Observers Say Turks Reject USSR Demands

Turkey Again Replies To Soviet Request For Joint Defense Of Vital Straits

ANKARA, Oct. 18, (AP)—Turkey today replied in detail to Russia's second demand for joint defense of the Dardanelles. Responsible persons said they are sure the Russian proposal was flatly rejected. It is also believed Turkey turned down the Russian plan for administration of the vital straits only by Black Sea powers. It is also believed Turkey rejected a Russian proposal to revise the 1833 Montreux Convention that governs the strait.

Newsmen thought the note was sent to Russia after two cabinet sessions and that Turkey probably suggested again that an international commission decide whether or not Turkey has lived up to the terms of the Montreux Convention.

Russia charged that Axis ships went through the Dardanelles during the war. In her first note to Russia, however, Turkey said some Axis vessels possibly did get through, but they did so illegally, and that she had always acted in good faith. In that earlier note, Turkey also declared that the joint defense of the Dardanelles would mean Russian bases on Turkish soil. She said that would violate Turkey's sovereign rights, and it is believed that Turkey has told Russia the same thing once more.

The United States and Britain have consistently backed Turkey's stand.

The text of the Turkish note probably will be made public in three days.

Judge Ware And Assistant Lauded By State Official

County Judge R. W. Hunting of deer, turkey, quail and squirrel is permitted from Nov. 20 to Nov. 30 every day and Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays are closed days thereafter. Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's days are open to hunting.

Open season for hunting the Ocala National Forest is Dec. 1 to 30 except on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The duck, goose and coot season is from Nov. 23 to Jan. 6.

Mysterious Communist Leader In U.S. Identified As Gerhard Eisler

NEW YORK, Oct. 18, (AP)—The former editor of the Communist newspaper, the Daily Worker, Louis F. Budenz, today named the mysterious figure who allegedly directs all Communist activity in the United States. Budenz declares the man is known as Hans Berger, but that his real name is Gerhard Eisler.

Budenz said he took orders from Berger while he was editing the Communist Daily Worker. Budenz left the Communist Party a year ago, joined the Roman Catholic Church, and now is an economics instructor at Fordham University. Budenz first announced in a speech in Detroit last Sunday the existence of a so-called secret, but dominant figure in American Communist affairs. He did not name the name. Budenz has now named his man but declined to give further information about Berger. The former editor said he would be a witness next month in Washington before the house committee on un-American affairs.

Budenz said in Detroit said in connection with the alleged American communist head:

"He never shows his face. He does not appear in official Communist buildings. Few Communist leaders here ever see him. They all, however, follow his orders or suggestions implicitly. His name on an article is a sign that it is official. The average rank and file American Communist, however, never heard of him."

Newspapers In State Face Big Paper Shortage

Florida Association Asks Congressmen For Immediate Aid

STUART, Oct. 18, (AP)—The Florida Press Association yesterday said more than 100 Florida newspapers face suspension of publication by January 1 because they have been notified by paper supply houses that they will have no paper to sell after December.

The association, through President Edwin A. Manning, publisher of the Stuart News, called on Florida's Congressional contingent for "immediate relief to break the OPA deadlock on newspaper prices."

Manning sent communications to Congressmen J. Hardin Peterson, Bob Sikes, Emory H. Price, Joe Hendricks, Pat Cannon, Dwight Rogers and Senators Pepper and Holland, warning:

"Approximately 100 newspapers in Florida, which are supplied by two paper houses, have been notified that contracts with the mills have expired and that the mills refuse to renew."

"They have been told flatly that there will be no newspaper after this year ends."

The paper houses have told the Florida publishers that OPA prices are below the world market, as a result of which 99 per cent of the world's newsprint which is manufactured in Canada and Finland is being diverted to Europe, South America and elsewhere. Unless steps are taken immediately to set up new contracts to supply Florida publishers, the foreign mills will have made commitments in other countries which will absorb their production for a year or more in advance and there will be no place to buy newsprint which Florida publishers must have."

Warning that "it is possible that the damage has already been done," he said, "this is the greatest crisis ever faced by the newspaper industry in Florida."

"An additional 125 Florida newspapers, customarily supplied by a Jacksonville paper house," he declared, "face a newspaper crisis because of the mill strike." "The Florida publishers," he stated, "are now on that ship and instead of only half of the newspapers of the State being crippled by cancellation of newspaper contracts by the mills, virtually 100 per cent of the papers will be crippled or put out of business unless immediate relief is obtained on both counts."

Note Left In Cell Reveals How Late Reichsmarschal Intended To Take Life

NUERNBERG, Oct. 18, (AP)—Hermann Goering, according to a high source in Nuernberg today, boasted in one of the three notes he left in his cell that he would cheat the hangman. One of the letters, it was learned, revealed how the late reichsmarschal intended to commit suicide under the nose of the military police that were assigned to guard him.

The letter was addressed to the American commandant of the Nuernberg jail, Col. B. C. Andrus.

Also found in Goering's cell was a letter to his widow, Emmy Goering, and one addressed to the German people, urging them to have courage.

It was also disclosed today in Nuernberg that Hitler's No. one henchman was not the only one of the eleven doomed Nazis who hoped to circumvent Allied retribution. It was revealed that between last January and the day of the execution, military policemen guarding the top German traitors found potential suicide weapons in the cells of the condemned on ten different occasions.

Scotland Yard Says Robbery Of Gems Work Of Experienced Thieves

Mrs. Goering cried today while talking to newsmen about her late husband. She declared, "I can't believe it yet. I can't imagine that this man is no longer alive. He was my husband, and I side with him, and I will side with him after his death too." She said she was glad Goering had been able to take his own life instead of being hanged, and added, "If one may be glad to die now, then I am glad that he died."

Mrs. Goering stated that she had longed to be able just to shake hands with him on one of her visits to the Nuernberg jail. The glass between them, preventing her from touching him, was that possibly it was lucky after all for it proved she was not the one who slipped him the poison.

Mrs. Goering said she once asked the late Reichsmarschal if he minded that the poison vial like both of them had, but Goering had told her she was wrong. Goering was perhaps afraid she might have been started otherwise and given his secret away.

It Costs Plenty To Feed Hungry U. S. Reporters

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Press Club, with its more than 3,000 resident and non-resident members, has lost a million dollars worth of business annually, mostly in steak sandwiches and other vittles.

Its stately men's dining room and men's bar and its ladies' dining room have become so over-taxed at the luncheon and dinner hours that the club is now opening another large room with a dining bar.

Here from 11 to 5 o'clock food will be served to both men and women. The man will take over the ladies' dining room during those hours.

To date this year the club has sold \$112,000 worth of food, drinks and wine for a total of \$16,000 and tobacco \$13,000. The total amount brought \$38,000 rental.

The new dining room is weakly set up with a long bar backed with mirrors across one corner of the room, a raspberry red plaid carpet, pale green walls and handily-covered draperies. Cost is estimated at around \$13,000.

The club's membership list of 804 active newspapermen, many of whom are the top echelon of the profession; 625 non-active members, prominent government officials, business and professional men; 499 associate members and 1,124 non-resident members.

The bar and card rooms are open only to members and guests who hold courtesy cards. The ladies' dining room is open only to women of members' families and to those newspaper women who have been passed upon by the board of directors and have been given courtesy cards.

The world's headlines have broken before the National Press Club and have been wired and cabled by it. One year, the President of the United States is held at dinner.

Pope Pius XII, visiting this country several years ago as Cardinal Pacelli, spoke before the membership at a club luncheon in English. Most of the members of the diplomatic corps have been his guests.

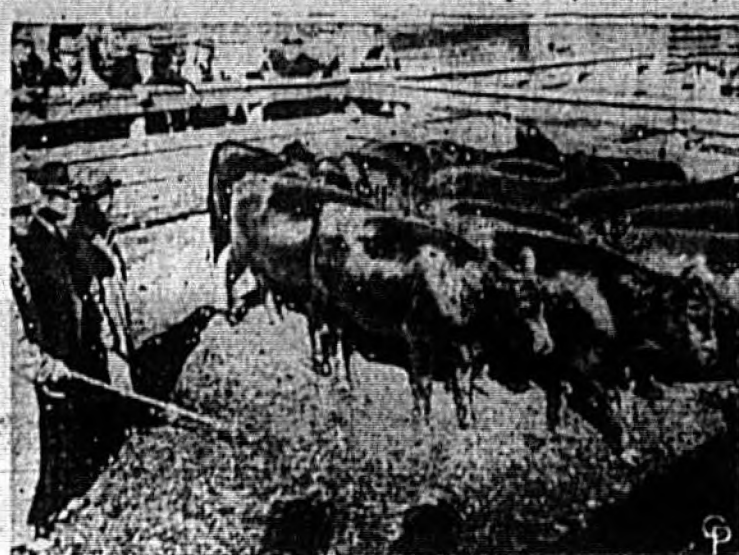

War-Wearied Pilots Find Relief Soaring High Without A Motor

AP News-features — Many a war-weary combat pilot has found relief from dream-like nerves in the past year at the controls of a powerless, vibrationless glider or sailplane, says John Robinson, national soaring champion.

"There's nothing like it for relaxing," declared Robinson, who has learned to soar faster and more quickly how to fly a powered plane." Robinson asserted. "And a qualified power pilot quickly becomes a better one once he has learned to soar."

"A forced landing without power has far less hazard to a pilot who understands soaring."

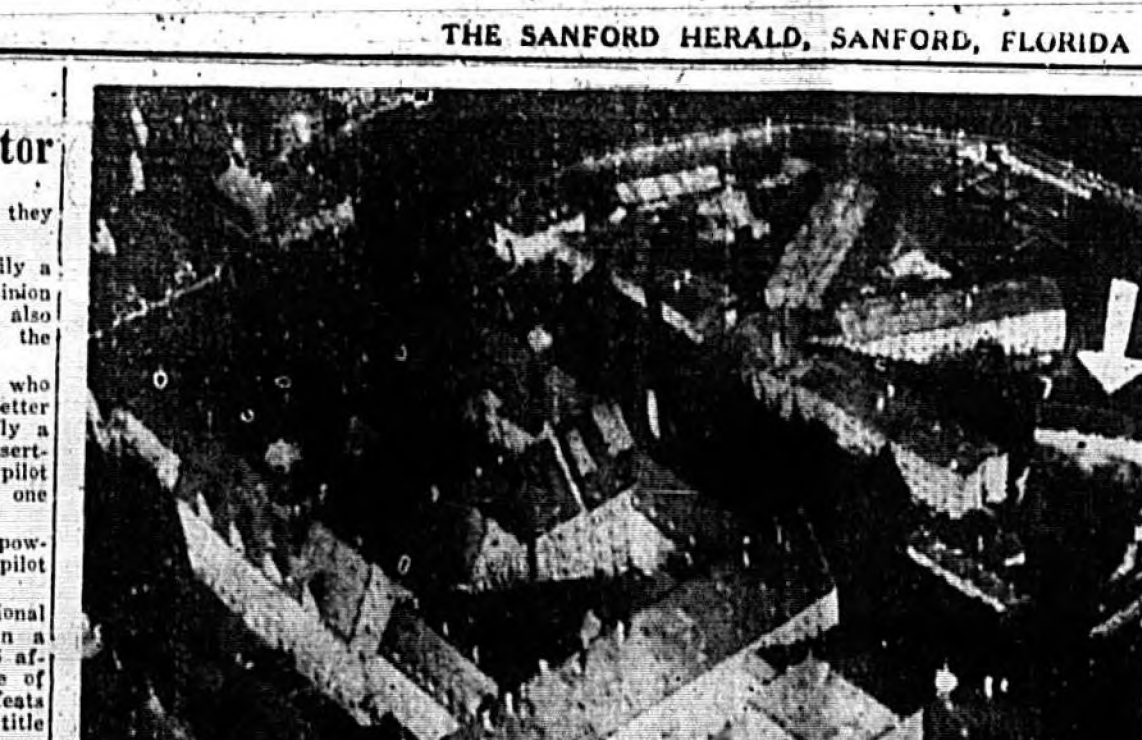
Robinson has won the national soaring title three times in a row, in 1940, 1941, and 1942. He says he has learned to soar in a wartime discontinuance of being the original glider pilot, and said they soared aloft in an unpowered plane long before they ever installed an engine.

Sailplane flying is primarily a sport, and, in Robinson's opinion it's the best there is. But it also has a practical value, says the stocky, balding pilot.

"In the first place a man who has learned to soar learns better and more quickly how to fly a powered plane," Robinson asserted. "And a qualified power pilot quickly becomes a better one once he has learned to soar."

"A forced landing without power has far less hazard to a pilot who understands soaring."

was a non-stop hop of 100 miles, with landing at the point of take-off. He also holds the distance record, 230 miles, set in 1940.

WASHINGTON (AP)—To those people who remember when their hardware dealer would gladly give them all the nails they needed for a small job around the house, the nail "shortage" is even more "rocky" than the scarcity of white shirts.

Nails used in pre-war days at around \$3.75 a keg now have been reported by the National Housing Agency (NHA) to be bringing as high as \$50 a keg in the black market. In thousands of communities a few nails are household repair job can't be had at any price.

Why the great scarcity? It's a matter of large demands for construction and repair work combined with the shortage of steel and ceiling prices on nails which have not been high enough to stimulate manufacturers to the required production. Dealers are required to set aside 75 percent of their monthly deliveries for veterans' housing.

The steel strike, cutting off supplies of that metal, lowered the production of nails early this year. The output dropped from an annual rate of 616,000 tons in the third quarter of 1945 to 465,000 tons in the first quarter of 1946. Also, despite substantial price increases granted by CPA, the industry claims it has been more profitable to divert steel wire rods into the production of items other than nails.

The total requirements for 1946, according to the NHA, are 795,000 tons. Estimated production is about 592,000 tons. The output in August was 61,000 tons, 18 percent greater than the July production and two-and-a-half times that of last January. The NHA, however, figures it needs to be stepping up to 45,000 or 50,000 tons a month.

The housing agency has asked the Civilian Production Administration (CPA) to request producers of steel wire rods to increase the supply rods for nail manufacturers sufficiently to enable them to meet the 45,000 to 50,000 tons a month goal. Under a previous informal agreement with CPA, the industry guaranteed to meet goals of 38,000 tons per month by September.

An interesting sidelight on the Comptroller contest is reported by Milton Plum, Tampa Tribune staff writer, who says that Senator Pepper backed the opposition to Governor Caldwell's man, Clarence Gay, and as a result the Governor is almost certain to enter the race against Senator Pepper in 1950. However, 1950 is a long way off and a lot of things can happen before then.

The Tampa Tribune quotes the Constitution to press that Senator Ed Fraser is not qualified to hold the office for which he was recently nominated by the State Democratic Committee: "No Senator or member of the House of Representatives shall, during the term for which he was elected, be appointed or elected to any civil office under the Constitution of this state, that has been created or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such term." Fraser was a member of the Senate which increased the Comptroller's salary from \$7,500 to \$9,000.

Negotiations with Czechoslovakia for a \$50,000,000 loan have been broken off. The State Department reveals because of Czech opposition to American policies in Europe and angry charges of "dollar imperialism" against this country. Czechoslovakia, one of those little Central European nations behind Russia's "iron curtain," has been taking its cue from Moscow, doing its best to help block Secretary Byrnes program for lasting European peace, while at the same time seeking to borrow money from this country for a national system. We say, to hell with 'em. Let 'em borrow their money from Russia.

Florida business, employing eight or more, are paying state unemployment taxes at the rate of \$200,000 a month to a benefit fund which has paid out more than \$30,000,000 in the last ten years without an investigation or without many people knowing anything at all about who gets what and why. A Tampa Tribune reporter who has been doing a little investigation on his own account, reveals that unemployment compensation is paid to people who are not entitled to it because of the failure of former employers to deduct against such payments. When a man quits his job he is not entitled to unemployment compensation, yet many claim it just the same and get it. And many claim to be repeaters who are habitually unemployed.

War Claims

A study of the 75,000 war claims for \$66,000,000, paid by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company on the lives of its American and Canadian policyholders during World War II reveals several interesting trends of the mortality in the greatest war of all time, according to the insurance company's statisticians.

By far the greatest number of claims—54,000 of the total—was paid for deaths due to enemy action. This number represents nearly one sixth of the total losses suffered in action by the two countries, the Metropolitan estimates. They also found that the course and intensity of American and Canadian fighting could be accurately charted from the claims paid for battle deaths.

"The mortality from disease was very low among men in service in this war," the company reports. Among the ground forces such deaths were found to be in the ratio of about 1 to 13 battle deaths. In World War I the figures for battle deaths and deaths from disease were approximately equal, while in the Spanish-American war the ratio was exactly reversed; namely, 13 deaths from disease for each battle death. This improvement in the relative mortality from disease is attributed by the statisticians to efficient medical organization and service, skillful surgery, and the use of blood plasma, sulfa drugs, and penicillin.

The record for non-battle injuries—largely accidents—was found to be less satisfactory. The ratio of fatal non-battle injuries to battle deaths was about 1 to 4 among the ground forces, as compared with 1 in 12 in the first World War. This was held to be due largely to the mechanized nature of present-day warfare, as approximately one half of the deaths from accidents resulted from air transport.

The peak of battle death claims was reached in June and July 1944, coincidentally with the D-Day landings and the fighting in Normandy. Minor peaks resulted from the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944, and during the break-through into Germany in March 1945. Preceding the landings in France, the claim curve had been a gradually ascending one, with sharp surges marking the attack on Pearl Harbor, the Dieppe raid, the North African and Sicilian invasions, the landings in the Gilberts, and the fighting in Italy.

Another interesting trend noted by the Metropolitan was that of the civilian war deaths, which amounted to 2 per cent of the deaths from enemy action for the war period as a whole. These fatalities—almost entirely merchant seamen—were relatively much more prominent in the early years of the war when heavy losses were inflicted on our merchant ships.

In 1942 almost one-fifth of the deaths from enemy action in this insurance experience were among civilians, as compared with one-twentieth in 1943, and a negligible proportion in both 1944 and 1945, thus reflecting the subsidence of the submarine menace.

Gadget For Polio

Some army man whose name is now remembered only as Burns invented a particular kind of valve while he was stationed at Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, during the war. It was just one of countless gadgets developed by the Army Air Forces because it seemed useful at the time.

That gadget, worth about 50 cents, is now believed to have been a major factor in saving the lives of 16 polio victims. It is used on an oxygen tank; to permit the oxygen to pass through a mask into a person's lungs. When normal lung capacity has been reached, the valve itself shuts off, then opens in time for the next breath.

With this apparatus, a constant flow of oxygen can be maintained without the usual tent which encloses the entire body up to the neck. Thus the Sister Kenny treatment of massage and hot packs can begin before the patient is able to resume normal breathing.

Soldier Burns, who is doubtless a civilian by now, can be very proud of his valve invention. In the extensive, difficult fight against polio, his little gadget seems to have been one of the few practical advances made in a long time.

Use For Poll Tax

Using state taxes to run a political campaign is a new idea advanced by Horace Wilkinson, a Birmingham, Alabama, lawyer who is reputed to have been the chief adviser in James E. Loism's capture of the Democratic primary for governor. Wilkinson proposes doubling the present poll tax, with half of the proceeds going as now to schools, and the other half to finance a campaign to elect a Southern president.

Apart from the constitutionality of the idea, which is more than doubtful, not all southerners would want select. It might also be guessed that there is much less chance of the poll tax being doubled than of being repealed entirely.

Dictatorship Runs Rife

That OPA merely worships its charts and regulations and cares not a whit whether the people have anything to eat or not is illustrated in a story told in The New York Times by Arthur Krock.

The Alberens Stone corporation, operating a quarry in the mountains above Charlottesville, Va., customarily provides for the needs of its employees through a company store, because it is remote from any trading center.

The quarry workers require a substantial diet. Before June 30 the company store bought a truckload of meat a week from Swift and Armour, but when OPA lapped in July, the company, to make sure that its workers got their diet of meat, bought fifteen steers and put them on its farm. An arrangement was made with an abattoir at Charlottesville to slaughter the steers as they were needed.

Then OPA was revived, and forthwith the company was served with a summons over the name of Paul Porter because it had slaughtered four of the steers and sold the meat to its employees at June 30 ceiling prices.

The company demanded to know the basis of charges against it, which were listed in the summons only as a violation of the Second War Powers Act. It was informed by OPA that slaughterers were held to their

Dear Friends: We have now argued again before the Interstate Commerce Commission the case of the reorganization of the Florida East Coast Railroad which has been in bankruptcy. Under the Federal Bankruptcy Law when a railroad is insolvent it is the duty of the Interstate Commerce Commission to determine who of those who apply to operate such a bankrupt railroad can render the best transportation service to the public and work out a plan for the operation of such railroad. The Commission in such cases must under the law provide fair and equitable treatment for creditors.

For many years the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad has been connecting with the FEC at Jacksonville. The FEC gets about half its freight from and delivers about half its freight to the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad. The FEC and ACL the great majority of all the passengers that it handles. Since the ACL is an old, well established Southern railroad and has had this long-time connection with the FEC and since it was the only regular railroad company applying for the operation of the FEC I have advocated, as did Senator Peterson, that it should be the public interest for the Atlantic Coast Line to operate the FEC which is 1-8 of the railroad mileage in Florida in any other business of importance than for it to be operated by the St. Joe Paper Company with headquarters at Port St. Joe, Florida, which is a subsidiary of the duPont estate in Florida. I have taken the position that it is not in the public interest to have a railroad which is so vital to the public as the FEC is simply made a cog in a great financial empire like the duPont empire in Florida which already has 17 banks with total resources of nearly \$400,000,000 and vast enterprises of many sorts and is rapidly expanding. The reason that there is so great a temptation for the duPont estate in the operation of the FEC, if it got it, to give the best railroad service to the shipper or the manufacturer who did business with the duPont banks. There would be too great a temptation for the duPont estate to give the best reservations on their trains to those who did business with some of the many enterprises belonging to the duPont estate. For instance, it was brought out in the record of this FEC case that in Miami all the tenants of the duPont Building have to sign up in their lease to do business with the duPont bank on the first floor of the building. What if the duPont estate should also say if you have an office in our building or you get reservations at our hotel or if you get reservations on our railroad you have got to do business with the duPont banks. Would that be fair to other carriers? And would it be fair to other

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 18 (AP)—Officials of the strike-bound Duquesne Light Company announced that a high-powered bullet was fired into a large outdoor transformer at one of the company's stations in the Pittsburgh suburb. A company spokesman said that no one saw the shot fired but that the bullet went through the transformer. The company spokesman said the damage to the transformer reduced the supply of electricity to the Pittsburgh industrial area. Some sections of the area were without current from four to 15 minutes. 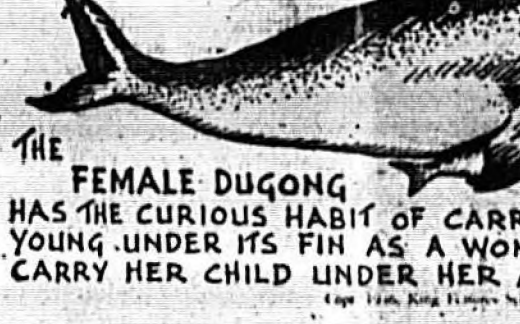

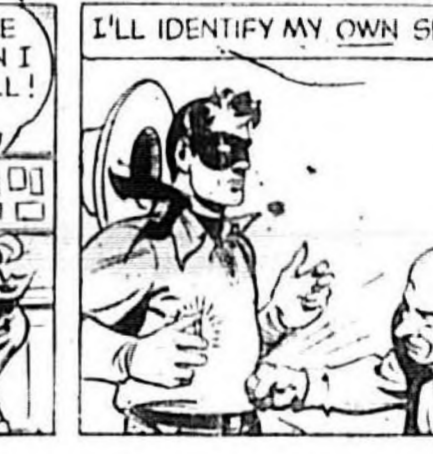
