





Arrival of the libraries in Rome ended a two-year quest by scholars from Allied, enemy and neutral nations during and after the war. The books limally were found by American soldiers hidden it castles and salt mines in Austria. One collection of nearly 130,000 irreplaceable volumes, collected over a century, was housed in the German Archeological Institute in Rome. The Institute's library built up by scholars of all nation who came to Rome to study, contained valuable source material boiling with the archeology of ancient Greece and Rome.

The 70,000 other volumes taken by the Nazla were from the Herziana Library, devoted to art his-







Funds Slashed For Interior Department

Unprecedented Cut Is Recommended by House Committee On Appropriations

WASHINGTON, May 7 (A)—The house appropriations committee has recommended an unprecedented slash of nearly 50 per cent in funds for the Interior De; artment, With its re-commendation for the fiscal wear which starts on July 1, the committee demanded

that the department "Place its thouse in order."

The appropriations group did not mention the name of Harold Ickes, who recently quit as head of the integior Department. The representatives criticized what they called inefficiency and gross extravagance in certain agencies. They said that the time had come for the maximum possible

wurtailment of expenditures. The committee also expressed hope that under what it called the dynamic leadership of Secre-tary J. A. Krug, the Interior De-partment would be placed on a more efficient faoting.

The Appropriations Committee recommended \$174,000,000 for the Interior Department, a cut of \$172,000,000 from budget bureau estimates. It's a cut of \$24,000,000 from funds for the current year. The recommendation scheduled for slebate on the
