Sex Of Children Still Unborn Can Now Be Foretold

NEW YORK, May 19 - (P) -Orange-yellow is the color for boys and bluish green for girls in a new method of foretelling the sex of unborn bables.

This discovery, reported today to the international and fourth American Congress on Obstetrics and Gynecology, goes exactly opposite to the custom of assigning pink to newly born girls and blue to the boys.

The report was by doctors Pierre Rosa and Aubin E. Fanard. of the University of Brussels, Brussels, Belgium. They said this is the first test that is certain They tried it on nearly 50 unborn children without a miss. The color signs come from the


animiotic fluid, a watery substance in which a prenatal child grows stid lives, up to the moment. of birth. This fluid contains tissue cells, from all parts of the little body that is exposed to the Hauld.

A small sample of the fluid is withdrawn, centrifuged, and then made into a smear on a glass slide. Some of the tissue cells in this smear have natural fints of color.

In boys there is a predominance of cells with yellow tints, giving the amear a slightly orange-yel tow hite. In girls the color is blu-ish-green, for similar rasons




