

Unsolved Riddle Of Smith Reynolds Case Is Matched

Twice Within Three Years Veiled Death Has Chosen North Carolina For Demonstration

PINEHURST, N. C., Mar. 19.—(AP)—Twice within three years veiled death has chosen North Carolina to demonstrate its disregard for the protective barriers wealth draws around its children. First, it was Smith Reynolds, youthful heir to a quarter of the \$100,000,000 tobacco fortune left by his father in Winston-Salem. And now it is Elva Statler Davidson, heiress to part of the hotel fortune the late E. M. Statler left. The investigation of her death is being pursued.

Apart from the fact that the vehicles were different, death took them under circumstances strikingly similar, circumstances usually mysterious.

Most peculiar of the eerie similarities, perhaps, were their forebodings just before the fatal hour—forebodings that gay parties could not shunt aside.

Turn back to a July night in 1932. Zachary Smith Reynolds, World traveler and man of daring adventures despite his youth, was presiding as lord of his ancestral mansion, "Reynolds," on the outskirts of Winston-Salem.

To that mansion he had brought a new mistress—his bride, Libby Holman, former Broadway torch singer.

And with them for night of merrymaking was a group of friends—some of Smith's hometown chums since childhood, including his confidant, Albert "Al" Walker; some of Libby's friends down from Broadway.

There was drinking. There was music. There was laughter—laughter of the roof-raising sort for all save Smith Reynolds. There was some laughter on his part, but tempered by his apparent foreboding that all was not well.

Finally they retired. In the dark hours between midnight and dawn they found Reynolds sprawled across a blood-soaked bed. In his head was a bullet hole.

Who killed Smith Reynolds? It did kill himself.

Signs Of New Life In GOP Seen In West

Some Believe Parley In Kansas May Seek To Wrest Control Of Party From East

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—(AP)—Signs of new life in the GOP were read by Senate and House members yesterday in the west of the Mid-West of plane for a meeting of upward of a thousand partisans from 11 states to lay the groundwork for the next presidential campaign.

Florida's Luxury

Florida's Luxury

In 1933 and 1934 when numerous candidates throughout the state were campaigning for seats in the House or Senate of the State Legislature, a program of economy was constituted one of the most important planks in practically every platform. One heard it on every side that the State must reduce expenditures and the taxpayers must be afforded relief. Recently, however, particularly as the legislative session draws near, one does not hear so much about economy.

What one is more likely to hear now is about additional appropriations for one thing and another. The State Budget Commission recently brought forth its budget proposal totaling some \$17,700,000, and representing an 8 percent increase over the previous budget. As an illustration of what this budget proposes, we mention an "item" of \$6,740 for the State's radio station WRFU, \$17,640 more than the previous appropriation.

"Are the taxpayers of Florida to be taxed up for \$47 an hour to hear the Senate?" asks the Tampa Tribune. "The taxpayers will try to get their money's worth listened to by the broadcast? What possible benefit to the State from this extravagant expression of senatorial vanity?"

"Taxpayers are now paying \$25,000 a year to maintain WRFU. That's bad enough. Who listens to it? And why should anybody listen to it? A pertinent and justified inquiry in favor of the tax is that \$25,000 a month has been spent keeping up an useless luxury of a State radio station. And now it is proposed to increase that appropriation by one-third to put on a program of legislative procedure for which not one in 100,000 of Florida's population will take the trouble to tune in. And why, in this bright scheme, leave out the House? Aren't its proceedings as much entitled to promulgation by air as the Senate? If the State is going into the radio age, let the Governor and his State department. And why not have programs provided by available talent at Raiford and Chaitachoochee?"

"When the President of the Senate and a committee of that body can agree on and seriously propose such costly absurdities as this Senate broadcast, taxpayers may well view with alarm the approach of the 1935 Legislature."

What the Legislature should do to this plan doesn't admit of argument. It should not only refuse to release the appropriation for WRFU but it should stop the present appropriation. Fifty thousand dollars for a State radio station is just \$50,000 too much."

Preparing For War

We see where Congress, with the support of the Administration, is getting ready to take the profits out of war.

The present plan is fairly shortsighted and should eliminate every possibility of anyone making anything out of the next war, that is, doing away with the most gruesome glories of the last war in which practically everyone stayed at home profiting materially.

The plan includes the following proposals:

1. An increase in the amount of income tax on personal profits of corporations and the like, of all individuals in excess of 60%.

To limit individual incomes to \$10,000 and take all over that in income taxes.

To impose income taxes on everyone, irrespective of individual amount to cover war expenses.

2. A new and collected war tax quarterly out of income tax on individuals.

To check unnecessary armaments by decreasing income tax on individuals.

Patents of all valuable inventions upon declaration of war.

Industrial management draft all general reserves of corporations to be registered on a draft management and industrial mobilization commission.

Trade and financial exchanges, fiscal ex-

change, importers, price at prices, parties and allocate to essential processes.

Locate all new private financing through a war finance agency.

A war finance corporation to assist in financing of essential war industries.

Commandering of essential industries and services.

Licensing Industries establishment of priorities in purchasing and when essential process-
