Grand jury indicts alleged killer

The Seminole County Grand Jury issued a first-degree premeditated murder indictment today against Derrita Adams, 42, in connection with the May 18 death of Robert G. Rabun, 41, said Assistant State Attorney Pat Whitaker. Adams has been held in the Seminole County jail since her arrest May 21 for grand theft of a motor vehicle, a truck that belonged to Rabun. Seminole County deputies arrested Adams for Rabun's murder on May 23. The truck was discovered missing after a relative found Rabun dead in his home at 735 St. Joseph's Court, Lake Monroe. The jury heard from three witnesses: a Seminole County deputy sheriff, the Volusia County Medical Examiner, and a Seminole County Sheriff's Office crime scene technician.

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Commission offers \$150,000 incentive

SANFORD — Seminole County Commission voted 4-1 Tuesday to award Florida Extruders International, Inc., a \$150,000 incentive package to expand its manufacturing company in Sanford. "We look forward to the expansion," said Seminole County Chairman Daryl McLain. The company, which manufactures extruded aluminum products for outdoor pool enclosures, screened porches and window frames, has been located in Sanford for more than 15 years. The group recently decided to relocate in

order to expand the facility. "We're ecstatic about the Commission ruling," said Stephen Little, director of safety and regulatory compliance at Florida Extruders International, Inc. In order to assist Commission in coming to a decision, the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council presented an analysis of the effects the project would have on Seminole County and the surrounding area. The report took into account the

expansion construction, new employment, additional business, and the direct and indirect impacts of the project. According to the report, the expansion and creation of new jobs will generate \$336 million in additional personal income for Seminole County households throughout the next seven years. However, not all commissioners were in agreement about the benefits of the project. "While I welcome manufacturing compe-

ries into the county, any business can expand, including mine, without negotiating a handout of government funds," said Commissioner Grant Maloy, who owns a foliage nursery in Seminole County and voted against the incentive package. "With all the infrastructure needs the county has, I think it [spending money on incentive packages] becomes a bigger issue as the budget gets tighter. "How can we justify this spending when fundamental items are not being satisfied," he added. Commission did place a stipulation on

Tomorrow's leaders experience American way of life

WINTER PARK — The future lies in the hands of today's youth. To affect tomorrow, one must affect the tomorrow's leaders. That is the philosophy of Bassem Chaaban and the rest of the staff at the World of Knowledge Foundation.

The World of Knowledge Foundation is a nonprofit organization focusing on youth scholarship. The major program of the foundation is called FLEX, which stands for Future Leaders Exchange.

Because of the breakup of the Soviet Union in 1991, there are many newly independent nations with receptive governments. Congressman Bill Bradley wanted to foster friendship between the United States and these nations, so in 1992 he proposed FLEX.

Sponsored by the State Department and evaluated annually in Congress, FLEX allows youth from countries in the former Soviet Union to study in the United States for a school year.

"The purpose of FLEX is essentially to bridge the gap of cultural divide," said Chaaban, the international exchange coordinator for this region.

While here, students must complete thirty hours of community service. They have recently participated in Youth Service Day 2003 and have volunteered with Habitat for Humanity and the Christian Sharing Center.

Approximately fifteen students have been involved in FLEX since its inception in this area. This year, there were three students at Lake Mary High School and one student at each Lyman High School, Lake Brantley High School, and Seminole High School.

A Hungarian student was a kayaker and had tried out for the Olympics but was injured and unable to be on the team. During his stay in the United States, he was placed with a family who owns a kayaking business. A Japanese student stayed with a Lake Mary music teacher and played piano in Arts Alive and sang with Lake Mary's choir in a Disney presentation.

"There are so many other

City accepts Dixon's resignation

SANFORD — Sanford City Commission voted unanimously Monday to accept the terms of Roger Dixon's resignation as the city's interim city manager and deputy city manager.

"I've talked with Roger a couple of times about his resignation," said Commissioner Randy Jones. "I wish him all the best in government work or the private sector. His assets of energy and enthusiasm will serve him well."

Commission agreed to grant Dixon three months severance pay, as requested in his resignation letter, at the higher salary of \$90,000 he was being paid as the interim city manager instead of the \$75,000 he earned as deputy city manager. According to his contract, the city was only obligated to pay him a 90-day salary if the city terminated his employment without cause, not if he resigns. Dixon asked the city to honor that clause even though he resigned.

Dixon's resignation comes amid an allegation that he made sexually-related comments to a subordinate, Paula Frytes-Torres. The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) sent a letter to the city indicating there was "reasonable cause to believe" Frytes-Torres. When the EEOC letter was made public two weeks ago, Dixon had stated he had no intentions of resigning. He said he changed his mind as more attention was focused on the allegation.

"[The sexual harassment complaint] put the city commission in a bad space politically," Dixon said. "It was affecting the way Sanford was viewed by other cities in the county and people who did business with the city."

Dixon said while the allegations were part of his reason for resigning, a larger factor was the change in city leadership. Dixon applied for the vacant city manager position, but did not make the list of eight finalists.

"I realized when I didn't make the short list for city manager that the city was moving in a different direction," Dixon said. "For me to stay on even as deputy city manager would have been a challenge with the new city manager coming in because I'm viewed as being in the [former city manager

CONCERNED IN THOUSAND OAKS, CALIF.

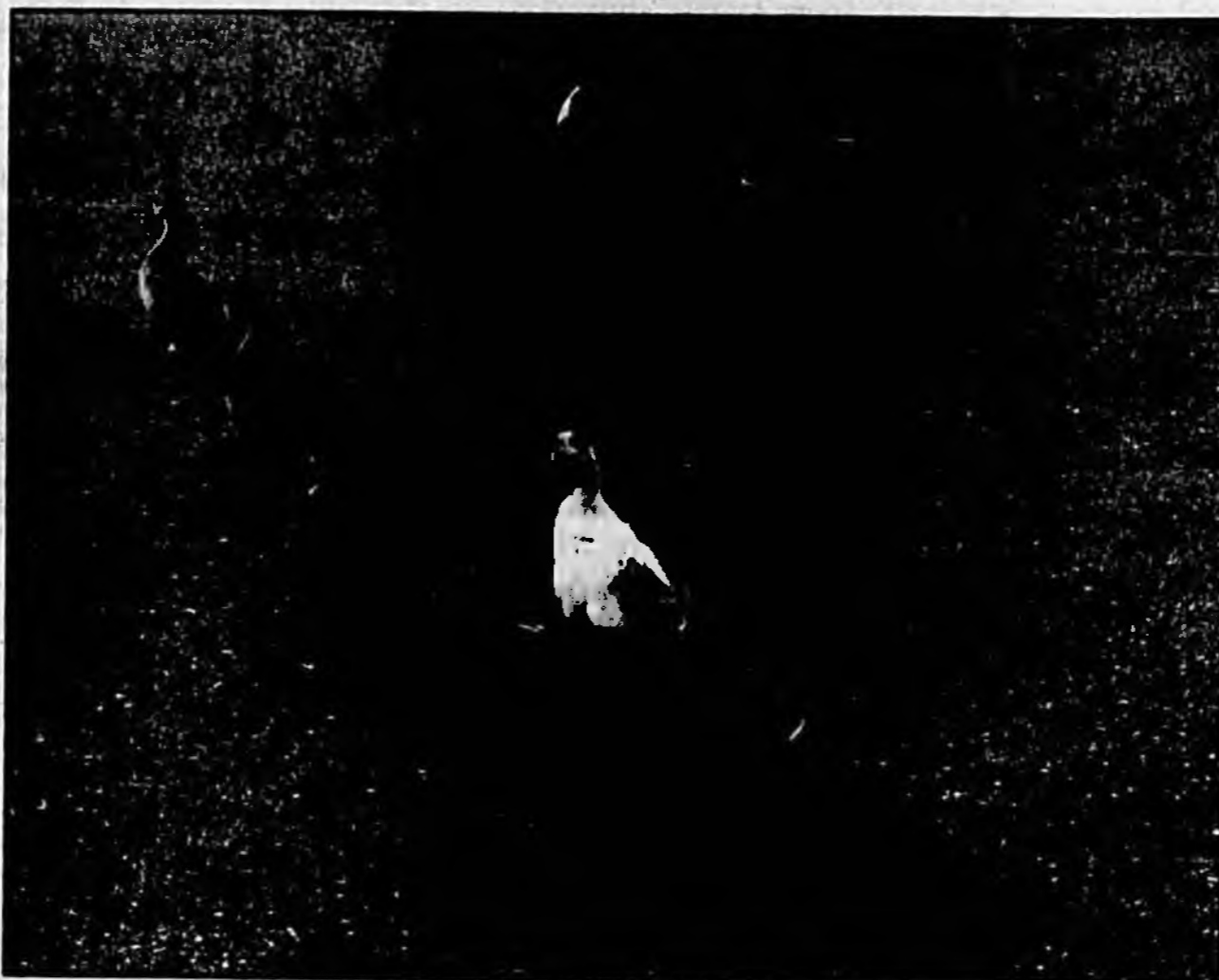

"Trail volunteers are the driving force behind the creation of trails in Florida and the reason why tremendous projects such as this trail bridge are envisioned and made possible," Mica said.

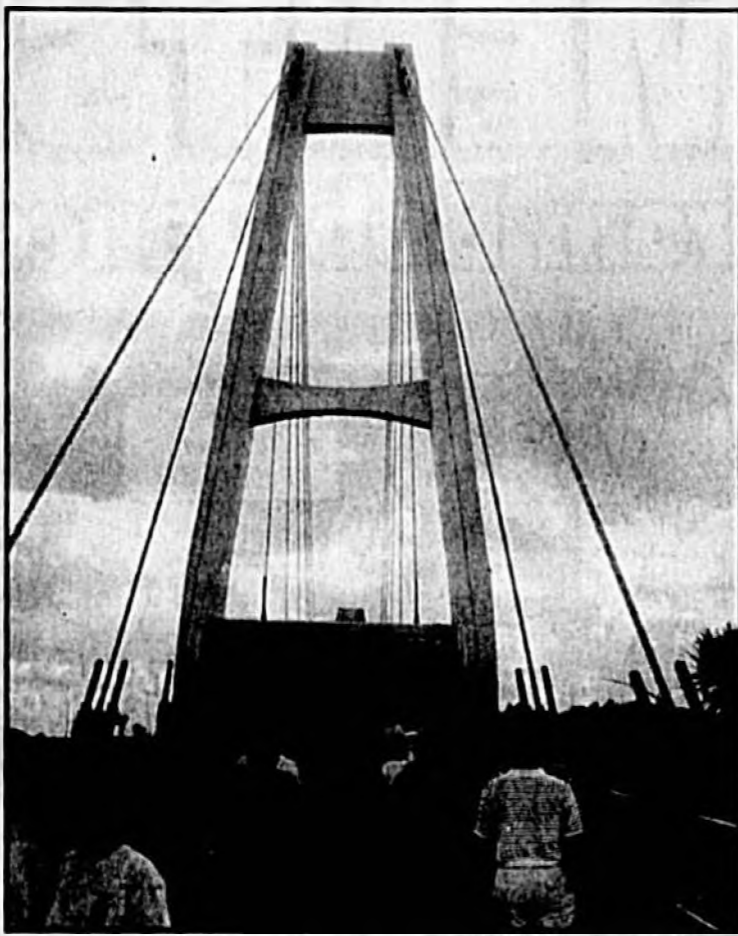
The opening of the overpass demonstrates Seminole government's commitment to its nature trail program, which began in 1998 when the first 4-mile section of the Cross-Seminole Trail was completed. Following a unanimous vote by County Commission in late 2001, construction began on the overpass the following year. At the same time, 7.7 miles of trails were added to the Cross-Seminole Trail Trail.

The I-4 pedestrian overpass was funded through a \$2.5 million federal transportation grant, money from the local Trails Referendum and the Florida Department of Transportation. It is the first trail overpass in Seminole County and is one of the first pedestrian suspension bridges in the southeast.

"This truly is a unique trail bridge for the region and probably America," said Kent Wimmer of the National Trails Association. "I've never seen anything like it before."

The bridge uses a cutting edge cable stay/suspension bridge design technology to cross the interstate, spanning 373 feet of I-4 right-of-way. The design accommodates future interstate widening plans by FDOT and the possibility of a light rail system in the interstate's median.

It also features a switch back ramp that actually runs underneath the overpass, similar to ramps seen at large football sta-

diums. "It is quite a facility," Commission Chairman Daryl McLain said. "I am very proud of it. It's the citizens of Seminole County who made this project possible."

Seminole's Trails Program won't stop now that the bridge is complete. This year, construction will start on an additional 6.3 miles of trails, including a

major highway overpass on State Road 434. In 2004, an additional 8.5 miles of trails are anticipated to start construction, with completion scheduled for 2005. At that time, the entire county will be connected with trails linking Orange County and connections to Oviedo, Winter Springs, Longwood, Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary and Sanford.

the approval. According to the terms of the incentive package, the city of Sanford must follow through with the package it approved in mid-May. The city's package, also worth \$150,000, includes a cash incentive of \$94,510, plus to up \$55,490 in waived permit and review fees.

City commissioners delegated \$39,000 of the funds from the Economic Development Trust during this fiscal year. In order to forego transferring \$60,000 from the General Fund Reserve to accommodate the incentive package, the remaining \$55,510 will be subject to the availability of funds in the coming year.

According to William J. McDermott, director of the Seminole County Economic

Development Office, there should not be a problem with the condition because he believes the city will have the money available in next year's budget. The city, however, is not as confident.

"We don't know at this point if the funds are available," said Kevin L. Smith, city of Sanford finance director. "It's still subject to budget and remains to be seen. I'm sure we will make every effort to make this happen."

According to Smith, a preliminary budget must be presented to city commissioners by July 1, and will be followed by several budget meetings. The city will not know officially if the funds are available until the budget is adopted in November.

When Florida Extruders International, Inc., recently decided to expand, company

executives evaluated sites within Seminole County as well as the rest of the southeast. The group is currently in negotiations for 34.5 acres located at Beardall Avenue and State Road 46 in Sanford.

"We're definitely moving forward with that location," said Little.

According to Little, construction could begin during the first part of 2004, and should be complete within 12 months.

The capital investment by the company for this project is an estimated \$11.5 million, including the land purchase, construction of a 224,000 square foot facility, and the purchase of machinery and equipment. The group plans to hire 155 new employees at an average annual salary of \$26,387.

"As we grow, Seminole County will grow," said Little.

Tony VanDerworp administration. In another circumstance it might have worked because I came here to be part of the city of Sanford, not to be Tony VanDerworp's boy."

Dixon vehemently denies the allegation that he called Freytes-Torres almost daily for two years and made suggestive comments to her.

"The truth will come out," he said, refusing to elaborate. "I don't want to try the case in the newspaper."

Dixon said he is weighing three different job opportunities and intends to stay in Sanford.

"My wife and I both love this city, and this is where we want to be," Dixon said. "I'm going to remain active in the community and be involved with a number of groups."

"Overall, I've had a very positive experience in Sanford," he added. "The city commission has been a pleasure to work for and I hope my future career allows me to work with them again."

With Dixon's resignation leaving a vacancy in the city's top administrative seat immediately following Monday's city commission meeting, Commission appointed Andrew Van Gaale, a project manager in the city's communi-

ty development department, to act as interim city manager until the search for a permanent city manager is complete.

According to Mayor Brady Lessard, this should take approximately 45 days. Still in the running for the job is James P. Coleman of Lady Lake, Danny Crew of Gastonia, N.C., Al Grieshaber, Jr., of Albany, Ga., and James Ross O'Connor of St. Charles, Mo.

"I'm honored by the appointment," said Van Gaale, who applied for the city manager position, but did not make the shortlist of candidates. "I think it's indicative of my commitment to the city over the past eight years. I appreciate the commission's confidence in me."

"It's a step in the right direction for me," he added. "As I had said to Mayor Lessard, I've always been here for the city to fill in, in whatever they needed. This just so happens to fit along with my career goals."

Van Gaale will work closely with the mayor and Commission to balance the budget, which is currently \$1.4 million over budget, before July 1.

"Today [Tuesday] we did

housekeeping, but by the end of the week I will diving into the budget," he said. "We'll be setting up a series of meeting and working diligently on that. I'm confident that between the mayor, commission and myself that we can resolve all the budgetary issues."

Before appointing Van Gaale, Commission entertained the idea of appointing a city department lead as the interim city manager. According to Lessard, this was not a good idea because each department lead is busy running their department and working on the upcoming budget.

"I'm confident Andrew will do an excellent job," said Commissioner Velma Williams. "He was one of the three applicants for the job and received five votes. He only needed one more to make the top 12."

"Because of this, I believe he will be well received by the city employees, the commission and the community," she added.

Lessard adds, "He's not asking for more money, and I will certainly take him up on that. It's nice to see someone stepping up to the plate and showing devotion to the city."

Melillo then led off a two-run fourth inning with a single and later scored the tying run as the Gamecocks took the lead for good.

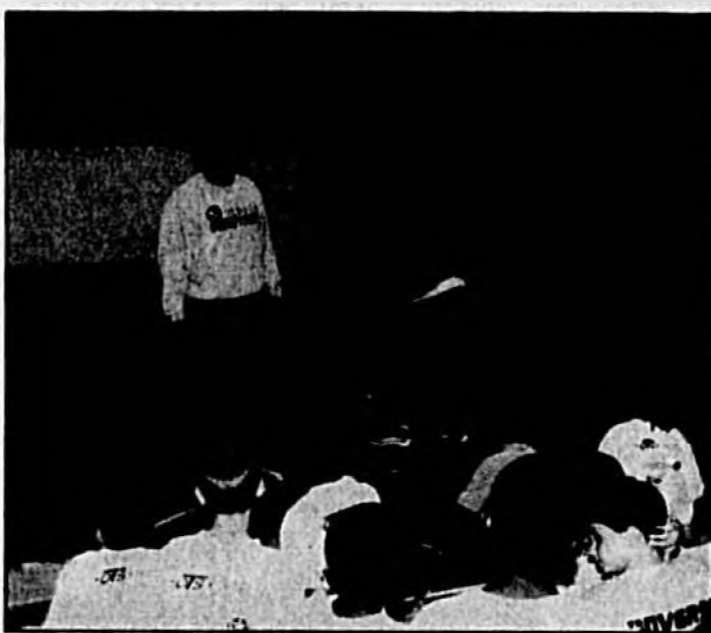
But on Saturday the duo really stood out, combining to go 6-for-10 with a double, four runs scored and an RBI as the hosts crushed UNC, 14-4.

Head coach Courtney Miller had 12 of her 16 players on the roster make either the Mid-Florida Conference All-Academic Team (3.00 or higher GPA / min. 24 hours) or Academic All-State (3.30 or higher / min. 18 hours) and as a team SCC accumulated an overall Grade Point Average of 3.23.

All told, 10 Raiders made both lists with seven being graduates of Seminole Athletic Conference schools.

Locals making both lists were sophomores Stephanie Mathieux (Oviedo) and Melanie Pace (Winter Springs) and freshmen Ashley Bitzer and Carlee Wood (Lake Mary), Megan Miller (Oviedo) and Kristen Schrupp (Winter Springs).

Making the Mid-Florida Conference All-Academic Team was Seminole High School's Mindy Crouse.

Other making both lists were sophomore Leah Holbrook (Boone High School), and freshmen Holly Lacko (Middleburg High School) and Karen Padgett (Clay High School, Green Cove Springs).

Making the Mid-Florida Conference All-Academic Team was sophomore Stacey Spell from Merritt Island and making the Academic All-State Team was sophomore Kiley Sieffert from Colonial High School.

Several of these players were also recently honored by being named to All-Mid-Florida Conference and All-State teams.
