

# Mackie Brothers Announce New Low Cost 1970 Housing Plans

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — The Mackie brothers, pioneers of the mobile home industry, announced today that they have developed a new line of mobile homes that they say will be the most popular in the industry.

The units, put together on a Sarasota factory assembly line, were far removed from the humble "tin can" houses that were jammed together in parks around the nation and sometimes seen piled in shantytowns after a natural disaster.

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come families now priced out of the housing market. The Mackies are planning into a field which has shown phenomenal growth. Thirty-three of every 100 new single family dwellings sold in the nation last year sold at under \$13,000 were mobile homes.

The brothers bought Fortune Home Corp. of Sarasota in 1968, and are now planning to build their models apart and redesign them with stronger engineering techniques.

At the Sarasota factory, a bare metal chassis on wheels rolls onto one end of an assembly line. Three days later, a time and turn out eight complete homes a day.

Because of highway restrictions, only the smaller houses leave the factory in one piece. Others are shipped in sections called modules, but once at the home site they can be assembled so quickly the family can move in the same day.

At St. Augustine, the Mackies also plan eight-unit garden apartments consisting of 11 modular units which can be transported from the factory, assembled and tied down in a week.

## Airport School Mystery Studied

What ever happened to that drafting school that was supposed to open at Sanford Airport in Building 3107? That's the question being asked by Airport Manager J. S. (Red) Cleveland, since there has been no communication from the Orlando-located facility after an early Spring appearance at the Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) meeting by Larry White, director of Draftac, a school for training draftsmen.

White sought to lease the airport structure for a five-year period and after some tumult and subdued shouting over the contract negotiation, the SIC on a split vote approved a lease which allowed the school to withhold a portion of the rental fee for a period of time.

Cleveland said SIC Attorney W. C. Hutchison has drawn up the lease pursuant to SIC wishes, but since there has been no contact from either White or Draftac over the actual contract signing.

Draftac proposed to do some renovation to the existing concrete Navy built quarters to accommodate the school on the first floor with student quarters on the remaining two stories, but since the lease lacks signing, no work can be started.

Draftac indicated months ago they wanted to be in Building 310 by July 1, but so far no one from the drafting school has arrived at the structure.

Cleveland said he had called the Orlando school several times, but has been unable to contact White. "As far as we're concerned the building is up for lease," Cleveland advised.

## Polk's Request - All-Time High

Seminole County Sheriff John A. Polk has submitted a total \$642,540.82 budget request to the county commission. This is an all time high for the operation of the sheriff's office, which because of area growth and inflation, is \$151,601.82 more than the \$490,938.66 approved 1969-70 fiscal year by the commission.

The new budget figures listed by Polk contain salary requests of \$397,470 for all sheriff's office employees, except the sheriff. Polk's pay, which is tied to a state population index, calls for \$16,225 salary next year.

## N. Orlando Considers Massive Trailer Site

NORTH ORLANDO — Village Council continued until July 16 at 7:30 p.m. the change in zoning classification in trailer parks from the present R-1 to the requested R-T.

The applicant, Gerstung Construction Company, proposes a "thing of beauty" rental trailer park at Hays and Moss Roads to SR 454. The park will encompass 90 acres and, according to Mrs. Lee Gerstung, represents an investment of in excess of \$1 million.

It was pointed out that the park will have one area for families and one for retirees, with nature trails, bicycle paths, two swimming pools, a clubhouse and all underground utilities.

Several points of clarification were elucidated for comparison between the rental trailer park as opposed to trailer lot sales subdivision. The trailer park subdivision has a controlled mobile home size, landscaping, lawn care, controlled junk and litter nuisance, controlled sanitation, and a rigid control of undesirable.

Council member Charles Kelly explained that the park will have the entrance built on the public right-of-way which will eliminate the situation which has plagued residents of Carriage Hill.

We are firmly convinced that the canal should be completed as soon as possible. We regret that the delay from 1970 to 1977 is the trap in which the canal is now caught.

We are as firmly committed to the preservation of the great natural beauties — Silver Springs, for instance — as any. We agree that every measure should be taken and the sharpest watch maintained on the subterranean fresh water supply.

It is also necessary that those who are engaged in blocking or destroying the canal accept the fact that there are regular updates of costs, that the economic benefits of the canal are subject to the same sort of re-appraisal.

Proper introduction of the ecological issue is quite to be expected. This is not confined to the canal, of course, but is present in almost every area of the state where the rivers, ponds and lakes are being polluted.

Yet it is this growing public alarm which could be used to cry "wolf" where no wolf exists and do the kind of basic and permanent harm which Florida — especially Central Florida — can ill afford.

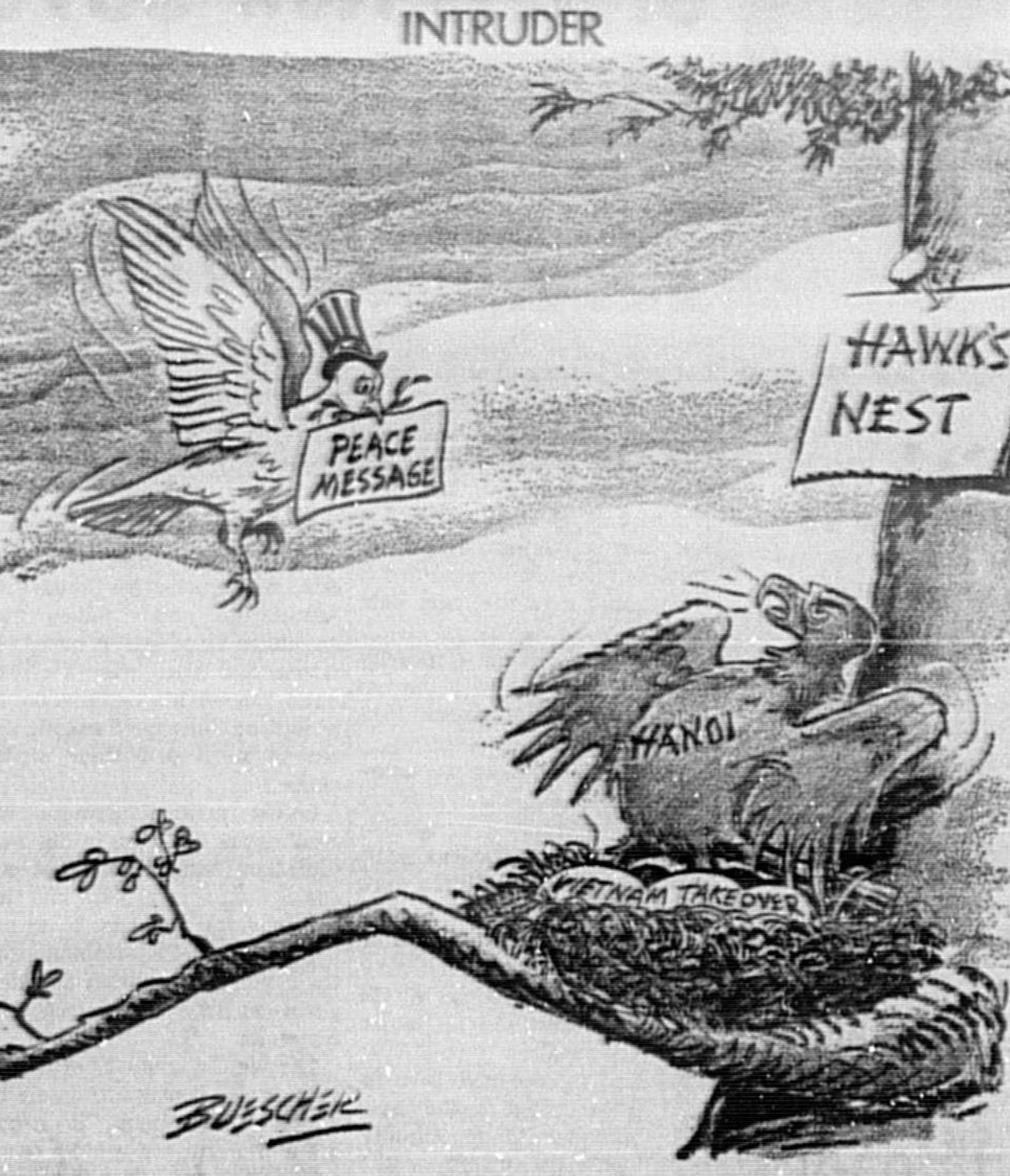

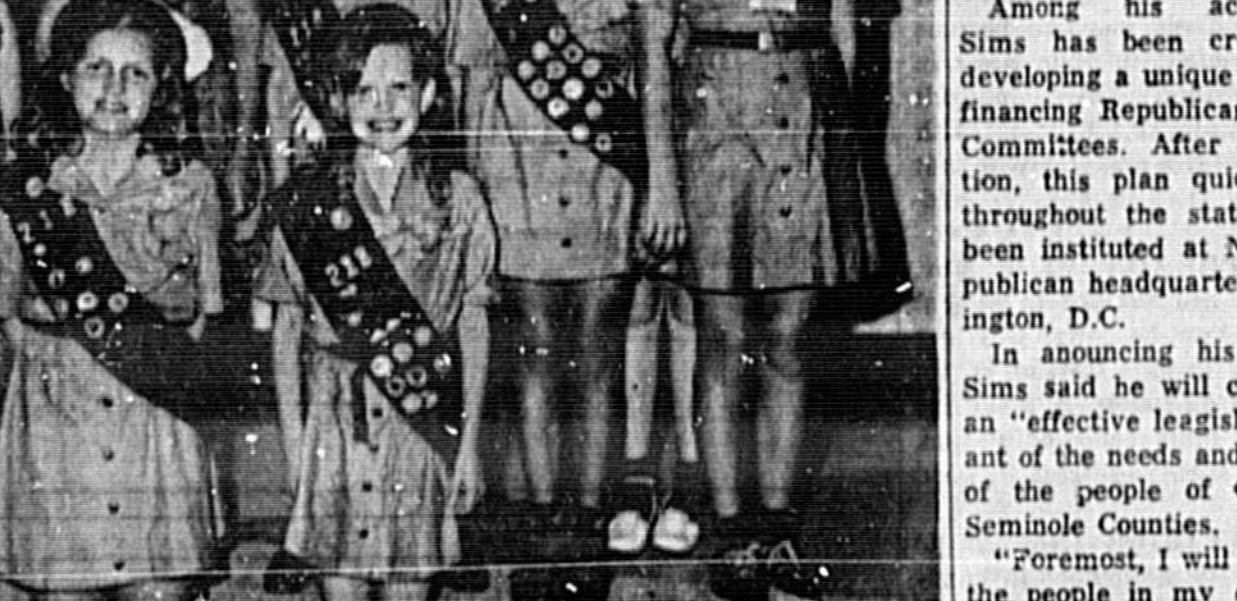

Now for the dime I gave them tonight, I expect to get a newspaper with all the local news, all of the state news, all of the national news, and all of the international news. And I want every bit of it to be fresh, I don't want to read anything that I have read before.

For the dime I gave them, I want at least 20 local pictures of news events and the people who made the news. I want pictures of accidents, fires, meetings, plays, baseball games and anything else I think is important.

It won't do any good to try to reason with me, I know my rights. Why, if I had wanted, I could have bought a bottle of soda-pop with that dime. I could have made a telephone call, or purchased a fourth of a gallon of gasoline... but, instead I gave The Herald my dime!

Because I gave them my dime, I want to know the latest things about area school boards, city commissions, the state legislature, the governor, the U. S. Congress, the President, and the war in Vietnam. I also expect them to tell me who died in the last 24 hours, who was born in the last 24 hours, and who was married.

I want to read about what my church is doing and when. I don't care if there are more than 130 churches in this area, I want to read about MY church.

I want to know what those guys in Tallahassee and Washington are doing with my tax money. I want them to tell me all about the Apollo and moon exploration programs, who has the H-bomb, and whether the Nazi Party is really coming back in Germany. They owe all of this to me, because I just gave them a dime.

I want them to cover every high school basketball and baseball game, and every play, ladies' tea, wedding and anniversary celebration in town. It makes no difference that there are 8 junior and senior high schools, 20 elementary schools, a junior college and a college in their circulation area; I expect their reporters to be there and cover them, because I just gave them a dime.

I want to read just as much about Democrats as I do Republicans, and just as much about Protestants as I do Catholics and Jews. I don't care if it is impossible to do it every day, I want them to do it, because I just gave them a dime.

If I got drunk and have a wreck, I don't want them to print my name in the paper. And I don't want anything in that paper about my buying a house, or selling a house. I have a friend who is getting a divorce and they can leave that out too.

I want to see for myself whether the prices are cheaper at the plaza food store or the downtown competitor. I want to know where I can buy a good second hand car, what's playing at the movies and what's for sale in classified. And they had better do it too, because I just gave them a dime.

Just because I don't have too much education, I don't want them to think they can take advantage of me. It doesn't make any difference if I don't do anything for my schools, church or city government; I pay my taxes, and I just gave them a dime, and I want to see if my name in that paper. And they had better spell it right too. I expect every name in that paper to be spelled right, I don't want any mistakes; if there are any mistakes to be made, I'll make them... but they can't because I just gave them my dime.

I want to make sure that they understand one more thing. Just because they might do all the things I've already asked, I don't want them to think they can deliver my paper any way they want. I want that paper delivered right to my front door, not in the front yard or on the roof. I want it rolled or folded neatly and it had better not be late either. I eat at 5:20 and I want that newspaper there when I sit down to eat.

When I meet one of their people on the streets I expect them to give me all the inside dope. I expect them to serve as publicity chairman on any committee I want, and I expect their reporters to agree with everything I think or do. If I want to call them at 11 o'clock at night and give them a hot news item, I have that right. I'm too busy in the mornings and won't have time.

And any time I want to call them and ask how many children Al Capone had, or how much gasoline Lindbergh used on his flight to Paris, I expect them to know — I don't want to have to call back.

Next week I'm going to start my own business, and I want a news item and picture about it. No, I don't expect to take any advertising with them; if they run the news story and picture about my opening, I won't need any advertising. After all, I just gave them a dime for that lousy sheet, and for a dime that's all I expect.

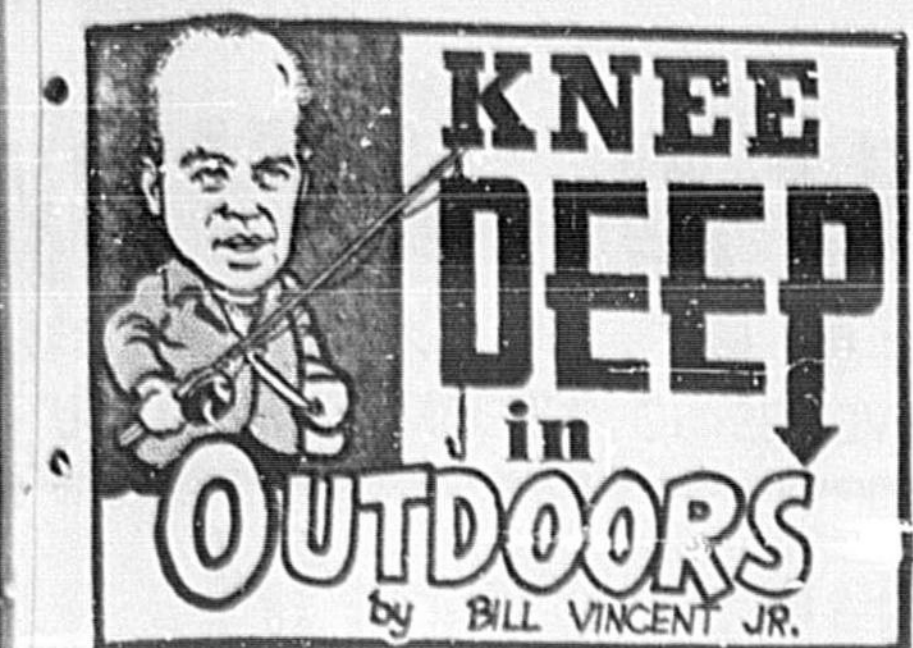

Willie Mays was surprised, Rico Carty was startled and Hank Aaron was just plain grateful.

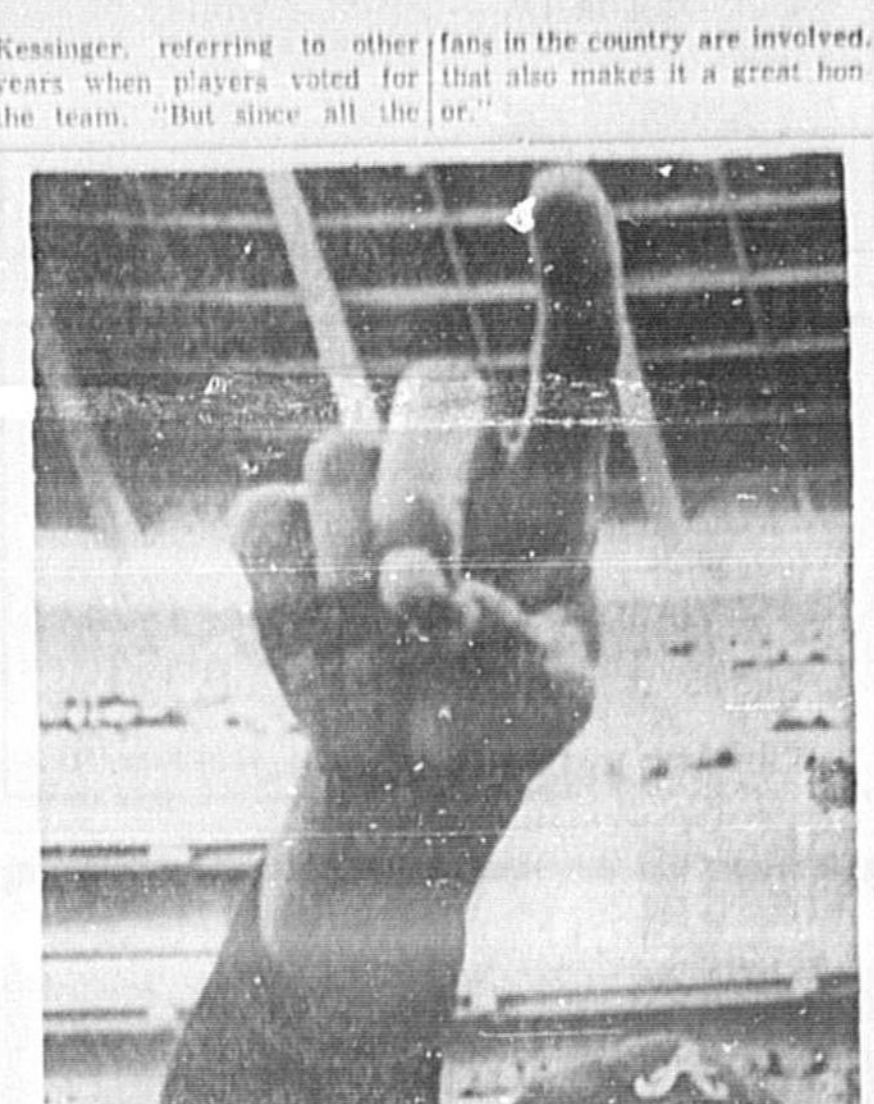
The three outfielders were among players who expressed their reaction after being picked for the National League All-Star team Monday.

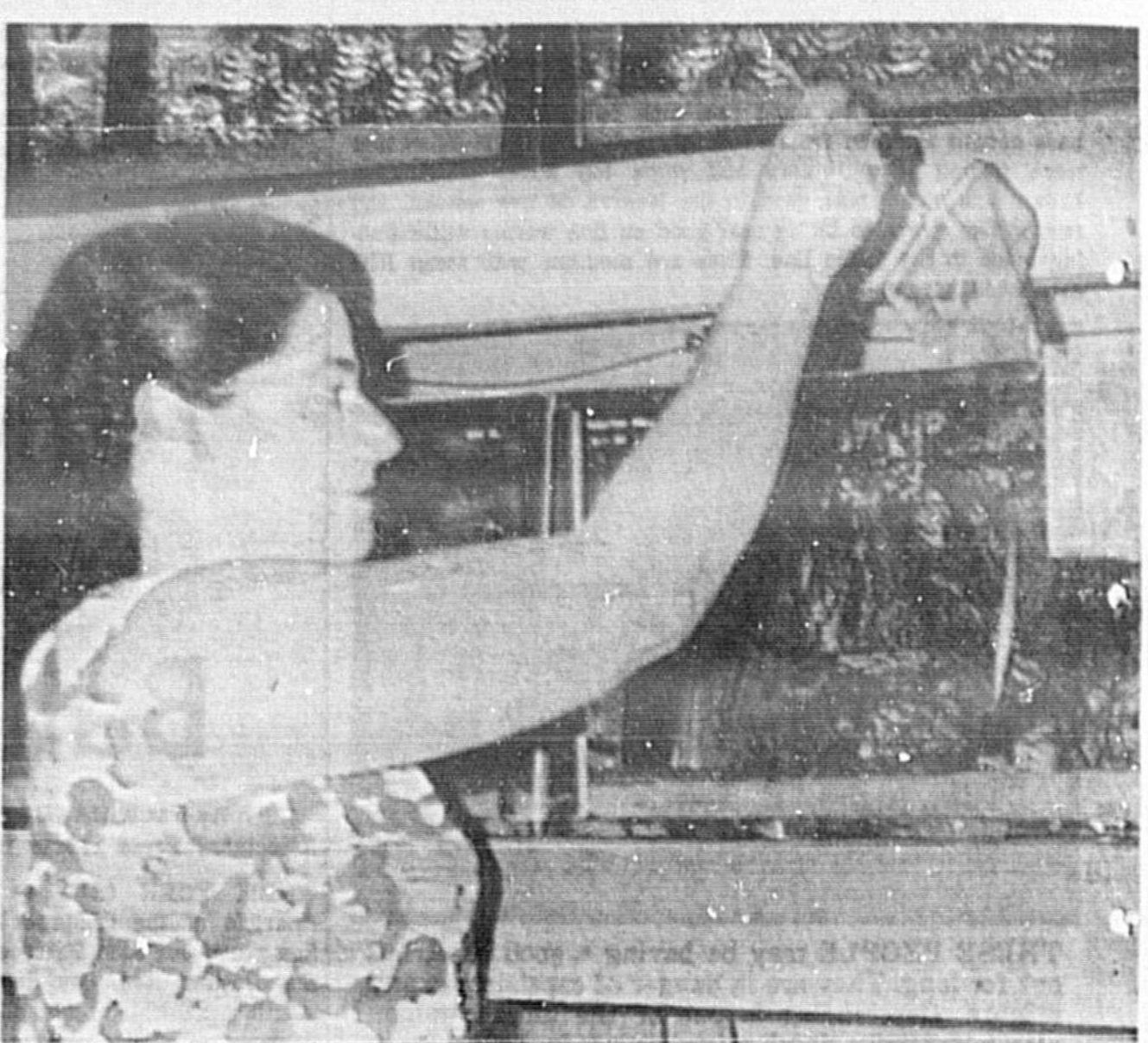

## Goodyear's Figures Revealing

AKRON, Ohio—American spent nearly \$1.5 billion in 1969 to put new rubber between the driver's wheels and its high ways. Figures disclosed by The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company show that about 84 billion was spent on 120 million new replacement tires. Three out of every one tire was for nearly every American age 18 or older.

Another \$1.4-billion was spent on about 26 million civilian truck tires and about \$138-million on new tires for the nation's farm equipment.

The calculations on the U. S. tire market were made by the corporate planning and research department at Goodyear. The business experts also report that replacement tire demands will change drastically in 1970, with emphasis shifting from bias-ply tires to those of bias-belted construction.

In 1969, about 77 per cent of all replacement tires sold were of bias-ply construction and about 20 per cent were bias-belted. The remainder—about 3 per cent—were radial-ply tires, Goodyear notes.

In 1970, bias-ply tire sales are expected to drop to under 45 per cent of the replacement market while bias-belted tire sales will climb to 52 per cent.

In addition, nearly all 1970 model cars will come equipped with bias-belted tires.
