I-4 ALERT:

Eastbound exit to State Road 46 will permanently close on Friday

The Interstate 4 eastbound exit ramp to State Road 46 will be closed permanently beginning Friday, July 26, at 5 a.m.

Eastbound motorists wishing to exit off I-4 onto SR 46 must use the new exit immediately after the County Road 46A exit. (see map page 6A)

The new exit ramp is 1.86 miles long and is designed to improve traffic flow from I-4 to SR 46 and will serve as the ramp for Toll Road 417 southbound when it opens in September.

Car dealers dislike Sanford rule revision

Changes would require dealerships to have at least one acre of land

SANFORD — An ordinance that would bar car dealers from operating on less than one acre of land is drawing fire from a local used car dealer.

Jim Dunn, owner of CMC Automotive Group, said the city of Sanford's proposed revisions of Schedule E of the Land Development Regulations could be costly for his industry.

"What this is in my opinion is a poison pill," Dunn said. "This will kill the entire used car industry."

The revisions would require new and used car dealers to provide 25-foot setbacks, appropriate buffers and proper

indoor service areas. Existing car lots would be exempt from the new regulations, but any new parcels considered for auto sales, rentals or leases would have to comply with the guidelines, including a requirement that the property be at least one acre in size and have a minimum parcel width along the front property line of 150 feet.

City planner Antonia Gerli said the one acre size was selected to allow deal-

ers adequate space to display their cars and still meet the city's stricter landscaping requirements.

"The outdoor display of cars takes up so much space, that by the time you figure in the setbacks, buffers and landscaping, I don't see how you could do it on any less than an acre," Gerli said.

"I think this is a very sound planning principle," said Jay Marder, director of planning and engineering for the city.

"The question is how small can you get and still have a car lot that looks good, has good landscaping and has good circulation area so you can effectively operate?"

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said landscaping around used car dealerships was important and noted that Dunn's operation, as well as that of Mincer Motors, were good examples of used car dealerships that have attractive, functional lots.

"Jim, your place should really be the model we use," added Mayor Brady Lessard.

Commissioner Randy Jones said lack

Juveniles arrested for hate crimes

OVIDO — Three 15-year-old boys were arrested in connection with a series of crimes reported on July 17, some of which are being considered hate crimes.

Although they are juveniles, Oviedo Police Commander Mark Beaulieu said they are being charged with felony crimes, and therefore their names become a matter of public record.

Two of the youngsters, Matthew Delal and Antone James Mihelic had Oviedo addresses. The third, Nicholas Jeffery Hill is from Geneva. All three are students at Oviedo High School.

The three were apprehended after a lengthy chase by officers and some of the victims. Hill and Mihelic were found hiding under bushes near a private residence after an Altamonte Springs K-9 unit, sheriff's deputies and the sheriff's helicopter were called in. The third, Delal, was located at his home, after his father had been notified of the situation.

In all, there were eight incidents involved mostly on Bay Club Road and Canoe Creek Road.

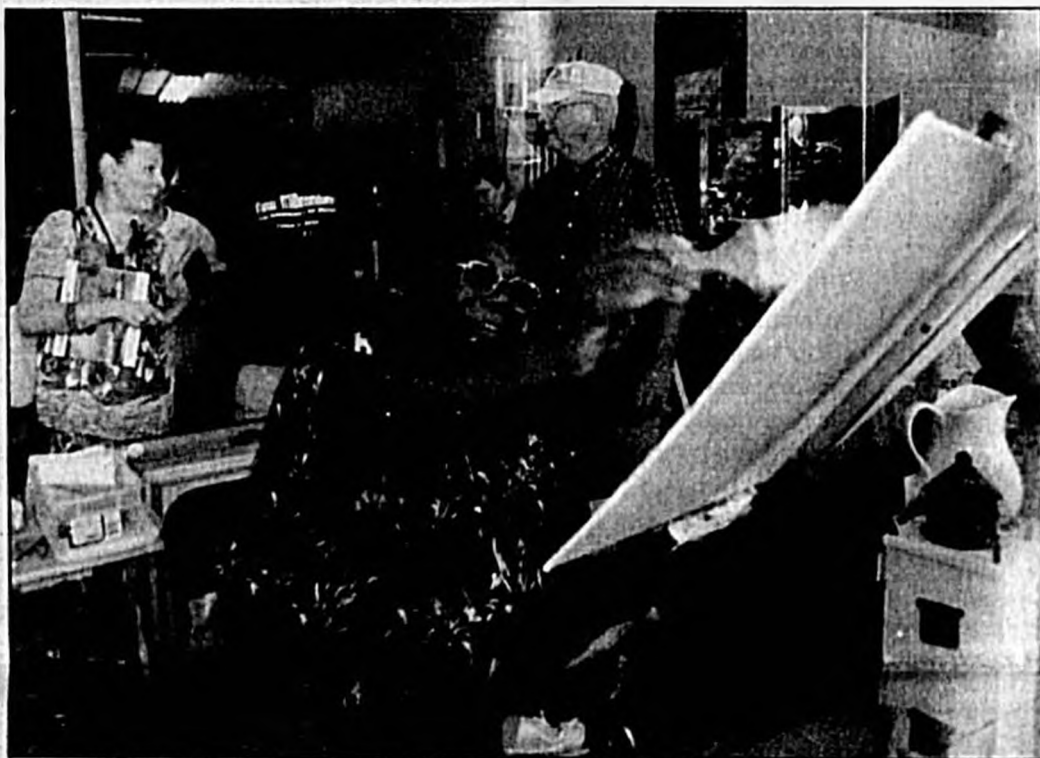
In one incident, the victim reported two rocks being thrown through the front windows of a residence, causing damage to two window screens, glass windows and vertical blinds, for a total damage report of \$505.

The second victim reported a rock thrown through the window over the front door, and two vehicles having radial slurs scratched into them for a total estimated damage of \$5,100.

The third victim also reported a large hole in the dining room window, apparently from a rock. During the investigation of that incident, an Oviedo police

City OKs bid for Riverwalk

Work should begin in August

SANFORD — Harbco Construction Inc. was awarded the a \$10.3 million contract to construct replace the seawall and build the Sanford Riverwalk along Lake Monroe.

City Commissioner approved the bid Monday night and work is expected to begin within days.

"It's going to be an exciting time," said Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard. "I like the fact that the Harbco folks are just as excited as we are to get started on this project."

The next step involves attorneys for the city and Harbco to develop the contract language. Since the company has already agreed to the city's standards and requirements by virtue of submitting its bid, contract talks should be quick, said Chris Smith, the city's Riverwalk project manager.

"I really don't see why work would not begin in August,"

Well known percussionist Sherwood Mobley has Sanford roots

A Sanford native continues to be the top timpanist in the Greenville, S.C. orchestra.

Success hasn't changed Sherwood Mobley, a Seminole High School graduate and master musician while growing up in Sanford.

Mobley was home for a few days with his family, lovely wife Deborah, and daughters Sarah and Naomi.

He was in the city visiting with his mother Freddie Muller Mobley of West Sanford and other members of his family for the annual reunion of the Mullers.

Mobley spoke of his recent

trip to Caracas, Venezuela. On June 16, he had the honor of being the main guest of the Municipal Symphonic Orchestra of Caracas. He was given one of the few opportunities to play the timpani as a solo, with the debut in that country of "Harmonic Rhythm" by an American artist.

Throughout the 22 minutes that the piece lasted, the timpanist offered the audience the opportunity to listen to this percussion instrument which differs from a regular drum in that it can be finely tuned says Mobley.

With various decades inside of the music world, Mobley has 25 years dedicated to the timpani, with his experiences giving him great pleasure in working with celebrities of the vocal

world such as Barry White, Frank Sinatra and Diana Ross.

During his around-the-world tour, he resided in Venezuela for four years and became main timpanist in the Maracaibo Orchestra. He also taught classes to the Venezuelan children.

Mobley is highly recognized in his profession in that there is only one timpanist per orchestra and that the instrument has only five usable notes. This limits the musical selection. Hopefully in the near future the number of composers interested in the instrument will compose more pieces.

Mobley is principal timpanist of the Greenville Symphony Orchestra, where he has been for many years.

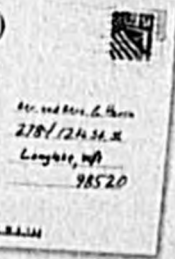

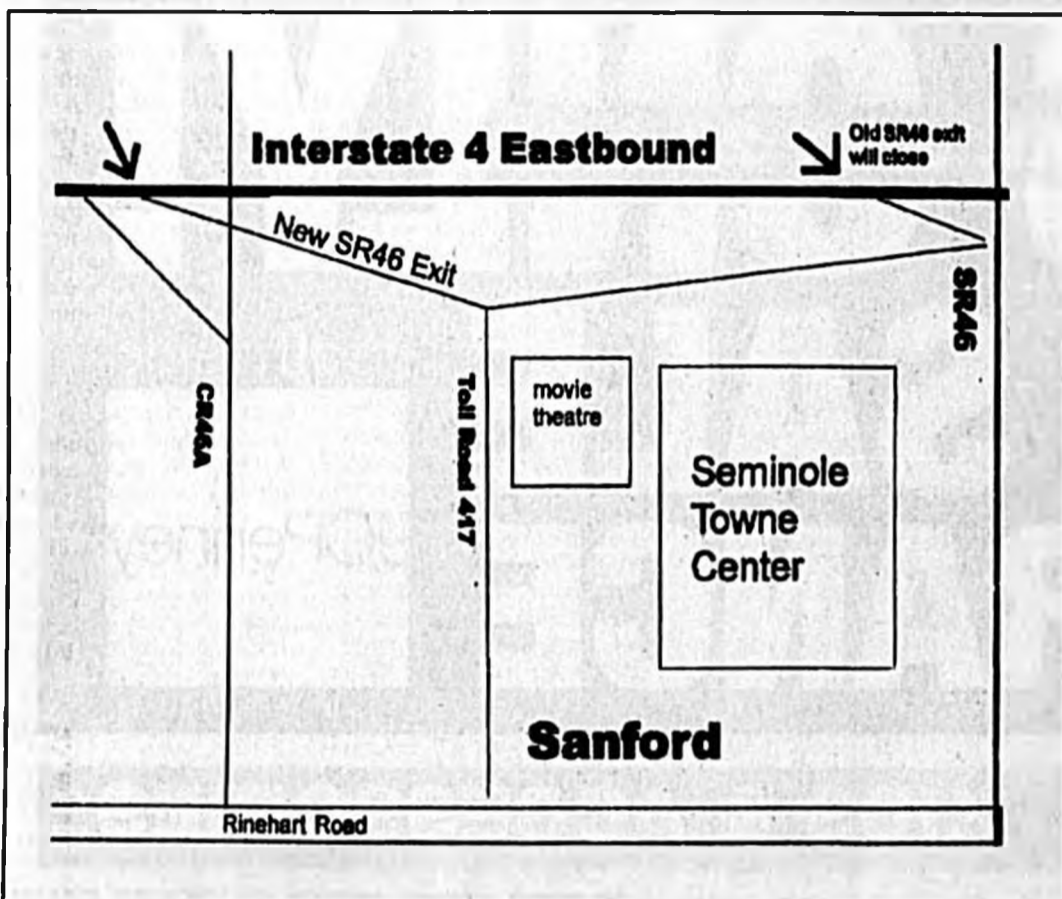

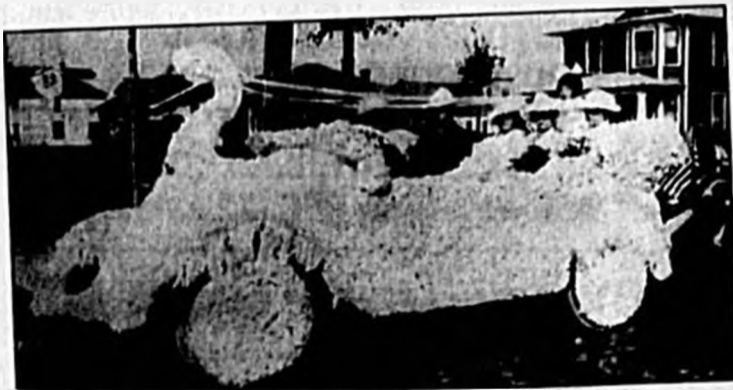

officer reported finding five other vehicles in the area with words scratched on the hoods. Victim four reported approximately \$600 damage to his Ford pickup truck. Victim five reported \$500 damage to his pickup truck. Victim six reported \$500 damage to his vehicle. Victim seven reported \$500 to his pickup. Victim eight had \$700 dam-

age to his Honda Civic.

Each of the three 15-year-olds were charged with seven counts; three for throwing a deadly missile into a dwelling, one for felony criminal mischief, one for criminal mischief and one each for resisting an officer without violence and committing a hate crime.

to our community at large by presenting at-risk youth at the middle school level and their parents, a factual representation of how life could be as an inmate in Florida's Department of Corrections facilities if they continue to make the wrong decisions.

This program helps especially the youth of today in the responsibility and accountability for their decisions.

Students and parents were taken on a video tour of Tomoka Correctional Institute and the procedures for processing an inmate by them both male and female.

The biggest concern of each team member is that many young people take for granted the decisions they make today, and don't care or realize that the bad decisions will determine how they will spend their future.

The message from the Tomoka team: this is where you will

spend a great deal of your young life if you make the wrong decision.

"You are not able to wear your Nike, Reebok or Air Jordan, your Tommy Hilfiger pants," Kendrick said. "You will wear state-issued shoes and state-issued clothing, called inmate sets of blues. You and your parents will have no decision over what you will wear."

Kendrick told the young people that in prison they will have an Inmate Handbook and curfews on TV and radio, as well as when you wake up or go to bed. Decisions are no longer yours. If you make your own bed - you lie in it. You are held responsible for your actions. Responsibility, accountability are what you will be answerable for - no one else.

Peer pressure, groupies, gangs, girlfriends, boyfriends, wanting to belong or "because everyone else is doing it," are only excuses for doing what you

do, Kendrick said.

"The problem today is no one accepts responsibility or wants to be held accountable or think of the consequences for what they do," he said.

The juveniles were told of true stories from inmates that started out breaking rules early in life. They never obeyed their parents. In school they had problems following rules set by school officials. They eventually dropped out because they didn't want anyone else telling them what to do. The decision to drop out of school means they will not receive a high school diploma or get a college degree. All this has ended, the inmates said.

These correctional officers and staff will be in charge of your custody, care and control. Don't become an offender. The decisions that you have made are not your parents' teachers', friends' but it's your responsibility.

Decisions are yours to make - make the right ones.

Voltoline graduates from Sergeants Major Academy

Army Reserve Sgt. Maj. James W. Voltoline has graduated from the U.S. Army Sergeants Major Academy Non-resident Course (NRC).

The two-year program parallels with the resident course and is the primary method for reserve component noncommissioned officers to complete the sergeants major course via the NRC website on the internet, or correspondence.

The academy is located at Fort Bliss, El Paso, Texas, and is considered the capstone or highest level of Army noncommissioned officer training.

Students are assigned class facilitators to telephonically assist them complete the first six phases of training, which includes instruction in military studies, an overview of the U.S. defense policy and the organization for defense of the nation; leadership, focuses attention on human behavior, individually and collectively; national security affairs, emphasizes the role of the U.S. national strategy, foreign policy and military strate-

gy; resource management, study of the fundamental principles of managing people, materials, systems, environment, and money.

The final phase seven has to be completed at the academy, which for 17 days students receive training in small group and organization processes, human values, ethics, and motivation, stress management, and written and oral communication skills development.

Smith said.

At the time the contract is signed, Harbco will be issued a notice to proceed. The company will have 10 days to begin mobi-

lizing on site. Harbco officials said they intend to open a branch office in downtown to oversee the project. A Web site with updated construction photos and possibly a Webcam will

also be established to provide information to the public and project engineers.

Harbco expects to complete the work by December 2003. "What a Christmas present," said Commissioner Art Woodruff.

The company has offered the city a deal that would pay Harbco an additional \$150,000 if the project is completed one month in advance. Smith said the city will research the issue but would like an earlier completion date, possibly two or three months sooner, for that large of payment.

"That seems like a lot of money for one month," Smith said. "We'll negotiate with them."

Harbco has primarily focused on commercial development like shopping centers, hospitality resorts, office space and retail facilities. The company has partnered with Concept Marine Associates (CMA) of Oakland, Calif., and Seaway Marine

Contractors Inc. of St. Petersburg.

"Most of CMA's work on marinas and seawalls has been on the West Coast," Smith said. "Both Harbco and CMA are interested in getting into the seawall construction business in the Eastern United States and the Caribbean, where the market is moving."

Lessard said Harbco's entry into waterfront construction projects would bode well for Sanford.

"They want to make this their premier project that they use in their advertising for future business," Lessard said.

Harbco was the low bidder out of four companies that submitted bids. The Central Florida-based company, founded in 1986, submitted a bid of \$10.287 million. Other bids included: American Bridge - \$11.767 million; CPH Constructors - \$15.7 million; Harbco - \$9.115 million; and Wharton-Smith Inc. - \$11.379 million.

of landscaping is a problem, as is putting too many cars on a lot.

"You've got some of these guys that park their cars so close together they have to move three or four cars to get into one in the middle," Jones said. "It looks terrible. Some of these places are nothing more than an old house with 15 cars parked out front."

Dunn said he agrees there are "bad apples" in town, but contends the revision of Schedule E goes to far. He suggests shrinking the minimum lot size to one-half acre. He also recommends the city enforce its existing codes.

"All the dealers I've talked with agree we need to do something about the ones that are bad," Dunn said. "We should

"We should police ourselves a little better, but the city needs to do a better job, too. We've got rules on the books to deal with some of these problems. Why hasn't code enforcement done anything about it?"

The ordinance revisions were scheduled for first reading Monday night. However, commissioners agreed to table the revisions — which include updates for home occupations, urban infill redevelopment projects and shuttle service for new hotels — and discuss the issues at a future work session.

The eighth grader, who just turned 14 recently, wears a size 18 shoe and has already been written about in several magazines. Sales up for UCF football tickets

ORLANDO — The University of Central Florida's marketing campaign for football season tickets has barely begun, but UCF has already seen an increase in sales. With nine weeks remaining before the first home game, UCF's season ticket count is more than 11,200 and is expected to far exceed last year's final total of 12,467 before the first home game in September. "The lower-level priority seating on the west side of the stadium is already sold out and ticket revenue is up 23 percent over this time last year," athletics ticket manager Shawna Potts said. "We have seen an interest from new fans with more than 600 new tickets sold and our season ticket renewal rate is nearly 90 percent." UCF, which joined the Mid-American Conference last November, will begin conference play this season and have its first opportunity to play for the MAC title as well as the league's bowl game slots. "We should have an excellent football team this year and excitement surrounding the program is beginning to build as the season draws near," UCF athletics director Steve Orsini said. "We have an attractive home schedule with all the MAC teams and Syracuse coming in, and the addition of a conference race to follow and bowl games to play for adds a new dimension that UCF fans will really enjoy." 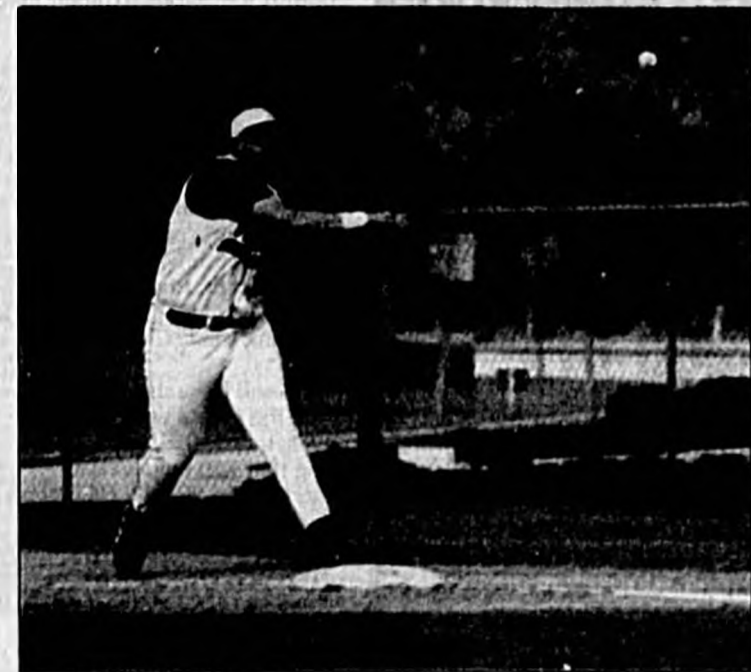

Once again the Seminole squad started slowly against a hot-shooting opponent, trailing 26-16 after one period and 45-33 at halftime.

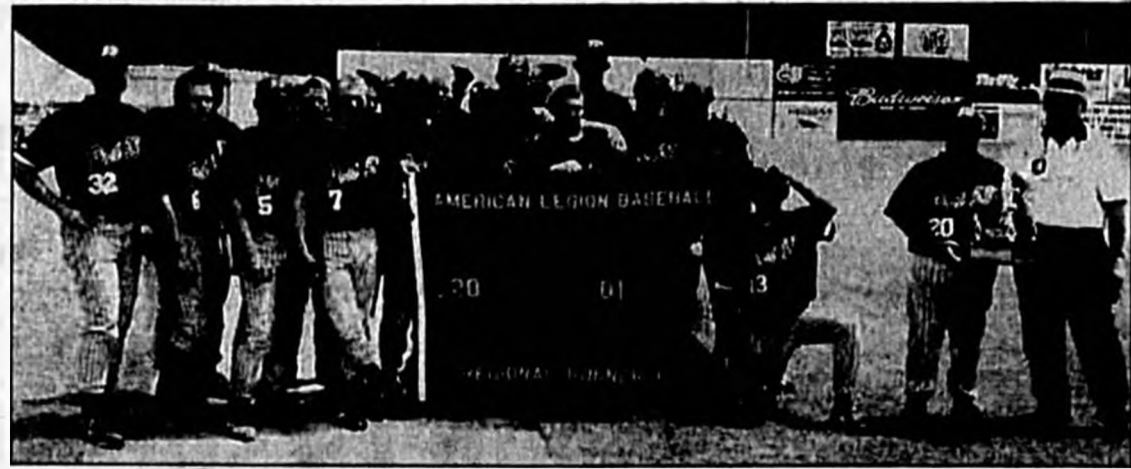
The Shooters, which trailed by 26 in the second half, made a tremendous rally and closed to within four at the final horn, 75-71.

UCF PICKED THIRD, MARSHALL TABBED AS PRESEASON MAC FOOTBALL FAVORITE

DETROIT — Going into its first year in the Mid-American Conference, UCF has been picked to finish third in the East Division by league media members. The results were announced at the conference's annual football media day at the Marriott Renaissance Center in downtown Detroit Tuesday.

By an overwhelming margin Marshall was chosen to reclaim the MAC football title that it won from 1997-2000. Marshall was picked by 43 of 47 voters to win the East Division and garnered 41 nods to win the championship game on Dec. 7.

Bowling Green was selected by a close margin to capture the West Division just ahead of defending MAC Champion Toledo.

UCF will have its chance to prove the voters wrong when it travels to Marshall Sept. 20 in a game that will be televised nationally on ESPN2. UCF plays Toledo in Orlando Oct. 19 in another marquee MAC game.

The 2002 season marks changes for the league as UCF joins the MAC for football only and will compete in the East Division. BGSU moves from the East, where it has competed

since 1997, to the West Division. The MAC went to divisional play in 1997 when it expanded from 10 to 12 teams. While Marshall was a clear favorite in the East, the West race is expected to be very close and quite possibly could come down to the Nov. 30 meeting between the rival Falcons and Rockets.

Bowling Green's 25 first place votes and 283 total points edged the Rockets' 266 point total and 13 first place notices. Western Michigan falls into the No. 3 slot with 205 points and three first place votes as the Broncos, divisional winners in 1999 and 2000, seek a return to the top spot. The No. 4 and No. 5 places, respectively, go to Northern Illinois (201) and Ball State (188), two teams that tied Toledo for the divisional title last year. The Huskies (4) and Cardinals (2) also were named on ballots to win the division.

Central Michigan (118) and Eastern Michigan (55) round out the West Division. Miami and UCF appear to be the top challengers to the Thundering Herd in the East Division. The RedHawks earned a 257 to 248 point margin over the Golden Knights for the second spot in the division. Miami was recognized with three first place votes and UCF one.

Kent State, which won four of its last five games last year to finish with its first winning mark in 15 seasons, is predicted in fourth place. Akron (136), which finished with two wins to end the season, is slated for the fifth spot. Ohio (111), looking to rebound from a one-win season was selected for sixth place. Buffalo (66), which closed strong with two late season victories, finished seventh.

Marshall was a convincing favorite to win the MAC title game, which will be held at the home stadium of the East Division winner. The Herd received 41 votes, while Miami and Toledo had two each and Bowling Green and UCF each garnered one vote.

Airport master plan waits for approval

The master plan outlining projected improvements and expansions to the Orlando Sanford International Airport is now in the hands of the Federal Aviation Authority (FAA) and Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

The plan has already been presented to the city of Sanford, and was outlined to the Seminole County Commission this past week by airport President/CEO Larry Dale, and Jim McGraff, who helped prepare the document.

"The FAA and FDOT now have 60 days

Federal Aviation Administration has 60 days to approve the document

from our submittal of the plan to approve the document," Dale said. "Once they do, it officially becomes the airport plan for the next 20 years."

Dale explained that for the past two years, the Orlando Sanford International Airport has been listed as the fastest growing airport in the nation, and the 23rd busiest airport in the entire world. But he added that the expectations for the

future growth will require a great deal of change at the airport, which is the purpose of the 20 year plan.

The following are some of the many findings and recommendations outlined in the Master Plan:

Terminals

The existing domestic and international terminals will not meet the forecast

demand for commercial aviation activity. The Domestic Terminal building in the year 2000 had 186,000 square feet of space. By the year 2020, requirements call for over 1.4 million square feet. For the international terminal, there were 220,400 square feet of space. By 2020, International will also require over 1.4 million square feet.

Three alternative plans for terminal expansions were presented in the Master Plan. Alternatives #1 and #2 indicated the terminals would be enlarged, but remain in the same general location. Alternative

Saturday, July 13, the Seminole County Sheriff's office received a report of the theft of comic books that were in public storage. The victim estimated the loss at \$55,000.



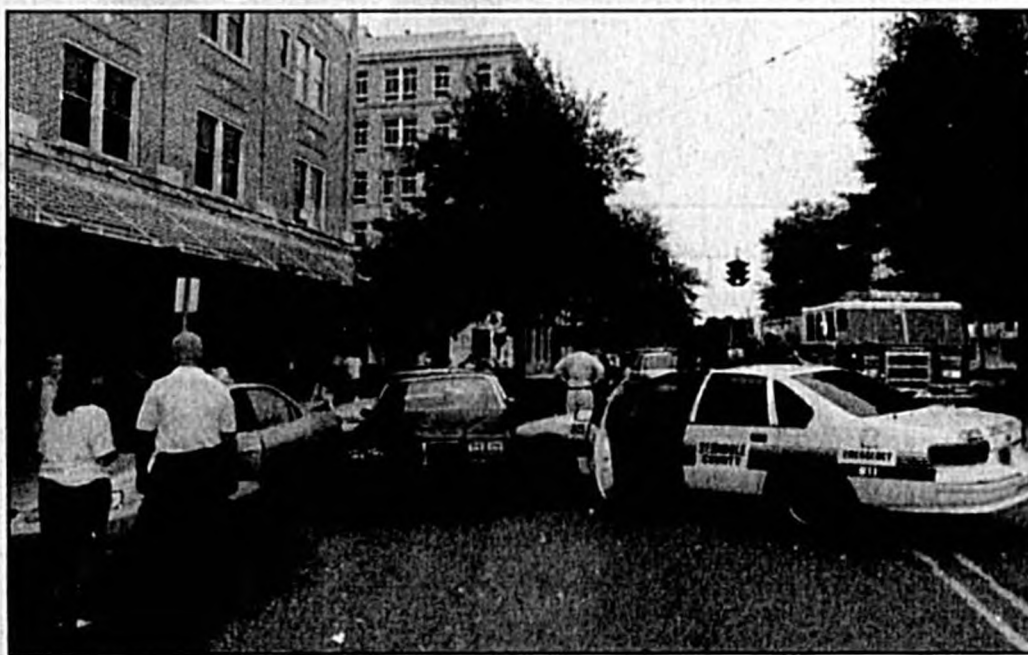

He said he had been collecting comic books since the 1960s, and that they were kept in protective plastic and placed in boxes.

Through an investigation some of the books were found at a local comic book store, where the suspect allegedly exchanged them for money and other collectibles. The store operator turned the books over to investigator, which led to the arrest Wednesday, of Shannon Bickel, 22, listed as homeless, from Orlando.

Paulucci blasts CEOs in scandals

Investing public is being 'screwed'

SANFORD — The recent financial scandals that have rocked some of the nation's largest corporations are drawing sharp criticism from a man who knows a thing or two about big business.

Jeno Paulucci, the outspoken entrepreneur whose Sanford-based frozen food companies

have earned billions, purchased a full-page ad in the Sunday, July 21, Washington Times newspaper demanding President George W. Bush direct his Justice Department indict top executives involved in crooked business practices.

"You can call it 'cooking the books,' or you can call it 'improper accounting' but there are really no other words except 'stealing' and 'larceny,'" Paulucci wrote in an open letter to Bush. "We beseech you to have your Attorney General (John) Ashcroft call grand juries for each and every one of those crooked companies and put the convicted bastards in prison now and forever, and thus return the confidence to all of us in our capitalist system."

In a telephone interview from his offices in Duluth, Minn., Paulucci said his is lobbying Washington to implement tougher standards for public corporations. Failure to hold top executives accountable for questionable business practices could destroy American business, Paulucci said.

"The CEOs have got to sign off that their companies are being run properly," Paulucci said. "The board of directors should,

County Commission approves millage rate

The Seminole County Commission approved the proposed millage rate for the county during Tuesday morning's commission meeting. Florida Statutes require the board to set a proposed millage rate to be used by the Property Appraiser in the Notice of Proposed Property Taxes (TRIM notice) which is to be mailed to property owners in August.

The proposed millage rates may be increased at the first public hearing (in September), but may not be increased at the second public hearing.

The total proposed millage rate is 7.9637. The total includes countywide millage at 4.9989, Unincorporated Roads at .1228, Fire protection at 2.6334, Natural lands debt at .0986, and trails development debt at .1100.

With the millage rate of 7.9637, with the \$25,000 homestead tax exemption, the owner of a home valued at \$100,000 would be pay-

ing \$597.28 in county taxes.

The owner of a home valued at \$50,000 with the homestead exemption would have a county tax bill of \$199.09. This will be in addition to other taxes such as municipal taxes, etc.

The proposed millage rate represents a 4.55 percent increase over the aggregate roll-back millage rate of 6.0904, which would have generated the same income as the millage rate from last year. The rate is constant with the fiscal year 2001-02 levels.

Sanford bicycle officers provide life saving lessons

In addition to being regular uniformed Sanford Police officers, Ed Morales, Bill Wixson and Brian Welch are members of the Special Operations Division Patrol Bike Unit. As such, they perform most of their duties on specially equipped bikes, patrolling the city, often in places where regular squad cars are unable to go. In inclement weather or during special situations, the three also have regular police vehicles in which to perform their duties.

But the main focus of the Patrol Bike Unit is to meet with youngsters for bicycle safety

courses. Recently such an event was held at Page School in Sanford.

"When we meet with these youngsters, we stress many points," Morales said. "Based on uniform laws of the State of Florida, which are designed to help bicyclists as well as motorists near bicyclists, we focus on understanding the rules to promote better safety, which in turn, saves lives."

"We emphasize wearing of helmets, which are required by all bicycle riders under the age of 16," he continued. "And the fact that on streets, bikes are to be ridden on the right side, in line with the traffic, which has been determined to be much

safer than the old rule of facing traffic."

Wixson continued that there are other requirements for riders, including how many may be on a bike. "Bikes are designed to carry one person, so that's all there can be. The only exception is for adults on a bike who have child carriers or back-packs," he said.

"There are also restrictions on wearing head sets while riding a bike," Wixson said. "If you
