Recreation Program Gets Lots Of Notice

A standard citizen appearing at the city commission meeting on Tuesday morning of business took time out Monday to tell the commissioners what a wonderful job the Recreation Department is doing.

It is usually possible to get a good product by the use of the public and the recreation program undertaken last year by the city passed the acceptance test with flying colors.

Recreation and Parks Director Ronald Perry reported that a total of 299,000 people had made use of the recreational facilities offered during the period Aug. 1, 1955 to July 31, this year. Most of them took part in summer activities when youth often is hard put to keep occupied in warm-weather recreation.

Perry's report listed expenditures of about \$42,000 on playgrounds, stadium and zoo expenses, with \$9,000 coming out in the form of income from the facilities.

Thirty-one types of activities were programmed and all were well attended. Just one example: 30,000 persons used the two swimming pools.

City Manager Warren Knowles commented that the report showed "a really amazingly diversified program." The commissioners laughed broadly when the citizen took the time to offer his praise and they had just cause to be proud.

Did Midas Touch Extend To Wood?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — King Midas, whose touch supposedly turned everything to gold, may have had a way with plain old wood, too.

All right, that's what America's number one industry thinks and why it is watching carefully excavations around King Midas' tomb in a 60-foot mound of earth on a plain near Ankara, Turkey.

There already is evidence that Midas' people produced wooden chambers that are still in good condition after 2,700 years.

Two years ago, a University of Pennsylvania crew dug its way into the tomb of King Gordias, a ruler well established as Midas' father, and found a burial vault built of massive wooden beams. They were hand-hewn, beautifully smooth and sanded, ex-

actly fitted and in such excellent shape that even after 27 centuries many of the joints were all but invisible.

Wood experts have discovered that the beams were ordinary pine, with no evidence they received some secret treatment.

Lumbermen like to feel that the explanation for this is simple — that, under proper conditions, wood will outlast any other man-made structural substance.

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China's admission that it would fall far short this year of its grain production targets was outside to send its promise on a two-day tour.

That's an age-old baseball axiom and if the faltering first-place Giants didn't know it before they sure know it now.

St. Louis beat Milwaukee, 5-4, and Cincinnati took Chicago, 5-0, in the other N.L. games. Los Angeles and Pittsburgh were idle.

The first-place Chicago White Sox stretched their lead to 1 1/2 games with a 5-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox in the only American League game scheduled.

Joe Cunningham celebrated his 50th birthday by collecting a triple, double and two singles in the Cards' win over the Braves. Cunningham's performance lifted his batting average to .340, only nine points back of Milwaukee's Hank Aaron, who leads the league.

Red Sox slugger Jim O'Toole of the Reds limited the Cubs to five hits in pitching his first major league shutout and registering his fourth victory of the year. O'Toole fanned 10 and didn't allow a hit until the 10th.

Two youngsters, 23-year-old Barry Latham and 20-year-old John Beane, led the White Sox to their victory over the Red Sox. Latham knocked Boston for eight innings before Ted Williams took off for his 16th homer in the ninth.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Gene Fullmer, a country boy from Utah, and Carmen Basilio, an onion farmer from New York, clash tonight for the NBA version of the world middleweight crown in the San Francisco Cow Palace.

Fight time is 9 p. m. and the two lads will be picking up some of the biggest checks of their varied careers for the scheduled 15-round bout.

A crowd of about 15,000 is anticipated, with a gate of \$200,000. Another \$100,000 will come from radio and TV rights. Of the total, Basilio gets 35 per cent, Fullmer 25 per cent.

The two bruising body-punchers, both former holders of the now-vacant crown, battle pretty much alike—but think differently.

"I expect to win it," says Basilio, the crag-faced veteran, "it's the most important fight of my career. My future depends on it."

Fullmer, with 151 rounds of boxing, plus dozens more with an axe handle on the heavy bag, believes he is at the peak of his career.

At 28 years, he is four years younger than Basilio. He will weigh seven or eight pounds more and will have a two-inch reach advantage.

"I've trained harder for this fight than ever before," says Fullmer. "And I have developed a new punch—extra power that should win it for me."

Labor Reform Bill Offer May Head Off Senate Fight

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republicans conferred in a surprise move, reported today that they would offer some new proposals which could head off a Senate floor fight over the labor reform bill.

If Senate Democrats agreed to the offers made by the House group, Senate Republicans obviously would abandon their plan to call up a resolution asking the full Senate to break the conference deadlock in favor of the House bill.

GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen introduced the resolution Friday after the committee deadline on House bill curbs on secondary boycotts and organizations of picketing and on federal-state jurisdiction in labor disputes. He said he would call up the resolution for action later today.

This appears to mean any hope that the conference could agree on a bill beforehand.

Over the weekend, however, the House conference came up with some new proposals which apparently would at least partly accept the modification demanded by Senate Democrats.

Rep. Robert Griffin (R-Mich.) said he and Rep. Phil Landrum (D-Ga.) co-authors of the tough Landrum-Griffin bill passed by the House drew up the package. Asked if it represented a concession on their part, Griffin said he preferred to call it an "adjustment."

Rain, Flash Flood Cave Streets, Soak Homes

SARASOTA (UPI) — Pitted streets, ruined lawns and water-soaked homes remained today as evidence of the rain storm-triggered flash flood that struck Sarasota Saturday night.

The Weather Bureau predicted the area would have scattered showers today, but nothing like the four inches of rain that deluged some sections of the city Saturday.

Water stood waist-deep in some areas, causing stalled traffic, street cave-ins and at least one bridge washout. Most affected roads had returned to near-normal by Sunday night.

Hardest hit was the Southgate section, which lost electric power and water service when the flood washed out water lines. One family was evacuated by civil defense workers.

City officials said there was no way to accurately estimate the damage total. However, they said damage would run into "the thousands of dollars."

Some of the holes in the streets measured five feet deep and seven feet across. Officials said many streets were underlaid and the damage might not show up until later.

During the storm's height, lightning knocked about 50 bricks from a downtown hotel's chimney. They damaged an automobile below.

A mystery was the whereabouts of a small plane whose pilot radioed Sarasota - Bradenton Airport that he was lost and low on fuel just before the storm hit.

An all-day search Sunday by a Coast Guard boat and law enforcement officers aboard turned up no trace of either the pilot or its aircraft.

Residents of a nearby community said they heard a plane's engine pattering, but did not hear a crash or see the plane land. Authorities theorized the pilot may have made an emergency landing and then departed without informing anyone.

Driver Licenses On Sale Tomorrow; Sites Listed

The 1960 drivers licenses will go on sale Tuesday 9 A. M. in the lobby of the Court House.

Renewal prices remain the same, \$1.25 for operator and restricted operator licenses, and \$2.25 for chauffeur licenses. Anyone now holding 1959 Florida license may renew it by bringing the license in person, or by sending it by an adult member of the family, or an employer may obtain licenses for his employees.

They may be renewed by mail. The entire original license must be presented in order to renew, and the applicant may keep the green carbon copy to use while the license is being renewed.

All restricted operator licenses must be renewed before October or examination will be required. Those now holding out-of-state valid licenses must appear in person to obtain Florida license, and anyone under 18 years of age must have signature of both parents and appear in person.

County Judge Wilson Alexander is extending the service this year and hiring additional help to give fast and efficient issuance and applicants may save much time by having license and exact change ready when they are next in line.

Good Intention

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Khrushchev is interested in a new proposal from West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to resume disarmament talks and wants more details, Tass news agency reported today.

Khrushchev said disarmament and other East-West issues "are not insoluble" and reiterated his promise that he is going to the United States "with good intentions to help peace" and to "melt the ice of the cold war." Tass said.

The new Adenauer proposal brushed aside warnings about Soviet military might made by Khrushchev in his earlier note, and instead appealed to the Soviet leader to reopen big disarmament talks.

Adenauer said the negotiations should begin where they broke off in August 1957.

British Back 'Firm, But Flexible' Stand In Khrushchev Talks

Ike Position Gets Added Strength

LONDON (UPI) — President Eisenhower today ended the second round of top secret Allied cold war talks assured of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's support for a "firm but flexible" stand in dealing with Russia's Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Macmillan's backing was confidence from West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. He placed Eisenhower in a strong position for his talks with Italian and French leaders when he goes to Paris Wednesday.

The president and Macmillan completed a week end of intensive discussions and headed back to London this morning from the Prime Minister's Chequers estate.

Police were prepared to cope with another overwhelming popular demonstration for Eisenhower on the drive through the heart of the capital to visit a World War II memorial chapel for Americans dead at St. Paul's Cathedral.

Tonight the president and prime minister were expected to disclose to the world in an unprecedented joint radio-television appearance some details of their weekend talks.

Eisenhower and Macmillan held a series of conferences Saturday and Sunday with their foreign ministers and a small group of top advisers at Chequers.

They discussed the forthcoming Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting, the Communist drive against the free world, means of strengthening NATO, disarmament, Western defense, nuclear test ban negotiations, the forthcoming United Nations General Assembly meeting and the Red Chinese threats against Laos and India's northern frontier.

Virtually no details of the talks were disclosed by Eisenhower and Macmillan's press officers and there was a near revolt Sunday night by the 400 or more newsmen who have come here to cover the meeting.

Other reliable diplomatic sources disclosed the two had reached broad agreement on a "firm but flexible" line to be taken when the president exchanges visits with Khrushchev.

They were said to have agreed that the president take a firm stand on basic principles while indicating the West's readiness to negotiate toward a cold war settlement.

In addition to a possible summit meeting, they were said to have agreed that the West should press for other conferences with the Soviet Union on lower levels on specific issues such as disarmament and a nuclear test ban.

The sources said the two were in close agreement on situations in the Middle and Far East.

Macmillan also was said to have indicated that Britain no longer intends to press for Red China's recognition by the United States for admittance to the United Nations.

Jet Engine Reliable

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Jet engines on airliners are proving to be 30 times more reliable than conventional engines, Federal Aviation Agency officials revealed today.

Nikita To Bring Wife

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department announced today that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev will be accompanied on his visit to the United States by his wife, two daughters, one son, and a son-in-law.

Smathers Bid Doused

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate leaders of both parties threw cold water today on a proposal by Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) that Congress recess Friday until Oct. 15 to avoid Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's visit and to get back-home views on pending issues. Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said he would consider Smathers' suggestion but voiced no enthusiasm for it.

Reds Hire Fuchs

BERLIN (UPI) — Former atom spy Dr. Klaus Fuchs has been appointed deputy director of the East German Central Institute for Nuclear Physics, the Communist government announced today.

Herrell Withdraws

MIAMI (UPI) — State Rep. Cliff Herrell of Miami withdrew as a possible candidate for governor in favor of Rep. Doyle Carlton of Waukeela, according to political observers here. Herrell withdrew Saturday saying an "impasse" had been reached. Sources said Herrell and Carlton had received their strongest backing from the same political group.

Gray To Ask Doc

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Walter, an Secretary of State R. A. Gray, 77, promises to abide by his physician's advice when he announces in October whether he plans to seek an eighth term. "Captain Bob," who says he has never had a serious illness, said he will take a physical examination in October, then ask his doctor if he should make the race.

Caldwell Calls Nikita World's 'Top Criminal'

MIAMI (UPI) — Former Gov. Millard F. Caldwell charged today that the forthcoming visit to America of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will contribute to the "Communist purpose."

Caldwell called Khrushchev "the world's top criminal" and warned that unless the United States watches its step, it may become another Russian satellite.

The ex-governor leveled the charges in a speech prepared for delivery to the National Warden's and Jail Assn.

"The self-appointed experts who spend a few days in Russia and return with glowing accounts of progress, education, socialized medicine, industrialization and cultural advancement are pleading Khrushchev's cause," he said.

India Reports New Invasions

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — The Chinese Communists have made new invasions into the Slang and Lohat division of India's North-East Frontier Agency region, un-official reports here said today.

The reports gave no details of the alleged new aggression by the Reds into India's border area.

They came as Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said that India would try to solve its border problems with Communist China by negotiation rather than war.

Nehru told Parliament his plan was twofold—to reinforce Indian border forces while at the same

time talking the situation over with the Peking government.

Even as he spoke Indian newspapers published reports that the Chinese had entered the Day Himalayan country of Bhutan from Tibet and had climbed again within Indian border guards.

The Nehru government was reported to have dispatched heavy army reinforcements to the north with instructions to shoot if necessary to drive back encroaching Chinese.

Nehru's speech to Parliament, however, was designed to reduce some of the tension that has been

building up. He said war was not the way to settle disputes.

He said the difficulty is that Indians claim certain northern territories on their maps and the Chinese Communists claim the same soil. He said he hoped conferences and talks could work out the dispute.

Nehru told of four clashes between Indian and Chinese troops during August but said the last one he was informed about occurred Wednesday. The other three occurred Aug. 1, 14 and 25, he said.

'Dead Man' Afraid To Die

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — "I was a traitor to my friends, my family and my religion. I did not want to go on living, but I was afraid to die."

This was the explanation Chinese student Cheng Guan Lin gave for hiking for nearly four years as a "living deadman" in a church attic next to the University of Michigan campus.

The Singapore school teacher's son, who fled from shame and failure, was to learn today what authorities planned to do with him. Ann Arbor police were considering breaking and entering charges.

Immigration officials also were on hand to start deportation proceedings if he is not charged with any crime in Michigan.

Cheng, 28, revealed more of the fantastic story of his self-made prison to authorities who questioned him in the Washtenaw County jail here.

"I guess you could call it a self-imposed torture," Cheng said as he nervously flung back his shoulder-length hair.

"You know how a kid feels after he has just broken his mother's favorite vase? That's how I feel."

The former university junior engineering student was flushed from the attic of the First Methodist Church, one of the city's largest churches, shortly before 6 a. m. Sunday by two policemen. His capture ended stories about a ghost in the church.

For the past few years, police have been plagued with power reports at the church. Members of the congregation complained of "funny noises" in the big church. Cheng said he made some noise skipping rope on a 2 1/2 foot wide catwalk of planks in the attic rafters above the ceiling and below the roof of the three-story church.

"I needed exercise," he said. "Even an Oriental like me can't lie on planks 24 hours a day."

He also got exercise climbing down a permanent steel ladder that led to his nest hideout and three flights of stairs that led to a basement kitchen.

It was here that Cheng got his food supply and used bathroom facilities since he vanished Oct. 9, 1955.

"I kept relatively clean," he

said, "by wiping myself with a cloth after perspiring. It rose to 130 degrees under that roof. It was cold in the winter, though."

Cheng's four-year student visa expired Sept. 15, 1958. He disappeared on Oct. 9 and was reported officially missing on Nov. 20, 1958.

Sept. 3 Opening Date Of School In Oviedo

The first day of school for Oviedo students in grades 7-12 has been postponed until Thursday (Sept. 3). Grades 1-6 will report Monday (Aug. 31) in keeping with the county-wide schedule. The luncheon will be open Monday and buses will make their regular runs.

Delay in starting date for the upper grades was made necessary because building renovations are incomplete. The three missed days will be made up on Saturday, the exact dates to be determined later. There will be no school sessions on Sat., Sept. 5.

\$250,000 'Truth' Fund Suggested

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Association of Citizens Councils of Florida has voted to start a state-wide drive for \$250,000 "to present the truth" about segregation.

In a day-long meeting here Sunday, the group also passed a resolution for the "determined defeat and destruction of the doctrine, plan, and program" of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Florida and the South.

The 30 delegates hit at what they called "the attempted prostitution of the vital segregation of misguided individuals, courts and groups."

The Rev. George Downs of Orlando, executive secretary of the association, presided at the meeting, which was held at the American Legion Hall.

Miami Teamsters Members Resign In Union Tiff

MIAMI (UPI) — The spokesman for a rebellious group of Teamsters' Union members has said "there is nothing left of New York" Local 237 in Miami.

George Pfaffendorf, former head of the local's organizing drive, said about 1,700 of the local's 2,000 members resigned over "methods of operations."

He said Local 237 President Henry Feinstein of New York made "misleading and provocative statements."

Pfaffendorf said he and 14 business agents have a tentatively scheduled meeting with Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa to talk over a new Florida charter and discuss a new membership drive.

"I don't say Feinstein wasn't sincere," Pfaffendorf said. "But his action did not create a good feeling between the union and public officials and between union and its members."

The union has been attempting to organize Dade County's municipal employees and has met stiff opposition from public officials. Feinstein has questioned the right of the officials to threaten workers with dismissal if they join the Teamsters.

Feinstein termed the defection as a "conspiracy" started by Pfaffendorf.

Pfaffendorf connived to get a charter while he was still working for us," Feinstein said. He said Pfaffendorf and the 14 business agents had "been off the payroll" for three months.

Polio Fund Goes For Vaccine

The Seminole County Health Unit has already bought needed polio vaccine with the \$50 given the Unit by the American Legion Auxiliary Thursday.

The donation will be used to buy vaccine for immunizing children who come to the clinic for shots. The Health Unit had a few serum supply all summer.

Deputy Gets Two Hits With One Shot

Sheriff's Deputy W. R. Brown shot two men with one bullet in a Midway struggle early Saturday morning.

Brown had James Henderson under arrest and was taking him to a patrol car when Henderson jumped Brown, according to the sheriff's office. Ollie Stallworth came to help Henderson, with whom the deputy was struggling. Brown managed to draw his pistol and shot Henderson. The bullet passed through him and hit Stallworth.

Both the Negro assailants are in Orange Memorial Hospital and will recover, barring any complications, Sheriff J. L. Hobby said today.

Officer Delivers 40th Baby On Job

NEW YORK (UPI) — Patrolman Robert L. Desendorf Jr., 33, Sunday delivered his 40th baby.

The 21-year police force veteran, who took several pre-med courses before joining the force and carries a medical kit with him on the job for just such emergencies, beat the ambulance to the home of Mrs. Frances Lopez and assisted in the birth of a seven-pound 10-ounce boy.

Union, Goodyear Race Strike Time

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Negotiators for the United Rubber Workers Union and the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. raced today against a midnight deadline to reach agreement on a new wage contract.

Union members at Goodyear plants in 11 cities last week voted strike authority to their bargaining team. There are 25,000 URW members at Goodyear plants.
