## Police nab Flea World thieves

**SANFORD** — Three security guards at Flea World are facing multiple counts of burglary after confessing to stealing from booths at Sanford's shopping bazaar.

Video tape taken on Nov. 2 at the Living Difference Landscaping Booth shows Cherie Hiffner, 57, and 39-year old Warren McCauley, both of Sanford, com-

mitting burglary. Investigators said Lee Burkett, 19, of Sanford, has also confessed to committing theft.

Investigators said the three security guards arrested on Monday all knew

about each other's activities, but they were not operating as a team. They had each worked at Flea World for less than a year.

"She (Hiffner) admitted committing

the thefts and gave me the names of the other two defendants," said Investigator Ben Hartner of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "They admitted breaking into numerous booths over the last four months."

Investigators have recovered \$3,000 worth of tools, clothing, kitchen knives and other items taken from vendors at Hiffner's residence at 2250 Marquette Avenue.

## 'I had no idea my throat was cut ...' Victim recounts boyfriend's attack

**SANFORD** — Jennifer Forehand knew she was hurt and needed help when she knocked on the door of Wade and Betty Reynolds, but she was afraid they would turn her away.

"I was concerned that maybe they wouldn't care," Forehand said. "I was covered in blood. They calmed me down, and cared for me until I could get to the hospital."

Forehand had walked nearly a quarter mile to reach the Reynolds' home. Her boyfriend, Andre Henley, 28, of Winter Park had kidnapped her, strangled her twice and slit her throat with a box cutter before leaving her for dead near the entrance to the Seminole County Public Schools Environmental Education property.

"I had no idea my throat was cut as I was walking along (State Road 436)," Forehand said, recalling the events of Nov. 16. "It wasn't until I was in the emergency room and they started asking all these questions that I realized I'm really hurt badly."

"I'm still astonished at how calm I was," Forehand added. "My first thought was just to get to the road, and I didn't want to get hit by a car. I was also scared that he (Henley) was still in the area. I kept saying please don't let me die."

Investigators were able to find out about Henley through Forehand, who, even though she could not talk because of her injuries, was

able to communicate through writing.

Forehand's nightmare began when she met Desiree Vega, 28, in the parking lot of a closed business off State Road 436, near Winter Woods Boulevard. The two met to discuss Henley.

"I was confronting her with proof that he was with both of us," Forehand said. "I wanted her to back out of the situation."

Forehand said she was Henley's girlfriend for two years, while Vega had been Henley's girlfriend for six months.

When Henley left after the meeting, Henley ambushed Forehand. Investigators said Vega knew that Henley was present, but that she was unaware he planned to attack Forehand.

"She (Vega) apparently thought that maybe he'd con-

front Jennifer (Forehand) and profess his love for her (Vega)," said Investigator Larry Herron of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Investigators originally believed that Vega told Henley he had to make a choice between the two women and apparently he took it to mean he had to kill Forehand. However, Forehand and investigators now say that does not seem to be the case.

"I don't believe he ever thought he had to make that ultimatum," Forehand said.

During their 2-year relation-

## Seminole teachers earn national certification, awards

**SANFORD** - Two dozen Seminole County teachers are among the 546 teachers statewide this year who met the requirements for national certification, earning incentives such as salary and mentoring bonuses.

Florida had the second largest number of recipients for the 1998-1999 school year, behind North Carolina at 726.

"We are fortunate to count these dedicated, hardworking teachers among the nation's best," said Florida Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher.

The Excellent Teaching Program, passed during the 1998 state legislative session, is designed to reward teaching excellence by providing incentives, including salary and mentoring bonuses, for Florida teachers who achieve certification through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

The NBPTS is a private, non-profit organization governed by a 63-member board of directors, the majority of whom are teachers. Thirty-eight states offer at least one incentive to teachers who earn the certification, while 31 states including Florida offer multiple incentives.

The incentives and bonuses in Florida include an annual salary bonus of 10 percent of

## Henley keeps his chair, Maloy is vice chair

**SANFORD** — It wasn't much or a reorganization. Before anyone could take a breath Tuesday, Carlton Henley was picked again to be Seminole County Chairman.

"I'm eager to support him," said District 5 Commissioner Daryl McLain, who was nominated for vice-chairman by District 2 Commissioner Randy Morris.

The vice chair went, however, to the same man who held it before - District 1 Commissioner Grant Maloy.

"When I took the chair a year ago, I was apprehensive," Henley said. "I feel much better

about accepting this today than I did then. I've received great cooperation. As a board, we've accomplished a lot of good things.

"This year we're going to be looking at very, very difficult issues," Henley said. "We're going to need the wisdom of Solomon. We'll have to be decisive and do what is right and not what may be popular."

Morris, who had been the chairman in three of the previous four years, said he's been impressed at the way Henley has kept politics out of the decision making by the BBC. Morris hinted that 1999/2000 would be a much sterner test for all five commissioners, three of whom face re-elections.

District 3 Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide, who entertained the chairman's spot, was the one who nominated Henley, thus ending any suspense there may have been. The others quickly agreed with Van Der Weide's pick.

In an otherwise, business is business meeting, Van Der Weide supplied a few chuckles when he read a resolution in recognition of Dan's Family Restaurant in Longwood. Seems, Van Der Weide stumbled into Dan's while free meals were being given to veterans on Veteran's Day.

"They say there's no such thing as a free meal," Van Der Weide said, laughing. "Well, this is the first one I ever received."

## Pets need proper shelter during cold winter weather

DEAR ABBY: When I heard the weather report for a nearby mountain community, I was reminded of an item I had clipped from a newsletter a few months ago. The temperatures are a little down to freezing in some areas and soon will be downright cold in many locations. Responsible pet owners must protect their pets need protection from inclement weather, so I dug out the clipping and hope you will print it as a reminder.

HIGH-DESERT ANIMAL LOVER

DEAR ANIMAL LOVER: Thank you for sharing that item. Countless pets will thank you in the months to come. It should not be assumed that a dog's or cat's "fur coat" is sufficient protection from icy weather. Read on:

PROTECT YOUR PETS FROM WINTER'S WOES (Author Unknown)

In many parts of the country, winter is a season of bitter cold

and numbing wetness. Help your pets remain happy and healthy during the colder months:

Do not leave dogs outdoors when the temperature drops. Regardless of the season, short-haired, very young or old dogs, and ALL CATS should never be left outside without supervision. Most dogs, and all cats, are safer if kept indoors, except when taken out for exercise. Short-coated dogs may feel more comfortable wearing a sweater during walks.

No matter what the temperature, wind chill can threaten a pet's life. A dog or cat is happiest and healthiest when kept indoors. However, if your dog is an outdoor dog, he/she must be protected by a dry, draft-free doghouse that is large enough to allow the dog to sit and lie down comfortably, but small enough to hold in his/her body heat. The floor should be raised a few inches off the ground and covered with cedar shavings. The house should be turned to face away from the wind, and the doorway should be covered with burlap or a rug.

DEAR DIANA: Thank YOU for a letter that's well worth space in this column. I hope that anyone who is having a medical procedure performed that requires sedation or anesthesia will take your letter to heart, and not attempt to get behind the wheel of a car until the medication is completely out of his or her system.

## STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS NOTICE OF INTENT TO FIND THE CITY OF SANFORD COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENTS IN COMPLIANCE DOCKET NO. 99-NOI-5907-(A)-(I)

The Department gives notice of its intent to find the Amendments to the Comprehensive Plan for the City of Sanford, adopted by Ordinance No. 3492 on October 11, 1999, IN COMPLIANCE, pursuant to Sections 163.3184, 163.3187 and 163.3189, F.S.

The adopted City of Sanford Comprehensive Plan Amendments and the Department's Objections, Recommendations and Comments Report, (if any), are available for public inspection Monday through Friday, except for legal holidays, during normal business hours, at the City of Sanford City Hall, Department of Engineering and Planning, 300 North Park Avenue, Sanford, Florida 32771.

Any affected person, as defined in Section 163.3184, F.S., has a right to petition for an administrative hearing to challenge the proposed agency determination that the Amendments to the City of Sanford Comprehensive Plan are in Compliance, as defined in Subsection 163.3184(1), F.S. The petition must be filed within twenty-one (21) days after publication of this notice, and must include all of the information and contents described in Uniform Rule 28-106.201, F.A.C. The petition must be filed with the Agency Clerk, Department of Community Affairs, 2555 Shumard Oak Boulevard, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-2100, and a copy mailed or delivered to the local government. Failure to timely file a petition shall constitute a waiver of any right to request an administrative proceeding as a petitioner under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S. If a petition is filed, the purpose of the administrative hearing will be to present evidence and testimony and forward a recommended order to the Department. If no petition is filed, this Notice of Intent shall become final agency action.

If a petition is filed, other affected persons may petition for leave to intervene in the proceeding. A petition for intervention must be filed at least twenty (20) days before the final hearing and must include all of the information and contents described in Uniform Rule 28-106.205, F.A.C. A petition for leave to intervene shall be filed at the Division of Administrative Hearings, Department of Management Services, 1230 Apalachee Parkway, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-1550. Failure to petition to intervene within the allowed time frame constitutes a waiver of any right such a person has to request a hearing under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S., or to participate in the administrative hearing.

After an administrative hearing petition is timely filed, mediation is available pursuant to Subsection 163.3189(3)(a), F.S., to any affected person who is made a party to the proceeding by filing that request with the administrative law judge assigned by the Division of Administrative Hearings. The choice of mediation shall not affect a party's right to an administrative hearing.

## Jean Metts' triumph is nourishment for the soul

The parking variance "favor" to Jean Metts came by a 3-2 vote. The vote should have been, 5-0. Has Sanford lost its senses? Were the miserly and mean-spirited going to dictate what happens in the Friendly City?

Here it is Thanksgiving week - the last Thanksgiving of the 20th Century - and the chambers at City Hall were packed with angry residents. An ugly scene, indeed. A black eye for Sanford.

From the get-go, all of Sanford should have been helping, not hindering efforts by Seminole Volunteer Enterprises to serve meat, potatoes, vegetables to the needy three evenings a week. If parking were a problem, why couldn't someone volunteer a shuttle service?

If residents of the historic district were so concerned with safety, why not ask the new police chief — Brian Tooley — to assign an officer to the cafe site at 407 W. Fourth St. A station could be set up inside the

place. Again, the officer on duty would be there from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. but three nights a week.

I agree with Commissioner Whitey Eckstein, an honorable public servant. "I don't think we can be a good city unless we allow Jean Metts to serve these 100 people." That's it. That's precisely it.

If the best mayor ever — Larry Dale — thinks that allowing Metts her parking variance is a dangerous precedent and is the issue here, perhaps he should stick to one-term in office.

Same for Commissioner Brady Lessard, whose obsession with the historic district has made him forget well-known and accepted Biblical passages. People aren't to be damaged, Mr. Lessard. Tomatoes damage. Food kitchens nourish. They nourish both the soul and the stomach.

Mrs. Metts' request is unique. That's what Dale and Lessard refuse to acknowledge. There is

King suggests residents stop at that location rather than phone, "As we are outside helping the people," she added, "We want the people who are able to use some of these things to please feel welcome to come and receive this blessing. Please let us help. We have lots to share and would like to help fulfill your wish list."

King also said donations are welcome for people who are able to give, for the benefit of others.

Unfortunately, Saturday is also one of the biggest shoplifting days of the year. With stores packed to the rafters with shoppers, some believe they can take a few articles and leave without being noticed.

Wrong. With today's tagging and electronic monitoring devices at exit doors, items which have not been paid for ignite alarms and bring store security to action.

It's not perfect however. Some people who almost make a living by shoplifting, might be considered as experts. They know ways to get through the system, or at least they think they do.

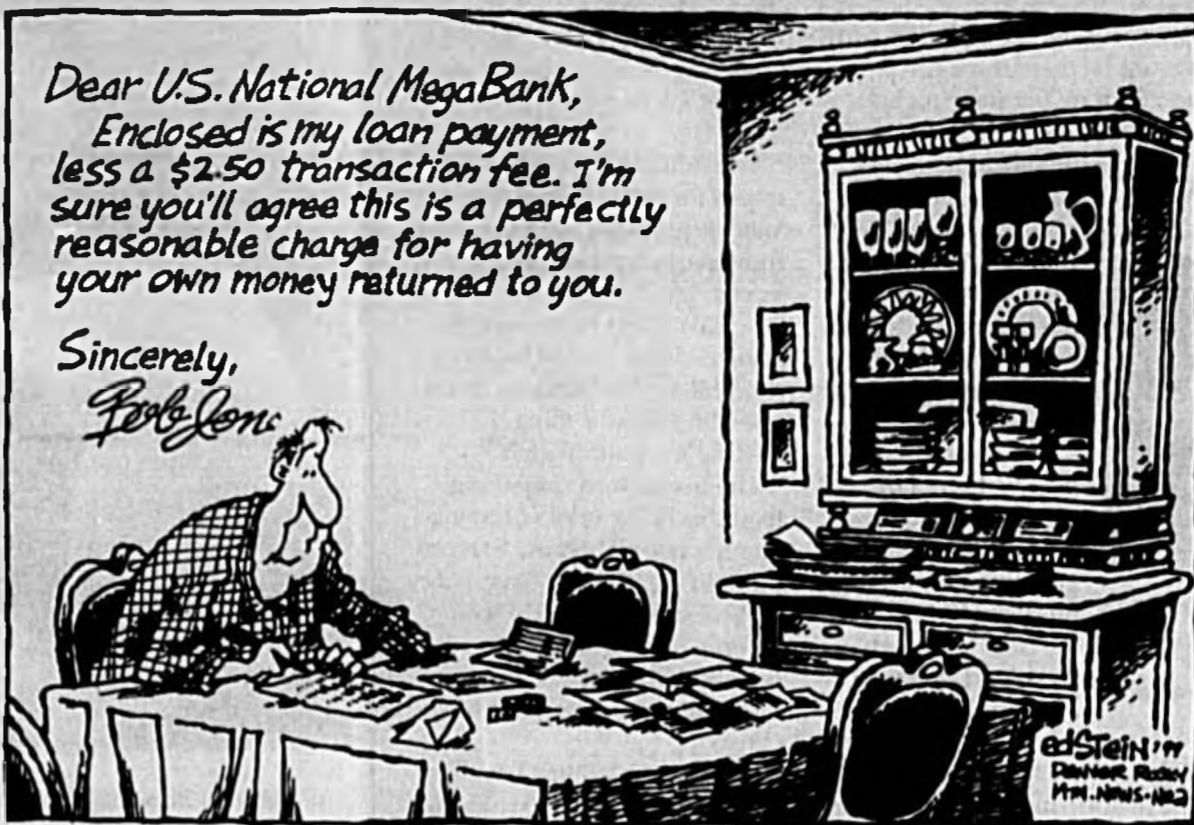
Honest shoppers therefore, should be extremely cautious and not give the impression they are trying to steal. Don't place items in bags, pockets or purses until they are paid for at the checkout counter. Don't display large wads of money at the counter. Don't leave children unattended, and don't leave small children hold merchandise before or after checkout.

In addition to shoplifting problems, there are often a myriad of grab-and-run situations of purchased items, and purse snatchings. The criminals are well aware of this and often see it as an opportunity to become even braver in their actions.

Taking items out to the car also calls for extreme caution. Never allow a stranger to "help you to your car with those large gifts." If you are purchasing something heavier or larger than you may be able to handle, take someone along who can.

And of course, locking a car (with the windows closed) is always the right thing to do. Thieves can easily see through car windows to find out which car to vandalize. Don't make it easier for them than it already may be.

Getting involved in the annual mass hysteria of shopping this weekend may seem to be frightening. With the expected shoplifting, vehicle burglaries, purse snatchings and other problems, there is surely reason for serious concern. But if we all exercise caution at all times, not letting down our guard, it can be a true adventure in shopping.

### JROTC cadets help boy enjoy festival

My girlfriend, Danielle, her little brother and I attended the Sanford Heritage Festival last Saturday night to see Chubby Checker. We went to the show, because my girlfriend's little brother, Chris, loves Chubby Checker. While we were there, we met two men from Crooms Academy Army JROTC who helped us immensely.

Chris has Cerebral Palsy and is in a wheelchair. He is prone to seizures and, recently, had surgery to relieve the effects of Hammer Toes. Hammer Toe is caused by constricting muscles in his foot, which make the toe curl up tightly and is very painful. After the surgery to his toes, Chris was left with a cast on each foot and exposed pins in both feet.

After Chris found out about going to see Chubby Checker, he was so excited, that was all he talked about.

Upon arriving at the Festival, Danielle and I noticed that we had a problem. We wanted Chris to

see the show, but we were worried about getting too close to the crowd, because Danielle and I didn't want anyone to hit Chris's pins.

Because he's in a wheelchair, we didn't want Chris looking at the backs of the people in the crowd. I went to look for a Festival official to see if there was a handicapped area or at least get Chris a safe place where he could watch the concert. I couldn't find any officials from the event or anyone that could help us until I found Chris Reed from Crooms Academy JROTC, a Cadet Captain from Sanford.

Mr. Reed sprung into action. Within minutes, he had First Sergeant Leonard Pacneco from Apopka in front of us. They swept Chris up, cleared a path and found him a safe spot close to the stage.

Finally, it's often hard to find someone willing to help or make it easy for a person in a wheelchair. Chris usually gets a lot of stares and funny looks. I would like to thank Cadet Captain Chris Reed, and First Sergeant Leonard Pacneco, for all their help. They gave a 14 year old boy,

who hasn't had much to be happy about, a very enjoyable night. Mr. Reed and Mr. Pacneco need to be commended for their citizenship and willingness to help others. The Crooms Academy Army JROTC program gets two thumbs up. The Marines are looking for a few good men, but Crooms Academy Army JROTC already has them.

## Thanksgiving provides a time to remember the year's blessings

"When thou has eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the good land which He hath given you...Enter into His gates with thanksgiving and into His courts with praise; be thankful unto Him, and bless his name...And let them sacrifice the sacrifices of thanksgiving, and declare His works with rejoicing...Giving thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in life..."  
(Deuteronomy 8:10, Psalm 100:4, Psalm 107:22, Colossians 1:12)

Happy Thanksgiving!

In the United States and Canada, Thanksgiving is a day set apart annually for expressing thanks to God for the blessings of the year.

Less than a year after the Plymouth colonists settled in the new land, the first American Thanksgiving was celebrated. That first winter was a dreadful, deadly one killing almost half of the colonists. Things looked up in the summer of 1621 with a bumper crop of corn harvest, after

which Governor William Bradford decreed a three-day feast to be held. "The first Thanksgiving Day, set aside for the special purpose of prayer as well as celebration, was decreed by Governor Bradford for July 30, 1663" (World Book Encyclopedia, Vol. 18).

In 1789, President George Washington issued a proclamation for a day of thanks; however, there was no regular day of the celebration of Thanksgiving until President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November 1863 as "a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father (ibid.). Congress ruled in 1941 that this day be made a legal federal holiday.

Thanksgiving is more than a holiday! For many people, Thanksgiving begins with turkey, dressing and cranberry sauce and ends when the favorite football team has won or lost; after which, family and friends - who have abounded in food and fellowship - "waddle" to their homes for a good night's rest!

"If asked to list Thanksgiving traditions, many people would think of

turkey, cranberries and Pilgrims but omit grateful prayers and worship services - and ironic situation for a holiday conceived by pious people as an opportunity for prayer, but a true reflection of modern attitudes. Americans know far more about the ship on which the Pilgrims sailed, the food they ate, and the clothes they wore than about the way they worshipped" (Diana Appelbaum).

Following the Civil War which left many people, if not all, with sparse blessings, it is recorded that some people remembered words from the First McGuffey Reader of their early school years which called them back to the faith: "You ask your parents for food, and drink, and books, and clothes, and when they give you these things, you thank them, and love them for the good they do you. So you should ask your God for those things which He can give you, and no one else can give you."

Yes, for many Americans today, Thanksgiving may be only a one-day affair. Truth is that most of us could not take 365 days a year of Thanksgiving

meals (even though we might think so); however, all of us could certainly use 365 days a year for thanksgiving and gratitude. Says Paul the Apostle: "Be joyful always...give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:16, 18).

The first National Thanksgiving Proclamation by George Washington gives us great historical motives and substance for ongoing Thanksgiving:

"Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection, aid and favors..."

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to con-

fer upon us (1789)."

The initiation of a Thanksgiving holiday came as our forefathers realized that their very existence was the result of Divine blessing. It is a holiday historically devoted to God, who transcends the entire community. Thanksgiving was begun as a national reminder of the blessings of God. No nation on earth has enjoyed prosperity and blessing equal to or fearing forefathers has great meaning until this day.

As you read the National Thanksgiving Proclamation that follows, read it as an invitation to connect with your forefathers and give thanks with Abe Lincoln:

"I do, therefore, invite my fellow citizens, in every part of the United States, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday in November next as a day of Thanksgiving praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens."

## Recipes to turn winter squash into elegant dishes

I much prefer winter squash — with their rich texture and sweet flavor — to summer squash, which always seem a little watery and insipid.

But I've always thought of winter squash as lumpy and dowdy, making plain, hearty eating. Recently, a chef showed me that winter squash can be absolutely elegant.

The recipe for Butternut Squash Risotto with Chicken and a smooth Butternut Squash Sauce was inspired by Chef Peter Kelly of the New England Culinary Institute. (The risotto recipe comes from Judith Barrett's and Norma Wasserman's excellent book "Risotto.") Wondering if Kelly's recipe was just a fluke, I consulted Roger Verge's book "Vegetables in the French Style" and found the recipe below for Winter Squash Tapioca Flan.

There's nothing wrong with inviting those dowdy, lumpy squash to your supper table. But it's nice to know that you can dress them up and take them to a fancy dinner.

Note: Pumpkin can be substituted for squash in both recipes.

### BUTTERNUT SQUASH RISOTTO WITH CHICKEN AND BUTTERNUT SQUASH SAUCE

For the sauce:  
1 small butternut squash  
1/2 cup chicken or vegetable stock, or more, if needed  
salt and pepper to taste  
1 to 2 tablespoons butter

For the risotto:  
1/4 pound fresh or frozen butternut squash  
5-1/2 cups chicken stock or broth

3 tablespoons unsalted butter  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
1/2 cup finely minced onion  
1-1/2 cups Arborio rice  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese  
1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley

For the chicken:  
4 4-ounce, boneless, skinless chicken breasts  
oil or butter for sauteeing or grilling  
salt and pepper to taste

To make the sauce: Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Cut the squash in half and scoop out the seeds and fibers. Bake the squash cut-side-up on a baking pan, until soft, about 45 minutes. Scrape out the pulp with a spoon and put it in a blender container, or the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal blade. Add the chicken broth, salt, pepper and butter. Puree until a sauce-like consistency is reached, adding more broth if necessary. Pour it into a saucepan and set aside.

To make the risotto: If using fresh squash, peel it, remove the seeds and cut the flesh into 1-inch pieces. Cook fresh or frozen squash with 1 cup water until it is tender and can easily be pierced with a fork. Place squash with 1/2 cup of its cooking liquid in a food processor, blender or food mill, and puree. Set aside.

Bring the 5-1/2 cups broth to a steady simmer in a saucepan.

Heat 2 tablespoons of the butter and the oil in a heavy, 4-quart, heat-proof casserole or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the onion and saute 1 to 2 minutes, until it begins to soften. Be careful not to brown it.

Add the rice to the Dutch oven and, using a wooden spoon, stir for 1 minute, making sure all the grains are well-coated. Begin to add the simmering broth, 1/2 cup at a time, stirring frequently. Wait until each addition is almost completely absorbed before adding the next half cup. Reserve about

1/4 cup to add at the very end. While you are cooking the risotto, stir it frequently to prevent sticking.

Meanwhile, saute the chicken or grill it to your liking. Set aside.

After the risotto has cooked about 18 minutes (the rice should be tender but still firm) add the reserved 1/4 cup broth, the pureed squash, lemon juice and parsley. Turn off the heat and immediately add the remaining tablespoon butter and the

Parmesan cheese and stir vigorously to combine.

To serve: Heat the sauce. Slice a chicken breast and fan the slices on a mound of rice. Drizzle some sauce over the top and/or around the sides. Repeat for four plates. Yield: 4 servings.

### WINTER SQUASH AND TAPIOCA FLAN

3-1/4 pounds winter squash  
2 teaspoons sugar  
salt, to taste  
scant cup milk  
1 vanilla bean, or 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
1 tablespoon fine tapioca  
4 eggs  
3 tablespoons butter  
pinch of freshly grated nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Peel the squash and remove the seeds and fibers. Cut the flesh into 3/4-inch chunks and place them on a double sheet of aluminum foil, about 20 inches long. Sprinkle with the sugar, add a bit of salt and wrap the foil around the squash, making a sealed package. Leave some room inside for heat circulation. Place the package on a baking sheet and bake for 45 minutes to 1 hour.

In the meantime, pour the milk into a saucepan, add the vanilla bean (if using) and a pinch of salt (do not add the vanilla extract at this stage, if that's what you're using). Bring to a boil. Sprinkle the tapioca into the boiling milk, stirring with a whisk. Lower the heat and cook for 5 minutes. Remove from the heat. Now is the time to add the vanilla extract if you are

not using a vanilla bean.

Remove the squash from the oven, and lower the oven temperature to 275 degrees. Puree the squash through a sieve, with a potato ricer, or with the fine disk in a food mill.

Remove the vanilla bean (if you've used it) from the tapioca mixture and mix the tapioca into the squash puree. Beat the eggs in a small bowl. Cut 2 tablespoons of the butter into small pieces and add to the squash mixture. Mix well, then add the beaten eggs and a pinch of nutmeg.

Season to taste with salt and mix well. Butter a baking dish with the remaining tablespoon butter, scrape the mixture into the dish and smooth the surface.

Put the baking dish into a roasting pan with sides. Pour hot water into the pan until it goes about halfway up the sides of the baking dish. Put the pan with the baking dish in it in the oven and bake for 10 minutes. Lower the temperature to 250 degrees, and bake for another 30 minutes, or until set.

Put the baking dish on a tray and serve immediately. Yield: 4 servings.

 ship, Forehand said that Henley was never abusive, although he was at times controlling.

"He never exhibited a bad temper," Forehand said. "We just saw each other a few weeks ago and there were no arguments, no tension, nothing."

Herron echoed Forehand's belief that Henley liked to be in control.

"Probably a large part of this crime was that he wanted to control everything and that control was challenged," Herron said.

Henley is charged with attempted first-degree murder. In addition, he is charged with kidnapping, aggravated battery, and grand theft auto. He is being held in the Seminole County Jail without bond.

Vega is accused of being an accessory after the fact to attempted first-degree murder. She has been released on a \$5,000 bond.

Henley told investigators he took speaker wire and put it around Forehand's neck, choking her and rendering her unconscious. He said he then loaded Forehand into her own two-door Nissan and drove her to just outside the Environmental Education Center property, where he choked her again and then slashed her neck with a box cutter.

Investigators said Henley took Forehand's car and abandoned it in the Branchwood Apartments. He then walked to the San Jose

helped him come up with an alibi, which is why she was charged as an accessory after the fact.

Forehand said she has had previous conversations with Vega, and that she did not appear threatening.

"We were both civil and respectful to each other," Forehand said. "She was not in any way disrespectful to me. I don't know what she may have been thinking in her mind. We were mostly teaming up, comparing notes, trying to get the lies straight."

Forehand is expected to fully recover from her wounds. She weighed 122 pounds before the incident on Nov. 16. Since then, she

survive that night by remaining calm and keeping her wits.

"At first I was in pure shock, because it was completely unexpected," Forehand said. "The important thing to remember in a panic situation is that while you feel scared, shocked, terrified, no matter what you feel, try not to think about it. Try not to tend to your own injuries, and don't lose the ability to think."

She said she is grateful her 5-year-old son was not with her when the attack occurred.

"This Thanksgiving, I have a lot to be thankful for," Forehand said. "If I had taken my son with me, not knowing this would happen,

 The three suspects discarded the majority of their stolen merchandise in the trash after receiving a tip about the video camera, investigators said.

"They primarily took small items such as T-shirts," Hartner said. "They claim that they were not reselling the items. We're still investigating whether that is true. We have no proof yet that they were reselling the items."

The three suspects could face a dozen charges of burglary, as well as additional charges, in the on-going investigation, said Hartner.

Victims of the thefts that have been plaguing Flea World during the last four months are

identifying items taken from them, so that the items can be returned to their owners.

"They knew what booths to steal from," Hartner said. "If they wanted shoes, they went to a shoe store. We've also recovered jewelry, watches and perfume."

McCauley, who lives at 4220 S. Orlando Drive, apartment number 53, was a knife collector, and some of the knives were found in Hiffner's home, investigators said.

McCauley told investigators that on Nov. 2 he unlawfully entered the In Living Difference Landscaping Booth with Hiffner, and that Hiffner stole several plants and plant food. He said he looked around but

did not take any items.

They left the booth and Hiffner took the stolen items to her vehicle, while McCauley continued to patrol the market, according to the arrest report.

Burkett, who resides at 2547 Georgia Avenue in Sanford, told investigators that he entered the Living Difference Booth with McCauley and removed screws from a cabinet door, stealing \$100. Burkett gave \$40 from the petty cash to McCauley, according to the arrest report.

Security guards at Flea World are not allowed to enter booths, except during emergencies. If there is a problem, they are supposed to call the Sheriff's Office.

 the prior year's average statewide classroom teacher's salary to teachers who hold NBPTS certification and have a satisfactory annual performance appraisal.

In addition, there is an annual bonus of 10 percent to teachers who meet the requirements and provide the equivalent of 12 workdays of mentoring services to other teachers.

The average statewide teacher salary is \$35,000. Teachers receiving the national

salary bonus money and \$3,500 for serving as mentors. Some teachers could begin receiving bonus payments beginning as early as mid-December.

The state also provides an application fee subsidy of \$1,800, and a \$150 portfolio preparation cost reimbursement. Both costs are one time payments.

In 1998, the Florida legislature appropriated \$12 million for the Excellent Teaching Program and increased the budget spending authority to \$14

for the 2000-2001 school year.

There were 1,371 Florida teachers who sought the national certification, according to the Department of Education. Those who do not achieve the designation this year have up to three years to retake portions of the assessments to gain the national designation.

The Department of Education will pay for one retake exercise, at a cost of \$275 each, for 356 Florida teachers. The retake candidates will be selected in a lottery drawing on Jan. 7, 2000, in Tallahassee.

"National certification is based on rigorous, high standards of teaching excellence, and regardless of the outcome, all those who participate in the process are commended for this great accomplishment."

Gallagher is seeking legislative approval to boost teacher income for Florida's top ranked teachers to as much as \$80,000 through the Mentor Teacher Program. One of the requirements for the Mentor Teacher status is national certification.

Nationally certified teachers must demonstrate their knowledge and skills through a series of performance-based assessments that include portfolios, student work samples, videotapes, and an analyses of classroom teaching and student learning. There are also written exercises.

National board certification is a voluntary certification and does not replace state level licensing. The Department of Education has received 1,455 applications from teachers planning to pursue certification for the 1999-2000 school year.

## Constuction work continues at Seminole County schools

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Construction at the Lake Brantley High School campus is nearing completion.

The \$40 million renovation project at Lake Brantley High School, which has more than 3,000 students, has been on-going since January 1998. The project is expected to be completed in the spring of 2000.

This summer, a new Administration Suite and an interior courtyard were placed under construction. For the second consecutive year, students at Lake Brantley High School took summer classes at Lyman High School.

The so-called "Round

Building," constructed in the early 1970's with open-pod classrooms, is being replaced by three academic buildings.

Other additions include a new Gymnasium and Media Center. The Science Building is being renovated. The school's softball and baseball field have also been relocated.

No other school in the county needed renovations as urgently as Lake Brantley High School did, said Dianne Kramer, executive director of facilities planning for the school district.

However, work is on-going at Seminole and Oviedo high schools. Seminole has received new classrooms in recent years, and Oviedo High School received a new Media Center. Several years ago, the Lake Howell

High School was renovated. Lake Mary High School may need major renovations in the coming years.

"Not much has been done for Lake Mary since it was built," Kramer said of the 20-year old campus.

A critical problem facing Seminole County schools is replacing open-pod classrooms, designed in the early 1970's without walls or windows, Kramer said.

The campuses of several elementary schools, plus Lake Howell and Lake Brantley high schools, and Teague and Tuskawilla middle schools, were constructed using the open-pod design.

In addition, at the middle schools and high schools, there are not enough fire exits.

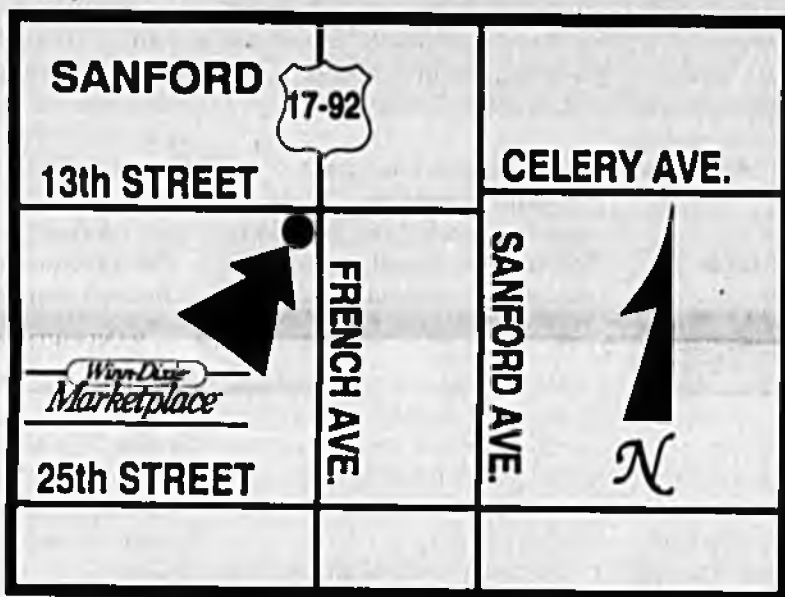

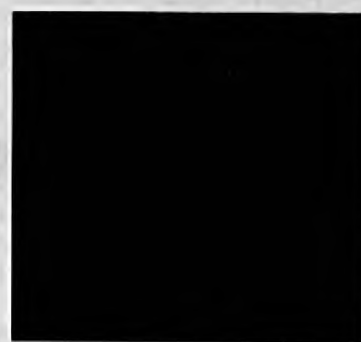

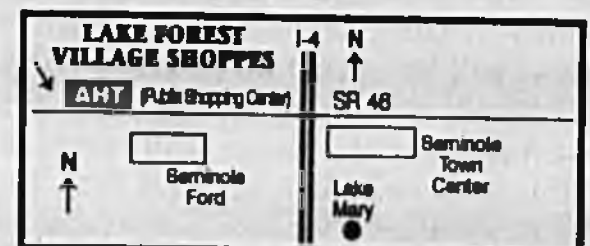

# Quarterfinals await winners

## Grudge match, long road trip on slate for playoff football squads

**LAKE MARY** - There are a lot of interesting questions heading into this Friday's second round of the Florida High School Activities Association (FHSA) Football Championship Playoffs.

Can Lake Mary win its 11th straight game and defeat a talented Oviedo team for a second time this season?

Can wild card selection Oviedo take advantage of a huge road upset of West Orange last week and stretch its own winning streak to six games and also average a regular season loss to Lake Mary at the same time?

Can Lake Brantley's big three of Bryan Smith, Lanier Bush and Randy Casey continue to run roughshod over the opposition and can the defense step up and shut down a top-seeded Tallahassee-Lincoln team that

scored 47 points in the first half last week?

The Lions (8-3) will travel to Lake Mary's Don T. Reynolds Stadium to take on the Rams (10-1), while the Patriots (9-2) will be in Tallahassee to play Lincoln (9-2). Both games are set for 7:30 p.m. kickoffs.

At stake for the winners is a place in the quarterfinals next week.

If Lincoln wins it would be at home no matter who wins the Oviedo-Lake Mary game.

If Lake Mary and Lake Brantley wins the game would be at Lake Mary and if Oviedo and Lake Brantley wins, the game would be at Lake Brantley.

A Lake Brantley victory over Lincoln would also assure the Seminole Athletic Conference of having a team reach the Final 4.

The Rams of coach Greg Stanton have gotten better and better each week, especially on

offense, and have moved into the darkhorse roll to win the Class 6A State Title.

Senior running back Charles Harris again led the way last week, rushing for 255 yards and three touchdowns as Lake Mary got past a very good Orange Park team 33-14.

But Harris is far from a one-man team as quarterback Jason Hadley and multi-purpose back Anthony Ballerino are capable of having big offensive nights.

The "no-name" Lake Mary defense has been strong all year and continues to stop opponents cold, while place-kicker/punter Russ Abrams is one of the top kicking specialists in the state.

The Lions of coach Greg Register pulled off arguably the biggest upset of the opening week of the playoffs, not so much because they won, but because they were able to shut out a West Orange team that

had easily handled the best

offense. The Patriots of coach George Clayton looked awesome last week in outscoring Dr. Phillips, which had lost three games during the regular season to teams which had a combined one loss, 41-27.

Smith, Bush and Casey combined for 422 of Lake Brantley's 437 yards of total offense and all five touchdowns in the victory.

And while the Patriots defense did bend, it didn't break and made big plays when it needed to. Darnell Weeks, Steve Baggs and Chris Raush are the leaders on the defensive side of the ball and must come up big this week if Lake Brantley is to remain alive.

If the first game was any indication, this week's rematch between the Lions and Rams could be barn-burner.

In the first game, Abrams was the star, kicking three field goals of 39, 47 and 26 yards as Lake Mary won 15-13 at John

Courier Field.

The rematch could be just as close as both teams have improved on both sides of the ball and have combined to win 13 of 14 games since that first matchup.

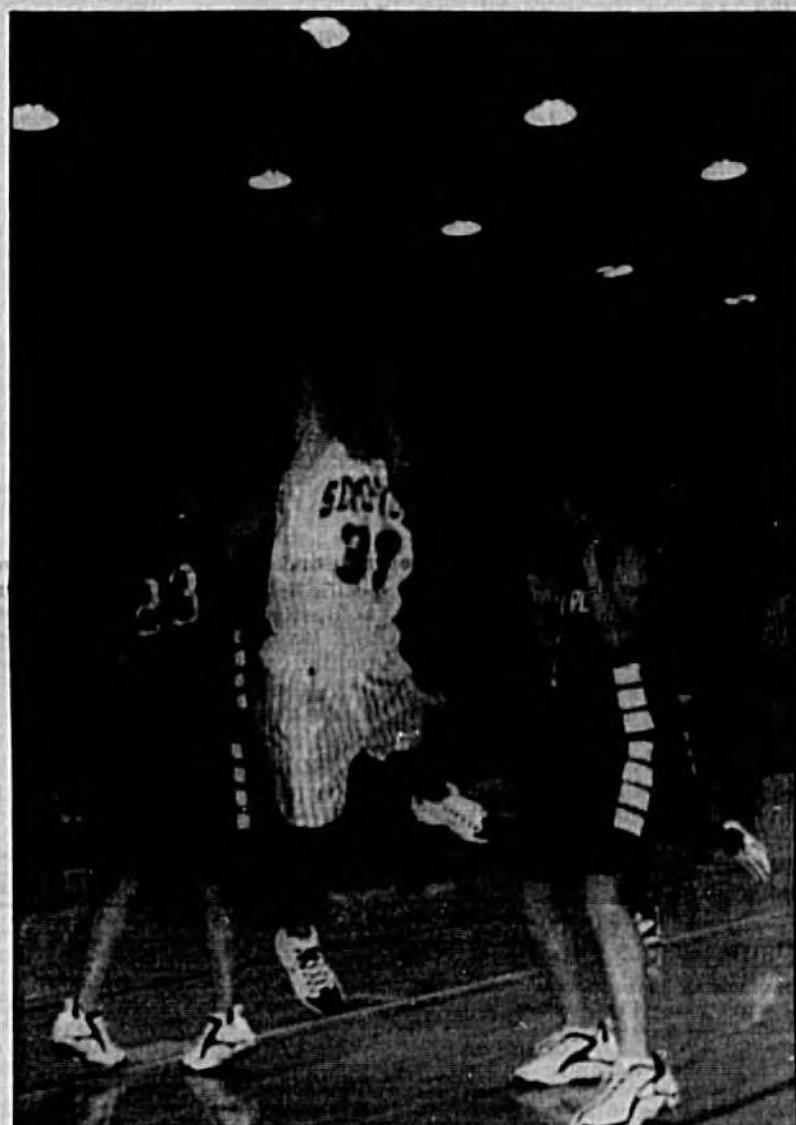

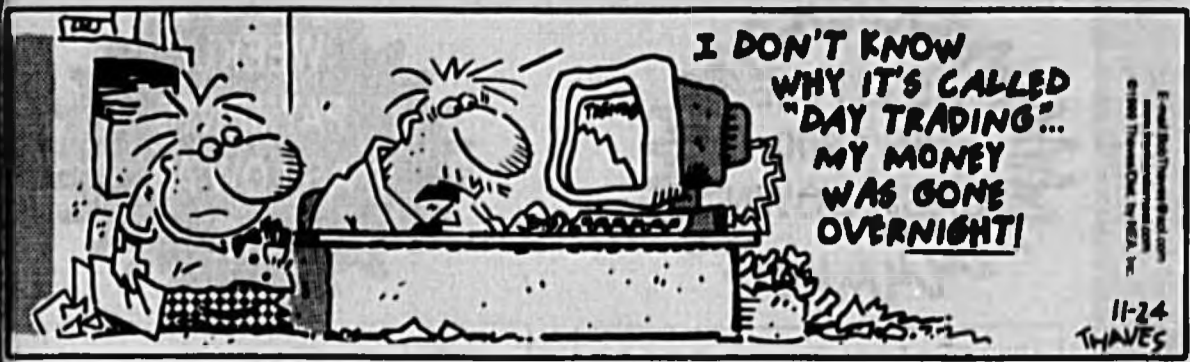

## Win at Bridge

### Two magazines merged

The world's oldest bridge publication is Bridge Magazine; it started in May 1926. And earlier this year it bought out another English magazine, International Popular Bridge Monthly. It is too early to judge what effect this will have, but probably little! It is a large-page magazine, but obviously it has a European slant with British four-card-major and weak-no-trump bidding. Still, as I used to be its editor, it is hard for me not to recommend it. Here is a problem supplied by Patrick Jourdain. How would you declare four spades after West leads the heart queen? For his opening bid, you expect West to hold the spade ace. So, it looks as though you can discard two clubs on dummy's top hearts and play to lose one spade and two diamonds.

However, if you do that with this layout, you go one down, losing two spades and two diamonds. There is a better approach. Ruff at trick one, then immediately lead a diamond toward dummy's king. If East captures the king with the ace, West must have the spade ace; you are fine unless he has all three missing trumps. If West wins with the diamond ace, you win with dummy's king, then throw your remaining diamonds on the hearts. Here, you will lose two spades and one club, your last club being ruffed in the dummy. ## Doctor Gott

### Be concerned about bruises

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am taking the new drug Celebrex for arthritis pain. I also take Coumadin to reduce the formation of blood clots. I recently have noted peculiar areas of bruising on my arms and legs. Should I be concerned?  
 DEAR READER: Without a doubt. These bruises suggest that you may be over-anticoagulated, even though your prothrombin time (a blood test that measures clotting) may have been in a satisfactory range for years. The Celebrex could be the culprit. Recent studies have confirmed that the concomitant use of Coumadin and Celebrex may cause an increase in the prothrombin time: in simple terms, the Celebrex may be accentuating the effects of the Coumadin. See your physician immediately and have a blood test performed.  
 DEAR DR. GOTT: Although I am 51

years old, I have a problem with my cholesterol. Usually, I can keep it under control by exercising and dieting. A friend recently gave me information on DHEA. Should I use it?  
 DEAR READER: In my opinion, no. DHEA (dehydroepiandrosterone) was touted in the past as a great way to recharge men's batteries and rekindle their vigor. However, medical tests were inconclusive, so the hormone fell out of favor. Thus, I am not surprised to see its clever promoters attempting once again to give DHEA an undeserved reputation as a medicine to lower cholesterol.  
 I'd save your money and follow your doctor's advice with respect to high cholesterol. While diet and exercise are certainly the cornerstone of therapy (and are often effective), you and your physician may have to consider other options, such as prescription drugs. Incidentally, are you familiar with niacin therapy? This vitamin,

now available in a time release form, shows great promise in some patients. To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Understanding Cholesterol." Other readers who would like a copy should send \$2 plus a long self-addressed, stamped envelope to P.O. Box 2017, Murray Hill Station, New York, NY 10156. DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been told that sitting in a sauna gives the same health benefits as aerobic exercise because the heart rate increases. Is this true?  
 DEAR READER: No, it isn't. There is no way to experience the benefits of exercise without exercising. Steam rooms increase the pulse rate because the body attempts to get rid of excess heat by circulating the blood more rapidly through capillary blood vessels in the skin. The blood is thereby shunted away from muscles and internal organs. Quite the reverse occurs during exercise, when blood flow is directed from skin to muscles.
