DEAR READER: Histal hernia.

through menopsuse during my late 60s without any hormone therapy because the risk was thought to be too great, I changed doctors and at age 70 was given Premarin and Provera. Within a short period of time my weight shot up from a constant 122 pounds to 135. Even though my cating habits have not changed, and try as I may using the same previous methods. I cannot shed a pound. Rather, I seem to be gaining a pound every few days.

Am I fooling myself by believing that nothing's changed or could the hormones be responsible?

DEAR READER: Premarin and Provers often cause the body to retain excess fluid, leading to unwanted weight gain.

You're not fooling yourself; your weight gain may merely be "water-weight" that is the result of the hormones.

I think that you should seriously consider discontinuing this therapy. Recent medical studies have indicated an unacceptable risk of breast cancer in women taking hormones. This risk increases with age.

On the other hand, postmenopausal hormone therapy does seem to retard osteoporosis and protect against heart dis-

Therefore, you and your gynecologist must carefully weigh the risks and benefits of these medicines. If, for example, you have osteoporosis or heart discase (or if close relatives suffered these afflictions at young ages), you may well wish to continue therapy. The benefits would outweigh the

In contrast, if you and your family are healthy and have lived long lives, you may not choose to risk developing breast cancer. Discuss this difficult decision with your doctor. Either way, you should have periodic examinations and mammograms to detect breast cancer.

Untimely death leaves void in lives of many

SANFORD - Terry Michael Hart worked hard every day for 18 years as the meat market manager at Winn Dixie on French Avenue in Sanford.

There were no celebrations to mark his dedication to his job and to the community. There were no fireworks, no dinners, no ovations.

But when Hart, 36, was killed in an automobile accident on East State Road 46 near Cocoa, there was a void in the lives of those who knew him.

"Everyone knew him," said store manager David Childs. "Everyone knew him and everyone loved him. He was an outstanding individual.

Hart lived in DeBary with his wife Jamie, his daughter Pamela Marie and his son Terry Jr., but his heart, those who knew him said, was in Sanford.

He was raised in Sanford and graduated from Seminole High School.

He was an avid supporter of Seminole High athletics and a big sports fan in general, Childs said.

Hart played in various Seminole County and City of Sanford recreation softball leagues. He was also a member of the American Water Ski Association.

Winn Dixie district manager Vergil Screws said Hart was a "great leader and role model for the young employees in the store." He noted that Hart had started young and worked hard.

"The young high school kids we have working here could really look up to him," Screws said. He said that Hart "knew everybody" in the

community because he took the time to speak with people.

"He took advantage of the opportunity to meet people and talk to them." Screws said. "When you work in a grocery store for all those years in a community like this you meet just about everyone."

Childs said the store staff was "devastated" by the death of their co-worker and friend.

begin Second study finished: Will courthouse stay or move?

SANFORD - A second report commissioned by the county to study the best location for courthouse facilities is ready for review.

Today talks begin with Seminole County commissioners and the design group that completed the study to either keep county court facilities in downtown Sanford or move them to Five Points.

Keith Reeves, president of Architectural Design Group is to make the presentation of the findings. Reeves said he is scheduled to meet with Commissioner Win Adams at 1:30 this afternoon, and Commissioner Pat Warren at 2:30.

On Oct. 31, Reeves will meet with commission Chairman Randy Morris, followed by a meeting with Commissioner Daryl McLain on Nov. I, and Dick VanDerWeide on Nov. 2.

"Until the discussions begin." Reeves said. "I can't reveal which position we have taken in our findings, but after the talks begin. the information should be made a matter of public record."

Reeves said it is his understanding that public hearings will eventually be held on his findings.

Earlier, Architect Bruce Andersen had been contracted by the county and City of Sanford to undertake a financial study of the move. It was dated August, 1995. In it, Andersen reported that the Five Points area has the potential to continue the growth it has seen in the past years. regardless of whether the court facilities are moved, while the downtown Sanford area would probably suffer if the operations were moved out. You can now buy liquor in Sanford on Sunday

SANFORD - Sanford merchants with proper alcoholic beverage licenses may now sell their products on Sunday.

The decision has been approved by the City Commission, and became effective as of second reading and adoption of Ordinance 3271 on Oct. 9.

Several store managers and owners, aware of this change, have already tested the waters and offered sales beginning this past Sunday.

Shift manager Joe Schiek at ABC Liquors, 2885 S. Highway 17-92, said the store began opening on Sundays last weekend. "I wasn't on duty at that time," he said, "but I know that sales were only at their standard level."

Walgreens Liquor Store, at 2501 S. French, also opened for the first Sunday on this past weekend. 'Business was slow," said store manager Sheila Robinson, "but we hadn't put up any signs or advertised, so people didn't know we would be open.

She added that she expected a larger number of customers this week, "once people know that we can do this.'

The actual wording of the ordinance appears to be somewhat restrictive, then rather confusing. "No alcoholic beverage may be sold. consumed or served or permitted to be served or consumed in any place holding a beverage license under the laws of the state between the hours of 2 a.m. and 7 a.m. immediately following on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday,

City decides on fences

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission has decided not to make proposed amendments to its Land Development Regulations pertaining to chain link fences.

The changes have been discussed on several occasions by both the city's Planning and Zoning Commission. Board of Adjustment and during work sessions by the city commission. The first reading was to have detailed an ordinance which would limit chain link fences in residential areas based on the number of fences already installed in blocks and/or neighborhoods.

Decisions were split however. Most recently, P&Z voted five to four, to keep the existing provisions in place, and scrap the suggested changes.

As the matter stands now, with the 1991 version of the ordinance, waivers and exemptions to allow chain link fences in front yards may be sought for single family residences through the P&Z site plan review. Barbed wire fences will remain prohibited in seven different zoning categories. Both type of fences will be prohibited in required buffer areas, and barbed wire and/or chain link fences are still prohibited in non-residential areas but the P&Z may consider waivers based on security considerations.

The matter was discussed extensively during the city commission's workshop meeting Monday afternoon. When the ordinance came up for first reading during the regular meeting. the commission elected to do nothing, which allows the original ordinance to stand as it has for the past four years.

TAMPA - Aiming to increase its profitability. Anheuser-Busch Companies Inc. announced Wednesday it will close its Tampa brewery by year's end, eliminating 375 jobs.

Checks are in SOOI

TALLAHASSEE - Half a million people who paid nearly \$300 to register out-of-state cars in Florida should be getting their

money back by early December. The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles announced Wednesday it would mail the first batch of refund checks In late November.

"We're glad that today is here," said Janet Dennis, an agency spokeswoman.

At one point since the \$295 impact fee was found unconstitutional last fall, the agency was getting 2,000 to 3,000 calls a day from people asking about the status of refunds, Dennis said. The volume of calls has dropped: just 750 people called Monday. Dennis said the agency has done what it could to expedite the refunds.

"We have bent over backwards trying to move this thing along," she said.

Lawmakers voted in 1990 to require a \$295 fee of people who registered out-ofstate cars in Florida. The justification was that newcomers ought to bear more of the cost of the wear-and-tear they bring to the state's roads.

But the Florida Supreme Court struck the down the impact fee, ruling it was unconstitutional to levy it just on newcomers.

In late November, the first refund mailing will go to approximately 510,000 of the 650,000 people who paid the fee between July 1991 and September 1994.

Refund applications received last month are still being processed, according to the highway department, which said checks would be mailed monthly until all authorized refunds are issued.

People had until Oct. 2 to apply for refunds. The highway agency estimates from 30,000 to 40,000 people owed refunds


didn't apply for them. The checks will go out in first-class make But before they're cut, the list of per-owed refunds will be compared to list people who owe the state back taxes or behind on child support. Those debts will subtracted.

If someone paid less than \$295, they'll back whatever they paid. This occurred cases where sales tax paid at the time purchase was subtracted from the fee.

Heavy rains cause heavy crop losses

ORLANDO - Florida's heavy rains caused heavy crop losses and will impact the state's production of winter vegetables. officials say. Rainfall and flooding killed 11,700 cattle and damaged the sugar crop. Crop losses were estimated at \$150 million so far. The financial loss for cattle ranchers has not been calculated. "Our winter vegetable market is definitely hurt," said Tim Manning of the federal government's Farm Service Agency, in Gainesville.



EDITORIAL **Final report?**

Tick, tick, tick, the hands of the clock keep going around and time passes. This afternoon, the clock's hands hopefully will begin to gather at the appointed time of decision.

Beginning this afternoon, architects are to start meeting, individually, with members of the Seminole County Commission. They will be unveiling what has been considered (hopefully) the final word on whether or not the Seminole County Courthouse should remain in Sanford or be moved to the county complex at Five Points in the extreme southern part of the city.

If everything goes as planned, Commissioners Win Adams and Pat Warren will have met individually with the architects who have compiled the document. Commission Chairman Randy Morris is to meet with the architects on Tuesday. Wednesday it will be Commissioner Daryl McLain and Thursday with Dick Van Der Welde.

At press time for today's edition of the Sanford Herald, the findings of the report were not made public. Will the report indicate the courthouse should be moved or should it stay where it is, with expected major expansions?

Architect Bruce Andersen had previously given the County Commission his report on the economic feasibility on the move versus remaining at the current facility. Anderson was contracted jointly by the county and City of Sanford to make his study. Andersen's study said the only logical decision, from the financial point of view, would be to keep the courthouse downtown.

The architects of this latest report have chosen to meet with county commissioners on an individual basis to respond directly to questions and may have regarding their findisge, La

At wome later date, it is expected that the study will be brought up during a regular commission meeting which can be attended by members of the public.

Harsh penalties for petty crimes

Back in 43 B.C., the Roman philosopher Cicero it's their first strike. set down a legal principle that endures to this day: "Let the punishment fit the crime."

I was reminded of this dictum when I dropped by my neighborhood liquor store recently to buy a couple of cigars. My pal Vic. who owns the place, wasn't his usual upbeat self.

He was furning about a new California law that empowers the government to permanently shut down his business, and deprive him of his livelihood, if he sells alcohol to minors on three occasions within three years.

The law is intended to curb underage drinking by cracking down on unscrupulous merchants who knowingly sell alcohol to kids. But even honest, law-abiding liquor-store owners, like Vic. can be duped from time to time by enterprising youths (using fake identification) seeking pleasures of the vine.

If this were not bad enough, the state Alcoholic Beverage Control Department routinely deploys undercover, underage youths to try to induce liquor-store owners to illegally sell to minors. To Vic's mind, this borders on entrapment.

If a merchant unknowingly sells alcohol to kids, the government is right to assess a fine. If a proprietor knowingly sells alcohol to kids, then they deserve to lose their liquor license, even if

But the government, represented by the state ABC in this case, makes no distinction between the conscientious merchant and the unconscientious. Thus, unfair punishment is sure The travails of li-

quor-store owners in California may appear inconsequential in a discussion of crime and punishment in America. But most ordinary folk don't form their opinions of justice in this country by appearing before a judge or jury (or






Here are a few more examples from the recent DCW3:

In the seaside resort town of Santa Cruz, Calif., police strong-armed a Good Samaritan -- clad in a clown costume, no less - who committed the heinous crime of putting coins in parking meters that were about to expire. Cory McDonald, a.k.a. "Mr. Twister." was cited for "unauthorized deposit of coins."

Santa Cruz is like a lot of other municipalities around the country that fatten up their coffers by aggressively ticketing law-abiding car owners who fail to feed enough coins into parking meters. In most cases, fines are grossly out of line with the harmless offense.

For instance, in downtown San Diego a patron who comes back to their car a minute or two after the meter is expired is likely to find a \$30 ticket on their windshield. That's a 1,200 percent penalty for failure to put a quarter in a parking meter. You expect that kind of draconian punishment in Singapore, but not in America.

You've probably heard by now that you were in a funk for a few weeks last November. President Bill Clinton informed us of this last month, and we should assume he is right even if we didn't realize it, because he is privy to a lot of information, such as daily intelligence briefings, that we are not aware

We hope by that time, regardless of the report's findings, that the commissioners will base their ultimate decisions on what is best for the people. Not just those working in county facilities, but the people of the downtown Sanford area who will certainly suffer great losses if the courthouse is moved.

Many outstanding projects are on hold waiting for a decision. If the commissioners decide to move part of the courthouse operation to Five Points, there is an indication that a massive parking garage will not be built just south of the Sanford City Hall. The expansion of the SunBank on W. First Street will possibly be dropped.

Even though a planned development request has been approved by the Sanford City Commission for a multi-million dollar improvement project on the Monroe Harbour Marina, at the Marina Hotel site, it may also be scrapped if the court facility is moved.

There are many negatives to moving the facility. Certainly, it will cost money to expand the present structures if they stay, and it may cause some financial concerns. but not as much as we (and Bruce Andersen) believe it would be if the facility is moved.

Now that the paperwork is coming out in the open this afternoon, we hope the county commissioners will look at the needs of all the people, in making their decision.

If the report indicates the facility should remain in the downtown area, we also hope the commissioners will let the matter end, and not urge that additional studies be made. which will delay progress even further. We've had enough of that. Let's get on to the business of serving the people.

ELLEN GOODMAN Bureaucrat looks kinda friendly

BOSTON - I have to admit that the tobacco industry is pretty nimble considering its size. Every time you think the gargantuan's been knocked out, up it comes, like an aging boxer with just enough moves to the stay in the ring for another round.

In their latest save-our-butt campaign, the industry first created a villain so big, so bad, that they hoped he would make them look good by comparison. The evil eminence in the latest RJR ad campaign was none other than - EEEK! - A Big. Bad, Bloated Bureaucrat.

Appearing in newspapers across the country this month was the photo of a smiling, fat, smug, old white guy, the Unknown Bureaucrat, over a line that asked: "Who Should Be

Responsible For Your Children." "In our society," the ad warned. "the government should not replace parents and teachers when it comes to educating our children about smoking, drinking and other important lifestyle decisions."

Now comes another ad in which RJR offers their corporate services - with a straight face this time - as a partner to parents helping kids resist the "powerful pressure from their peers" which leads them to that smoking "lifestyle." Oozing sincerity, RJR implores us to "Listen. Empathize. Be involved. And always bear in mind that growing up is hard to do." We should also give kids tips on saying no. For example, Kids "can use humor, an exclient way to defuse a tense situation."

is it possible the tobacco mogula are going for the yucks themselves?

When he first appeared at my table, RJR's Bureaucrat looked an awful lot like a wholly owned political subsidiary of the tobacco lobby. He bore about as much resemblance to the FDA's David Kessler - the industry's real nemesis - as I do.

But we are witnessing yet another move to slow down the first serious government altempt at curtailing teen-age smoking. When the campaign was announced in August for regulations to curb cigarette ads and outlaw both vending machine sales and self-service displays, the tobacco companies filed various lawsuits and claimed that they don't target minors.

Now, adding insult to nictotine injury, the parents of Joe Camel are insisting in ads that We all agree we must do something to keep eigarettes out of the hands of children under the age of eighteen."

Well, trusting RJR to educate the kids about smoking is like trusting Calvin Klein to teach them about sex. (If you think Klein's white panties were kiddle porn, you ought to see RJR's black lungs 1

The tobacco industry first pledged not to market to kids 30 years ago. If we had collected the fines of up to \$100,000 they pledged to levy on themselves for every

violation of their own code, we could probably buy our own legislators.

Here is a hint about their education format. From a memo obtained by The Washington Post, we now know that an RJR executive proposed marketing to underage kids as long ago as the mid-1970s. Claude E. Teague Jr.'s memo is sprinkled with references to the peer

group known as 'pre-smokers'' and 'learners.' Remember the

training bra? Teague describes a training cigarette.

RJR was told how to create "youth brands" with a specific nicotine content and specific taste that would overcome the kids' initial resistance to "the flavor of tobacco smoke (which) is initially foreign and not pleasant."

The cigarette folks are nothing if not sympathetic toward adolescents. They share the pain. As

the executive wrote. "The fragile, developing self-image of the young person needs all of the support and enhancement it can get." All the support it can inhale anyway.

I have built up some resistance to hypocrisy over the years. But the offer to help kids resist peer pressure is too much for even my immune system. Peer pressure doesn't come out of the ozone. These guys created it in their marketing lab. As the memo said, any marketing geared to the young. "should emphasize togetherness. belonging and group accptance...

And never mind the health thing because psychologically, at eighteen, one is immortal."

It wasn't just RJR that practiced what Teague preached. You can match Philip Morris up against Reynolds, run the Marlboro Man against Joe Camel. The glamorous anorexic ads, the T-shirts, the baseball caps, the racetrack promotions have been geared toward 'pre-smokers'' for decades.

How many times do we have to discover what we already know about the tobacco pushers?

Allow me to redirect the question in the ad: WHO IS MORE RESPONSIBLE TOWARD **OUR CHILDREN, A BUREAUCRAT OR RJR?"** You know, in just the right light, the Bureaucrat from central villain casting looks kinda friendly.

ber," when we elected all those Republicans. and that now we are "moving into a more positive frame of mind."

I point out all this merely to demonstrate how fortunate we are to live in America. where funks are rational and of short duration. This is not the case in many other nations.

Take Islamic countries. Some of them stay in a constant funk for fear some hot-blooded male person might catch a glimpse of a female ankle and lose control of himself. Some of these countries have even banned satellite dishes because they bring sinful images right into the living room. Earlier this year, religious authorities in Kuwalt nixed Barble dolls because "this she-devil has polished nails and wears skirts above the knee.'

Take India. A year ago, dairy farmers in this country got in a grand funk when a Norwegian company proposed to ship 3 million tons of liquefled cow dung a year to India. The idea was to fill empty oil tankers from the Middle East with the stuff and send it down Delhi way to be used as fertilizer. This upset some people in India, where cows are sacred and an estimated 100,000 of them and their water buffalo cousins wander the streets of New Delhi and deposit 15,000 tons of droppings every month. It was a dumb idea for India "to become a dung-importing nation." one protest leader told the Washington Post.

This year, the Indians are in a big funk because Col. Sanders is importing Kentucky Fried Chicken to the city of Bangalore and, the anti-KFC crowd says, the colonel's chemical and hormone-stuffed poultry will ruin the public's health.

Take France. No nation in the world seems to get in more funks than France. French farmers are always complaining that their subsidies are inadequate. French fishermen are always demanding that the government control the importation and price of foreign fish. French film makers are always griping that too many American movies are being shown.

And their culture. Everybody in France, it seems, spends much of their day worrying that their precious culture is being diluted by alien forces. One thing the French have in abundance, however, is dogs, and they are the source of yet another Big French Funk. Slippery deposits of dog doo on the sidewalks are sending 650 Parisians a year to the hospital. One contractor hired to clean up the mess collects 3.5 tons of the stuff daily. Recently, a group of artists attempted to shame dog owners by drawing chalk circles around piles of canine crap to depict it sitting on plates, and then added spaghetti. salad, utensils and glasses.







WASHINGTON - The House and Senate are bracing for their first votes on milestone Republican budget-balancing plans, as leaders of the two chambers continue cutting deals to solidify their expected victory margins.

Brandishing fresh agreements with wavering lawmakers on Medicald and agriculture. House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., and Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., marched their chambers toward passage of similar measures, despite a veto threat from the White House.

The House was poised to approve the legislation today, while the Senate seemed likely to follow Friday.

Both bills claim to balance the budget by 2002 by extracting savings from Medicare, Medicaid, benefits for veterans, and hundreds of programs all across the government.

Probe continues into bus crash

FOX RIVER GROVE, III. - Investigators tried to determine today whether a malfunctioning traffic light held a school bus on railroad tracks as a commuter train slammed into it at up to 60 mph.

The wreck killed five students and injured about 30 others. Eleven students remained hospitalized today, five in critical condition.

Sensors embedded in the tracks are supposed to change the crossing's traffic light to green as a train approaches to signal vehicles to clear the intersection, officials said.

AIDS study: Body and Its own defense

NEW YORK - In a new sign of how slippery a foe the AIDS virus is, researchers reported today that it can infect key blood cells even after it's trapped and chemically handcuffed by the body.

The result shows that researchers must find ways to attack the trapped HIV, researcher Gregory Burton said.

Scientists have long known that large populations of HIV become trapped by a weblike mesh in lymphoid tissues like the tonsils, spleen and lymph nodes.

Studies show that HIV infects blood cells in lymphoid tissues. but it hasn't been clear whether the trapped HIV was responsible.

That's because the trapped viruses are "handcuffed," covered with antibodies and other immune system proteins that should prevent them from infecting cells.

But the new study says they are infectious, and it blames the cells that form the weblike mesh. Somehow, these cells let trapped HIV continue to infect despite its handcuffs, researchers from Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond report in today's issue of the journal Nature.

Burton, an assistant professor of microbiology and immunology, said current anti-HIV drugs may not work against the trapped virus because they are aimed at blocking reproduction. and HIV does not reproduce while trapped.

"We go out and destroy the virus at other sites, but it remains sitting (while trapped) ... waiting to infect as soon as it gets an opportunity," he said.

The web-making cells are called follicular dendritic cells. Their normal job is to trap and hold bits of foreign material. which serve to remind the disease-fighting immune system what germs and other invaders look like.

The new work was done in mice and in test tubes. Researchers found that when HIV was handcuffed by so-called neutralizing antibodies, it could still infect its key target. T cells of the immune system, but only if dendritic cells were present.



ORLANDO - Shaquille O'Neal will have surgery on his broken right thumb and may be sidelined until just before New Year's.

"I want to be playing by Christmas, but I'm not going to rush anything," O'Neal said Wednesday. "My team is good enough 18 where they can hold their own without me."

The 7-foot center who led the Orlando Magic to the NBA Finals last season will be operated on Thursday, a minor procedure to repair a piece of the bone in his thumb.

"He will be out of competitive basketball for approximately six to eight weeks after surgery." Dr. Richard Shure of the Jewett Orthopaedic Clinic said Wednesday after examining O'Neal.

O'Neal said his thumb was bent back flat

Tuesday night when he was raked across the hand by Miami center Matt Geiger on a move to the basket in the second quarter of the Magie's 106-91 exhibition victory.

Geiger was not called for a foul. In fact, O'Neal was called for traveling as he spun along the baseline and went for what looked like a dunk.

Immediately after the injury. O'Neal was furious and threatened to "show ... some of my Shaq-Fu stuff' to any other player who put a similar move on him.

But by Wednesday, O'Neal had cooled off.

"It's not a matter of getting revenge anymore, it happened and now it's over," O'Neal said. "But somebody needs to do something. I think some coaches tell their players to come in and chop me and hope I get mad and throw a punch or something and get thrown out. I guess that's a

good tactic, but it's not right. I've got to be able to protect myself."

Geiger said the Heat's game plan was to foul O'Neal if he got the ball in too close. "It was a just a normal foul. There was nothing personal about it." he said.

"You're going to get fouled because he's not a good free throw shooter." the Heat's Billy Owens said Wednesday. "You got to expect that." But some of O'Neal's teammates were bitter.

"A hard foul is a hard foul, but not when you're out there trying to hurt somebody." Horace Grant said. "That foul was ridiculous."


There was no word how the Magic will fill the center spot although they signed veteran Jon Koncak as O'Neal's backup in the offseason.

"Obviously I'm not going to provide the offense that Shaquille did, but that's not why they brought me here," Koncak said. "I came here to help with the defense and rebounding and step in if there was an emergency.

In Tuesday's game, O'Neal finished with 11 points in 13 minutes. He was 4-for-6 from the field and 3-for-4 from the foul line. He was averaging 22.8 point a game during preseason.

In his three seasons, O'Neal has missed only three games because of injury. Last season he averaged 29.3 points. 11.4 rebounds and 2.4 blocks to lead the Magic to the Eastern Conference championship and the finals for the first time.

"Everyone on this team would rather be playing with Shaquille than without him, but it's no use talking about what you don't have." Magic coach Brian Hill said. "We've got to have our guys clevate their game some and go with what we have."


