nounced today he was quitting as head football coach at the University of Florida to devote full time to being athletic director of the Gators. The announcement, made in a letter to University President Stephen C. O'Connell, came after weeks of speculation that Graves would retire and be succeeded by Tennessee Coach Doug Dickey, a former Florida quarterback.

O'Counell, in a statement to the press, said Dickey had been offered the job. "If Ceach Dickey accepts our offer, he said, "it is my hope he will meet with us on the campus immediately after the first of the new year in order to
