# **Brantley** Honored; Graham Is Speaker

The Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce honored outstanding members of the community and the chamber Saturday night at its eighth annual awards banquet, at which Gov. Bob Graham was keynote speaker.

The event, held at Lord Chumley's Restaurant in Altamonte Springs, was attended by 250 members and guests. Graham stressed a strong commitment to improving Florida's economic base by encouraging and actively seeking new industry to provide jobs.

He also explained what he considers to be the benefits of his proposed halfcent local-option sales tax to bolster local governments by providing them with additional revenues for necessary services.

Graham estimated Seminole County could generate some \$5.6 million in annual revenues from a half-cent sales tax.

He said 30 percent could be earmarked for combating crime and maintaining and expanding the county Jail, while the remaining 70 percent would be divided among the cities based on population.

In some cases, Graham said, the amounts raised through the half-cent sales tax would be equal to about 75 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation in property taxes.

D-Altamonte Springs — are in Tallahassee today working together to get the best possible reapportionment have had a district comprising the plan for state House districts for the county.

A bipartisan committee of county civic and political leaders met with the two legislators Sunday afternoon to urge them to work together. And the committee approved in concept a modified Hattaway-Brantley plan to keep as many municipal boundaries as possible intact in each of the two county districts.

Brantley's proposal could not be immediately approved with district lines. when it was found that the Longwood legislator had included both his and Hattaway's homes in the same district.

Former State Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. urged changing the Brantley modification so the two representatives would not have to run against each other. "We don't want them to run against each other. We want them both representing us," he said

Brantley noted that the new district lines as he had drawn them had not been checked for mathematical preciseness and would have to be run through the computer in Tallahassee.

Hattaway and Brantley said the computer was all tied up this morning and could not be used to solve local problem until later today.

While Altamonte Springs Mayor Ray Ambrose said he personally could agree that the district boundary lines within Altamonte Springs could be split to exclude Hattaway from the Brantley district, the official city position is to keep the city boundaries intact within a district.

However, Altamonte Springs City Commissioner Dudley Bates said, "It is incumbent upon us to be pragmatic if we must compromise in Altamonte Springs. I personally could come to grips with splitting the city between Brantley and Hattaway,"

## Day Care Vs. Defense Funding: **Grant Eyed For Spending Study**

Phoebe Carpenter thinks tax dollars invested in day care is a better investment than the same money spent on national-defense weaponry.

Mrs. Carpenter is administrator for Community Coordinated Child Care for Central Florida (4-C's), a non-profit organization designed to contract local day-care centers using state and federal money to finance child care for mothers who would otherwise be on welfare.

Operating on a budget of \$5 million annually, 4-C's also receives some funding from Seminole, Orange and Osceola, the three counties it serves.

Hoping to back up her theory with statistics, Mrs. Carpenter is seeking state grant money to pay Employment Research Inc. to study spending tax dollars on on day care vs. tax dollars for defense. The Lansing, Mich.-based consultant is known for its studies on the economic impact of federal policies within a community, she said.

Exactly what the study will cost depends on whether the state accepts grant applications in the full amount from Osceola and Seminole counties. A

for former welfare recipients and for mothers who would otherwise qualify for

training for a job. In Seminole County; 4-C's currently works with 22 day-care centers under contract. There are 100 centers contracting with 4-C's in Orange, Seminole and Osceola Counties serving approximately 4,000 children, Mrs. Car-

penter said. As opposed to some states, such as Pennsylvania, that use state and federal funds to operate day-care centers, 4-C's contracts private day-care centers with tax dollars. The savings are considerable, Mrs. Carpenter said.

Pennsylvania spends anywhere from \$3,500 to \$10,000 annually on each child in its day-care program. Mrs. Carpenter said 4-C's provides equally good childcare services by contracting with private centers, spending approximately \$1,300 per child annually.

- range for the amount of potential grant care for the poor through an agency like money is between \$18,000 and \$36,000, 4-C's, and it is the most efficient use of The 4-C's program provides day care tax dollars to provide this service, Mrs. Carpenter said.

The extra through 4-C's must be either working or revenue comes from mothers in the work force and paying taxes who would otherwise be forced to remain at home, unemployed and receiving welfare.

On the other hand, for each \$1 invested in defense hardware, Mrs. Carpenter believes the research will show a deficit return on the tax dollars spent.

"We want to look at the tax dollars spent by the population in a given area," Mrs. Carpenter said. "That money is managed by the government and spent back in the area (through defense contracts). Does it produce a net gain or loss (to the government in the next batch of tax dollars)?"

Multiple variables must be considered in a study of this kind, and tax dollars paid through an employer, for purchased items and at the end of the year are all sources of revenue to the state and federal governments, Mrs. Carpenter said.

# **Altamonte Woman Killed When** Car Plunges Over Guardrail

ended in death for an Altamonte Springs woman in Orlando on Saturday night as the car she was riding in plunged over the guardrail along Interstate 4 onto a street below.

Orlando police said they are continuing their investigation of the accident which occurred at 6:30 p.m. Helen K. Mayo, 50, of 508 Orange Drive, a passenger in the car died in the accident.

The driver of the car, Joseph Boyce, 53. of the same address, was treated and released from the Orlando Regional Medical Center, hospital officials said. Police said the couple's Chrysler hit an inside guardrail on the interstate, spun

around and the rear end broke through the outside guardrail. Witnesses told Atrip home from a baby-shower party police the car was traveling at an czcessive speed, about 80 mph.

An autopsy Saturday revealed Ms. Mayo died as a result of the accident, according to Orange County Medical Examiner Thomas Hegert.

"It's going to take at least two months to get this investigation done," said Orlando investigator Lane Lauderback. "We've sent blood samples to the crime lab to determine Boyce's blood-alcohol level. The. « was a heavy odor of alcoholic impurities on his breath. However, until the tests are back and our investigation complete, no charges have been filed."

Lauderback said the two were heading home after attending a baby shower in Orlando when the accident occurred.

Police said that when they arrived on the scene the vehicle was lying upside down on Division Street and Boyce was lying on the street a few feet from the CBC

"He (Boyce) was complaining of broken ribs," Lauderback said. "Herndon Ambulance took him to the hospital. Ms. Mayo, however, died at the hospital.

"We're very fortunate that Division Street is not a very heavily traveled road," Lauderback added.

### UAW, Ford Resume Talks

DEARBORN, Mich. (UPI) -- Ford Motor Co. officials who refused to go along with a failed United Auto Workers agreement with General Motors are confident they can conclude early contract negotiations with the Union in a matter of days.

UAW and Ford bargainers were to meet today at Ford world headquarters to resume negotiations on contract concessions that may well hold the key to the struggling automaker's future.

### 'Terrorists' Decry Image

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Authorities must decide today whether to charge a 19-year-old Armenian in the assassination of a Turkish diplomat and arranged a lineup to see whether witnesses can recognize him.

The Justice Commandos of Armenian Genocide, which claimed responsibility for killing Turkish Consul General Kemal Arikan last Thuraday, telephoned UPI's New York office early today to say it "resents" being portrayed by the media as an international terrorist gang.

### Tot Killed By Jeep

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - A 3-year-old boy rolled his plastic toy Jeep down the driveway of his suburban home and into the street and was struck and killed by a real Jeep as he went to retrieve his toy.

His mother watched helplessly as the toddler was struck by the Jeep, Police Sgt. Dennis Zine said Sunday. Alfredo Chaves died at a hospital about 45 minutes after the accident Saturday.

NATIONAL REPORT: The Winter of '82 slammed head-on into its second month today, leaving parts of the Midwest a frozen battlezone under the worst snows in 70 years. Emergency crews and the National Guard fought up to 6-foot drifts in Missourl and Ohio to deliver bables and rescue motorists. St. Louis was brought to a standstill by 19 inches of snow in a fourth straight weekend of weather misery from storms that weather experts have called the worst of the 20th Century. At least six people died in Sunday's onslaught. The National Weather Service said another storm system in the Northern Rockies would move quickly into the Midwest and hit Missouri and Illinois by tonight and was expected to veer into northeast New York state, Maine and southern New England. Up to 17 inches of snow inundated the Indianapolis area Sunday, more than a foot hit Detroit, Chicago had 8 inches and 7 inches blanketed Toledo, Ohio, which was expecting 10 more. The St. Louis snows were the worst in the city in a 24-hour period since Feb, 12, 1912, and more snow was expected. Snow squalls crossed Lake Erie and dumped 3 inches of snow on Buffalo, N.Y. Snow also spread over Texas from the south

Casselberry officials, digging for a way to rectify a dispute between themselves and a city resident over a drainage ditch are slated to discuss Mayor Owen Sheppard's recommendations at tonight's council meeting.

The City Council meets at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall, 95 Lake Triplet Drive.

"First of all, I am recommending that we leave the ditch as it is," Sheppard said. "However, if council doesn't agree I'm recommending we put in a pipe and cover the drainage ditch up. There are no other options because we need drainage there or we'll have a flooded road."

Sheppard's recommendations concerning the 312-by-5-foot ditch between a vacant lot owned by Casselberry Gardens and James and Eloise Matheny's home at 1315 Quintuplet Drive come after a six-month dispute over the drainage ditch which was installed to handle storm water runoff.

The Mathenys became upset when they returned from vacation in August and discovered a ditch had been dug near their property. They said the ditch is an eyesore, dangerous and has caused their property value to decrease.

Until recently, piping the water was not allowed by the Department of Environmental Regulation. However, recent changes in DER rules now allows such piping provided the water does not flow directly into Lake Marie.

If the council votes to pipe and cover the ditch, the effort will cost the city about \$6,000, Sheppard said.



# **Fibers Crop Up Again** In Atlanta Murder Trial

ATLANTA (UPI) - An FBI expert testified today that fibers found on bodies of abducted and murdered young blacks matched those from Wayne Williams' bedspread and other points in his home and car.

Fiber expert Hal Deadman began winding up the state's presentation of evidence in "uncharged offenses" with charts and photographs showing fiber matchups between the victims and Williams' belongings.

Williams, a 23-year-old black free-lance photographer and would-be talent scout, is on trial for the murders of Jimmy Ray Payne, 21, and Nathaniel Cater, 27, two of Atlanta's 28 abducted and murdered young blacks. But the prosecution, in an attempt to prove "pattern, plan, scheme and bent of mind," has presented evidence on 10 more killings.

The predominant theme was Williams' old violet bedspread. Deadman said fibers showing "the same microscopic characteristics and optical properties" were found on the bodies or Alfred Evans, 13, who vanished in July of 1979 and became the second victim in the series; Eric Middlebrook, 14, Charles

Stephens, 12, Luber Geter, 14, Terry Pue, 15, and Patrick Baltazar, 11.

Pue's body carried "over 100" of the bedspread fibers, Deadman said. There were 50 of them on Evans' body and 35 on Stephens.

But, there were multiple matches on each body, the FBI expert said. On Stephens' body, he said, there were fibers matching a total of seven items from Williams' home and car, and six different matches from Baltazar's body. In addition, he said, animal hairs from the bodies of Baltazar, Pue, Geter, Stephens and Middlebrook "could have come from" the Williams' aging German Shepard, Sheba.

A clump of red fibers removed from Middiebrook's tennis shoe, Deadman said, matched fibers from the trunk liner of a 1979 Ford LTD the Williams family owned at the time. The entire rear seat of the family's white station wagon was brought into the courtroom - but there was no further attempt, at least for the time being, to show whether the family ever possessed the green and light blue wagons witnesses have mentioned.

## Roads Are Going To Pot

WASHINGTON (UPI) - This winter's snow, ice, and freezing rain has devastated the nation's roadways and created a record number of potholes in city streets, country roads and interstate highways, a research group reports less than halfway through the Sea 900.

The Road Information Program, a nonprofit agency funded by highway contractors, insurance companies and automakers, said the annual "pothole plague" usually confined to the Northeast and Midwest is spreading throughout the nation.

Donald Knight, executive director of the program, said driving on bad roads cost the average American motorist \$204 last year in repairs and wasted fuel.

"Until now, the worst year we had on record

was 1978 when 100 million potholes were popping at the rate of six per second. It took 6.4 million tons of asphalt and \$320 million to repair that damage," Knight said.

This year will be worse, he said.

Knight said resurfacing during warm months can prevent potholes, but a backlog of road repairs has been building up for nearly a decade.

Going into this winter, he said, 1.04 million miles of roadway making up more than half of the nation's paved road network were in substandard condition.

Knight said the nation spent a total of about \$17 billion on road repairs last year but, not counting this winter's damage, it would take double that amount over the next 10 years to catch up.

## New Rules Mean Poor Better Off On Welfare Than Working

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Welfare rules changes which take effect today mean that in some states, it is more profitable

to collect aid than hold a job. In only a handful of states, mainly ones providing the highest benefits, is the financial reward higher for staying home, but in many others it is a close call, said Cheryl Rogers of the University of Chicago Center for Study of Social Policy which did a survey on the effect of the change

While conceding the change may reduce the financial incentive for working in some cases, the Reagan administration maintains it also eliminates an unfair subsidy

The change is among a batch of rules aimed at ending benefits for 408,000 families and trimming back assistance. for 279,000 more getting Aid to Families with Dependent Children. AFOC, the nation's major welfare program, serves 3.9 million families.

Most of the new rules took effect Oct. 1. The rule taking effect this week lowers the limit on "disregards" - the expenses working AFDC recipients may deduct

from their income in determining eligibility for benefits.

They will be allowed to continue deducting \$75 a month and \$160 per child for day care. But after four months on the rolls, they will no longer be allowed to deduct an additional \$30 plus one-third of their income in determining eligibility. For anyone who was on welfare last Oct. 1, four months means Feb. 1.

"This will be the big change," said Al Gonzalez, legislative affairs director of the National Association of Social Workers.

The administration calculated that taken by itself - the Feb. 1 cut would kick 153,800 families off the rolls and cut benefits for 225,000. The real effect is smaller, officials say, because some families already have been hit by earlier cuts, including a ceiling on total income and a previous lowering of the disregards.

Administration officials say the disregards encouraged families, some earning up to \$20,000 a year, to stay on the rolls.

## Seminole Considering Joining With Orange's Housing Finance Group

First-time home buyers in Seminole County today may see an opportunity for low-interest mortgages become reality A contract between Orange and Seminole counties to form a single housing finance authority will be up for the vote by the Seminole County Commission today at an emergency meeting

scheduled for 4 p.m. at the county courthouse. Money for the low-interest home loans would be generated by revenue bonds granted tax exempt status by the federal government. Seminole County finance institutions will manage the bonds and offer mortgages below the market interest rate, according to Sam Mazzotta, executive director of the Orange County Housing Finance Authority.

An emergency commission meeting is necessary to meet Governor Bob Graham's Feb. 1 deadline to qualify for a share. of nearly \$360 million available to Florida counties for the lowinterest loans in 1982, Assistant County Administrator Jim Easton said

Three commissioners already have endorsed the Orange-Seminole Housing Finance Authority alliance. Seminole's participation with the Orange County authority eliminates the need to form a separate agency locally, Easton said.

Commissioners Robert Sturm, Sandra Glenn and Barbara Christensen have said Seminole County should join the authority to offer less expensive mortages to first-time county home buyers who otherwise could not afford them.

Commissioners William Kirchhoff and Robert "Bud" Feather are opposed to the alliance. Kirchhoff and Feather say the tax-exempt bonds would have an unfair edge over other county road and sewage treatment bonds which are not taxexempt.

The Orange County Housing Finance Authority is prepping itself for a \$150 million bond issue to generate capital for multifamily projects. Neither Mazzolla or Easton indicated whether Seminole might also participate in that bond issue

If the commission votes today to approve the contract, bonds would require validation by May 1, according to the governor's deadline schedule

Barring any serious complications, single-family housing mortgages could be available to Seminole County residents by June or July, Mazzotta said. If not, the authority may have to wait until the end of the year before marketing the bonds.

"We have to wait for a 'window' in the bond market," Mazzotta said. "We have to wait for a fall in yield. The lower we have to pay on a bond yield (market interest rate) the lower we can make (the home buyers) interest rate."

## **Body Discovered?**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Police think they have found the skeletel remains of a distinguished Florida State University instructor who disappeared three years ago, leaving behind only a letter saying he did not want to "grow old."

They think the remains are those of Dr. Don Tucker, 55, according to a spokesman for the sheriff's office who said today the cause of death has not been established, but suicide is a possibility.

A rusty and jammed shotgun lay near the body, found by two hunters Saturday in a wooded area in adjoining Gadsden County. A decaying FSU identification card led Gadsden County sheriff's deputies to link the remains to Tucker, a biology research associate who disappeared in January, 1979.

The only clue to Tucker's disappearance was a rambling letter, mailed from nearby Midway to a colleague of Tucker's a few days later, saying, "I choose quite simply not to grow old." The rest of the letter, partially typed and partially handwritten, was withheld at the request of the Tucker family.

The hunters stumbled across the remains while walking through a ravine in the Robert Brent Wildlife Management Area, said to have been one of Tucker's favorite hunting spots. His abundoned station wagon was found in the area shortly after its di .pp+trance.

Dick Simpson, a spokesman for the Leon County sheriff's office, said the remains will be turned over today to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement crime laboratory for positive identification and to determine the cause of death. Tucker's wife, Ruth, told the Tallahassee Democrat Sunday night she has never given up hope that her husband was alive. "But after that length of time the chances, I guess, weren't very good," she said.

One of Tucker's associates, FSU Professor Lloyd Beidler, said that international researchers familiar with Tucker's work, had inquired about his disappearance over the years.

He said he and others in the biological science department had hoped Tucker had just decided to go away for a while.

"We don't know if we believed it or just wanted to believe it," he said.



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## Solution Needed On **Impending Famine**

So inured has the human race become to the imminence of doom that a new prediction of disaster receives little attention and even less credence. Nonetheless, the specter of starvation is now hovering so near the world's poor nations that it can no longer be ignored.

Growing population in the Third World, and rising consumption in the developed nations have, in fact, reduced world grain stocks to a 40-day supply - a frightening statistic. With so little reserve, simultaneous crop failures in the United States and one or two other agricultural nations could easily create another catastrophe of the magnitude of 1972-73, when an estimated 500 million persons died in Africa and Asia of starvation or illness induced by malnutrition.

That famine was precipitated by an unlucky combination of poor crops and the ill-timed decision of the Soviet Union to double the protein intake of its people by a sharp increase in meatproduction. Russia's purchase of 25 million tons of feed grains on the world market that year resulted in a worldwide grain shortage and a 300 percent increase in prices. As was inevitable, many in the poorer nations simply could not buy food.

The world has never recovered from the disastrous depletion of its granaries a decade ago. In fact, supplies have moved steadily downward from a three-month stock in 1960 to hardly more than a month at present.


Small wonder, then, that many agricultural economists predict the 1980s will be the decade of food crises, as the 1970s were the decade of energy shortages. Clearly, world leaders are under compelling necessity to develop global strategies against this threat to human life.

Fortunately, the earth's resources are far from exhausted. While the U.S. breadbasket may be producing beyond its optimum limits, agriculture in much of the rest of the world is yielding far below its potential. Moreover, only half the world's arable land is being farmed.

Even in arid lands, bountiful crops can be raised, as the Israelis have proved with their rich farming in the Negev Desert, once thought to be uninhabitable. The techniques they have developed to conserve irrigation water and breed plant forms to withstand heat and poor soils have excited the wonder of the world.

Most unproductive lands are in underdeveloped nations, however. Few of these countries have either the knowledge or capital to initiate largescale agricultural developments and fooddistribution systems that will ward off hunger.

Massive educational and technological assistance from the developed world must be mobilized if

## DON GRAFF Or Try, Try, Try Again

Just offhand, it would appear difficult at this point for Ronald Reagan to make a bigger botch of the private school tax exemption business than he already has.

But he obvously is trying his darndest.

As the situation stands - or stumbles - at this writing, the president is asking Congress to empower the Internal Revenue Service to deny tax advantages to institutions that practice racial discrimination in admissions or otherwise, legislation that would cancel his own denial of that authority to the IRS, which denial, however, he has already partially retracted himself in the case of all affected schools except two that are to be allowed to enjoy tax breaks but that may have to pay back whatever they realize from the special deal if Congress comes through as requested by the president.

Now - assuming you're still with us -- the president says he is personally opposed to racial discrimination but is acting because the tax exemption selectivity the IRS had been exercising on the basis of evidence of discriminatory practices is not the law of the land, even though a number of applicable court decisions say it is and Congress has never thought it necessary to question or qualify IRS authority in the matter.

What - hang in there, we're almost through - this means is that the IRS has been left to carry on as usual except as respects two schools previously judged to be pursuing discriminatory practices, special treatment that puts the IRS in the position of defying the courts.

Most of official Washington has been left stupefied, particularly by the president's assertion that it's all his own idea.

And that part of it that is of the Democratic persuasion has been presented an irresistible political opportunity, one that would be wise to resist. This particular mine has been so loaded - apparently in the dark - that it has the potential of shredding everyone who touches it

If we were observing in action Franklin Delano Roosevelt, whose centennial we happen to be observing at the moment, there might be cause for suspecting manipulation to gain some presidential end that could not be achieved through a straightforward approach. Roosevelt delighted in the practice of such devious politics. As Joseph Alson noted in his current study of the president and his presidency:



'Give me your rich, your famous, your nobel laureates, your Russian poets and Polish emissaries, your respectable white anti-Soviets yearning to breathe free..."

## **ROBERT WAGMAN Memorial Dishonoring?**

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The proposed memorial to honor those who fought in the Vietnam War is generating growing opposition among conservatives as its March ground breaking approaches.

The \$7 million project of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, an organization of veterans of the war, is to be built on federal land halfway between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument.

The memorial will be built entirely with private contributions but will be maintained by the government.

However, completion of the memorial - at least in its present form - is becoming a matter of some doubt despite its earlier approval by Congress and by Interior Secretary **James Watt.** 

Conservatives are arguing that the memorial's design honors not the men who fought and died in Vietnam but those who opposed the war. That view appears to be gaining support within the Reagan administration.

major conservative publication, called the "V" design "an outrage" because it "inmortalizes the anti-war signal." But National Review editor William F. Buckley Jr. later wrote that the judgment was "premature" and called the design "beautiful, imposing and fitting."

NEW YORK (UPI) - Many Americans may find themselves unable to retire comfortably in the year 2000 if Social Security benefits dwindle and inflation continues -and they don't begin planning now.

No longer can 20-and 30-year-olds afford to ignore that far-off day of retirement. "People are going to have to rely much more heavily on personal savings for retirement income." said Susan G. Fisher, Chemical Bank vice president and director of marketing.

'I personally believe Social Security checks will not nearly fill my retirement needs."

Company pension plans and personal savings programs such as the new Individual Retirement Account will do much to augment Social Security, Ms. Fisher said, but she warned against being lulled into a false sense. of security by visions of millions of dollars. Inflation will take its toll on the purchasing

power of savings at the time of retirement, she said.

For example, under Chemical's IRA program, a 30-year-old saver who begins today putting the maximum \$2,000 allowable annually in an IRA account (\$500 each quarter) will have saved \$1,028,198 by age \$5, assuming an average annual interest rate of 12 percent compounded quarterly.

But \$1 million today will be worth only \$311,805 in 20 years and \$174,110 in 30 years assuming a 6 percent annual inflation rate not compounded, Ms. Fisher said.

'Nevertheless, without a personal savings plan, you're in danger of not providing for your retirement at all," she added. "The idea of a person in his twenties having to save used to be considered absurd. Today it's more like a necessity. And the tax-sheltered IRA is one of the best and safest means of investing for retirement."

Not only do IRAs lower your tax rate and allow interest on the account to grow without being taxed, Ms. Fisher said, but when you withdraw the money usually it will be taxed at a lower rate than when you earned it since income generally is lower during retirement. "As with any investment, the return you get

on an IRA account depends on what you go into," Ms. Fisher said. "You have to put it into something that's going to grow at rapid enough rates."

Ms. Fisher said Chemical is launching a major consumer education program on IRAL, including seminars, a film and cable

these countries are to be rescued from famine in the decade ahead.

Such a task is beyond the resources of a single nation. It will involve a cooperative international effort of great magnitude and the participation of private enterprise as well as governments. But to deny human hunger because of cost or complexity is intolerable.

The Reagan administration should move on several fronts to deal with this global crisis.

Direct technical assistance should be provided to receptive governments. This should be supplemented by appeals to major food-growing and processing industries and private foundations to set up marketing organizations and cooperatives in underdeveloped nations. Lastly, the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization can be galvanized into further efforts at the village level, where small farmers can be shown how to profit from increased production, while easing the threat of famine in their countries. International inertia is the immediate challenge.

Although FDR is known to be one of the predecessors Ronald Reagan has chosen to take as an example, the present chief executive has given no indication of having a sense of humor of this description.

Very much to the contrary. He is covering for the miscues of his subordinates, and may be much more annoyed by them than he is letting on. But his every effort to this end reveals a limited comprehension of both the implications of the messy business at hand and the larger workings of the government over which he presides. He does not lay confusion but sows it.

The controversy centers on the monument's design: Two walls of polished black granite will form a "V" and descend 10 feet into the ground with steps leading to the bottom level. Into the walls will be chiseled the names of all 59,000 Americans who died in the war or are still listed as missing.

Above the names will be a prologue stating: "In honor of the men and women of the armed forces of the United States who served in the Vietnam War. The names of those who gave their lives and those who remain missing are inacribed in the order they were taken."

Following the names will come the words: "Our nation remembers the courage, sacrifice and devotion to duty and country of its Vietnam veterans. This memorial was built through private donations from the American people. Dedicated Nov. 11, 1982."

The design by Maya Ying Lin, a Yale University architecture student, was selected by a blue-ribbon panel from among 1,400 entries in a national contest.

Critics contend that the use of the color black, the descent of the monument into the ground and the "V" angle of the walls (which they assoicate with the "peace" sign used by war protestors) dishonors those who fought in intended to break ground on March 1. But Watt recently withdrew his approval, contending that the plans must be resubmitted "because of design changes."

Many see this decision as an indication that Watt concurs with the conservative critics of the memorial. The veterans organization says that the only changer made since the secretary's initial approval last summer were designed to facilitate access to the site by handicapped people.

Meanwhile, millionaire businessman H. Ross Perot has hired the national polling firm of George Gallup to try to determine what Vietnam veterans think of the memorial.

The polling organization plans to ask Vietnam veterans to comment on the design after they have received copies of the plan and statements by those on both sides. Perot opposes the design, which he says looks like a "trench." He thinks that a majority of Vietnam veterans will agree with him.

Supporters of the memorial are saying little publicly at the moment except that they are re-examining Watt's latest decision. But privately they admit that a March ground breaking now appears to be impossible.

But by the seventh year he would actually make \$31 if he withdrew the money. The seventh year is the break-even point.

# Hard Feelings Persist About Begin

WASHINGTON - The troubles between Israel and the United States are "behind us," Secretary of State Alexander Haig has declared.

Accordingly, the United States vetoed United Nations sanctions against Israel over the Golan Heights annexation, and Prime Minister Menachem Begin personally assured President Reagan that Israel would not break the truce in Lebanon unless "provoked."

But there is still a residue of hard feelings against Begin inside the White House. The president's advisers blame the acerbic Israeli prime minister for the lack of communication between Washington and Tel Aviv over the annexation.

On the other hand, sources told my associate Ron McRae that Begin has his supporters in some unlikely places within the Reagan administration. Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger, Assistant Secretary of

State Nicholas Veliotes and Middle East analysts in the intelligence agencies believe Begin is getting a burn rap on this one.

They view Begin as - of all things - a moderate in Israeli politics. They're advising the White House that Begin's successor is likely to be even more intransigent and unpredictable.

Personally, Begin is a likeable and congenial man. But he is under continuous pressure from extremist factions in Israel, and must respond with tough talk and hardline policies to keep their support. Here are some examples of the pressures on Begin, as presented by his reluctant but realistic defenders in the administration:

- Though the Camp David accords passed the Israeli parliament, Begin was the only member of his own Cabinet who voted for them.

- One million Israelis - out of 3.2 million

- signed petitions last December demanding that Begin stop the return of the Sinai to Egypt.

One hundred thousand demonstrators called for the expansion of Israeli territory to its onetime Biblical borders - from the Euphrates River on the east to the Nile on the west. This would include nearly half of Egypt and most of Jordan, Syria, Lebanon and Iraq.

- In a poll of secondary-school students last November, 60 percent favored the radical right-wing Tehiya ("revival") party, which calls for the physical expulsion of non-Jews from Israel and the occupied territories.

- Settlers in the Sinal village of Yamit are threatening to secede from Israel, and vow they'll resist any attempt by the Israeli Army to force them out.

- Radical Jewish terrorist groups have attacked government offices with Molotov cocktails to protest the Sinal withdrawal.

With zealots like these snapping at his heels, Begin's annexation move and his irtemperate scolding of the United States arl: understandable if not particularly palatable, argue Weinberger and the others. Begth depends on the extremists for his razor-thin parlimentary majority - and if he fails, his successor might be less able to resist their pressure.

What Weinberg, Veliotes and the Middle East experts are advising Reagan to do [s forget the personalities involved and address himself to the issues that divide Israel and the United States - particularly the Palestinish question. It's the issues that must be ailswered if close ties are to be restored between the two allies.

Footnote: A spokesman for the Israeli Embassy pointed out that the signatures (in the Sinai petition have not been verified and that the secondary-school students wijo participated in the poll do not vote.


The Porsche Turbo of Ted Field-Danny Ongais-Bill Whittington, a strong pre-

## Racket, Strings, Shoes, What Is Best For You?

Spring is close at hand and the tennis abrasive surface. Regular clay court activity in the area will really start to pick up. A lot of players will be purchasing new equipment and knowing what kind of racket, strings, shoes that are right for you is important. I'm asked questions about equipment quite often. The following are a few of the most often asked questions and a response to each:

What is the difference between wood, graphite and composite rackets?

There are differences in durability and performance. Made of nature's own composite materials - ligning, cellulose and hemicellulose. Wood will break down gradually under heavy usage. Of course excellent wood tennis rackets have been around for over 100 years and will continue to be around for at least another 100.

In general, a metal racket will last a bit longer than an all wood frame, but you get an entirely different feel and sound when you hit the ball. With a composite, you'll find yet another different sound and feel. As to which is best, that's up to you to decide. My own personal choice is an aluminum because it gives me power without sacrificing control (it's stiff). This complements my serve and volley style. A racket choice will undoubtedly change your game to some extent, but improvement is not guaranteed with a change of racket.

Are there really major differences in regular and extra duty tennis balls? If so, exactly why does a regular ball perform better on a clay court?

Yes, The nap or cover is different on the two balls. Extra duty balls are more resistant to wear, fluffing up quickly, protecting the cover from the more

balls, designed for a softer less abrasive surface, nave a tighter nap so that they will not pick up as much grit as hard court balls. I recommend using the ball designed for the surface you're going to play on.

#### Will I get more power from loose or tight strings?

Everyone from physicists to stringing assistants has debated this question. By all the scientific methods used in testing strings, the tighter you string, the less power you get. The strings simply can't bend and return fast enough. However, the tighter you string your racket, the faster the ball will come off the strings which will make your volley seem more powerful. The ball will jump off the racket face quickly and get to where its going faster. On this question, science and personal experience don't seem to jibe, but if you look carefully, you'll see that the scientific evidence is accurate.

#### Will an oversize or midsize racket help my game?

You certainly can't argue with success. Reader surveys conducted by World Tennis earlier this year revealed that 81 percent of respondents believed that oversize rackets were a positive development for tennis, and the market research done for WT by SMART inc. shows that midsize and oversize rackets account for 26.5 percent of all rackets sold and that oversize sales grew 58.4 percent (midsize 16.4 percent) from August 1980 to August 1981.

In other words, the best racket for you is the one that you're most happy with, whether it's the size of a squash racket or a mowsine .... Next work we'll cover more questions on tennis equipment.

# **McEnroe Carves Up Connors**

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) - Jimmy Connors had said that his five-set victory in the finals of a Rosemont, Ill., tournament against John McEnroe in early January "had everything - great tennis, controversy, comedy and even death." Remembering that televised duel and recalling some previous epic Connors-McEnroe matches, a crowd of 13,391 turned up Sunday at the Spectrum to watch America's two tennis titans battle it out in the finals of the \$300,000 U.S. Pro-Indoor Tennis Championships.

But this time, it was no contest. The top-seeded McEnroe, displaying a surgeon's touch, took only one hour, 55 minutes to demolish the second-seeded Connors, 6-3, 6-3, 6-1, in perhaps the most lopsided result of their 17 matches to date for his first U.S. Pro Indoor title.

"I tried to concentrate more during each point," McEnroe said after his fourth win in his last five natches with Connors. "Back in Chicago (Rosemont), I played a good game, then a bad game, in the match." then a good game. I wasn't consistent. This time, if he won a game, he'd have to week end after midnight, had problems

In winning the \$60,000 first prize, the world's top-ranked player had Connors working very hard with a variety of shots to all areas of the court. He also served 13 aces and picked up a number of winners with his serve.

Connors, seeking a record fifth title here, struggled from the outset. His biggest enemy was fatigue from a tough fourset semi-final victory over hardserving Chip Hooper the night before. McEnroe certainly noticed.

Connors then mustered what would be his last charge in the eighth game when he fought off three set points to gain a service break, but McEnroe broke back to take a 2-0 lead in sets.

Connors appeared beaten at this point, but McEnroe knew better than to relax.

"It wasn't until I was two sets ahead that I really got on him," he said. "I figured at this point I would be able to run through in straight sets. But I didn't let up. I was up two sets to love in London (1981 Wembley tournament) and he won in five. I still wanted to make him work."

McEnroe breezed through the 37minute third art, gaining service breaks at love in the second and fourth games.

"He played well and hit the ball well," said Connors, shrugging off persistent "Were you tired?" questions,

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



## Plain Aspirin Won't Help You Sleep

DEAR DR. LAMB - I hope you can answer me as there seems to be some controversy over this question. Is there any danger to one's health because of taking two Buf-W8Y ferin a day, each day? I am 69 years old but find a Bufferia tablet can aid in putting me to sleep. I like to take one on retiring and another some four hours later when I wake up. I am sure they are far less harmful than a barbituate. Even so I wouldn't want anymy. side effects from constant usage

DEAR READER - Bufferin is aspirin combined with an antacid (aluminum glycinate and magnesium carbonate). As so many TV ads have indicated the antacid is to neutralize the stomach acid. It does not improve the action of the aspirin itself.

Aspirin does not have any sedative properties. Its main effect is a mild pain reliever. Another old ad slogan was that "it doesn't make you sleep, it lets you sleep," the implication being that minor aches and pains keep you awake and the aspirin relieves these. You do not mention any aches or pains or derstands the procedure and any reason for taking aspirin except that you sleep better. You are right, it is less

dangerous than many of the sleeping pills people take and if you get help from it in the amounts you take it is not likely to be harmful to you. There are a number of undesirable side effects from taking aspirin. This includes irritation of the stomach. If you are taking plain aspirin instead of Bufferin you can dissolve the aspirin in a little milk completely and drink it. That prevents any crystals from settling against the stomach lining and burning a small hole in your stomach. I think dissolving ordinary aspirin is really better than the combination medicines of

antacids and aspirin. But do drink something when you take even Bufferin.







# Why Did 'Turkey' Give Away \$1 Million Worth Of Land?

GREEN RIDGE, (NEA) — When J.N. "Turkey" Kearn signed his 1,436 acres west of here over to the State Conservation Department back in 1976, some of his neighbors thought he was crazy.

Well, he's got another news flash for them.

"I've gone and given 'emanother 40 acres," the 80year-old Kearn cackles as he ambles into the front room of his west-central Missouri farm home, slides around a bulky wood-burning stove and spits into a rusty pan heaped with wood ashes, orange peels and egg shells.

"I'd been trying to buy that piece for the longest time, but I never had the chance --- not till the owner died and his wife. didn't want to worry with it," he says.

Of course, Kearn won't be worrying much about the property, either., Conservation Department employees will be responsible for tending it, mending it and maybe renting it out.

Indeed, about the only thing left for him to do with the land is just to love it. But when your heart is as big as your old homestead, even that's a Jull-time effort



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

## **N.Y. Policeman Crusades** For Homosexual Rights

NEW YORK (UPI) - Sgt. Charlie Cochrane is a 15-year veteran of the police department, recipient of four good conduct medals, and a mosexual.

When he suddenly decided last November to crusade for the cause of gay rights, there were warnings from friends, relatives and fellow officers.

"I knew there was a chance that my parents would be harassed, that I might be beaten up. that I'd be hassled by the fringe that hates gays," said Cochrane, 38.

He decided to testify anyway before the city council in support of an anti-discrimination ordinance that was defeated. Since then he has been invited to speak out for television talk shows, citizens groups and congressional hearings

Cochrane's most recent appearance was in Washington before a congressional subcommittee considering a bill making it illegal not to hire someone because of homosexuality.

"But what frightened me the most when I decided to go public was realizing they're going to be calling me The Gay Cop forever," "I could make police commissioner and they'd still identify me that way." He went public anyway. And has been surprised by the lack of reprisals. It was tough telling his parents, Cochrane paid.

He tried to tell an old friend 10 years ago, and has not seen the friend since. The partner Cochrane used to patrol Brooklyn's worst neighborhoods with was nervous the first few times he brought his boyfriend to dinner. There has been some "lockeroon commentary" down at the precinct. But fellow officers have surprised him by their acorptance.

"Nobody wrote 'faggot' on my locker," said Cochrane, who supervises officers working on a Manhattan precinct's task force for special events. "I haven't had one crank phone call. I didn't even make the (bathroom) wall."

Cochrane does not take himself too seriously. He calls the other cops "honey." Asked to describe how to recognize him, Cochrane says he will be wearing a "maroon Bill Blass down jacket." And he admits to ogling co-workers.

"I know about a dozen cope who have told me they are gay. There are others who I bet are gay," he said. "And I know a couple more I wish were gay."

Cochrane is protected by an executive order ssued by the mayor that sa may be discriminated against on the basis of race, sex or sexual preference. He is careful to say his views do not represent those of the New. York City Police Department.

# **Reapportionment Has Taken** Much Of Lawmakers' Time; Tax And Crime Bills Pending

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - With reapportionment high on their minds, state lawmakers have moved slowly on other issues during the first two weeks of the session and the pace is not expected to quicken much this week.

The Senate this far has passed only two bills - its legislative reapportionment proposal and an \$800,000 emergency appropriation to finance a state lawsuit against phosphate mining companies,

It has scheduled a two-hour floor session, only the second regular floor session of the year, for Thursday to take up other bills.

The House has met in full session three mornings a week and considered several measures, but at a much alower rate than usual.

A handful of crime bills is scheduled for debate this week, including one sought by many police agencies (HB 497) that would authorize them to destroy the bulk of marijuana and illicit drugs they seize and keep only certified samples for trial.

There have been so many seizures in some counties that storage space has had to be rented and some authorities fear imported marijuana could contain disease and insects dangerous to crops. Another bill scheduled for House consideration (HB 13) would allow the video-taping of testimony of disabled crime victims and witnesses, including the very young and elderly, so they would not have to go through the trauma of appearing in court. Also due for debate is a proposal (CS-HB 14) requiring that any immigrant or refugee living in the United States for less than three years undergo a medical examination before being given a job in a restaurant.

The bill is intended to identify diseases that may be carried by recent refugees.

In the Senate, most of the week will be devoted to committee work and behind-the-scenes maneuvering on reapportionment.

The finance and tax committee holds a workshop Tuesday afternoon on several sales tax increase plans. Chairman Harry Johnston of West Palm Beach says no votes will be taken, with the decision on whether taxes will be raised being delayed until work on the 1982-83 state budget gets farther along.

The Senate Reapportionment Committee meets Wednesday to consider new congressional districts if Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami Beach, who heads the congressional subcommittee, is able to work out a tentative proposal to send to the panel.

New districts worked out by senators for themselves during the first week of the session are being reviewed now by the House. Gordon and Senate Reapportionment Chairman Dempsey Barron had hoped to finish work on a congressional plan last week, but they decided at the last moment to hold things up for a while.

## **Fighting Power Companies Alone**

# **Public Counsel Jack Shreve**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Public Counsel Jack Shreve is continuing to fight what he describes as a \$103 million windfall to big electric companies. despite setbacks in the state Supreme Court and Public Service Commission.

Shreve failed last week in an attempt to get the PSC to order Florida Power & Light Co. to turn over information necessary to build his case.

And the Supreme Court ruled in September that the commission had the authority to establish a socalled "transitional allowance" when adopting a new fuel adjustment formula almost two years ago. But Shreve will continue to attack the allowance when the PSC holds its next fuel adjustment hearings in mid-February. And he is not

diacouraged. Commissioners John Marks and Susan Leisner held out hope for the public counsel, saying they might be convinced later the PSC erred in its original decision.

Shreve must convince at least three of the five. commissioners he is right if he is to win a change. He hopes to at least reduce the amount of the allowance and limit it to Floridians who were customers of the four big private electricity companies at the time it was implemented if he is not able to get it repealed.

'We'll continue to push this thing. It's not over yet, by any means," he said.

FP&L, Florida Power Corp., Tampa Electric Corp. and Gulf Power Co. have been allowed over the years to collect a special fuel charge from their customers to get reimbursed for fuel expenses not covered in the basic rates.

The fuel adjustment clause allows companies to immediately pass on increases in the price for oil or coal without having to wait until their next regular rate increase.

The PSC switched to a new method of calculating the monthly fuel charge, deciding to determine it twice a year instead of monthly and base it on estimated fuel expenses for the upcoming six months instead of actual expenses for the previous four-week period.

The method includes a "trueup" at the end of the six months, with customers getting refunds if the estimate used to calculate the charge turned out to be too high and utilities able to collect additional money if it turned out to be too low.

The commission agreed to a \$112 million transition allowance after the four utilities said that without it, they would be losing two months of fuel charges because of the timing of the switch to the new system. (The estimate of the allowance has now been reduced to \$103 million 1

Shreve did not object to the new system, but he opposed the transition allowance, which will be assessed this spring if he can't convince the commissioners to rescind it. The charge would be a onetime fee to the customers of the four companies and, according to one report, average about \$17.

Shreve contends that the transitional allowance is not justified because the fuel adjustment charge established by the commission for the first sixmonths of operation under the new system covered those two months which the utilities claim were not covered

He is trying to get fuel invoices he says will prove his case and asked for a specific order against FP&L, the biggest company of the four. Commissioners said the request was irrevelent because they already had determined that the allowance was justified and had been upheld by the Supreme Court

Marks and Mrs. Leisner indicated they could be convinced later that the PSC erred.

"It is possible the commission will reconsider, Anything is possible," said Bill Gibson, administrative assistant to PSC Chairman Joe Cresse. "But I don't think it will happen."

"If I could find a doctor who would do it illegally, I would do it," Lott says. "I want the chance for a few more years."

McGrath has written the Utah center asking for its selection criteria.

Dr. William Devries, the University of Utah surgeon who won approval to implant an artifical heart, has said the first implant recipient must be someone who would "have to have some type of corrective surgery.

"Then, if he cannot be weaned off the heartlung machine, there would be nothing else you could do but cut out the heart and put the artificial heart in."

McGrath said Lott fits the qualifications. Lott, an avid high school athlete in Columbus, Ohio, joined the Navy and was a career military man until 1979, when at age 35, he suffered congestive heart failure at. Charleston, S.C.

Lott. stabilized, was discharged from the Navy on 60-percent disability, two years abort of his 20-year retirement.

The family moved to Homestead, Fia., where he began working as a communications dispatcher at Metro-Dade County's fire alarm office. His condition continued to worsen. Just before quitting last October, he first learned from doctors that his case was terminal.

The news, he said, "was like hitting a brick wall. I thought I was going to retire from the fire department and buy a boat."

## Film: 90-Minute Message Of Freedom

WASHINGTON (UPI) - For 90 minutes Sunday, the United States sent a message around the world that the Polish people are not alone in their struggle for freedom.

The message came in the form of a radio and television program, "Let Poland be Poland," It featured statements of support for the Solidarity labor movement from President Reagan and the leaders of 14 other democracies, Sponsored by the International Communication Agency, the program cost about \$350,000 to produce and \$150,000 to transmit via satellite. An ICA official said 48 countries agreed to accept Sunday's "feed."

The ICA estimated the Sunday audience for the broadcast was 90 million. Of that number, the agency said the program was heard or viewed by 30 million in West Germany, 15 million in Italy, 11 million in France and 5 million in the Netherlands.

"Substantial portions" of the program were carried during prime time in those nations, an ICA spokeswoman said.

The Public Broodcasting Service also made the program available to its affiliates in this country.

The Soviet Union and Polish Communist officials have denounced the broadcast as propaganda interference from Washington. The film was not aired in the Soviet Union.

The Soviet news agency Teas said, "The 'prayer for treedom' (voiced in the American film) comes from those who encourage and feed the most reactionary, dictatorial and anti-national regimes, those who arm the Israeli aggressor and torpedo sanctions against the racist-ruled Republic of South Africa, the huge concentration camp."

The Kremlin also issued a rebuttal in the form of a 45minute radio program stressing the flood of aid going from socialist capitals to Warsaw.

Poland's Deputy Foreign Minister Jozef 'Viejacs said on Warsaw Radio that the film "was in bad taste ... a harmful act that may contribute to the deterioration of East-West relations."

Actor Chariton Heston was host of the show, and there were appearances by actress Glenda Jackson, actors Max Von Sydow, Kirk Lougias, Orson Welles, Henry Fonda, singer Frank Sinatra and comedian Bob Hope.
