PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The nation's major steel companies announced a new proposal for settlement of their bitter contract dispute with the United Steelworkers today but the union promptly rejected it.

The USW action virtually doomed voluntary settlement of the history-making controversy during the 80-day truce ordered by the U. S. Supreme Court in the 116-day walk-out of 300,000 union members.

The companies proposed an economic package which it estimated would cost them 30 cents an hour per man over a three-year period. They coupled it with a plan of negotiation and arbitration for settlement of the thorny local working conditions issue, which appeared the chief stumbling block in the road of settlement.

Low Bid On Sanford Ave. Widening Is \$298,381

The county got a good price today on the widening of Sanford Ave. from 25th St. to Ginderville as the low bid of \$298,381.49 was one of three bids below the cost estimate for the job.

Bids were opened on the project at Tallahassee this morning and County Atty. Mack Cleveland Jr. reported that 11 firms bid on it.

Apparent low bid was submitted by R. B. Tyler Co. of Louisville, Ky. Two others below the original estimate of \$333,000 were placed by C. A. Meyer Paving Co. of Orlando at \$314,359.85 and by W. H. Armston Co., Inc. of Dunedin at \$317,359.67.

This project is in the budget as part of the county's \$1 million bond issue and the below-cost estimate bid was taken as an indication that "a little extra money" may be saved for application to other proposed improvements.

This project will result in the four laning of Sanford Ave. from 25th to Ginderville, giving access to the Naval Station and downtown traffic, which has increased greatly.

Construction will include paving of the street, plus all drainage lines and curbing involved.

Production To Stop
DETROIT (UPI) — Ford Motor Co. announced today it is discontinuing production of its Edsel lines of cars which were introduced only two years ago.

Ship Fire
SAVANNAH, Ga. (UPI) — A Dutch freighter loaded with paper pulp, resins and cotton caught fire in Savannah harbor early today but the blaze was brought under control in less than two hours. The ship, identified as the Lopperum, was tied up at an Atlanta Coast Line Railroad wharf.

Inspections To Halt
LAKELAND (UPI) — The state was expected to stop inspecting fruit in intra-state shipment today on the suggestion of the Citrus Commission. The commission recommended the action to Agricultural Commissioner Nathan Mayo Wednesday because of a court injunction brought by the Lake County Citrus Sales Inc. of Leesburg.

Effort Blocked
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Commerce Department has blocked an effort by the Soviet Union to buy \$150 million worth of American surplus steel. The department said Wednesday night the applications were disapproved under regulations prohibiting shipment to Communist countries of materials having strategic value in wartime.

Unity Responsible
MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — Sen. Spessard L. Holland said Wednesday night the South's unity was largely responsible for the success of the last session of Congress. Holland said the new labor management act, economy in government and the cutback in foreign aid would not have been realized "without Southern support."

Budget Problem
AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — President Eisenhower today intensified his efforts to whip the big federal budget for the next fiscal year into final shape before he departs for Europe Dec. 1.

The President obviously is having to spend more time resolving intra-service differences over the big military budget than in years past.

Torrential Rains Hit Southeastern Portion Of State

MIAMI (UPI) — Torrential rains continued to fall across southeastern Florida today, flooding many sections of Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties.

Ocean Ridge, a community 10 miles south of Palm Beach, reported seven inches of rain in the 24-hour period ending at 10:30 a. m. today. Most of it fell in a two-hour period Wednesday night.

Pompano Beach had nearly four inches in a 90-minute period. Rainfall was generally above two inches in communities from Palm Beach to Miami.

Little letup was in sight for the area for the rest of the day.

The Weather Bureau said the showers were triggered by a cold front which stalled at Lake Okechobee Wednesday.

A mass of warm air from the Southwest today routed a record November cold wave.

The Weather Bureau said the last effects of the arctic front that set record temperatures and left foot-deep snows when it reached the East Coast were fading fast.

Temperatures across the nation climbed slowly above the normal seasonal average.

Two Orlando Men Hurt In Wreck

William F. Metcalf of Orlando, who suffered a fractured pelvis in a south Seminole County auto accident early yesterday, was reported to be in good condition at Orange Memorial Hospital last night.

The early morning crash happened when Metcalf tried to make a turn from old Highway 441 onto the new 441. The car left the road at about 60 m.p.h. and struck a pine tree, wrecking it, said Highway Patrolman M. T. Crawford.

Metcalf also suffered arm lacerations and a passenger, Kenneth Pierce received severe forehead lacerations, Crawford said.

Murder Charge Is Dismissed

Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams today dismissed a second degree murder charge against a Sanford Negro woman on the advice of the Assistant State's Attorney.

Annie Ruth Shaw had been accused of stabbing her husband, K. D. Shaw during November of last year.

Assistant State's Attorney Tom Waddell Jr., asked Judge Williams to dismiss the case because "we just don't have enough evidence on how the man died."

"He could have died from hicups for all we know," Waddell said after the dismissal.

Fire Chief Warns: Check Oil Heaters

Sanford Fire Chief today urged all residents to be especially careful during the forthcoming winter months of checking oil heaters to prevent fires.

"With the cold weather coming in, the biggest percentage of our fires now will be due to faulty oil heaters," Cleveland said.

He urged residents to make sure all heaters are checked carefully and cleaned before they are lighted.

"Make sure there is no oil leaking from the flues and be sure your flue is in good working condition," Cleveland added.

The Fire Chief also reminded all residents on the importance of calling the department before burning leaves during the windy months ahead.

600 Homes Planned At Casselberry

Casselberry developer Hibbard Casselberry said today that he will build 600 homes next year in the town's Lake Kathryn Park area.

A plat of 100 lots was filed in the county clerk's office yesterday after the Casselberry Town Council approved the lot plan Tuesday. The 600 three-bedroom homes are the beginning of 3,000 houses to go in the Lake Kathryn area, Casselberry said.

The homes in the \$12,000 to \$18,000 bracket will have one and two baths and all will be air conditioned. The terrazzo floors and cement block walls will be topped by built up masonry.

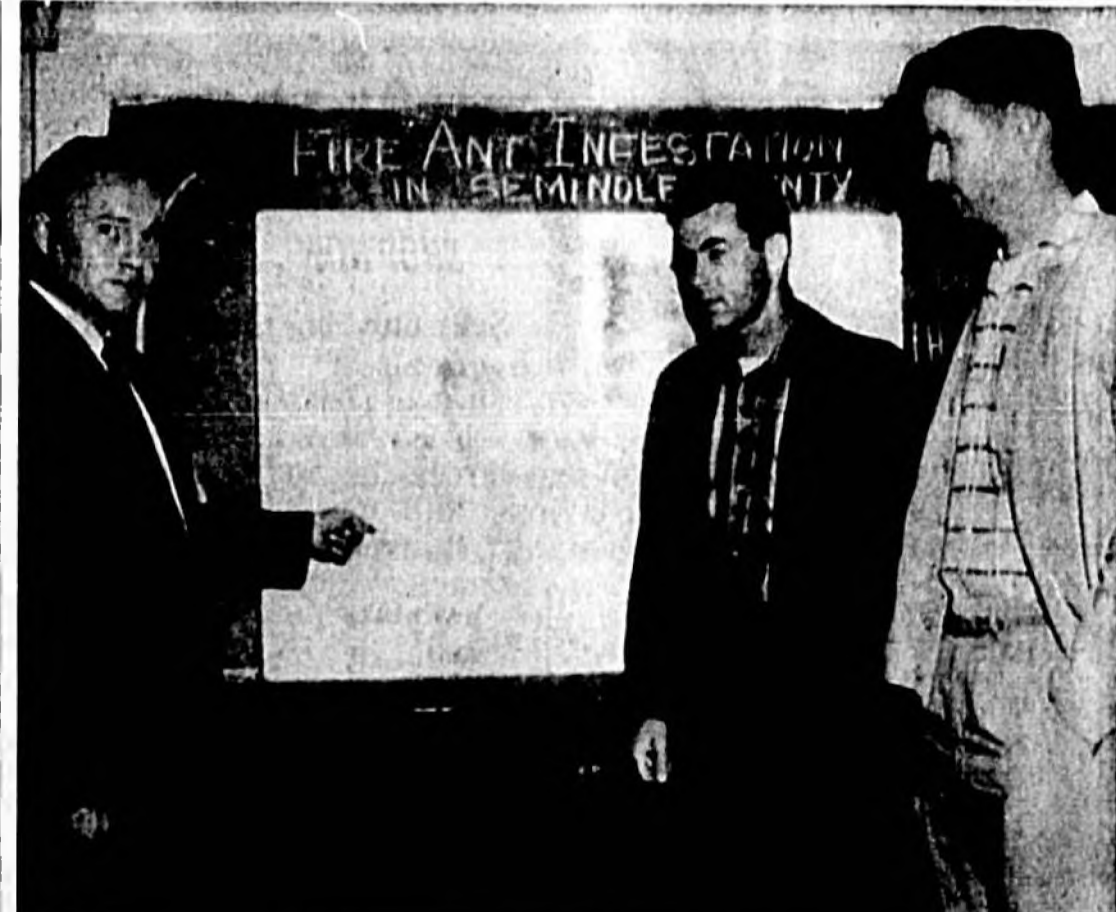

Teamster Group Asks Federal Judge To Oust Hoffa As Union President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A federal judge has been asked to oust James R. Hoffa as president of the Teamster Union and bring him to trial on corruption charges.

The request was made Wednesday to U. S. District Court here by Godfrey P. Schmidt, attorney for 12 rank-and-file teamsters.

The group asked Federal Judge F. Dickinson Lewis to name an impartial board of examiners to hear 164 charges of misconduct against Hoffa and report back on their verdict.

They said neither Hoffa nor the Teamsters' executive board had done anything about the charges

which were filed with the court months ago.

They said "no reasonable hope of substantial reform of the Teamster movement can be entertained while James R. Hoffa and his cronies control the administration of the international organization."

The rebel group argued that the union's general executive board, which normally would try union officers accused of misconduct, was not capable of being impartial in Hoffa's case.

Board members are "stooges" of the Teamster chief and would whitewash any charges against him, the rank-and-file teamsters said. They charged that Hoffa conspired to rig his own election to the \$50,000-a-year union presidency.

Former GM Vice President Harry W. Anderson was struck by the charge from Curtis's gun Wednesday when he stood up in a duck blind and stumbled just as Curtis pulled the trigger.

The blast tore away the upper right portion of Anderson's head.

He lost consciousness immediately and died about an hour later while Curtis and other hunting companions carried him toward help on the Canadian mainland.

Curtis, Anderson, George Kennedy and Arthur Brown, a Detroit manufacturer's representative, had been hunting together on an exclusive 7,000-acre preserve owned by Kennedy's Kelsey-Hayes Wheel Co. of Detroit, on St. Anne Island. The island is at the juncture of the St. Clair River and Lake St. Clair which form the international boundary between Michigan and Ontario.

It took the party about an hour to get from the duck blind to the hunting lodge by truck and boat, a distance of about four miles.

When they arrived on the Canadian mainland with Anderson's body, Curtis talked to Canadian provincial police for about an hour and then rushed to the American side of the international waters and drove to Anderson's home at Ann Arbor, Mich., about 90 miles away. "I am deeply grieved," Curtis said on arriving at the Anderson home to console the widow of his friend. "Harry Anderson was my

very dear friend for many years." He then went inside and talked privately with Mrs. Anderson for about 20 minutes before he left for his own home at Flint, another 30-mile trip. At home, friends shielded him from reporters but promised he would meet with them today.

Curtis and his companions have hunted ducks on the opening day of the Ontario season at the same preserve every year for eight years. They were just about to quit for the day when the accident occurred.

Witnesses told the same story Curtis himself related to Ontario Constable Owen Collins who questioned him about the accident.

"He said he had taken aim on the lead duck in a flight and pulled the trigger just as Anderson stumbled in front of his gun," Collins said.

The lodge operator said Anderson may have become "excited" at sight of the ducks overhead.

Collins said there appeared to be no doubt that it was an accident, but that there probably would be an inquest anyway. He said the matter had been turned over to Canadian Crown Atty. S. A. K. Logan and that the question of an inquest would be discussed today.

A neighbor of the Andersons, Dr. Albert C. Kerlikowski of the University of Michigan Hospital, broke the news to Anderson's widow.

He said "she sensed something wrong as soon as I walked in" and asked "Curly, is something wrong — has something happened to Harry?"

But he said she took the news well — "She is a sturdy woman, capable of standing on her own feet."

Anderson, whose body was sent to Ann Arbor where he lived since retirement in 1954, was GM vice president in charge of personnel. He would have been 60 on Christmas Day.

Curtis, nicknamed "Red," retired Aug. 26, 1956, two weeks after his 65th birthday and after 44 years with GM. He became president of the world's largest corporation when Charles E. Wilson left to become secretary of defense in 1952.

'Outstanding' Farmer Talks To Kiwanians

The Seminole County Farm-City Week program began early when Florida's Outstanding Young Farmer yesterday told Sanford Kiwanians "What Agriculture Means To Every American."

Jack Collier, of Ocala, Jaycee farmer award winner for 1959 gave the first of four talks on agriculture to be heard by Sanford civic clubs through next Tuesday.

Development of water facilities and conservation of topsoil were emphasized by the Marion County farmer. The 244 million people expected to live in our country by 1975 will need more food, Collier said. This means more water will be needed. New industrial developments also concentrate where there is abundant water, Collier pointed out.

For each United States citizen there are now about three acres of tillable land in the nation. The country's average depth of topsoil for growing is about six or seven inches. "So you see we are only inches away from starvation," Collier said, pointing out that Japanese and Korean soil has already been eroded down to bare rock.

Telling the richness of Florida agricultural resources, Collier said that the state's 300,000 acres of citrus make it the largest citrus producing area in the world. Florida has 550 registered herds of purebred beef cattle, 300 million acres of forest land; 28 race-horse breeding farms in Marion County alone. Limestone in the soil attracted the horse breeders to Marion County, the young farmer said.

"When we attempt to introduce new industries in our communities we must never sacrifice agriculture, for it is the hand that has fed us in the past and the hand that will feed us in the future," Collier said.

Sanford civic club speakers observing the fifth annual national Farm-City Week Nov. 20-26 will be Dr. H. Clarke, Professor of Agricultural Economics at the University of Florida who will speak at the Civitan Club meeting tonight, and Mason Marvel, Assistant Vegetable Crop Specialist at the U.

Experts Hunt Clues To Air Mystery

ATLANTA (UPI) — A strange jig-saw puzzle is being pieced together this week in a Biloxi, Miss., warehouse in an effort to solve a baffling mystery of the skies.

Trucks have brought to the warehouse at Keesler Air Force Base a pile of twisted junk, not recognizable as a sleek and sturdy airliner. This was the recoverable material from the

National Air Lines DC7B that plunged into the Gulf Nov. 10, killing 43 persons.

The plane was flying a normal over-water course from Tampa to New Orleans. It was in contact with the New Orleans control tower. But after a pilot's routine report — silence. Then, hours later, discovery of an oil slick, and bodies and pieces of plane floating in the water.

What happened?

If there was an explosion, tell-tale streaks will show just where on the plane it happened. A tiny gear, stopped in a certain position, may show whether directional controls were functioning properly.

Gear mechanism, which would not change with the impact of a crash, might give some clues. So would the position of the landing gear retracting mechanism.

A propeller with its blades bent outward indicates that the plane hit the water with engines on. If they are bent inward, the plane went down with engines stopped.

Florida Cities Study New Slum Clearance Ruling

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida's cities studied ways today to take advantage of a State Supreme Court ruling which will allow them to share in federal funds for slum clearance.

Apparently only a few of the 17 municipalities in Dade County will be able to do so any time soon.

In Dade County, the metropolitan government commission (Metro) could pass a local act to make Miami and its other towns eligible for federal funds. Metro is the only local government in the state empowered to write its own local acts.

That's the question the jig-saw experts try to answer. These are the officials from the airline, the Federal Aviation Agency, the Civil Aeronautics Board, manufacturers of various parts of the plane and other representatives of the Airline Pilots Assn.

Some of them were on the scene far out in the Gulf shortly after the wreckage was located, already beginning to salvage every tiny piece of the plane that could be found.

Condition of the victims' bodies also is highly important. Water in the lungs would mean they were drowned, hence were alive after the plane hit.

It's a grim game, this particular kind of jig saw puzzle. But success in solving such puzzles is one of the reasons why it's so safe to fly nowadays.

Florida Cities Study New Slum Clearance Ruling

Tampa and Tallahassee had enabling laws passed in the 1950 session of the Legislature.

Tampa is ready to start work on clearing out a 40-acre slum area. And Tallahassee is expected to clean up a 15-acre slum section near the State Capitol.

Other cities will have to wait for the next session of the Legislature in 1961 — unless a special session is called before then to pass enabling legislation.

Army Can't Win

PARIS (UPI) — Parliament demanded to know today whether the army felt strong enough to fight Brigitte Bardot for the pleasure of the company of her nervous husband.

The army wouldn't say yes and it wouldn't say no.

The question exploded in all places of a National Assembly debate on President Charles De Gaulle's plea for a nuclear military force.

It climaxed a national tumult over whether BB's husband, actor Jacques Charrier, was pretending illness to avoid army duty. Two days after he was drafted he was in the hospital with a "case of nerves" but three days after that he was back in Brigitte's arms in Paris.

And two days after that he was

back in the hospital with those old devil nerves.

The war of Charrier's nerves struck army Minister Pierre Guillaumet while he was urging fellow lawmakers to allocate money for atomic bombs, jets, and ballistic missiles.

Up jumped Deputy Roland Boudet, usually a DeGaulle government supporter.

"What I want to know is whether or all recruits are submitted to the same obligations when they come from the arms of a movie star," Boudet said.

"Very good! Bravo! Bravo! Bravo!" boomed other deputies, leaping to their feet. The army minister looked pained and remained silent. Military sources said later they would study the problem of Charrier's nerves.

As for Boudet, he vowed he would not vote for the DeGaulle arms budget unless the army was prepared to fight Brigitte for Jacques.

Bryan M. Grady Dies At 63

Bryan M. Grady, 63-year-old 2418 S. Willow Ave. resident died Wednesday in Seminole Memorial hospital, after a short illness.

The former accountant was a member of All Souls Catholic Church, a World War One veteran, and a member of Veterans' Barracks 486 of Sanford. He served on the Mexican border in 1918. Mr. Grady came to Sanford from Miami in 1954.

Here Are Reasons For Planning

City Manager Warren Knowles included a sheet in the City Commission agenda at its last meeting which answered the question of "why a community should plan."

The points in it were well presented. Here they are:

"We plan in order to create the kind of physical and social environment that makes people and organizations want to locate and remain in the community."

"We plan in order to prevent wear-out and static communities."

"We have planning as a process in arresting and reversing the processes of urban decay, and as a process in making our communities better in all respects than ever before."

"Community planning creates an organized pattern that will guide public and private endeavor in producing a better and more efficient urban community."

"Planning is not a method of finding ways for spending more tax dollars, but rather a process designed to obtain the greatest efficiency and lasting benefit from each dollar spent in the physical development of the community, whether from public or private sources."

A mere 100 new families added to a typical Florida community will sooner or later result in:

- Improvements to at least 40 acres of land, in residential, commercial, and other uses, for which reasonable development ought to be set up and administered;
- About 1 1/2 miles of streets to be paved and more than that length of sewers and water lines to be built and maintained;
- School and recreation facilities for 55 additional children, plus other community facilities for newcomers of all ages;
- At least 100 more passenger cars added to community traffic and to the demand for parking spaces in the business center and elsewhere;
- An increase in the annual budgets of the city and county, requiring a total of \$50,000 in new, or added tax revenues.

"Community planning is intelligent forethought applied to the development of a community. It involves setting down in words, maps and charts a guide for public officials and private citizens to use in developing and using land. This plan is commonly known as the comprehensive or master plan for the community."

"It is regulated by the voters of the community and its officials."

Large Packers Lose To Small

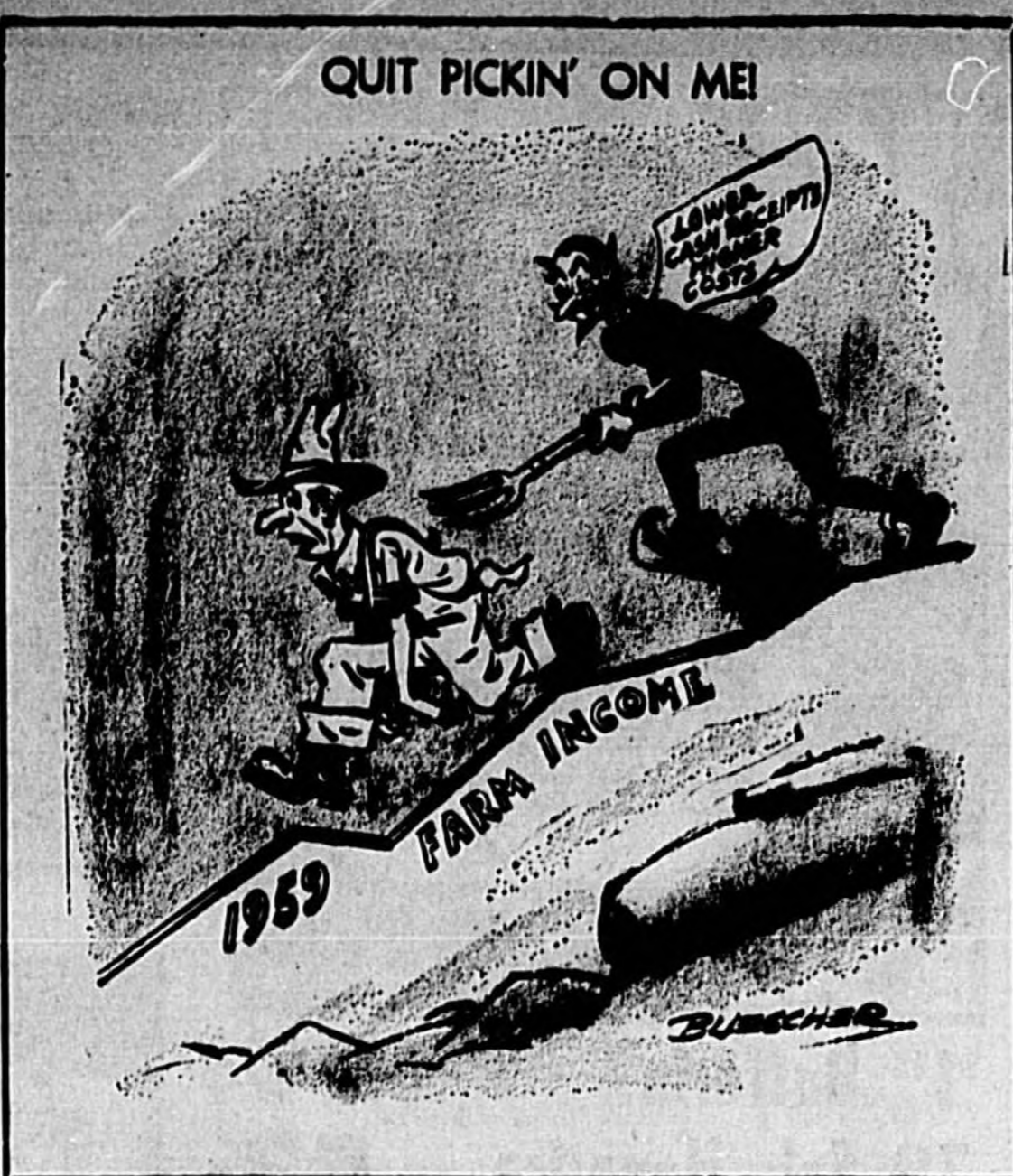
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Washington See-Saw

By WIN PENDLETON

One of the first bills to be introduced in the Congress in January will call for the creation of a United States Court of Labor-Management Relations. The bill will be submitted by Senator George Smathers. The purpose of the Court will be to prevent prolonged nationwide labor trouble similar to the steel strike. The Court will have jurisdiction over industry and labor when collective bargaining has reached an impasse.

The Court, as proposed by Senator Smathers, would be made up of five men appointed by the President. These men would have judicial backgrounds and would not be a cross section of labor-management-business. This would be a Court of law, sitting in Washington on a full time basis. Smathers says, "It would be in the nature of a Supreme Court on labor-management relations, whose findings and judgments would be final and binding on both parties—a court of last resort in this field, so to speak."

Smathers made headlines in Washington when his proposal was made last week. Since then, letters have come to his office from all parts of the country. Most of them have been in favor of his plan, although there have been a few who accuse him of being "anti-labor." The Senator maintains that he is not anti-labor, but that "we are a nation of prudent and responsible people, and methods can and must be devised to equitably resolve differences where collective bargaining fails to achieve results in the national interest. The achievement of this objective will be beneficial to both labor and management and fully protect the public interest."

Von Braun Signs Name To Posterity

NEW YORK (UPI)—Like Hollywood celebrities implanting their footprints in concrete, rocket scientist Dr. Werner Von Braun recently signed his name for posterity—but in a material more appropriate to the space age.

Von Braun's signature was written in a new quick-hardening material called "astro-ceramics," which is primarily used in molding tools to handle such space-age items as beryllium, titanium and molybdenum.

The occasion was construction of Republic Aviation Corporation's new Research and Development Center on Long Island, N. Y.

Vote Returns Cause Confusion

CENTERVILLE, Ohio (UPI)—Even the candidates were confused over the outcome of this little southwestern Ohio community's recent race for mayor.

Unofficial election returns had shown James Kelsey winner by three votes over William Gimbel. Then the official returns came in, each candidate had 402 votes. The Board of Elections called in the two to settle the matter by the only means left—the flip of a coin. Kelsey left heads.

The coin was spun and came to rest on the board's book of minutes. It was heads.

Gimbel offered Kelsey his hand in congratulation, then turned to leave. But the election officials called him back.

The coin had slipped down onto the table. It was tails.

Kelsey put out his hand to congratulate Gimbel.

"I'm confused," said Gimbel.

Labor May Choose Demo Candidate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Next year's Democratic nomination for president probably is riding on Big Labor's final decision on responsibility for the 1959 labor reform bill.

Big Labor's decision may not be unanimous. Jimmy Hoffa already has committed his Teamsters' fat treasury to oppose all Democrats who voted for the labor bill. AFL-CIO has been zig-zagging on that.

All of the Senate Democrats who aspire to the 1960 presidential nomination vote for the labor bill. Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) is more clearly identified with labor legislation in 1959 than is any other presidential hopeful. AFL-CIO seems unable to make up its mind about Kennedy.

United Press International reported from Washington last week a ruckus in the annual convention of the AFL-CIO industrial union department, which is the CIO element of merged Big Labor. The governing opposition of the Machinists' Union blocked a resolution which would have praised Kennedy and five other Democrats for their position on labor legislation this year.

Kennedy was the only Democrat among the six who is counted among the presidential hopefuls. The machinists were—and are—against anyone who voted for the Landrum-Griffin bill. The Automobile Workers' Walter P. Reuter was among those who wanted to give Kennedy a cheer. The end result of the commotion was that the resolution was expensively tucked away without an explosive floor fight over Kennedy as a friend or foe of Big Labor.

Kennedy can count Reuter's friendly attitude as a great and valuable political asset. Reuter is smart and powerful. He knows the political ropes and how to

Company Heading For Proxy Fight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Allegheny Corp. appeared headed for a taste of some of the medicine it has been dishing out for the past 20 years—a proxy fight all its own.

Allegheny and its chief executive Allan P. Kirby have been behind some of the biggest financial fiascos in history, including the famous 1964 battle for control of the New York Central Railroad.

Now, developments of late last week indicate that the giant holding company will be on the receiving end of a proxy contest that could possibly rival the New York Central battle in notoriety.

Millionaire Kirby has been accused of acting in "bad faith" by Boston financier Abraham M. Sosenbend, who, together with a small group of associates, recently acquired 700,000 shares of Allegheny common stock or about 16 per cent of the total common shares outstanding.

Kirby holds about a 10 per cent common stock interest, but has rights to purchase a substantial amount of additional common shares. He also holds a big sum of preferred stock.

Sosenbend made his charge when informed of the discharge of David Wallace as Allegheny vice president, and of Kirby's intention to recommend Sosenbend's election to the Allegheny board of directors.

"I consider this an act of bad faith in violation of what I understood to be a gentleman's agreement between Mr. Kirby and myself," Sosenbend stated. Sosenbend is holding an informal conference in New York today, at which time his plan of action most likely will be disclosed.

The prize is a big one. Allegheny, in effect, controls the \$2,500,000,000 New York Central system through a 17 per cent interest, and the 3 billion dollar Investors Diversified Services, Inc., investment firm, through a 25 per cent interest.

It also has a substantial interest in the Missouri Pacific Railroad and in the giant real estate firm of Webb & Knapp.

That, perhaps, is a fact. The pamphlet also notes that the favorable Landrum-Griffin vote was in part in response to an avalanche of mail from angry citizens. It was an avalanche which Big Labor could not match, despite its 15 million members.

The division in the labor movement over assessment of blame for the Landrum-Griffin bill is likely greatly to reduce the influence of labor leaders at next year's Democratic national convention. They have had in the past a veto power in Democratic conventions.

They used it in 1962 on Alben W. Barkley. Barkley accused them of choosing programs and candidates to gain "greater control over the machinery and policies of the Democratic Party."

Give Professional Touch To Wrapping Packages

Ribbons and designs on gift packages are wonderful "icing on the cake" . . . but they look best when the paper is smoothly and attractively wrapped around the box.

Here are the steps a professional uses in wrapping packages:

Place the paper face down on the table. Put the box, upside down if possible, on the paper. Place it so the design will show to the best advantage when the package is wrapped and tied.

If the box cannot be turned upside down, cut the paper about ¼ inch wider than is needed and turn the raw edge under. Arrange so that the overlap will come under the ribbon or trim you plan to use.

Cut the paper wide enough to go around the box and overlap 1½ inches (less for a very small box), and long enough to extend a little

more than half the depth of the box at the ends. This extending length will have to vary slightly according to the shape of the box and should be a trifle more for a deep box than for a shallow one. Don't scrimp.

Bring the paper up over the sides, overlapping as near the center of the box as possible, and fasten with a gummed seal or with tape.

Finish one end at a time. Fold the sides in smoothly. Fold the top, which is to be the bottom of the package, down first, then bring the fold that is on the table up over all the folds, securing with tape or sticker.

Turn the box over. You are now ready to add your own special trims.

Chemists Bring Meltless Snow For Yule Season

All the snowy splendor of a traditional White Christmas can be yours in holiday decorations this year at the flick of a finger — whether the outside temperature is way up high, or very low!

Unlike nature's uncertain product, this man-made snow lasts till the end of the holiday season—still looking as fresh and cool as a new snowfall. The artificial snow is the result of blending several resins

with a fluorinated hydrocarbon — the coldness or freezing action in most mechanical refrigerators.

In the snow cans the hydrocarbon acts both as a solvent for the resins and, because of its ability to expand rapidly when released under pressure, as a propellant for the resins.

Wintery effects can be created both indoors and out with these man-made snows. The chemical is harmless and does not deteriorate under ordinary temperature and humidity conditions.

This snow can be used to "frost" window panes or will simulate fresh-fallen snow on evergreens!

Other novel effects can be produced on glass surfaces. Simple paper or cardboard cutouts of Christmas figures may be made, and placed on the glass while the "snow" is sprayed around them, either a negative or positive print of the mask may be made.

Cut-out cardboard Santas, for example, can be sprayed in several snow colors to make inexpensive but eye-catching place cards for holiday parties.

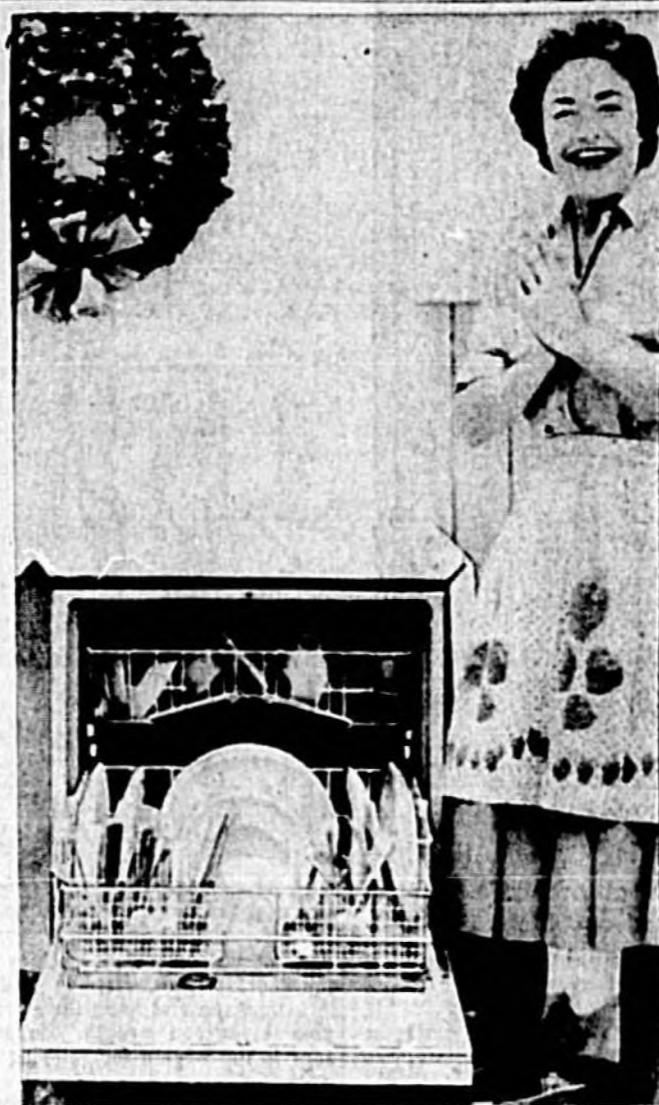

Mount the tree in a stand that holds water. This will keep the tree fresh and green.

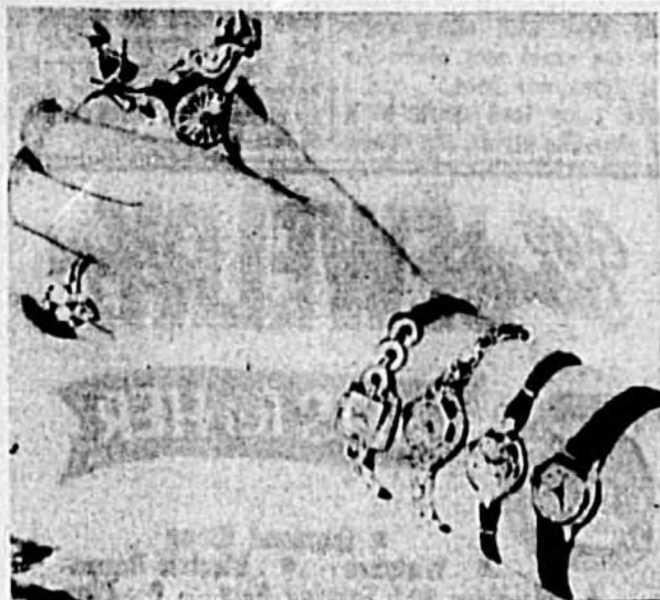
Keep the tree away from open fireplaces, radiators, TV sets and electric lights.

So it is that since the year 334 A. D., this date has been observed as the date of the Saviour's birth.

Members of the Greek, Russian and Ukrainian Orthodox Churches celebrate this on January 6th.

To this day, the festival of Christmas still occurs on many different dates throughout the world.

December 6 is the day when Christmas is observed in most Western European countries and marks the beginning of a long happy holiday season!

Oldest Christian Church Stands In Bethlehem

Probably the oldest church in Christianity is the Church of the Nativity, built upon the spot where the stable stood. It was erected by Emperor Constantine the Great, in 330 A. D.

The church looks like a fortress. Its original stately portal has been walled up and replaced by a low and narrow entrance. There was a reason for this. 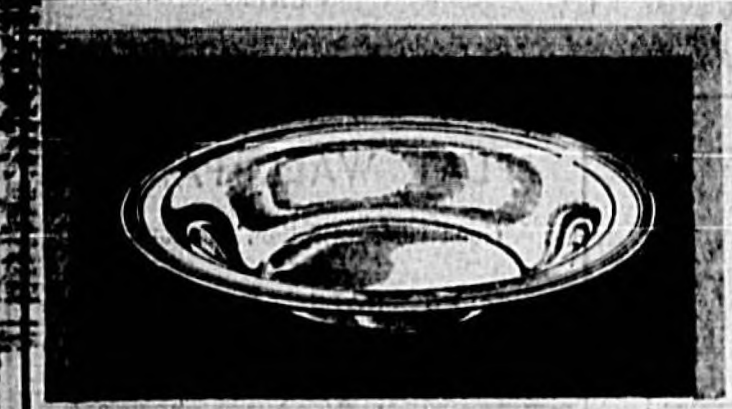

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Just How Old Is Santa Claus, Anyway? Here Are Some Guesses

Just how old is Santa Claus? Where does he come from? Why does he enter by way of the chimney? Why does he drive a sleigh? Even the best reference sources do not quite agree about the ancestry of the jolly, big-hearted fellow we know.

But, after all, is it so important whether the name Santa Claus has its origin in the Dutch "Sinterklaas," or in the German "Christkindl" or "Kris Kringle"?

It is generally agreed that the idea for our modern day Santa Claus began with a young boy called Nicholas over 1600 years ago. During his early years, growing up in the Asia Minor portion of present-day Turkey, he was generous and pious. These qualities grew within him until as a man he became the bishop of Myra.

His most famous deed of generosity was directed toward three beautiful daughters of a poor nobleman. He wanted dowries for his children so they could be married. So, Nicholas on three different nights tossed bags of gold through a window of their home, and each daughter could be married and well cared for.

Down through the centuries the story of Saint Nicholas was carried to other countries and when unexpected gifts appeared they were attributed to him.

Dutch children still wait for Saint Nicholas, or "Sinterklaas," as they call him. He is pictured as a kindly, white-bearded bishop who rides a white horse over the rooftops when he lowers his gifts down the chimney.

It is this "Sinterklaas," brought over by the early Dutch settlers, that we give thanks for Santa's custom and method of giving, for the full white beard, riding over rooftops and, partially, for his name.

Santa Claus had many other forerunners, some who still bring gifts in his place to children in other lands.

Another "ancestor" of Santa came from Germany. "Christkindl," sometimes called "Kris Kringle," is a little messenger of the Christ child. This same angel also was the gift-giver to the Swiss children. There the angel arrived in a sleigh drawn by six reindeer. The elves, Santa's fine helpers,

are "imported" from Norway. Dr. Clement Clark Moore, a seminary professor, wrote "A Visit from St. Nicholas" ("The Night Before Christmas") for his children.

He vividly described Santa Claus, bringing all the many legends he knew.

In 1863, cartoonist Thomas Nast was commissioned to illustrate Moore's poem. Santa Claus, much as we see him today pictured everywhere at Christmas, emerged from Nast's drawing board 96 years ago in New York City.

vacation, resulted in 706 fatalities! Last year there were only 580 people killed. Between forty-eight and fifty-five percent of these deaths were caused by drunken drivers, or by drivers who had something to drink, according to the National Safety Council.

Police and traffic authorities everywhere agree that the drunk driver, even the mildly intoxicated one, is more dangerous on the highway than the speedster, reckless driver, thrill seeker or thoughtless driver.

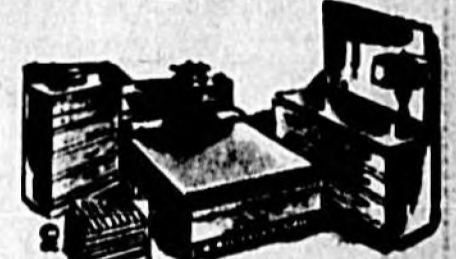

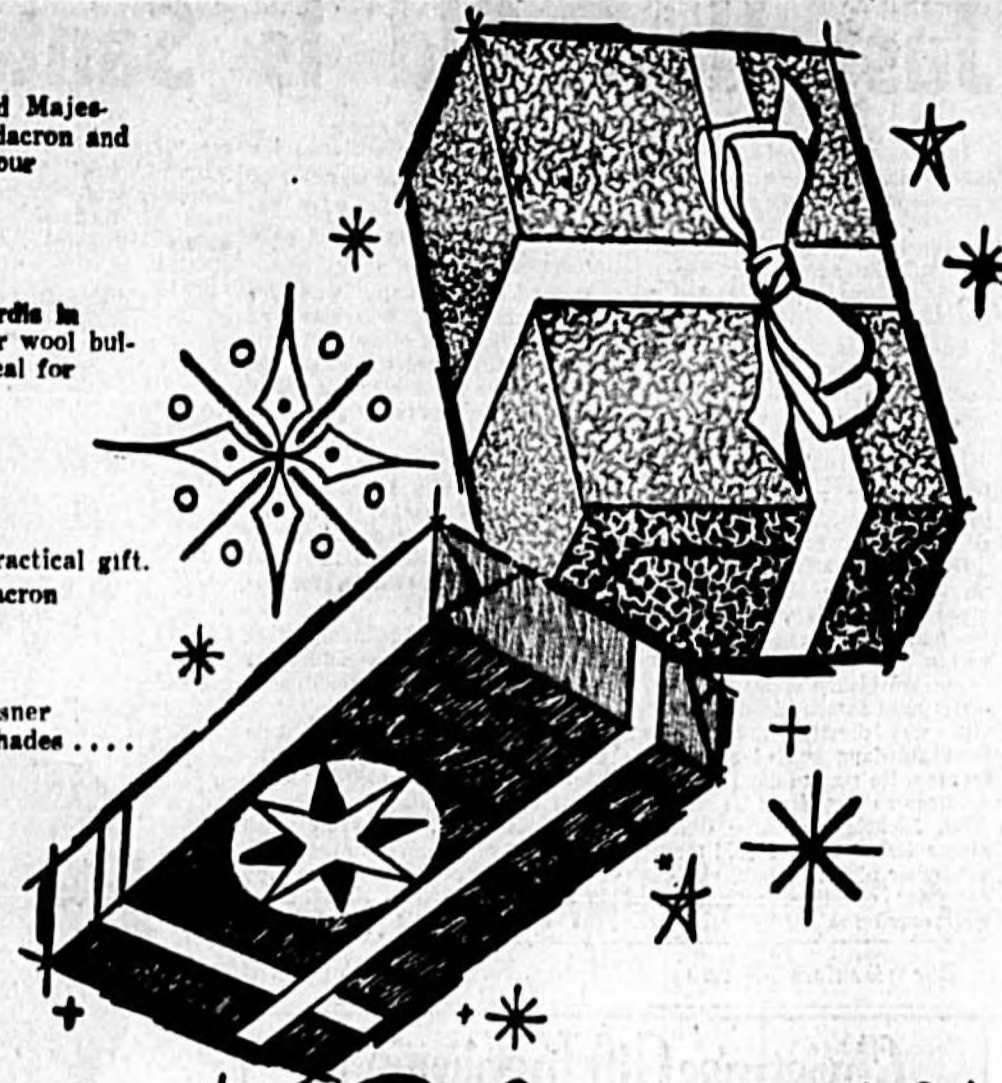
