Toy bash

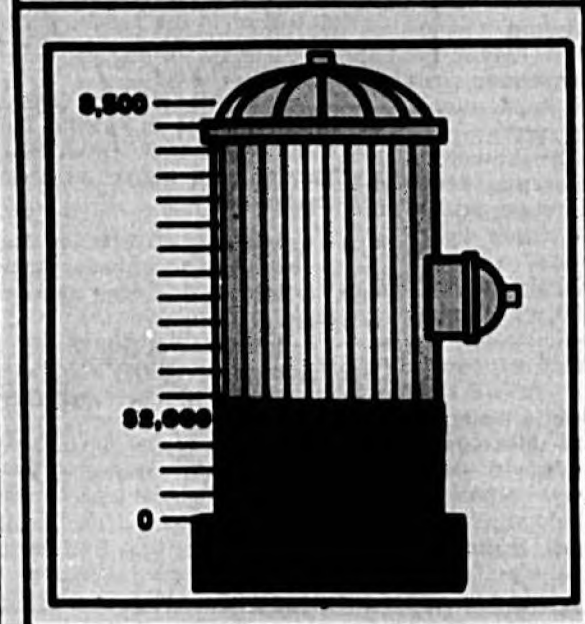

Stopping child abuse

New system of investigation is family-friendly

SANFORD — Residents of Seminole County will soon have a new way to strengthen and preserve families threatened by child abuse and neglect. The Family Services Response System (FSRS) has been approved by the community advisory council for District 7 of the Department of Health and Human Services Board.
The district encompasses not only Seminole County, but Orange, Brevard and Ocala as well. According to Stuart Doyle, spokesman with HRS, "This past year, we investigated approximately 14,000 cases in the four county area, with about half of them only in Orange County, leaving the rest in the three-county area."
"But this new system will be especially important to Seminole County with the rapid growth it has had in population," he added.

"With that, we expect more cases and more reports of abuse and neglect."
"Under this FSRS," he continued, "Our investigations will be more family-friendly, and less cumbersome, allowing us more time to devote to the really serious cases."
He said it also offers a compendium of readily available services designed to help families solve immediate and long-term problems. "Families from Midway to Heatslow, in other words, regardless of income or location, will be able to decide on what services they may want."
In addition to winning board consent, the FSRS received a stamp of approval from HRS Secretary Jim Tovey, which means that the District 7 can begin implementing the plan as soon as possible.
The FSRS, which will not receive new funding, will rely on existing services in the district to help families work out their problems and remain intact.
Doyle said it was developed to create a more productive way of protecting children and the self-esteem of their families during the investigation process.
The objective is to allow HRS to respond to particular reports of child abuse or neglect by providing, when appropriate, specialized services to families.
"The focus however," said Paul Sneed Jr., HRS Dist. 7 administrator, "will be on reducing the

Child abuse at a glance

Child abuse is a serious problem, law enforcement officials say.
"Even if there is only one case of it, it's a serious problem," said Cmdr. Dennis Williams of the Sanford Police Department. Williams did not have any specific figures on child abuse in Sanford, though he said more often than not the calls tend to be referred to the Department of Health and Human Services (HRS) to be investigated before charges could be considered. Often, charges are found to be unwarranted, he said.
Williams suggested that if abuse, neglect or exploitation is suspected, you should call either the local police department, the Seminole County Sheriff's office or the HRS Abuse Registry.

Road work OK'd, grants approved

Commissioners more isolated

SANFORD — County and city commissioners are in deeper isolation from the public — and now their own staff — in zoning matters.
A 1991 chill placed on conversations between elected officials and participants in "quasi-judicial" matters has been expanded to include conversations with government staff. The subjects covered now clearly include zoning matters, according to an August opinion by Attorney General Bob Butterworth.
Butterworth wrote courts have ruled such conversations before a meeting carries a presumption of prejudice. Elected officials must prove they were not influenced by the conversation. **See Isolate, Page 5A**

Woman fights City Hall over sewage woes

SANFORD — One Sanford woman is taking on the city in an effort to help her mother.
Dolores Burnette is trying to get the city to pay for damages to her mother's home at 2533 El Capitan Drive, which Burnette says has been "flooded by sewage from city drainage lines."
Burnette had submitted documents regarding the plight of her mother, and had requested to address the city commission Monday night. City Manager Bill Simmons says he has been working with the home owner, Mrs. Jordan, and her daughter (Burnette) since August.
During the city commission meeting, Burnette explained that sewer water has been the problem since a heavy rainstorm on July 30th. She told the commission how the house is at the end of the street, and at the end of the sewer line. "Every time we have heavy rains," she said, "my mother can't even flush her toilet without it backing up."
She observed, "My mother is living in a home that smells like, ... how should I word it, ... human excrement."

Air show features fastest truck

SANFORD - While the world-famous U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds and Red Baron Stearman Squadron will be among the featured acts performing at the upcoming air show in Sanford, on-the-ground activities will also see an unusual performance.

The Octane Boost Shockwave Jet Truck will be making runs during the air show. It is listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the world's fastest truck, being clocked at 376 miles per hour.

Speeds are said to have set records for 286 miles per hour in the quarter mile, and 376 in the standing mile.

The vehicle is owned and operated by Leo and Donna Shockley. Leo drives and Donna is responsible for starting the three jet engines with a special power unit.

Leo Shockley has over 30 years experience in the motorsports industry, and has set hundreds of records in route to three national championships.

The couple have been married for 31 years, and have three children and five grandchildren.

The truck is powered by three Pratt & Whitney J 34-48 Navy T3 aircraft engines, which produce 36,000 horsepower. It weighs 7,000 pounds, and requires four 16-foot parachutes to stop the vehicle once it is moving.

The vehicle is valued at a half million dollars.



The Guinness Book of Records lists this Octane Boost Shockwave Jet Truck as the world's fastest. The speed was clocked at 376 miles per hour. The vehicle will be in Sanford Oct. 29 and 30, during Air Show Orlando, at the Central Florida Regional Airport.

According to information about the truck, it has enough power to accelerate vertically at almost 3-G's, (three times the force of gravity) nearly four times the power to weight ratio of the F-14 Tomcat Jet used in

the movie "Top Gun."

The air show is sponsored by the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. Gates of the Central Florida Regional Airport will open at 9 a.m. each of the two days, Oct. 29 and 30. Tickets are \$9 in advance for

adults or \$12 at the gate. For children, they are \$5 in advance or \$7 at the gate. Children under seven are admitted free with a paid adult. Parking is \$2. Advance tickets are available at Ticketmaster.

Forecast: Inflation to get worse next year

WASHINGTON - Everyone, including the Clinton administration, is forecasting that inflation will get worse next year. But there is a big dispute over just how much worse.

Every whiff of inflation lately has sent financial markets reeling out of fears that the Federal Reserve will be prompted to boost interest rates again.

But the administration officials argue that markets are overreacting. They insist that economic growth has slowed considerably and with that slower growth will come an easing of inflationary pressures.

But many private economists believe the jury is still out on whether the central bank's five rate increases so far this year have been enough to slow the economy to a more sustainable pace.

These analysts believe the Fed is poised to jack up rates again at any further sign of inflationary pressures.

Because of those expectations, analysts were eagerly watching for the government's release today of its report on inflationary pressures at the wholesale level, the Producer Price Index, and Friday's release of the Consumer Price Index.

If the numbers are bad enough, many analysts believe the Fed will move immediately to tighten credit further in an effort to slow the economy's momentum.

Last month, the government reported that the PPI jumped 0.6 percent in August, its worst performance in nearly four years. Higher prices for gasoline, food, automobiles and tobacco all contributed to the big jump.

But in advance of today's report, analysts were looking for a much better September figure of around 0.1 percent, with lower energy prices contributing much of the improvement.

However, some economists are worried that the core rate of inflation - which excludes the volatile energy and food indexes - could show a jump of 0.4 percent or more, reflecting rising commodity prices in a variety of areas from steel to chemicals.

Economists worried about inflation point to rising commodity prices to support their belief that inflation is worsening.

"You are beginning to see the early signs of a worsening of inflation," said Robert Dederick, chief economist at Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

He forecast that overall consumer prices, which so far this year have been rising at a modest annual rate of 2.9 percent, could jump by 3.7 percent next year.

The administration forecasts consumer prices to rise 3.2 percent next year, only a slightly faster pace than this year.

"Based on all the evidence coming out, we are still comfortable with our forecast," Laura Tyson, the president's chief economist, told reporters last week.

The administration insists that while commodity prices have been rising more rapidly, reflecting stronger demand, wage pressures, which account for two-thirds of the CPI, have remained extremely docile.

Private economists are split between Dederick's concerns that inflation is beginning to accelerate and the administration's belief that price pressures are remaining contained.

Sung Won Sohn, chief economist at Norwest Corp. in Minneapolis, said he was looking for only a modest rise in inflation next year in line with the administration's expectations.

But even Sohn said he expected the Fed will raise rates one more time this year, probably at its regularly scheduled meeting of policy-makers on Nov. 15.

In December of 1982, Beckner ran for election to the Sanford

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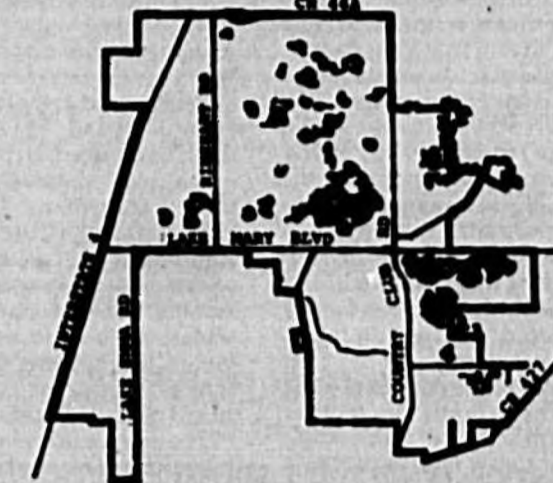

Winning streak struck

Silver Hawks serve up first defeat for Rams

WINTER PARK — Before the season started, Lake Mary High School boys' volleyball coach Bill Whalen was wary of the Rams' date at Lake Howell on Oct. 12.
 And after the Rams, riding a school-record 22-match win streak, won Wednesday's first game of the best-of-three set from the Silver Hawks, Whalen knew his team was really in trouble.
 They were.
 Lake Howell bounced back from the first-game loss and rallied for a 6-15, 15-11, 15-13 win, handing Lake Mary its first loss of the season and pulling into a tie atop the Seminole Athletic Conference standings.
 "I've said before that sometimes it's not good to beat a good team easily in the first game, especially on their floor," said Whalen. "Tonight, it came back to haunt us."
 "We just didn't pass the ball well tonight. And you can't run your offense when you can't pass the ball. That's not to take anything away from Lake Howell. They played extremely well tonight. They blocked us well."
 As the scores suggest, the match was another installment in the intense and closely-contested rivalry that the Silver Hawks and Rams have developed since Seminole County schools started playing boys' volleyball.
 "It was a typical Lake Mary-Lake Howell match," said Whalen. "Both

teams went at it extremely hard. Whenever we play Lake Howell, we know we're in for a dogfight."
 "That's why it was so important to beat them at our place earlier in the season. I didn't want to have to come in here needing a win just to get a share of the conference championship. Now, unless one of us loses one of last two conference matches, we're going to be co-champions."

SANFORD — Challenged by their coach in practice the day before, the Seminole High School boys' volleyball team took it out on Flagler-Palm Coast and Ovideo Wednesday night.
