History Of Sanford

Beginning with this issue of the Herald we are publishing a series of articles on the early days in Sanford taken from a paper prepared in 1910 by Mrs. J. N. Whitner for delivery before the Wednesday Club and called "The Tale of a Mosquito and Annals of Sanford".

This paper began with the earliest known facts pertaining to Florida's history and proceeded through the founding of this city by General Sanford and its early growth and development to about the time of the Big Freeze in 1895, As Mrs. Whitner was a woman of rare intelligence, intimately acquainted with the scenes of which she wrote, and meticulous in her research, there is a note of authenticity about this paper which has given it tremendous value! throughout the years.

Although for a good many years accessible to us and others whose business it was to write about the history of Seminole County, it was only recently that we could prevail upon Mrs. Whitner's daughters to authorize its publication in full. They have generously given their consent now because of their hope that it may encourage other members of ploneer families here to write the stories and legends of those early days for future generations to read,

It is particularly appropriate for this paper to be pub-Ished now because of the growing interest in the General Sanford Memorial Library and Museum where it is hoped to house not only the priceless books, art collection and historical papers of General Sanford, but also many other letters, documents and historical data belonging to pioneer families and pertaining to the early life in Sanford.

We know that our readers, old-timers and new-comers alike, will enjoy these articles by Mrs. Whitner and we appreclate the opportunity to make them public. We hope that others will be inspired to emulate Mrs. Whitner's example and that a whole freasure house of all-but-forgotten lore will come to light.
