

PADUA, Italy, Dec. 10, (P)—Two British officers and several Italians were injured today in a two-hour riot set off when a British army truck ran into a group of Italian pedestrians. Padua is the site of general headquarters of Britain's central Mediterranean force.

The Italians, estimated in an official announcement to total more than 150, attacked British personnel and tore down a British flag in the mistaken belief that the truck had killed two of their countrymen.

Plane With Marines On Board Is Lost In Rugged Country South Of Seattle

SEATTLE, Dec. 11, (P)—A lying Coast Guardsman has radioed that he has spotted wreckage three and a half miles wreckage three and a half miles from the airport at Toledo, Wash. The wreckage lying near the western fringe of the Cascade Mountains between Seattle and Portland may be the Marine Corps transport which has been missing since yesterday with 32 men aboard. The Coast Guard observer said he could not determine whether anyone was alive. A group of searchers have set out to investigate the report.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11—(P)—There's still no word from the missing military transport plane-lost with 32 persons aboard. The plane was carrying Marines from San Diego to Seattle then it disappeared in rugged northwest coast country. Efforts to find the plans have been seriously ham-pered by continuing bad weather. But the Army and Navy and Forest Rangers are conducting a widespread search.

One clue to the whereabouts of a missing Marine Corps plane has proved to be misleading. Major Carl Ernst, a Portland Army ir Base operations officer, said there is no truth in an earlier report that the ship with 32 men aboard had been sighted south of Toledo, Wash.

JERUSALEM, Dec. 11, (A) The British navy announced to-day that 742 shipwrecked Jewish refugees have been rescued from the Greek island of Syrina. The Jews were marooned on the bar-ren, waterless island last Sunday when thei, immigrant ship was wrecked in a Mediterranean storm. 
