

Unsolved Riddle Of Smith Reynolds Case Is Matched

Twice Within Three Years Veiled Death Has Chosen North Carolina For Demonstration

PINEHURST, N. C., Mar. 19.—(AP)—Twice within three years veiled death has chosen North Carolina to demonstrate its disregard for the protective barriers wealth draws around its children.

First, it was Smith Reynolds, youthful heir to a quarter of the \$100,000,000 tobacco fortune left by his father in Winston-Salem.

And now it is Elva Stalter Davidson, heiress to part of the hotel fortune of the late E. M. Stalter left. The investigation of her death is being pursued.

Aside from the fact that the vehicles were different, death overtook them under circumstances strikingly similar, circumstances equally mysterious.

Most peculiar of the eerie similarities, perhaps, were their forebodings just before the fatal hour—forebodings that gay parties could not shut aside.

Turn back to a July night in 1932. Zachary Smith Reynolds, World traveler and man of manifold adventures despite his youth, was presiding as lord of his ancestral mansion, "Reynolds," on the outskirts of Winston-Salem.

To that mansion he had brought a new mistress—his bride, Libby Holman, former Broadway torch singer.

And with them for a night of merry-making was a group of friends—some of Smith's hometown chums since childhood, including his confident, Albert "Ab" Walker; some of Libby's friends down from Broadway.

There was drinking. There was music. There was laughter—laughter of the roof-raising sort for all gave Smith Reynolds. There was some laughter on his part, but tempered by his apparent foreboding that all was not well.

Finally they retired.

In the dark hours between midnight and dawn they found Reynolds sprawled across a blood-soaked bed. In his head was a bullet hole.

Who killed Smith Reynolds? Or did he kill himself?

Coroner W. N. Dalton first decided it was a case of suicide. But that verdict didn't hold for long.

Believing otherwise, Sheriff Trancu Scott reopened the investigation. A second coroner's jury attributed death to "the hands of parties unknown," and Libby Holman and A. I. Walker were indicted.

But there the case was left suspended, its mysteries unsolved. At the request of the Reynolds family, Solicitor Carlisle Higgins "not pressed" the indictments for lack of evidence.

Libby Holman became the mother of a posthumous son and finally went back to Broadway in marked contrast to his luxurious life as the traveling companion of Smith Reynolds. Ab Walker took up the business of operating a gasoline filling station in Winston-Salem.

Turn the calendar forward. Two years and seven months have passed.

It is a balmy March day at Pinehurst where the wealthy white away the cold months.

Elva Stalter Davidson, 22-year-old child of unknown parents whom Stalter, the hotel magnate, adopted in infancy, is at her winter home.

Like Smith Reynolds, she never had been denied a luxury which money could buy but burdened with a care which money could relieve.

With her is her husband of two months—H. Bradley Davidson, Jr., twice her age and father of three children by a previous marriage that ended in divorce. And with them are house guests. When nightfall comes, hosts and guests set out together for a round of the resort town's night life.

There was drinking. There was music. There was laughter—laughter and tears for Elva Stalter Davidson.

An accordionist played a haunting gypsy tune—Elva Stalter Davidson's favorite tune. Maybe it revived forgotten sorrows. Maybe it aroused yearnings unattained. At any rate, Elva Stalter Davidson wept and seemed possessed by foreboding.

Returning home, she and her husband argued as to which should put the car in the garage. They compromised by leaving it in front of the house and retired to separate bedrooms.

Next morning she was found dead in the car, which some one had removed to the garage.

What caused Elva Stalter Davidson's death?

The coroner's jury decided she had been overcome by carbon monoxide gas, and an autopsy performed by Dr. C. C. Carpenter of the Wake Forest College school of medicine supported that conclusion.

Sheriff Rowland S. Pruette launched an investigation, declaring her death was "murder or suicide" and certainly was "no accident."

Having accompanied the body of his bride to the North for burial, H. Bradley Davidson returned to Pinehurst and was subjected to rigid questioning by Pruette.

The coroner's jury verdict that she "died of carbon monoxide gas under circumstances unknown" left the case open for further investigation which Sheriff Charles MacDonald promised to pursue.

Night Battle Has Basis In Rumor That Negro Was Killed By White

NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—After a night of riot hoodlum marauding, hundreds of policemen fought a semblance of order today to Harlem, the negro district.

Two negro rioters were in critical condition. One negro, Charles Alston, died from the roof of a six tenement in the last forty minutes before dawn.

Seven and three other negroes sharpshooting at policemen on the roof. When Alston jumped, another negro in a critical condition gunshot wounds. Ten negroes were shot during outbreak. The hoodlums battled freely with negro marauders. More than 100 whites and negroes were injured.

Richberg Named Deceiver Who Sold Labor Down River

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine workers, charged yesterday that Donald R. Richberg "deceived the President" and "sold labor down the river."

Lewis renewed his attack on Richberg in concluding testimony before the Senate labor committee in support of the Wagner relations bill. He referred again to Richberg's interpretation of a White House order of Feb. 1, 1934, sustaining the majority rule for employe representation.

Lewis said Richberg, then NRA general counsel, wrote both the order and three days later the interpretation, and that the latter "emasculated and destroyed" the presidential edict.

"I think Mr. Richberg sold labor down the river by his action and I think he deceived the President," Lewis said.

"I have no desire to condemn Mr. Richberg. I am critical because in his attitude and in his interpretations of the plan intent of Congress the President has driven a knife to the very heart of labor."

"Do other labor leaders feel as strongly as you do about Mr. Richberg?" asked Chairman (David L.) Walsh.

"I can't speak for all of them, but I know the 600,000 members of the United Mine workers do and that the executive council of the American Federation of Labor feels the same way," Lewis replied.

The Wagner bill would set up a board with power to enforce its decisions.

Lewis advocated making the board a part of the Department of Labor instead of setting it up as an independent agency.

Miami Officials Sued For \$500,000 By Beach Tribune

MIAMI, Mar. 20.—(AP)—The Daily Tribune, tabloid newspaper, yesterday charged a conspiracy to direct its editorial policy, and claimed \$500,000 damages of copy writers and editors.

Those named by the Daily Tribune in its circuit court suit were:

Mayer E. G. Bessell, City Commissioner Oswald R. R. Robinson, County Solicitor Fred W. Pine, Safety Director S. D. McCreary, Gordon H. Russell, Charles F. Towle, W. C. Johnson and Abraham O'Sweeney.

The newspaper alleged the defendants conspired to compel the Daily Tribune to change its editorial policy by making accusations against M. L. Anderson, father of the Daily Tribune publisher, Walter Anderson.

The suit was drawn in five counties. The first charged conspiracy in Mayer Bessell's reputed public attacks upon the Daily Tribune in a city commission meeting last month.

Russell, publisher of the Miami Labor News, was charged to have conspired with the others to print editorial attacks.

The three grand jurors of Miami County returned a bill of indictment against the defendants yesterday.
