Jefferson's Birthday.

One hundred and eighty-seven years ago this coming Sunday was born in Albemarle county, Virginia, a man who was destined to leave a remarkable imprint upon the lives of those with whom he was to be associated and upon the lives of future generations in this country.

Born in 1743, living until 1826, Thomas Jefferson was active during a period in world history which is perhaps the only rival in point of interest and achievement to the modern era.

Whether it was the time he lived that produced the man in Jefferson, or whether it was the man, in company with other men like him, who made the time, is hardly worthy of a guess; the fact remains that the opportunity for greatness presented itself and Jefferson for one took every advantage of it.

As it is he is remembered not so much as the third president of this country, an honor and an opportunity for service which is regarded as the highest, as he is as the founder of a great political party embodying the fine principles of government in which he believed.

The old Democratic party, founded by Jefferson, sustained by Jackson, Cleveland, and Wilson, is not the smoothly running political machine which can always win elections, but it is the party of principle and the party of the people and as such it will always be a fitting monument to the man whose birthday will be celebrated Sunday.

Drive Your Car

7. If you feel you've got to speed—do it where it won't kill anybody but yourself.
8. When making minor repairs stop where your car may be seen from both directions; otherwise you may stop longer than you anticipate.
9. Speeding around corners is a straight route to the hospital. Don't race past a street car. Some day the jury will call it manslaughter.
10. Use discretion. The fact that you have the right of way won't bring anybody back to life, least of all yourself.

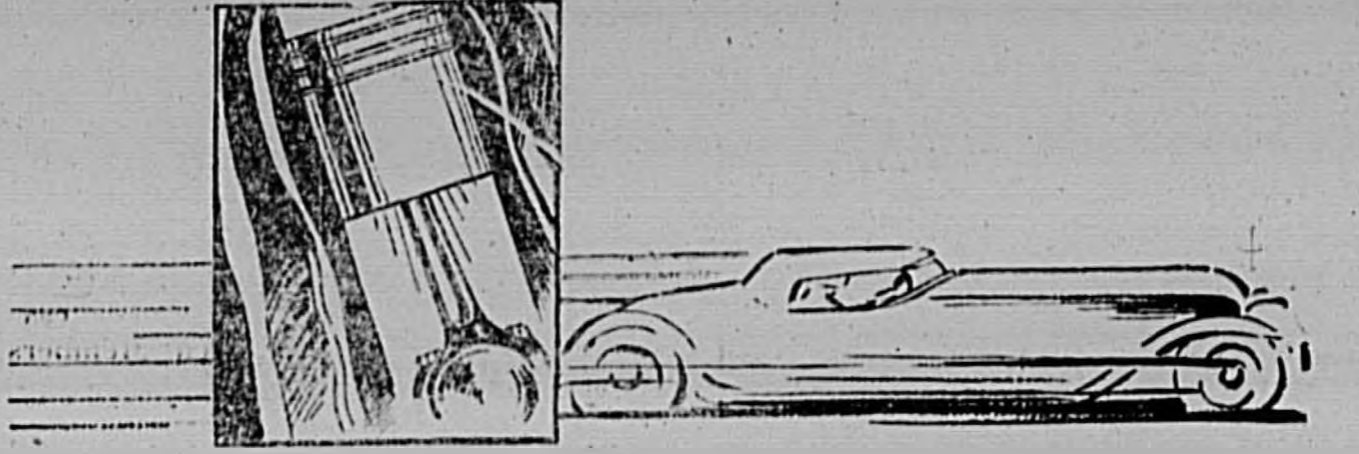

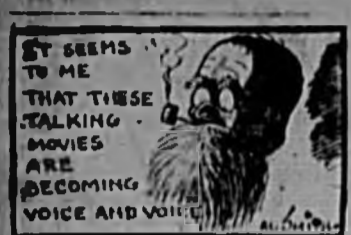
