

Sanford Wins Playoffs With 3-2 Win Over Daytona

Game Called End Of Sixth On Account Of Downpour Of Rain

Lookouts Meet Albany In First Of Inter-loop Series; Winner Must Take Four Out Of Seven Games

Sanford won the final Blaughey playoff series of the Florida State League yesterday by defeating Daytona Beach 3 to 2 when the game was called at the end of the sixth inning because of rain. The Lookouts won four games and Daytona three games in the series.

The Lookouts won the right to play Albany, winners of the Georgia-Florida league, by their victory. The first game of a four out of seven game series begins here tonight and a second contest will be held here tomorrow night with the teams traveling to Albany Wednesday for three games if necessary, and coming back to Sanford if the series is extended to the sixth and seventh games.

Manager Tommy West of the Islanders protested calling the game but the umpires studied the condition of the field after the rain had fallen about 40 minutes and declared that even if the rain ceased the field was too wet for further play.

A crowd of over 2000 were forced to seek the shelter of the stands and automobiles outside of the park.

With Cleo Jeter toasting for the Lookouts and Bill Donnelly for Daytona the abbreviated fray produced a pitchers' battle for the six innings it lasted.

Daytona coupled three hits and an error by Mayo Langston to send two runs across the plate in the first frame. Jeter bore down then and permitted but two hits for the next five innings.

Sanford opened an offensive in the second that produced one run and again in the fourth put on the pressure to score the tying and winning runs.

Daytona opened for Daytona in the first with a single to right field. Wozniak singled to right to send Babe to second. Mayo Langston tried to permit Babe to go to third and Wozniak to second. Wozniak struck out and Tommy West singled to center to drive Babe men across home plate.

With one man out in the second, Whitley Campbell made first base on an error by Wozniak, went to second on Lane's single to right field and scored on Jeter's line double to center field.

In the fourth Marion singled to right field, advanced to second on Campbell's sacrifice and crossed the rubber on Lane's second successive single to left. Jeter played a big part in the victory at bat as well as in the pitcher's box, drove the ball to third base who elected to throw Lane out at second. Jeter was safe at first as

Tomorrow night will be "Dale Alexander Night" and fans will present the genial Sanford manager with a gift of appreciation for his work this year.

The Lookout management stated this morning that the winner of the recent "most valuable man" contest would be announced tomorrow night also. The winner of the contest will receive a \$57.50 Bulova watch donated by Charles F. Wert, the jeweler.

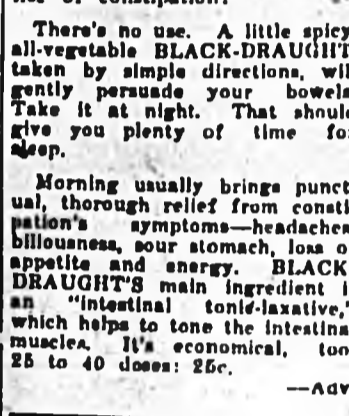

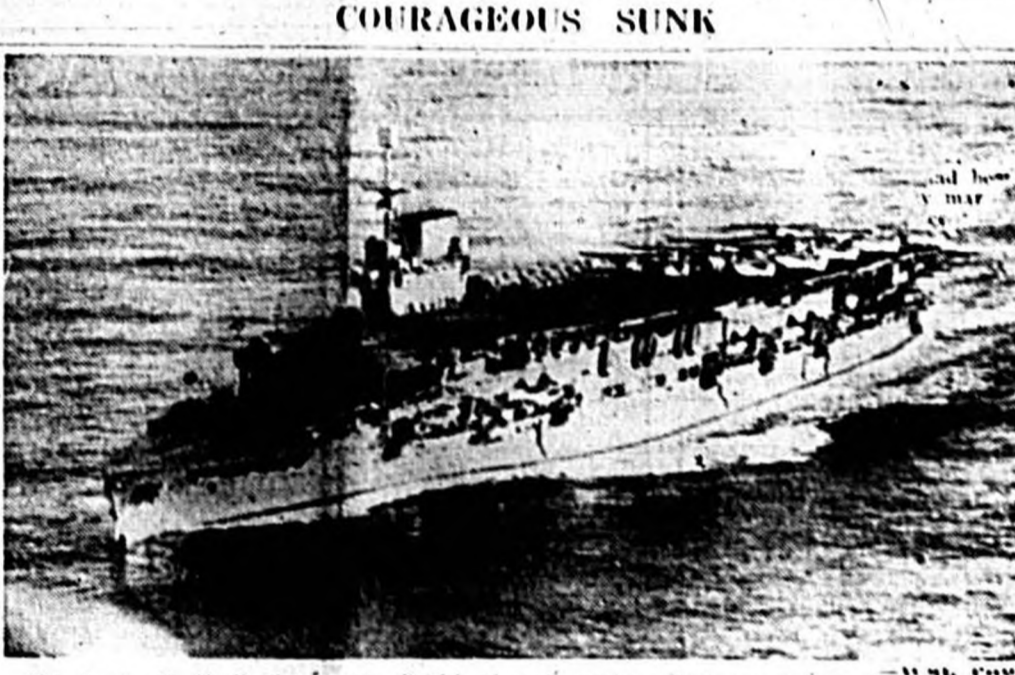
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This is the H. M. S. Courageous, British aircraft carrier, which was sent to the bottom by a German submarine.

The British who are so used to "cuddling through" were depending upon the mud in Poland to stop Hitler. But this time the British merely muddled.

Some seem to have doubted Lindbergh's patriotism because of his warning to stay out of war. Didn't he receive a medal, or something from General Gough? Nevertheless he is that if the United States did get into this war, Col. Lindbergh would be one of the first to volunteer.

The Key West Citizen reflects the view of the average American at the moment. "We do not believe the United States will get into any European war unless and until it appears certain that Great Britain and France will be victorious. In other words, if the Anglo-French alliance can take care of the situation alone, why should we help them? Of course there's no denying that we'd be in a awful fix if they should lose."

The Nation has served notice that it will not be a candidate for nomination as president of the American Chamber of Commerce. That would be a good precedent for other presidents to follow. One would be much for any president to help to avoid nomination. That is the best precedent it can have. It is, in fact, a precedent that should be followed by all presidents.

Business As Usual

These are momentous days in the history of the world and no one can pretend that we even here in Sanford will not be vitally affected by them. At the beginning of the first World War, we were not so sure. Many people thought that was something which did not concern us at all and would not materially change the course of our lives. Today we know that was entirely an erroneous conclusion. There is something going on in the world today which is bound to have more violent consequences than anything which has ever happened before. It does not matter who wins the war, or how long its duration, changes are taking place, tremendous dislocations are occurring, which are probably greater than at any previous time in the history of the world, and which without a doubt will vitally affect all of us.

However, there is not much which we can do about it and certainly we cannot prevent the overwhelming forces working to bring about these changes from reaching their full strength. For those of us who live in Sanford and Seminole County, however much we may be interested in what is happening, and however seriously we may be affected by it in the end, we believe we should adopt some such slogan as "Business as Usual," and go right ahead trying to make the most out of the life God has given us and playing the best game we can with the marbles we have to shoot with.

Because there is a war, how devastating it may be to great portions of the globe, how disastrous to certain individuals, many nations and innumerable cities and towns, all is not necessarily lost, certainly not for us here in America, and least of all for those of us who live on the shores of Lake Monroe. We do not subscribe to the theory that civilization is doomed, or that the future, at least for Sanford is hopeless.

That this will be a bloody and horrible war goes without saying. But there have been wars before, there have been wars long before Alexander the Great longed for more worlds to conquer, and civilization has survived them all. New engines of destruction have been created for this war, to be sure, but so have they for every other war since the world began. We remember being taught in school shortly before the last great war that there never could be another war because the implements of death were so destructive no nation would dare resort to their use.

The consequences of that war were tremendous. For some, even away down here in Sanford, they meant death, and yet throughout it all, boys and girls danced and sang, new buildings were built, cities sprang up over night, business was good, men and women married, had babies, and for millions life went on pretty much as usual. In this new war, there is no reason to believe that the end of the world has arrived, any more than in all the previous wars in which the world has engaged.

There are going to be many opportunities during the next few years for doing big things. Surely new jobs will be created and unemployment is bound to disappear. The railroads are already in the process of a gigantic renovation program. Big industries are putting men back to work and wheels, idle for years, are turning over again, manufacturing goods and materials. "War babies" are booming and as prosperity reaches these industries their employees other industries will prosper too.

Who knows but what it may be found wise and practical to decentralize many of these huge factories and foundries, now congregated largely in the industrial east or near the Canadian border, where under certain conditions they would make an ideal target for an enemy bombing raid? We in Sanford would do well to watch this situation and make sure that if these industries are scattered, some of them are located in this city.

There may be opportunities, too, in connection with national defense. The army, navy and air corps are going to have to be vastly increased. Regrettable as is this national expense for destructive weapons, if government money has to be spent on more air bases, army cantonments, training schools, supply houses, factories or what have you, let us make sure that Sanford gets its share.

There is every reason to believe that the farmers of the country after ten or fifteen long lean years are at last coming into their own. As prosperity returns to the industrial half of the population, families which have not eaten celery for years will begin to buy it again. During the last war farm lands everywhere in this country were at a premium, as Europe's farmers marched to the battlefield.

And so, while we should deplore the brutal acts of dictators who are leading the world into another frightful carnage, and while for millions it undoubtedly spells disaster, we here in Sanford should count our blessings and be thankful that as far in the future as man is able to see we can well afford to carry on as usual.

A Fine Record

Regardless of whether Sanford wins the Albany series or not, no one can deny the Lookouts have made one of the greatest records ever established in Class D baseball. This team, composed of a group of clean looking and clean living young men under the guidance of Dale Alexander, mild-mannered easy going Tennessee who led the American league in batting in 1932, has brought Sanford more favorable publicity than many thousands of dollars could buy.

Taking the league lead at the beginning of the season, the Lookouts never relinquished it and finished with 98 games won and 34 lost, a new record which is likely to stand as an all-time mark.

Several Sanford players made new individual records. Among them were Red Marion who finished the season with a batting average of .334, setting a new mark for a rookie. Whitely Campbell tied Sid Hudson's 1937 mark of 35 sacrifice hits.

But perhaps the greatest work was done by Sanford's crack pitching staff which includes Sid Hudson and James Harry (Dixie) Dean who were sold to the Washington Senators for \$12,000. Hudson led the league, winning 24 games and losing but four while Dean won 23 and lost four. Dean set up a new consecutive winning game streak as he racked up 17 straight wins without the loss of a single fray.

Cleo Jeter is another crack member of the hurling corps whom many rate the greatest "money pitcher" of the year. He was the third member of the trio to win more than 20 games, his total being 21 victories and nine losses.

Much of the credit for the Lookout's fine showing can be attributed to the astute Charles Bradshaw, president of the club. Mr. Bradshaw has never lacked faith in Alexander and his players, even when it seemed as though they were about to be banished by DeLand in the final game of the series here. Whether they win or lose the Albany series, the Lookouts, and the people of Sanford, can be proud of the record they have established.

Polish Defenders Still Resisting Invading Armies

(Continued From Page One) sell rivers, limiting land operations to small patrols in the no-man-land between the French Maginot line and the German Siegfried forts.

Both sides brought up reinforcements of men, guns and munitions for the next phase of the battle of the Saar basin, which must involve a direct attack on one of the rival fortified lines.

Last night's war communique No. 30 said: "There was activity of artillery at various points of the front, especially south of Saarbrücken. The German forces successfully attacked an enemy submarine."

No details were given of the destruction of the submarine. Parisians had their first glimpse of British Tommies en route to the front as lorries decorated with Union Jacks and the tricolors rolled through the streets.

Men and women ran to the curbs shouting: "Vivent les Anglais! Vive l'entente cordiale!"

It was stated on authority that France's air force was at combat posts and it was believed that most of the British air force designated for the western front also was in place.

Allied scouting planes reported that the Germans were moving many heavy guns into the Rhineland, including huge naval guns mounted on railroad trucks and firing 420 millimeter shells which the Germans intend to hurl at the Maginot line fortifications from railroads on the west bank of the Rhine.

These naval guns are the heaviest Germany possesses and are said to be superior in accuracy and range to the biggest gun used on the western front in 1914-1918 with the exception of "Big Bertha," which shelled Paris at 40-minute intervals. Most of the new German naval guns, according to French military experts, can fire from 30 to 45 miles, placing them far back from the range of the Howitzers in the French Maginot forts.

During the lull in the fighting the French consolidated their gains in the Saar valley and prepared positions before Saarbrücken, Saarbourg and Sierburg for the allied "big push" against the outer band of the Siegfried forts, which was expected shortly.

Saarbrücken and Saarbourg were well within machine gun range of the French advance lines and were dominated by the French while Saarburg was held under French artillery fire. The occupation of Saarbrücken and Saarbourg was deferred, according to semi-official information in Paris, in order to save the towns from destruction at the hands of the retreating Germans.

The Germans already had destroyed many roads, railroad lines and bridges around Saarbrücken as they fell back to the Siegfried line, positions about five miles northward, it was reported.

German destruction of transport lines in the Saar region, and an interruption of the Trier-Metz railroad line on the

right bank of the Moselle river, was regarded by French military experts as proof that the Germans did not intend to make a strong fight in defense of those sectors.

It was estimated that half of the industry of the rich Saar basin was either in French hands or paralyzed by the proximity of the French advance.

Fuehrer Dwells At Length On Efforts To Preserve Peace

(Continued From Page One) thinks it should not believe the word of German statesmen, Hitler continued. It should also be critical of the statement of German terms upon the Germans.

Peace offers made at the time of Versailles applied "stupidly," Hitler said, and cast doubt upon the sanity of the men who made them.

States were cut up and destroyed by those peace terms, he said. All Polish territory taken from Germany at the end of the World War held the best in German labor and culture, he said.

At this point Hitler said he should have a "quieting effect" upon the Edens and the Churchills—outstanding British opponents of a policy of "appeasing" Germany.

As he concluded his 74-minute speech Hitler admitted the German people were not "displaying the same enthusiasm as in 1918 but deep down they have the enthusiasm to win the war."

He said he had tried to find a "reasonable solution" to the problem and that this was possible as long as Pilsudski lived.

At this point Hitler said that what had depressed him and caused him suffering was that Nazis had had to suffer at the hands of an inferior state while Germany was a "great state."

Poland tried to make the German inhabitants of the Polish territory into Poles, he shouted.

"What would England, France or America have done in similar circumstances," he asked, turning to the question of the Polish Curator.

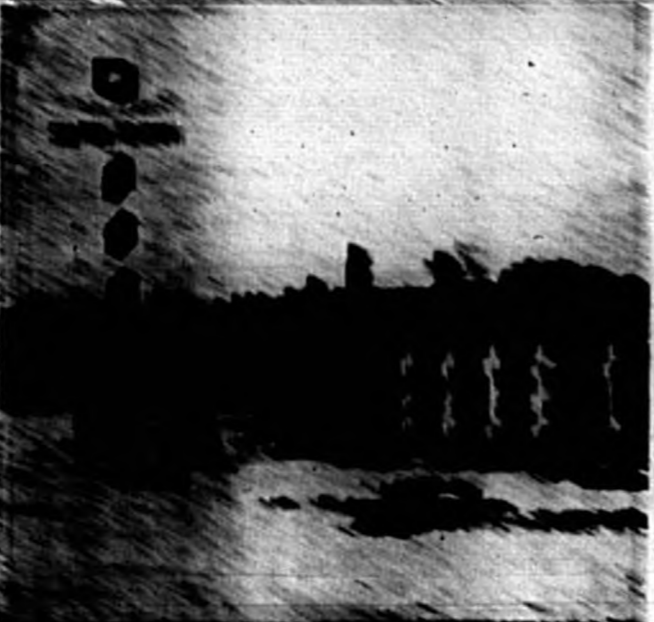
