Police nab Flea World thieves

SANFORD — Three security guards at Flea World are facing multiple counts of burglary after confessing to stealing from booths at Sanford's shopping bazaar.

Video tape taken on Nov. 2 at the Living Difference Landscaping Booth shows Cherie Hiffner, 57, and 39-year old Warren McCauley, both of Sanford, comSecurity guards admit to breaking into booths

mitting burglary. Investigators said Lee Burkett, 19, of Sanford, has also confessed to committing theft.

Investigators said the three security guards arrested on Monday all knew

about each other's activities, but they were not operating as a team. They had each worked at Flea World for less than a

"She (Hiffner) admitted committing

the thefts and gave me the names of the other two defendants," said Investigator Ben Hartner of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "They admitted breaking into numerous booths over the last four months."

Investigators have recovered \$3,000 worth of tools, clothing, kitchen knives and other items taken from vendors at Hiffner's residence at 2250 Marquette Avenue.

'I had no idea my throat was cut ...'

Victim recounts boyfriend's attack

SANFORD - Jennifer Forehand knew she was hurt and needed help when she knocked on the door of Wade and Betty Reynolds, but she was afraid they would turn her away.

"I was concerned that maybe they wouldn't care," Forehand said. "I was covered in blood. They calmed me down, and cared for me until I could get to the hospital."

Forehand had walked nearly a quarter mile to reach the Reynolds' home. Her exboyfriend, Andre Henley, 28, of Winter Park had kidnapped her, strangled her twice and slit her throat with a box cutter before leaving her for dead near the entrance to the Seminole County Public Schools **Environmental** Education property.

"I had no idea my throat was cut as I was walking along (State Road 436)," Forehand said, recalling the events of Nov. 16. "It wasn't until I was in the emergency room and they started asking all these questions that I realized I'm really hurt badly.

"I'm still astonished at how calm I was," Forehand added. "My first thought was just to get to the road, and I didn't want to get hit by a car. I was also scared that he (Henley) was still in the area. I kept saying please don't let me die."

Investigators were able to find out about Henley through Forehand, who, even though she could not talk because of her injuries, was

Seminole teachers earn national certification, awards

SANFORD - Two dozen Seminole County teachers are among the 546 teachers statewide this year who met the requirements for national certification, earning incentives such as salary and mentoring bonus-

Florida had the second largest number of recipients for the 1998-1999 school year,

behind North Carolina at 726. "We are fortunate to count these dedicated, hardworking teachers among the nation's best," said Florida Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher.

The Excellent Teaching Program, passed during the 1998 state legislative session, is designed to reward teaching excellence by providing incentives, including salary and mentoring bonuses, for Florida teachers who achieve certification through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

The NBPTS is a private, nonprofit organization governed by a 63-member board of directors, the majority of whom are teachers. Thirty-eight states offer at least one incentive to teachers who earn the certification, while 31 states including Florida offer multiple incen-

The incentives and bonuses in Florida include an annual salary bonus of 10 percent of See Teachers, Page 6A



The Department gives notice of its intent to find the Amendments to the Comprehensive Plan for the City of Sanford, adopted by Ordinance No. 3492 on October 11, 1999, IN COMPLIANCE, pursuant to Sections 163.3184, 163.3187 and 163.3189, F.S.

The adopted City of Sanford Comprehensive Plan Amendments and the Department's Objections, Recommendations and Comments Report, (if any), are available for public inspection Monday through Friday, except for legal holidays, during normal business hours, at the City of Sanford City Hall, Department of Engineering and Planning, 300 North Park Avenue, Sanford, Florida 32771.

The petition must be filed with the Agency Clerk, Department of Community Affairs, 2555 Shumard Oak Boulevard, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-2100, and a copy mailed or delivered to the local government. Failure to timely file a petition shall constitute a waiver of any right to request an administrative proceeding as a petitioner under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S. If a petition is filed, the purpose of the administrative hearing will be to present evidence and testimony and forward a recommended order to the Department. If no petition is filed, this Notice of Intent shall become final

If a petition is filed, other affected persons may petition for leave to intervene in the proceeding. A petition for intervention must be filed at least twenty (20) days before the final hearing and must include all of the information and contents described in Uniform Rule 28-106.205, F.A.C. A petition for leave to intervene shall be filed at the Division of Administrative Hearings, Department of Management Services, 1230 Apalachee Parkway, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-1550. Failure to petition to intervene within the allowed time frame constitutes a waiver of any right such a person has to request a hearing under Sections 120.569 and 120.57, F.S., or to participate in the administrative hearing.

After an administrative hearing petition is timely filed, mediation is available pursuant to Subsection 163.3189(3)(a), F.S., to any affected person who is made a party to the proceeding by filing that request with the administrative law judge assigned by the Division of Administrative Hearings. The choice of mediation shall not affect a party's right to an

'Tis the season

It may begin this Friday, but Saturday is the big day. Traditionally, the Saturday following Thanksgiving is the biggest shopping day of the year. Stores begin their pre-holiday sales promotions, and buyers, hoping to find items that may be difficult to locate later in the year, head for the shops, stores and malls.

Unfortunately, Saturday is also one of the biggest shoplifting days of the year. With stores packed to the rafters with shoppers, some believe they can take a few articles and leave without being noticed.

Wrong. With today's tagging and electronic monitoring devices at exit doors, items which have not been paid for ignite alarms and bring store security to action.

It's not perfect however. Some people who almost make a living by shoplifting, might be considered as experts. They know ways to get through the system, or at least they think they do.


Honest shoppers therefore, should be extremely cautious and not give the impression they are trying to steal. Don't place items in bags, pockets or purses until they are paid for at the checkout counter. Don't display large wads of money at the counter. Don't leave children unattended, and don't leave small children hold merchandise before or after checkout.

In addition to shoplifting problems, there are often a myriad of grab-and-run situations of purchased items, and purse snatchings. People who are hitting the stores on the first big shopping spree often take larger than usual amounts of money. The criminals are well aware of this and often see it as an opportunity to become even braver in their actions.

Taking items out to the car also calls for extreme caution. Never allow a stranger to "help you to your car with those large gifts." If you are purchasing something heavier or larger than you may be able to handle, take someone along who can.

And of course, locking a car (with the windows closed) is always the right thing to do. Thieves can easily see through car windows to find out which car to vandalize. Don't make it easier for them than it already may be.

Getting involved in the annual mass hysteria of shopping this weekend may seem to be frightening. With the expected shoplifting, vehicle burglaries, purse snatchings and other problems, there is surely reason for serious concern. But if we all exercise caution at all times, not letting down our guard, it can be a true adventure in shopping.

Upon arriving at the Festival, Danielle and I noticed that we had a problem. We wanted Chris to

see the show, but we were worried about getting too close to the crowd, because Danielle and I didn't want anyone to hit Chris's

Because he's in a wheelchair, we didn't want Chris looking at the backs of the people in the crowd. I went to look for a Festival official to see if there was a handicapped area or at least get Chris a safe place where he could watch the concert. Thanksgiving provides a time to remember the year's blessings

"When thou has eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord they God for the good land which He hath given you...Enter into His gates with thanksgiving and into His courts with praise; be thankful unto Him, and bless his name...And let them sacrifice the sacrifices of thanksgiving, and declare His works with rejoicing...Giving thanks unto the Father, which hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in life ...

> (Deuteronomy 8:10, Psalm 100:4, Psalm 107:22, Colossians 1:12)

Happy Thanksgiving!

In the United States and Canada, Thanksgiving is a day set apart annually for expressing thanks to God for the blessings of the year.

Less than a year after the Plymouth colonists settled in the new land, the first American Thanksgiving was celebrated. That first winter was a dreadful, deadly one killing almost half of the colonists. Things looked up in the summer of 1621 with a bumper crop of corn harvest, after

which Governor William Bradford decreed a three-day feast to be held. "The first Thanksgiving Day, set aside for the special purpose of prayer as well as celebration, was decreed by Governor Bradford for July 30, 1663" (World Book Encyclopedia, Vol. 18).

In 1789, President George Washington issued a proclamation for a day of thanks: however, there was no regular day of the celebration of Thanksgiving until President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November 1863 as "a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father (ibid.). Congress ruled in 1941 that this day be made a legal federal holiday.

Thanksgiving is more than a holiday! For many people, Thanksgiving begins with turkey, dressing and cranberry sauce and ends when the favorite football team has won or lost; after which, family and friends - who have abounded in food and fellowship - "waddle" to their homes for a good night's rest!

"If asked to list Thanksgiving traditions, many people would think of

turkey, cranberries and Pilgrims but omit grateful prayers and worship services and ironic situation for a holiday conceived by pious people as an opportunity for prayer, but a true reflection of modern attitudes. Americans know far more about the ship on which the Pilgrims sailed, the food they ate, and the clothes they wore than about the way they worshipped" (Diana Appelbaum).

Following the Civil War which left many people, if not all, with sparse blessings, it is recorded that some people remembered words from the First McGuffey Reader of their early school years which called them back to the faith: "You ask your parents for food, and drink, and books, and clothes, and when they give you these things, you thank them, and love them for the good they do you. So you should ask your God for those things which He can give you, and no one else can give you."

Yes, for many Americans today, Thanksgiving may be only a one-day affair. Truth is that most of us could not take 365 days a year of Thanksgiving

meals (even though we might think so); however, all of us could certainly use 365 days a year for thanksgiving and gratitude. Says Paul the Apostle: "Be joyful always...give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:16, 18).

The first National Thanksgiving Proclamation by George Washington gives us great historical motives and substance for ongoing Thanksgiving:

"Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection, aid and favors...

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to con-

fer upon us (1789)."


The initiation of a Thanksgiving holiday came as our forefathers realized that their very existence was the result of Divine blessing. It is a holiday historically devoted to God, who transcends the entire community. Thanksgiving was begun as a national reminder of the blessings of God. Recipes to turn winter squash into elegant dishes

I much prefer winter squash --with their rich texture and sweet flavor - to summer squash, which always seem a little watery

The recipe for Butternut Squash Risotto with Chicken and a smooth Butternut Squash Sauce was inspired by Chef Peter Kelly of the New England Culinary Institute. (The risotto recipe comes from Judith Barrett's and Norma Wasserman's excellent book "Risotto.") Wondering if Kelly's recipe was just a fluke, I consulted Roger Verge's book "Vegetables in the French Style" and found the recipe below for Winter Squash Tapioca Flan.

There's nothing wrong with inviting those dowdy, lumpy squash to your supper table. But it's nice to know that you can dress them up and take them to a fancy dinner.

Note: Pumpkin can be substituted for squash in both recipes.

BUTTERNUT SQUASH RISOTTO WITH CHICKEN AND BUTTERNUT SQUASH SAUCE

For the sauce:

1 small butternut squash 1/2 cup chicken or vegetable stock, or more, if needed

salt and pepper to taste 1 to 2 tablespoons butter

For the risotto: 1/4 pound fresh or frozen but-

ternut squash

5-1/2 cups chicken stock or

3 tablespoons unsalted butter 1 tablespoon olive oil 1/2 cup finely minced onion 1-1/2 cups Arborio rice

1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/4 cup grated Parmesan

cheese 1 tablespoon chopped fresh

parsley For the chicken:

4 4-ounce, boneless, skinless chicken breasts

oil or butter for sauteeing or grilling

salt and pepper to taste

To make the sauce: Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Cut the squash in half and scoop out the seeds and fibers. Bake the squash cut-side-up on a baking pan, until soft, about 45 minutes. Scrape out the pulp with a spoon and put it in a blender container, or the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal blade. Add the chicken broth, salt, pepper and butter. Puree until a sauce-like consistency is reached, adding more broth if necessary. Pour it into a

saucepan and set aside. To make the risotto: If using fresh squash, peel it, remove the seeds and cut the flesh into 1-inch pieces. Cook fresh or frozen squash with I cup water until it is tender and can easily be pierced with a fork. Place squash with 1/2 cup of its cooking liquid in a food processor, blender or food mill, and puree. Set aside.

Bring the 5-1/2 cups broth to a steady simmer in a saucepan.

Heat 2 tablespoons of the butter and the oil in a heavy, 4-quart, heat-proof casserole or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the onion and saute 1 to 2 minutes, until it begins to soften. Be careful not to brown it.

Add the rice to the Dutch oven and, using a wooden spoon, stir for 1 minute, making sure all the grains are well-coated. Begin to add the simmering broth, 1/2 cup at a time, stirring frequently. Wait until each addition is almost completely absorbed before adding the next half cup. Reserve about

1/4 cup to add at the very end. While you are cooking the risotto, stir it frequently to prevent stick-

Meanwhile, saute the chicken or grill it to your liking. Set aside.

After the risotto has cooked about 18 minutes (the rice should be tender but still firm) add the reserved 1/4 cup broth, the pureed squash, lemon juice and parsley. Turn off the heat and immediately add the remaining tablespoon butter and the

Parmesan cheese and stir vigorously to combine.

To serve: Heat the sauce. Slice a chicken breast and fan the slices on a mound of rice. Drizzle some sauce over the top and/or around the sides. Repeat for four plates. Yield: 4 servings.

WINTER SQUASH AND TAPI-OCA FLAN

3-1/4 pounds winter squash 2 teaspoons sugar

salt, to taste scant cup milk

1 vanilla bean, or 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1 tablespoon fine tapioca

4 eggs

3 tablespoons butter pinch of freshly grated nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Peel the squash and remove the seeds and fibers. Cut the flesh into 3/4-inch chunks and place them on a double sheet of aluminum foil, about 20 inches long. Sprinkle with the sugar, add a bit of salt and wrap the foll around the squash, making a sealed package. Leave some room inside for heat circulation. Place the package on a baking sheet and bake for 45 minutes to 1 hour.

In the meantime, pour the milk into a saucepan, add the vanilla bean (if using) and a pinch of salt (do not add the vanilla extract at this stage, if that's what you're using). Bring to a boil. Sprinkle the tapioca into the boiling milk, stirring with a whisk. Lower the heat and cook for 5 minutes. Remove from the heat. Now is the time to add the vanilla extract if you are

not using a vanilla bean.

Remove the squash from the oven, and lower the oven temperature to 275 degrees. Puree the squash through a sieve, with a potato ricer, or with the fine disk in a food mill.

Remove the vanilla bean (if you've used it) from the tapioca mixture and mix the taploca into the squash puree. Beat the eggs in a small bowl. Cut 2 tablespoons of the butter into small pieces and add to the squash mixture. Mix well, then add the beaten eggs and a pinch of nutmeg.

Season to taste with salt and mix well. Butter a baking dish with the remaining tablespoon butter, scrape the mixture into the dish and smooth the surface.

Put the baking dish into a roasting pan with sides. Pour hot water into the pan until it goes about halfway up the sides of the baking dish. Put the pan with the baking dish in it in the oven and bake for 10 minutes. Lower the temperature to 250 degrees, and bake for another 30 minutes, or until set.

Put the baking dish on a tray and serve immediately. Yield: 4

ship, Forehand said that Henley was never abusive, although he was at times controlling.

"He never exhibited a bad temper," Forehand said. "We just saw each other a few weeks ago and there were no arguments, no tension, nothing."

Herron echoed Forehand's belief that Henley liked to be in control

"Probably a large part of this crime was that he wanted to control everything and that control was challenged," Herron said.

Henley is charged with attempted first-degree murder. In addition, he is charged with kidnapping, aggravated battery, and grand theft auto. He is being held in the Seminole County Jail without bond.

Vega is accused of being an accessory after the fact to attempted first-degree murder. She has been released on a \$5,000 bond.

Henley told investigators he took speaker wire and put it around Forehand's neck, choking her and rendering her unconscious. He said he then loaded Forehand into her own two-door Nissan and drove her to just outside the Environmental Education Center property, where he choked her again and then slashed her neck with a box cutter.

Investigators said Henley took Forehand's car and abandoned it in the Branchwood Apartments. He then walked in the San Ince

helped him come up with an alibi, which is why she was charged as an accessory after the fact.

Forehand said she has had previous conversations with Vega, and that she did not appear threat-

"We were both civil and respectful to each other," Forehand said. "She was not in any way disrespectful to me. I don't know what she may have been thinking in her mind. We were mostly teaming up, comparing notes, trying to get the lies straight."

Forehand is expected to fully recover from her wounds. She weighed 122 pounds before the incident on Nov 16 Since then, she

survive that night by remaining calm and keeping her wits.

"At first I was in pure shock, because it was completely unexpected," Forehand said. "The important thing to remember in a panic situation is that while you feel scared, shocked, terrified, no matter what you feel, try not to think about it. Try not to tend to your own injuries, and don't lose the ability to think.

She said she is grateful her 5year-old son was not with her when the attack occurred.

"This Thanksgiving, I have a lot to be thankful for," Forehand said. "If I had taken my son with me, not knowing this would happen.

The three suspects discarded the majority of their stolen merchandise in the trash after receiving a tip about the video camera, investigators said.

"They primarily took small items such as T-shirts," Hartner said. "They claim that they were not reselling the items. We're still investigating whether that is true. We have no proof yet that they were reselling the items."

The three suspects could face a dozen charges of burglary, as well as additional charges, in the on-going investigation, said Hartner.

Victims of the thefts that have been plaguing Flee World during the last four months are

identifying items taken from them, so that the items can be returned to their owners.

"They knew what booths to steal from," Hartner said. "If they wanted shoes, they went to a shoe store. We've also recovered jewelry, watches and perfume."

McCauley, who lives at 4220 S. Orlando Drive, apartment number 55, was a knife collector, and some of the knives were found in Hiffner's home, investigators said.

the prior year's average statewide classroom teacher's salary to teachers who hold NBPTS certification and have a satisfactory annual performance appraisal.

In addition, there is an annual bonus of 10 percent to teachers who meet the requirements and provide the equivalent of 12 workdays of mentoring services to other teachers.

The average statewide teacher salary is \$35,000. Teachers receiving the national salary bonus money and \$3,500 for serving as mentors. Some teachers could begin receiving bonus payments beginning as early as mid-December.

The state also provides an application fee subsidy of \$1,800, and a \$150 portfolio preparation cost reimbursement. Both costs are one time payments.

In 1998, the Florida legislature appropriated \$12 million for the Excellent Teaching Program and increased the budget spending authority to \$14

for the 2000-2001 school year.

There were 1,371 Florida teachers who sought the national certification, according to the Department of Education. Those who do not achieve the designation this year have up to three years to retake portions of the assessments to gain the

national designation. The Department of Education will pay for one retake exercise, at a cost of \$275 each, for 356 Florida teachers. The retake candidates will be selected in a lottery drawing on Jan. 7, 2000, in Tallahassee.

"National certification is based on rigorous, high standards of teaching excellence, and regardless of the outcome, all those who participate in the process are commended for this great accomplishment."

Gallagher is seeking legislative approval to boost teacher income for Florida's top ranked teachers to as much as \$80,000 through the Mentor Teacher Program. One of the requirements for the Mentor Teacher status is national certification.

Nationally certified teachers must demonstrate their knowledge and skills through a series of performance-based assessments that include portfolios, student work samples, videotapes, and an analyses of classroom teaching and student learning. There are also written exercises.

National board certification is a voluntary certification and does not replace state level licensing. The Department of Education has received 1,455 applications from teachers planning to pursue certification for the 1999-2000 school year.

If the first game was any indication, this week's rematch between the Lions and Rams could be barn-burner.


In the first game, Abrams was the star, kicking three field goals of 39, 47 and 26 yards as Lake Mary won 15-13 at John



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



> optulon, no. DHEA (dehydroeptandrosterone) was touted in the past as a great way to recharge men's batteries and rekindle their vigor. However, medicul tests were inconclusive, so the hormone fell out of favor. Thus, I am not surprised to see its clever promoters attempting once again to give DHEA an undeserved reputation as a medicine to lower cholesterol.

• I'd save your money and follow your doctor's advice with respect to high cholesterol. While diet and exercise are certainly the cornerstone of therapy (and are often effective), you and your physictan may have to consider other options, such as prescription drugs. Incidentally, are you familiar with niacin therapy? This vitamin,
