Mrs. Vernon Catron, C-TP president, gave a final report on proceeds from the Fashion Show stating that the net amount was \$331.75.

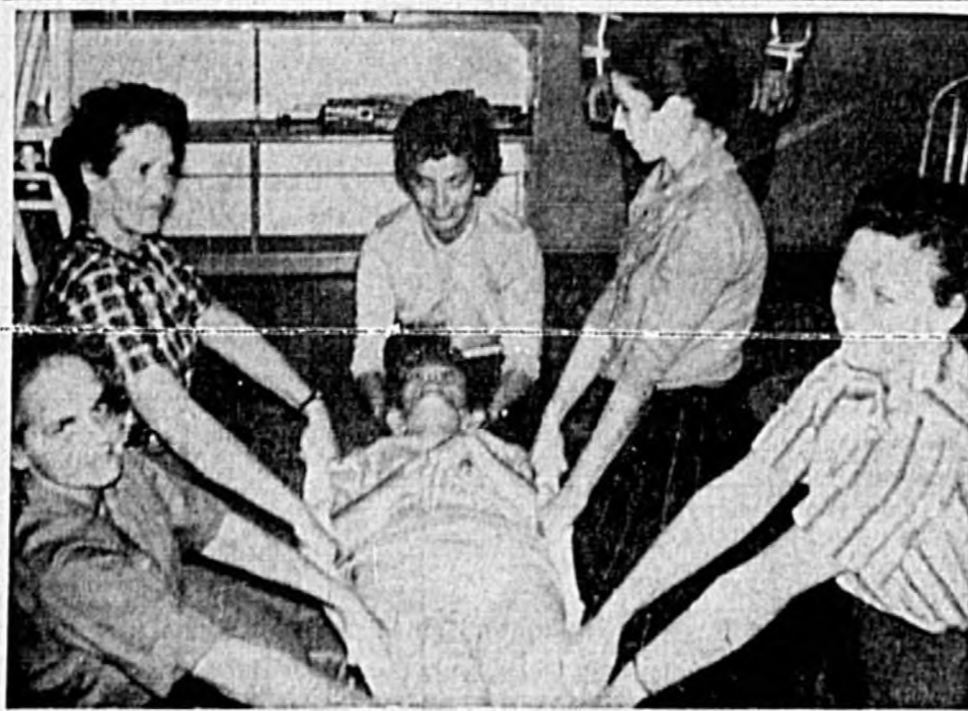

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Castro Attacks Muzzling

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro lashed out early today at government censors who try to "muzzle" Cuban heroes by deleting references to God from their historic utterances.

Castro was incensed by the reading at a mass meeting here of an abridged version of a slain leftist's "political testament." The words "we trust that the purity of our motives will find favor with God" had been cut from the passage.

"Have we fallen so low that we must omit these lines because they speak of religious convictions?" Castro demanded in a 68-minute speech. "This was the act of a lackwit who has confidence neither in his own ideas nor in Marxism, who considers history as something dead and rotten."

The premier also "suggested" that the name of the Rebel Youth Association should be changed to the Association of Young Communists.

At the same time, the Castro regime announced that it is coming new 20- and 40-cent pieces. Cubans will be given two weeks to exchange most of their existing coins, from 10-cent to peso pieces, for the new issue.

Existing 1- and 5-cent coins will continue in circulation. The college is the second sweeping economic reform in as many days, following Castro's rationing of food and other household necessities.

The rationing measure was openly criticized by some Cubans.

"The situation will be worse than before," some Cubans said. "We will go hungry." However, others argued that things will be better, "because everybody will receive the same rations and we can eliminate the black market."

Cuban underground sources in Miami speculated that the new coinage might be the first step in a sweeping, Soviet-sponsored reform of Cuba's currency designed to tie the country more closely to the Communist world.

They said Alexander Korovushkin, president of the Soviet State Bank who visited Havana early this month, urged a top-to-bottom change in Cuban currency which would eliminate the tradition that the peso is pegged to the U. S. dollar.

Spokesmen for the MRR underground said the Korovushkin plan would call for surprise introduction of the new currency and restrictions that would allow Cubans to exchange no more than 2,000 pesos—worth \$500 to \$600 on the black market—for new bills.

Goldwater Says Conservatism Is Wave Of Future

NEW YORK (UPI)—Nearly 1,000 demonstrators paraded Wednesday night around Madison Square Garden where a noisy crowd of 18,000 persons attending a Young Americans for Freedom rally heard Sen. Barry Goldwater say conservatism was the wave of the future.

The sign-carrying pickets later marched a few blocks away to St. Nicholas Arena and listened to Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey condemn extremism of both the left and right.

Police were prepared for skirmishes between the opposing groups, but the 200 officers, including several mounted patrols, were left standing idle.

The pickets booed loudly and waved signs reading "Freedom can't survive the arms race," "Stop the world, they want to get off," and other slogans. The bus riders shouted and waved fists at the demonstrators.

Goldwater, an Arizona Republican, was accorded a frenzied 10-minute ovation before he spoke under the glare of six spotlights. The capacity crowd sang "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" as hundreds of multi-colored balloons were released from the rafters.

President's Mom Is Recovering

BOSTON (UPI)—Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, who underwent surgery for a pelvic hernia, probably will join her ailing husband in Palm Beach, Fla., late next week.

The President's mother was expected to spend eight or nine more days at St. Elizabeth's Hospital recuperating from her hour-long operation Tuesday which was described as "very successful."

Dr. Roy J. Herrmann, gynecologist who has been a Kennedy family doctor for many years, said he expected Mrs. Kennedy to fly back to Palm Beach when she was able to leave the hospital.

The 71-year-old grandmother had suffered from the hernia condition since last fall, but delayed surgery because of the more serious illness of her husband. The former ambassador was partially paralyzed last December by a stroke and for a time could not speak. He has been reported improving in recent weeks.

Herrmann, who performed the surgery, appeared quite pleased with the results. He said Mrs. Kennedy was in no danger and that was no sign of malignancy.

The doctor telephoned the President in Washington immediately after the operation.

Mrs. Kennedy Presents Art Carnival

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy made friends today with a furry gray baby elephant in the back yard of Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's residence.

For five minutes President Kennedy's wife petted 11-month-old Urvasi — named for a Hindu fairy—placed a floral garland around the animal's trunk and fed it raw sugar cane, unpeeled bananas and milk from a quart bottle.

This was Mrs. Kennedy's third day in India and she devoted a good part of it again to children.

Shortly after she fed the elephant in Nehru's garden she made a presentation of a mobile "art carnival" to the children of India.

The mobile unit still is being assembled in New York but Mrs. Kennedy gave Mrs. Indira Gandhi, Nehru's daughter, an album describing it.

When ready it will travel about India providing a work

area big enough for 40 children and five instructors. It has a "motivation" section where children can work with paint brushes, paper and other materials on creative arts.

In giving Mrs. Gandhi the album, Mrs. Kennedy made what really was her first formal speech in India.

Standing before a carved wooden chair swing, she said: "Madame Gandhi and my friends, it gives me great pleasure to present to you today this art carnival to the children of India from the International Council of the Museum of Modern Art and the Asia Society.

"Its purpose is to stimulate the artistic imagination of children, the artists of tomorrow.

"I have noticed often, and especially this morning at Balahayog (boys home), that the art of children is really the same the world over and so, of course, is our feeling for children. It seems to me that

in a world where quite enough divides people it is good to cherish a feeling and an emotion that unites us all." Mrs. Gandhi thanked her on behalf of the children of India and said it would go a long way toward cementing friendship between our two countries.

Boost In Phone Service Noted

During 1961, 738 new telephones were added for subscribers in Seminole County, Direct Dialing became effective in May, permitting subscribers to dial their own long distance calls and the extended scope service, to include Orlando and Geneva on local calls was begun, going into service on Feb. 4th this year.

"The annual report of the Southern Bell Telephone Co. spotlights a growing, changing and improving Southern economy," local manager Bob Shelden said today.

The report reveals that while Southern Bell operates today in substantially the same geographic area as 25 years ago, it serves over seven and a half million telephones compared with one million at that time. In the past ten years, Southern Bell telephones in service have doubled.

Southern Bell President Ben S. Gilmer in the annual report attributes the telephone growth to economic progress in the South.

"Our growth," Gilmer said, "is evidence of the increasing requirements for communications services associated with the growth of cities and suburban and rural areas."

"However," Gilmer pointed out, "the economic slowdown prevailing in the nation in 1961, including the South, caused telephone growth to be lower than in 1960."

The report pointed to the Bell systems work in satellite communications as illustrative of part of its progress during the year. Under agreement between A. T. and T. and the NASA, launching of the first of the Bell system's "Telstar" experimental satellites is scheduled for this spring.

The Bell laboratories also announced development of the first "Solid State" optical master that can produce continuous beams of pure light. In the future, such beams could conceivably carry large volumes of communications. Research on superconducting materials has opened the way to creating more powerful magnetic fields that were practically impossible before. This is expected to have a great impact on the development of nuclear energy as well as the future of communications.

"We are proud of our role in the development of this great region," President Gilmer said, "and we intend to continue to participate in its progress and to strive in the years ahead to strengthen our ability to serve this region well."

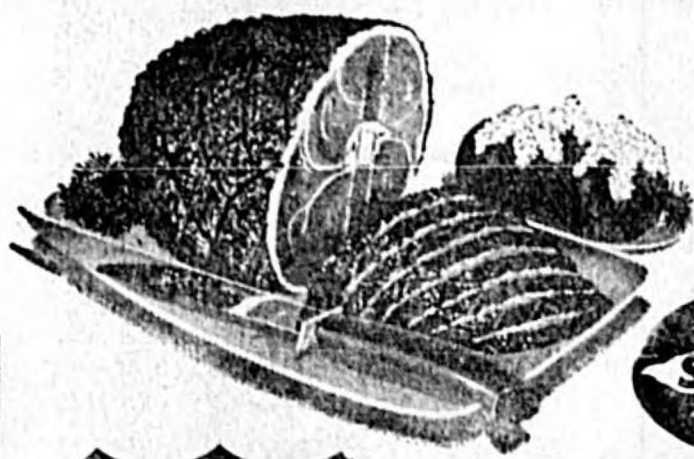

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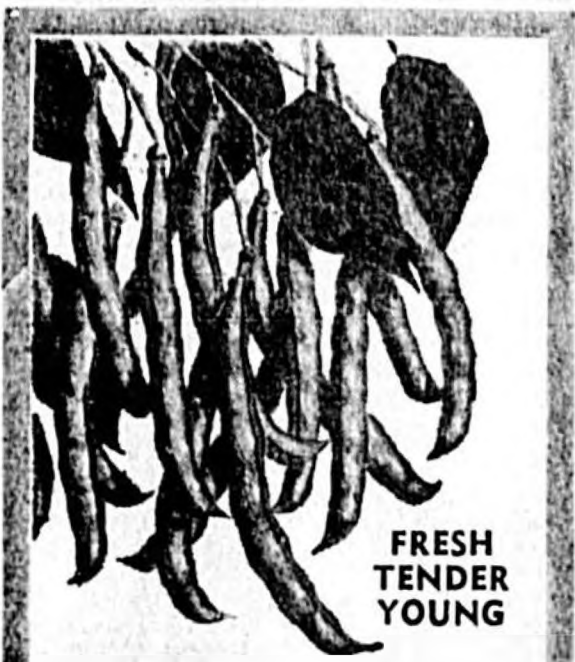

Cuban Refugee Dentist Tells Of Flight To This Country

Dr. Manuel Antonio Zuniga, one of 300 Cuban dentists who came to this country as refugees, was guest speaker at Monday night's meeting of the DeBary Community Methodist Men's Club.

Zuniga spoke on conditions in Communist Cuba and told of how he and his family fled the country last August and came to DeLand to make a new life.

He related the many emotional and technical difficulties involved in their flight, among them the added anxiety of expecting a fourth child. (A daughter, Lizetta, was born just 12 days after their arrival in Miami).

The doctor practiced for 10 years at Preston, Cuba, Oriente Province, in January of last year, when the

American missionary, Dr. Richard Milk, had to abandon the position as Director of the Agricultural and Industrial School, a Methodist Institution at Preston. Dr. Zuniga became his successor.

The school finally was taken over by Castro's government and the Zunigas daily realized the increasing danger of staying in Cuba.

Since the Communist Government confiscated all family property, in order to purchase tickets to leave, Zuniga had to depend on help from this country which was provided through the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief and was sponsored by the Trinity Methodist Church of DeLand.

Zuniga, a highly educated man, speaks fluent English and makes a most interesting speaker.

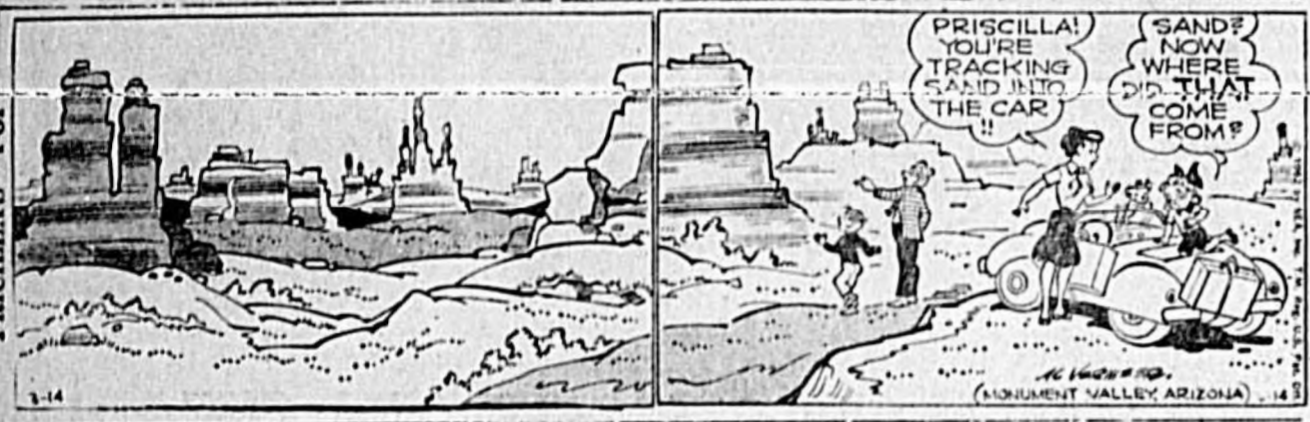
