

City selects Grieshaber for top spot

Sanford's new city manager brings legal, military background to the job

SANFORD — City Commission voted 4-1 Friday night to hire Al Grieshaber, Jr., of Albany, Ga., as Sanford's next city manager.

"I'm as excited as the rest of the Commission to bring him on board," said Mayor Brady Lessard. "I think we've brought in a city manager that will take this city to the final level. I join the community in welcoming the colonel to

Sanford." Grieshaber, who tentatively plans to begin his role as city manager Aug. 4, replaces Tony Vanderworp, who resigned in February. "He thinks outside the box and seems to

embrace accountability," said Commissioner Velma Williams. "He convinced me he can make difficult decisions. He realizes and appreciates community involvement," she added. "All four would have been great city managers, but

I voted my conscious."

Grieshaber is currently the city attorney for Albany, Ga., and retired from the U.S. Marine Corps as a lieutenant colonel.

Williams admits she had reservations about hiring a city attorney for the city manager position, but says that Grieshaber is the best individual for the job.

"When I come down here, I won't be the city attorney, I can assure you," said Grieshaber. "I see a lot of great assets in

Academy students learn early lessons in etiquette

Some people may not realize there's a proper way to place a napkin in their lap while eating. For those who aren't familiar with this simple etiquette "how to," don't fret. Just find a student from Lake Mary's Montessori Academy and ask them about manners that matter.

The academy's young pre-school students are currently learning about modern manners in a series of mini-etiquette camps taught by Maralee McKee, national etiquette columnist, certified etiquette consultant and founder of the Protocol School of Orlando. County's planning process may go online

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners will vote Tuesday on whether to hire the University of Central Florida to create an online program to assist residents in accessing parcel-based government information.

If approved, work on the online project, known as the Planning and Development Integrated Government Services System, would begin immediately.

The online service will allow users to submit and view the status of permits, gather information about parcels and perform other tasks related to planning and development, making the overall process faster and more efficient.

Due to the extensive amount of work involved in facilitating the program, the project will be divided into five phases. Completion of the entire system should take two years.

If approved, Commission will enter into an agreement for completion of phase one and two only, which includes the documentation of business processes and a technical evaluation. During this time, an audit of the county sys-

tems, a comprehensive assessment of customer service, and a redesign of planning and development work flow and business processes will be done.

These two phases make up 30 percent of the overall project and will cost an estimated \$150,000, which is currently available within existing account lines. Completion of this section will take approximately 12 months.

The partnership will benefit several departments within Seminole County, and will involve the property appraiser, the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, and UCF's colleges of engineering and computer science, and health and public affairs.

This item was originally brought before Commission in mid May at which time staff was directed to proceed with contract negotiations.

In other news, Commission will:

- Receive a briefing from the Metro Orlando Economic Development Commission (EDC) regarding current projects and events.
- Vote on whether to appoint

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Editor's note: No, it's not trick photography. The fellow in the picture by The Clock is Barry Troutman. I finally found a sucker, er, loyal reader, who would pay for a chance to write my column. Actually, Barry was the highest bidder at the Sanford Historic Trust's silent auction and reverse raffle held a couple of weeks ago. I plan on making this a yearly donation, so if there are any aspiring columnists out there (i.e. Carey "I.B." Ferrell), make sure you attend next year's auction to bid on a chance to become The Clock Keeper for a week.

In the coming weeks the Sanford City Commission will review the codes which set building and occupancy standards for Sanford's Historic District. Changes proposed by the Historic Preservation Board and recommended to the commission by the Planning and Zoning Board refine some definitions and standards but leave the codes pretty much as they were written 10 years ago.

While some residents complain about the approval process for paint colors, fencing and exterior changes, the fact is that many approvals are done administratively without appearance before the HPB. What many do not realize is that these codes have revitalized a declining neighborhood.

In the early '90s, renovating a house in the new Historic District was a bold investment. Nothing kept a neighboring property owner from subdividing a house and creating a weekly rental unit. Vacant houses became crack houses and the real estate paradigm was "rent as many apartments as you could and minimize property improvement."

In 1992, a handful of Historic Trust Members commissioned noted Community Planner Andrea Duany to study Sanford. The codes we have today, as well as the ideas for Riverwalk development, evolved from Duany's recommendations. With district support, Commissioner Lon Howell championed the codes through the City Commission. I don't believe Lon every lost a vote on district issues.

The resulting changes have been remarkable as demonstrated at last Saturday's neighborhood birthday party for Barbie Bauman. The neighbors assembled at the Kuhn residence, which when the codes were enacted was a cluster of four buildings with a total of 11 apartment units. Kuhn's have renovated three of the four buildings as their home and apartments for their daughters. With the girls gone the only center is a local character named Ping (proving that one editor is worth at least 11 weekly renters).

Five years ago the party site was the weekly rallying point for Citizens on Patrol, a group of 40 or 50 neighbors who patrolled the streets 24/7 in an effort to reduce crime. We had trouble getting the Sanford police to attend those meetings. Ultimately, our efforts did less to reduce street crime than to illuminate Sanford's policing crisis. I'm pleased to report that Chief Brian Tooley and his wife, Mindy, were celebrating with our neighbors Saturday night. Chief Tooley and his "new police force" have made a tremendous difference for the district and the city in general.

Saturday night Larry Dale was on stage singing "Rocky Top" and County Commission Chairman Darryl McLain was chatting with neighbors. However, the remarkable fact was that all those present had not only invested their savings to improve at least one property within the District, but had also volunteered their time to make the district and Sanford a better place to live. All this not a result of tax dollars or tax incentives, but of private investment protected by a reasonable set of building preservation codes.

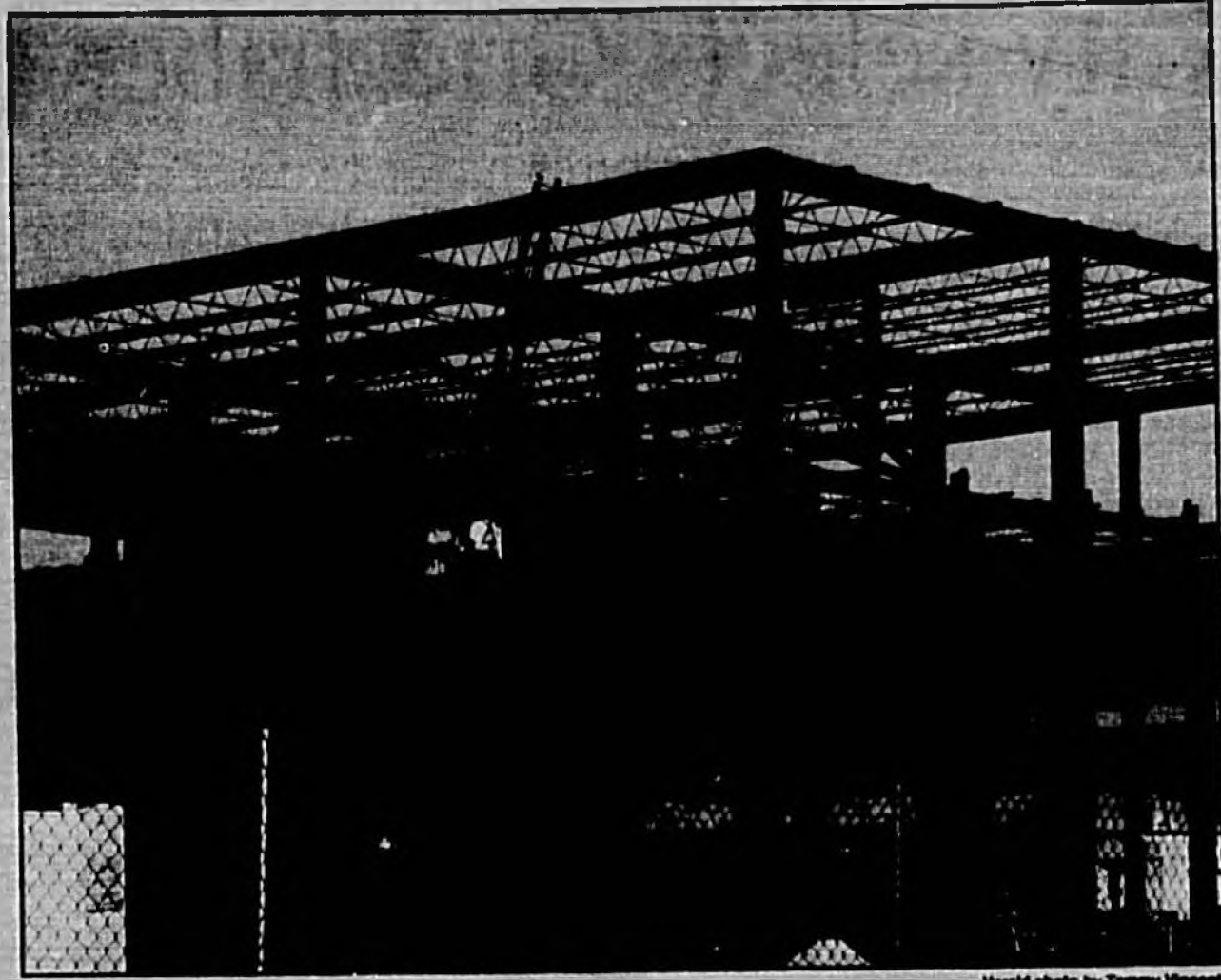
So as the city commissioners sit down to review proposed changes to the Historic Codes they should know above all else that the current codes have worked wonders for our community. With current codes in place, the future of the neighborhood remains bright, tax revenues are up in the district, and homeowners are enjoying annual double-digit percentage increases in property value. The desire for continued community improvement remains high among our neighbors who have demonstrated their willingness to back their dreams for the future of Sanford by volunteering to get the job done.

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
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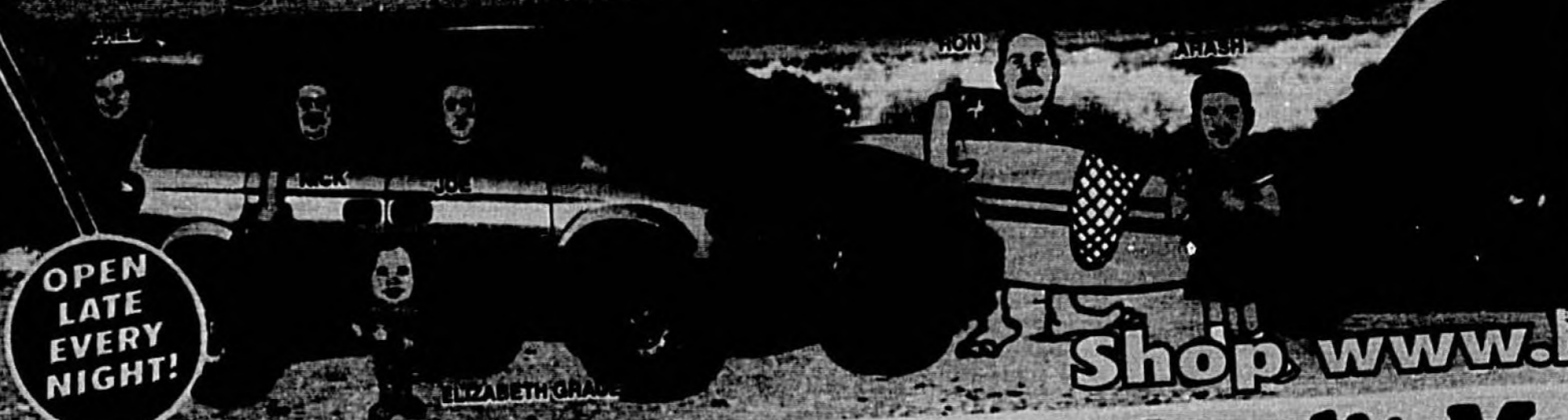

people how to serve a formal meal for 12 with maid service. Today's etiquette is about acceptable everyday public behavior such as using a cell phone or how to behave at the movies.

Since etiquette doesn't change depending on age, McKee said children can begin learning about proper manners from a very early age. As they grow, they build upon what they have already learned, increasing their self-confidence in social interactions, especially during a time when wanting to fit in is very important to them.

Along with building self-confidence, learning proper social behavior as a child also creates good character and habits, McKee said.

"It's just so much easier to teach young children the right way to do things rather than break them of a bad habit later on," McKee said. "We want our children to be known as patient, other-centered, trustworthy, honest and kind. That's why we must teach them etiquette because it's the tool that is used to express these character traits."

The year-by-year timeline for manners starts with the most simple of etiquette skills.

At age 4 or 5, children should be saying "please" and "thank you," with a little reminding. They should also begin drawing thank you pictures and know how to put their napkin on their lap.

As children grow older, their social skills should evolve. For example, children should sign their thank you picture by 6 or 7; and by age 10, they should be writing their own thank you notes.

As for the proper way of placing a napkin in your lap, Montessori Academy student Katie Scholl can tell you how it's done. "The fold should face your tummy," she said.

Sanford. I believe in building the community from within and getting involved in civic organizations. I believe in being visible and getting the community together."

Grieshaber beat out a total of 89 applicants for the city manager position, including the other three finalists, James F. Coleman of Lady Lake, Danny Crew of Gastonia, N.C., and James Ross O'Connor of St. Charles, Mo.

"I'm proud and pleased and privileged to have this opportunity," said Grieshaber, whose 12-year-old daughter, Liz, will begin school here in the fall. "I'm very excited."

Commissioner Randy Jones, disagreed with his counterparts, voting for O'Connor, instead.

Crew, however, seemed to be the front runner after the conference call interviews earlier in the month, but the tables turned when Commissioner Art Woodruff visited Gastonia, N.C.

While on the site visit, Woodruff conducted interviews with city officials and business associates and reported the overall feel of the city to commissioners Wednesday evening during a work session.

According to Woodruff, several red flags were raised about Crew's performance during his stint as the city's manager.

"I heard he wasn't as gung-ho as council on the downtown

redevelopment in Gastonia," said Woodruff. "Also, I was also told that once he has the facts and a decision is made he doesn't want to continue discussions. He's not interested any more."

According to Woodruff, the most disturbing of the allegations is that Crew, according to those interviewed, would not give the same information to all the council members.

The Gastonia Chamber of Commerce refused to discuss Crew with Woodruff and, according to Woodruff, it seemed as if several members of the council didn't want Crew as a city employee any longer.

"I don't feel this had any influence on the final vote," said Williams. "It didn't phase me one way or the other. I was concerned with the personal interviews."

Woodruff did, however, announce during Friday night's meeting that after speaking with several other people in Gastonia, his concerns were no longer justified.

This, however, was not the biggest upset of the week. It was discovered on Tuesday that Coleman apparently lied on his resume, which stated that he had been the assistant city administrator in Longwood and that he served "in the role" of DeLand's assistant city manager. However, neither position existed at the time Coleman was on the cities' payrolls in the 1990s.

"It's embarrassing to me for us

to come up with a list of finalists and employment verification has not been checked," said Williams. "As a commissioner, I believe I should be able to assume certain things. I feel I should have been able to assume that this was checked out."

According to Joe Denaro, the city's human resource director, reference checks were completed, but only included the individuals listed on the candidates reference list. Verification of employment, or an employee reference check, was not seen as a concern.

"This should have been done when we got the short list," said Jones.

Commissioner Kevin Hipes agreed, stating, "This should have at least been done before we flew anyone in."

Coleman, however, arrived with the remaining three candidates for Friday's interviews.

After the votes were tabulated, he was last on the list, with O'Connor second and Crew third.

According to Commission Andrew Van Gaale, a project manager in the city's community development department, will continue in the role of interim city manager until Grieshaber is able to take over. Former Deputy City Manager Roger Dixon also filled in before he resigned earlier this month.

Both Dixon and Van Gaale applied for the job, but failed to make the shortlist of candidates.

The fishing in East Central Florida is heating up.

If you want some rod bending action take a little trip out of Port Canaveral. All you need to do is run out a few miles and locate bait pods to find tarpon, cobia and sharks. The tarpon are following bait and are really attacking. Live pogies are the preferred bait. Usually you can cast net your own bait.

It is best to rig with heavy tackle such as a Shimano 6500 Baitrunner with 20-pound test main line and an 80-pound shock leader with a Daiichi #/0 Bleeding Bait circle hook. One little trick that tarpon can't resist is to add two pogies on the hook so they fight each other. It is an awesome way to sight fish.

You will also find cobia and sharks in the bait pods. No matter which species you hook it will be a blast. Inshore fishing is heating up each day.

Tuesday was an exceptional day for redfish. While poling the Hell's Bay Guide 18 along the flat about 100 redfish tails were waving high. It was quite an awesome sight. My angler Paul DeBrow and I landed 9 out of 11 reds with the largest weighing 16 pounds. Thursday produced four more reds for my dad as we landed a 28-pound fish along with a few smaller fish.

The small trout have been starting to turn on and some GATOR trout are being landed. Next week should be real productive with the new moon. The best bait for trout continues to be the Rip Tide 3-inch Mullet and the Rip Tide 5-inch Flats Chub jerk bait. Hopefully the weather will straighten out for the weekend.

tion and outreach, monitoring commercial and recreational catch quotas and issuance of seafood dealers and commercial fishing licenses.

Robson has served as the FWC's South Region director for five years with administrative oversight for 10 counties, including Palm Beach, Broward, Dade, Monroe, Hendry, Collier, St. Lucie, Okeechobee, Martin and Glades.

"As South Region director, Mark has helped coordinate several major agency issues, including the Tortugas Ecological Reserve, Biscayne National Park Fishery Management Plan, marine life feeding, Everglades restoration and Lake Okeechobee," Heller said.

The new marine fisheries division director has spent his entire professional career with the agency, beginning as a wildlife biologist in the Big Cypress Wildlife Management Area (WMA) east of Naples and later as lead biologist at the J.W. Corbett WMA.

Robson became the first South Region nongame wildlife biologist in 1985 and spearheaded the first attempts to systematically monitor and manage a variety of species not normally hunted. These species account for 97 percent of all wildlife.

He earned a bachelor's degree in wildlife management from the University of Maine and a master's in wildlife ecology from the University of Florida. He has published a number of articles in professional journals and is a member and past-president of the Florida Chapter of the Wildlife Society.

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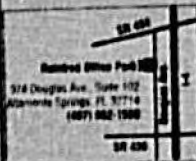
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The Way We Were: Remembering The Pig 'n' Whistle

The Sanford Museum has been looking for a picture of the Pig 'n' Whistle for several years, and finally one has been found!

Billy Robinson came up to me after Buck Metts' funeral in May with the information that his grandfather, James Bryan, had built the Pig 'n' Whistle here in 1948 and that he had the original barbecue sauce recipe. I immediately asked if he had a picture, and he did.

A few days later, Billy came down to the Sanford Museum while I was there, bringing the picture and the recipe. We reminisced about the Pig and I received further information.

Billy's grandfather, Jim Bryan, had been born in Orlando and later moved to Georgia where he built the first Pig 'n' Whistle in Macon, Ga. Later he built others in the South; the Sanford one in 1948.

Jim's daughter, Joyce Bryan Robinson, and her son Billy moved to Sanford in 1948 to be near her parents. Billy entered third grade at Southside Primary and later graduated from Seminole High in 1958.

For those who don't remember the Pig 'n' Whistle, it was located on the southeast corner of 25th Street at Park Avenue. In front of the building you see picture, there was a large parking lot which at certain times was filled with cars wanting curb service. There was also an inside dining room. For the first few years, the barbecue pit was outside by Park Avenue, which was Highway 17-92 at the time.

Many of you will recall the delicious barbecue sandwiches and also meeting friends in the large parking lot. It was one of the three places teenagers cruised while looking for their friends in the 1950s. The other two were Angel's Eat Shack and McReynolds Drug Store.

When Billy was 13 years old, he was paid \$2.50 per night to wipe the trays from the curb service and other odd jobs. One night two beverage agents ordered two bottles of beer and Billy opened them. The agents asked if he was 21 and since he wasn't, they told him to leave immediately. Two rookie policemen, Ben Butler and Joe Hickson, happened to be there as customers and took him home. The restaurant was fined \$50, and Billy's career at the Pig was ended.

During my conversation with Billy, it was learned that his great grandfather, J.L. Bryan, had moved to Orlando circa 1875 where he served as deputy clerk and was one of Orlando's first mayors (1880-84). He was also a county judge.

Billy Robinson graduated from Seminole High School in 1958 and was married to the late Ann Davis, daughter of J.C. and Lillian Davis. Ann had

worked for many years at Central Florida Regional Hospital. Billy is retired from J.C. Penney's and is a member of All-Souls Catholic Church.

Billy's mother, Joyce Bryan Gustavson, continues to live in Sanford as does his aunt, Grace Bryan Garhade. Billy's two sisters are Patricia Pauska and Mary Ward.

The Pig 'n' Whistle was sold in the early 1950s to Harry Tooke and John Ivey. John Capko owned it when it was closed circa 1976. A bank building was built on the property a few years later.

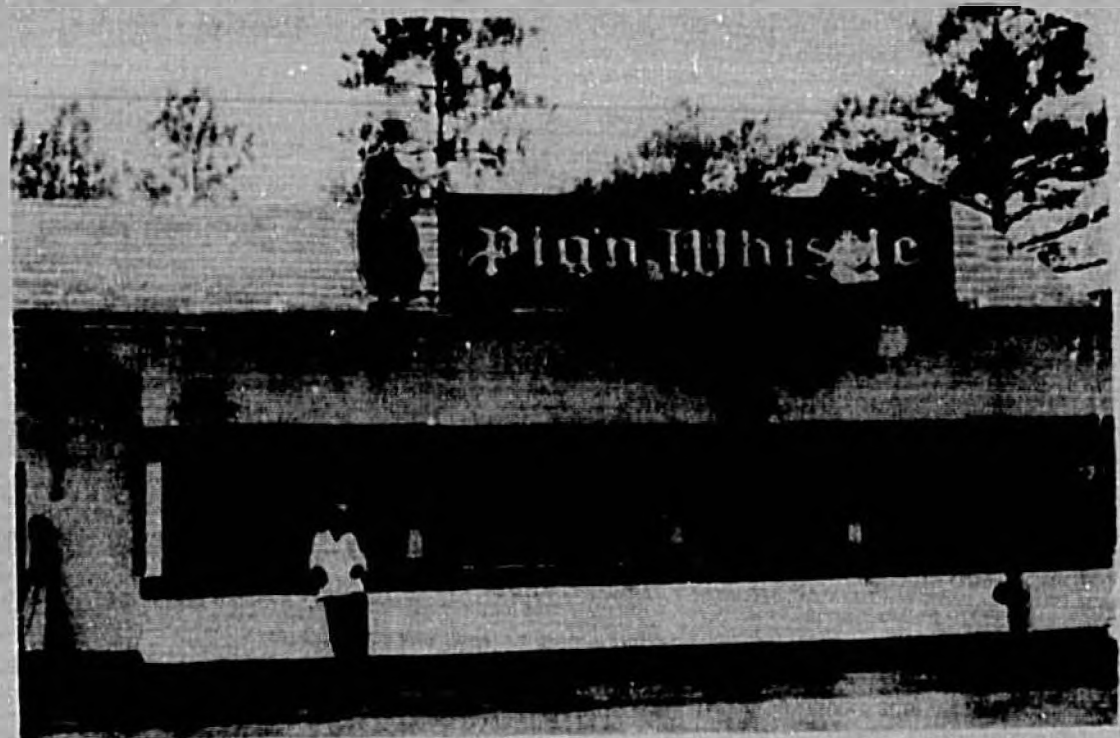
Celery Fed Reunion Revialted

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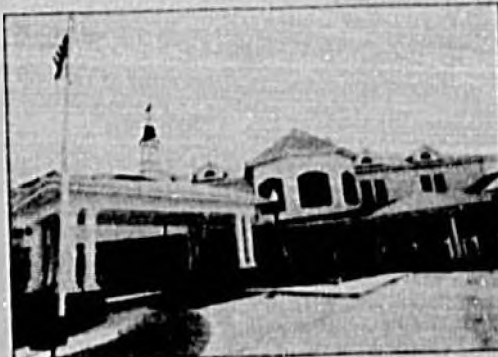

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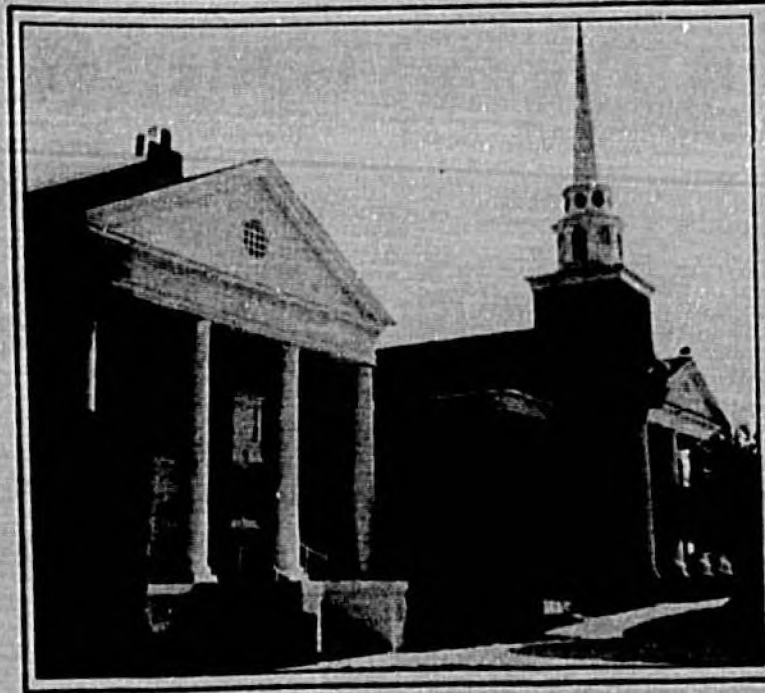

Daniel "Jumpman" Jackson, the 6-foot-6 forward who thrilled crowd with his jumping ability and defensive prowess, has signed with NCAA Division II power, Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina.

Jackson averaged 11 points, 8.3 rebounds, 4.2 steals, and 1.8 blocks per game e, while shooting 50-percent from the floor this season and was named to Mid-Florida All-Conference Team.

The local historian is bringing back the days of sideshow extravaganzas to Seminole County as part of his "Central Florida's Era of Big Circuses and Carnivals," exhibit currently at the Museum of Seminole County History. The display is a glimpse back to a time when children and adults paid pennies to see such oddities as Alligator Man and the Diva.

Carlson's display is the first of many traveling exhibits planned for the museum's new Agricultural Exhibit Building, which opened last month. Dozens of students have already visited the new facility, many who can't make up their mind whether the alien body on display — the one that the government doesn't want you to know about — is authentic.

"After touring the museum, the students may not remember what General Sanford did, but they remember the alien body," Museum Specialist Karen Jacobs said. "It's up to them to decide if it's real or not. For some, it's a tough decision to make."

For people who want to see the extraterrestrial for themselves, the museum is located at 300 Bush Blvd. The facility is open to the public Tuesday through Friday from 9 a.m. to noon and Tuesday through Saturday, 1 to 4 p.m. For more information, call the museum at 407-665-2489.

Children's homework shouldn't dominate their downtime

QUESTION: How do you feel about homework being given by elementary schools? Do you think it is a good idea? If so, how much and how often?

'Focus on Family'

DR. DOBSON: Having written several books on discipline and being on the record as an advocate of reasonable parental authority, my answer may surprise you: I believe homework for young children can be counterproductive if it is not handled very carefully. Little kids are asked to sit for six or more hours a day doing formal class work. Then many of them take a tiring bus ride home — and guess what? They're placed at a desk and told to do more assignments. For a wiry, active, fun-loving youngster, that is asking too much. Learning for them becomes an enormous bore instead of the exciting panorama that it should be.

Excessive homework during the elementary school years has the potential of interfering with family life. In our home, we were trying to do many things with the limited time we had together. I wanted our kids to participate in church activities, have some family time, and still be able to kick back and waste an hour or two. Children need opportunities for unstructured play — swinging on the swings and skipping rocks and playing

with basketball. Yet by the time their homework was done, darkness had fallen and dinner time had arrived. Then baths were taken and off they went to bed. Something didn't feel right about that kind of pace. That's why I negotiated with our children's teachers, agreeing that they would complete no more than one hour per night of supervised homework. That was enough!

Homework also generates a considerable amount of stress for parents. Their kids either won't do the assignments or they get tired and whine about it. Tensions build and angry words fly. I'm also convinced that child abuse occurs at that point for some children. When my wife, Shirley, was teaching the second grade, one little girl came to school with both eyes black and swollen. She said her father had beaten her because she couldn't learn her spelling words. That is illegal now, but it was tolerated then. The poor youngster will remember those beatings for a lifetime and will always think of herself as "stupid."

Then there are the parents

who do the assignments for their kids just to get them over the hump. Have you ever been guilty of doing that? Shame on you! More specifically, have you ever worked for two weeks on a fifth-grade geography project for your 11-year-old — and then learned later that you got a C on it? That's the ultimate humiliation!

In short, I believe homework in elementary school should be extremely limited. It is appropriate for learning multiplication tables, spelling and test review. It is also helpful in training kids to remember assignments, bring books home and complete them as required. But to load them down night after night with monotonous bookwork is to invite educational burnout.

In junior-high classes, perhaps two hours of homework per night should be the maximum. In high school, those students who are preparing for college must handle more work. Even then, however, the load should be reasonable. Education is a vitally important part of our children's lives, but it is only one part. Balance between these competing objectives is the key word.

Pindo palm hardy enough for Florida landscapes

Pindo palm, natural of central and southern Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay, is one of the hardiest palms used in Florida landscapes. The slow growing palm has very attractive feathery leaves that curve in toward the trunk and have a distinctive blue-gray color.

The palm is not only a good ornamental plant but produces delicious edible fruits that ripen in the summer. The fruits are often used to make a good tasting jelly that gives this palm the common name of jelly palm. The fruits are sometimes called pindo dates.

The Plant

Pindo palm is slow growing plant with a heavy, stucky trunk with persistent leaf bases. The mature palm height is about 15 to 20 feet tall and a spread of 10 to 15 feet. The feathery fronds are about 4 to 6 feet long and individual leaflets about 2.5 feet long and have slender, fibrous spines on the margins of the leaf stem.

The leaves tend to curve toward the trunk and have a characteristic blue-gray color.

The floral structure is formed late in the spring and very showy. The individual flowers are creamy yellow to reddish in color and separated male and female flowers grow in the same inflorescence.

The fruits mature in the summer, are about one inch long and yellow to orange in color.

The fruit is edible and very tasty.

Culture

Pindo palm can be grown in full sun or partial shade, on a wide variety of well drained soils. Palms growing in dry infertile soils tend to be smaller and with smaller leaves. The palm can survive hot windy conditions as well as freezing temperatures.

This palm is easy to grow, inexpensive and readily available at nurseries. Use a palm special fertilizer 4 to 6 times a year, applying 1 to 2 pounds of

fertilizer per application, minor element deficiencies of iron and manganese can appear in soils with high pH. Maintain a relative good soil moisture conditions for better growth of the plant.

They will benefit from a 2 to 3 inches deep of mulch to help maintain soil moisture and temperature. Propagation is by seeds that take many months for germination. Trees grow successfully in urban areas where air pollution, poor drainage, compacted soil, and drought are common. This palm can be cross pollinated with the queen palm to form hybrids and the resulting plants will be intermediate in morphology and hardiness in comparison to the parents.

Use

Pindo palm can be used in parking lot islands, recommended for buffer strips around parking lots or for median strip plantings in the highway.

Use near a deck or patio, as a specimen tree, residential street tree and why not, a fruit tree that can be used by wild life

such as squirrels and other mammals or for human consumption. A wine can also be produced from the fruits of this palm. They can be planted beneath power lines due to their slow growth and relative small size.

Pests

This palm is susceptible to Ganoderma butt rot, a serious fungus disease that destroys the base of the trunk, slowly killing the plant. Infected plants will develop symptoms that can be described as a "closed umbrella" and a fungal structure called "Conk" will appear near the base at the side of the trunk. There is no cure for this disease and palms replanted in the same location will develop the same disease. Other pest problems are caused by the palm leaf skeletonizer and scales.

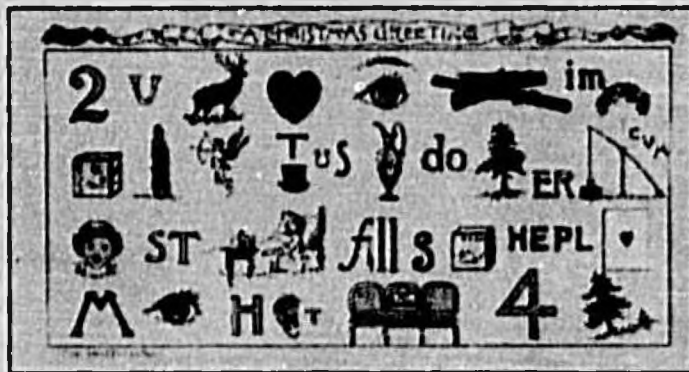

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons corn flour
- 200 ml orange juice freshly squeezed and strained
