



### **Homosexual Sergeant**

#### May Face Discharge

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va. (AP) - Sgt. Leonard P. Matlovich, who teaches classes in race relations here, says he no longer feels like a hypocrite because his students now know he is a homosexual Matlovich, 31. admitted in a letter to his commanding officer two months ago that he was a homosexual. But he argues that his record shows his sexual leanings don't detract from his abilities. He served three tours on duty in Vietnam and won medals each tour, including the Purple Heart. Now the 12-year veteran's career in the Air Force may be ended with a less than honorable discharge.

#### Solzhenitsyn Visits U.S.

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) - Exiled Soviet author Alexander Solzhenitsyn has arrived on American soil for the first time for a private tour of this gast former Russian colony purchased by the United States 108 years ago. His arrival Tuesday in this small drizzle-drenched state capital went almost unnoticed. Sources said Solzhenitsyn ...id his wife boarded the Alaska state ferry "Taku" at Ketchikan early Tuesday following a monthlong visit to Canada where the author reportedly was "trying to find Russia in the people and in the land."

#### Tariff To Boost Prices

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Ford administration calculates that its oil tariff will add 19 cents to every \$100 in expenses of the average consumer, who will face more expensive gasoline, fuel oil, plastics, food and a host of other products that have some link to petroleum. The consumer cost increases would be concentrated largely in the price of gasoline and fuel oil but even there the increases would be relatively small.

#### Jobs For Grads Scarce

WASHINGTON (AP) — The College Placement Council has released a survey showing an 18 per cent drop in jobs for new college grads this year. "Judging from their comments, employers do not expect appreciable provement in hiring until possibly next spring," the council said. The hiring decline was the first since the 1969-71 recession and the severity approached the 27 per cent drop in the 1970-71 season, the council said.

#### **Democrats Rap Ford**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Democrats who control Congress are sharply criticizing President Ford's latest actions to force up petroleum prices but cannot guarantee the votes to substitute their own energy program. As a result of the President's action, announced in a nationally broadcast statement Tuesday night, the price of gasoline is expected to increase by at least 1.5 cents a gallon in

Coach Larry Miller of Winter Springs Elementary School, who had bad news, however. It seems the bargains had already been snapped up by Florida Tech University and the city of Casselberry and Winter Springs Elementary completely depleting the store's inventory.

"You waited too long. Two days ago you could have gotten for \$1,000 what you needed at a savings of 33 per cent or \$500," Miller

Hunter revealed he had been unable to get help from the county in obtaining recreational equipment at a short notice and funds are not presently budgeted for the purpose by the city.

New Finance Commissioner Ernest Hendrix was instructed to find parts of the budget from which funds might be transferred to fund the proposed recreation program and report at next Monday's Council meeting. With the closing of school in the offing, time is running out for augmenting and announcing plans for a

Mayor Troy Piland warned the Council, "Decide if you are going to have a program. Summer's going to be halfway through

and you are going to be sitting here talking about it." The Council passed a motion by Hunter to proceed with plans for the recreation program, but if available funds are located in departmental budgets to fund it, it would take at least three weeks to advertise and hold the required public hearing.

Councilman John Daniels said response to a request for CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) funding for personnel had been less than encouraging. Daniels had asked for funding for hiring a full time recreation director, an arts and crafts instructor, (three hours, five days a week) and four student counselors and advisors at a total of \$2,890. # 'No Case' Brings Directed Acquittal

### **Gurney Aide Complained**

Of Probe, Attorney Says TAMPA (AP)-For nearly two years, a U. S. attorney says, he received monthly telephone calls from former Sen. Edward Gurney's chief aide complaining about a

Federal Housing Administration probe Robert W. Rust, U.S. Attorney for Florida's Southern District in Miami, testified Tuesday in the bribery conspiracy trial of Gurney and four others. He was told to return today for cross examination. Rust, appointed in 1909 on Gurney's recommendation, said an FBI agent told him about the federal investigation

But Rust said he excused himself from the case and re ferred it to the Justice Department in Washington.

#### FPC Order Is Opposed

TALLAHASSEE (AP)- President Ford's plan to increase oil tariffs will be a double punishment on Florida if it's coupled with other federal proposals, Florida's top

Democratic Sens. Lawton Chiles and Richard Stone, Gov. Reubin Askew and the Public Service Commission Tuesday protested a Federal Power Commission order that could cut off natural gas to Florida Power & Light Co. While Ford's oil tariff is designed to reduce use of imported oil, it would only mean a tax hike and higher electric bills for Floridians because losing the gas would force some state electric companies to turn to foreign oil for fuel, they said.

FP&L officials said the FPC order could raise utility bills for the average customer about \$3932 per month.

#### Consumer Law Struck Down

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A circuit judge has declared unconstitutional the state's Unfair and Deceptive Trade Practices Act, known as the "Little FTC" and hailed as a major consumer-protection law.

The law is "vague, uncertain and indefinate and unconstitutionally seeks to delegate legislative authority to other agencies," Leon County Circuit Judge Ben C. Willis said in a ruling made public Tuesday. The decision will be appealed, said Asst. Atty. Gen. Rod

The 1974 law delegated to Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin powers similar to those of the Federal Trade Commission in drawing up rules, with Cabinet approval, banning unfair and deceptive trade practices.



### Presidential Plan Will Prove Costly

Just when it appears we can see light at the end of the recession tunnel, bam, we're hit with a presidential action that does nothing more than put a higher price on just about everything the American consumer needs for survival.

In his speech to the nation last night, President Ford announced that he was taking immediate steps to increase the price on imported crude oil by \$1 per barrel and 60 cents per barrel on imported refined petroleum.

Too, he said that he will submit to Congress next month a plan which will gradually remove the price controls on domestic crude oil.

What does all this mean to us in Central Florida? For one thing, it appears the President is

telling those oil-producing nations, from whom we purchase 37 per cent of all the oil we use, that we can afford even higher prices than we're already paying for imported oil (last year we paid about \$25 billion for that 37 per cent we imported). Too, the President's action will directly affect

Central Floridians because our energy-providing sources buy foreign oil that is already refined. This most assuredly means another hike in the fuel adjustment charges that we already find staggering on our electric bills.

Perhaps an amendment to the U.S. Constitution, permitting Congress to levy a tax on exported oil, is in order.

Last year, we saw the cil industry in this country reap record profits while we were paying without bombing or major firefights, catching through the nose for gasoline -- when you could get the foe off guard.

At the same time, those U.S. oil companies were exporting over twice as much oil as they had the previous year, yet producing 500,000 barrels a day less than in 1973.

We're not saying this could be the solution to all our energy woes, but doesn't it make sense that we should place either a complete embargo on all oil exports or tax that exported oil so high that American companies would find it more profitable to keep it here for our use. We think so.

This of course, would call for a constitutional amendment, since under the original articles of the U.S. Constitution (Article I, Section 9,5) "No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any urgent need to explore the possibility of new Bailey told newsmen that at least five Viet- Davis!





### Altamonte Water Hike Opposed

Calling a move by Altamonte Springs to hike water bills for non-city residents to pay for city-supplied fire hydrants, "damned ridiculous," Seminole County Commissioner Mike Hattaway yesterday ordered the county attorney to investigate the legalities of the





A \$1.021 billion appropriation for public schools hammered out yesterday by Florida House and Senate con-ferees will plug an additional \$150,000 into grades K-3 in Seminole County schools, a school official said today. Asst. Supt. Roger Harris said the omnibus Public Education Act of 1975 stresses leaving of the "Three R's" in the lower grades by pouring in additional funds.

Sponsored by Richard Hodes, D-Tampa, the bill requires changes in the state's funding formula and stipulates that "early childhood and basic skills development programs shall be the first priority of Florida's public schools."

Calling the new bill's impact "very complicated," Harris said an additional \$26 will be spent per child in grades K-3. In Seminole County, about 7,204 students fit


