Seminole County School of officials will hold a work session at 7:30 p.m. tonight at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary Blvd. in Sanford, to discuss elementary school rezoning plans for Elementary School "Q" to be built in the Oviedo area. The following existing schools will be affected by the construction of the new facility: Carillon, Geneva, Keith, Lawton, Partin, Rainbow, Red Bug, Stenstrom, Sterling Park and Winter Springs. About 400 people attended a similar meeting held March 8. A Core Committee comprised of executive directors of facilities planning and elementary education will present input from the March 8 meeting and two alternative plans for rezoning in that area. The public is encouraged to attend.

Board members voted Tuesday to approve conditionally an application to open a charter on-line high school in fall of 2000.

Cyber High School's Leona Rachman will submit a revised application to open the high-technology school for about 150 potential dropouts who would attend on-site classes twice a week and complete an on-line curriculum the other three days. School officials questioned the school's projected enrollment of 450 for the second year, the school's initial budget and curriculum standards. The motivation of potential dropouts and their own concerned board members.

Rachman, proposing a similar project in Orange County, must also surpass funding hurdles from Florida Department of Education officials in Tallahassee. Rachman must restate provisions of the school's proposed time line under the board's conditional OK.

The board received a letter withdrawing the application from the applicant of a second charter school being considered. No further action was taken on Excelsior Charter School.

Lyman High School's Leadership class will host the second Non-Violence conference Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at St. Peter and Paul Catholic Church, 5300 Howell Branch Rd., Winter Park.

Students will participate in rope courses, and workshops in peer mediation, conflict resolution, gang awareness and save-a-friend hotline so that they may practice and promote non-violence in their schools.

Penny tax will benefit Sanford roads projects

SANFORD - Sanford will receive more than \$5 million in road improvements thanks to sales tax money from Seminole County.

The Sanford City Commission agreed Monday to use part of the city's \$5.6 million in available "one cent sales tax money" for work on an east-west connection between the St. Johns Parkway and Airport Boulevard along the Coastline Road and Jewett Lane alignments.

A four lane road between St. Johns Parkway and Upsala Road will be built at a cost of \$1.3 million. The road will be 1.6 miles long. The Right of Way for the road has been acquired, and utility work is

complete, officials said. The city will work on a bridge across Lockhart Smith Canal at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

Work on two lanes between Lockhart Smith Canal and Beaver Road will cost an estimated \$1.75 million. The utilities are being designed and constructed under a state loan program.

The project will also include work on two lanes between Beaver Road and Airport Boulevard, at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The Right of Way has been conditionally donated, and no utilities are planned.

Commissioner Velma Williams said St. Johns Parkway should be renamed Martin Luther King-St. Johns Parkway.

Pan Am begins move into new facility

SANFORD - Pan American Airlines started establishing its new maintenance facility at the Orlando Sanford Airport Monday.

Workers began setting up the line maintenance facility Pan American Airlines is leasing at the Orlando Sanford Airport. The airline is moving its Florida base from Fort Lauderdale to Sanford.

The airline will initially employ about 15 workers out of the maintenance facility, plus possible flight crew as service

expands. Pan American Airlines will begin domestic flights out of the airport within about 45-60 days, according to Ray Wise, director of marketing and properties.

The maintenance facility is large enough for flight crews, a lounge, and three 727-300 aircraft, Wise said. Workers for Pan American Airlines so far have been hooking up telephone lines, public utilities, water service, and sewer service.

"They're real anxious to get started," Wise said. "Everything has been going smoothly."

The airline will provide the Orlando Sanford Airport with

its first regularly scheduled domestic service.

Pan American Airlines plans to offer flights to Newark, N.J., continuing to Portsmouth, N.H., three times per week later this spring. If the flights are a success, officials say the service will expand to daily flights.

"People are already calling us to see if they can book a flight to Newark," Wise said.

Pan American Airlines could in time offer service between Sanford and Chicago and Atlanta, Wise said.

The Orlando Sanford Airport handles about 1.3 million passengers per year. The majority of the passengers are British,

arriving on charter flights from England.

In February, Britannia Airlines moved from the Orlando Sanford Airport to the Orlando International Airport. Last year, the international carrier accounted for about 20 percent of the airport's customers.

Domestic service from Pan American Airlines, plus larger flights from international carriers, could allow the airport to at least come close to matching last year's passenger numbers again this year, Wise said.

"That's a lot of international passengers to make up," Wise said. "Pan American Airlines

will certainly contribute to our continued growth."

Pan American Airlines is owned by Outfront Transportation Industries, a New England railroad operator and owner of paper mills and other industries. This is the third incarnation of Pan Am. Guilford paid \$24.5 million to creditors of the second Pan Am. The original Pan Am filed for bankruptcy in 1991 and liquidated.

The carrier currently owns eight 727-300 aircraft. Pan Am is looking into purchasing additional aircraft, including several DC-10's. Pan Am currently operates weekly charter services, officials said.

Red light sting nabs 250 drivers

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Less than two weeks after an aggressive driver ran a red light in Lake Mary and ran into the car of an expectant mother causing the death of her twins, county law enforcement teams ticketed as many as 250 aggressive drivers on Wednesday. Most were ticketed for running red lights.

One of those stopped was a habitual repeat offender who was taken to the county jail.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said the county's law agencies intend to "create an

expectation that if you run a red light, you are likely to get stopped. Wednesday's ticketing illustrates how prevalent this problem has become."

Sheriff's deputies teamed with city cops throughout the county, teams of four working at locations with high vehicle crash statistics. One was near where 48-year-old Kenneth Hinson ran a light and hit a car driven by expectant mother Violetta Bernauer of Lake Mary.

At times, deputies observed three or more cars running the same light. "It was a busy day - busier than we expected," Harriett said.

Rezoning of school district will be topic at community meeting

SEMINOLE COUNTY - With Seminole County's growth spurt far from over, school officials are now considering a variety of options to meet the needs of students in rapidly developing areas like Oviedo and Winter Springs.

A meeting today at 7:30 p.m. at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary Blvd., Sanford, the second such meeting this month, will address rezoning issues for Elementary School "Q" and its impact on surrounding communities.

This school, to be built on the north side of Chapman Road and just east of Alafaya Trail, is slated to open for the 2000/2001 school year. At Tuesday's meeting, school board officials voted to approve the purchase contract for \$1,125,000. The site contains just over 15 acres of usable land on the almost 25 acres being bought.

The board concurrently approved the purchase of an additional 25 acres for Middle School "CC" for \$1,101,780. Located on the north side of State Road 419 within the River Oaks Planned Unit Development, the site will serve the eventual relocation of Lawton Chiles Middle School.

The entire 25,040 acres are considered usable by the district's facility planners. The

middle school land purchase is considered contingent upon verification of available adequate sewage capacity from Alafaya Utilities.

Also approved Tuesday was a staff recommendation to proceed with due diligence on a site adjacent to the Seminole High School / Millennium Middle School sites. Due diligence in this case would include an appraisal and environmental assessment. Called "Master's Cove," the two parcels border on the north and south the recently acquired property / roadway of a portion of Live Oak Boulevard.

A party under contract to purchase the two parcels wanted \$135 thousand an acre, or \$1,957,500 for the 14.5 acres. Staff rejected the offer due to cost and began to evaluate options including condemnation of the land.

The purchase became a reality again when property owner BML Investments offered the property to the district for the reduced price of \$44,500 an acre or \$645,250, along with a request that the purchase take place "under threat of condemnation," the owners want the school board to pay closing costs. The seller, in turn, would consider any difference in price between the purchase price and fair market value to be accepted by the district as donation.

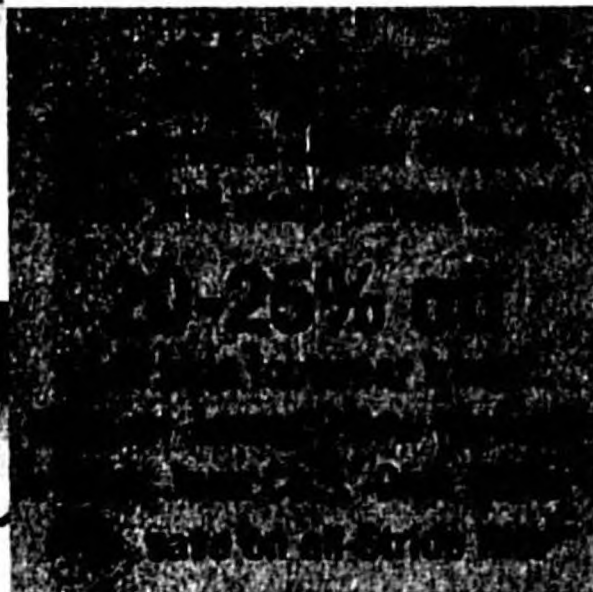

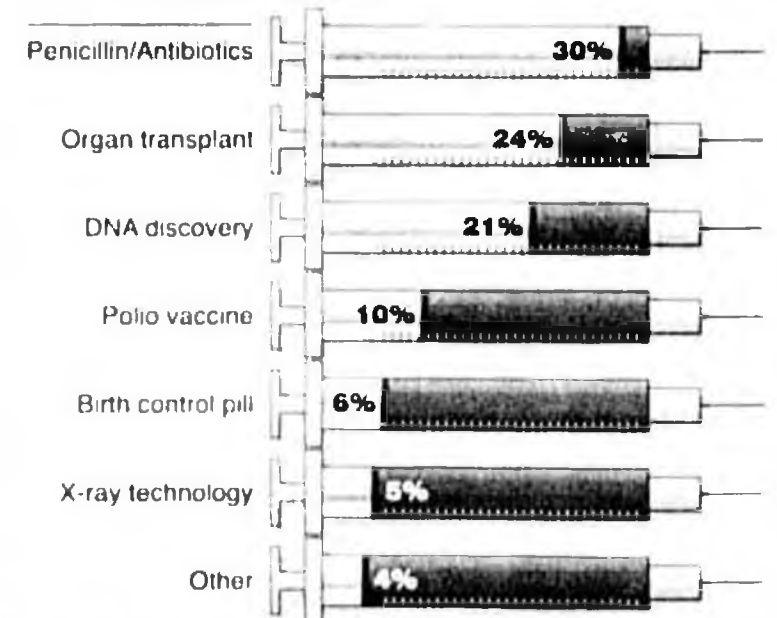

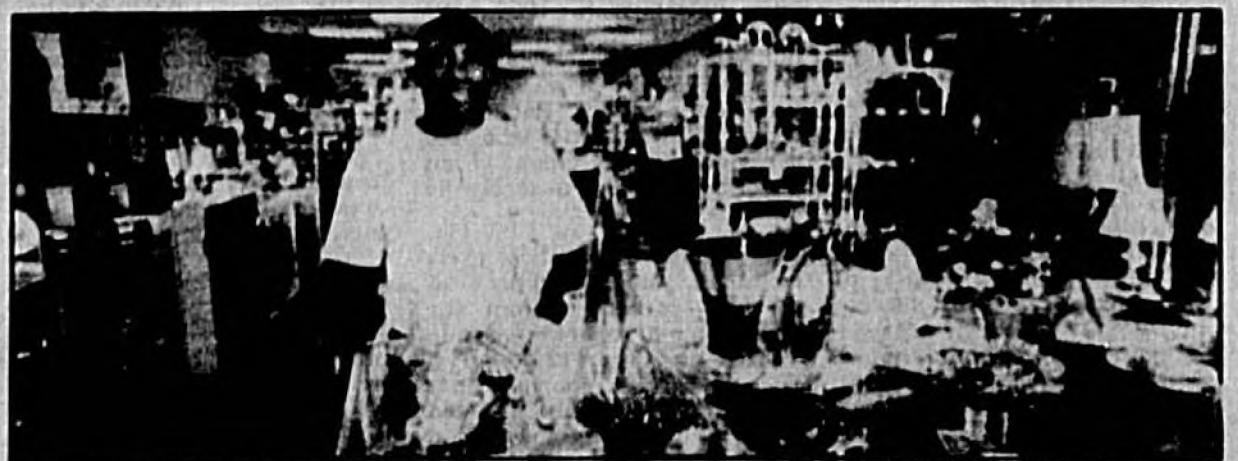

Lacrosse is expanding, and play is improving

SANFORD - Quick, name the Seminole County high school sport that enjoyed the most participants of all last year and this year.

Besides football. Soccer? Nope. Cross country? Wrong.

It's a sport most people don't even understand, let alone have the equipment to play, but Seminole County has taken to lacrosse which, between boys and girls teams, had more players than any other sport, including soccer.

Now, the schools, all seven in Seminole County are fielding varsity boys and girls teams, are starting to draw fans as well. Especially the county's bigger programs like Lake Brantley, Oviedo, Lake Mary and Lyman.

Not a bad change from even the start of last season when throwing and catching were still skills to be learned.

The game is moving closer and closer to becoming sanctioned by the FHSAA as teams and counties all over the state are adding the sport at a club level. Several Volusia County schools are expected to sign on next year and Orange County is almost 100 percent full.

But Seminole County might be the strongest in the state. True, Winter Park of Orange County is a machine and the defending state champs, but Oviedo and Lake Brantley are certainly capable of handling them on a given night.

Lake Mary and Lyman could also challenge Winter Park. The main difference is that now, each of the county teams are getting more quality players who actually know the game. It's a change from the past when the few players who grew up with the game could dominate each night.

That's not to say that there aren't some standouts in the county. Lake Brantley's Danny Hogan may be the best player in the short history of Seminole County lacrosse.

Lake Mary's attack tandem of Brian Montgomery and Adam Kurir are lighting up the scoreboard. Kurir had eight goals in a romp over West Orange Tuesday night.

Oviedo star Dave Walsh can also score with anyone. They are just a few of the players emerging as potential Division I candidates, something that hasn't happened yet in Seminole County. In fact, none of the top players in the area can even get noticed by the national lacrosse powers from the north.

Last year, Oviedo's Taylor Pope signed with Division II power Ohio Wesleyan, which is as strong as most Division I teams. He no longer plays on the team but might be the biggest signing so far from the county.

The problem is that northerners can barely recognize the Florida game. It's getting better, but there's still a lack of finesse as most teams suit up football players to play defense and, for lack of experience, the play is still a bit sloppy. You still aren't getting a lot of perfect, 50-yard outlet passes, but the game is improving rapidly. It's just a matter of time.

The best part about the game now is the fraternity of lacrosse fans and parents. Unlike in most other sports, the teams support themselves and look at their game as part of a lacrosse community.

The players know everyone on the other teams, even though it still gets a bit too rough at times. It's refreshing to hear

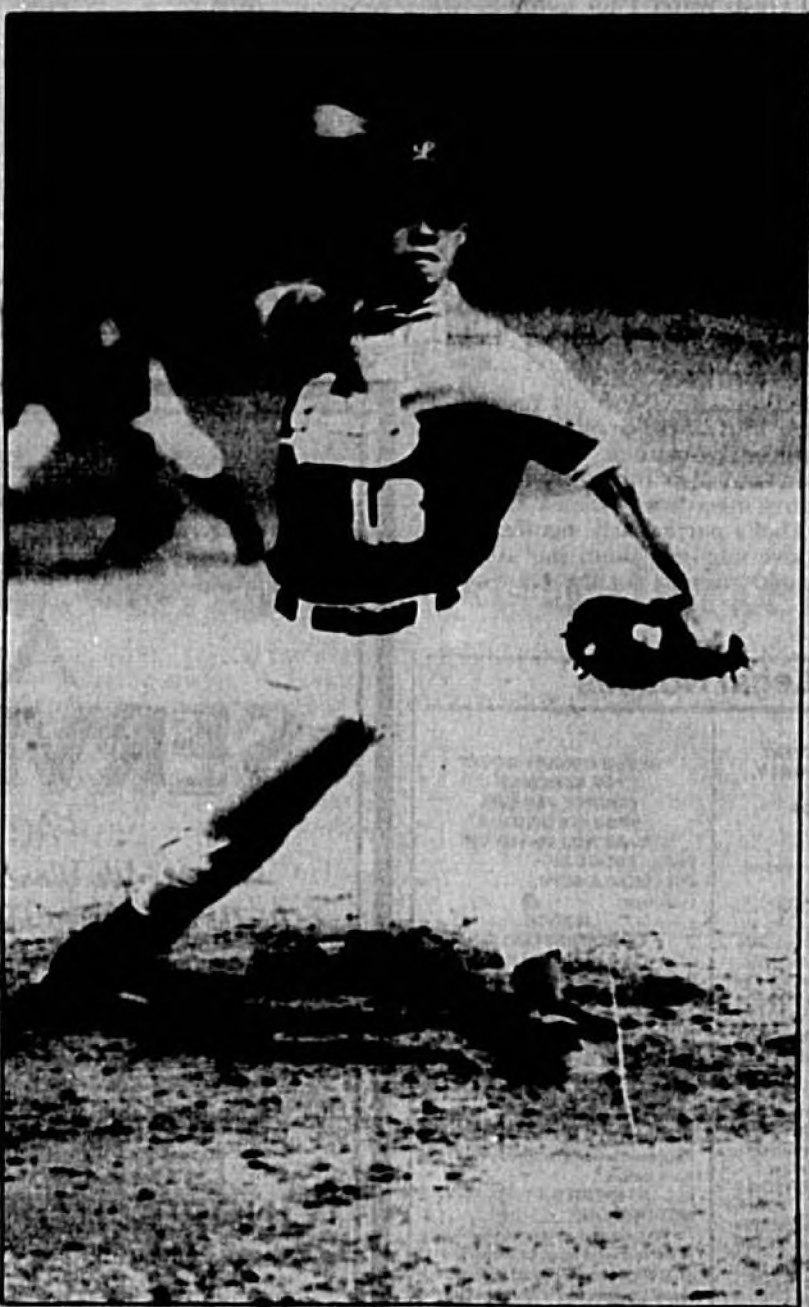

Proposal earmarks millions for helping Florida wildlife

SANFORD - Recently proposed federal legislation could provide a tremendous increase in funding for Florida's wildlife-related conservation, education and recreation, as well as money for parks and other state land acquisition.

Rep. Don Young, who presented the bill, said the legislation has the support of a broad-based, bipartisan group of legislators. He said he and other congressmen would welcome continued public input.

"To create the best possible legislation," Young said, "this bill has to include input from throughout the political spectrum."

The proposed legislation—HR 701, also known as the Conservation and Reinvestment Act of 1999 or CARA, would earmark revenues from Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) oil and gas leases

for conservation, wildlife-dependent recreation and education programs.

Dr. Allan L. Egbert, executive director of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission said, "For more than three years, we have been seeking congressional support for this type of legislation through the national coalition, 'Teaming with Wildlife,' which has 3,000 members, including more than 70 businesses and organizations in Florida."

Five years ago, the Teaming with Wildlife coalition set out to find a way to pay for nongame wildlife management. States have had fish and game management programs for many years, but they were funded largely by license fees from licensed anglers. There have been few programs designed to benefit nongame fish and

Egbert said Title III or HR 701 could provide a significant infusion of dollars, permanently allocated for these types of programs.

This version of CARA also includes important language preventing incentives for new oil leasing and drilling. That's particularly significant in Florida, where Governor Jeb Bush has already expressed continued support for the oil leasing moratorium.

Function, power of grand jury reviewed

Florida law provides a number of ways in which a criminal charge against a person may be brought. The most common of these is by information. This is because, in state court, prosecutions for any non-capital offense may be brought by an information. An information, being a sworn statement by a prosecutor that a particular crime has been committed, can be brought relatively effortlessly. However, the Florida Constitution and the criminal rules of procedure require that a charge punishable by death must be brought by a grand jury indictment.

Similarly, charges brought in federal court which are punishable by death must be brought by a grand jury indictment. However, unlike in state court, an offense brought in federal court which may be punished by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year must be prosecuted by indictment unless the accused, after having been advised of the nature of the charge and of his or her rights, waives in open court prosecution by indictment.

The reason, at least theoretically, for requiring that certain crimes be charged by indictment is that the grand jury is intended to serve as a buffer by standing between the prosecutor and the ordinary citizen and as primary security against hasty, malicious, and oppressive prosecution. The indictment requirement places in the hands of our peers, the grand jurors, the responsibility of determining, after hearing and/or examining evidence, whether there exists probably cause to believe an offense has been committed.

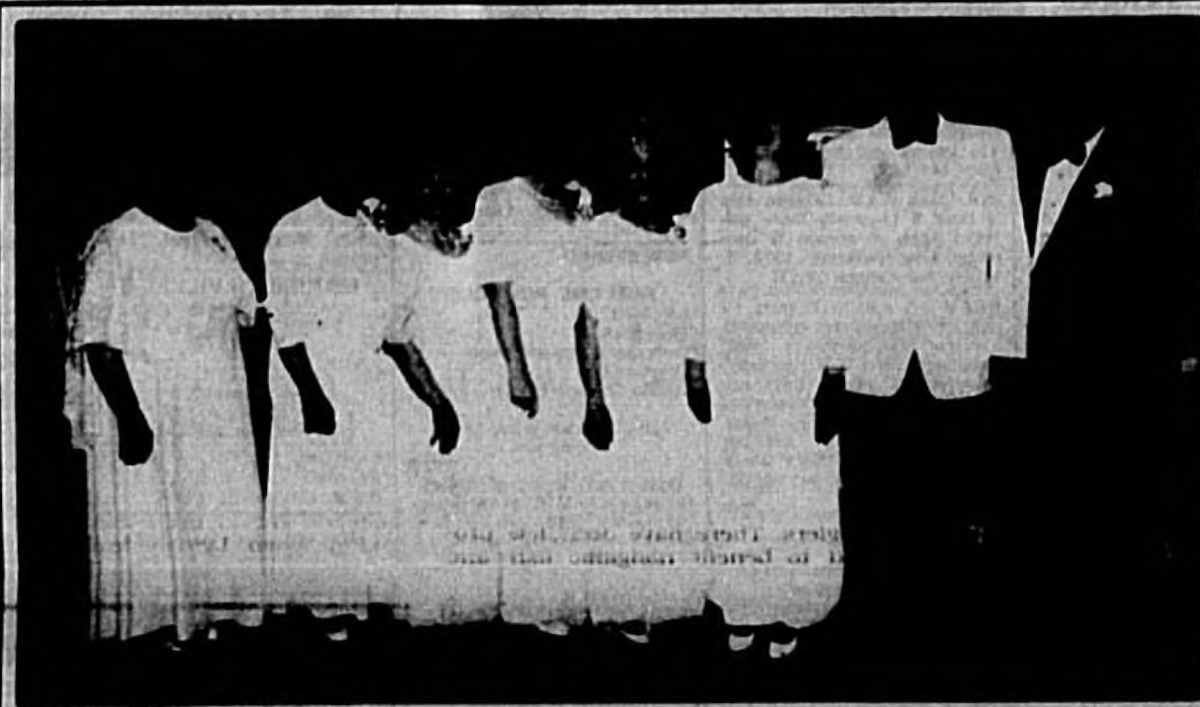
In determining whether there exists probably cause to believe an offense has been committed, a grand jury can exercise powers that are generally unrestrained by the technical procedural and evidentiary rules governing the conduct of criminal trials. A grand jury, through the court, has the power to summon witnesses and to compel testimony. Additionally, a grand jury, through the court, has the power to issue subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production for inspection of other evidence such as business records, handwriting exemplars, voice exemplars, and samples of a witness' hair.

Compelling testimony and production of evidence is an incredibly broad grant of investigatory power. One that often times finds itself at odd ends with the protections afforded to all citizens by the Constitution of the United States such as the right to remain silent or to not incriminate oneself. Therefore, a witness who is served with a subpoena to appear before a grand jury should be aware of what he or she

must do or not do in order to protect his or her rights and avoid being held in contempt of court. In this situation, as in any criminal matter, assistance of counsel should be sought.

Whether a crime must be charged by indictment depends on the punishment provided by law for the type of crime a defendant is accused of and the forum in which he or she is being prosecuted. However, the grand jury's function in both state and federal court is the same; to determine, through the use of its investigatory powers, whether there exists probably cause to believe an offense has been committed. In the coming weeks we will discuss the assistance of counsel at grand jury proceedings and other aspects of testifying in front of a grand jury as well as other aspects of criminal law.

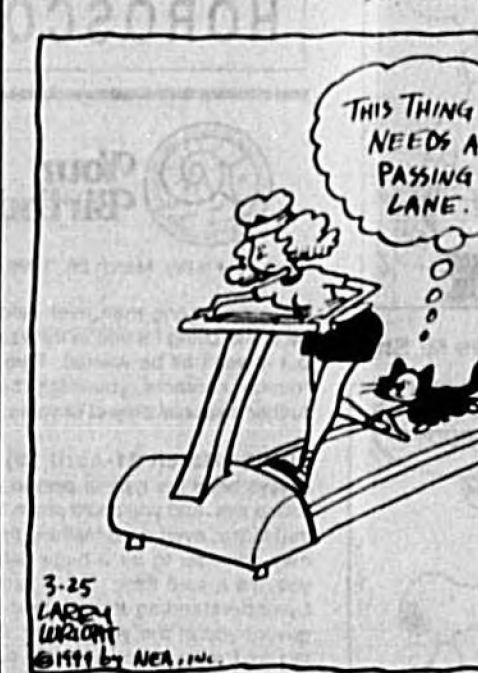

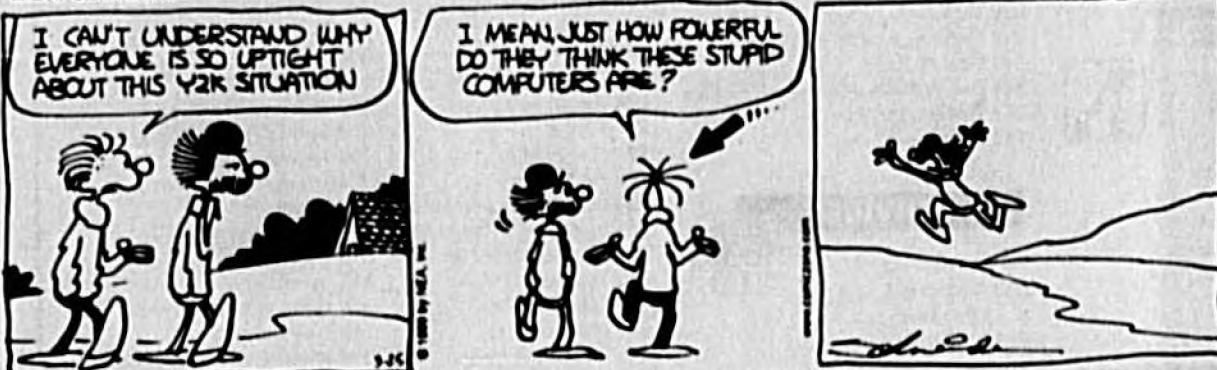

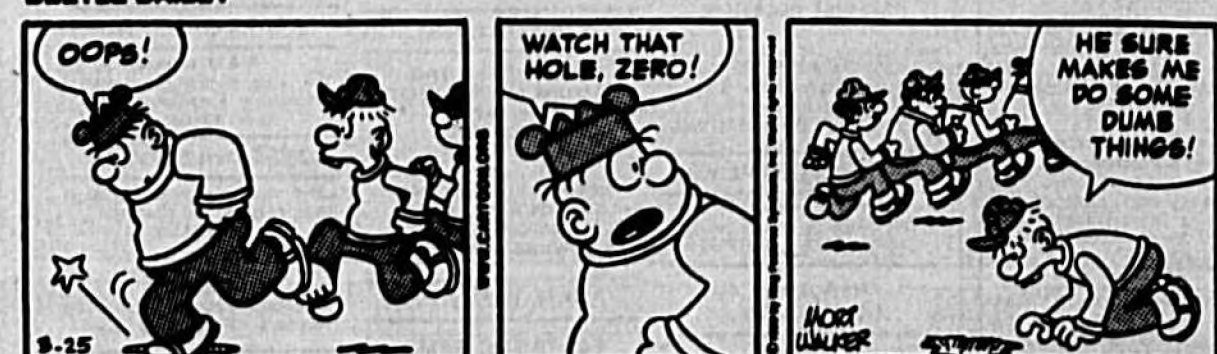

WIN AT BRIDGE

A toe in the water, bitten off

One of my favorite cartoons is Sherman's Lagoon. It ranks up there with Peanuts and Marmaduke. Sherman is a shark who, as you will have deduced, lives in a lagoon. He and his wife, Megan, have voracious appetites for all creatures, especially humans.

This deal made me think of them. East took the opportunity to enter the bidding, which is so often right when holding spades, but he ended up being fed to the sharks by South. How did the play go in six clubs?

East's two no-trump showed at least 5-5 in the unbid suits. It might have worked well, but South refused to be silenced with his good suit. Then, North bid what he expected his partner to make.

At first glance, after the spade lead, it seems as though South must lose two major-suit tricks. However, the bidding helped to push declarer in the right direction. Yet perhaps he would have found the winning line anyway, if East had settled for a one-spade overcall. (If East had passed, probably South would have hoped the heart fineness was working.)

After winning with dummy's spade ace, declarer cashed the club ace, then played three rounds of diamonds, ruffing the last in the dummy. Next, he exited with dummy's remaining spade.

East experienced a sensation not unlike rows of sharp teeth puncturing his leg. Having no trump with which to exit, he could either lead a heart away from the king or — as he did — return a spade, on which declarer discarded a heart while ruffing in the dummy. Then South cashed the heart ace, returned to hand with a heart ruff, and drew the missing trumps.

ASK DR. GOTT

Herbs are no way to treat hepatitis

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm seeking information on herbal relief for hepatitis C. Are you familiar with the effects of the herb milk thistle seed to help the struggling liver with its daily function?

DEAR READER: Hepatitis C is a form of liver infection caused by a specific virus. The disease causes fatigue, fever, weakness, and — in its later stages — jaundice and liver failure. To my knowledge, there are no known herbal remedies to correct this condition. A more suitable approach is to follow your physician's advice with respect to diet (no alcohol) and medications (Interferon and other drugs). If you rely on unproven remedies such as thistle to treat your chronic hepatitis, you will get into trouble sooner or later.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Following a car accident, I was diagnosed with fibrositis. What can I do for this?

DEAR READER: Fibrositis (fibromyalgia) is a chronic tissue inflammation that is often baffling. Patients have normal exams and blood tests, but complain of unremitting stiffness and pain in their muscles. Trigger points are common. The

affliction is more often seen in women than in men, and it is frequently associated with insomnia. The cause is unknown, although trauma and stress seem to play a role.

Some medicines, such as cortisone, may relieve symptoms. Physical therapy, biofeedback, massage and hypnosis are useful. I suggest that you see a physiatrist (a specialist in rehabilitation medicine); most large hospitals have physiatrists on staff.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can high doses of aspirin affect the pancreas? I was hospitalized because of pancreatic inflammation that the doctors believed might have been caused by the eight aspirin tablets I took every day for neck pain.

DEAR READER: Aspirin does not ordinarily affect the pancreas, an organ of digestion and insulin production. However, aspirin is far from harmless; it can retard clotting, cause peptic ulcers (because it affects the stomach's mucus barrier), trigger asthma, and result in allergic reactions and ringing in the ears.

Your post-aspirin pancreatitis could reflect an allergy to the drug; on the other hand, you may have developed a hidden duodenal ulcer that inflamed the pancreas, which lies adjacent to the lower stomach and duodenum. Make sure that your doctor checked you for peptic disease as part of the testing program.
