Growing one crop year after year encourages insects, diseases and totatoes or vines, it will be well for weeds. The experienced trucker knows how necessary it is to fight them all on land used for the same reed potatoes for their own plantings purposes year after year. On expensive truck land it may pay, but t does not in general farming.

The value of growing an occasional crop of legumes has been established. Let them have a prominent place in your rotation. They add nitrogen to the soil and are great soil builders in other respects.

Another advantage of a good rotation is that deep and shallow rooted crops are alternated. Crops that send their roots down deeply help to prevent a compet condition of the subsoil and so maintain better drainage and a better moisture reservoir. Woman's Club Notes





SHRINE OF THE "HOLY COAT"

Cathedral at Treves Contains One of Most Jeslously Guarded Relick of the Roman Church.

At intervals of many years the old Prince Bishopric of Treves, wakens out of its half-slumbering condition and becomes the center of a great pilgrimage. Besides its numerous Roman nomains, this quiet old town, claiming to he 1,300 years older than Rome, is the shrine of the "Holy Coat," one of the most Jealously guarded relics in the possession of the Roman church.

The citizens of Troves are very he "Holy Quat" was placed over the high altar,' but it was not exposed to the public gaze for some three hundred years afterward. It was kept in a secret place of the cathedral known only to a few, and there were many who doubted its existence. A guide book of 1814 says: "The existence of the relic at present is rather doubtful-at least, it is not visible. The attendants of the church say it is walled up." All doubts were removed in 1844, when Archbishop Arnoldi announced a centenary jubiles, at which it was exhibited to a million and a half of pilgrims from all parts of the world ... The coat is a loose garment with wide sleeves, very simple in form, of coarse material, dark brown in color, probably as the result of age, and entirely without seam or decoration.

MESSAGES FLOAT FOR YEARS

United . States Hydrographic Office Tells of Finding of Bottle Set Adrift in 1914.

Several instances of measures in bottles having floated about the Pacific for years before being recovered have been announced by the. United States hydrographic office.

.A, bottle was set adrift by Capt. S Nagahus of the Tamba Maru, Japanese, August 17, 1015, 900 miles east of Kamchatka, was recovered May 15 last near Moellps, Wash. Another bottle, set adrift in December, 1914, off Cape Corrientes, Max., was found February. 22 last 240 miles north of Christman, island, in the latitude of the Hawalian islands.

A third bottle, tossed from the schooner W. H. Marsten by Capt. W. Wann February 14, 1915, 2,040 miles' sust of Chile and 600 miles south of Easter island, was picked up January 21 last four miles south of Wanganui island, New Zealand.







One of the ways of solving the problem of properly dressing the growing girl is illustrated in this dress of dark red nunsveiling. No lining is required for the design, which is made to be slipped on over the head and adjusted with the minimum amount of trouble. The front and back are in panel style and the openneck is finished with a collar of red taffeta, while the cuffs match the collar.

" To reproduce the model for a girl of right years requires 3% yards 36-inch challis, with ½ yard of silk for the trimming. The home drossmaker readily sees how easy it is to cut and make the dress with the aid of the cutling and construction guides. First, take the material and fold it in half on the sewing table. Place the back, collar and front, marked with triple "TTT" perforations on the lengthwise fold, The side front, cuff, side back, belt, lap and sleeve are laid on a lengthwise thread of material.

The belt may be laid on either a longthwise or crosswise fold of the goods.

The dress is trimmed with smoeking, which appears on each, side of the front and the collar and cuffs may be of contrasting material, if desired.


