Test scores rise, but

School district eyes improvements

Herald Staff Writer

SANFORD - Students in Seminole County showed a little improvement overall on CTBS scores between last year and this.

Some schools showed a marked improvement while others dropped dramatically 'Overall, I think the schools

stayed on par with their programs." David Winger, director of testing for the school district said. "There wasn't, statistically, much significant change ... which is good."


The students in grades 2, 4 and 8 are tested annually with the Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills (CTBS). The tests are divided into three sections: reading, language and math.

Scores from 0 to 100 are given in each section. The scores in each section are averaged for each school and for the district. The national average is 50.

Seminole County second graders scored an average of 52 on the reading portion of the test; 64 on the language; and 64 on the math. In 1993, they scored an average of 50 in the reading: 61 on the language: and 62 on the math.

The fourth graders scored an average of 56 on the reading; 61 on the language and 66 on the math. In 1993, they scored 56 on the reading; 62 on the language and 65 on the math.



While Winger said changes of less than 10 points are "not really

statistically significant," there were dramatic diffeences in the scores at some of the individual schools.

Murder trial Verdict expected today

SANFORD - A circuit court jury continued their effort to reach a verdict this morning in the first degree murder trial of Anton Daryl Meyers. Jurors were sequestered in a local motel late Thursday night when they became too tired to continue working.

After deliberating about seven and one-half hours, the jurors told Judge Alan A. Dickey at 10:30 p.m. they were too exhausted to continue. The jury foreman said after 16 hours of intense focus, the jurors were not capable of giving the case the concentration necessary to reach a verdict. "We have a ways left to go," the foreman said.

Prior to deliberations, the jurors listened to prosecution and defense closing arguments.

Meyers is charged with murder in the disappearance seven years ago of Lake Mary teen Kathy Engels during an attempted rape. Prosecu-tion witnesses testified Meyers de-See Murder, Page 5A

Miller vies for circuit judge seat

SANFORD - Altamonte Springs lawyer Robert E. Miller has announced he will seek election as a circuit court judge in the Eighteenth Judicial Circuit. The circuit is comprised of Seminole and Brevard counties.

Miller, 40, is a partner in the firm of Miller and Grace. P.A. In his law practice, Miller represents many small business clients, small developers and homeowners' associations. In addition, he is a trained mediator.

"My concerns are with the frustrations that I see with the individuals in Seminole and Brevard counties have in having to deal with the court system," Miller said about why he is running for judge. "Having represented

only individuals and/or small business corporations in the 14 years that I've practiced, I think I have a good handle on what people feel when they walk into the courtroom, what they expect, what they anticipate. And then, the results that they get. And I think part of it has to do with the failure of the court system or our judicial system to adequately communicate with our citizenry. I'd like to do some things maybe a little bit differently than some of the current judges that we have in terms of being able to provide more finding of fact as in civil cases, so that people get a better understanding of what the thinking of the court is when they render a decision.

Volusia injunction denied

ORLANDO - Volusia County Sheriff Bob Vogel claimed a small victory Thursday from a federal Judge's ruling refusing

an injunction against his drug-and-cash confiscation squad.
U.S. District Judge Anne Conway also denied class-action status for a lawsuit filed by a black motorist, Sciena Washington, and a Hispanic motorist, Jorge Nater, against the

The judge dropped the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People as a plaintiff in the suit, saying it failed to show that any members had been stopped by deputies or that members' money had been seized. Dismissal of those motions Wednesday does not prevent the

motorists from seeking money damages. NAACP lawyers said they would not be deterred by the ruling. They are expected to seek damages.

Vogel said he was pleased by the ruling and would continue to justify the actions of his officers, who stop motorists along Interstate 95 believed to be involved in drug trafficking.

Navy settles waste case

JACKSONVILLE - The Navy has agreed to pay \$151,000 to settle state charges that Jacksonville's Naval Aviation Depot mismanaged hazardous industrial waste.

"It's not that we want to collect money from the Navy. We want them to comply with the regulations, the same way everybody else does," said Ashwin Patel, who runs the Department of Environmental Protection's hazardous waste office in Jacksonville.

The Navy agreed to pay \$31,000 to a state environmental trust fund and pay for \$120,000 worth of new equipment and training to reduce the production of industrial waste at the

The Navy admitted no wrongdoing in a settlement it negotiated with DEP.

Youth acquitted in dentist murder

DAYTONA BEACH - A youth acquitted of the 1991 murder of his dentiat stepfather has settled a civil suit over estate and insurance money with his three siblings.

Jason Larzelere, 21, agreed to accept \$75,000 and give up rights to money generated by accounts of the highly publicized shotgun slaying of Edgewater dentist Norman Larzelere in his

Jason Larzelere was acquitted in September 1992 of being the masked gunman who chased the dentist down an office hallway and fired as the victim huddled behind the waiting groom door.

Jason's mother, Virginia Larzelere, was convicted of masterminding the shooting of her husband for insurance money. She is on death row awaiting execution. Jason had been adopted by the dentist, who had three other children with Virginia Larzelere.

The three younger children - Jessica, 17, Benjamin, 7, and David, 4 - filed a civil suit against Jason to prevent him from sharing in insurance money. The young boys were adopted recently by paternal grandparents Lucille and Norman

Under terms of the agreement announced Wednesday, the siblings retain all literary, dramatic, spoken stage, motion picture, radio, television and other commercial rights-

Wells Fargo theft uncovered

FORT MYERS - A Wells Fargo supervisor arrested on grand theft charges may have stolen up to \$100,000 in cash in the last 18 months, police said.

Steven Horton, 28, used much of the money to buy computer Detective Sgt. Mark Zellman said Thursday. Wells Fargo officials discovered the theft after an internal

audit, Zellman said. Horton had access to bags of eash arriving at the offices each day. "The amounts varied," Zellman said. "If they had a really

big day, he would be prone to take more, if it was a light money day, he'd be prone to take less money.' It is still unclear how much money was taken, or how the

theft was accomplished. So far, police can account for about \$50,000, Zeliman said.

PENSACOLA - Cold weather, mites and disease are believed to have delayed, but not stopped, the migration of so-called killer bees to Florida, a state expert says. They are heading this way. There is nothing we know of

in 1900 but have remained south of Houston.

Poor students to file suit

Seminole won't be involved with 43 districts

TALLAHASSEE - Four civil rights groups want to represent Florida's poorest children in a lawsuit that accuses the state of failing to adequately educate its students.

"We believe that the state's attention must first be focused on the children it has educated least adequately," said Mary Gundrum, an attorney for the NAACP and groups representing Hispanics and Haitlans.

Representing the civil rights groups and the families of 38 poor children, Gundrum filed a motion Thursday in Tallahassee circuit court asking that they be allowed to join in a lawsuit filed two months ago by 43 school boards against the state,

The Seminole County school district is not among those district filing the suit.

"They talked about it," said Dr. Hortense Evans, administrative assistant to Supt. Paul Hagerty, "but we never got involved." Evans did not know the district's reasons for chosing not to get involved in the suit.

All 38 children involved in the suit go to

population is poor, according to Gundrum.

The lawsuit alleges that the state has not lived up to the guarantee made in the Florida Constitution that it will provide an adequate education to all its children. It also says lawmakers should allocate more money for education.

Poor children have no chances of building better lives if they don't get a good education, Gundrum said.

"Without it, Florida can expect to pay increased welfare costs and unemployment costs," Gundrum said. "More importantly, without it, the state will pay the social cost of a lost generation whose children would have been its greatest hope."

Many poor children are clumped together in schools with dark hallways, peeling paint. inadequate plumbing and outdated textbooks that have to be shared, Gundrum said.

Their teachers are less experienced and their classes are less challenging, the Gainesville attorney continued. The groups will help the lawsuit both

Problems at schools that have large numbers of poor students include dark hallways, broken lockers, peeling paint, inadequate plumbing and "library shelving that does not get replaced until termites eat through both shelves and books," Gundrum said.

Baptist and Catholic dialogue endorsed

ORLANDO - Southern Baptists and Roman Catholics can be more than political soul mates, the nation's largest Protestant denomination has declared.

In a major step toward ecumeniciam, the Southern Baptist Convention said Thursday born-again believers may be found in all Christian denominations, and endorsed Baptist-Catholic dialogue.

"We live in a land where there is a demonic onslaught against the forces of deceney and righteousness, and we need to stand with good people together,' Timothy George, dean of Beesom Divinity School in Montgomery, Ala., told the convention on the final day of its 137th annual meeting.

The declaration overwhelmingly approved by about 7,500 convention delegates places no limits on the freedom of Baptists to persuade other Christians to switch churches. It also acknowledges serious theological differences with Catholics on issues that include papal infalli- widely publicized appeal for bility and the relation between closer relations signed by conthe Bible and church tradition. 🦠 Set against the historical en-

mity between the nation's two largest religious groups, the formal declaration of the desire for dialogue was seen as historically significant.

"It certainly is a major step to consider whether members of other churches really are part of the Body of Christ," said the Rev. Frank Ruff of the Secretariat for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs of the National Conference of Catholic

Baptists and Catholics have quietly had conversations since 1971, beginning with informal regional dialogues and progressing to national conversations between Catholic and Baptist scholars. This year, particlpants in a Catholic-Baptist diaogue jointly sponsored by the Baptist Home Mission Board and the bishops conference published five pamphlets offering biblical reflections on social issues, including the environment and racism.

Still, such conversations have never been formally endorsed by the annual convention.

What brought the discussion into the forefront this year was a servative Catholic leaders and prominent evangelicals.

Governor signs budget, vetoes few items

TALLAHASSEE - Florida's \$38.6 billion budget contains far fewer vetoes than feared by lawmakers who trounced Gov. Lawton Chiles' health-care plan.

Retaliation fears were unfounded, Chiles said Thursday before making public \$2.8 mlllion in spending cuts by his line-liem veto pen.

The largest budget in Florida history, passed by lawmakers two months earlier, includes \$330 million for prison space for 17,033 more criminals, \$237.4

million for Juvenile Justice in- director, David Coburn. cluding boot camps and academies for more than 2,000 offenders, and \$10.9 billion for education.

"This budget funds a comprehensive public safety strategy that is tough, smart and honest - to lock up violent criminals and prevent a new generation of prison inmates." Chiles said. The spending plan authorizes

more than 121,000 state employees - up by more than 4,000 - with most of the new Jobs in corrections programs.

"You've got to staff those things," said Chiles' budget

Spending cuts by Chiles were far less than the \$43.8 million singled out as deserving the ax last month by a tax research "Election-year politics resulted

in too few budget turkey vetoes," said Dominic Calabro, president of Florida TaxWatch.

"I'm kind of upset that he vetoed projects for Coral Gables and the city of Miami," said Sen. Al Gutman, R-Miami. He was among Republican lawmakers who said they were bracing for retribution for fighting Chiles on ·health care.

Chiles cut a \$150,000 appropriation from a Hurricane Andrew Recovery and Rebuilding Trust Fund to put hurricane shutters on a Coral Gables youth center. He said the fund's purpose is hurricane recovery,

not prevention. He vetoed \$90,360 from the fund to help Miami pay cost overruns on hurricane damage repair at Monty Trainer's Marina, saying it isn't a high priority compared with other hurricane area needs.

"I don't know if it's based on merit or based on retribution. Gutman said.





Man who held girl prisoner in a dungeon pleads guilty

RIVERHEAD, N.Y. - A man accused of imprisoning a 10-year-old girl in a backyard dungeon for 16 days pleaded guilty to kidnapping and admitted he built the bunker specifically for the youngster a year before he abducted her.

Under the plea bargain, John Esposito is expected to get 15 years to life in prison July 28 for Katle Beers' 1992 kidnapping. The 45-year-old building contractor entered the plea Thurs-

Prosecutors said that he forced Katic into a box in the bunker after she resisted his sexual advances. She survived on bologna sandwiches, sodas and funk food, and watched a television placed in the cell with her.

District Attorney James Catterson said he accepted the plea bargain to spare Katle, now 12, from having to testify at a trial. Esposito could have received 25 years to life on the original

in court, Esposito, speaking barely above a whisper, admitted that he had schemed for a year to abduct the girl, whom he had known since she was born.

"For what purpose was this room constructed?" Catterson

"It was constructed to hold Katie," Esposito said softly.

Esposito's lawyer, Andrew Siben, said Esposito abducted the child because he was "very concerned about the life that Katle was living. ... John wanted to take her out of a very dysfunctional family setting."

Weapon in Simpson slaying found?

LOS ANGELES — Police re-portedly found a bloody ski mask in O.J. Simpson's mansion and the weapon believed used in the stabbing deaths of his exwife and a friend - a sharp. military-style digging tool.

Detectives also questioned witnesses who cast doubt on Simpson's alibi, and expanded their investigation halfway across the country, using metal detectors Thursday to search an overgrown, junk-strewn field near the Chicago hotel the former football star checked into hours after the bodies were

A homicide detective who spoke on condition of anonymity told The Associated Press that investigators had finished their reports and that Simpson's arrest was imminent. He would not elaborate.

The 46-year-old Simpson has denied any involvement in the slayings of Nicole Brown Simpson, 35, and Ronald Goldman, 25. Their bodies were found Sunday night outside Mrs. Simpson's condominium in the city's Brentwood section.

Police were analyzing the bloody military style entrenching tool, which resembles a sharp-edged shovel, the Daily News of Los Angeles reported today, citing unidentified police sources. The newspaper did not say where the tool was found.

KCOP-TV, citing unidentified police sources, said that police found a bloody ski mask in Simpson's house. The station also said that police believe a military knife was used in the killings, but it did not elaborate.

The football Hall of Famer flew to Chicago from Los Angeles late Sunday for a business meeting. then returned a few hours later after he was told of his ex-wife's

Detective Bert Luper, one of two Los Angeles officers in Chicago investigating the slayings, said that someone who stopped at a gas station near the O'Hare Plaza Hotel in Chicago reported seeing a person who looked like Simpson in the field. Luper wouldn't say what searchers were looking for. "We're working on an anony-

mountlp," he said. Meanwhile, a woman who jogged by Mrs. Simpson's condo at about the time of the killings told a detective that a vehicle generally resembling Simpson's was parked across the street, the Los Angeles Times reported to-

"I saw a light-colored Ford Bronco or Blazer-type car," the woman, who requested anonymity, told the Times. The newspaper reported previously that bloodstains were found in Simpson's white Ford Bronco.

ago, in the early Sunday morning hours of June 28, 1969, the New York police carried out one of their routine bigoted raids on the Stonewall Bar. But this time, sev-

eral of the patrons, a few of them drag queens and pro-stitutes, refused to go quietly. The police unleashed an orgy of violence followed by five days of rioting. As Martin Luther had declared in his tradition-breaking speech at Worms in 1521, gay and lesbian peo-ple also announced.

'Here we stand; we can do no other." With that declaration, the gay movement marched into history.



Folks' perception of Father Nature would be vestly different from their view of Mother Nature, just like their perceptions toward dads and mome in general. Ask your typical, errant teen-ager whom he'd rather have greet him on the porch when he arrives home with

- will grant them yet another reprieve.

Budweiser breath at 3 a.m. for the third time. Exceptions aside, the usual mom will scream, holler and sob, "why are you doing scream, holler and sob, "why are you doing this to us?" she will glare ominously at the offender while listening to a "heartfelt" apology. Then she il fet her pseudo-sorry offspring slink upstairs to bed. She il lie awake for an hour wondering where she went wrong. Dad's response to catching Junior slumped on the stoon; local the front door and return to bed, mumbling, "Do his butt good to sleep outside."

Despite her tendency toward temper tantrums in the form of natural disasters (hurricanes, earthquakes, Tom and Roscanne Arnold), Mother Nature is largely perceived as benign. Tribal slaughter is genocide

WASHINGTON - Deep in the heart of Africa, Rep. Tony Hall, D-Ohio, recently found himself staring out at a gleaming waterfall surrounded by thick foliage. It was, he says, some of the most picturesque scenery he had ever seen.

"Then all the sudden," he told us, "you saw bodies coming over (the waterfall), and you said 'That's not what I think it is.' And then one and then two and then three and

then boom, boom, boom, one right after another.... It was just

numbing." As a presidential observer in Rwanda earlier this month. Hall witnessed the grim results of two months of tribal warfare that has resulted in an entimated 400,000 deaths. The bloated, mutilated and often headless bodies of innocent civilians have clogged the Kagera River between Rwanda and Tanzania in recent weeks. The number of Tuisis - the minortty tribe that's

has been cut in half over the last two months from 18 percent to 9 percent of the population, Hall says.

Hall will report his Andings to President Clinton this week. There is no doubt in Hall's mind that the ethnic bloodshed is an act of genocide, and his report will urge the administration to label it as such.

This could put the administration in a tight spot. Under the Genocide Convention of 1948, signatory countries are required by international law to find the guilty parties and bring them to justice once killings are labeled an act of genocide.

So far, the White House and State Department have fudged and fumbled over using the word "genocide" to describe the slaughter in Rwanda. Officials will only say that "based on evidence we have seen or observed on the ground, we have every reason to believe that acts of genocide have occurred in

A State Department official says the United States is waiting for a special United Nations report on human rights in Rwanda before deciding if the killings will be labeled genocide. But the U.N. report could take five more weeks. "Who knows what could happen by that time?" Hall said.

An international peacekeeping force the U.N. security council agreed to send to Rwanda has also been delayed by the Pentagon's red tape. It will take at least another month before 5,500 U.N. soldiers are deployed to Rwanda, for that's how long it will take the Pentagon to deliver the 46 armored personnel carriers it agreed to loan to the mission.

Hall stops short of calling for armed American intervention. That doesn't mean America can't lead by exhausting its legal options. "No country, no government is calling it genocide," Hall told our associate Andrew Conte. "I think we could prevent a lot more deaths if we could get involved first legally and then in all the other ways we're supposed to We have every right in the world to put a stop to this."

While America fiddles. Rwanda continues to burn. Tutsi refugees are piling into neighboring Tanzania even faster than dead bodies are clogging the rivers. Food and water supplies are low, Hall says, while the camps continue to grow by as many as 4,000 people

Hall is no stranger to human suffering. As chairman of the Congressional Hunger Caucus, Hall has travelled extensively through the world's most wretched environs. None of his travels prepared him for Rwanda.

see what they might need to improve on where they went down and what they're doing right if the scores rose dramatically."

For example, at Lakeview Middle School in Sanford, scores went up from 40 to 55 in reading: from 45 to 53 in language and from 41 to 55 in

"They have a new attitude toward testing there," he said. There's a new administration there and they are looking at things differently.

According to Jim Shupe, principal at Lakeview, they have tried to make the testing atmosphere as comfortable as possible for the students. They played Mozart (which Shupe said has been proven to improve test scores) and try to ensure the students are relaxed during the

"We're very pleased with the results." he said. "We're going to do whatever it takes."

At other schools, where scores may have dipped. Winger had no explanation as to what may have caused the decrease. It is something, he said, that the schools will have to look at with their improvement committees, their teachers and their administrators. He said he will prepare a statistical analysis of the data that he hopes will help them in finding solutions.

Winger cautions that comparing the CTBS scores from one year to the next is "not really fair." noting that the test really represents a group of students rather than the school in gener-

'We would be better served. for example, comparing the fourth grade scores from this year with the second grade scores from two years ago," he

The test scores have fallen steadily the last few years, Winger said, because a change was made in the test in 1992. Every five or six years, he said, the test is changed and updated. That year and the following year are traditionally lower scoring periods as the schools adjust to the new test.

He could not account for why the scores at many of the schools continued to fall this year.

"We are looking into that," he said. "But on the average the scores have leveled off and have gone up. So, really, it's just those lew schools we need to look at."

The school district staff said there are ongoing plans in the district to make improvements at all the schools in an effort to raise standardized test scores across the board.

Leinster attacked the credibility of inmates testifying for the state as a liars' match between convicts. He claimed the inmates

Meyers case.

Whitaker repeatedly asked, "What was this man doing?" when Meyers told three young girls that he was 19, bought them beer, and drank with them most of the night. The girls were 12. 13 and 14 years old and Meyers was nearly 27 at the time. The attorney claims Meyers was after sex but when Engels resisted, he killed her.

Although each of the commissioners had voiced opinions on the matter during the June 2 meeting, they restated their feelings again last night. I chaired the Charter Review

Committee when this first came up," sald Mayor Rockett. "We recommended that the city charter be changed to have three year terms rather than two, but when it went before the commission which was scated at that time, it was voted down and never got onto the ballot."

Rockett explained that if the measure now being presented is approved, two commission scats would be up for 3-year term elections in 1995, with the mayor's position and other two commission scats to be voted on in 1996. There would be no election required in 1997.

"I believe we've grown as a city over the years," Rockett sald, "and we have reached the point where we should have at least one year out of every three without having to get involved in politics."

"I disagree," commented Commissioner George Duryea. "I don't see this as starting with any ground-swell from the people. This isn't citizen initiated, and I believe two year terms are sufficient. If a person does a good job during that time, he or she can get reelected again."

Commissioner Sheila Sawyer, who also served on the former Charter Review Committee agreed that she still preferred two year terms. "I don't recall exactly what the vote by the committee was when this first came up," she said, "but I voted against it, and I remember the vote wasn't unanimous.

She added that she recalled the term-lengthening concept came up as the result of several citizen suggestions during charter review hearings.

Commissioner Gary Brender supported the three year length. as he did two weeks prior. "I think it's only sensible," he said. 'Our governmental duty on the commission is to set policy which often affects our future, but if we have a different commission every two years, we'll have to spend all of our time politicking."

Lake Mary resident Ethel Carlson stepped forward during public discussion. "I've been attending commission meetings for the past 13 years," she said. "I've found if commissioners did a good job, they were always reelected. But there were times when some didn't do a good job and I found myself wishing their term would only be for one year so I could vote against them."

Carlson urged the commission to vote in favor of having the question placed on the ballot.

Two weeks ago, when the commission voted to have the question presented in ordinance form, the vote was unanimous. Last night, with the question before them of placing it on the November ballot, the vote was four to one, with Commissioner Duryea voting against it.

The second matter to appear on the ballot in November pertains to the swearing-in date for newly elected commissioners. This is just some word changes," said City Manager John Litton. "We have been swearing in new commissioners seven days after the election was verified, but this ordinance would have the swearing in at the first regular or special commission meeting following the election."

The commission voted to have

it placed on the ballot with a unanimous vote, and no discussion. Both of the ordinances were

presented on first reading, and will be required to pass second reading and public hearing. expected to be scheduled at the July 7th commission meeting.

Clinton urges Congress to pass crime legislation

CHICAGO - Haunted by grim memories of children living in fear, President Clinton is urging Congress to deliver overdue crime legislation and "atick up for the right of people to be safe in their

The president today was visiting the Robert Taylor Homes, the nation's largest housing project, to increase pressure on legislators to finish work on a crime bill he had once hoped to sign by Christmas. A Memorial Day deadline came and went as well.

Speaking at a Democratic fund-raiser Thursday night. Clinton said his visit to the South Side towers was part of an effort "to try to bring safety and sanity to public housing in Chicago and throughout the United States."

"We're going out to Robert Taylor Homes tomorrow to stick up for the right of people to be safe in their homes and to raise their children in

Aides said Clinton would use today's visit to push for final passage of the crime bill and to stress the need to educate young people and teach them values that will help them resist the pull of drugs and crime.

The House and Senate have approved differing versions of crime legislation, and negotiators on Thursday began trying to craft a compromise that would put more police on the streets, build more prisons and create more crime-prevention programs.

Clinton has taken a particular interest in the massive Robert Taylor project since a federal judge ruled earlier this year that the Chicago Housing Authority had violated constitutional protections when it began searching apartments for guns without first obtaining search warrants.

Clinton supported the searches and said earlier this week he didn't mind making groups like the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Rifle Association mad "when we decided that we'd try to help sweep the housing projects in

In March alone, 89 weapons, including 26 semi-automatic weapons, along with 1,700 rounds of ammunition were confiscated at the development, according to the White House. The 28 16-story buildings stretch out for miles and are home to 13,000 people. Residents complain of unremitting violence and gong activity.

The Clinton administration approved \$2.8 million to help combat the problem and has worked with local authorities to put more police in the projects, ready vacant units for new residents, increase tenant patrols, renovate playgrounds and set up midnight basketball leagues for youth.

Clinton says he has never forgotten his 1991 visit to two other Chicago housing projects. Rockwell Gardens and AHLA, when he was Arkansas governor.

In a radio address earlier this year, he recalled the children he met there: "They talked of gunshots and drug dealers, of late-night knocks at their doors and hallways where they dared not atray. Many of their stories had a common theme: Their childhoods were being stolen from them."

Clinton says the crime legislation would complement administration efforts to make public housing safer.

Rep. Jack Brooks, the Texas Democrat who chairs the conference committee on the crime bill, said he is seeking a "balance between hard-nosed punishment and forward-looking prevention."

Brooks and Senate Judielary Committee Chairman Joseph Biden Jr., D-Del., have worked out their own proposed compromise between the \$22 billion, five-year Senate bill and the \$28 billion, six-year House bill.

The outlines of their \$30.2 hillion, six-year measure are supported by the Justice Department. The proposal calls for: \$10.9 billion to state and local law enforcement, including almost \$9 billion for 100,000 community police officers: \$8.4 billion for state and local prisons: \$1.9 billion for federal law enforcement; \$7.6 billion for prevention; \$1.4 billion for drug courts.

Congress may test Clinton's veto threat on health care reform

WASHINGTON - President Clinton's grand goal of private health insurance for "every American" its in jeopardy in Congress, and he may soon have to decide whether he's willing to follow through on his threat to veto anything that falls short.

In both houses of Congress, designed to create universal coverage are under heavy attack as Democratic lawmakers work to protect small businesses and other interests in an election scason.

Already, some Democratic lawmakers looking for compromise are working to redefine the words Clinton used when he issued his veto threat, while others urge him not to enforce it.

"I think we need to step back from that cliff," Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., says of the threat Clinton uttered in January. Boren, leaving Congress this year, says drafting a bill to achieve 91 percent coverage "la probably an acceptable level" and Congress could always make changes in the future.

"I'd find a way to not stress the veto threat," said Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb. "I'd keep the pressure on because I think he's heading in the right direction, though."

cited in the health care debate. 91 percent insurance coverage is roughly what could be achieved without forcing employers to finance the bulk of coverage for their workers. That provision in Clinton's bill is hotly con-

Labor economists view full employment at roughly 95 percent of the population, he says, and similar logic should apply to health care. He also cited a study estimating that if 91 percent of the public had health insurance, It would cover 97 percent of the costs. Since health reform is designed to control costs as well as expand coverage, Breaux suggests that, too, is a good

definition of universal coverage. "Universal coverage should be our goal and we should have a plan" for getting there, he says.

With a population estimated at 260 million, 95 percent coverage would leave 13 million Americans uninsured. Ninety-one percent would leave more than 23 million without coverage.

That would be a large improvement over the estimated 39 million who now go without insurance at some point during

But it still would be a long way

from Clinton's unambiguous wintertime rhetoric.

"If you send me legislation that does not guarantee every American private health insurance that can never be taken away, you will force me to take this pen, veto the legislation and we'll come right back here and start all over again," he said in his State of the Union message.

Clinton's own bill envisioned universal coverage by Jan. 1. 1998. Administration officials say the president is flexible about the date, and they cite his target, more than three years in the future, as evidence that he initially proposed phasing in coverage

House Democrats may yet succeed in pushing through a measure that relies on phased-in employer mandates, as Majority Leader Richard Gephardt is auggesting, with provisions that soften the blow on small bustпеваев.

But the overall prospects for legislation probably hinge on bipartisanship, beginning in the Senate. There, moderate Republicans and Democrats oppose making employers pay.

There's widespread agreement on a series of insurance reforms and other steps designed to spread coverage more broadly. But there's deadlock over what course to take if these reforms leave millions without coverage.



Choosing a laundry detergent Best choice is one that suits family's needs

With so many choices on the market, how does the consumer know which laundry detergent is best? According to The Soap and Detergent Association, the best choice is the one that suits the family's needs in terms of effectiveness on specific soils. personal preference for fragrance, form (i.e. powder or liquid), and price.

General purpose laundry detergents are available in liquid or powdered form. Liquid detergents are very effective on greasy, oily stains and are convenient for pretreating stains. Most come with measuring caps and many offer refili sizes. Powdered detergents may be more economical to use. Because they are effective for lifting out clay, mud and ground-in dirt, powders are an ideal choice for children's play clothes.

Although other liquids and powders are sultable for cold water, low water temperatures can inhibit powdered detergents' ability to dissolve. To help them dissolve more completely, use a warm water wash with a cold water rinse. Add the detergent while the washer is filling; and continue to fill until the detergent is dissolved, then add

Both liquids and powders are available in smaller sizes, they provide the same cleaning power as their larger unconcentrated counterparts. To determine the correct

A combination detergent is one detergent that does two jobs. Examples include a detergent with built-in fabric softener, color-safe bleach, or bleach alternative.

Other features, such as brighteners to help keep clothes white, enzymes to help remove protein soils, compatibility with all water temperatures and special formulations for infants' laundry, enhance a detergent's performance. Detergents are also available with or without fragrances

Light duty detergents, available in liquid or powder form, are designed for hand or machine washing lightly soiled items, as well as for delicate fabrics. Many are also

Dishwashing liquids are formulated for washing dishes, but some can be used for hand washing delicate fabrics. Read label instructions to be sure. They should never be used in an automatic washer because they are high sudsing.

Question: I recently purchased a blouse made from one of the new microfibers. Do you have any advice about caring for it?

Answer: The new microfibers are synthetic fibers often made of polyester, rayon or nylon. Each fiber is 100 times finer than human hair. This fineness gives the fabric its soft feel and makes it very lightweight. In addition, fabrics made from microfibers are durable and usually easy to care for.

Most microfibers can be safely washed or dry cleaned. However, always check the care label and follow the manufacturer's instructions. Sometimes the synthetic fiber is blended with wool or cotton which may require special cleaning procedures.

As the fibers get brushed during wearing, they move to the surface creating a fuzzy texture on the fabric surface. This fuzziness can be removed with an electric shaver.

Be careful when tronting or touching up wrinkles. Since microfibers are synthetics, a low temperature setting is necessary to prevent damaging the fabric.

The Drug Prevention Office randomly surveyed 10 percent of Seminale County School's second grade atudents to determine how much they have learned about alcohol and other drugs and their impact on people. The results of this survey

indicate some good news and some bad news. One piece of good news is that over 98 percent of our kids recognize that nicotine is a drug. However the bad news is that a significant percentage of our second graders don't understand the addictive potential of beer and wine coolers. While kids in second grade seem quite well informed on the dangers of using drugs, 14 percent think that taking drugs can make people feel happy.

There's some important leaching opportunities for both families and schools in the results of this survey. Since beer and wine coolers are almost always among the first addictive experiment with (often as early Drug Prevention office, 323-5710.)



as fourth grade), we must redouble our efforts to make sure they understand the dangers involved. Also, since the commercials that children see usually show beautiful young adults having a wonderful time while being sexy, provocative and clever in scenes featuring alcohol use, we need to talk openly and honestly about what's really going on. The advertiser is trying to sell his product, and the reality is that young people who use alcohol often throw up, get violent. and/or are responsible for accidents that cause injury and/or death to themselves or others.

Let's help our kids be in the best possible position to make healthy decisions before danger-

South falls back on the club finesse. But if the queen wins, declarer plays a club to his ace and leads his second diamond. If West wins with the ace, declarer's club loser can be thrown on dummy's
