### Half Of Year's Tobacco Crop Is Sold At Average Of 52.05 Cents

ATLANTA, Aug. 5—(AP) The pipe dreams of many a tobacco farmer in South Georgia and North Florida are coming true. Already nearly half the crop—50,440,292 pounds—has been sold for an average of 52.05 cents a pound. That's the highest average since the State Department of Agriculture began keeping records 22 years ago.

So with each passing day the sun-grown, blue cured golden leaf is stimulating farmers to visions of mortgage burnings, new clothes, new equipment and even, maybe, banks in the area as mortgages are being paid off rapidly and many a farmer in faded denim has led his wife and brood into stores for new outfits.

The market opened July 22 and the prospects of a short crop—around 100,221,000 pounds—plus a heavy demand for cigarette and cigar-type leaf drove prices to an opening day record.

Some bids went to 67 cents for the best leaf that day, but the offerings of some nondescript leaf brought the average down to 52.05 cents.

Even so, that was 12 cents a pound higher than the previous opening day and since then prices have held firm.

The price was so good, in fact, that one farmer from Virginia, Garnet Osborne of South Boston, loaded part of his crop in a plane and flew it to the market at Douglas, Ga.

So far little of the crop has gone under government loan at the support price of 43.9 cents a pound, which is 3.9 cents over the 1947 rate.

One of the reasons for the good prices is the fact that farmers in Georgia planted only 86,900 acres in tobacco this year, compared to the 107,000 last year. This acreage in 1947 produced some 50,000,000 more pounds than this year in Georgia.

Combined with Florida's total, however, the crop in 1947 was 169,730,021 pounds—the highest in history—but the price was only 37.65 cents a pound.

That was 5.15 cents under the 1946 price which established the previous record high.

Last year's collapse of the market was brought about by two factors, the size of the crop and the fact that Great Britain withdrew as a buyer to conserve

precious dollars.

Britain is the largest single foreign buyer on the Georgia Florida market.

This year Empire buyers were back on hand, but there is no estimate available yet of the size of their purchases. Even so, their very presence contributed to the bull atmosphere which dominated the warehouses from the outset.

## West Envoys Talk 3 Hours With Molotov

### Representatives Of Britain, France And U.S. Air Questions With Red Minister

MOSCOW, Aug. 6, (AP)—The United States, Britain and France gave their reply to the Soviet Union on the Berlin and other questions in a three-hour interview with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov tonight.

The three western representatives went at once to the American embassy after the meeting.

"We met with Molotov," said U.S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith. "No comment."

He juggled his briefcase from one hand to the other, obviously anxious to get to work with his colleagues.

All three envoys—Smith, Frank Roberts of Britain and Ambassador Yves Chataigneau of France—were non-committal as they left the Kremlin.

The Kremlin session was about an hour longer than the envoys' Monday night conference with Prime Minister Stalin.

Smith had arrived at the Kremlin first, followed by Roberts, who is secretary to British Foreign Secretary Bevin, and Chataigneau. These three had conferred with Stalin Monday night, seeking a basis for ending the Soviet blockade of Berlin and resolving other east-west differences.

The Kremlin conference started at 6 P. M. (9 A. M. EST). Stalin was not believed present at this meeting, which the western diplomats had sought with

## Smoke Bomb Is Hurling Into Men At Unis Plant

DAYTON, O., Aug. 6 (AP)—A smoke bomb was hurled today by National Guard troops patrolling the strike-troubled Unis Lens Co. plant.

Ten guardsmen hit the ground as the missile went off some 100 feet from the company grounds and failed to see the occupants of a car from which the bomb was tossed.

Col. George Schiele of the Ohio Guard said the bomb was government-made and commonly used to throw up smoke and cause confusion. It was wrapped in paper bearing the words "Warning" and "Explosive" and was contained in a corrugated box, the guard commander added.

City police joined guard leaders in hunting occupants of the car which sped away from the plant area after the explosion.

The National Guard totaling some 1,400 men was ordered to the Unis plant four days ago by Gov. Thomas J. Herbert after a series of picket line skirmishes. These involved CIO United Electrical Workers on strike and employees who sought to return to work at the plant, which was closed 91 days because of a wage dispute.

Unionists clashed with Dayton police during the picket line fighting and 11 union leaders were arrested on charge of violating orders against mass picketing.

## Studebaker Blasted As Irresponsible By Ewing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—Oscar R. Ewing said today he had planned to fire Dr. John W. Studebaker as U.S. Commissioner of Education but Studebaker "beat me to the gun" by resigning.

Ewing, Federal Security Administrator, accused Studebaker of irresponsibility. He said he decided about the first of this year that the education officer should be replaced, but was waiting on another man to decide whether to take the job when Studebaker quit several weeks ago.

Studebaker since has accused Ewing of poor administration and of blocking education office efforts to carry on an anti-Communist campaign in the nation's schools.

## BREAK FARBER PLANT FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 6 (AP)—

British and American authorities set out today to chop the giant I. G. Farben chemical cartel into small pieces. Their plans are intended not only to break up the billion-dollar trust, but to keep it that way.

One of the objectives of military government in the combined economic area is that I. G. Farben empire shall not be reconstituted, an announcement said.

## French Are Moving Families From Berlin

BERLIN, Aug. 6, (AP)—The French said today they are evacuating as many French families as possible from Berlin because of supply difficulties caused by the Russian land blockade.

An official statement denied reports, however, that French occupation troops or military government officials also are being withdrawn.

"No member of the French garrison has left his post," the statement said. "The strength of the garrison remains the same as it was a year ago."

## MacKenzie King Gives Final Talk To Party Leaders

### Canadian Head Declines Draft To Be New Minister

OTTAWA, Aug. 6, (AP)—Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King told Canada's National Liberal Party today in a farewell address that he cannot be drafted to continue as the party leader. He is resigning after 29 years in the job.

Addressing some 3,000 delegates to the National Liberal convention, King reiterated that he is quitting political life and intends to hand over the party leadership and his office of prime minister to the man chosen as his successor. He has been prime minister more than 21 years.

Turning to tomorrow's leadership balloting, the 73-year-old prime minister said:

"Let me make my position perfectly clear. Were my name to be placed in nomination tomorrow, I should have to request that it be withdrawn before the voting takes place."

The first caucus brought predictions last night that Louis St. Laurent, minister of external affairs, will be named leader of the party, perhaps on the first ballot.

If so, he will become prime minister. Under the Canadian system the leader of the party with the most seats in the House of Commons automatically gets the prime ministership.

St. Laurent's closest competitor for the job is James G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture. Before King's address today, some had suggested the convention might ask King to continue as leader if the St. Laurent-Gardiner fight became so bitter as to threaten party or national unity.

But King told the delegates: "Your duty tomorrow is to choose a successor to myself in the party's leadership. When your choice is made, I shall return to the party if the St. Laurent-Gardiner fight becomes so bitter as to threaten party or national unity."

His speech dealt mainly with the National Liberal Party and its progress in the years of his leadership. But he departed from his theme once to lash against Communism as "the greatest menace to our times." He called Communism destructive to the freedom of individuals and of nations.

King's resignation will carry with it the resignation of the entire ministry and will involve the formation of a new administration.

## Army Gives Engineers Construction Money

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—The Army gave its engineers \$3,525,100 today for special military construction at the secret guided missile center at White Sands.

It also allotted \$40,907,085 to bolster the nation's ramparts in Alaska, where a lack of housing has forced a delay in plans to increase ground force strength.

Funds for the New Mexico and Alaska projects were among top items in a \$412,700,000 expansion program announced by Secretary of the Army Royal. Of this total, \$151,000,000 was earmarked for Army and Air Force construction in 27 states and 10 overseas areas.

The Army Engineers also will spend \$229,000,000 during the fiscal year ending next June 30 on such things as equipment, maintenance and materiel operations. In addition, Congress gave them \$2,700,000 extra to continue work underway in Guam, Okinawa and Alaska—mostly housing.

## FALL WEATHER CHICAGO, Aug. 6, (AP)—

A large section of the country had a touch of fall today and night at the start of August, too.

U. S. Forecasters reported "cool, clear and fall-like weather prevails, except in the Mississippi valley where the temperature is in the 70s and 80s."

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## Senators Drop Probe Of Red Spy Activities

### Chairman Ferguson Says Administration Refuses To Issue Needed Information

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—Rep. MacDowell (R-Penn.) said today a "significant" amount of uranium metal, a "vital component" of the atomic bomb, was sent to Russia in 1945. In a House speech, MacDowell said these shipments were in addition to those he told the House Un-American Activities committee yesterday were made during "war years."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—Senators investigating Communist spy ring charges today suspended public hearings because they said the Truman administration refuses to give them necessary facts.

Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) of the Senate investigating subcommittee announced the decision. He made public also a refusal by Attorney General Tom Clark to supply official FBI records on William W. Remington.

Meantime, the House Un-American Activities Committee went underground for a secret meeting with a mystery witness in its own similar investigation.

A subcommittee was sent out of town to interview this witness at an undisclosed place. Rep. Joseph (R-SD), acting chairman of the full committee, said this man's testimony, together with other testimony already gathered, "will prove the existence of a Communist spy ring which reached high into the government during the war."

Clark's refusal to turn over the FBI records on Remington was done with an order from President Truman who denounced the Congressional hearings yesterday as a "red herring" intended to divert public attention from what he calls the refusal of the Republican-controlled congress to enact adequate anti-inflation legislation.

Remington, 30-year-old suspended Commerce Department official, was identified by Elizabeth T. Bentley as one of several government workers she says passed wartime information to her for a Communist espionage ring.

Miss Bentley testified she was a courier, traveling between New York and Washington.

## U.S. Continues To Pile Up Points In Olympic Meet

### Mrs. Draves Wins Diving Crown As Bob Mathias Cops Run

LONDON, Aug. 6, (AP)—A lithe, brunette beauty from Pasadena, Calif., Mrs. Victoria Manalo Draves made Olympic diving history today while another Californian, young Bob Mathias of Tulare, took a lead in the track and field's rugged decathlon.

The first track championships of the day, however, went to a pair of Europeans. Henri Eriksson of Sweden won the grueling 1,500 meter run, and Mrs. Fannie Blankers-Koen of Holland captured her third championship—the 200 meter dash—to become the first of her sex ever to accomplish that feat.

Mrs. Draves won the high platform championship to become the first woman ever to monopolize Olympic diving honors. She had captured the springboard event earlier.

The victory by the 23-year-old Vicki gave America its seventh gold medal in water events—five by the men, two by the women.

Eighteen-year-old Patricia Ann Elsener of San Francisco finished in the turner spot in the tower diving.

While a crowd of 60,000 gathered in the big stadium in a cold drizzle, the 17-year-old Mathias took a lead toward the honor of being the best all-around athlete of the 1948 games.

After seven events in the decathlon, with three to go, the hardy athlete led with 5,600 points.

He forged to the front on the strength of a mighty discus throw of 141 feet, 4 inches.

Floyd Simmons of Charlotte, N. C., who earlier in the day had wrestled the decathlon lead from Argentina's Enrique Kistenmacher, slipped back to fourth place after a discus toss of 107 feet, 4 1/2 inches.

Second place was held by France's Heinrich of France, with Kistenmacher third.

MIAMI, Aug. 6, (AP)—A Navy board of inquiry today studied the charred wreckage of a Navy transport plane in which 10 men were killed. Reports that there was a WAVE aboard, making the toll 11, later were found to be false, the Navy said.

The plane crashed and burned after a collision with a Stearman training plane 23 miles north of here late yesterday. The two occupants of the trainer parachuted to safety.

Nine of the victims were Navy personnel and the other was from the Coast Guard.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—The Communications Workers of America announced today that it will ask new wage boosts for 87,000 Bell Telephone workers this month.

CWA President Joseph A. Belms told reporters the 217,000 union members will be in a position to strike unless they get a wage increase, but he added:

### Senate Passes Bill To Assist Home Building

### Measure Contains No Low Rent Or Slum Clearance Section

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—Congress moved watered-down housing and anti-inflation legislation close to final action today, and Republican leaders laid plans to adjourn the special session tomorrow.

The Senate housing bill tomorrow "as is" and send it to the White House. It is possible congress may adjourn by 1 P. M. Saturday, Martin added. The Senate agreed to vote at 1 P. M. tomorrow on the anti-inflation bill.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the House today a compromise housing bill aimed at speeding small home building.

The measure contains no low-rent or slum clearance subsidies. Approval came on a voice vote after the chamber had voted 48 to 36 to substitute the measure for the Taft-Ellender-Wagner housing bill.

The Senate thus overrode its Banking committee which had approved the F.E.W. measure.

The F.E.W. bill would have provided for government aid in building public-owned low rent and slum clearance projects.

The housing action came after the Senate Banking Committee voted two major changes in the Republican anti-inflation bill as passed by the House yesterday.

The committee also approved the reimposition of restrictions on installment buying which the House had voted. It changed the effective date, however, from next Mar. 15 to June 30.

A proposal by Senator Capehart (R-Ind) to freeze all prices as of last midnight was lost on a five to five committee vote.

Chairman Tobey (R-N.H.) told reporters he does not know whether the committee bill has the approval of Senate Republican policy leaders.

Tobey offered a motion in the committee to give Mr. Truman the standby price and wage controls and allocation powers which he asked the proposal was voted down six to four.

Tobey said the entire House bill "falls far short of being an effective program to control inflation."

The installment buying curb is a general authority to the Federal Reserve Board to impose restrictions, which in wartime required a one-third down payment on such things as automobiles, home furnishings and appliances. The house had to be (Continued On Page Two)

Patrolman Sparks had attempted to arrest the negro for drunkenness at Sanford and Fourth Street late in the evening, when suddenly the negro whipped out a knife and slashed Sparks across the chest, cutting through his San Brown Belt which prevented a deep wound.

The latter also received a deep gash in his left hand which is still a bit stiff from the effects of the wound. To defend himself, the patrolman shot the negro through the abdomen.

Garvin was in the hospital for several months and later was placed in the County Jail.

BARTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—A Tampa psychologist today gave some support to Dewitt F. Rollins' contention that he was mentally incompetent to make a reliable statement for several days after his wife's slaying.

Dr. Samuel G. Hibbs said the experiences undergone by Rollins between May 16 and 20 might have made him mentally incapable of making a dependable statement May 20.

Miss Rollins, Winter Haven school teacher, was shot to death in the family automobile May 16. Rollins is charged with the first degree murder charge.

Several state witnesses have testified on May 20 while he was in jail Rollins said he and his wife quarreled, he tussled with her for a pistol and heard shots.

Dr. Clyde C. Frazier, pastor of the First Methodist Church at Winter Haven, testified he considered Rollins a "psychopathic case." He said Rollins was trying to climb the cell bars when he first saw him.

## FCC Proposes Fight Against Radio Prizes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6, (AP)—The Federal Communications Commission said today it proposes to crack down on radio cash prizes which appear to involve a lottery or to depend upon "lot or chance."

The action, the commission said in a statement, is prompted by "the growing number of 'money' programs on the radio."

The announcement called attention to that section of the Communications Act which says that no radio station "shall knowingly permit the broadcasting of any advertisement or information concerning any lottery, gift enterprise, or similar scheme, offering prizes dependent in whole or in part upon lot or chance, or any list of the prizes drawn or awarded by means of such lottery, gift, enterprise or scheme."

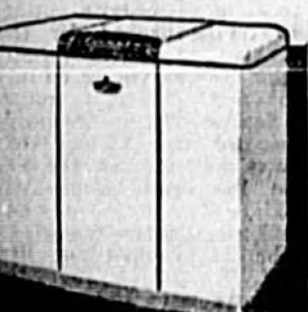

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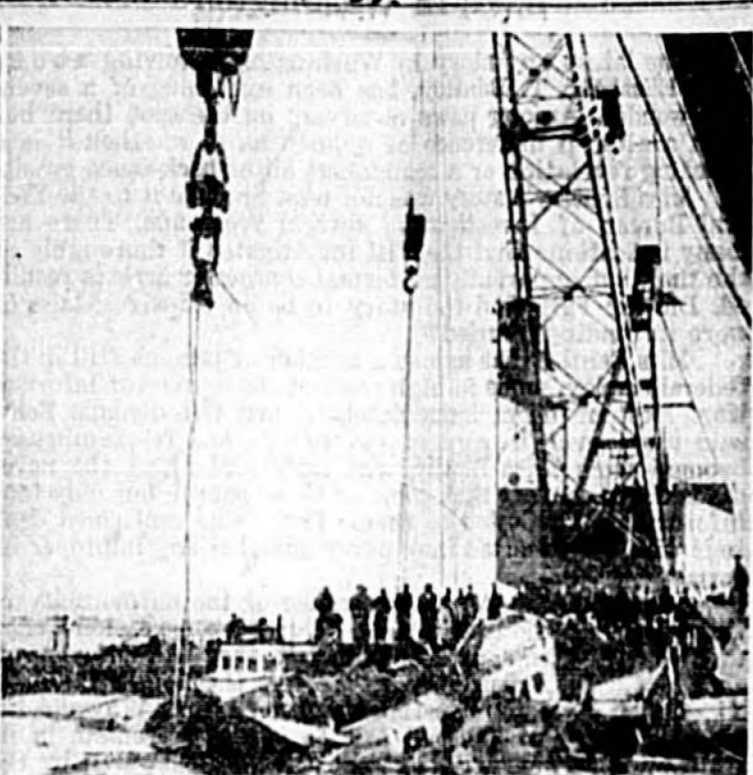

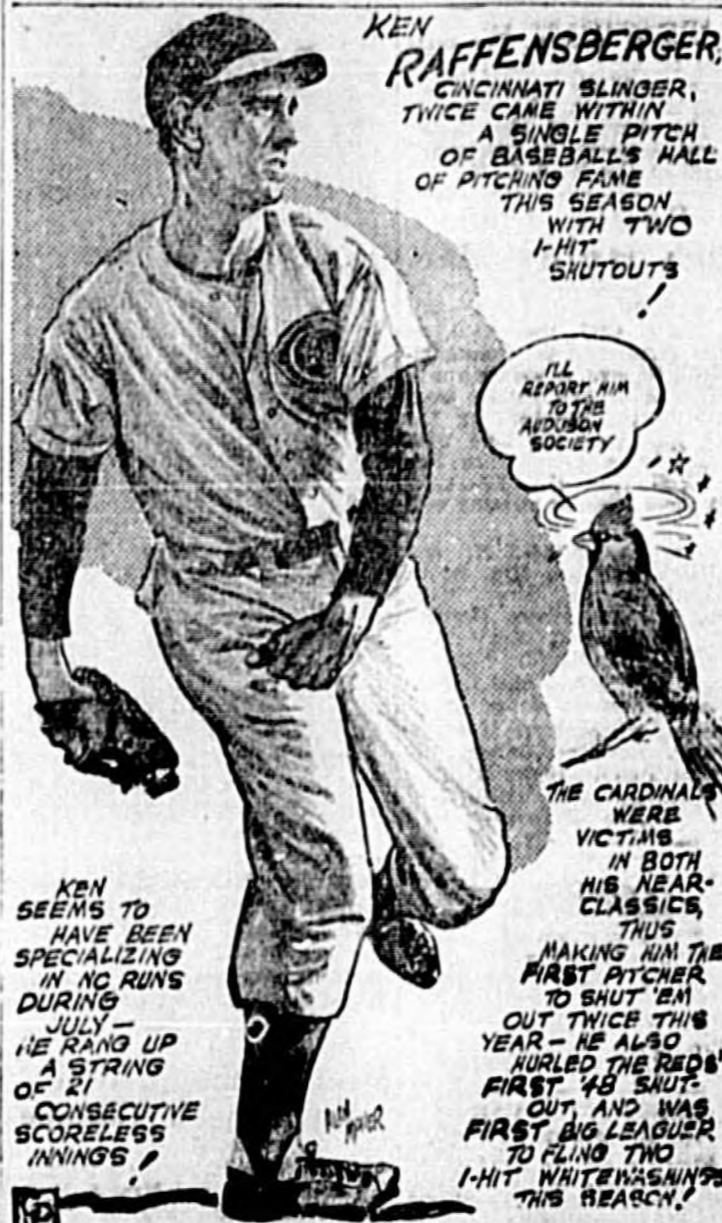

**Peasant Potatoes**  
 2 tablespoons fat  
 4 tablespoons finely diced onion (1 small onion)  
 1 tablespoon finely chopped green pepper  
 1 tablespoon finely chopped pimento  
 1 1/2 cups diced leftover boiled new potatoes (about 8 small new potatoes or 1/2 pound)  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 Dash of freshly ground pepper  
 Dash of paprika  
 Melt the fat over low heat; add the onion, green pepper, pimento and cook until partly tender, about 3 to 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the potatoes and sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Cook over low to moderate heat, stirring frequently, until potatoes are thoroughly hot and

very lightly browned, about 10 to 20 minutes. Serve immediately. 2 to 3 servings—recipe may be doubled.

Note: If new potatoes, used were boiled in their jackets, they should be peeled before dicing.

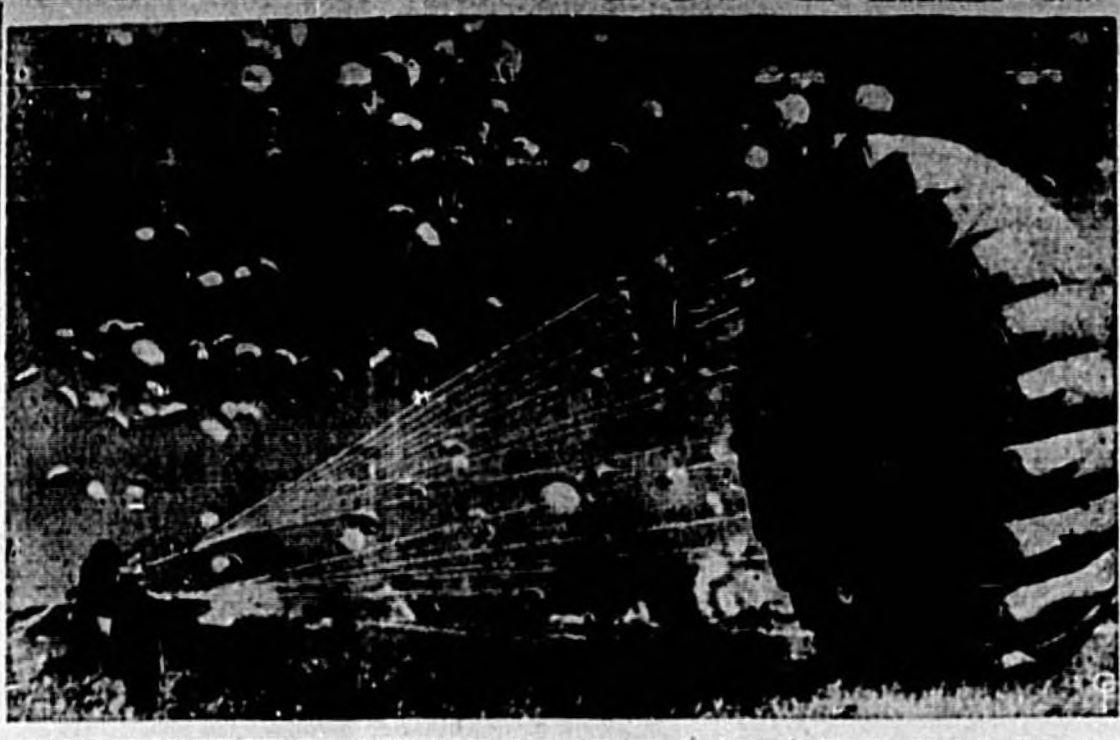
(Recipe for Starred Dish Follows)

**Deviled Tunafish**  
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon dry mustard  
 1/2 teaspoon paprika  
 1 cup milk  
 One 7-ounce can (1 cup) tuna  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 1 tablespoon finely cut parsley  
 1/4 to 1 cup (about 2 slices) soft bread crumbs  
 4 short sprays parsley  
 Melt 2 tablespoons butter or margarine in a saucepan over low heat; add the flour, salt, mustard

and paprika and blend quickly. Remove at once from heat. Add milk gradually, blending with whisk or back of wooden spoon until smooth, after each addition. Return to medium or high heat and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and bubbly. Reduce heat to low and allow to simmer 2 minutes longer to finish cooking flour. Remove from range, add tuna (including oil from can), lemon juice and finely cut parsley. Mix well, breaking tuna into flakes, but leaving some of it in larger pieces. Turn into 4 individual baking shells or dishes. Melt the remaining tablespoon of butter or margarine in clean saucepan or small skillet over low heat, add crumbs and stir until they are evenly coated. Sprinkle over tuna and place under low or moderate heat in broiler, about 4 inches from source of heat, so that crumbs do not get too brown before fish is hot. Watch closely. In about 7 to 10 minutes or so fish should be thoroughly heated and topped a beautiful golden brown. Garnish with parsley sprigs, tucking short stems into sauce. 4 servings.

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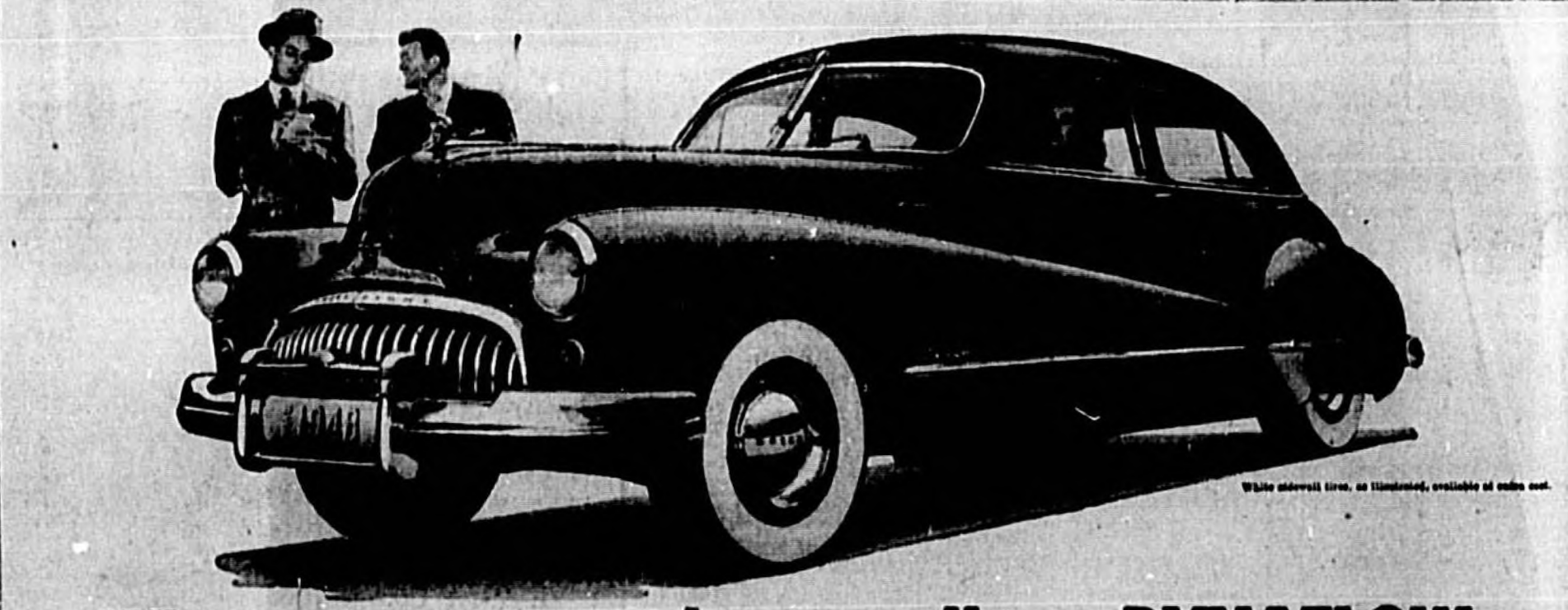

## Ex-Official Of Reds Denies He Violated Laws

### Perlo Takes Stand Before Board Probing Into Activities Of Espionage Ring

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Alexander Korol, London-born mystery witness in the Congressional spy hearings, refused today to say whether he was a Communist or knew a woman who claims she was a former Red agent. Korol appeared before the House Un-American Activities Committee. For the most part he fended off questions on grounds the answers might incriminate him.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Victor Perlo, accused of slipping wartime government secrets to Red spies, asserted today that he had "never violated the laws of interests of my country." He denounced the charges as "inventions of irresponsible sensation seekers."

Perlo took the witness stand before the House Un-American Activities Committee today to deny charges that he had "violated the laws of interests of my country."

Elizabeth T. Bentley, self-named ex-Communist spy, repeated her testimony that Perlo headed one of two groups of government officials, passing secrets to the Reds. And she said it is "extremely likely" that there were numerous other such groups.

Perlo refused, on constitutional grounds, to say whether he knew Miss Bentley or whether he ever was a Communist.

Rep. Mundt (R-SD) told reporters subpoenas will be issued for a Russian teacher and his wife who he said taught in a New York school for children of the United Nations.

## Local Health Unit Warns Sanfordites Of Trench Mouth

Local doctors and dentists are reporting quite a bit of "trench mouth," a germ infection of the gum and mouth, it was reported this morning by Dr. Frank Quillman, director of the Seminole County Health Unit.

The disease, about which so much was heard during World War I, is caused by direct or indirect contact and spreads rapidly, said Dr. Quillman. It is caused by Fusiform bacillus also by a spirochete, and its effects are sometimes confused with those of the diphtheria germ.

Infection may be spread by unsanitary drinking glasses or dirty spoons in eating places, he declared.

"Not all of the local restaurants are complying with the State Board of Health requirements as far as sanitation of the utensils is concerned," warned Dr. Quillman, and he urged the general public to help in this condition by requesting that the places in which they eat to meet the code.

"When customers see dirty cracked or chipped cups, they should tell the managers of eating places that they do not want to be served with these," he suggested.

The disease is apt to spread among those who live and work together. It may be caused by contact with dirty towels or by kissing, he revealed.

A first means of prevention keep the mouth clean, using the tooth brush thoroughly with dental preparation, also a mouth rinse of salt water, hydrogen peroxide or sodium perborate preparations that release oxygen, advised Dr. Quillman. He suggested also that the gums be massaged with the finger after brushing.

"A clean mouth is more resistant to the disease than a dirty mouth," he counseled, and said that tooth decay and old roots are factors in bringing on the disease.

## Dressing Room Is Built At PTA Park

A new concrete block dressing room has been added to the facilities at the Seminole County PTA sponsored swimming park at Lake Mary, according to H. R. Greer. In addition to the dressing rooms, the bench has been graded, and septic tanks have been installed.

"Funds are badly needed to complete the project of repairing the dock and to finish other small jobs at the park. I should think \$125 would be enough to do the work outlined," Mr. Greer declared, as he urged all interested citizens to assist in the project.

## Extra Session Granted Only Few Of President Truman's Requests

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—The White House remained silent today on President Truman's strategy for his next attack on the 80th Congress. While most Presidential advisers say Mr. Truman will sign the Republican housing and anti-inflation bills, he is expected to criticize them sharply as inadequate. White House Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told reporters only that anyone can draw his own inference from the President's "known attitude."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—President Truman asked the extra session of Congress to pass a trick sheaf of legislation. The lawmakers granted only a handful of his requests, and cut most of those to their own pattern.

Here's the score:  
Granted in full:  
UN loan—A \$65,000,000 loan to the United Nations to finance construction of a permanent headquarters in New York.

Granted in part:  
Anti-inflation legislation—Congress voted authority to the Federal Reserve Board to restrict installment credit and to tighten up on bank reserve requirements. (Mr. Truman has asked for broad anti-inflationary powers, ranging from price, wage and rationing controls to an excess profits tax on business. His recommendations included consumer credit controls and greater authority for the Federal Reserve Board to regulate "inflationary" bank credit.)

Housing legislation—Congress approved a bill providing limited federal aid for low-cost housing and large rental projects, but lacking the subsidized public housing and slum clearance provisions of the Taft-Elliender-Wagner Bill recommended by the President.

Progress reported:  
International wheat agreement—The Senate foreign relations committee approved the international wheat marketing agreement but left it for the next Congress to act upon.

Rejected or ignored:  
Civil rights—A 5-day filibuster prevented action on anti-lynch legislation, the only item on Truman's civil rights program called up during the extra session.

The great bulk of the President's anti-inflation program, including revival of the excess profits tax, regulation of commodity speculation, stronger rent controls, and rationing authority, price and wage controls, and authority to allocate scarce goods, were not included in the bill.

## Sayer Proposes 6 1/2 Mill Reduction In City Tax Rate

A millage rate of 21 1/2 on all real and personal property in the city of Sanford will be recommended by City Manager H. N. Sayer tomorrow night, following completion of a preliminary tax assessment roll on the basis of valuations established by J. M. Clemmishaw Company. The present millage rate is 28.

Mr. Sayer will also recommend a reduction of 25 percent in all valuations on personal property as appraised by the Clemmishaw company, but with no changes whatever in the valuations placed by the appraisal engineers on real estate.

The net effect of the new assessments and the proposed millage cut will produce some \$48,000 in additional revenue for the City, Mr. Sayer pointed out. The millage will be used for the construction of a new baseball field and club house, a waiver of rentals on airport facilities used by the New York Giants as an inducement toward the purchase of the Mayfair Inn, for the removal of the St. Johns River line dock, for the construction of a fill on the lakefront in connection with new docks and warehouses, and for other projects on which the City is committed.

According to the new assessment roll, the value of all Sanford real estate is appraised at \$10,932,110, an increase of 69 percent over 1947. Personal property assessments are \$3,509,801 representing an increase of 78 percent.

The 1947 tax rate was 28 mills, with 15 mills devoted to operating expenses and 13 mills for debt service producing a total revenue of \$199,281.44.

The City Commission is expected to consider Mr. Sayer's recommendations and the 1948-49 budget at a meeting at 8 o'clock tomorrow night.

## Sen. Taft Says President Has Inflation Curbs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said today that Congress gave President Truman all he needs to control a situation "Not likely to produce an extreme inflation of a depression."

Taft, Senate GOP chairman, said he now sees no need for any further legislation of consequence to combat high prices when Congress returns in January.

"By the time we get back," he told a news conference, "we may be trying to do something about deflation."

He made these other points to reporters and in a 2,000 word statement summarizing the work of the special session:

1. Mr. Truman is angry at Congress because of fundamental differences which "Can only be settled by a vote of the people at the November election."

2. Taft does not take seriously talk of a post-election special session in November, unless some grave unforeseen international development makes one necessary.

3. GOP election prospects "look very favorable."

4. Republicans are determined to change the Senate rules next year to control filibusters.

5. Mr. Truman is asking for price control and rationing powers to be taken down "the safety valve while you go on striking the furnace." Inflation Taft says, can be attributed directly to the war and to Administration policies of the last 14 years.

6. He will press next year for enactment of low rent housing and slum clearance legislation—features of the Taft-Elliender-Wagner housing bill which the House refused to pass, this year.

7. Taft said even before the (Continued on Page Six)

## Storms In Britain Leave 22 Dead And Property Damaged

LONDON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Week-end storms in Britain and France left at least 22 persons dead and considerable damage.

British crops were flattened, and a traveler sank, and cranes and port installations were damaged.

Damage at the French port of Brest alone was estimated at more than 100,000,000 francs (\$330,000). Several small boats and port installations were damaged.

Eight persons on a holiday drowned at Perra-Quire, in Brittany, when a fishing boat capsized. Rescuers saved five others aboard.

Another fishing boat was wrecked on rocks in south Brittany, drowning five crewmen. Two crewmen of a third fishing boat which ran ashore from Vannes were missing. A swimmer drowned in high seas off Henley.

Lakeland Fla., Aug. 9 (AP)—Women picketers trudged in front of meat markets here today urging housewives to buy no meat and from all indications their appeal was effective.

W. D. Schilling, a Lakeland Ledger reporter, visited five major meat markets to find either no customers or only one or two here and there. The meat counters, however, were full of pork.

Five pairs of picketers paraded during the morning in front of the markets carrying signs asking other view will take to the sidewalks in the afternoon.

Besides the picketers, women were busily telephoning meat buyers to keep away from the meat in about two-thirds of the tele-phones. Mrs. Black said names phone books had been called.

The picketing had a direct bearing on at least one market's meat prices. One market manager said he was selling for 59 cents a pound steaks that cost him 60 cents.

The drive for no-meat purchase will continue all week. A typical sign read "Leave the meat in clover while we put this over."

## Personal Income In U. S. Reaches Record

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—The personal income of Americans climbed to an annual record of \$241,900,000,000 in June, a record high, the Commerce department reported today.

Non-farm income rose by about \$100,000,000,000 at an annual rate above the level which had been almost constant the last six months. For the first half of 1948, average of personal income was at an annual rate of \$280,100,000,000. This compared with \$199,900,000,000 in the last half of 1947.

## Molotov Again Sees Envoys Of West Powers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall predicted today there will be more meetings in Moscow between Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov and representatives of the Western Powers. The Secretary noted that the Western ambassadors only an hour before had completed their third meeting with Molotov. They have been discussing the Berlin blockade and other east-west difficulties.

MOSCOW, Aug. 9 (AP)—Diplomats of the United States, Britain and France conferred in the Kremlin with Foreign Minister Molotov more than three hours today.

It was the third such conference in a week and was believed concerned with the Berlin blockade and other problems in the range of differences between the west and east.

The envoys left the Kremlin at 7:34 P. M. and went to the British embassy for another conference. Advisory staffs of all three missions were at the embassy awaiting their arrival.

All three envoys appeared to be in good spirits as they assembled at the embassy, just across the Moscow River from the Kremlin.

Observers said they believe Molotov gave them the Russian views on Western proposals set forth last Friday.

What they were, as well as the answers, remain to be seen.

U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith led the procession into the Russian seat of government at 4:50 P. M. He was followed by Frank Roberts, special British envoy and private secretary to Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin. (Continued on Page Six)

## Americans Protest Shots Fired Into Cars In Palestine

U. S. Consul General John J. MacDonnell has protested to the Jewish military governor of Jerusalem over shots fired at Americans and at cars flying the U. S. flag.

"There is no doubt that United States cars have been fired on in Jerusalem, and that the shooting has occurred six times in recent days," U. S. consular sources said.

Joseph M. Przewowski, Chester, Pa., a civilian consulate guard, was shot in the arm last week while driving to Kalanda airport for a flight to Cairo. The attack was reported in the New York Times.

## Large Cotton Crop Of 15,169,000 Bales Is Forecast In U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—A bumper cotton crop of 15,169,000 bales was forecast by the Agriculture Department today.

Such a crop would be the next largest on record. The top yield was 18,946,000 produced in 1937.

The 1948 indicated crop is 3,318,000 bales more than last year's crop and 3,155,000 bales more than the ten-year (1937-46) average.

The indicated yield of 317.5 pounds per acre is the highest on record, 14.6 pounds above the previous record of 298.9 pounds in 1941.

The Department said the unusually high yields in prospect are due not only to exceptionally favorable growing conditions, but also to increased use of fertilizer, and a larger proportion of the cotton acreage being planted in heavy yielding areas.

This is the first official forecast of the year. It is 3,318,000 bales more than last year's crop of 11,851,000 bales. Production for the 1937-46 period averaged 12,014,000 bales.

In a comparison report, the census bureau said 258,928 running bales of this year's cotton crop had been ginned prior to Aug. 1. This compares with 193,638 ginned to the same date last year and 171,641 to the same date two years ago.

The condition of the cotton crop on Aug. 1 was reported at 85 percent of normal. This compares with 78 percent a year ago and 76 percent for the ten-year average.

The indicated yield of lint cotton per acre was reported at 313.5 pounds, compared with 247.2 last year and 254.2 for the ten-year average.

## HIT-RUN DRIVING

DELAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—William Lester Jones, 38, died in a hospital here today of injuries received when he was struck by a hit-and-run driver near Seville Saturday night.
