# Residents cry foul

## Wekiva development approved despite concerns over zoning

SANFORD - Seminole County commissioners approved the last major Wekiya River development Wednesday night over the outcry of Markham Woods area residents.

Residents of the Markham Woods estate homes area were concerned with the 499-home Lexington Estates development proposed by Lexington Homes. Seven people spoke against the proposal, while no residents opposed the Heathrow expansion.

"All we ask is that our zoning be

protected," said Frank Shelton, a

Markham Woods-area resident and a member of the Seminole County Planning and Zonning Commission. 'And man, it hasn't been done on one site yet."
"I have real concerns about the

future of the rural character of the area," said Russell Monerief, one of the founders of the Wektva River protection movement.

But commissioners said Lex-Ington Homes plan to build 499 homes valued at \$350,000 or more on a 837-acre tract north of Lake Mary Boulevard and west of Markham Woods Road offered both protection to the river and the current residents' way of life. Lexington Estates will feature an 18hole private golf course.

This will add to the quality of your life," Commissioner Pat Warren said. "You're the winner here."

Shelton cited 220-home Sylvan Lake, approved in 1988, as the first substantial increase in density in the area. That decision was followed by approvals to allow 400 homes in Plantation and 485 homes in Alaqua Lakes beside the river to be "clustered" on half-acre or smaller lots, he said.

In response, Commissioner Fred Streetman said since the county had already allowed Plantation and Alaqua Lakes near the Lexington Homes site to use a clustered plan. he could not refuse a similar request.

Commissioners voted 5-0 for the request. The Florida Department of Community Affairs must review the proposals approved by commissioners Tuesday and Wednesday. Final commission approval is scheduled for July 10.

Fred Harden, a member of the Friends of the Wektva River Inc., said he was pleased to see the Lexington plan to prevent trrigation water from the proposed 18-hole golf course from flowing into the Wekiva River. He said he was also pleased to see the quarter to half-mile distance from the development's edge to the the river would be dedicated to the county or the state for preservation.

Lexington Estates designers proposed to irrigate the golf course with rainwater collected in fairway water hazards and reuse treated wastewater from the Yankee Lake

## **Bond defeat** could damage property values

SANFORD - The recent deleat of the Seminole County school bond referendum could adversely affect property values in the county, according to Glenda Philpot, president of the Seminole County Board of Realtors.

"When people with children look at an area as a possible home, the first question out of their mouths is about the quality of the schools," Philpot. a relocation specialist, said.

A report produced by the school district stated that the overerowding in Seminole County schools coupled with a lack of adequate financial resources would cause a decline in the quality of education in the district.

"The recent defeat of the proposed school bond issue will undoubtedly require substantial overcrowding of schools and implementation of double sessions in a number of schools," the report stated. "This could significantly affect the desirability of Seminole County for potential new residents. and therefore slow the current rate of develop-

The report said the quality of Seminole County schools is expected to decline due to emergency measures which will need to be taken to house the current and predicted students population. This could signal a decrease in the destrability of homes.

thereby decreasing their marketability and value. "It behooves realiors to work hard to ensure the quality of our schools," Philipot said.

Ann Neiswender, Seminole County School Board chairman, said because of the defeat of the bond issue referendum, the board has no choice but to explore the use of double sessions and year-round schools as alternative ways of housing students.

Over the next five years, it is expected an additional 17,000 students will enroll in Seminole County schools. An additional 30,000 students will enter the schools before the turn of the century.

'Naturally we don't want the quality of education to go down." Neiswender said. "We will do anything we have to to make sure the children do not suffer. Our first priority is to the students."

Philpot said most people perceive a school system resorting to double sessions in their schools as inferior, regardless of the quality of the curriculum.

"It's a decrease in quality," she noted, "And a decrease in the quality of the schools will cause a decrease in (housing) sales. The lack of funding for district schools could have a real impact on the Seminole County market.'

The scene depicts space-walking astronauts floating near their futuristle space station. As the direction of the light hitting the stamp shifts, images appear and disappear and change colors from red to yellow, orange, green, purple and blue, The effect is similar to that which is found on the

corners of VISA credit eards. Longwood Postmaster Jean Wells said.

"It's really pretty," Wells said. "There's a satellite spinning around and there are stars shining on it. It's a 25-cent stamp on a number 9 envelope. We're not selling any more of them than any other stamp. But our window clerks are giving them to people who ask for the number 9s and the people seem to be happy

The new stamps have been selling well in Orlando because of its vicinity to the Kennedy Space Center. said Dennis Lippencott, a supervisor for the Central Florida distribution center in Orlando. He has distributed 30,000 of the new stamps and has 47,000 on order, he said.

The stamp reportedly has been making a big list

## Pilot flunks drug test, is fired

MIAMI -- An Eastern Airlines pilot who tested positive for drug use when he returned to work last summer has been fired, after the company discovered the clerical error that caused it to

overlook the original test result, a spokesman said Wednesday.

Eastern spokesman Robin Matell said the oversight was discovered after the unidentified pilot was arrested for allegedly buying cocaine in Key West.

"His test was positive, but through a clerical error it was missed." Matell said. "He was arrested allegedly for buying cocaine. When we were notified by the Key West police, we confronted him and he resigned, early in March."

But the pilot later rescinded his resignation, and so was fired,

He could not say if the pilot tested positive for cocaine. Matell said the pilot, who joined Eastern in 1985, flew as a second officer, or flight engineer, on Eastern's fleet of Boeing 727

As a second officer, the pilot would have never flown the alterait, although he sits in the cockpit, Matell said.

## Panel: prison care caused inmates' death

TALLAHASSEE - Two inmates died and another lost a leg to gangrene because of less-than-standard medical treatment at a prison near Daytona Beach last year, a court-appointed panel of doctors said in a report published Wednesday.

After reviewing medical records at Tomoka Correctional Institution in Volusia County, the team of doctors said that in several cases medical staff showed "both professional incompetence and a malignant degree of indifference to human

In one case, they discovered that medical staff failed to care for a 60-year-old asthmatic who slowly died of respiratory failure.

In another case, a 68-year-old inmate in prison for molesting a 12-year-old girl had complained of serious chest pains in January 1989, and he was placed in the infirmary for nine hours. He died of heart failure after he had been sent back to his cell, the doctors' report said.

## Martinez to seek federal disaster aid

TALLAHASSEE - Florida plans to seek federal disaster assistance for seven Panhandle counties affected by flooding in the last two weeks as soon as damage assessments are complete, Gov. Bob Martinez said Wednesday.

Meanwhile, a section of heavily traveled interstate 10 in Washington County was closed indefinitely for repairs to supports on a bridge over the Choctawhatchee River weakened by crosion caused by flooding.

Barry Inman, a spokesman for the Department of Transportation, said engineers were assessing the damage to the pilings Wednesday to decide what kind of action was needed.

"Within a day or so we'll know how long it will take to get traffic going again." Inman said, adding that it could be several weeks for the DOT to make the repairs necessary to make the bridge safe again.

Travelers are being routed 40 to 50 miles out of their way while the repairs take place, said Rod Westall, chief of emergency planning for the state.

Automobiles are being detoured north along U.S. 90, while trucks are being re-routed south along State Road 79 and

## Spring Hammock plant growth approved

SANFORD - Seminole County commissioners applauded the David M Company's plans to expand their industrial site in Spring Hammock while blocking another proposal to confirm existing commercial zoning on another Spring Hammock tract.

"I can't help but think the best benefit of this is to the business environment," said Commissioner Fred Streetman. "(David M Co.) represents the very best in American business.

I will look back on this one day as a very positive event." sald Commissioner Pat Warren.

David M, a manufacturer of printing press equipment, proposed to double the size of their existing plant site on Osprey Trail to include 18 total acres east of County Road 419. David M officials said they had no immediate plans to expand their 96-employee operation, but wanted approval to provide for future expansion.

The proposed expansion raised the concern of Spring Hammock protectionists. The Seminole County League of Women Voters wrote a letter in opposition to the request.

So did Heather Leonardi, a fifth grade student at Winter Springs Elementary.

Protect this please, for the children and the futures of the children of Florida," Heather's letter stated. "Please save this land."

The David M site lies a short distance from the Seminole County Evironmental Studies Center and David M officials worked closely with study center officials to limit the light, noise and odors from the plant on the nature center.

Pat Burkett, a study center teacher and one of the original proponents of preserving the Spring Hammock site, said David M officials were very cooperative said the company was very responsive to their concerns.

"The only real concern I have is about the future," Burkett

said. Mark Barrington, David M. general manager, said company officials realize any commitments they make will be passed on to any potential future owner.

Among the commitments made was leaving a 100-foot natural wooded buffer between the alte and the study center south of it. Lights and noise would be reduced to limit any impacts on the study center and surrounding sensitive environmental lands, David M officials

Commissioners approved the

But commissioners unanimously denied a proposal by south Florida investor George Chen to change the land use of, seven acres west of U.S. Highway 17-92 from recreation to commercial uses. The property has commercial zoning, but needs the land use designation before it can be developed.

Commissioners were not impressed by assertions that the site, which can be completely flooded and is about 90 percent covered in wetlands, could be adequately developed. The site is also sought by the state for purchase to preserve it.

Chen's attorney, Duke Woodson, said if the request was approved. Chen would donate 26 acres west of the alte to the county or state. Woodson said Chen was willing to sell the entire site to the state, but the state's offer was about one-third the amount he wanted for it.

But commissioners said the land should not be developed and voted 5-0 against the request. They also voted to begin an administrative rezoning to reclassify the land for agricultural purposes.

At the end of the meeting. Commissioner Bob Sturm said the county should consider swapping the former county health department building on

French Avenue for Chen's land. Commissioners directed staff to review appraisals of the properties and to notify them of the fensibility of the proposal. Woodson was not present during the discussion.

In other action, commission-

●Voted 5-0 to oppose a request by planning and zoning commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski to change the land use of 24 undeveloped acres south of State Road 46 and west of interstate 4 from office and rsidential uses to commercial uses. Six people who live near the site opposed it, saying they didn't want a store near their estate homes.

Owners of the property include former county commissioners Kwiatkowski and Bob Hattaway and former county attorney Tom Freeman.

Commissioners said the proposal was premature until Grant Line Road is extended to the sites east border. They said they preferred an office development on the site.

Approved an Industrial proposal by Kwiatkowski and Hattaway on 11 acres they own southwest of the 1-4-Orange Boulevard intersection. The site is now designated and zoned for commercial uses and lies south of the port.



## Beer's hidden risk

Non-alcoholic beer is becoming increasingly popular among the growing segment of Americans who want, sensibly, to reduce their consumption of alcohol. But what is not widely known is that the beer poses particular dangers for recovering alcoholics.

The drink is being offered by America's top brewers as a new adult soft drink. Con-cessionaires are promoting it in an effort to cut down on liquor consumption at sports

But the beers can be a hidden trap for anyone under treatment for alcoholism. because they actually contain small amounts of alcohol. Under federal law, brews classified as non-alcoholic may have alcohol contents as high as .5 percent. And that is enough to cause readdiction in recovering alcoholics. according to experts.

Labels on the bottles list the alcoholcontent, but doctors fear that most people will take it for gianted that non-alcoholic beer contains no alcohol. "I'd bet 99 percent of people drinking it think it's alcohol-free." says Mike Mangan, supervisor of the adult in-patient program at San Diego's McDonald Center for Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Treatment. "I don't believe the labeling is good enough. It can throw a person off, thinking it's alcohol-free. One drink of non-alcoholic beer could cause a relapse."

One physician who threats alcoholics says he knows of more than a dozen local cases in which persons have become readdicted after experimenting with so-called "near beers" and non-alcoholic wines.

A representative of Alcoholics Anonymous warns that non-alcoholic beer is capable of friggering not only the addict's physical obsession but also his mental obsession. This is especially true if the non-alcoholic beverage is drunk in places associated with the addict's former alcohol abuse.

Recovering alcoholics should be alert to labels and accept responsibility for what they drink. But there is also an obligation on the part of manufactuers and retailers to warn recovering alcoholics of the hidden dangers of non-alcoholic beers and wines. This responsibility extends to such quasi-public entities as sports arenas and stadiums.

As long as the brewers advertise these drinks as non-alcoholic, warnings should be placed prominently on the containers, as well as in bars and liquor outlets, it would be preferable, however, if manufacturers voluntarily dropped the description "nonalcoholic" in favor of "low alcohol" or "reduced alcohol." That would better serve the interests of truth in advertising and reduce the risks to recovering alcoholics.

# Pilot hits turbulence at FAA

Indeed, a blocked radio transmission was the principal contributing factor to the worst disaster in the history of commercial aviation the 1977 runway collision of two fully loaded Boeing 747s at the Tenerife airport in the Canary

## Book firm's fall not an 'assault'

WASHINGTON - The American left, having lost its last great cause - et tu. Nicaragua? has fallen upon fallow times. But a few leftist intellectuals, believing it better to be shrilly stilly than silent, are in full cry about an 'assault" on "cultural freedom.

Their "outrage" concers a "disaster" and "scandal" of "censorship" that "chills the intellectual environment." They call it on attempt by a "complacent, often jingoistic" society of "muffle" critics, a "barbarie" act by "bean counters" of a "bloated conglomerate" guilty of "corporate vandalism" in a "slash-and-burn style." It is the "cultural crime" of "bibliocide." committed, says leftist Studs Terkel, because of "the bottom line, which has become the most obscene expression of the American vocabulary.

What is this sound and fury about? The head of a small publishing company lost his job.

Panthron, a subsidiary of Random House (which is owned by Newhouse), specializes in publishing left-wing books and losing money. Last year it lost between \$2 million and \$3 million. Random House recently told the head of Pantheon to plan to do better. He got hully and quit, and live associates did, too.

That event is unimportant. But the reaction to it among some hyperventilating intellectuals this exercise in nostalgia for the playpen of the 1960s, this new fling at faculty-club radicalism and sandbox revolution - is a hilarious specimen of people intoxicated by self-importance. It also is a case study of the descent of intellictuals' leftism into burlesque.

If you doubt that the protests on behalf of the Pantheon Six is just political special pleading. consider Would STuds Terkel, Kurt Vonnegut. William Styron, Jonathan Schell, Noam Chomsky and the like be protesting a corporation's refusal to run a right-wingleaning publishing house as a "prestige loss leader'

Many publishers bring forth books expected to be loss leaders, and do so because they believe publishing involves social responsibiliry. Bur Pantheon's apologists, who suggest it has cornered the market on civic virtue. demand a preposterous entitlement: Pantheon itself should be run, in perpetuity, as a loss leader. Because it has lost money for so long, it has an malicuable right to do so forever.

When Pantheon's defenders complain about publishing being tainted by "supermarket accounting." it is the noun they find most objectionable: it is "censorship" for Pantheon to be held accountable for its use of other people's money. It is "unlettered greed" "unlettered" - the worst kind) for Newhouse to limit the number of years Pautheon can lose Newhouse money by grinding ideological axes. It is presumably idealism for the Pantheon politicians to have televised fantrums because they do not have an unlimited draw on other people's money.

Pantheon's radicals believe that capitalism is tolerable when, by the industriousness and

responsibility (including attention to the bottom line) of others, it produces sufficient surplus to subsidize its ideological enemies at Pantheon. But cap-Italiam is merely irresponsible greed when it requires Pantheon to live by the rules the rest of the world must respect.

These intellectuals. obscencly comparing themselves to dissidents "silenced" by tyranny, advertise themselves as defenders of intellectual integrity, but they distinguish themselves by their disrespect for language. It goes

societies generally. beyond imprecision. beyond the sloppy expression that betokens a muddled mind. It is the arrogance of ideologues who have lost not only the ability to persuage but also the desire to persuade. Now, for a reality check: While the Sandinistas have been cleaning out their desks, they have passed a little piece of legislation that puts a lie to their socialist proclamations. The new law grants permanent property rights to any person now occupying government property. It is a blatant attempt to give more than 10,000 property titles to Sandinista leaders and followers to enrich themselves and strip Chamorro of a starting base.

One opposition leader called the law "the theft and decapitalization of the goods of the state." Another called it "a huge send-off party" for the Sandinistas. The new law, combined with another one pardoning criminals for crimes committed until April 25. amounts to an invitation to wide-scale embezzlement over the next month, according to the CIA analysis.

We can't help but think back to the Sandinista's protests in 1985 when we reported on the property holdings and money-making ventures of party leaders. They claimed that each house the leaders lived in and each company they ran was actually owned by the state. Come April 25. even the Sandinistas will have to admit that the perks we said they enjoyed now belong to them free and clear.

Nicaraguans have had reason to suspect Ortega's taste for the finer things in life. In 1985 on a shopping spree in Manhattan, he and his wife bought \$3,500 worth of designer eyeglasses. He likes to wear Italian leather jackets and other status symbols.

But - a point in his favor - Daniel Oriega is the least thicking of the Sandinistas. He fives modestly in a house in Managua. His brother. Army Chief Humberto Ortega, is another story. Be goes home at night to an opulent housing compound complete with a small park

A high-level Nicaraguan defector, Major Roger Miranda, confirmed some details of the Ortega lifestyle. The CIA has since uncovered several bank accounts in Panama traced to the Ortega brothers and totaling more than \$3 million.

The CIA believes that Sandmista Interior Minister Tomas Borge is worth more than \$1

President Bush is now pushing for \$300 million in aid to Nicaragua. Our advice is to post-date the check until Chamorro is in office. Otherwise, the Sandmistas will find a way to give themselves a going away present.

# Report: Indian kids have more emotional problems, less help

WASHINGTON - The 400.000 Indian adolescents living on American reservations suffer a higher rate of emotional problems than white children. but only 17 mental health professionals are available to help them, according to a report released Thursday

According to the Office of Technology Assessment report. Indian adolescents face a higher rate of suicide, substance abuse. stress, depression, anxiety and neglect than their white counterparts.

They are also more likely to be physically and sexually abused. to have alcoholic parents or disrupted families and to have school related stresses.

But despite the high rate of emotional distress, the report said the federal Indian Health

neamn trained to serve children and teens, onetenth the number needed.

The report. "Indian Adoles-cent Health." notes that data on the emotional problems of Indian children and the professionals available to aid them is scarce. "The information that does exist makes clear, however, that mental health services for Indian adolescents are inadequate."

The 17 health professionals cited by the report serve 12 Indian Health Service areas. each covering from one to 11

The Billings IHS area, with more than 12,000 Inidan adolescents in Montana and Wyoming. has the most mental health care providers with nine. Five of the areas, together serving about 80,000 Indians in 16 states, have other races combined.

Service funds only 17 mental no mental health professionals teens, according to the OTA report.

> Denise Dougherty, project director for the report, said data from a variety of studies on the frequency of various mental health problems among American teens was used to conclude that the Indian adolescents have a higher rate of emotional illa than whites, aged 10-17.

"You have to piece together the the data from studies and other sources," she said, noting sulcde figures show the 1986 mortality rate for Indians age 15-19 was 26.3 per 100,000 while the rate for all other U.S. races was 10 per 100,000. In the 10-14 age group. Indian suicides were four times higher than all







That particular sequence of vowels and consonants could only be one word, a local corruption for the name of an old-time medical remedy: assafoctida.

This remedy was made from the roots of the plant Narthex Assafoctida, it was considered a stimulant, a powerful antispasmodic, an expectorant and a laxative. At the turn of the century, children commonly wore little cloth bags of assafoctida pinned on their undershirts or on a string around the neck to ward off colds and lung congestion.

I'm amazed that you, a physiclan, never heard of it. Therefore, I assume your plea of ignorance was really a play to fire up all the old-timers to write so you could discover how many senior citizens read your column.



Experts differ about the correct bid with the North hand. In competitive circumstances the bidding side is better placed after a one-diamond opening. since opener will be able to bid both his suits without raising the bidding level. Here the opening bid of one club worked well. since an opening lead of a club would very likely have caused two spades to be set. After the opening diamond lead, East won the king and returned a diamond. Declarer won in dummy and led the heart jack. West won the queen and played a third diamond, declarer slufling a club. Then came another his last diamond. East discard- make the winning play.

ing his last heart and declarer ruffing. Declarer now ruffed his losing heart with dummy's spade 10. When East discarded a club, declarer knew how to play the spade suit. East would certainly have overruffed with the spade queen if he had it, so West was marked with that card. Declarer therefore led a spade back to his king, dropping the singleton queen. He returned to the club ace to play another spade. East took the are and later scored a trick with the spade nine, but declarer's contract was safe. He lost only two hearts, two spades and one diamond. The information that East could not overruff with the heart, won by West. He returned spade queen guided declarer to
