President Urges 'Economic Restraint'

Business, Labor WASHINGTON (UPI) President Johnson served notice on business and labor today that he might have to request higher taxes to curb inflation unless they keep the lid on prices and wages. He told Congress in his annual economic message that keeping the economy from overheating in the face of the Vietnam buildup and the business boom is the "most serfous economic challenge" fac-

Johnson predicated that unemployment will fall below four per cent this year, the lowest since 1953, while the value of the nation's output of goods and services will soar to a record \$722 billion.
