## Kilgore Trounces St. Johns Outfit By 11 To 2 Mark

Florida Power and Light's softball team last night, playing with only eight men, trounced the Osceola Cypress outfit 13 to 6 in a game marked by a pair of home runs, one by Buddy Lake in the third inning and one by Wilson Smith in the fifth frame.

Kilgore trimmed St. Johns 11 to 2 in the nightcap as rain threatened throughout the evening. However, just as the game ended the rain started falling.

Florida Power collected 15 hits off Farris, pitching for Osceola. Hodges and Kinlaw limited Osceola to six hits, Kinlaw relieving Hodges in the fifth and permitting but one hit for three innings.

Osceola scored first in the first inning getting two runs. They added three in the fourth and one in the seventh. Cleo Jeter led the Osceolas with one hit in one official trip to the plate.

### Fishermen Report Big Mullet Catches As Season Opens

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 31.—Florida's greatest mullet season is on, and fishermen on both east and west coasts are reporting bigger and better catches than they have had in many years.

Veteran fishermen attribute the increase in mullet this season to the fact that for the first time the state conservation department enforced the closed season during spawning time last year.

Commenting on the numerous letters and advice he has received from dealers and fishermen stating that as a result of this enforcement there are more mullet than in several years before, R. L. Dowling, state supervisor of the conservation department, said: "These conditions emphasize the true value of closed seasons as a means of protecting fish life, especially when they are properly enforced."

Mullet, described as being "the lamb of the sea" because it is peaceful in its habits and feeds on microscopic plants and animal life of the sea instead of devouring other fish or seafood, is Florida's greatest staple food fish.

Mullet production in Florida exceeds 24 million pounds a year and is the "old reliable" of commercial fishermen in 41 of the 48 counties which touch salt water. Two species are common in Florida waters—the black mullet and the silver mullet. Black mullet is the favorite food of thousands of local residents and visitors, and no fish market is without them in season.

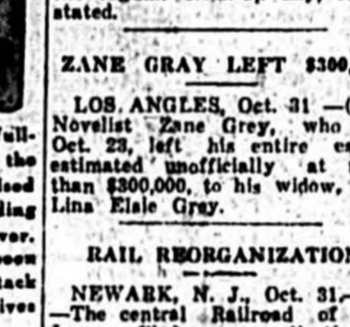
The food content of mullet is of the finest quality and contains more iodine than any other Florida food fish. Its flesh is easily cooked readily digestible, and its price is lower than that asked for any other meat in any of the food stores.

"Mullet should be protected and the supply built up," Supervisor Dowling says. "On the other hand, there should be a determined effort on the part of the industry to so advertise and publicize its fine qualities as a food fish that the demand will be greatly increased."

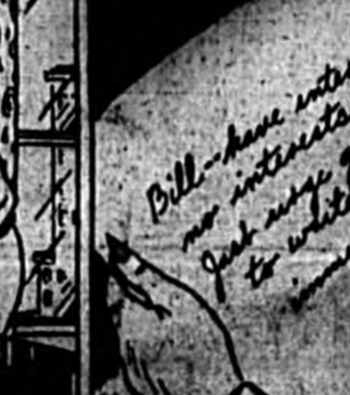

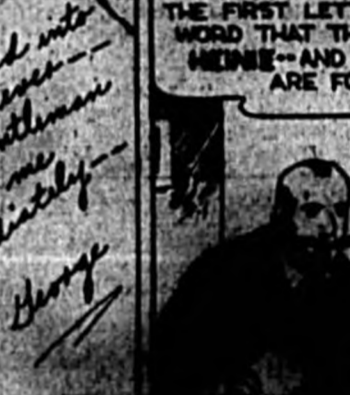

## Nazi U-Boat Sinks Another British Ship

### Crew Is Brought To Port After Unsuccessful Attempt To Tow Vessel

## Egba Evades Sub Attack

### Second English Steamer Is Fired On Near Gibraltar

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Sinking of the 5,317 ton British steamer Bronte was disclosed today with the arrival in England of the crew aboard a rescue vessel.

The crew of 40 and one passenger were rescued by the ship which attempted to tow the crippled Bronte to port after it had been attacked by a submarine. The attempt failed and the Bronte sank.

At Gibraltar it was officially announced that the 4,989 ton British steamer Egba was fired on today by a German submarine but evaded attack. She is bound to arrive in England on voyage undamaged. The attack is said to have occurred about 240 miles east of the Madeira Islands.

German bombers attacked a flotilla of British destroyers in the North sea blockade area yesterday. The British admiralty announced last night that they fought off by anti-aircraft fire before they could do any damage.

It was not known, the admiralty said, whether the destroyers damaged the two bombers, which appeared over the flotilla south of Dogger bank, a sand bank in the center of the North sea between England and Denmark. The attack was in the heart of the blockade area. It was not known whether the Germans had any air raiders on British warships covering the blockade or if the bombers were some that had raided sections of England and Scotland this morning and were driven back over the North sea by British pursuit ships.

## Coast Guard Boat Finds No Trace Of British Freighter

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Coast Guard announced today that the cutter Bibb reached the reported position of the British freighter Osmund but was unable to find any sign of the ship or survivors.

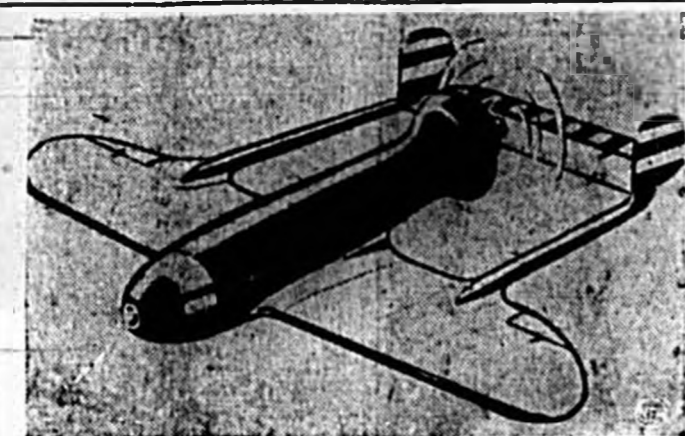
The Bibb, one of the several navy and coast guard vessels which left last night after intercepting a distress call from Osmund, reported it found a moderate southerly gale blowing. The spot was about 600 miles east of Spain.

## Finns Aroused By Soviet Statement On Negotiations U. S. Armaments

HELSINKI, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Angered Finnish leaders early today discussed the possibility of breaking off negotiations with Soviet Russia and recalling a mission now en route to Moscow because of last night's speech by Soviet Premier Molotov.

Molotov's speech, revealing for the first time the extent of Russian demands on Finland, struck here like a bombshell and it was alleged that he had violated an agreement whereby the Finnish mission was to reveal any details of the pending talks.

The cabinet, after a midnight session, informed the Finnish general staff that the situation has become so serious because of Russia's demands for Finnish territory on the Carelian peninsula include Finland's "little Maginot line." The defense line, between the Gulf of Finland and the Gulf of Bothnia, is decisive to Finland's defense in the east.

The government wired the mission en route to Moscow to halt at Viborg on the Soviet-Finnish frontier and communicate with Helsinki for instructions. It was stated here that both countries had agreed that the Russian demands would not be accepted unless Finland had reached Moscow Thursday morning.

Molotov revealed the demands at the time that the mission, headed by Juhani K. Paasikivi, left Helsinki for Moscow with "counter proposals" understood to contain flat rejection of Russia's demand for a naval base on Finland's southern coast.

The cabinet then went into the emergency session which resulted in the order for the mission to stop at Viborg.

## Advocates Of Tropic Storm Arms Repeat Moves North Win Skirmish Across Cuba

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Advocates of repealing the arms embargo won the first skirmish over neutrality legislation in the House yesterday when it rejected the measure.

"Sic 'Em, Adolf"

Foreign Commissar Molotov, in explaining the Soviet's foreign policy in the Kremlin yesterday, said that Russia was determined to try not to spread the war but to stop it and that Russia hoped to be able to maintain its present neutrality, but he added somewhat significantly, "The war is only in its advance stages and has not yet developed but it will spread over Europe and beyond."

Russia wants to do everything it can to stop the war but it is selling armaments and other supplies to Germany with which to carry on the war. Russia wants to remain neutral but Molotov condemns the United States for repealing the arms embargo and getting ready to sell guns and planes to Britain and France.

Germany did not start the war, Molotov insists, Britain and France are the aggressors, he says, because they are persisting in the absolutely defenseless policy of trying to protect their empires. The British are exploiting their colonial possessions and oppressing their working peoples. These colonies should be turned over to Germany where they would get a square deal.

Russia does not intend to interfere with the independence of Finland, Molotov explains. All Russia wants is a little strip of territory along the border, the reduction of all fortifications between Finland and Russia, and the right to send Soviet troops into Finland for the purpose of establishing military and naval bases there.

But in spite of his bitter attack on the democracies and his sweet words for Germany, Molotov refrained from any promises, or intimations of military assistance to the Nazi regime. Hitler can take small comfort from this speech that he can depend on any real assistance from Russia in the event of a life and death struggle in the west.

Yet the speech was obviously designed to encourage Hitler to go ahead and to strengthen the German people in their support of Hitler and his regime. German readers of Molotov's speech in their newspapers today will feel confident that they need have no fear of the Russian bear at their backs, and they will read again that France and England are to blame for the war.

And Molotov may have intended that Americans reading his words today will be frightened into demanding that Congress not repeal the arms embargo, thus further encouraging Hitler to launch his "Blitzkrieg." Russia will remain as neutral as the United States, Molotov said, thus offsetting whatever threat to Germany this country's friendship for the Allies might contain.

Throughout every passage of his long speech, Molotov's address rang with the exhortation, "Go ahead, Adolf, butt your brains out against the Maginot Line. Sacrifice your fliers over the British Isles. Your loss will be our gain."

Explaining The Costs

Anticipating a substantial rise in prices in the near future as business continues to improve and warning of some public opposition as the higher cost of living makes a balanced family budget more and more difficult, the Tampa Tribune has a few suggestions to offer which should be read by everybody who has anything to do with the distribution of essential commodities to the public.

"This situation makes it all the more necessary that retail merchants give immediate consideration to how these increases will be presented and explained to the buying public," the Tribune says. "Being last in the chain of distribution, retailers usually receive the blame for every price increase. But it need not be so if a definite program pointing out the reasons why of price advances is prepared."

"The retail merchant today is dealing with a buying public which is better informed. He should explain to his customers that in the long line of distribution the costs of manufacturer, wholesaler and retailer are affected by rising prices of raw materials, by increased demand and higher wages. Retailers owe it to themselves to reveal just how the business dollar is spent and what a small percentage is retained by the merchant as profit."

"We suppose all branches of the retail trade will dust off the old standard advertisement, 'buy now before prices advance.' That may suffice for a time, but a strong feeling of resentment will develop along with advancing prices unless there is an explanation of price machinery and reasons for price increases. An informed public will not blame the retailer for advancing prices if the merchant can show he is not directly responsible for those higher prices."

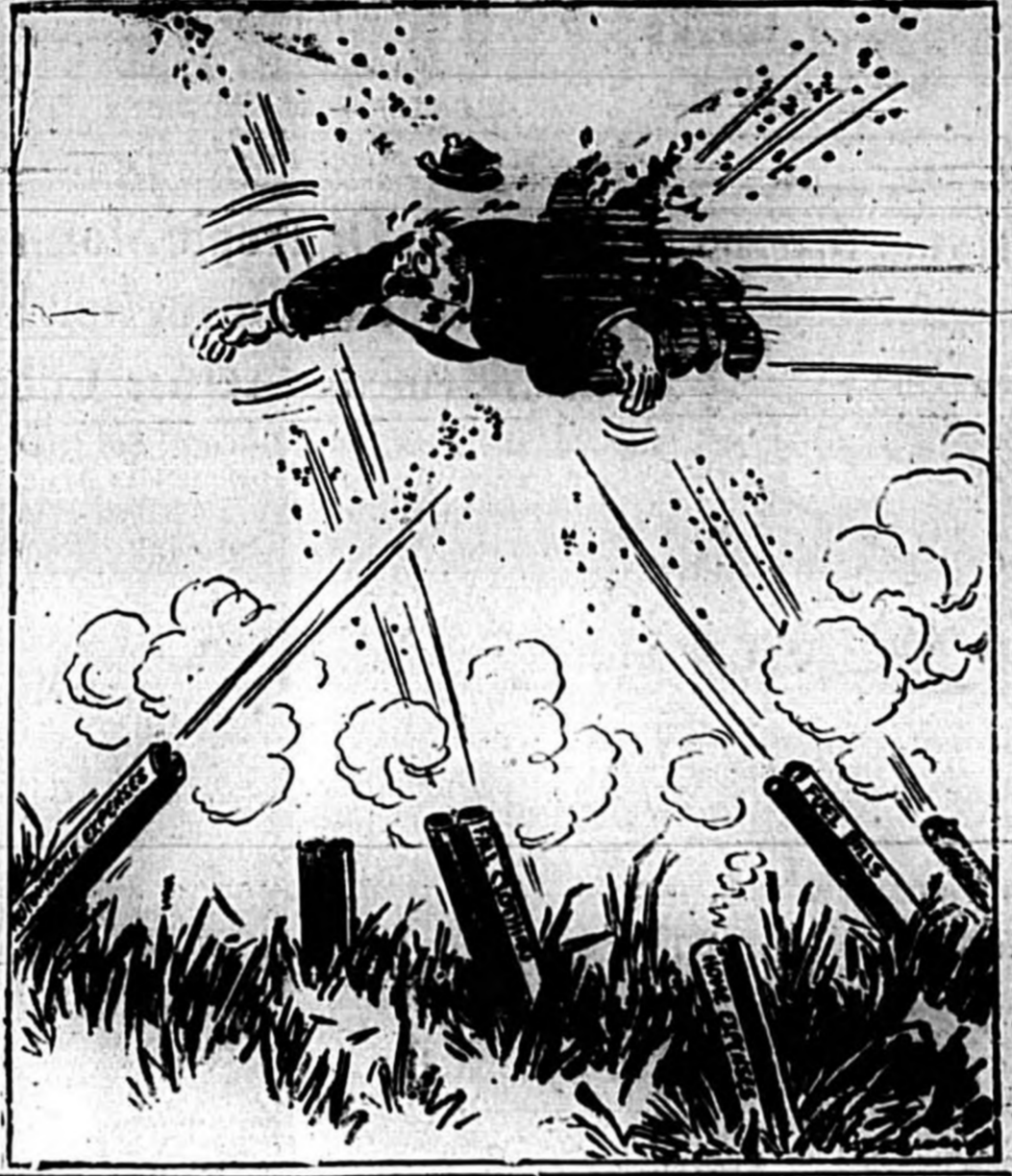

Let us, on the day set aside for this purpose give thanks to the Ruler of the universe for the strength which He has vouchsafed us to carry on our daily labors and for the hope that lives within us of the coming of a day when peace and the productive activities of peace shall reign on every continent.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this thirty-first day of October, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and thirty-nine, and of the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and sixty-fourth.

Molotoff Chides President For Supporting Finns

MOSCOW, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Premier Molotoff yesterday chided President Roosevelt for leading Finland the moral support of the United States, in effect warning the Finns to come to terms, and notified the world that Russia is drawing closer to Germany and Japan, once partners in the anti-comintern pact.

In an exhaustive report on Russia's new foreign policy, the premier and foreign commissar told more than 1100 deputies attending the extraordinary joint session of the Soviet council that the United States' move to repeal its arms embargo would intensify aggression and protract the European war.

Salient points in Molotoff's 65-minute speech: 1. Struck at President Roosevelt for intervening in Russia's negotiations with Finland "in contradiction of the United States' policy of neutrality."

2. Declared Russia was unable to understand Finland's refusal of a mutual assistance pact similar to those which made the Baltic states of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania virtual protectorates.

3. Denounced Great Britain and France for carrying on the war with Germany for the purpose, he said, of safeguarding their colonial possessions.

4. Said "there can be no question of restoring Poland" and that it was absurd to continue the present war for such a cause.

5. Asserted that German and Russian relations are being placed on an increasingly solid and friendly basis.

6. Unmentioned trade negotiations would be opened with Japan and opened the door for a move by Tokyo toward stronger cooperation—possibly a non-aggression pact.

7. Gave no hint of any possible Soviet aims in the Balkans but said Turkey, which refused a pact with Russia and signed one with Britain and France, must take note of the offer of cooperation to Japan.

By her pact with Britain and France, he said, Turkey had moved into the "orbit of war" and would not hazard a guess whether Turkey would come to regret it. Russia's dictator, Joseph Stalin, was given a tremendous ovation when he seated himself along with other Soviet leaders in front of the chairman's rostrum of the modern hall built behind the picturesque Kremlin.

Touching on President Roosevelt's plan on Oct. 11 for Finland, Molotoff said near the end of his address: "One finds it hard to reconcile that with the American policy of neutrality."

"In a message to Comrade Kallin, chairman of the presidium of the supreme soviet, Mr. Roosevelt expressed the hope that friendly and peaceful relations between the U. S. S. R. and Finland would be preserved and developed.

"One might think that matters are in better shape between the United States and, let us say, the Philippines or Cuba, who have long been demanding freedom and independence from the United States and cannot get them, than between the Soviet union and Finland, who has long ago obtained both freedom and political independence from the Soviet union."

Of the negotiations with Finland, he said that the soviet had urged Finland to agree to a pact similar to those recently concluded with Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, which gave Russia extensive rights to station troops, warships and planes on the soil of her Baltic neighbors.
