Lee Mansfield Survived Double Brush With Death

of hell." The Germans never did get into Bastogne proper but they managed to close a pretty tight circle around the town and were trying their best to penetrate it. Bastogne was held by the 101st Airborne Division whose Commander buried the well-known, defiant "Nuts" to the Germans surrender proposals.

"The 4th Armored" continued Mansfield, "had succeeded in opening a road from Luxembourg into Bastogne and we had followed in their tracks. The outskirt of the town were infested with German snipers and tanks, continuously active. It was bitter cold and the turrets and tracks of our vehicles were frozen to the point where we had to use crowbars to pry them loose. It was our second attack of the day, around three o'clock in the afternoon, and our specific mission was to hunt snipers and destroy their hideouts. It was snowing and hazy that day, and visibility was none too good.

"As our tank nosed over a hill, we noticed some enemy activity in a tall tree near a farmhouse. We looked for German tanks but couldn't see any so we closed to a thousand yards and got ready to fire. My gun was loaded and trained on the target and I was just about ready to let loose when, seemingly out of nowhere, a shell came crashing through the side, exploding in our midst and setting fire to the tank. I looked around and noticed that the lieutenant had been hit pretty badly in the leg, the fire had begun to spread so I grabbed him with my right hand and pushed him up through, rolling him over the turret. I immediately tried to follow him but I had been hit in the left femur, knee joint and left arm and the only thing I could manage to do was to clear the hatch from my chest up. I could feel the heat of the flames getting closer and closer, but with only my right elbow to work with I just couldn't get anywhere.

"Let's have a cigarette, Mansfield, I'm getting goosepimples even on my cast."

"By this time," resumed Mansfield, "the snipers began to work on me and I felt like a clay duck in a shooting gallery. Fortunately, their aim was bad and although bullets kept whizzing all around me, I never got hit. I kept trying to squeeze myself through the hatch but I was trapped for good and I knew it. The fire in the tank was getting worse and I had almost given up hope of seeing home again when a second shell tore into the Sherman blowing me right out of the turret. I was still conscious, so I rolled myself off into the snow and waited for help. A few minutes later, the driver and assistant driver who hadn't been hit at all, came up and dragged me to the first aid station."

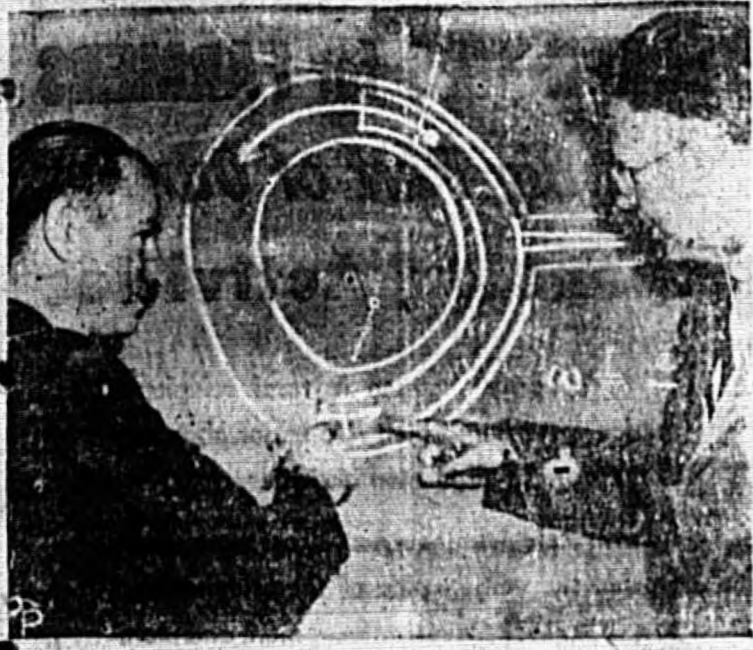

**All Roads Lead
Back To Rome
For Rare Books**

ROME—Eighteen freight cars, manned and guarded by American troops, recently brought back to Rome 7,000 crates containing 200,000 rare and priceless books from two libraries carted off by the Germans.
Arrival of the libraries in Rome ended a two-year quest by scholars from Allied, enemy and neutral nations during and after the war. The books, finally were found by American soldiers hidden in castles and salt mines in Austria.
One collection of nearly 130,000 irreplaceable volumes, collected over a century, was housed in the German Archeological Institute in Rome. The Institute's library, built up by scholars of all nations who came to Rome to study, contained valuable source material dealing with the archeology of ancient Greece and Rome.
The 70,000 other volumes taken by the Nazis were from the Herziana Library, devoted to art history of the Renaissance.

Schantel, Payue Hurl Two Feds Wins Over Daytona Beach.

Ed Vermillion Slated To Twirl Against Gainesville Tonight

Schantel Gives Up Only Two Hits To Islets; Payne Permits Sosh Men Only 7 Bingles; Saints Down Howington In 2-1 Tilt

Shipper Ed Levy's Celery Feds had another .667 percentage for weekend play in the Florida State League which brought the Feds from fourth to third place and a half game lead over the closely trailing Deland Red Hats.

In Friday night's tilt, the Feds were edged out by the Saints in a 2 to 1 battle with Jodie Howington on the hill for the locals. But the Feds came back on Saturday night to top a 3 to 1 decision over the Daytona Beach Islanders when Jim Schantel hand-cuffed the Brooklyn chain gang with two hits.

For their second win over the weekend, Levy's boys slammed out 13 blows yesterday afternoon at City Island Park in Daytona Beach to down the Sosh aggregation by a score of 7 to 3. The Feds handed Art Yacenda his first defeat in five tilts this season.

Howington hurled six hit ball against the Saints while the Feds were collecting eight off the offerings of Gene Smith and Jim Ketcher. However, Sanford was unable to bunch a few hits near enough to each other to produce more than a single marker. The Saints got their two runs in the fourth when Manager Bill Stein-hecke singled to left to score Pawlick and Wosten.

Saturday night's tilt was the feature of the three games. Jim Schantel had the Islanders eating right out of his hand and it was the seventh inning, with two men away, before a single Islet even reached the initial sack.

The only two hits Schantel gave up came in the eighth frame when Lennon tripled to left-center and scored when Duffy singled to right. Meanwhile, Malof displayed a neat performance on the hill for the fifth place Daytona club. He permitted the Feds only five hits, one each in the second, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh frames. Levy scored the Sanford run in the fourth when Langston flied out to center. Lake doubled in the sixth to score Bryant from first and Justice flied in the seventh on Schantel's fielders choice.

Yesterday afternoon, Jim Payne

on the hill and handled the Senators a week ago yesterday. Payne was nicked for seven hits but they were well scattered. Payne was given a good margin by his mates when the Fed tallies were recorded in the initial stanza. Bryant walked and Levy was safe on Duffy's error. Langston doubled to right to score Bryant and Levy and the Fed outfielders crossed the plate or Sharpe's single to short left.

Three more Feds raced home in the second when Zaspel walked and was sacrificed to second. Silverman singled to center and Zaspel scored on Bryant's fielders choice. Levy connected with a three base hit to tally Bryant and scored when Lake singled to right.

The other Sanford marker came in the seventh when Levy doubled and scored on another two bagger by Justice.

Daytona scored single runs in the first, fourth and sixth.

Cutback Order Forces Feds To Release Mayo Langston

Citrone, Pratt Also Dropped By Sanford Squad

Pete McRaney Placed On Suspended List By Local Officials

Manager Ed Levy of the Celery Feds this morning announced that due to the cutback regulation that went into effect following yesterday afternoon's Florida State League tilt, Sanford has released Mayo Langston, an unlimited class player.

For the first 20 days of the season the Feds had been using four class men, Buddy Lake, Langston, Jodie Howington and Manager Levy. Beginning tonight clubs will be permitted to use only three class men.

Other Fed players released due to the cutback from 18 to 15 players included utility man Gene Pratt and outfielder Bob Citrone. Pete McRaney, who has been suffering two severe "charley-horses" since the season's opener, has been placed on the suspended list.

The roster of the Feds now includes infielders Levy, Bob Tuttle, Joe Justice, Al Bryant and Byron Sharpe, outfielders Lake, Dave Bride and Jerry Silverman, catcher Don Zaspel, and pitchers Howington, Ed Vermillion, Cal Blanc, Jim Schantel, Goose Kettle and Jim Payne.

Levy said yesterday afternoon following the Daytona game that in all probability Bride would take over Langston's position in right field until his ankle had healed well enough to resume his speed, and then be transferred to center field. Silverman will then be placed in right field.

Levy said that he was well satisfied with the ability of Silverman and that the St. Petersburg youth had definitely won himself a position on the club. Levy further explained that Justice had been signed to play only for a short time, and that Tuttle would be handed the second base assignment in the near future.

INSIDE SPORTS REPORT

Yesterday afternoon in Daytona Beach we had a long talk with Benny Kahn of the Daytona Beach News-Journal. Kahn recently wrote that he thought, in our own words, Brooklyn was double-crossing the Islanders in that St. Paul had furnished Sanford with five ball players.

To my knowledge, St. Paul only furnished Sanford with one player, Jim Schantel, the pitcher. The other four, Jerry Dvorak (now released), Don Zaspel, Byron Sharpe and Dave Bride all were released outright by St. Paul and signed to Sanford contracts by local officials. And for the information of all concerned, getting these men to remain and play for Sanford was a difficult task.

We promptly pointed out that St. Paul was a homeowned and independent ball club. St. Paul is not a farm club of the Dodgers. We admit they do have a working agreement which is far different than a chain operated organization such as Daytona Beach.

Thus, there is nothing illegal in Schantel playing for Sanford, nor, as we see it, is Daytona Beach being double crossed by the Dodgers.

To present the latest facts in the case, Kahn informed me yesterday that he had talked long-distance with Judge Branham in Durham. Branham is the minor league czar. Kahn reports that Branham said that the deal was strictly legal in every sense.

Now, mind you, Kahn says that the Schantel deal between Sanford and St. Paul is unethical. Unethical in the sense that any club tied up with Brooklyn by a working agreement should not be allowed to farm players that it owns to other clubs.

Does Daytona Beach want Schantel themselves or would they rather see Schantel a free agent? Personally we don't see anything unethical about baseball since it is operated under a strict set of rules and regulations. To our way of thinking there is nothing in organized baseball that can be considered unethical. We feel that if the Sanford-St. Paul deal with Schantel was unethical there would no doubt be some regulations against it.

We talked yesterday afternoon with Ernie Padgett, Daytona Beach official and also the vice-president of the Florida State League. Padgett agreed that he thought the league was now settling down a bit and that good baseball would be displayed from here on. With regards to the Islanders or the Dodgers, Padgett says that he believes the Daytona club will be strengthened considerably when the cutback occurs in the higher class leagues.

We won't fail to respect Kahn for his alertness and there's no doubt that the "little one" is just about the class of sports editor in this league but unethical or not, Schantel is still looking for Sanford and the Islanders are in fifth place.

We'll probably hear more from Daytona Beach on this for Kahn says Judge Branham said he would investigate the ethics of the situation.

Jerry Carter, The Man We All Know

As Florida voters scan their ballots in the May 7 primary, it is safe to say that no name on it will be more familiar to the vast majority than that of Jerry W. Carter, candidate to succeed himself on the Railroad Commission, for Jerry has been getting acquainted in the by-ways of the state for half a century. Floridians first knew Jerry Carter as a salesman, later as a fledgling campaigner for the Democratic party, then as hotel commissioner under three governors and more recently as state railroad commissioner for three terms.

Jerry, who came to Florida as a boy from his native Alabama, received little formal schooling. For it fell his lot to help support a widowed mother. He peddled his way through the panic of 1907 and later became an outstanding salesman for a sewing machine

company and a dry-goods house. These years drew him in contact with the Democratic leaders of Florida and, after the state campaign of 1916, he was appointed hotel commissioner to build up this branch of the state government. In those years, Commissioner Carter helped lay the foundations for the great tourist trade of today, not only by raising hotel standards, but also by establishing out-of-state agencies to interest people in coming to Florida. Under his regime, the sanitary, building, electrical and plumbing codes for hotels were written and put into effect.

Back into private business for six years after 1928, Jerry was one of the pioneers in airconditioning for the South.


The call of public life was strong, and in 1934 a vacancy occurred on the Florida Railroad Commission and Carter was elected. He was made chairman in 1937, and in 1938, and again in 1942, was re-elected in each first primary with large majorities over several opponents. In

1938 he carried 64 out of the 67 counties in the first primary. Jerry Carter has become generally recognized as a good railroad commissioner, who has been consistently on the side of progress and against stifling monopoly. Recently Jerry and Mrs. Carter had 23 present at a dinner reunion of their sons, the wives and children. That is the kind of citizenship he believes in, and the results speak for themselves.
