Everybody Vote

Tomorrow is election day. Three more weeks of cam-paigning have brought voters face to face with their final decision among those candidates who survived the first pri-mary. Tomorrow they will indicate their preferences for presidential delegates, governor, state senate, county com-missioners, sheriff and other minor officers.

The voice of the people is great on election day. It can make or break the most powerful political boss. It may not count for much month in and month out. There may be times when some of us feel we live under a dictatorship, we are in the hands of criminal racketeers, or all powerful poli-tical machines, but conter-nection day and the man in the street is the one who rules.

That is, he rules when he exercises his right to vote. Of course if he just sits at home and says "Let George do it", his rights and privileges, as well as his kind of government, can and often are taken away from him. Almost in-variably when the crooks and grafters get into control, when machine politics dominate our government, whether local or national, it is because many decent, honest, law-abid-ing citizens did not take the trouble to vote.

It is really surprising how many people do not vote even when there is a great deal of interest in an election. For instance, in the first primary, there were over 1,100,000 persons in Florida who could have voted. It was freely predicted that 800,000 of them would, but actually only a little over 700,000 went to the polls. Even in Seminole Coun-

ty there was not as heavy a turnout as had been expected. Ordinarily the people get just the kind of government they deserve. If they take an interest in their government, their candidates and study the programs for which they stand, vote intelligently, and then maintain that interest after election day to see that projects which are good for the public are properly supported, they will have good govern-ment. If they do not, anything is likely to happen, and usually does.

Tomorrow's election should be of special interest to Seminole County citizens. Senator Russell is the first really Southern man with a chance to become president in a long Southern man with a chance to become president in a long long time, and Senator Russell has many Georgia friends liv-ing in Seminole County, Sanford has a candidate for gover-nor, the first time Sanford has produced a candidate for any state office. state office.

You may think that whether you vote or not will not make much difference. But if you can take that attitude. others may, too, and the figures mount up. Many an election has been decided by a narrow margin. Yours may be the de-ciding vote in an issue of statewide importance. So go to the polls tomorrow. Be a good citizen, and vote.

By GEORGE BOULTWOOD BONN, Germany M-The United States, Britain and France today signed a peace contract with Western Germany and then welcomed their former enemy as a "new partner in the fight for peace and freedom."

By CARTER L. DAVIDSON PARIS (b — Six nations signed today a treaty fusing their forces into a one - uniform Eruopean army. The Hig Three Western powers backed it up with the solemn declaration that an attack on Berlin, West Germany or any other part of Free Europe would be a "threat to their own security." The declaration was concident with the ceremonial signing of the army pact and retated agree-ments by France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg which, when rati-fied, will merge their armed forces into a single army of one million men-history's first peace-time international force.
