"I heard very few people say anything but good things about Florida. The feeling that we have in this state that all northern investors are trying to hinder our development is wrong, and most of the business people of the north who have studied the situation in Florida are ready to do anything they can to overcome this feeling of distrust." "Generally speaking, I found business in the north very good and I believe business conditions in Florida will improve steadily in the next three months. I think that Florida will have as many visitors this winter as it has had in any year except the boom year when the state was overrun with land speculators."

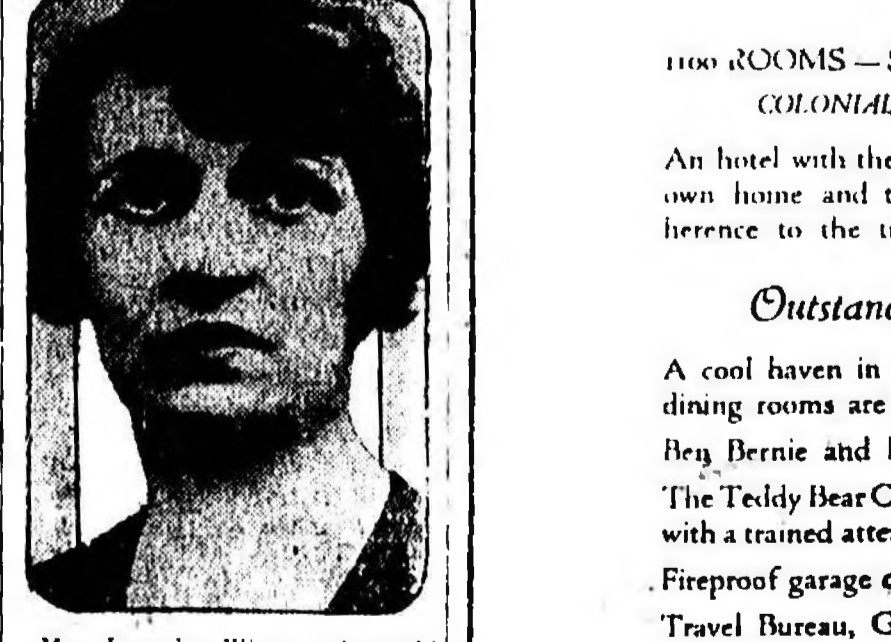
Texas Governor-Elect Will Ask Klansmen In Office To Resign

 "I am not opposed to the drainage act, but there are many things that I don't know. I will have to be enlightened more than I am now before I can do other than what I am doing." The resolution asking that the appeal be made was from the Overseas Chamber of Commerce and signed by J. C. Deen, president. Resolutions from other chambers of commerce in Seminole county, all asking for a Supreme Court decision, were also presented. One from the Longwood Chamber of Commerce, passed at a special meeting. The Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce also asked that an appeal be made. Public sentiment at Altamonte Springs was for an appeal. County Commissioner Evans claimed he had ascertained by talking to business men of that community. Commissioners Are Challenged L. A. Brumley, sitting in the courtroom, where the Commissioners held their meeting, asked that he be heard. He said he didn't know why the Commissioners should take it upon themselves to test the law when they were elected to uphold the law. The canal will be a great project for the county and city, he said. Mr. Brumley is a former chairman of the County Commissioners. Mr. Wheeler vainly attempted to answer Mr. Brumley's claim that he did not believe Mr. Brumley appreciated the position of the County Commissioners.  "One of them ran toward a little dressing room and tried to get out by the window. I followed her and started to run with her again toward the entrance door. Four or five fellows, rushing across the hall, knocked us down, I then tried to force the thin partition but failed. "I looked up the hall, and saw that the front of the place, near the entrance, was all ablaze. The spectators were huddled in a mass, clinging together in death-like grips, with horror and fright on their faces. "I tried once more to rouse them and shouting for them to follow I started to run, dashed through the flames, and flung myself down the burning stairway." With tears streaming down his face, Davis concluded. "Unfortunately, they did not move, and all perished."

election and the big 1928 election will be properly, not prohibition or any other issue. According to the Federal Reserve, with wages running from \$5 to \$20 a day, and profits running into millions a year for companies, it is in your own interest to support a year for complete prohibition, you can expect any great dissatisfaction with things as they are.

HOWEVER, HUMAN beings are not interested in their pocket-books. Other issues of prohibition is a big issue already. The world over, prohibition which might mean war and expenditures beyond those of the late war, is more important to the United States than high wages for bricklayers or additional millions for established millionaires.

SENATORS VOTING to put the United States at the mercy of the foreign judge, instead of establishing "reservations." The country should understand the meaning of "reservations," which most displeases Europe.

THAT RESERVATION forbids the United States to consider questions affecting the United States and the United States' control over war debts must be cancelled. It might, but probably would not, prevent the court from deciding that the Monroe doctrine is unimpaired.

WHY SHOULD this country put its interests into the hands of foreign judges, instead of remaining right? What do we gain by giving up our right to decide for ourselves? Why should we ask a foreign court to decide for us? The United States is a sovereign nation, and it should be able to decide for itself.
