# Director Quits Post

Herbert Johnson, Seminole County civil defense director and veterans' service officer, made good on notice given to the County Commission during budget hearings and has submitted his resignation from the two department post to accept the position of Civil Defense Director of Brevard County.

Johnson during the budget hearing complained bitterly about the county job classification and pay which did not fit him in a department head and showed a salary schedule of \$5,450 to \$6,850 for the two-pronged position.

The Commission, since the complaint was made by Johnson requested Frank C. Brown, Co. of Miami, which had done the pay plan but Johnson's position in department head status and the plan was amended to reflect the change. Range of salary, however, in the change of status, was left as it was in the old schedule.

Johnson told the Board that he was seeking employment elsewhere because of his "personal need for more money."

# County Ponders Budget

## Half-Mill Tax Cut?

Reduction in county ad valorem taxes by at least one-half mill is expected when tentative budget is adopted by the County Commission later this week.

Over the past three weeks, the County Commission has been holding budget sessions daily with department heads and chopping away at budget requests to hold the line on taxation.

Each mill of taxation will bring \$238,400 into the county coffers, an increase of some \$14,000 over last year's \$224,700.

However, hospital millage is scheduled to be reduced by .53 mill in the new fiscal year due to completion of payment by the county of matching funds for construction of the new hospital wing.

In addition, tax levy for the Port Authority will be reduced by \$60,000 since county retractor funds in that amount are earmarked for the authority in the 1967-68 fiscal year.

# Setback For SJC

# Credit Card Explosion

Inflation is hitting Americans' pocketbooks in more ways than one. The money flows out, but the life of income-earning credit cards continues to swell.

Currently, more than 200 million credit cards are issued in the United States each year — by travel and entertainment organizations, machine companies, hotels, airlines, auto rental agencies, you name it. The figure is expected to increase 25 per cent by the end of 1967.

Credit cards have become popular with the criminal element, too. Stolen cards can bring up to \$250 on the underground market. Who steals your purse may steal trash, but if one or more credit cards are in it, it could be an extremely expensive loss.

Over the years, American Express agents have investigated thousands of cases of stolen credit cards and have come up with a series of simple rules: **Keep cards on your person, and check frequently to make sure they are all in your possession.**

• Keep a record of all numbers and issuers of cards.

• If a card is missing, report its loss immediately to the issuer — first by telephone or wire, then by letter. Your responsibility ends with due notice.

Also report it to the police.

• Screen your cards. Destroy those you really don't need.

• Always make your card is returned after making a purchase.

# Worry Clinic

Ned Cantwell is a search type of editor with the right needed to help develop young writers. For too often older executives criticize and "chew out" young folks for errors, but fail to give proper praise for good deeds.

Dead, this is one of the common complaints of your child. Look actually strengthen your muscles!

In my college textbook, "Psychology Applied," on p. 372-374, I discuss this topic at length.

Therein I describe a hypnotic experiment on a group of soldiers. Before they were hypnotized, they competed vigorously to see who had the most powerful handgrip. They averaged 100 pounds per man.

Then they were hypnotized but given the defeat or negative idea that they were weak, feeble, anemic, etc.

Now they averaged only 60 pounds per man, though they strained till the veins stood out in their necks.

Before they were awakened from hypnosis, they were then given the opposite suggestion, namely that they were strong, powerful, Herculean.

Now they averaged 140 pounds per man, which was almost 40 per cent more than their best record while awake!

And double their strength under the defeat idea.

In the waking state, we seldom attain our maximum power nor reach the low point which hypnosis permits, but we go in those directions, depending on whether we think positively or negatively.

A victory morale is worth ten times as much as the extra point after touchdown, and often is worth two or three actual touchdowns!

# Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — These years have been a painful couple to President Johnson. The sun was shining, or he thought so. Then the storm broke and he was standing in the midst of thunder and lightning.

In this speech, acknowledging an injustice inflicted on the American Negro by centuries of oppression, Johnson said: "Nothing is more freighted with meaning for our own destiny than the revolution of the American Negro."

He did not mean revolution by violence in this country but by progress. He wasn't thinking of violence then.

# Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — For two decades it has been lower major railways, shipping, airline or trucking strikes could so cripple the economy they could not be long endured.

In a war, a Vietnam, national shipping unions could cause added American deaths. A trucking union leader a few years back made it clear he wanted to be able to threaten to tie up trucking nationwide. He would achieve this ability, he said, by securing labor agreements that expired on the same day throughout the country.

This nation has several times seen the disastrous effects of major dock or rail strikes.

This it has been obvious these two decades there must be some effective legislation on the books to prevent shut-downs that affect the national welfare to such an extent they cannot be tolerated, yet handling these disputes in a way that fundamental bargaining rights of both labor and management are preserved.

Some have suggested a network of labor courts for critical nationwide industries. National strikes in these industries would be outlawed. Court trials would be required when the growth of communications and special interest groups have sometimes made representatives so susceptible to conflicting pressure as to be impotent.

Four-year terms for representatives have been suggested as one answer. Under this plan, half the representatives would be elected each two years.

NEW YORK (AP) — Should the government pay fat people to lose weight?

At first glance the proposal may sound ridiculous, but if all factors are considered, it makes at least as much sense as many other government support programs.

If Uncle Sam is willing to pay a farmer an allotment to reduce his acreage under cultivation, why shouldn't he be equally willing to hand a little cash to tubby city dwellers as an incentive to hold down their production of fat?

Such a program is fundamentally sound because all concerned would profit, including the government itself.

How? Well, let's see.

Let us first examine a typical fatty case today. Sam Slugg, a middle-aged breadwinner with a wife and two kids, a \$12,000 annual income, and 40 pounds of excess body weight.

"Sam," his doctor warns him, "you've got to take off those 40 pounds or you're going to die 10 years early. It's as simple as that."

"OKay," says Sam, whose conscience already has been bothering him because he knows that fat is unattractive and un-American. "I'll go on a diet."

He does go on a diet and begins to count his calories like a miser. He even joins a gym club to get more exercise. The first few pounds evaporate like morning dew under a hot sun.

Then Sam runs into a few hard facts that every dieter learns: **How? Well, let's see.**

That losing weight is hard, lonely, grueling work. In time, discouraged by hungrier pangs and the lack of any evident reward, Sam relapses into his old pattern.

Just as the doctor promised, Sam dies 10 years early, and soon his family is on government relief.

# Avery's Next Step High Court?



Will Ex-County Commission James P. Avery take his zoning fight to the Supreme Court next? Indications are that he will, as the County Commission this afternoon upheld the zoning board and refused to rezone the intersection from R1AA to C1 commercial. The board voted 4-1 to uphold the decision with Fitzpatrick casting the only negative vote. Hundreds of protesters streamed into the County Commission chambers causing the board to hold the hearing in the County Courthouse. Phil Logan, Avery's attorney, cited the need for commercial use in the area and that it would not be any detriment to the health, safety and welfare of the community. "What we plan is in the framework of the zoning law," Logan emphasized. "There is a definite need for a shopping plaza in this area. These people (pointing to the overcrowded town) may not realize it now—but in the future they will," Logan stressed. Testifying for Avery was Hector Al Lormann who said in his personal opinion the best uses to be served would be commercial. Attorney Ken McIntosh representing some 300 protesters urged the board to "serve the interest of the county and community" by turning down the request. He cited the adverse effect on the residential areas and warned of increases of traffic congestion near the Mary Magdalen Church and school property. Attorney S. J. Davis, who represented the town of Allamont, said the council of that city wanted to "keep the character of a residential community, and that Allamont was presently against the rezoning. Both McIntosh and Davis used diagrams and pictures to show the adverse effect of the rezoning. McIntosh also cited testimony by City Planner Jack Godwin that he did not feel the property suitable for commercial development. Both Avery and Logan declined comment on what they plan next. However, Avery had indicated several months ago he planned to fight this case "right up to the supreme court."

# Courthouse Delay Said 'Intentional'

## Alexander Hit On Facility, Road Bond Issue Lag

Blame for "intentional" delays in planning of the new courthouse and acquisition of funds for rights of way for primary and secondary road construction in Seminole County was laid at the feet of Commission Chairman John Alexander this morning by Commissioner W. Lawrence Swafford. Swafford stated he had contacted James Gamble Rogers, associate architect of the new courthouse, and had been informed Alexander had ordered plans held up on the new facility. "It has been over six months since anything has been done," Swafford declared. "Let's get something moving. Let's get both these programs off dead center." In other business, the Commissioners designated persons who will assume their respective offices in event of the election because of attack on the United States. Named as emergency interim successors in order of succession were Walter Torres, Harold A. Hathaway and Arthur Matthews for the district one seat held by Edward Varborough; William Ruth, Jack Goodin and Glenn McCall by Alexander; Leslie Winters, Richard Rogers and Charles Robinson by Swafford; Edward H. Parker, Arthur J. Medaif and Kenneth Strong by Robert Parker, and James P. Avery and A. K. Shormaker Jr. by John Fitzpatrick. Swafford urged funds in the full amount of \$3 million be issued, then validated and sold only what is needed. The Chamber of Commerce Long Range Planning Committee in an appearance before the board several months ago urged the same course of action. Alexander pointed out that \$1.2 million is needed for primary and secondary roads in the county in the state five-year program and proposed bond program including SR 427 from Five Points to Gidderville, SR 436, SR 46, Oslen Bridge, SR 426, 1532 to 14, SR 419 alignment and Red Bug Road. Swafford urged four funds of \$1 million from Longwood to 14 and SR 46 east. The Commissioners discussed the fact that provision for the Lake Jesup Causeway is not contained in either the state's five-year program nor the proposed bond issue. The Board agreed unanimously the only way to finance construction of the causeway would be by designating it a toll facility. By

# Review New Lyman Plans

School officials met in special session this morning in school superintendent William J. Phillips' office to review preliminary plans for the new \$1,500,000 Lyman High School. The plans will be presented to the Seminole County School Board on August 10, according to school administrator Walter Teague. Today's study gave Phillips and other school officials an opportunity to scan the plans to determine if they met with the county's educational standards for new school plants. The school board will also look over plans for the new Oviedo and Sanford Junior High Schools on Aug. 10. Consulting by building firm of the firm of Watson and Co. of Orlando presented the sketches that show plans for 20 general classrooms and six science labs. The entire facility will eventually cover 107,549 square feet. The central core unit is flanked by buildings housing administration in front, gymnasium and locker rooms in rear, and fanning out in courtyard fashion are the various labs and classrooms. Two special buildings will hold "satellite" dining, one in front and one in rear of the classroom plans. Projected plans call for driver training, band drill, and sports areas, including baseball and football fields. "The plans call for an initial 1,204 pupil stations, with a maximum of 1,605 pupil stations." The new Lyman High School will be located on a 20 acre tract of land on SR 427, north of the Dog Track Road. The site is just south of the Longwood City limits, but indications are that the city will supply water to the new school. Indications also are that the new school will be renamed Longwood High School.

# Bates Cool To Fire Aid Proposals

Request of the Suburban Fire Control District that the Casselberry Fire Department consider providing fire protection to a portion of the new fire district and make a proposal of costs involved met with little enthusiasm from Fire Chief Paul Bates Monday night. The request for the proposal on costs was contained in a letter written by Tally Hattaway, district chairman, and read by Mayor Arthur Wheatley at the Council meeting. "The fireman don't think much of it," Fire Chief Paul Bates stated explaining the fireman had volunteered to provide fire protection within the city limits only. "The mayor pointed out if such protection is contracted for a period of five years as requested by the fire commissioners of the district need would arise for two full time firemen and one relief man. It was agreed the matter should be "hashed over" at a work session before any decision is made.

# Davis On Constitution

Dilution of the power of individual legislative delegations over local affairs through home rule will be one of the matters to be discussed at the Seminole County to be considered by the Legislature during the special session on Constitution revision, former Rep. S. J. Davis Jr. told The Herald today. "Under the new Constitution as proposed by the Constitution Revision Commission the County Commission would be given the right of self government such as the cities have. The counties would be given power to enact ordinances without first going to the Legislature," Davis said. Davis served for many months on the Commission which held public hearings on constitution revision throughout the state.


