

Stopping child abuse

New system of investigation is family-friendly

By MOR PPRIPANT Horald Staff Writer

SANPORD — Residents of Seminole County will soon have a new way to strengthen and preserve families threatened by child abuse and neglect.

The Family Services Response System, (FSRS) has been approved by the community advisory council for District 7 of the Department of Health and Human Services Board.

The district encompasses not only Seminole County, but Orange Research and Opening as well.

The district encompanies not only Seminole County, but Orange, Brevard and Oscoola as well.

According to Stuart Doyle, spokesman with HRS. "This past year, we investigated approximately 14,000 cases in the four county area, with about half of them only in Orange County, leaving the rest in the three-county area."

leaving the rest in the three-county area."
"But this new system will be especially important to Seminole County with the rapid growth it has had in population." he added.

"With that, we expect more cases and more reports of abuse and neglect."

"Under this PSRS." he continued, "Our investigations will be more family-friendly, and less cumbersome, allowing us more time to devote to the really serious cases."

He said it also offers a compendium of reality available services designed to help families solve immediate and long-term problems. "Families from Midway to Heathrow, in other words, regardless of income or location, will be able to decide on what services they may want."

In addition to winning board consent, the PSRS received a stamp of approval from HRS Secretary Jim Towey, which means that the District 7 can begin implementing the plan as soon as possible.

The PSRS, which will not receive new funding, will rely on existing services in the district to help families work out their problems and remain intact.

Doyle said it was developed to create a more productive way of protecting children and the self-esteem of their families during the investiga-

The objective is to allow HRS to respond to particular reports of child abuse or neglect by providing, when appropriate, specialized services



SANFORD - One Sanford woman is taking on the city in an effort to help her mother.

Dolores Burnette is trying to get the city to pay for damages to her mother's home at 2533 El Capitan Drive, which Burnette says has been

"flooded by sewage from city drainage lines." Burnette had submitted documents regarding the plight of her mother, and had requested to address the city commission Monday night. City Manager Bill Simmons says he has been working with the home owner, Mrs. Jordan, and her daughter (Burnette) since August.

During the city commission meeting. Burnette explained that sewer water has been the problem since a heavy rainstorm on July 30th. She told the commission how the house is at the end of the street, and at the end of the sewer line. "Every time we have heavy rains," she said, "my mother can't even flush her toilet without it backing up." She observed, "My mother is living in a home that smells like, ... how should I word it,human excrement."

TALLAHABBEE - Ice-cream sandwiches, cones and sundae cups made by a Minnesota company and sold mostly from ice cream trucks have been recalled due to possible salmonella

No illnesses have been reported in Florida, but Schwan's ice cream is distributed from warehouses in Jacksonville, Clearwater, Taliahassee, Pensacola, Lakeland, Sanford, Punta Gorda, Lake City and San Antonio.

The state Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services said Wednesday it is contacting all Florida distributors to make sure they follow the federal recall order.

Schwan's Sales Enterprises of Marshall, Minn., in working with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to recall products that came under suspicion after reports of illneases in

The recalled products include ice cream, yogurt and sherbets as well as individual ice cream servings. The Florida distributors handle products for ice cream trucks.

Common symptoms of salmonella poisoning include nausea. vomiting, cramps, diarrhea, fever and headache.

Russian tourist attacked, robbed

MIAMI — A Russian teen-ager who came here to learn English and knew only a few phrases had been in town one day when a smiling passerby approached him and asked, "Are you a tourist?"

"Yes, I am a tourist." Denitri Bondarenko, 17, replied, proud that he could answer with a complete sentence.

The passerby, on a bicycle, disappeared and returned in less than a minute with three other men. They offered Bondarenko little white pills he suspected were narcotics. When he shook his head no, he says he was struck from Behind, knocked almost unconscious and robbed of about \$1,000 Monday in the trendy Coconut Grove section of Miami.

He had won a scholarship for Regent Language Training USA by correctly answering questions about American history and culture, said Cliff Brazier, the school's president.

Orange jail investigates robberies

ORLANDO — In a three-year period, prisoners at the Orange County Jail were robbed of \$63,000 in cash and property turned over for infekeeping while they were behind bars. authorities said.

Jail employees are suspected of being the culprits, but there is not enough evidence to arrest anyone, authorities said. The cash, jewelry and clothing disappeared during the last

Orange County Comptroller Martha Haynie released an audit this week involving one fund from which \$25,000 appe was stolen. Jail officials admitted that as much as \$38,000 had

been stolen earlier. New managers and accounting controls all but ended the thefts earlier this year, jail chief Tom Allison said Tuesday. A certified public accountant from Haynie's office has been added to the all to oversee inmate accounts.

The jail reimbursed inmates for any stolen cash. Inmates who could prove the value of their lost jewelry and clothes were paid in full. Many could not, though, and were offered settlements of substantially smaller amounts than they claimed were due.

pilots' licenses to unqualified buyers.

Edward Anderson McCorvey, 59, was one of five men accused in what the government said was a five-year conspiracy to sell flight certifications for thousands of dollars. Prosecutors say the group put ill-trained pilots into South

Under a piea agreement, the now-retired FAA Atlanta employee pleaded guilty Wednesday to a count of conspiracy to defraud the United States and to a count of issuing false certificates that he'd given a check ride - similar to the trip a licensing officer takes with a prospective automobile driver.

Also accused were Sixto Arango of Miami; Ernesto Arancibia, a Peruvian national who lives in Miami; Santiago Elies of Miami, and Gregory Coogle of Sunriae, a records clerk in the Hialeah Police Department.

Big crop estimate means tougher times for growers

TALLAHASSEE - Florida citrue growers will be facing the same squeeze as their tasty produce in the coming season.

Crop estimates released Wednesday by the U.S. Department of Agriculture put Florida's orange production at 196 million boxes for the 1994-95 harvest, the second biggest crop in state history and up from 174 million

boxes last season. "Growers are having to save money in their processing and on the production side of the business," said Bobby F. McKown of Florida Citrus Mutual in Lakeland. "Many are looking at their herbicide costs

and number of applications. along with other factors' Total U.S. orange production from Florida, California, Texas and Arizona is forecast at 264 million boxes this season, up 10 percent from last season.

meaning growers have to move plenty of fruit if they want to make money. "We've been very aggressive starting really about last March," said state Citrus Department executive director Dan Santangelo, pointing to rising tionwide. Numbers compiled by

consumption was up 2 percent in a year.

Growers watched juice futures take a dive with the release of Wednesday's report, and recent wet weather is not helping. "The ground is basically satu-

rated statewide," McKown said. "It's delayed harvesting for the past two weeks. There's more decay when you have these kinds of conditions, and we're seeing more heavy drops." Grapefruit production also is

predicted to be up this season. going to 55.5 million boxes from the 51.05 million last sesson. Florida's huge production

numbers are an outgrowth of killer freezes in the 1980s, which pushed many growers south with new plantings. A record 82 million orange

trees are growing in Florida. But 20 million are not yet producing. indicating even bigger harvests down the road.

The next crop estimate is due in December, and growers hope wet weather and other factors will shrink the figure.





Forecast: Inflation to get worse next year

WASHINGTON - Everyone. including the Clinton administration, is forecasting that inflation will get worse next year. But there is a big dispute over just how much worse.

Every whiff of inflation lately has sent financial markets reeling out of fears that the Federal Reserve will be prompted to boost interest rates again. But the administration officials argue that markets are over-

reacting. They insist that economic growth has slowed considerably and with that slower growth will come an easing of inflationary pressures.

But many private economists believe the jury is still out on whether the central bank's five rate increases so far this year have been enough to slow the economy to a more sustainable

These analysts believe the Fed is poised to jack up rates again at any further sign of inflationary pressures.

Because of those expectations, analysts were eagerly watching for the government's release today of its report on inflationary pressures at the wholesale level, the Producer Price Index, and Friday's release of the Consumer Price Index.

If the numbers are bad enough, many analysis believe the Fed will move immediately to tighten credit further in an effort to slow the economy's momentum.

Last month, the government reported that the PPI jumped 0.6 percent in August, its worst performance in nearly four years. Higher prices for gasoline, food, automobiles and tobacco all contributed to the big jump. But in advance of today's

report, analysts were looking for a much better September figure of around 0.1 percent, with lower energy prices contributing meeting of policy-makers on much of the improvement.

— could show a jump of 0.4
percent or more, reflecting rising commodity prices in a variety of areas from steel to chemicals.

flation point to rising commodity prices to support their belief that inflation is worsening

"You are beginning to see the early signs of a worsening of inflation." said Robert Descrick, chief economist at Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

He forecast that overall consumer prices, which so far this year have been rising at a modest annual rate of 2.9 percent, could jump by 3.7 percent next year.

The administration forecasts consumer prices to rise 3.2 percent next year, only a slightly faster pace than this year.

"Based on all the evidence coming out, we are still comfortable with our forecast," Laura Tyson, the president's chief economist, told reporters last

The administration insists that while commodity prices have been rising more rapidly, reflecting stronger demand, wage pressures, which account for two-thirds of the CPI, have

remained extremely docile. Private economists are split between Dederick's concerns that inflation is beginning to accelerate and the administration's belief that price pressures are remaining contained.

Beckner said he will pass the gavel to Joy Brewer, lodge vice president. According to the organization's by-laws, she will automatically become president.





Lottery makes you wonder

A recent Associated Press report out of Tampa says, "Unless lawmakers change the Tampa says, "Unless lawmakers change the way they collect money for school construction, classroom overcrowding will be a chronic headache in Florida, educators say."

It makes you wonder.

The first thing which may cross your mind is the Florida Lottery. When it was started several years ago, the big boon to all was the fact that a large percentage of the money was to go to Florida schools.

We note that nowhere did it say that the percentage was to go "directly" to schools. rather it was worded in such a way as to show Intent, but not assurance.

The lottery is selling in record numbers. Statistics released over this past weekend say Floridians spend more, per individual, on the state lottery than do residents of any other

It makes you wonder. When many millions of dollars are put into the lottery, one would expect to see some of those millions going to our school system. However, lottery officials and lawmakers tell us not to worry. They say the money is indeed going to schools. There are others who

We see several needs. First of all, the entire lottery operation needs to be examined to be certain the money is distributed as originally

Secondly, we suggest another study to determine whether expenses connected with the actual lottery operation are within expectations, or are dollars being used in a fashion that might be trimmed.

Third, and possibly not as acceptable to some, we suffest the lottery eliminate roll-overs. If the lottery is not won each week, the money should go directly and entirely toward schools and the lottery started from the beginning for the following week.

Let's look at the basics. The lottery was approved as a method of helping obtain money to improve our schools. It was not meant as a get-rich-quick scheme for one or two individuals each week.

The Florida Legislature is now borrowing money to help pay for school overcrowding. With our state's rapid growth, it amounts to taking or borrowing money, which will need to be repaid, one way or another. How?

Before the legislature begins to look at tax increases we urge a study be made on how incoming finances such as the lottery are being used right now.

Frustrated by city

Monday, Oct. 10 at your city commissioner's meeting I represented my 83-year-old widowed mother, Me. Wilminia Jordan, residing at 2533 El Capitan Dr., Sanford, Florida, relating to a recent newer overflow into her home

Fcame away from this meeting feeling sorry for the citizens that live in this town. I came away with an impression that it is time that new commissioners are voted in and that your mayor be replaced as soon as possible. It would be to your advantage to replace the city manager, Mr. Simmons, as well.

As I tried to explain the reasons for my being at this meeting and to furnish documents to try to illuminate the minds of your commissioners and the mayor, Bettye Smith, this was an impossibility. You cannot absorb information when you refuse to hear it. I was cut off and not allowed to continue speaking, therefore, my mother did not get treated like a first class citizen but like a third class citizen.

I had with me at this meeting a witness to the sewer flooding of my mother's home. My mother was present at this meeting to tell what happened and so was my sister, who is partially owner of the home. I was not allowed to bring this up for being stienced by the mayor.

To avoid having to pay the damages to my mother's home, the city manager alluded to the flooding of this home being by rain water and not newer water. We acknowledge that we knew we had flooding on the property and this had been a problem for several years. In fact the water problem has existed on this property for approximately 11 years now and it is our opinion that the city allowed the builder to build this house on low ground and did not see that the house was constructed high enough off the

ground to eliminate the possibility of flooding. The city does not properly maintain their own culverta in the front of the home and they are at this writing full of grass and weeds and water will not properly flow through them which causes the front yard to flood. There is an improper water flow from the road because most of the time when it rains the water in the road at the front of the house holds at ankle deep for several days. The road is not scraped regularly and this contributes to flooding.

Recently, in fact, on Oct. 4, the day before the Florida State Environmental Department went to the city on Oct. 5, to discuss the water problem the city came to scrape the roads. This is the first time in the 11 years that my mother has lived there that I have ever seen this done. Guess we will have to call them more often.

The problem was not the flooding of rain water that has damaged the home but from commodes overflowing at such a speed that the water rushed out of the baths into the hallway which is in the middle of the home. We contend that there was no check valve at the city lines. We have pictures of a new check valve that had been installed by the city but we were not allowed to show them, incidentally, the city cut off old pipe to install the new valve and failed to take it with them. To this meeting we brought carpet that had been flooded with water from the bathrooms and this was refused to be allowed to be viewed and none of the commissioners asked to see pictures or view carpet which leads us to believe minds were made up before the meeting began. We were told by the mayor that they (she particularly I feel) had heard all they wanted to hear.

The mayor advised us that the city of Sanford had insurance coverage and we could present the claim for payment to them. I tried to explain that we had approached the insurance company and they said they would not pay the claim because of the city of Sanford, namely Mr. Simmons. Mr. Moore of the utility department reports advised them not to pay the claim. Yet this mayor, could not respond except to continue saying, see their insurance company representative, knowing full well what the results would be.

Take care, residents of Sanford, today it's my mother's home that was flooded by the lack of a check valve at the city sewer lines, tomorrow it could be your mother's problem, then you will be in the same boat. For the response you get when you file an insurance claim against the city's insurance will mostly likely be the same as ours. The city says see their insurance company; they determine liability by the information and evidence provided. The city's insurance company. The League of Cities Insurance Company, advises per Anita Wysong. Claims Department, that they cannot pay this claim because the city says no. They make a decision based upon city of Sanford's reports and refuse to investigate further and state that the reason they are not going to pay the claim is that the city refuses to accept liability. Proverbial run-around is what this is called.

Save our sealite

Nine former members of the Florida Marine Fisheries Commission have endorsed the Save Our Scalife constitutional amendment that will appear on the ballot in November as Amend-

All of us wish that an agreement on a statewide basis had been reached, but after many years of trying, it became obvious that the only hope to protect our dwindling marine resources was this type of action supported by the people of Florida. The past chairman of the MFC, Dr. Tom

Fraser, a noted marine biologist and I, as past vice chairman, announced our support for Amendment 3 after commercial groups were able to block proposals to slow the overflahing of mullet and the accidental killing of endangered green sea turties.

The acute problems we are having with our Florida marine resources are not unique to us but are occurring all over the world. A United Nations agency warned that four major fisheries of the world have been completely depleted and nine more are in serous decline. In the United States, 67 different species are classified as dangerously overfished, with fish being taken faster than they can reproduce.

The Save Our Sealife amendment is not an effort by recreational flahermen to do away with what has been a way of life for many commercial flahermen for generations, but to try and save what is left of the dwindling marine resources in Florida. More and more controls will have to be placed on the harvest of our marine resources in the years ahead.

I urge you to support Amendment 3 in November. It must succeed.




This places so darn many parents into that horrible "damned if we do and damned if we don't" position that many of them have adopted a "damned if we will" attitude,

Snead says what won't change under the FSRS however, is the reporting system of alleged abuse and neglect cases. As Aristide prepares to return to Haiti as Saturday after three years in exile, his masters of peace and reconciliation and his plans for rebuilding his impoverabled nation have lessened the Clinton administration's concerns.

Still, divergent opinions shout the populat Roman Catholic priest-turned-politician color U.S. predictions about how he will handle his revived presidency.

To discuss Aristide in Washington is to invite a portrait of two very different men: the one as intellectual cleric devoted only to improving the lot of Haiti's poor; the other a demagague who harbors contempt for the United States and democratic institutions. institutions.

Women make their presence felt

WASHINGTON — Women in the House and Senate say they made their presence felt more than ever this year, pushing through a range of legislation from new programs to fight domestic violence to increased funding for breast cancer

With 48 women in the House — including District of Columbia Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton — and seven in the Senate, they now make a difference when they vote together, and their presence is increasingly felt on key committees, too.

The 103rd Congress passed 66 measures of particular importance to women, according to the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues — from big-ticket items such as the \$1.6 billion Violence Against Women Act to more stringent regulations on child support.

"While the numbers of measures passed in this Congress is historic and impressive, the other story is the one behind the

numbers: the cooperation between congresswomen, their persistence in working to bring legislation important to women to the House and Senate floors, and their political savvy in making this a record-setting Congress," said Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., elected in 1972 and the senior female member of the House.



Cedras files to exile in Panama

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti - Former dictator Raoul Cedras flew to exile in Panama today, clearing Haiti's way to democracy and the long-awaited return of the nation's elected

President Jean-Bertrand Aristide plans a triumphant return Saturday, three years after he was ousted in a September 1991 coup that brought Cedras to power and caused crushing economic sanctions to be imposed on the impoverished

Cedras, a participant in Aristide's bloody overthrow, was flown into exile with the help of American soldiers he once pledged to battle to the death. His departure — taken in the middle of the night to discourage jeering crowds — broke another of his vows: that to remain in his homeland.

A convoy of U.S. Humvees carried Cedras and his family on his hillside mansion to the airport at 1:45 a.m. today. Then the man feared by thousands of Haitians walked across the darkened tarmac holding his wife's hand, accompanied by his three children.

Fears of new war subside

KUWAIT - Fears of a new Gulf War subsided after Iraqi troops retreated from provocative positions near the Kuwaiti border, but the United States still pressed for measures to deter Saddam Hussein from instigating future crises.

Despite the apparent Iraqi withdrawal, thousands of U.S. troops continued to stream into the Gulf region as insurance and six Gulf countries committed their own troops to the allied

The United States suggested limiting Iraqi troops and heavy equipment near the Kuwaiti border on Wednesday, after backing down from a more ambitious proposal to bar all Iraqi

forces from southern Iraq.

Defense Secretary William Perry was expected to pursue discussions on the proposal when he arrived in the region

Arafat puts police on high alert

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip - With Israel demanding the return of a soldier held hostage by Islamic militants, Yasser Arafat put his police on high alert and braced for a possible clash with fundamentalists opposed to the peace process.

The PLO leader, facing the worst crisis in five months of

Palestinian autonomy, sought in vain Wednesday for help from political leaders of the Hamas fundamentalist movement, then convened his top security lieutenants for a midnight session. Afterwards, spokesman Marwan Kanafani said early today

that Arafat "decided on new measures to implement law and Arafat ordered a widespread crackdown on Hamas support-

Cease-fire called

BELFAST. Northern Ireland - In an announcement unimaginable only a few months ago, pro-British Protestant paramilitaries declared a cease-fire today, six weeks after the Irish Republican Army called a similar truce.

The move is expected to pave the way for round-table talks on the future of Northern Ireland.

The Combined Loyalist Military Command announced it will "universally cease all operational hostilities" beginning at midnight tonight.

The command is an umbrella organization for the two main paramilitary groups committed to keeping Northern Ireland linked to Britain - the Ulster Defense Association and the Ulster Volunteer Force.

The pro-British "loyalists" are responsible for more than a quarter of killings in Northern Ireland's 25 years of bloodshed. Only recently they were predicting civil war.

Happily marching to the bank

LEIPZIG, Germany - Uwe Gies marched in anger against the Communists five years ago. Now he happily marches to the

The Leipzig native runs an engineering firm that is helping reconstruct eastern Germany.

Western investors pay Gies to draw up blueprints for renovating old buildings and putting up new ones. He and his 45 employees did \$3.2 million worth of business last year.

When he was among pro-democracy demonstrators who helped topple the East German Communists in 1989, Gies had no idea he would become a successful capitalist. He was a

26-year-old student at the time. Gies says he's going to vote for Chancellor Helmut Kohl's party in the Oct. 16 federal election because he sees Kohl's Christian Democrats as the best guarantee of prosperity.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — For four years. the Nobel literature prize has gone to writers for away from Sweden. This year, bets are on the prize coming back to Europe.

Authors from Belgium, Portugal, Estanta, Hungary and Ireland are among those mentioned most often as top candidates for the \$855,000 prise, which is being an-

Steeped in secrecy, the 15 sitting members of the Swedish Academy's literature committee pick the winner each year from a running stockpile of names, which they modify perennially.

Longtime observers in Sweden, including literary critics and professors, say the safest let may be no bet. Still, some say the time may have come to honor a European again.

"Europe Stands in Line for Literature Prise," said a benefities Wednesday in the respected daily, Dagens Nyheter. The last European winner was Camillo Jose Cela

from Spain in 1989, and before that Frenchman Claude Simon in 1986.

Last year's winner was Toni Morrison from the United States. She was preceded by West Indian poet Derek Walcott of St. Lucis. Nadise Gordiner of South Africa in 1991, and Mexican Octavio Paz in 1990.

Names mentioned this year include Estonian novelest Jaan Kress, Beigian poet-playwright Hugo Claes, Hungarian author Oyargy Kourad, Irish poet Sesses Heavey and two Portuguese novelists. Jose Saramago and Antonio Lobo Antures.

The project is one link of a \$21 million area road-improvement program centered at Lake Mary Boulevard and Sanford Avenue.

The 140-foot footprint of the road will feature sidewalks on either side and curb and gutter drainage. The short section between County Road 427 and Sanford Avenue will be widened to six lanes to accommodate current traffic levels. The remainder of the road will be designed so it can be easily widened to six lanes when traffic

Currently, an average of 8,900 vehicles use the section each day. That use is expected to increase to 28,500 cars per day by the year 2019.



champions.


