## Britain And Poland Clash On Election

### Britain Accused Of Interfering In Poland's Internal Affairs By Embassy

LONDON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Britain and Poland clashed again today on the subject of the Polish general elections in November. A Polish embassy spokesman charged that Britain was interfering in Polish internal affairs. He particularly criticized the statement issued in London that British supervision of the November general elections would be necessary.

The Polish official added that Britain's remarks about the conduct of the June national referendum meant that the British government actually was taking sides with opposition parties in Poland. In reply to the Polish embassy official's accusations, a British Foreign Office spokesman retorted that Britain will not interfere financially with Poland until the Poles guarantee a free election in November.

## British Ship Heywood Puts Out To Sea Following Sabotage Warning

JERUSALEM, Aug. 23.—The British troopship Empire Heywood put to sea today a short time after naval headquarters received a telephone call warning that the vessel would be sabotaged.

The ship is en route to Haifa, where it will remain in the Mediterranean for four days, because it is thought she will be safer at sea than in Haifa Harbor. Saboteurs were late in the night of another troopship in the harbor earlier this week. The Heywood also was damaged in a previous explosion.

The immediate landing of the refugees at Cyprus is prevented by camp conditions on the island. The Heywood started for Cyprus a week ago with the 600 refugees but was forced to return to Haifa when passengers banded into small boats in the harbor.

The Jews are being deported under the British policy following further unauthorized immigration to Palestine.

## Immediate Price Ceilings On Tires Okayed By O.P.A.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23. (AP)—The O.P.A. today authorized a retail price rise of about two and one half percent on tires for passenger automobiles, motorcycles, trucks and buses. The agency said that the increases are effective immediately. It explained that they are to meet the new price control act requirement that dealers' profit margins be restored to the level of last Mar. 31.

Meanwhile, the O.P.A. was speeding work on a list of other price booms that under the new law must be in effect tomorrow.

Earlier today the price agency granted retail price increases ranging from one to three percent on several kinds of building materials. It authorized a six percent hike on all sales levels for toilet tissue and paper towels.

Already on the books are increases for such household items as refrigerators, washing machines, radios and vacuum cleaners.

There is a possibility of a further price rise of about three percent for new automobiles. This would be in addition to the seven and three-tenths percent average increase in price ceilings for cars granted six weeks ago.

# Moscow Says U. S. Being Charged With Holding Yugoslav Vessels

## Safety Of Five American Army Airmen Doubled Yugoslav Spokesman Says Turkish Officer Under Guard

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23. (AP)—The State Department is pessimistic about hopes for the safety of five American airmen shot down by Yugoslav fighters last Monday. A spokesman says that the Yugoslav Fourth Army has expressed doubt that any of the Americans parachuted to safety.

A message from Belgrade officially confirms the release of nine occupants of another American Army plane which was forced to crash land two weeks ago. The two incidents led to the strong ultimatum from the United States to Yugoslavia. American representatives in Yugoslavia have been forced by bad weather to postpone until tomorrow a visit to the scene of last Monday's crash.

Meanwhile in Paris an official Yugoslav spokesman says that the Turkish officer who was a passenger on the plane that crashed two weeks ago is being detained. He declares that the Turkish officer's flight over Yugoslavia was not accidental. This statement followed a brief dispatch from Belgrade to the French Press Agency saying that Marshal Tito had decided to reject the United States ultimatum. However, there has been no official statement about such a decision.

## Construction And Installation Of Lockers Begin At Local Storage Plant

Construction and installation of facilities for 1,000 lockers was started yesterday at the plant of the Central Florida Quick Freeze and Storage Company at Thirteenth Street and Elm Avenue.

Alex R. Johnson, president and Forrest Gabel, secretary-treasurer, predicted that the plant, which will be especially designed to serve individuals and growers, will open during the late fall.

At the present time, 500 of the lockers for frozen foods are on hand. There will be facilities for frozen foods in one room, also rooms for chilling and aging meat, spring pork and miscellaneous storage purposes.

"We will have," said Mr. Johnson, "facilities for processing and freezing meats, vegetables and fruits, cleaning and dressing of fish and poultry. All frozen foods will be stored in door type lockers. Quick freezing will be done in the latest to below zero degree quick freeze unit."

The building, which formerly housed the Eckerson Canning Company and later was used by Chase and Company for storage purposes, has 150 feet frontage on Thirteenth Street and 180 feet on Elm Avenue. It has a cement floor and steel truss roof, and is well lighted with plenty of window space. According to L. T. Choate, representative of the Mandat Cork Company of Atlanta, Ga., the plant will be the largest and best equipped in the south-east. Much work is already on hand for including purposes.

York refrigeration units will be installed by the H. B. Matthews Industries of Jacksonville. The new type drawer lockers are arranged in vertical tiers of five, above which will be placed two of the square or door type lockers. R. L. Cornell is consulting engineer for the new plant.

Canal Project

Substantial progress was made on the proposed St. Johns-Indian River canal at the hearing held at the Mayfair Inn Tuesday where it was shown that over half a million dollars in losses were suffered by the cattle industry as a result of floods in 1941 alone and that high water had cost the City of Sanford another half a million dollars during the past twenty years.

Considerable testimony was introduced to show the potentialities of the upper St. Johns River valley if flood waters during the rainy season can be diverted from the prairies on which the cattle graze and if various citrus and agricultural men can be assured of proper drainage as well as proper irrigation at the proper time.

The advantages to this section from a shipping standpoint were also clearly indicated. Cheaper freight rates with a much shorter route to the ocean and the possibility of moving upwards of 300,000 tons of commodities annually through the canal were emphasized by various witnesses while the opportunity of attracting to the St. Johns River route the yachts of wealthy tourists bound for the lower East Coast was also noted.

This St. Johns-Indian River canal project is an old story to Sanfordites where many an old-timer has been working for it for the past 30 or 40 years. Although the cost is not great, now estimated at something slightly less than \$5,000,000, political considerations have always hampered its progress.

Such a calamity should be prepared for before it is too late, thinks Congressman James W. Trimble of Arkansas. He has introduced a constitutional amendment, providing that if this disaster happens, the highest officers of the army and air forces should choose a civilian to serve as temporary president.

The 20th amendment to the Constitution gives Congress power to pass a law providing what should happen if both the president and vice-president-elect die before assuming office.

Perhaps Congress would rather risk chaos than make decisions which some voters might oppose.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

Chicago Aug. 20: Last week when I wrote my column from Suffolk, I really expected to be pounding this one out on my own typewriter, in Tampa, but my friend Vernon Ramsey twisted my arm and made me join him on a trip to Chicago to attend the International Apple Growers Convention.

Now I had just about as much excuse to attend an Apple convention as a peach orchard should have running for Congress, but you know me when temptation crooks her index finger, I get no more resistance than a burned out coil.

So the upshot of it was, I find myself strapped in a Pennsylvania Central Airlines plane watching the United States go by at a speed of about 200 miles an hour. It is a right pretty sight, too, looking down on Chesapeake Bay, Washington, D. C., Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit and Chicago.

Chicago would be a helluva big city if you could scrape it altogether in one big pile like they've done with New York, but the way it is now, the darn place just won't let itself go like a lady off her girdle. You just don't know where it begins or leaves off.

The Stevens Hotel, where we put up for the night on our arrival, was a right smart establishment, a kind of a cross between the Grand Central Station and Polo Grounds, with more folks millin' around the lobby than you'd find in most Florida towns on Saturday night.

The bell-hop who showed us to our room for a dirty look and a fifty cent tip, opened a window which faced Lake Michigan and with the first blast I liked to freeze to death. We could see a lot of native Yankees playing around on the beach, but it was too rugged for us thin blooded Southerners.

After washin' the stratosphere off our faces we went down to the dining room, or that is one of them, they had five or six, for a mess of victuals. I thought prices were high in Florida until I took a look at the menu. The cheapest thing they had to offer was hamburger steak at 1.50 per helping. I ordered for a half a lobster at \$3.50 but found that a slab of plain old Key West Crawfish has it beat a mile and you can still get it in Tampa at a dollar a throw.

After washin' the stratosphere off our faces we went down to the dining room, or that is one of them, they had five or six, for a mess of victuals. I thought prices were high in Florida until I took a look at the menu. The cheapest thing they had to offer was hamburger steak at 1.50 per helping.

Vernon thought maybe a little short might be helpful before dinner so he phoned to room service and asked if it would be possible to get a bottle of Scotch or Bourbon. It was, if you wanted to pay \$15 for it. We didn't, figurin' it was cheaper at 75c a drink over the mackinay.

My quarters for the Apple Growers was the Sherman Hotel and we drifted over there after a while to see what was going on. I was surprised to find the place filled with Floridians, most of them citrus leaders, who have found it worthwhile to keep a close check on the apple deal because of its close relationship to the sale of citrus fruits.

Maybe living up in this neck of the woods appeals to some folks, but as for me, I wouldn't trade my little Florida fox-hole for a dozen Chicago's.

ural reservoirs that held water to be released slowly. At the lower mouth of Lake Harney, there is a bluff on each side of the river that holds the water back so it can flow out only so fast. There is another such natural formation at the lower end of Lake Monroe. Lake Jessup fills up as a safety valve in high water, and empties out when the rain ceases. These reservoirs supply a constant source of fresh water to maintain the present river.

If a large canal is constructed at Puzzle Lake into the Indian River, it will be another mouth to the river. The upper waters of the St. Johns River will discharge quickly into the ocean, 50 miles above Sanford, and we will have a sluggish stream from Lake Harney, through Lake Monroe, and down the old St. Johns, with probably more sewage and pollution trouble.

There is another feature that we must keep in mind, and that is fish and wild-life. In times of high water, the grass-covered prairies are alive with minnows that come out of the creeks. They are safe in these shallow waters and thrive. Game fish are more plentiful after high water. High water and overflow are favorable to duck and wild-life that add charm and beauty to the country.

I, personally, am in favor of some proper branch of the Government creating large basins for the storing of water in the Upper St. Johns River and not the digging of a large canal to drain these waters off quickly. We need these reservoirs of water to sustain us in periods of dry weather.

For the past four years, we have had above normal rainfall. This will change, and we will then have seasons when water is scarce.

A difficulty in regulating the levels of water is that you bring the water down to a certain level and then attempt to hold it there, but there may be no rainfall to replenish the levels. The evaporation in this State is almost equivalent to the amount of rainfall.

Some way should be worked out whereby we can live and enjoy periods of high water without thinking that we are being ruined.

Should a lock-canal be dug, the levels that might be maintained on the river will be a source of continual argument. Some interests will want the water held high, other interests will want the water held low.

The St. Johns River in its construction is a marvelous piece of God's handiwork. There are natural reservoirs that held water to be released slowly.

### New Issue Of Convertible Debentures Recommended By A.T. & T. Officials

NEW YORK CITY, Aug. 23. (Special)—The board of directors of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company voted yesterday to recommend to stockholders a new issue of convertible debentures in an amount not to exceed \$251,000,000, an increase in the authorized capital stock of the company from 25 million to 25 million shares, and the adoption of an employee stock plan under which up to 2,800,000 shares may be issued and sold to employees of the company and its subsidiaries.

A special meeting of stockholders to vote on the recommendation will be held Oct. 16. Proxies and accompanying statements describing the proposals are being prepared and will be mailed Sept. 7. Since approval by holders of two-thirds of the shares outstanding is required to authorize the convertible issue, the company emphasizes the importance of stockholders returning their proxy promptly if they do not expect to attend the meeting in person. Stockholders registered at the close of business Sept. 13, 1946, will be entitled to vote. Proceeds from the sale of both debentures and stock would be used to provide funds for extensive additions and improvements to the plant of A. T. & T. and its subsidiary and associated companies, and for general corporate purposes. The company points out that because of the improved service and in order to extend and improve existing services, the Bell System has entered upon the largest construction program in its history. This will necessitate obtaining over the next few years very substantial amounts of new capital.

The company estimates that on the initial offering more than 500,000 Bell System employees will be eligible to purchase shares, and that approximately 2,800,000 shares would be offered, out of a total of 2,800,000 which would be authorized for employees.

## Arabs Demand Britain Consult Grand Mufti

### Request Made To Invite Exiled Leader To London Parley On Palestine

JERUSALEM, Aug. 26 (AP)—A new element was injected into the explosive Palestine situation today with an Arab demand that Britain consult the exiled Grand Mufti of Jerusalem. A formal request was made that the Mufti, who played ball with Hitler during the war, be invited to the London conference on Palestine scheduled to begin in September. The request was handed the British government by the Arab Higher Executive Committee.

There seemed little likelihood that Britain would extend an invitation to the Mufti. The exiled Arab leader is none too well liked in official London circles, where his record of collaborating with the Axis is still remembered. The Palestine picture was further complicated today when a Zionist leader, Richard Lichheim, sharply criticized the World Jewish Agency. Lichheim said the agency has secretly agreed to the British plan for dividing the Holy Land into Jewish and Arab states, but that the agency has not yet made its new position public.

In Palestine itself, there was a spectacular raid on a tiny Jewish town today by British forces. Two hundred residents of the village of Sefot Yam were rounded up and herded into barbed wire enclosures for questioning. The British surrounded the village before dawn and searched homes and buildings. They were looking for the men who attached bombs to the refugee transport Empire Rival in Haifa harbor last week and almost succeeded in blowing up the vessel.

The surprise raid on Sefot Yam followed the pattern of a full-scale military invasion. Long lines of trucks crammed with British troops took part in the operation, along with field kitchens, radio equipment and Sherman tanks. All roads in the village were blocked off and guarded by machine guns.

### Truman Takes Break In Vacation Plans

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Aug. 26 (AP)—President Truman today turned from his vacation to study prospective appointments to the Atomic Energy Control Commission.

Presidential Secretary Charles Ross told newsmen that Mr. Truman is giving the matter serious consideration. Ross added that it is doubtful whether any announcement will be made until the Chief Executive returns to the capital.

## Continued Shortage Of May Food Items Seen By State Market Head

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 26 (Special)—International and domestic conditions remain uncertain and confusing, but there is one point out which there is no question whatsoever, and that is the continuing shortage of food items, said William L. Wilson, director of State Markets, back in Jacksonville today after an extended trip to points in the North and East. "I have been impressed during these recent days with the idea that market-women producers stand to make money for some time to come but that we are nearing the end of the period in which practically nothing can be added at a good price, regardless of quality."

"Discussing the current situation with Clinton P. Anderson, Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, just before my return home, I found him most interested in the problems facing Florida Producers. Naturally, I was delighted with his sympathetic attitude and his general grasp of conditions affecting our farmers, as well as farmers throughout the country.

"Secretary Anderson has shown a keen appreciation of the difficulties we have faced from time to time, during his service as head of the United States Department of Agriculture. This is a true statement of many of the high-ranking officials in his Department. I was particularly glad of this opportunity for a conference with the Secretary, because of numerous matters of immediate concern to our producers, which I gave me an opportunity to discuss with him. I am hopeful that this conference as a representative of Commission, Mayo of our own Florida Department of Agriculture may prove helpful by giving our latest available information, and viewpoints, to the head of the Federal department."
