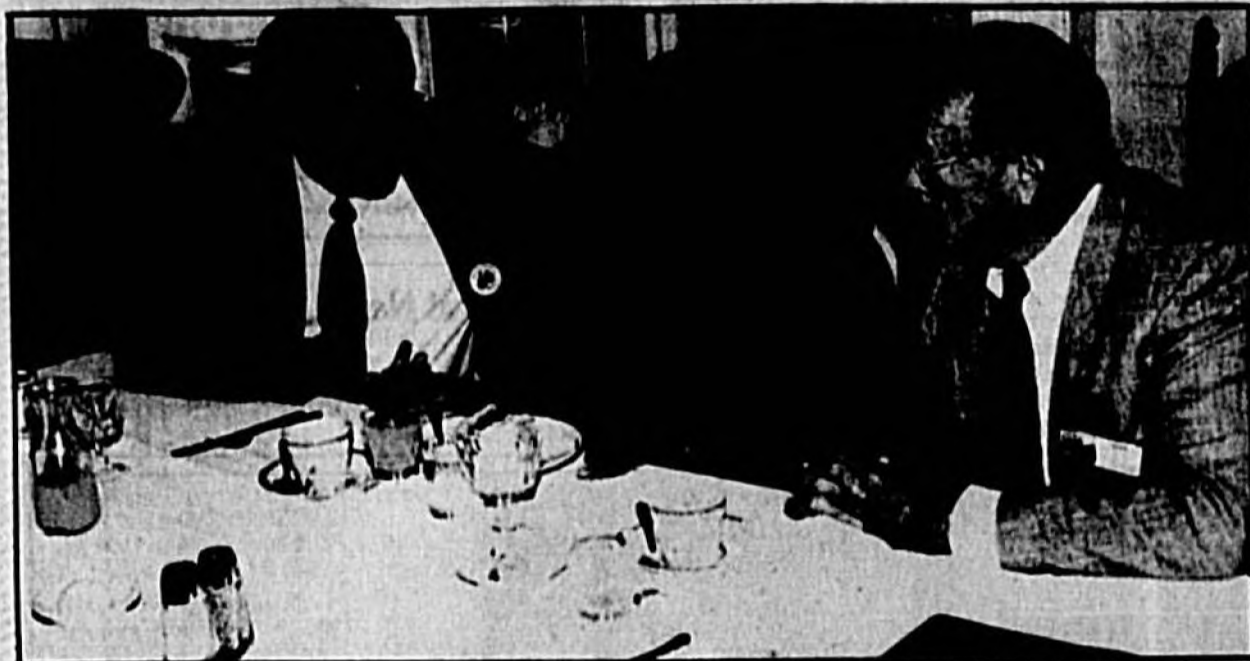

## Will Suber's dirt list take county to the cleaners?

### Depositions continue in fired employee's sexual harassment, discrimination lawsuit

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Joyce Suber case keeps getting nastier. The latest transcripts of depositions in her lawsuit against Seminole County depict the fired property acquisition coordinator as an "earthy person" with an ax to grind.

Suber, 54, admittedly compiled a Dirt File to prove she was a victim of sexual and age harassment but her former bosses insist she was let go because of dishonesty, misuse of county time, insubordination and for receiving gifts and gratuities.

Federal authorities as well as state authorities have been investigating the county's land acquisition division and an investigation that has caused the dismissal or resignation of many top county officials - and a nightmare to those who succeeded them. To be sure, Suber isn't getting much sleep.

County Engineer Jerry McColium and former Public Works Director Larry Sellers have testified that Suber's dismissal was justified. Neither

said they saw any evidence of her being sexually harassed or being discriminated against because of age.

McColium, Suber's immediate boss, said he believed that the reason she kept a "dirt list" was to use some of this information to "blackmail" the county to settle her case because she thought she was going to lose her appeal in 1996. "But if Joyce had a problem she would have said something about sexual harassment."

McColium said that Suber had an "intense dislike" for deputy county attorney Lonnie Groot, whom she felt was meddling in land acquisition.

"Joyce liked to control things. She thought Groot had an agenda to transfer property acquisition to the county attorney's office. She said that to me. She called Groot, 'Lonnie f.....ing Groot.'"

The earthy Suber was not one to have as an enemy. "If she disliked you intensely she could be very vindictive about things," McColium said. "She could be pretty abrupt with you. She liked the F word. She used cuss words. She told a lot of dirty jokes. After her divorce, her hemlines seemed to go up. I told her once, 'Joyce, that's getting short.'"

In her May 28 and latest deposition (she has had six) Suber said she did use the F word. "Well, I guess when I feel like the matter called for it. I didn't on a daily basis."

She said she kept a list of those who harassed her and named Tom Lilly, Lonnie Groot, Jim Wilson, Jerry Matthews, Daryl McLain, Win Adams and Frank Van Pelt. "I called it a 'Dirt File,'" she said.

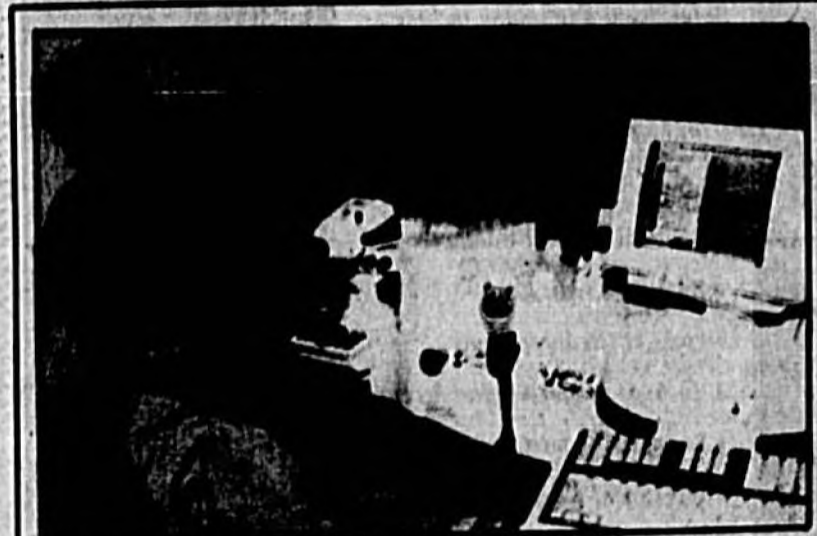
On one occasion at a golf tournament Suber insisted she was harassed by County Commissioner Daryl McLain and that there were two witnesses. "Take care of my girl," McLain allegedly told Vic Scodius.

Sellers said that he agreed with McColium that Suber should be fired because the

evidence was there that she broke the rules for a county employee. "She was people oriented, upbeat, a touchy-feely person," Sellers said. "I don't believe she was ever harassed."

Former Deputy County Manager Kevin Grace said he frequently saw Suber either laughing or kissing county commissioners Bob Sturm and Pat Warren. "When I first saw this

## Slain deputy's memorial service planned

SANFORD - A memorial service for slain Seminole County Sheriff's Deputy Eugene Gregory has been planned for Monday. Gregory died from gunfire at the hands of Alan Singletary Wednesday, July 8.

The service will be at the Central Baptist Church located on State Road 46 in Sanford, just west of Airport Boulevard. The service will begin at 11 a.m. A procession of police vehicles will travel from the Sheriff's Office to the church. This procession will start at 10 a.m. The travel route for the procession will go from the Sheriff's Office on Airport Boulevard to State Road 46 to the church. There will be no viewing or burial.

Gregory was one of the original deputies called to the scene at Singletary's Geneva home after receiving a complaint by Singletary's landlord, Tony Larsen. As Gregory and Deputy John Harper approached Singletary's mobile home, Singletary opened fired.

Gregory was a full time veteran of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office since 1991. He served in a reserve capacity prior to that. Gregory previously owned a lumber store on French Avenue in Sanford. He was lovingly known as "Stetson" by those who knew him. Please See Memorial, Page 6A

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Planned growth, with a tax base fueled by clean industry, to pay for the amenities desired by the residents of Seminole County; this has been

Randy Morris' agenda. Interviewed recently by Susan Karys-Courech, a member of the Central Florida Sierra Club group, on his stand on the environment, Morris said he would stay the course in his bid for re-election to the Seminole County Commission. Chairman Morris, and the

happened. We've had a seven percent increase in property tax revenue this past year." Of that increase, 5.1 percent is coming from new growth and expansion, he said.

"That's exactly what our economic message was four years ago, that's what I ran on, that's what I educated people on, that's what I'm trying to do."

"That then allows the increase in additional services," said Morris, "so you have things that you didn't have four years ago." Morris pointed to the Cross Seminole Trail, project and an additional \$1 million in the budget to acquire urban park land, as accomplishments of the current commission.

Seminole is either first or second, depending on the year, in urban density, in the state. The estimated population of the county, at build-out in 2015, is 540,000. "We're also the only (urban) county that has 20 percent of its land, that has been bought and acquired, for the public trust, for the future and that's a huge statement for us." He said he doesn't agree with the direction taken by the Tourism Development Commission, marketing Seminole County as "Florida's Natural Choice."

"That's a decision that the tourism folks have made and the commission has sided with, but I'm not a big fan of 'Florida's Natural Choice' because I don't think we need to attract tourists to our natural places. Let them go to Disney and let's leave our natural places to (our residents)."

"There are those that disagree with that because they think ecotourism is a good thing, because it educates people. There are benefits, but

there are certainly drawbacks."

To fight what Kairys-Courech calls "urban sprawl," Morris said, "We're headed right exactly as the (comprehensive plan) has dictated. We need to have commissioners that adhere to the comp plan. We have people who misinterpret what property rights are about. They believe that property rights mean the maximum development that a property can have, guaranteeing an economic profit." Morris said his opponent "believes firmly that there is an inalienable property right to the maximum value of land, which means maximum development potential, which I don't concur with."

"I think the county has been very good at protecting the rural zone," Morris said. The Sierra Club and other "green" groups, such as the Audubon Society, are concerned about the proposed extension of urban services, water and sewer,

into the East Rural Area (Chuluota). "I voted against the Chuluota Bypass project, I voted against the extension of the utility system out there. I think this is a pivotal election. If Commissioner Adams and I leave the commission, I think you'll see the rural zone go away."

Morris said he would support an ordinance for water craft on the Econlockhatchee River. Some residents and canoe and kayak enthusiasts have complained of dangerous situations on the river. "We've enhanced the sheriff's budget for more lake and river protection. But they only respond by complaint."

Morris said the commission has picked the area of the river which the ordinance will affect, they still have to determine whether the enforcement will

be based on horsepower, wake or speed limit. The vote on the ordinance will come before the commission at the Tuesday, July 14, commission meeting.

Kairys-Courech asked Morris, "How would you secure our protected areas along the Econ River and the Wekiva River and promote corridors for wildlife and conservation use?"

Morris responded, "We have a huge amount of protected areas right now and the issue is that we're coming now to the expiration of the voter-approved Natural Lands referendum. The funds are expiring. Morris said and there are 20 or 30 projects on the request list. "We might be able to get three or four more done." Morris said the commission would have to go back to the voters, to ask for an extension. "We're almost done acquiring lands. Going back to the voters would allow for us to get some management money and probably land acquisition will come to a close."

The trail system will tie every city and major neighborhood to the natural areas. "It's a great, great story. It's very important to get those trails to those natural areas and connect the

urban areas, so people aren't having to drive half an hour to go to a regional park."

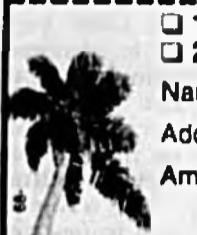
"Any homeowner or environmentalist should support (the redevelopment of U.S. Highway 17-92)," Morris said, because it is a better use of resources. "An area that is now blighted could be used for new growth and new services that could supply the residential population, instead having to go wipe out whole new sections of the county."

Morris was endorsed by the Sierra Club, as well as the Home Builders Association and much of the business commu-

nity. In his 1994 election. He said there are many projects he would like to see to comple-

tion. "There's a lot that hangs in the balance," Morris said.

### A sad day

A simple wooden cross staked in the sandy dirt road is bolstered by a profusion of roses, carnations, chrysanthemums. Perched in the crux, frozen in flight, is a lavender silk butterfly. A tiny cowboy hat tops the cross. Emblazoned on the crossbar are two stars and the word Stetson. Before his death, it was fallen deputy Eugene Gregory's nickname.

The cross stands yards away from the yellow and black plastic tape stretched across the road; Police Line Do Not Cross, it says, over and over again, across the road where Deputy Gregory died, shot on a hot, still, full-moon night in a standoff with a troubled gunman.

Deputy Gregory had earned the respect of everyone who knew him. A Christian man, a family man, his death touched us all. His memorial service Monday will be the somber goodbye to a fallen hero.

Sadly, it is contrasted with the death of the man who shot him, in a bloody 14-hour rampage that left two other deputies injured.

Alan Singletary, 43, had a promising life in 1973, then a Seminole High School senior, a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, known to his friends as Big Al. His tenuous mental state deteriorated over the years, blamed now for ending two lives early Thursday morning.

Two lives, one lived with honor and dignity; one lived in quiet desperation as reason slipped away. Two lives that crossed in one explosive moment, and then ended.

Our heartfelt sympathy to the Gregory family, fellow deputies and friends who have lost a fine and great man.

Our compassion and prayers to members of the Singletary family, whose pain is immeasurably compounded by the shocking, irrational acts of a loved one.

It is a sad day.

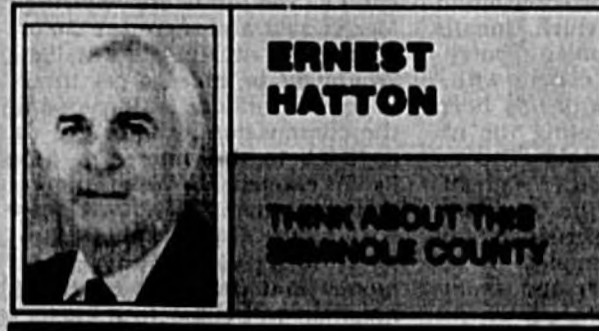
## It's time to debate our political issues

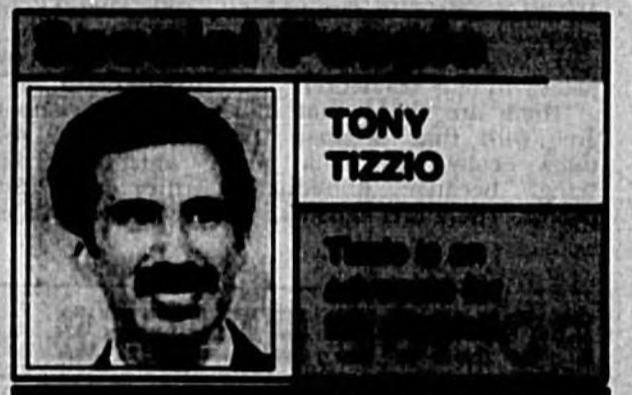

### Disability conference

Last week we told you about the Orange County Disability Awareness Conference, held June 26 and 27 at Orlando's Downtown Expo Center. It was hosted by Orange County's own Disability Advisory Board. Today we present Part 2, where we will introduce you to some of the organizations at the event.

We'll do this by giving a short synopsis of each group (we hope to explore some of these organizations in depth, in the future). A majority of these organizations covered the whole Central Florida area, they were also, mostly non-profit, although some of them were private corporations.

**Cluster homes, group homes, and community living programs:** With these programs, people are trained in daily living skills, including cooking, shopping and money management. Vocational training, job placement and evaluations are other benefits of these programs. Say's Diane Reichler, a program manager at Quest North, "I hope we can continue these things forever and ever."

**The Center for Independent Living (CIL):** A Central Florida mainstay for years, CIL's mission, it says, is to empower individuals with the resources and skills to live an independent and self-sufficient life. CIL offers many programs, services and activities for people with many kinds of disabilities.

Several private organizations were also represented, including Colonial Medical Supplies. Colonial is one of the areas largest suppliers of items such as wheelchairs, walking aids, scooters, and a whole line of medically-related items. Rental equipment is also available.

**Canine Companions for Independence** was also represented, along with some four-footed friends. This organization provides service dogs for people with disabilities. These dogs are provided for physically disabled, hearing impaired, developmentally disabled and more. These dogs are provided for situations where a third party is needed. They are trained to provide a multitude of services for their owners, such as picking up whatever the disabled person drops. This organization has been helping the disabled since 1975.

I saved the most unusual for last. **The Magic Wheels Basketball Team** is a joint effort between the Orlando Magic and Florida Hospital. This group is a women's basketball team that is both inspirational and enthusiastic. In fact, the enthusiasm that these young ladies feel about playing is what I think this conference was all about, letting the disabled live life as they want to. If that means helping a little, fine, if it also means changing laws or our ideas of what the disabled can do, well, that's fine, too. That is what the Disability Movement is all about.

If you have a non-profit organization, related to the disabled, and you have a fund-raiser or special event coming up, let us know about it. Include the name, address and phone number of the organization as well as the time, place and contact person for the event.

### Sticking to facts on lakefront plan

Today I got a haircut and a strange thing happened. My barber asked me what I thought about developing the lakefront here in Sanford. He prefaced the question with the statement, "We're not supposed to talk politics here, but I'd really like to know what's going on."

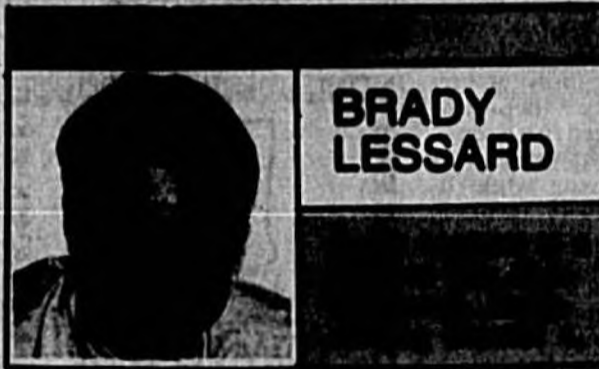
When the peaceful refuge of a barber's chair is invaded with a political discussion, you know there is interest out there. Ours was not an argument, or even a debate, we both favor the concept of bringing a project of this magnitude to Sanford. When I got home, I realized how nice it was to have such a civil discussion with a concerned citizen/friend. It occurred to me that much of the recent discourse on the development has not been as pleasant. Sure, for the most part my barber and I agreed on the topic, but civilized dialogue is not reserved for those that do.

In the past few weeks, this editorial page has been filled with letters regarding the proposed hotel and conference center in downtown Sanford. Opponents of the project have sparred with those that support the proposal, and I don't think any of us would prefer it any other way. This wonderful country provides the opportunity to discuss issues and policies without the threat of violence and anarchy that plague many parts of the world. What disturbs me however, is the fact that much of the debate and engagement is based on complete falsehoods. As a member of the City Commission, as well as a concerned citizen here in Sanford, I feel it is my duty to attempt to set the record straight.

1. **Mayor Dale is not the only member of the commission interested in bringing an economic catalyst to Downtown Sanford.** Contrary to what some may tell you, the mayor does not run the city like a dictator, rather he makes no apology for pushing hard an agenda he feels will benefit the city. Believe me, I'm not writing this to defend Larry Dale, he is more than capable and willing to do that himself. The point I would like to make however, is that every member of the commission makes the final decision on city matters. Use this resource! Make the effort to lobby Brady, Kerry, Whitey, and Velma as much as you do the mayor. Mayor Dale is one vote, the majority of decisions we make require three.

2. **Sanford needs economic development desperately.** Many of those opposed to this project feel comfortable making the erroneous claim, "We don't need it." This is simply not the case. The latest U.S. Census report shows eleven poverty pockets in walking distance of the proposed development! We need to explore every opportunity available to provide jobs for our poorest residents. Decades of grants, subsidies, and aid designed to conquer poverty have failed miserably. While the proposed project will provide very high paying management positions, there is also a desperate need for the entry level positions it would bring as well.

3. **This project is not a "done deal."** Once again, contrary to what you may be hearing, this project is far from a fait accompli. First and foremost, the Sanford City Commission will



continue to discuss and study all aspects of the hotel and conference center. Public participation is ALWAYS welcome at our public meetings, and I believe we all have our phone numbers listed. Pertinent questions remain to be answered prior to final approval. Traffic studies, environmental impacts, and other issues will need to be addressed by both the city and any potential developer. Secondly, there is no guarantee that if we told the developer to start the project next month that it would happen. Interest rates, the economy, and Sanford's beautiful downtown have given us the opportunity to re-vision this proposal. Only the beauty of our Downtown can be considered a constant.

4. **Fort Mellon Park will continue to serve the public whether a portion of it is developed or not.** The added amenities that are being considered along with this project are very exciting. The boardwalk and fishing pier being discussed would act as a magnet for the entire city to come and enjoy. I've yet to visit a city with a waterfront like ours that has failed to maximize it as we have. The assertion being made that the development would exclude any group of people from enjoying it is wrong. I'm extremely disappointed that anyone would use this falsehood as a tool in the campaign against it. Let's limit this debate to real and truthful issues.

I think it is wonderful that the commission will consider calling a referendum to decide the issue on Monday night. While I firmly believe in representing democracy, and think some have overstated the forefathers' affection for referendums on this page, I think it will be a wonderful process for Sanford. We are at a very important crossroads in the history of our city. We've been able to start winning the war against crime here in town, property values continue to soar, and for the first time in years, on Wednesday night the City Commission lowered taxes. It was a small step in the right direction, but in the past year Sanford has taken many "small" steps that when combined, represent progress. As the debate over the lakefront development continues, I only ask that we make every attempt to keep the discussion civil. Whether the project is built or not, we'll still be friends and neighbors seeking a better, safer, and cleaner Sanford. Let's scrutinize the facts, study the economics, weigh the impact, and make an informed decision.

## Curious politics

I read with interest the article in Sunday's paper about the meeting between Bob West and The Sierra Club. Several things struck me as curious:

First, the report indicated that all candidates were invited and only Mr. West showed up. Since the meeting date reported in the paper was the same day the county commission was holding a workshop on the budget, neither Commissioner Morris nor Commissioner Adams should have been expected. Mr. Henley, who is opposing Commissioner Adams for District 4, has been faithful about attending commission meetings. I have spoken with both Commissioner Morris and Commissioner Adams. Neither had been contacted by The Sierra Club prior to the meeting. Even if they had been, their first priority on that date was attending the budget workshop. I have not spoken with Mr. Henley as of this time, but I will presume he was at the meeting. The real question is why was Mr. West not in attendance? As a matter of fact, I have seen Mr. West at very few of the County Commission meetings.

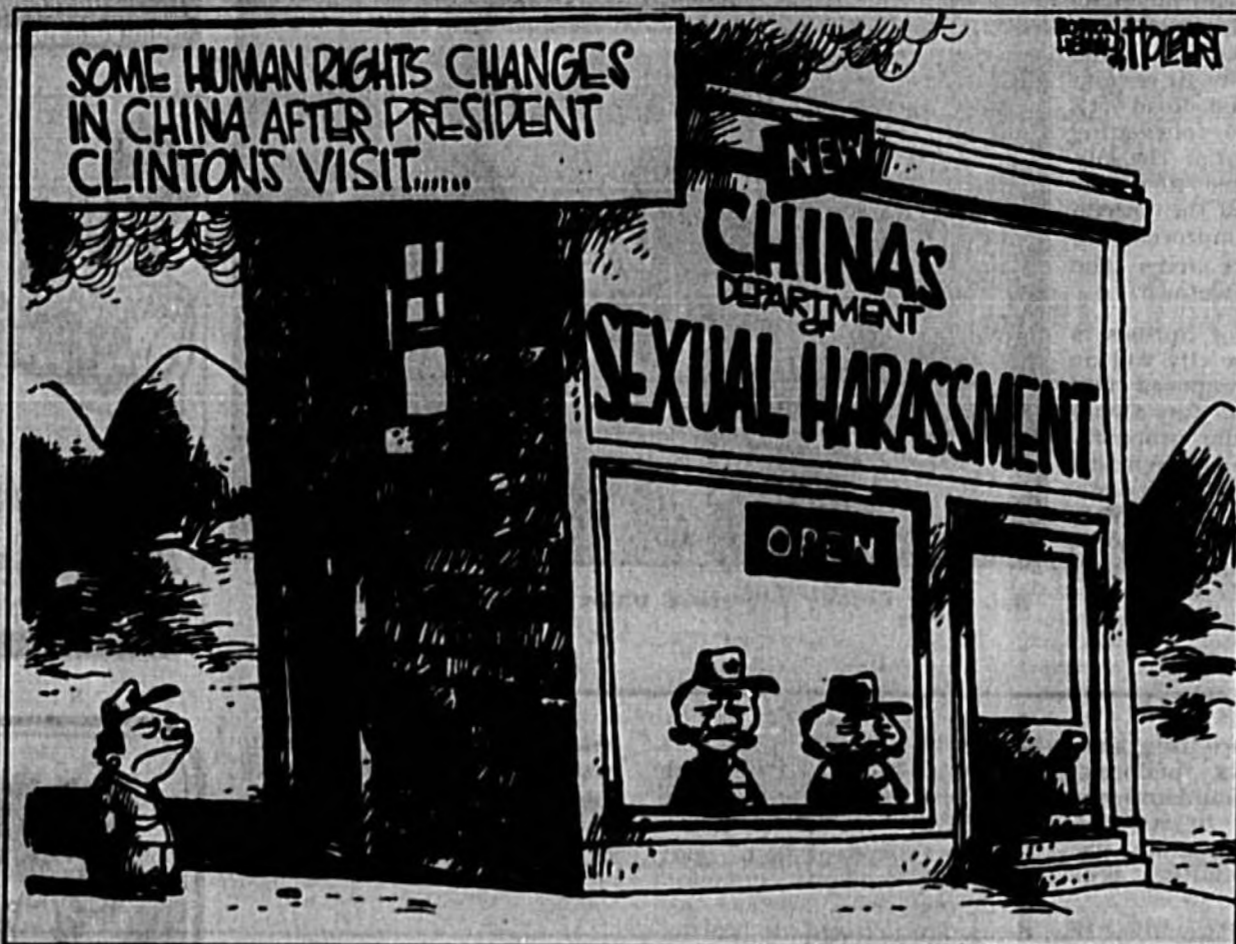
Second, Mr. West either mis-spoke or was misunderstood. The statement is that he is "adamant about protecting the rights of 'public' property owners." The gist of the answer involved "private" property owners. The question should be, in light of everything he said, how does he propose to have his cake and eat it too? He doesn't want the county to "have wall-to-wall development" but he doesn't want to buy up "all the (threatened) land" and put it into public use. He believes that a property owner should be able to develop his land, either residentially or commercially. I presume that means as long as the proposed development doesn't interfere with Mr. West's moral judgment of its acceptability. So, how do we protect the land needed to ensure aquifer recharge, clean water, and clean air if we don't buy it and can't restrict the owner's right to develop it?

Third, the discussion on the mass transit issue either shows a flagrant misunderstanding of the issue or a willful disregard of reality. A series of vans will not substantially reduce congestion on the roads. While the cost per mile for buses and/or light rail may be more at this time, the cost for the proposed vans will rise. If I can ride the bus from Sanford to Orlando for \$65 because the transit system is partially subsidized by the various governmental entities, then why would I pay \$1 per mile to ride the van? The government would still be subsidizing the cost in order to keep the price from driving away riders. What we need are more buses in conjunction with light rail to move large numbers of people. Moving 8-11 people at a time will not address the congestion issue at all.

Fourth, does Mr. West think he is an environmentalist and/or conservationist because he kept bees, likes wildflowers, thinks the Cross Seminole Trail is a good idea and canoes the Wekiva River? If so, he needs a good dictionary. In more than a year of observing Mr. West, the only thing I am convinced of is that he doesn't want to be confused with the facts. This article didn't do anything to change that opinion.

## Marking the spot

Bob Kuhn's guest column Sunday, June 28, was an interesting collection of some misinformation, and not a little malice, on the subject of Fort Mellon Park.

For example, one of his statements was: "The 'history' of Fort Mellon Park—there is no 'fort' to preserve not even an 'historic' marker exists."

A few feet from the sidewalk on First Street, near the Sanford Museum, stands a large bronze marker on a standard, with the following inscription:

FORT MELLON PARK, 1837-1837 To commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the first settlement on the shores of Lake Monroe named Fort Mellon, in memory of Captain Charles Mellon who died in defense of the fort; subsequently known as Mellenville and later Sanford. Sponsored by Sallie Harrison Chapter D.A.R. 1936

Further, immediately in front of the Museum (520 East First Street) is another historic marker, erected in 1981 by the Florida Board of Parks and Historic Memorials. It recognizes the Henry Shelton Sanford Grove and Experimental Gardens, established in the vicinity by the man for whom the City of Sanford is named—diplomat, developer, and horticultural expert.

In addition to these markers in Fort Mellon Park, a short distance away at Second Street and Mellenville Avenue, is yet another large bronze marker, mounted on granite, headed "Site of Fort Mellon" and relating that the commandant, Captain Mellon, was killed February 8, 1837, in a battle with Native Americans. This was also erected by the Sallie Harrison Chapter of the D.A.R.

History is not an infallible guide for the future, but neither should it be ignored nor lightly discarded. Ditto, Fort Mellon Park.

By the way, Bob, while I was reviewing the information on these markers, there were people playing tennis on the court you called "not fit to play on."

## Congress and spending

I am deeply concerned about the way Congress is doing business lately.

There are complex spending bills which hide anti-environmental measures for our national parks and public lands. When the Congress returns they will quickly take up a bill that could destroy much of America's birthright—the natural heritage of our National Parks and Public Lands. After their July 4 break, members will be voting on a bill that contains spending for our National Parks, forests and wildlife refuges.

The Interior Appropriations bills they will be voting on contain a measure that flies in the face of everything for which America stands. Thirty million in taxpayer dollars to blaze a road through a remote Wildlife Refuge in Alaska, a mandated doubling of logging levels on America's only temperate rainforest, the Tongass forest in Alaska.

Putting the brakes on efforts to restore salmon populations in the northwest, weakening the law that protects endangered species, mining activities on our western public lands.

These riders put America's natural heritage at risk. We're seeing our community's open spaces swallowed up by development almost by the day. The last thing we need is for Congress to promote road-building and development in our National Parks and public lands. ## Where have all the seniors gone?

There are a couple of things that you need to be aware of about Seminole County students. The 9th grade numbers are a combination of this year's 9th graders and last year's 9th graders who did not earn enough credits to be classified as 10th graders.

There were 2,815 seniors who received standard diplomas, 54 who earned ESE diplomas, 57 who earned Certificates of Completion and 19 who earned GED's through programs at Oviedo and Croome. According to the high school principals, there are 444 students who did not graduate or could graduate if successful in summer school.

Yes, that makes 3,301 seniors when the school system is only reporting 3,185. I've already asked the question! But whether you have 3,185 seniors or 3,301 seniors, only 2,815 received standard diplomas. This was an 8th grade class that numbered over 4,400 in 1994.

Where have all the Seniors gone? In Volusia County the school system adopted a stance that said in effect, "We will not let you fall to graduate!" Students who were in danger of not meeting the 2.0 grade point average needed to graduate, or those short on credits, were given the benefit of every resource the school system had to offer. Students were identified, counseled, encouraged and checked on constantly throughout the school year. Some stu-



dents were sent to Daytona Beach Community College to take makeup classes—taking up to 10 credits at a time. At the end of this school year, only three (3) failed to graduate on time with their class.

The Volusia County School System—both the Board and the Staff—didn't just sing the old Peter, Paul and Mary song, lamenting all those lost and wasted lives. They did something! My hat is off to them!

lutton's Jim Wood; Oviedo City Manager Gene Willford; Assistant City Manager Monte Beamer; David Moon; Mark Bens of Seminole County Traffic Engineering; David Groudhall of Metroplan Orlando; Arthur Evens, with the city; Charles Smith; Jeff Payne with the Cross Seminole Trail and Oviedo Mayor Mint Bruce.

The meeting was initiated by State Rep. Tom Feeney (R-Oviedo) who was instrumental in opening doors for the ODD group to voice their concerns about downtown traffic. Major concerns are that traffic is dangerous to pedestrians, the speed of traffic, using alternate routes for truck traffic, putting a crossing at the intersection for pedestrians and the Cross Seminole Trail in relation to State Road 434.

Even though planning is in its early stages, one proposal indicated that Oviedo might be interested in taking over 434 into downtown Oviedo. This would allow the city to reroute truck traffic on Toll Road 417 then back to 434, alleviating some of the concerns. The city would also be able to create cul-de-sacs around the Oviedo area and make improvements by planting more trees and greenery in old downtown.

One of the major hurdles is whether or not the city will do what has been proposed and whether the Oviedo City Council will approve the proposal. The main concern still remains the safety issues with pedestrian and street traffic. With the growing number of people using the new trail, it can only be a growing concern.

announced candidates for the Seminole County School Board.

Calling it a runaway budget, Bernard Grier, a candidate for District 5, expressed concern for the debt the school system is under. "It is a system out of control," commented Grier. "And it is not fair to taxpayers." Grier wants to stress accountability and give voters the opportunity to vote on bond issues, which according to him has not happened since 1987.

Jeanne Morris, who has held the District 5 seat for the past eight years does not agree with Grier. "We have built seven schools since I have been on the board and renovated many more," said Morris. "We've done all of this but we've managed the money very well." Morris points out that school taxes have decreased in the last four years.

The informative session was sponsored by the Private Business Association of Seminole at their breakfast meeting Friday. "The candidates will go to different forums and give the same speech," said PBAS President Mike Hattaway. "We wanted to do something different."

After having an opportunity to introduce themselves, the candidates were asked predetermined questions compiled by a panel of PBAS members. Questions were randomly posed to each candidate in a rotating fashion. Only one candidate answered each question with the exception of one question.

Each candidate was asked if he or she had ever had to make a payroll. The school board's budget is the largest in the county and 80 percent goes to salaries. Each candidate had their own personal experiences handling payrolls and each acknowledges the tremendous responsibility that comes with a budget this size.

Candidate for District 1 Diane Bauer cited her experience as an unpaid employee assisting her husband, an independent insurance agent, with the running of his office. Her responsibilities included maintaining his books. "I feel comfortable with my degree of experience," said Bauer. "You find the answer if you don't know. My strength is the willingness to learn."

Bauer has had five children educated in Seminole County schools. "I believe I can make a difference," said Bauer. She says her involvement as a parent enhanced her children's education and, if elected, she

wants to strengthen the partnership of parents, business, teachers and administrators. Bauer would like to see the school to work program expanded without diluting academics.

Lurlene Sweeting, who is running against Grier and Morris in District 5, agrees with Bauer. "Everyone will not need four years of college, but everyone needs to support themselves," said Sweeting.

Bauer and Sweeting agree the school system needs to provide options to meet the needs of all students.

Sweeting has a Ph.D. in Education Administration and a master's degree in Counseling. She worked for the school board in Philadelphia. Most recently she has assisted her son by managing his law firm. "I have been preparing all my life for this time," said Sweeting. "I promise to work full time and for one term."

From her experience in Philadelphia, Sweeting has seen problems with busing little children. She believes in neighborhood schools for young children. If elected Sweeting's focus would be on the children and saving money.

Grier had his own insurance business for 18 years and works in real estate. He has a second grader involved in the busing in the north end of Seminole County.

Grier believes that vouchers have a place in the system, as do charter schools, but he would rather see the school system do its job and run strong schools. "Why can't we provide competitive schools?" questions Grier.

When asked about providing a dual language teaching program for children who have not learned to speak English, Grier stated he believes second languages should be offered as an elective, but that it should be an English speaking system.

Barbara Kuhn is not running for re-election, leaving the race for District 1 to Bauer and Terry Patten. Patten has a daughter at Keith Elementary School. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps and said he understands the meaning of discipline and respect. Patten and his wife own their own fabric art business. Patten is an active Dividend volunteer and has volunteered as a "special friend" at Keith Elementary.

Concerning the consent decree with the Justice Department, Patten's response was, "I

don't believe it was in the best interest of anyone." Patten advocates less government and more control on the local level.

When asked, Patten indicated he supports minimum grade requirements before students are allowed to participate in extracurricular activities. Patten also expressed concerns about the school board budget. "Students do not learn from school buildings, they learn from teachers," said Patten.

Questioned about suspending students for truancy, Patten responded, "It is putting the cart before the horse. Students need motivation. Throwing money at it (the problem) is easy," commented Patten. "Finding their motivation is the hard part." Patten believes social problems will be lessened if the school system can find the way to really touch children.

Morris complimented Director of Security for Seminole County schools Wolfgang Halbig when she was asked about steps to cure violence in the schools. "We've done a lot for several years," said Morris as she went on to explain about Spanky the dog. The beagle makes unannounced visits to high schools in Seminole County. The "Save a Friend" hot line for students to report weapons, fights or other problems has been in place for three years according to Morris. Morris explained that administrators and teachers are taught to identify and prevent violent situations.

School Board member Sandy Robinson, District 2, was invited to participate, but was out of town and unable to at-

tend. It appeared Robinson would run unopposed until James "Joe" Laughlin, a teacher with Seminole County for 16 years, announced late Friday his intent to run for District 2.

In his announcement, Laughlin stated that he favors neighborhood schools with smaller class sizes and less time spent on school buses. He is concerned about the amount of money spent to renovate existing school buildings when new facilities can be built for the same amount and neighborhood schools can be built for much less.

"My background in business and education qualifies me to ask the tough questions and expect proper answers so that the taxpayers and the students get the most for their money," stated Laughlin.

All of the announced candidates for the school board are Republicans, which is not unusual in Florida. Candidates must qualify between noon on July 13 and noon on July 17. School board members serve for four years and their terms do not expire at the same time.

The Private Business Association of Seminole was founded in 1993 to serve the needs of private businesses and corporations in the Central Florida area. The Association has an active membership of business owners, partners and associates representing a variety of businesses. PBAS, a nonpartisan organization does not endorse any candidate, but follows issues of importance to Seminole County including education, economics, storm-water management and growth.

## Seeing through the eyes of children

Daring to follow her dream, Gwendolyn Yago, a guidance counselor at Geneva Elementary for 11 years, has come a long way in the year and a half since she left the school.

After a very rough and rocky period, she completed her first major play "Children in Chains", which was performed to nearly sold out audiences both times it was presented at The Titusville Playhouse in Titusville in March and April.

"I was overwhelmed," Yago said. "It's often difficult to get the kind of public response and media attention I received as a first time playwright."

Yago is a native Floridian who began singing at the age of 10. While pursuing her Bachelor's degree in Psychology, a Master's degree in Guidance and a Ph. D. in Law, Yago never left her first love, singing.

Through the years, Yago has been an award winning lyricist, an actress in many community theater productions, and an interpretive vocalist, performing for governors, astronauts, civic leaders, college presidents and many church congregations. This was all while dedicating 11 years of her life to the students at Geneva Elementary.

Now, Yago can add successful playwright to her long list of

accomplishments.

"Children in Chains" is based on the true life story of Mary Lewis, a minister at the Miracle Deliverance Center in Titusville.

Lewis' mother left the family when her three children were young. Her father befriended another woman who already had a large number of children, and who took in Mary and her brother and her sister. Soon after that, the horror story unfolded.

Fights and beating were a daily occurrence. The mother treated her own children like they should have been treated, leaving the anger and violence for Lewis and her siblings. Adding to the despicable treatment, invitations to help look for things in the attic led to rape sessions that became more and more frequent.

Then, the children were starved, even though there was more than enough food in the household. Lewis, her brother and her sister rummaged through garbage cans in the backs of grocery stores in order to eat. Sometimes, if they were lucky, the new mother would allow them to eat the scraps that were left over after her children had their fill.

To top off this ghastly story, the children were ultimately chained, hand and foot, to the wall of a very small outhouse. They were left there for a very

long time, until Lewis' brother was able to escape and get help for his siblings.

Yago makes sure that all sides of the story are told, including that of the father and the stepmother. But the main perspective of the play is told through the eyes of the children, keeping the events simple yet delicate. Surprisingly, the play allows the audience to see that although there is no excuse for the reprehensible treatment of the three children, the parents did have problems that they did not know how to deal with.

"What is most amazing to me," Yago said, "is the fact that Lewis has not been hardened

by all she endured as a child. She has forgiven those who mistreated her and used her own horrible experiences to help those who must endure the same."

The play started out as a musical, but ended up as a drama with Yago writing and performing the theme song, "Another Side of This Mountain", which is being played on local Christian stations. The play will be presented July 26, at 3 p.m. at the Henegar Center, 625 East New Haven Ave, Melbourne. Tickets are \$12 in advance and \$15 at the door. Call (407) 723-8698 for reservations.

**CENTRAL FLORIDA** - The Dr. Phillips Institute for the Study of American Business Activity at University of Central Florida says business conditions continued in positive directions over the recent three months ending in May.

Strong current conditions remained evident in (1) the local rate of unemployment, (2) nonfarm payroll job growth, (3) sales of existing single-family homes, and (4) private construction activity.

The near-term assessment of the local hotel occupancy rate however, remained slower while the growth in passenger arrivals at Orlando International Airport is said to be stuck at moderate.

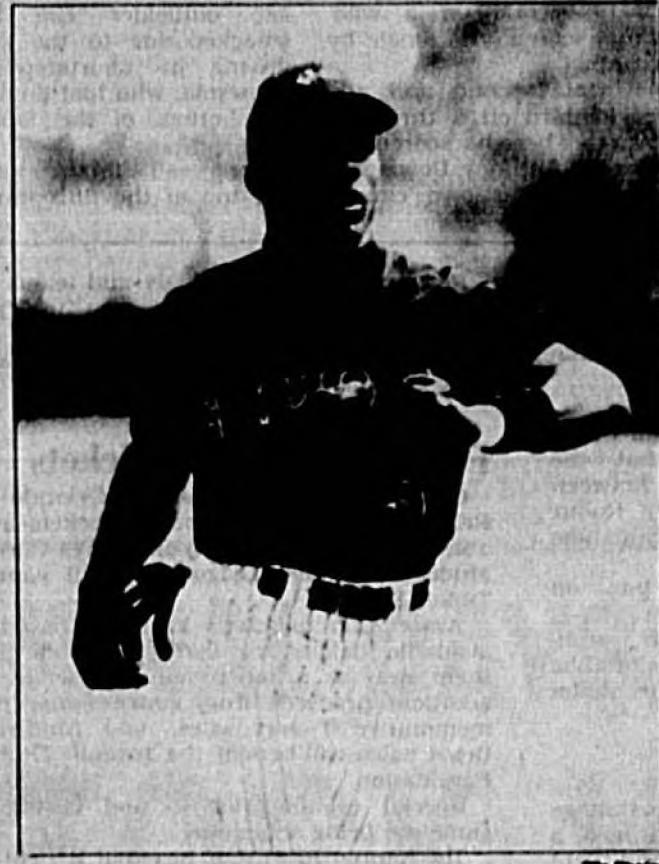

# Synchronized swimmers take to Lake Brantley pool

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — It's almost like figure-skating underwater.

Synchronized swimming, now an Olympic event, has taken off ever since it was first shown during Olympic competition in 1984. Since then, the number of competitors has grown and one of the highest levels of competition is being held at Lake Brantley High School this weekend at the 1998 Sunshine State Games.

Local competitors include Sarah Chase, Kelly DeWees, Megan Chase and Emily Taylor.

The sport has only recently begun turning heads as fans are learning to appreciate the beauty of the sport. To music, competitors participate in solos, duets, trios and teams and swim on three levels: novices,

intermediates and regular (advanced competitors).

The athletes participating at Lake Brantley range from under-nine to 18.

Swimmers compete in several events including figures and are required to complete four different technical figures which are added to their routine scores at the end of the competition.

Judges take several factors into their scoring method. According to one of the event coordinators Diane Crumbaker, judges look for things such as how high a swimmer leaps out of the water during a routine, the amount of area covered in the pool, artistic impression and technical merit.

One of the competitors this weekend - Katie Norris of Tallahassee - is a member of the United States Junior National Team. There are several other future Olympians competing

and other Central Florida swimmers are missing due to the U.S. Open in Hilo, Hawaii.

There won't be only females competing this weekend. Two boys from Melbourne will be participating as the sport continues to grow.

Friday's rains didn't slow things down and events should be on schedule all weekend. Swimmers compete during light rain, but in the event of lightning, it's everybody out of the pool.

This weekend also marks the second straight year Lake Brantley has hosted the event.

"They really take care of us here," Crumbaker said. "The people here are just great and anyone who shows up can see some future Olympians."

The events will continue at the Lake Brantley pool starting at 9 a.m. Saturday and Sunday with warm-ups beginning at 8 a.m.

Lopez, a 6-foot-1, 170-pound shortstop who played for Mike Smith at Lake Brantley High School, was the eighth player taken in the draft by the Toronto Blue Jays and is currently negotiating with the club on a seven-figure contract.

If he does not reach agreement with the Blue Jays he will play at Indian River Junior College in Ft. Pierce and re-enter the draft next June.

As a senior, Lopez, who reminds a lot of people of Seattle Mariner shortstop Alex Rodriguez defensively, came on with the bat, hitting .521 (38-for-73), with seven home runs, 35 stolen bases and 28 RBI.

He was also considered the Most Valuable Player of the State Tournament as a junior when the Patriots won the Class 6A title in 1997.

Raines, a 5-foot-10, 170-pound outfielder who played for Mike Powers at Seminole High School, was a sixth round pick of the Baltimore Orioles and has already started his

professional career with the Sarasota Orioles of the Gulf Coast League.

He appears well on his way to reaching his goal of playing in the Majors with his father, New York Yankees outfielder/designated hitter Tim Raines, as he was hitting .421 at last report.

Another player of local interest that was picked for All-America honors was Kenesaw, Georgia star Corey Patterson, who played in the Seminole PONY League with Raines before moving to Georgia.

Patterson, an outfielder, was the third player taken in the draft by the Chicago Cubs after hitting .560 with 22 home runs, 61 RBI and 36 stolen bases this year.

Winners of the area competition will advance to the State Tournament starting July 16 in Tallahassee.

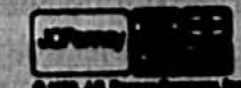

## Small Soldiers: A campaign of humor

\*\*\* 1/2 **Small Soldiers:** ATTENNNNN-SHUN! Fall in! Single file lines down the rows, and no pushing! Keep it up...two, three, four. HALT! ABOUT FACE! At ease, soldiers.

Now, let me debrief you on a new film called *Small Soldiers*, a bona fide sleeper. It is directed by Joe Dante, the same grunt who marched into theaters with the 1984 hit, *Gremlins*. The writers are an eclectic platoon consisting of Gavin Scott (co-wrote *The Borrowers*), Adam Rifkin (*Mouse Hunt*), and Ted Elliott and Terry Rossio (both have a story credit for the recent *Godzilla*). Together, they have come to the front line with a witty fantasy where toys come to life.

A young boy named Alan Abernathy (Gregory Smith) wants to help his father's struggling toy store make some money. He asks his truck driver buddy, Joe (Dick Miller), who ships toys for a manufacturer that has just been bought out by a major conglomerate, to front him these new action figures called the Commando Elite and the Gorgonites. These are state-of-the-art figures, and Alan hopes that the kids will buy them up.

Little does Alan know, but the toys virtually have minds of their own. They have been programmed with a special military chip known as the Microprocessor, which enables the toys to come alive and think for themselves. However, both sides—mortal enemies of one another—have also been programmed with specific instructions: the Commando Elite must eradicate the Gorgonites and their supporters, and the Gorgonites must hide and, ultimately, lose to the Elite.

Unsuspecting civilians get into the crossfire as the re-

lentless Elite headed by Chip Hazard (voice by Tommy Lee Jones) continue to blaze a path to the Gorgonites headed by the soft-spoken Archer (voice by Frank Langella). Alan, with the help of his beautiful neighbor, Christy (Kirsten Dunst), must take the initiative and help the Gorgonites, not only to survive the Elite, but aid them in finding their home of Gorgon.

*Small Soldiers* is a film in the same vein as Dante's *Gremlins*. The difference is that the monstrous beasts,

being the Gorgonites, are like the gentle Mogwai, and the heroic-looking Elite are like the havoc-causing reptiles. Yet, both films take place in a small suburban town, and both involve a young couple who must save the day.

Although the set up is rather slow, it builds up into a campaign of humor and excitement. The reason for the humor is in the writing. When the Elite lets loose on the speakers with a tune from the Spice Girls, Alan's mother fears that the troops are using a "psychological attack". As the Gorgonites set sail on a toy ship down a stream, one worries aloud saying, "I hope we don't hit an iceberg."

And the excitement not only comes from Dante's knack for staging pandemonium, but from the incredible special effects courtesy of Stan Winston's puppet work and the computer magic of Industrial

Light and Magic. The toys really look like toys and their alive! They act like toys and move like toys. The illusion is pretty believable.

But heed the PG-13 rating, parents. This film contains scenes of violence and vulgar language. This is probably the same warning critics gave when *Gremlins* came out. Let's see how many smart consumers we have out there. Will they check out the film first? Or, will they be surprised later when they realize that this ain't *Toy Story*? There are also truly nightmarish images as when the Wendy dolls attack Christy, and when a horde of Elite and Wendy dolls come at Alan with all sorts of sharp implements.

*Small Soldiers* marks the final film of actor/comedian Phil Hartman, and it is a fitting memorial. It is funny and enjoyable, and definitely worth staying in attention for.

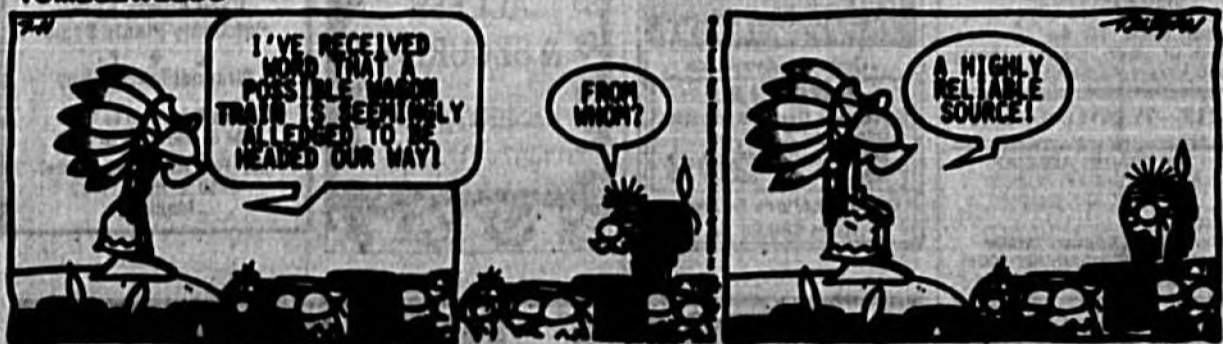

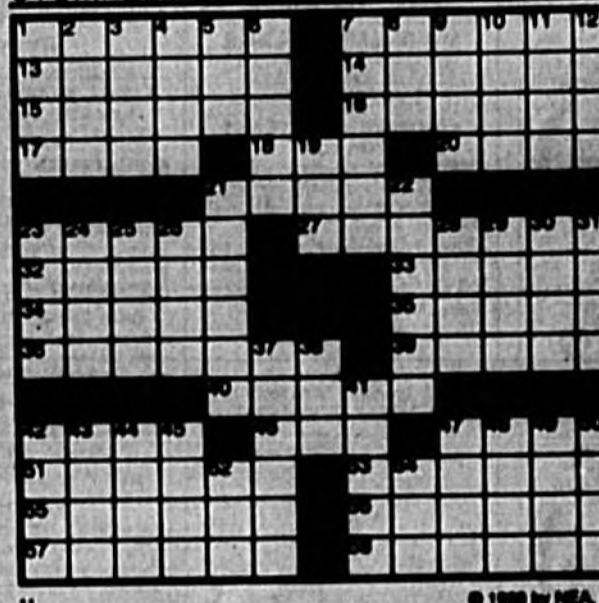

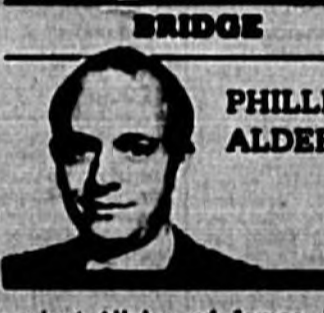

### Airboat operator wants to show people his river

**ST. JOHNS RIVER** - The morning is mild, if 80 degrees at 7:30 a.m. can be called mild. The sun is masked in a haze brought on by recent wildfires. It is softly reflected by the lake which stretches out before us, smooth as a smoked topaz mirror.

Sitting high in the seat of the airboat, the feeling is not unlike that of flying. The boat skims along the surface of the water, scattering some birds before us, while others remain, undisturbed by the sound of the airboat engine and the beat of the propellers.

There are Southern birds and there are Yankee birds, says Capt. Bill Daniel, our guide on

this river trip.

"They almost dare you to run over them," says Daniel. The same is true of the alligators.

The big ones roll the shallows as we approach, while the hatchlings seem to want to race the boat. One shoots from the shoreline and glides just below the surface as we pass over it.

They put on a good show, these prehistoric survivors. "That's what they (the tourists) come to see," says Daniel. The alligators. And this veteran of the river knows just where to find them.

A crane operator by trade, Daniel has 33 years experience as an airboat operator. Please see *River*, Page 3C

# Seminole's haz-mat team is well-equipped

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The nine Fire-Rescue personnel assigned each shift to Seminole's Station 35 are part of the county's special operations team, prepared to handle chemical contaminations, chlorine leaks, gas spills and other potentially toxic situations. Their truck, Squad 2, is one of the best equipped hazardous materials (Haz-Mat) trucks in the state.

A regional resource, the team responds to overturned tankers and other major hazardous-materials situations throughout Central Florida. The protective suits needed to work around some chemicals cost as much as \$4,000 each. Much of the funding for the truck and training came from Federal grants, and, if

any equipment is damaged during a clean-up, the chemical company responsible for the spill would be required to pay the cost, not Seminole County taxpayers.

The Haz-Mat truck's on-board computer, library and small laboratory help the team identify unknown chemicals and determine how to handle them. The truck is equipped to manage just about any situation. The inventory list runs 15-pages long. Special suits and spark-proof tools protect firefighters working with the dangerous and sometimes flammable chemicals.

"This will become the brain center [of a haz-mat situation]," said Special Operations Team member R. Todd Angel. "We're the firefighters that firefighters call."

"That depends on what you are coming for," he said, and smiled. "Not a thing but gasoline..." - From "Hyacinth Drift", Cross Creek.

When the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings Society holds its 12th annual meeting in Sanford next April, they should take away from the experience more than the famous author did.

Founded in 1987, the MKR Society is "dedicated to the furtherance of interest in the work of one of America's admired writers."

Members enjoy a quarterly newsletter and an annual meeting, which will convene this year April 15 through 17 at the Marina Hotel and Conference Center on Lake Monroe.

Last year, the meeting was held in St. Augustine, home of Castle Warden, the hotel run by Rawlings' second husband, Norton Baskin. Highlights of the event included a literary tour of St. Augustine, by society member David Nolan, who "described objectively but with great feeling the strife and turmoil as well as enjoyment of life that was experienced in St. Augustine while

Rawlings lived (there)..."

As part of the Sanford meeting, for the first time, a general discussion will be held on some of MKR's short stories. Best known for the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, *The Yearling*, Rawlings also penned "Benny and the Bird Dogs", "Cracker Chidlings", "A Mother in Manville", and "Pelican's Shadow". Also part of the discussion will be a chapter from Rawlings' memoirs, *Cross Creek*.

"Hyacinth Drift" recounts the 10-day boat trip she and Desate Prescott took in March of 1934, beginning near the headwaters of the St. Johns River and traveling north to Welaka, where they entered the Oklawaha River and continued north to Cross Creek.

The trip was taken at a time when Rawlings had "lost touch with the Creek.

"I had had hardships," Rawlings wrote, "that seemed to me more than one could bear alone. I loved the Creek. I loved the grove. I loved the shabby farmhouse, suddenly they were nothing. The difficulties were greater than the compensations."

Rawlings had discussed a river trip with her friend, Prescott sug-

Initially, it was for pleasure that he spent time on the river, to fish and enjoy the wildlife. Now, he is making it his livelihood.

His brand new boat had only 6.9 hours in the water when we put in at the Sanford Marina boat ramp. Equipped with a 425 horsepower 454 Chevy engine, the props have been modified to turn quieter, Daniel says, for his own comfort as much as for his customers. The six seats are mounted high, not down low like some of the "tourist" airboats of the Everglades and other parts of Florida. A 4-inch draft allows the boat to go on parts of the river not accessible by others.

"I've been showing the river for years and years," he said. "I'm trying to give the feel of how a real airboater sees the river."

The perception of airboats is that the noise they output is not conducive to wildlife viewing but Daniel said birds and other wildlife are disturbed more by canoeists because "canoeists are perceived as a predator." His boat is tuned to produce no more than 65 decibels. "I'd hate for them to have to get used to

747s," he said. (A portion of the river lies in the flight path of the Orlando Sanford Airport.)

Because of his personal enjoyment of the river, Daniel has gotten involved in efforts to preserve it and other water bodies in Florida. He was active in the Friends of Lake Jesup and the Sierra Club. He is on the board of the Florida Wildlife Federation, the Christmas Riverboat Association and is a member of the Native Plant Society. He was named Water Conservationist of the Year in 1995.

Daniel's aim for his airboat adventure tours is to "educate." His business card shows an overhead view of a section of the river, near the mouth of Lake Jesup. Inside, the card reads, "Explore the oxbows and sloughs, check out the alligators, herons, cypress trees, turtles and marshlands; see an abundance of nature and wildlife within minutes of the developments and artificial attractions of Central Florida."

"If nothing else," Daniel says, "I'm going to get them out here to relax."

gated it would be the perfect time for the undertaking.

The pair put in near Fort Christmas, in an 18-foot boat, with two outboard motors, coas, a chart and a compass, and a Dutch oven. They supplemented their supplies of coffee and bacon with game they shot and fish they caught along the way.

Rawlings and Prescott reached Sanford on the morning of their fourth day on the river. Being Sunday, the filling stations near the docks were closed. A station in town was opening to accommodate the owner of the pleasure yacht. Rawlings and Prescott were chauffeured, in a limousine, to the station to fill their tires and purchase the Sunday New York paper.

"We used the gasoline," Rawlings wrote, "and forgot to read the papers."

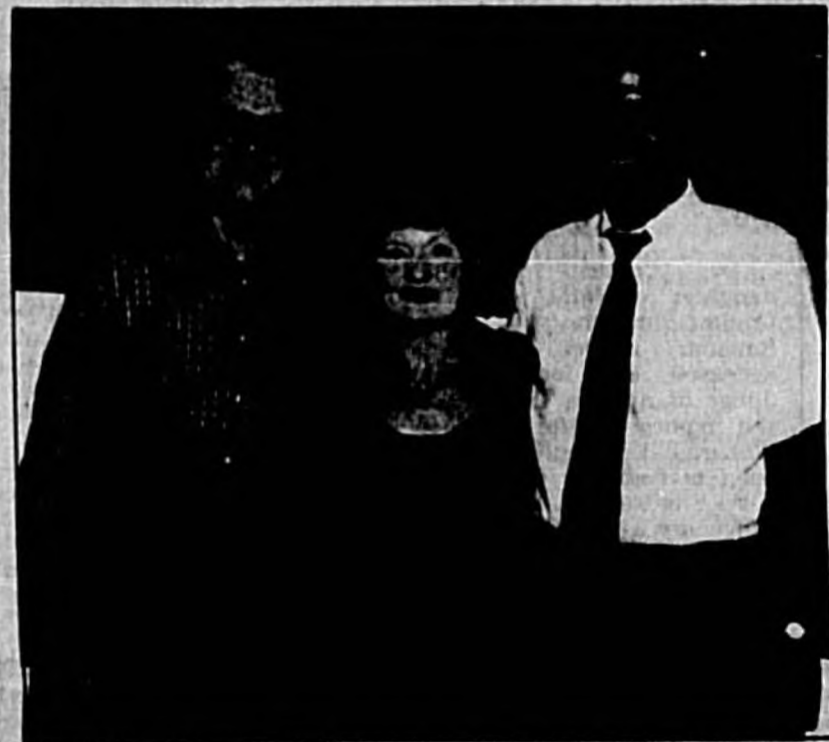

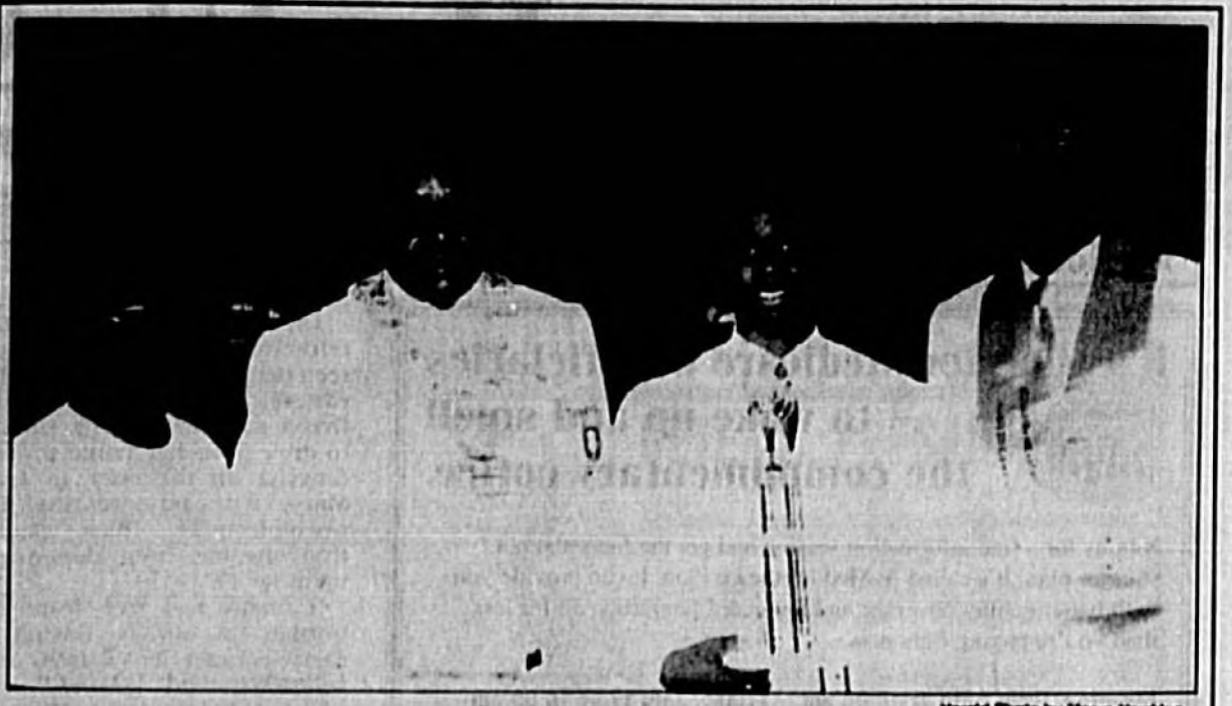

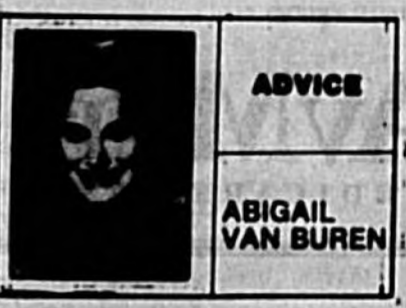
Stan is so in love with me, and the idea that we'll always be together, that if I tell him it's over, he will be crushed.

The day after undergoing refractive eye surgery to correct her myopia, or nearsightedness, radio personality Lise Dixon can see clearly enough to drive from her home in New Smyrna all the way to Lake Mary, with out wearing the uncomfortable, thick glasses that she has been dependent upon for 28 years.

"I finally feel free from the burden of always having to carry contact lens cases, lens solutions, and glasses every where I go!" Said Lise Dixon of HOG 97.5. With tears of joy she stated that she looks forward to being able to use her beach cruiser without the constant concern of sand getting under her contacts, or the discomfort of her awkward glasses constantly sliding down her nose.

Laser in-Situ Keratomileusis, or LASIK, usually takes less than 15 minutes, and is completed in the comfort of the surgeon's office. It can improve vision and provide freedom from glasses and contacts-no more tripping over the cat and straining to see the alarm clock after waking up in the morning! The excimer laser reshapes the cornea (transparent wall of the eye in front of the colored iris) by removing small amounts of tissue. This allows light rays to focus more directly on the back of the eye (retina), in turn cor-

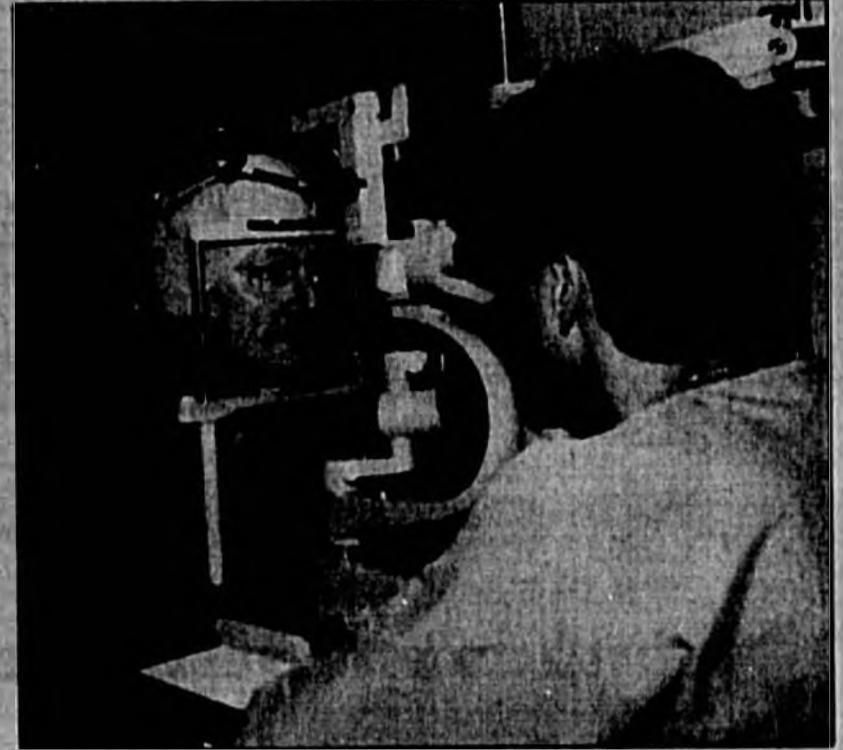
recting both astigmatism and nearsightedness.

Optometrist Dr. Brian Den Beste, General Partner and Clinic Director of Laservision in Orlando, has more than 30 surgeons certified to use their FDA approved Vix excimer laser.

"There are very few people who are unable to have this procedure done," said Dr. Den Beste. "There is currently 10 years worth of data about this surgery, and because of the positive outcomes it has been estimated that there will be more than one million eyes corrected by LASIK by the year 2000".

Before deciding to have surgery to correct her nearsightedness, Florence Martin, a contract services analyst with the U.S. Air Force, spent weeks researching LASIK on the Internet, where she located Dr. Konrad Filutowski, Chief Surgeon and Medical Director of Filutowski Cataract and Laser Institute in Lake Mary. She was very pleased with her results, experienced no pain during surgery and could see better immediately following the procedure. Her husband, however, prefers to continue to wear his glasses even after her positive testimony about LASIK. "I have never had any problems with wearing glasses, and I feel that if it ain't broken, don't fix it," said Mr. Martin. He was able to view his wife's surgery on a television in the surgical waiting area, as well as take home a videotape of the procedure.

Many people choose LASIK over Radial Keratotomy (RK) and the newer Photorefractive

Keratotomy (PRK), because both have more potential complications and longer healing times than LASIK. "LASIK is more comfortable than PRK, and visual recovery starts to occur the first day with LASIK, whereas it may take up to one week with PRK. Patients have to use eye drops for a few months after PRK, but they only require them for about a week after LASIK," said Dr. Filutowski. "This is really the only procedure for people who are highly nearsighted because PRK is less effective in these cases. LASIK is a more accurate procedure than RKH.

"I had heard about RK fifteen years ago, but decided to wait until there was more information about the long term results of the surgery," said Jackie Romig, a registered nurse who recently underwent the LASIK procedure because she was tired of being dependent on her glasses. "I wanted to start swimming again, but I couldn't see well enough without my glasses and I can't

wear contacts because my eyes are too dry. I truly did not feel a thing during surgery, and had almost no discomfort during the first night".

Jon Secoy decided to undergo the procedure after hearing about it's outstanding results. "I have been dependent on glasses all of the time since seventh grade. I felt like someone was putting a cigarette out in my eye when I tried to wear contacts for any length of time," said Mr. Secoy. "For me, because of my glasses, both contact sports, snorkeling and scuba diving were out-I either couldn't see well enough to participate or I feared that my glasses would get broken."

For those people who have had RK, but did not achieve a full correction, LASIK can reduce the remaining nearsightedness. Many people can be corrected to 20/20 or even 20/15 vision with LASIK, but there are others who may need weak prescription

Many people who wear glasses or contacts to fine tune their vision. To find out more about this innovative surgical technique, schedule a consultation with an eye surgeon who is certified to perform this procedure.

Prior to surgery, patients undergo a thorough eye exam. Specialized tests, such as the topographical map, and measurements of the thickness of the cornea are made and antibiotic and anti-inflammatory eye drops are instilled. Eye drop anesthesia is then used to numb the eye. A lid speculum is used to keep the eyelid open during surgery.

Patients are advised not to touch or get water in their eyes after surgery, not to wear any eye makeup for a couple of weeks and to use antibiotic eye drops as directed. Eye patches with eye holes that allow the patient to see should be worn through the night.

Many people who wear glasses and contacts fear that they will lose them while engaging in sports. Divers can purchase corrective lenses for their mask, but these are not only expensive, they are easily scratched or broken on a crowded boat.

According to Filutowski, anyone affected by up to 12 diopters of nearsightedness and/or four diopters of astigmatism is a candidate for LASIK. The procedure, however, should not be performed on persons who have active eye disease, such as an infection. People who have recently had changes in their eyeglass prescriptions or pregnant women (because pregnancy often causes vision to change temporarily) should wait until their vision becomes more stable before considering this surgery.

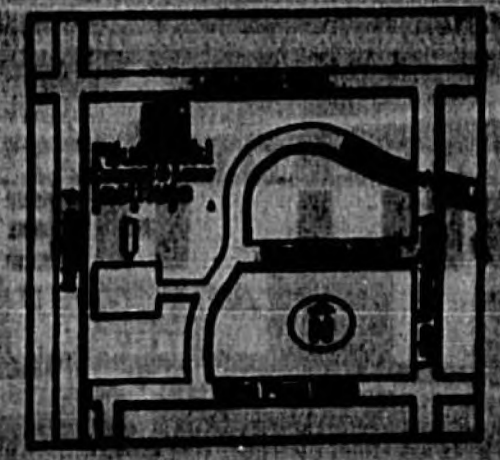
