Penny tax will benefit Sanford roads projects

SANFORD - Sanford will receive more than \$5 million in road improvements thanks to sales tax money from Seminole County.

The Sanford City Commis-sion agreed Monday to use part of the city's \$5.8 million in available "one cent sales tax money" for work on an east-west connection between the **St. Johns Parkway and Airport** Houlevard along the Coastline Road and Jewett Lane alignments.

A four lane road between St. Johns Parkway and Upsala Road will be built at a cost of \$1.3 million. The road will be 1.6 miles long. The Right of Way for the road has been acquired, and utility work in

complete, officials said.

The city will work on a bridge across Lockhart Smith Canal at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

Work on two lanes between Lockhart Smith Canal and Bevier Road will cost an estimated \$1.75 million. The utilities are being designed and constructed under a state loan program.

The project will also include work on two lanes between Bevier Road and Airport Boulevard, at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The Right of Way has been conditionally donated, and no utilities are planned.

Commissioner Velma Williams said St. Johns Parkway should be renamed Martin Lather King-St. Johns Parkway.

> SANFORD - Pan American Airlines started establishing its new maintenance facility at the Orlando Sanford Airport Monday.

Workers began acting up the line maintenance facility Pan American Airlines is leasing at the Orlando Sanford Airport. The airline is moving its Florida base from Fort Lauderdale to Sanford.

The atritne will initially employ about 15 workers out of the maintenance facility, plus possible flight crew as service

expands. Pan American Airexpands. Pan American Air-lines will begin domestic flights out of the sirpert within about 45-60 days, according to Ray Wise, director of mar-licting and properties. The maintenance facility is large enough for flight crews, a

lounge, and three 727-200 aircraft, Wise said. Workers for Pan American Airlines so far have been hooking up tele-phone lines, public utilities, water service, and sewer service.

"They're real anxious to get started." Wise said. Everything has been going amoothly."

The airfine will provide the Orlando Sanford Airport with

its first regularly scheduled domentic service.

Domestic service from Pan American Airlines, plus larger flights from international carriers, could allow the sirport to at least come close to matching last year's passenger numbers again this year, Wise said.

"That's a lot of international passengers to make up," Wise said. "Pan American Airlines

will certainly contribute to our continued growth."

Pan American Airlines is owned by Outflord Transport a-tion Industries, a New England railroad operator and owner of paper mills and other industrice. This is the third mearnation of Pan Am. Guildford paid \$24.5 million to creditors of the second Pan Am. The original Pan Am filed for bankruptcy in 1991 and liquidated.

The carrier currently owns eight 727-200 aircraft. Pan Am is looking into purchasing additional aircraft, including several DC-10's. Pan Am currently operates weekly charter services, officials said. Pieses are Terminal, Page 3A

Rezoning of school district will be topic at community meeting

SEMINOLE COUNTY - With Seminole County's growth spurt far from over, school officials are now considering a variety of options to most the needs of students in rapidly developing areas like Oviedo and Winter Springs.

A meeting today at 7:30 p.m. at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary Hivd., Sanford, the second such meeting this month, will address rezoning issues for Elementary School "Q" and its impact on surrounding communities.

This school, to be built on the north side of Chapman Road and just cast of Alafaya Trail, is slated to open for the 2000/20001 school year. At Tuesday's meeting, school board officials voted to approve the purchase contract for \$1,125,000. The site contains just over 15 acres of us-able land on the almost 25

acres being bought. The board concurrently ap-The board concurrently ap-proved the purchase of an ad-ditional 25 acres for Middle School "CC" for \$1,101,760. Located on the north side of State Road 419 within the River Oaks Planned Unit De-velopment, the site will serve the eventual relocation of Law-tern Chiles Middle School ton Chiles Middle School.

The entire 25.040 acres are considered usable by the dis-trict's facility planners. The

middle school land purchase is considered contingent upon verification of available ade-

quate sewage capacity from Alafaya Utilities. Also approved Tuesday was a

Also approved Tuesday was a staff recommendation to pro-ceed with due diligence on a site adjacent to the Seminole High School / Millennium Middle School sites. Due dili-gence in this case would in-clude an appraisal and envi-ronmental assessment. Called "Master's Cove," the two par-cels border on the north and south the recently acquired property / roadway of a por-tion of Live Oak Boulevard.

A party under contract to purchase the two parcels wanted \$135 thousand an acre, or \$1,957,500 for the 14.5 acres. Staff rejected the offer due to cost and began to evaluate options including condemnation of the land.

The purchase became a re-ality again when property owner BML investments ofowner BML investments of-fered the property to the dis-trict for the reduced price of \$44,500 an acre or \$645,250, along with a request that the purchase take place "under threat of condemnation." the owners want the school board to pay closing costs. The seller, in turn, would consider any difference in price be-tween the purchase price and fair market value to be ac-cepted by the district as dona-tion.

Red light sting nabs 250 drivers

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Less than two weeks after an aggressive driver ran a red light in Lake Mary and ran into the car of an expectant mother causing the death of her twins, county law enforcement teams ticketed as many as 250 aggressive drivers on Wednesday. Most were ticketed for running red lights.

One of those stopped was a habitual repeat offender who was taken to the county jail. Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said the

county's law agencies intend to "create an


expectation that if you run a red light, you are likely to get stopped. Wednesday's tickcting illustrates how prevalent this problem has become."

Sheriff's deputies teamed with city cops throughout the county, teams of four working at locations with high vehicle crash statistics. One was near where 48-year-old Kenneth Hinson ran a light and hit a car driven by ex-pectant mother Violetta Bernauer of Lake Mary.

At times, deputies observed three or more cars running the same light. "It was a busy day - busier than we expected," Harriett day said.

Function, power of grand jury reviewed

Florida law provides a number of ways in which a criminal charge against a person may be brought. The most common of these is by information. This is because, in state court, prosecutions for any non-capital offense may be brought by an information. An information, being a sworn statement by a prosecutor that a particular crime has been committed, can be brought relatively effortlessly. However, the Florida Constitution and the criminal rules of procedure require that a charge punishable by death must be brought by a

by death must be brought by a grand jury indictment. Similarly, charges brought in federal court which are pun-ishable by death must be brought by a grand jury in-dictment. However, unlike in state court, an offense brought in federal court which may be punished by imprisonment for punished by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year must be prosecuted by indictment also unless the accused, after having been advised of the nature of the charge and of his or her rights, walves in open court prosecution by indictment.



The reason, at least theoretically, for requiring that certain crimes be charged by indictment is that the grand jury is intended to serve as a buffer by standing between the prosecutor and the ordinary citizen and as primary security against hasty, malicious, and oppressive prosecution. The indictment requirement places in the hands of our peers, the grand jurors, the responsibility of determining, after hearing and/or examining evidence, whether there exists probably cause to believe an offense has

been committed.

In determining whether there exists probably cause to be-lieve an offense has been committed, a grand jury can exercise powers that are generally unrestrained by the technical procedural and evi-dentiary rules governing the conduct of criminal trials. A grand jury, through the court, has the power to summon witnesses and to compel testi-mony. Additionally, a grand jury, through the court, has the power to issue subpoenas duces tecum requiring the pro-duction for inspection of other evidence such as business records, handwriting exemplars, voice exemplars, and samples of a witness' hair.

Compelling testimony and production of evidence is an incredibly broad grant of investigatory power. One that often times finds itself at odd ends with the protections afforded to all citizens by the Constitution of the United States such as the right to remain silent or to not incriminate oneself. Therefore, a witness who is served with a subpoena to appear before a grand jury should be aware of what he or she


must do or not do in order to protect his or her rights and avoid being held in contempt of court. In this situation, as in any criminal matter, assistance of counsel should be

sought. Whether a crime must be charged by indictment depends on the punishment provided by law for the type of crime a defendant is accused of and the forum in which he or she is being prosecuted. However, the grand jury's function in both state and federal court is the same; to determine, through the use of its investigatory powers, whether there exists probably cause to believe an offense has been committed. In the coming weeks we will discuss the assistance of counsel at grand jury proceedings and other aspects of testifying in front of a grand jury as well as other aspects of criminal law.



Herbs are no way to treat hepatitis

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm seeking information on herbal relief for hepatitis C. Are you familiar with the effects of the herb milk thistle weed to help the struggling liver with its daily function?

DEAR READER: Hepatitis C is a DEAR READER: Hepatitis C is a form of liver infection caused by a specific virus. The disease causes fatigue, fever, weakness, and — in its later stages — jaundice and liver fail-ure. To my knowledge, there are no known berbal remedies to correct this condition. A more suitable approach is to follow your physician's advice with respect to diet (no alcohol) and med-ications (Interferon and other drugs). If you rely on unproven remedies such as thistle to treat your chronic hepati-tis, you will get into trouble sooner or later.

later. DEAR DR. GOTT: Following a car accident, I was diagnosed with fibrosi-tis. What can I do for this? DEAR READER: Fibrositis (fibromyalgia) is a chronic tissue inflammation that is often baffling.

Having no trump with which to exit, he could either lead a heart away from the king or — as he did — return a spade, on which declarer discarded a heart while ruffing in the dummy. Then South cashed the heart ace, re-turned to hand with a heart ruff, and drew the missing trumps.


DEAR READER: Aspirin does no ordinarily affect the pancreas, at organ of digestion and insulin produc-tion. However, aspirin is far from harmless; it can retard clotting, caus peptic ulcers (because it affects th stomach's mucus barrier), trigge asthma, and result in allergic reac tions and ringing in the ears. Your post-aspirin pancreatitis could

reflect an allergy to the drug; on the other hand, you may have developed a hidden duodenal ulcer that inflamed the pancreas, which lies adjacent to the lower stomach and duodenum. Make sure that your doctor checked you for peptic disease as part of the testing program.
