Teen sentenced for murder

SANFORD — A 18-year-old Sanford youth, Jimmie Lee Bailey, Jr., was sentenced to 60 years in prison yesterday. He was one of two persons accused in the murder of Joe Wesley Clemens, on Dec. 1, 1990.

Bailey, who resided at 131 Academy Ave., was brought before Circuit Court Judge Newman D. Brock for sentencing yesterday afternoon. The original charges were first degree murder, and attempted robbery with a firearm. Through plea bargaining initiated by his court appointed attorney, the court lowered the charge to second degree murder.

The incident occurred late last year, when Bailey, then 15, and Corbblin B. Bush, who was 14 at the time, attempted to rob Clemens outside his home at 1810 Peach Ave. in Sanford, according to authorities.

Clemens, 18, was killed by a shot in the chest fired from a shotgun.

The court had determined during initial hearings, that "...juvenile sanctions were not appropriate" for Bailey and Bush, and they were to be "sentenced as adults."

In addition to the prison term, Bailey was also given 15 years probation, to run consecutively, and is to pay numerous court costs.

Babies saved here

SANFORD — The rate at which health-care workers are able to save the lives of at-risk babies has improved dramatically in Seminole County, according to the most recent statistics.

That means that once again the infant mortality rate in the county fell far below state and national averages, the figures released by the county's Public Health Unit show.

"I was quite surprised," Dr. Jorg Deju, county health director, said Thursday. "I was expecting something higher."

Deju attributed the high rate of infant survivability to the county's maternal and infant health program.

Mothers that are first seen at the public health unit are then assigned to obstetricians at Central Florida Regional Hospital or Florida Hospital-Altamonte. There, the mother is seen by a single physician until she gives birth.

Deju said the county's 91 million Women, Infants and Children program helps pregnant women to give birth to healthier babies.

The unofficial rate for 1991 is expected to be about 2.4 deaths per 1,000 births in Seminole County, according to information as of Nov. 18 compiled by the health unit. In 1990, the unofficial rate compiled by the county was 5.7 deaths per 1,000 births, a slight increase from the last official rate of 4.5 deaths in 1989. Official rates are prepared by the state Office of Vital Statistics.

The statistics mean about 60 children are estimated to have lived because of improved health care services in the county, Deju said. Last year, 55 children were saved and in 1989, 57 children lived.

Although there was an apparent increase in the infant mortality rate between 1988 and 1991, Deju said the small numbers of births in the county can cause a single death to "skew" the rate.

"When you're talking about only 2,000 or 3,000 births each year, one death will make a big difference," Deju said.

There was a statewide infant mortality of 9.8 in 1989, the latest year the information is available. See Babies, Page 5A

Lake Mary OKs sports complex

LAKE MARY — The major sports complex planned for Lake Mary moved further ahead to reality last night. The City Commission unanimously approved three separate aspects of the proposal.

Bids on Phase I construction are expected to be advertised by Jan. 2, and opened by mid February. Lake Mary Parks Director John Holland said, "We can probably expect to see baseball played there by October."

During last night's triple presentation, City Planner Matt West explained, "It's a matter of legal requirements. There are three steps the City has to take officially before we can really get underway with it, and we have to go by the book."

The massive sports complex has been planned for 34.3 acres of land owned by the city, but contained within the Timacuan Planned Urban Development (PUD). It is located in the far eastern section of the Timacuan subdivision, and fronts Country Club Road and See Sports, Page 5A

Mom's frantic effort to save her boy fails

LONGWOOD — A Longwood Elementary School first grader died Thursday as his mother rushed him to the hospital after he became ill at school.

Dick Hofmann, director of community relations for the Seminole County school district, confirmed this morning that James Andrews, 7, had missed a few days of school prior to Thursday with an infection. Hofmann was unsure what that infection was.

School officials report that Andrews was picked up at school by his mother at 11:45 a.m. to be taken to the doctor. He died at 12:56 p.m. on the way to South Seminole Community Hospital in Longwood.

Diane DeAngelis, a spokesman for the hospital, said it was still unclear this morning what sort of infection the child had, but said that it was so intense that while doctors were able to resuscitate him they were unable to establish a regular heartbeat. See Dies, Page 5A

"He was already in cardiac arrest when he arrived," she said. "They did everything they could, but weren't able to save him."

Lt. J.F. "Butch" Yelvington, of the Longwood Police Department, said the investigation into the boy's death was continuing this morning but that the emergency room doctor had told him there had been no signs of abuse.

"This appears to be a medical problem," said Yelvington.

He said that the boy had been under a doctor's care for an infection. He could not release the doctor's name until after the investigation was complete, though he did say that the physician's office was in Sanford.

Hofmann said that the boy reported to his teacher about 9:30 yesterday morning that he was feeling sick to his stomach. Noting his pale color, she sent him to the school clinic. His mother was called, but she was not reached. Hoffman said. See Dies, Page 5A

Senators score disciplinary ax

State Sen. Richard Langley was angry this morning for being one of five key Republicans bounced from leadership positions by Senate President Gwen Margolis in retaliation of their opposition to the \$513 million budget cut bill last week.

"It was pretty poor judgement on the part of the senate president," said Langley, who represents part of western Seminole County. "It will absolutely heighten tensions be-

tween Republicans and Democrats. It's too bad."

Sen. W.W. "Bud" Gardner, D-Titusville, who represents much of the remainder of the county, agreed this morning that the events of last week's special session and Margolis' actions will widen the Democratic-Republican rift.

"It's unfortunate," Gardner said. "I hope when we can get back to Tallahassee next week, we can begin to work together, but the wounds are going to be there."

Langley, whose district currently includes most areas of the county

west of Interstate 4 and north of State Road 434, was removed from the powerful Senate Appropriations Committee. Langley, along with 18 other senators, including one Democrat, opposed the spending cuts pack last Friday because of cuts to social service programs and prison construction. The coalition nearly defeated the proposal, which passed 21-19.

Langley said the coalition opposed the bill because it excluded two Republican-backed proposals.

The first would have shifted \$30 See Senators, Page 5A

MAD DAD sentenced for child sex abuse

PENSACOLA — A MAD DADS community leader who crusaded against crime and drugs has been sentenced to 25 years in prison on child sex abuse and pornography charges. Circuit Judge Nicholas Geeker sentenced Barry Dickham, 35, of Pensacola on Wednesday under state sentencing guidelines calling for a term of 17 to 40 years. Dickham, who changed his plea from innocent to no contest in the middle of his trial last month, was setting up a local chapter of the drug-fighting group called MAD DADS in July when he was arrested on pornography possession and distribution charges. MAD DADS stands for Men Against Destruction Defending Against Social Disorder.

FBI: Doctors helped bilk government

MIAMI — The FBI says doctors helped bilk the government of up to \$6 million in a scheme to ship Medicare recipients a milk supplement they didn't need. The supplement, Sustical, is supposed to be taken only by people who can't eat solid food and have to be fed through tubes, Miami FBI spokesman Paul Miller said Thursday. At least four or five individuals using almost a dozen fake company names were involved in the billing scheme, Miller said. The suspects allegedly told Medicare patients the government would give them free milk if they gave their names and social security numbers. Doctors then certified that the supplement was medically necessary for the patients.

Cop accused of stealing drug money

TAMPA — A police detective commended for his investigations of international drug cases is accused of stealing seized drug money from the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. Douglas G. Schultz, part of a Tampa police-DEA task force, was charged with grand theft. He was jailed briefly Thursday and released on his own recognizance. Schultz, 29, is accused of taking \$1,930 from the DEA between August and September, according to court records. The money was part of thousands of dollars obtained under a search warrant in a drug case, prosecutor Lee Atkinson said. A nine-year police veteran, Schultz's investigative prowess earned him a three-page commendation from U.S. Attorney Robert W. Genzman in December 1989.

Man can keep malpractice suit money

WEST PALM BEACH — A man who killed a woman by hitting her car while fleeing police in a stolen truck can keep the \$25,000 he won in a prison malpractice lawsuit, an appeals court ruled. Johnnie Lee Jones doesn't have to use the money to repay an insurance company that compensated the victim's family, the 4th District Court of Appeal decided Wednesday. Christine Gregory, 25, of Sunrise, was killed when the truck hit her car in Feb. 1985. Jones ran from the scene and was struck by another car, injuring his leg, which eventually had to be amputated.

Former gang member spared from death

PENSACOLA — A former motorcycle gang member belatedly convicted for the 1984 murder of a woman whose body never was found has been spared from the electric chair. Circuit Judge Nicholas Geeker said he believed Donald Harvey Fleming would be convicted of the crime if he had voluntarily agreed to a jury's recommendation. Jurors who convicted Fleming, 42, in September had recommended a sentence of life in prison without parole for at least 25 years, the only alternative to the death penalty for first-degree murder.

Attorney general may defend SCEA

Bank: Damages high in Howell Place suit

SANFORD — The Seminole County Expressway Authority will ask the Florida Attorney General's office to defend it in the third lawsuit over plans to build a final link of the expressway between U.S. Highway 17-92 and Interstate 4.

In November, Barnett Banks Trust Co., current owners of the Howell Place retirement apartments on Airport Boulevard, sued the authority stating 1987 property reservations of a strip of their property along Airport Boulevard ranging from 110 to 305

feet in depth resulted in the "denial of all beneficial use of the property." SCEA members voted Wednesday to ask the attorney general's office to defend it in the lawsuit. Barnett attorney Jay Small said damages from loss of market value could exceed \$1 million.

SCEA director Gerald Brinton said expressway planners may not need the Howell Place property for the six-mile link. He said road designers are considering a plan that would move the expressway west of Airport Boulevard, creating less disruption of businesses and less cost for the road.

The expressway authority is currently appealing a March decision by Seminole County circuit judge Robert MacGregor that the 1987 reservation of the expressway path between the Orange County line near Aloma Avenue and I-4 at a former railroad overpass

prevented Christopher and Janet Bulet from selling their Upsala Road home.

Expressway director Gerald Brinton said the state has billed the expressway authority \$28 per hour for the Bulet case, for a total of \$1,076 so far.

In 1989, Brenda Properties sued SCEA stating the reservation drove tenants away from its Zayres Plaza shopping center at the intersection of U.S. 17-92 and Airport Boulevard. The lawsuit was settled earlier this year with the \$3 million SCEA purchase of the shopping center.

Small said he represents the Bulets and participated in the Brenda Properties suit with his colleagues in the firm Bringham, Moore, Gaylord, Wilson, Ulmer, Schuster and Sachs.

Haitians' 2nd deportation ban lifted

MIAMI — A federal appeals court again ruled in favor of the U.S. government sending thousands of Haitian refugees back to their homeland, lifting a second deportation ban issued by a Florida judge.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel in Atlanta voted 2-1 Thursday to overrule the ban imposed by U.S. District Judge C. Clyde Atkins in Miami.

Atkins had scheduled a hearing on the matter today.

Atkins' second order came Tuesday, hours after the same appeals panel threw out his initial injunction against deporting the Haitians.

It was unclear when deportations may begin. In Washington, State Department spokesman Colin Cleary said he hadn't yet heard about the appeals court ruling and couldn't comment.

Maj. Don Kappel, a spokesman at the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, where more than 6,000 Haitians are being held, said Thursday that no Haitians would be sent home overnight.

"We're extremely disappointed," said Ira Kurshan, a lawyer for the Haitian Refugee Center, a Miami group fighting to block the deportations.

Kurshan said he would ask Atkins today to issue a new order barring the government from repatriating the Haitians. If that fails, he said, he will take the case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Haitians fled their country after a military coup toppled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide in September.

Lieutenant governor predicts more cuts within six months

TALLAHASSEE — Lt. Gov. Buddy MacKay says a sluggish economy could cause another round of state budget cuts with up to a \$300-million slash within the next six months.

The Legislature met in a special session last week to deal with a state deficit and cut \$622 million. The reductions slashed welfare programs, kept completed prisons unopened and delayed pay raises for state workers.

"If anybody thinks that's the last round of cuts between now and July, they're wrong," MacKay told a group of top government officials, environmentalists and business leaders reviewing

Florida's growth-management laws.

MacKay backed off the \$300-million figure later Thursday, saying he was "not part of the revenue-estimating team." But he said the economy is creating a need for millions more to be trimmed from the budget before the fiscal year's end on June 30.

"I don't see anything that leads me to believe (the economy) will turn up," he told the Tallahassee Democrat for today's editions. Budget Director Doug Cook supported MacKay's prediction.

"Certainly there's a potential for another reduction," Cook said. "It's a very, very scary economy out there."

Fatal shots

Police probe possible link of killings of six in two homes

NORTH PORT, Fla. — Six people, including three children, were shot to death in two homes just miles apart in southwest Florida and investigators today are trying to determine if the crimes were linked.

In the North Port killings, authorities say two masked men early Thursday shot a man and three children and critically wounded a fourth child after bursting into their rural Sarasota County home. All had gunshot wounds to the head.

Just four miles away in Charlotte County,

an elderly couple also were found shot to death early Thursday in their home.

Telephone lines at both homes had been cut.

"The investigation is determining that they are possibly linked," said North Port police detective Bob Lovett late Thursday.

The retired Port Charlotte couple's dog also had been shot and killed.

Authorities for both the North Port police and the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office said no motives were immediately known.

Police in North Port said they would not confirm the identities because relatives of the man had not been notified.

In the North Port killings, school officials told the Fort Myers News-Press the names of the mother, who escaped unharmed, and the children.

The woman, identified as Donna Peay, 30, had frantically called 911 on a cordless phone as she fled from the home at 2:41 a.m. EST.

Ms. Peay described the gunmen only as two white men of medium build, about 5-foot-8 or 5-foot-9.

Police said the bodies were found in several bedrooms in the home, and that several had multiple gunshot wounds.

Court rules term-limit amendment valid issue

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Supreme Court said limiting members of Congress, the Cabinet and the Legislature to eight years in office is a valid question for Florida voters, but opponents predict a federal court fight if term limits are approved.

The Court ruled Thursday that a proposed constitutional amendment meets requirements to go on the November 1992 ballot if petitioners obtain the required 364,000 signatures by August.

They've obtained more than 135,000 since April, said Phil Handy, a Republican Winter Park businessman who chairs Citizens for Limited Political Terms and heads the group's "Eight is Enough" initiative.

With the court ruling, Handy told a news conference, "Deep-pocketed special interests lost, and the ever-entrenched 'good ole boy' network that wants to keep term limits off the ballot lost."

Distinguished-teacher award surprises her

LAKE MARY — Her fourth and fifth grade students cheered and giggled and hugged her while Christine Watkins remained briefly speechless yesterday.

The alternative education teacher was named Seminole County's nominee for the Ida S. Baker Distinguished Black Educator award in a surprise ceremony at the school yesterday morning.

Principal Sherrill Casey had called Watkins to her office to "talk to some irate parents." When she entered the conference room she was met, instead, by Casey, acting superintendent Richard Wells, Dr. Marion Dalley, assistant superintendent for instruction; her husband and her son. And no one was angry. "We're very proud of her," her husband said.

Watkins, who had once left school her senior year in high school, works hard at building her students' self esteem to be sure they stay in school.

Her senior year at Lyman High School was the first year of forced integration and Watkins said it was difficult for black students.

"Both my sister and I left school," she said. "But John Blair came to our house and asked us to come back."

Blair, now the district coordinator of music education, was then the band and chorus director at Lyman. She had been in the chorus when she left school.

Blair, she said, often marched the band through neighborhoods surrounding the school. On one such march after she had graduated high school, she thanked him for convincing her to get her diploma.

"What are you going to do now?" she said he asked. She gathered her resources and went to the University of Central Florida.

When she earned her bachelors degree and began teaching, she saw Blair again. She said he asked her once again what she would do next. She went on to earn a masters degree in elementary education.

"He never told me what I should do," she said. "He just posed the questions." Watkins said she doesn't believe that Blair "has any idea" how much he has affected her life.

She said she wants to help her students learn about the importance of education.

"When I first talked to them about college, they had no idea what college was all about," she said. "They thought it was a place to play football."

Kids' care

Ten million American children have virtually no access to health care. To address this crisis, a federal advisory panel has proposed a nationwide network of school-based health clinics. It also suggests the government offer subsidized private health insurance to families with infants.

The advisory panel, headed by Deborah L. Steelman, who served as President Bush's director of domestic policy during the 1988 presidential campaign, has devoted much of the last 2 1/2 years to studying the problems of the health care system. The group's recommendations for what would amount to universal health coverage for American children will be included in a final report that will be sent to Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan.

If Sullivan endorses the proposals, as expected, there is a very good possibility that Mr. Bush will propose them during his State of the Union message to congress in January.

As envisioned by the advisory panel, a network of school clinics would provide both basic health care and preventive care to preschool and elementary school children. While the clinics would be targeted to children from low-income families, their services would be available to all children.

Government-subsidized private health insurance would be provided for children of families with incomes up to 185 percent of the poverty line. This would mean that a family of four earning up to \$24,714 would be eligible. The subsidy would help them pay monthly premiums that would range from \$25 to \$60 for each child.

All told, the cost of the national network of school clinics and subsidized health insurance for children is estimated at \$2.5 billion a year. The cost of the program is estimated to be less than 1 percent of the nation's annual expenditure on health care.

Furthermore, by providing health care for children who now lack coverage, the federal government would go one-third of the way toward solving the overall problem of uninsured Americans. The remaining two-thirds could be solved if a solution as promising and as affordable as the federal advisory panel's plan for children also were devised to address the problem of working-poor adults.

Skinner as chief of staff

Sam Skinner will replace John Sununu as President Bush's new chief of staff.

Born in Springfield and reared there during part of the 1940s, Skinner first gained recognition as a U.S. attorney in Chicago. Later he was named by then-Gov. James Thompson as chairman of the state Capital Development Board and finally as head of the Chicago-area Regional Transportation Authority.

In all of those positions, he became respected for his efficiency and his ability to work well with those around him. When Bush was elected president in 1988, he picked Skinner to be the secretary of the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The job he took this week as Bush's chief of staff will undoubtedly prove to be the most challenging of all. The chief of staff is the president's right-hand man. He controls the president's daily schedule — who sees him and who doesn't. He will have a major voice in formulating White House policy on current issues. Likewise Skinner will play a key role in next year's presidential campaign.

We have no doubts, however, that Skinner will handle his new assignment with the same confidence and dedication that he has shown in every public position he has had.

As DOT secretary, Bush called upon him to be the administration's point man in dealing with the Exxon Valdez oil spill, the San Francisco earthquake and airline terrorism. In Washington he became known as the "master of disaster."

As chief of staff, Skinner will have one major advantage over his predecessor — his ability to work with others and to understand the importance of compromise in getting things done.

His most recent accomplishment was working out an agreement with Congress on a six-year \$151 billion surface transportation bill.

Sununu, although certainly a highly qualified individual, turned out to be arrogant, abrasive and somewhat abusive to those who disagreed with him. Other leaders of the Republican Party, including members of Congress, found it increasingly impossible to work with him.

President Bush could not have found a more logical choice than Skinner for the difficult task of chief of staff.

Conservatives to back Buchanan?

The entry of Pat Buchanan into the race against President Bush for the Republican nomination is no trivial development. It will have major consequences even if, as is virtually certain, Mr. Bush beats back the challenge and wins re-nomination.

Buchanan intends, by his action, to indicate that the conservative movement, or at least a substantial segment of it, has "had it up to here" with Mr. Bush, as a result of various alleged derelictions — violating his "no new taxes" pledge, caving in on the quota issue, etc.

Undeniably, there is deep concern among conservatives over Mr. Bush's increasingly erratic course. The most recent issue of National Review, which is unquestionably the leading journalistic spokesman of American conservatism, firmly withdraws the magazine from Mr. Bush's camp:

"A movement rooted in philosophy," it declares, "cannot make electoral success the sole test of the rightness of action. Unless President Bush makes a major, explicit, and convincing turn to the right, therefore, we can no longer support his Administration. And such a transfiguration seems at present unlikely."

But that, as the editorial goes on to concede, is not quite the same thing as endorsing

Buchanan's candidacy. Just for one thing, that would require a careful scrutiny of Buchanan, and while he is a splendid battler for conservative principles, he is not a man without defects. He has never, for example, held elective office of any kind. Moreover, the kinds of activities that have brought him to the forefront of public attention — notably the cut and thrust of TV debates — have inevitably had a polarizing effect on his image that the American people dislike in a presidential candidate. It has been said that the president is the "pontifex maximus of the American civil religion." Ronald Reagan played that role superbly, but it is almost

impossible to imagine Buchanan doing so. Perhaps, if his candidacy is intended simply to send Mr. Bush a message, such defects are largely irrelevant. But Pat Buchanan has also taken positions that make even a symbolic candidacy difficult to support.

There is, for one thing, the whole issue of his alleged anti-Semitic remarks. Without reviewing the matter in detail, let me say that I don't believe for a moment that Pat Buchanan is anti-Semitic — though it would redound greatly to his credit if he expressed regret for certain statements of his that were arguably open to such an interpretation.

But Buchanan is also the chief exponent of an "America First" policy that seems to favor protectionist trade measures, sharp limits on immigration and an isolationist foreign policy, all of which are strongly opposed by many people who consider themselves, with justice, every bit as conservative as Pat Buchanan. How can they join his parade?

At the Republican Convention, Buchanan will probably endorse Mr. Bush, and conservatives will close ranks behind him to defeat the Democratic contender. That should do it.

Black leaders at fault

In the Dec. 12, 1991 edition of the Sanford Herald, you published an article titled, "Young Black Males Filling Jails." The article discussed the fact that nearly one-third of the black male population in Florida between the ages of 18 and 34 will either be in jail or on some form of probation by the year 1994. The conclusion was reached that this was mainly due to crimes committed by these young Blacks relating to drugs. As one of the cures for this problem, Frank Scruggs, chairman of the Racial and Ethnic Bias Study Commission, recommended that sentencing guidelines be revised "to ensure the defendants aren't

imprisoned for drugs or non-property crimes."

Instead of trying to solve the problem, Mr. Scruggs just wants to eliminate the punishment for the crime. The sale and use of illicit drugs such as crack cocaine is far from a victimless crime. The users often rely on theft and prostitution to support their habits and the use of crack cocaine by pregnant mothers is creating a generation of brain damaged youth who will undoubtedly end up on the welfare system for the rest of their lives. The use and sale of addictive drugs such as crack has turned many of this country's inner cities into war zones.

Mr. Scruggs uses the same twisted logic as those who suggest that the fact that jails in the United States are mostly filled with Blacks is due to racism. Is it not possible that Blacks are committing a disproportionate number of the crimes?

The problem, in my view, lies in the black community itself. Black leaders, instead of encouraging achievement and discouraging aberrant behavior, often blame all the problems in the black community on racism: There is also a tendency for members of the black community to accept such things as drug use and prostitution. Several weeks ago, an anti drug march was held in the city of Sanford. A concerted effort was made by many individuals to encourage the citizens of the Georgetown community to participate in the march. Many hours were spent meeting with members of the community in preparation for the event. When it came time for the anti drug march, however, not one member of the Georgetown community participated.

I am sure that many people will call me a racist for even suggesting that the black community is responsible for many of its problems. These same people are the ones who suggest that no one is responsible for their own actions. They feel that crimes are caused by conditions and circumstances, rather than bad people.

I, for one, feel that there should be absolutely no discrimination, of any kind, on the basis of race, color, creed or sex. Everyone, however, must be responsible for their actions and crime problems should be solved with logic and sound reasoning rather than by absolving responsibility and eliminating punishment for criminal behavior.

Bush listened to Kemp too late

WASHINGTON — President Bush no doubt wishes he had listened to Jack Kemp sooner.

Ever since Bush picked Kemp as Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, the former pro-football quarterback has been trying to help the president call some plays on the domestic field. But for almost three years, Bush's eyes have glazed over whenever Kemp insisted that the globe-trotting president needed to champion housing issues and other problems on his own turf.

Finally, in early November, Kemp got the president's attention. On a flight back to Washington from the West Coast, Kemp got past the palace guard and cornered Bush for a long talk.

Bush heard the conservative line as only Kemp can deliver it. He has a powerful memory that allows him to pull up anecdotes that he collects around the country. He can explain America's economic ills through the countless conversations he has had with middle America. He even remembers all of their names and has been known to rattle off the names, for example, of a dozen black women whom he considers to be champions of low-income housing.

A well-placed administration source told our associate Jim Lynch that it was Kemp's airborne pep talk that day that persuaded Bush to cancel his trip to Asia and stay home to take care of business.

But the rapport between the two men faded when they got back to Washington. At a meeting in the White House later in November, Kemp grew exasperated with the reluctance of Bush and other Cabinet members to champion more aggressive domestic policies. "I guess I'm the only failure in your Cabinet, Mr. President," Kemp said. Then he grabbed his papers and stormed out.

Soon thereafter, Kemp took his case to the public, appearing on national television to advocate tax cuts and complain that Bush was getting bad information from his economic advisers. The palace guard hit the ceiling at the White House. Kemp's chief of staff was chewed out again for not keeping Kemp in check.

But pleasing the president may not be Kemp's priority right now. He is a hero of the conservative wing of the GOP — the same Reagan alumni who are unhappy with Bush's tilt away from the far right. Kemp's boldness has earned him attention from those people, even a few in Congress who think Bush should make Kemp his domestic czar. Others are hoping Bush will fire Kemp and make him the perfect martyr for the right. That would set Kemp up for his own run at the presidency in 1996.

Kemp's sights are firmly fixed on the White House. He still has his "kitchen cabinet" of advisers in place from his 1988 run. Sources told us that those advisers have discouraged him from running for the Senate from California next year — an idea that he had toyed with until recently. He spent much of the summer jetting back and forth to Los Angeles, but in the end decided not to bother with a Senate bid. His advisers told him that it wouldn't help him become president any quicker.

They are looking for a new stage for their man. There isn't much more Kemp can do at HUD. He has already performed CPR on the agency and nursed it back to reasonable health. He has used his Cabinet position as a platform to further his national visibility and go toe-to-toe with the president. If nothing else, Bush should have been listening to the howl of Kemp's own political survival instinct.

U.S. ponders new Soviet commonwealth

MOSCOW — The states of the new commonwealth are drawing pledges of recognition from the West, while Russian President Boris Yeltsin consolidates his power in the Kremlin and makes international contacts.

Yeltsin's economic policies, meanwhile, are under fire. One of his early allies, Moscow Mayor Gavril Popov, said Thursday that the Russian government will cause ruinous inflation by freezing prices early next month without allowing a free market.

While Popov focused on domestic troubles, the West pondered how to respond to the creation of the Commonwealth of Independent States, a loose grouping of republics formed this month.

NATO and the European Community indicated Thursday they were nearly ready to recognize the Soviet republics as independent states. In Washington, President Bush said U.S. recognition was "just going to take a little bit of time."

NATO opens door to East Europeans

BRUSSELS, Belgium — The NATO allies sat down today for unprecedented security talks with their former adversaries in Eastern Europe, and Russian President Boris Yeltsin asked to eventually join the alliance.

Yeltsin, moving to enhance his powers before the formation of a new commonwealth of former Soviet republics, said he considered ties to the 16-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization "to be very serious."

NATO officials reacted coolly to Yeltsin's proposal. Secretary of State James A. Baker III, at the inaugural meeting of a special NATO forum, called it "historic day for the alliance and for all of Europe."

The new forum, — the North Atlantic Cooperation Council — was set up last month by President Bush and other Western leaders to draw their former enemies closer without granting them full NATO membership.

Palestinians want stronger U.S. hand

WASHINGTON — Palestinian negotiators say U.S. involvement is needed to get peace talks with Israel moving when they resume next month, but so far there's no sign it is forthcoming. President Bush, voicing disappointment that the talks failed to move beyond an impasse over procedure, said Thursday the United States was a catalyst for talks but would not "dictate solutions" to either side.

Palestinian delegates to the Mideast peace talks that recessed on Wednesday were leaving for home today, following their Israeli counterparts by a day.

Black, white leaders ending apartheid

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Black and white leaders said they were optimistic as they opened historic talks today to end apartheid and build democracy after centuries of racial conflict.

"If we who are gathered here respond to the challenge before us, today will mark the commencement of the transition from apartheid to democracy," African National Congress President Nelson Mandela told the conference.

The government, the ANC and 17 other groups are taking part in the talks that mark the final phase in the drive to end apartheid.

million from a state employee pay raise to health care for uninsured workers and prison construction. When that failed, Langley said the coalition then proposed to trim 20 percent of the state employee travel budget, \$64 million, which not only would have restored the health care and prison construction programs but would have added another \$33 million to

education.

But Gardner, whose district includes Sanford, said he was blindsided by the coalition vote. He said the day before, he gave budget conference committee members, including some who were among the 19 members, a chance to voice any opposition to the proposal. Gardner said only one did and the committee passed the proposal 30 to 1.

"To walk in there like that and attempt to embarrass (Margolis),

that's unforgivable," Gardner said.

Margolis said the changes will strengthen a weakening Democratic hold on the Senate.

"I think we've beefed up the committees where Democrats were weak and important bills will be moving," said Margolis, D-North Miami Beach. "I think it'll be a more orderly Senate."

Rantoul Lane. It is to the west of the recently opened Liberty Park area. But contrary to Liberty, which is classified as a "passive" park, the new one would be an "active" park, with a variety of facilities for competitive sports.

West explained the need for three separate ordinances.

"First, we have to handle the present zoning of the Timacuan PUD. The property the City owns was originally for use as golf villas. We will be required to change this to a park status."

"Secondly," he commented, "We will need an official change of development order." He explained, "The order is a joint contract between the City, State, and developers of Timacuan, it sets out specific uses for the property, but there is no wording in it for any park. This will have

to be changed."

"The third step," he added, "is a site plan review for the park."

If all of the steps are approved by all parties concerned, the park will eventually be built in two phases. Phase I improvements have been established by the City's receipt of a \$150,000 matching grant from the Florida Department of Natural Resources.

In addition to required landscaping, irrigation, drainage, paving and sidewalks, Phase I will have 2 softball/baseball fields, and 2 little league/Pony League baseball fields. Two of the fields

will be lit for night use. Also, 1 multi-purpose field, parking areas for 130 vehicles, and restroom facilities.

While specific funds for Phase II have not been established, it will include lighting of the two remaining ball fields, 178 more parking spaces, a maintenance and storage building, 6 tennis courts, 2 racquetball courts, 2 basketball courts, 4 shuffleboard courts, additional restrooms, and a picnic pavilion.

Morris was assured by Holland that if the bids for Phase I come in at a level less than the money available, parts of Phase II might be moved ahead.

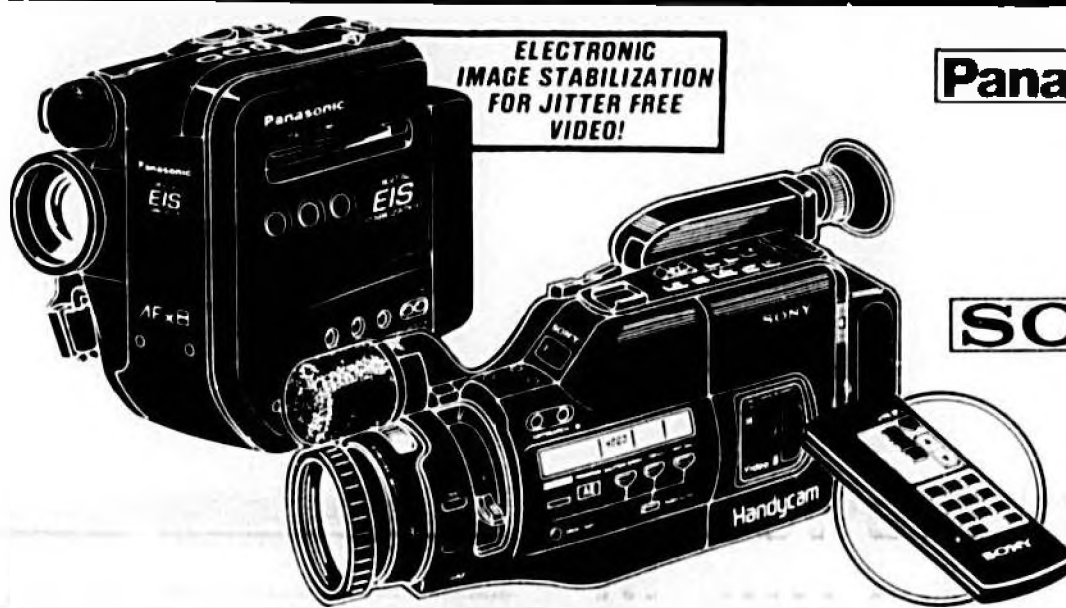

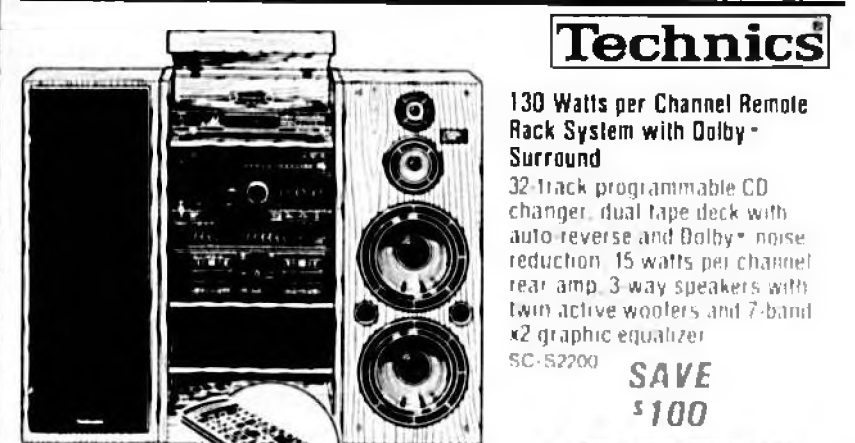

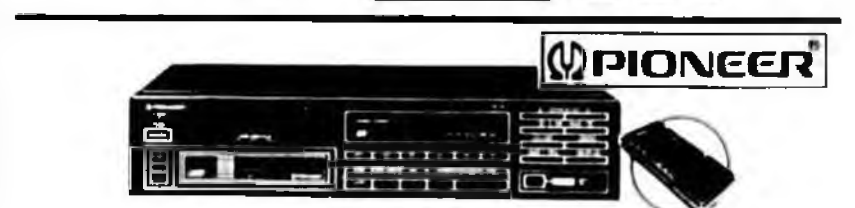

Ex-Silver Hawk dies

PHILADELPHIA — Eric Bird, a graduate of Lake Howell and Lehigh University's all-time top placekicker, went into the hospital for routine shoulder surgery. A day later, he died.

Bird, 21, of Casselberry, suffered a brain seizure Thursday while recovering from surgery. He was pronounced dead at 7:35 p.m.

Lehigh spokeswoman Rita Malone said doctors have not established a connection between the seizure and the surgery performed by the team physician, Dr. Emil J. DiIorio.

Bird went in for surgery Wednesday at Muhlenberg Hospital Center in Bethlehem to repair damage to his shoulder, which was dislocated two years ago during a game.

He was recovering normally from the surgery until about 1:30 a.m. Thursday, when he suffered a brain seizure. A CAT scan revealed a large brain tumor, Malone said.

Bird was flown by helicopter 50 miles to Hahnemann, arriving at 6 a.m. in critical condition.

Bird is survived by his father, Peter, mother, Denise and four siblings: David, 23; Matthew, 18; Nathan, 16; and Christine, 11.

A funeral will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at Maitland Presbyterian Church in Maitland.

Discharging a gun

Vet needs to get World War II gun out of his home

DEAR ABBY: I need to know how I can legally get rid of a military .45-caliber handgun that I have had since I was in the U.S. Army back in 1943. It was issued to me prior to my being shipped overseas.

When I was discharged, the parachute and most of the other equipment I had been issued was requisitioned back by the military, but no mention was ever made of the gun, or the 1 1/2 clips of ammunition that I still possess. (In all of this time, I have never fired the gun.)

I want to return the gun to the government, but I don't want to find myself in hot water for having possessed it all this time as a civilian. Since the gun is plainly marked "U.S. Property," I am wondering if my civilian possession of it all these years may have somehow been illegal ever since my discharge.

WONDERING IN SAN JOSE
DEAR WONDERING: According to Sherry Lawrence of the Personnel Command Public Affairs Office of the Army, the failure of the military to reclaim the weapon at the time of your discharge was probably the result of a paperwork slip-up.

Because the weapon is old and probably has not been maintained, it may be a safety hazard.

Call your local police department and explain that you have a weapon from World War II that needs to be safely disposed of. They will either advise you to bring it in, or offer to pick it up.

I advise you not to handle it — lock it up until you either deliver it to the local police or they pick it up. Peace of mind is only a telephone call away.

DEAR ABBY: Recently we had a devastating fire in the East Bay hills of Berkeley and Oakland. There were many lives lost — people and animals injured, and countless homes destroyed.

Is there 'no room for Christ' in the hearts of man?

It is recorded that about 2,000 years ago a very uncommon birth took place.

Some question the date of the celebration and this unusual event. Others say we Christians are worshipping a pagan holy day. They claim the practice of hanging ornaments and light bulbs on a tree and putting gifts under the tree is paganistic. Others say no one even told the church to pay homage to Dec. 25 any way, for it is not in the Bible, therefore the church is in error. Even still there are those who say that history proves that Christ was born around another time of the year rather than during the winter.

Now these arguments might be true, but Christians must rest their case on the fact that if in fact this Christmas Day started out as a pagan holiday, because of Christ, it is now changed because we are not worshipping the particular day. No, we are merely worshipping the birth event that took place on a day, therefore, we have changed the pagan special day and presented it to the world as the day our Lord and Savior was born. This is the time in which Christ broke into history of mankind.

Because everybody and everything must have a beginning, if there was no birth of Christ, then who turned the water into wine? Who was it in

which John baptized down in the Jordan River? Who was the man in whom the Holy Spirit sat upon? If there was no birth, then why did Matthew trace Christ lineage back some 42 long generations? If Christ's birth was not important, just why did Luke take precious time to record it by telling the entire birth story. We must understand that everything and everything has a beginning and starting point. Even God, for His beginning and starting is within Himself. For He is the beginning and the end.

Which brings us to our text, "No Room at the Inn."

In Luke 2:7, he tells us that the unusual birth of Christ took place in an animal stable. God's incarnate, was born in a stable; God's only begotten son was born in a lowly stable. Jesus who gave up His royal seat in heaven, crown of glory and royal robe and diadem only to come to earth and be born in a crumbly stable simply because there was "no room in the inn."

And it seems as unique as Christ's birth was, it really should have been expected. For centuries before His birth, the Old Testament prophet Isaiah wrote, "The Lord Himself shall give you a sign; behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call His name Immanuel."

Approximately 700 years before Christ, Micah

said "But thou Bethlehem, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel: whose going forth have been from of old, from everlasting." Therefore, throughout the Old Testament scriptures the birth of Jesus Christ is clearly predicted. The place of His birth, His name and His position all were recorded some hundreds of years before Jesus was born in Bethlehem. It seems to me that someone should have been ready before He came so the awful words never would have been spoken, "no room in the inn." If someone had prepared a place for the Lord, then He never would have been able to say, "The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of man hath nowhere to lay His head, because there was no room in the inn."

Now the reason why there was no room was because Caesar Augustus, the supreme ruler of the Romans, decreed that a census be taken in order to create a basis for taxation. This meant that every person in the empire had to be enrolled in his own birth city. That's why Joseph, a builder, descendant of the great King David, had to go to Bethlehem, the city of David, to register. This was leading toward fulfilling the prophecy of Micah, that Bethlehem was to be the birth place

of Christ. But when Mary and her husband Joseph arrived in the city, they inquired for lodging only to receive the words, "no room in the inn."

Consider this phrase if you will, for the Bible teaches that there never was room for Jesus. From His lowly birth in the filthy stable to His burial in a borrowed tomb, there was no room for Him. There was no affection or compassion for Jesus, saying no room. When we allow ourselves to become concerned about our affairs so much so until we can't give a helping hand, we are "saying no room" for Christ. When we let sin rule in our lives, no room. When we don't give to God that portion He requires of us, we are hindering our blessing, plus we are telling Him sorry, "there is no room."

But I came to let you know that there is room at the cross for you. You may be high or you may be low, there is room at the cross for you. You may be rich or you may be poor, but there is room. You may be popular or an outcast, still there is room at the cross for you. If you let Jesus come in, He will sup with you and clean up your inside and make room in your heart.

Is there any room?

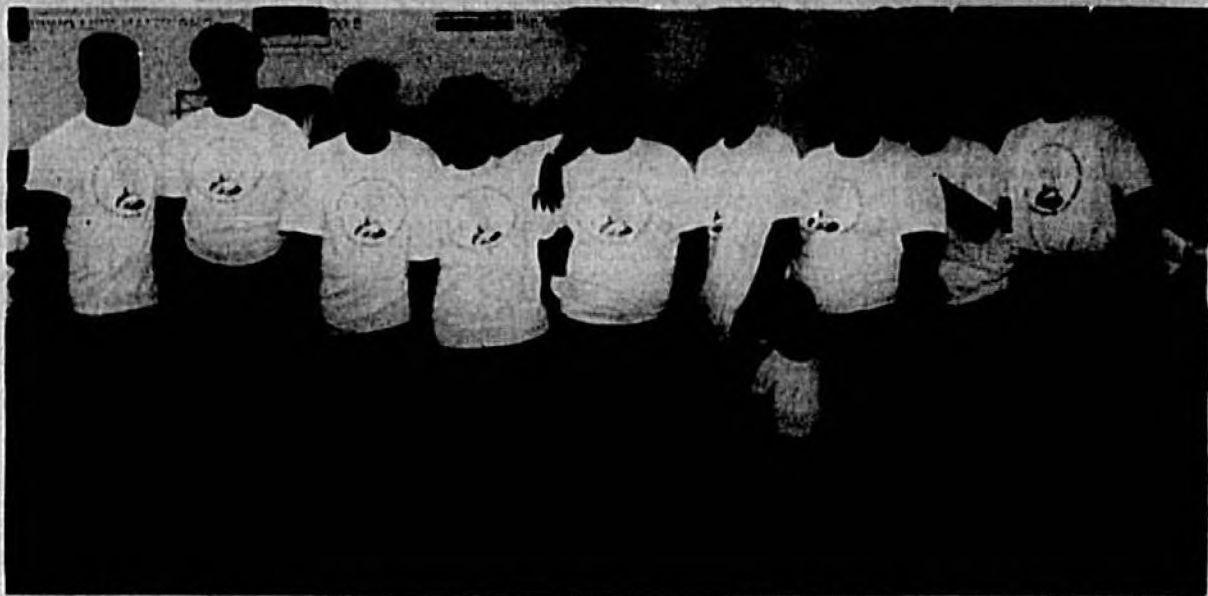

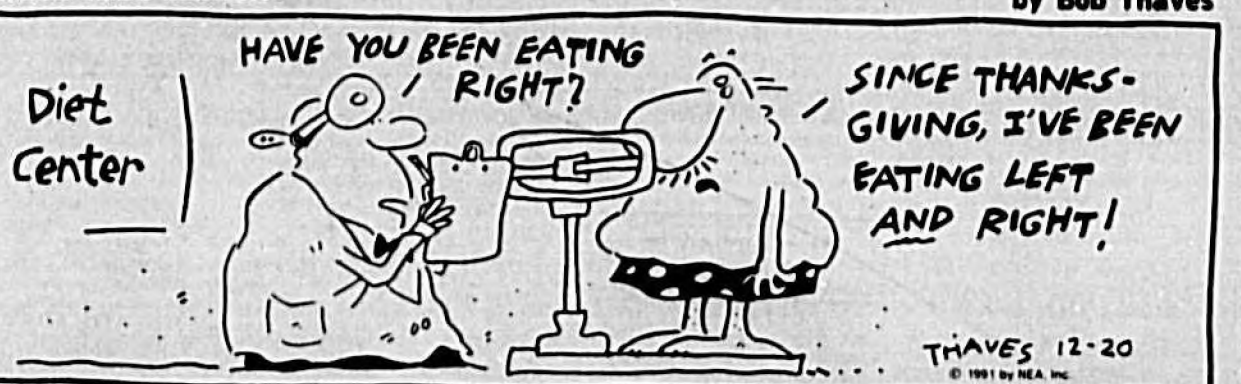

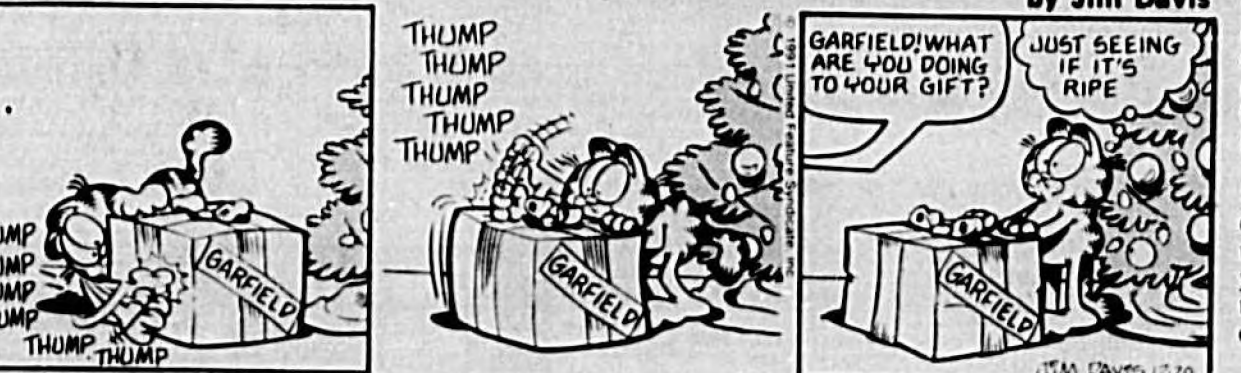

Extraction of bone marrow causes pain

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had bone marrow removed from my hip for protein tests. The spot where the marrow was extracted still hurts, and the pain never seems to disappear. Is this normal?

DEAR READER: The bone marrow, where blood corpuscles are made, lies deep in the bones. In the presence of a blood disorder, doctors need to examine a specimen of bone marrow to determine whether the blood-forming cells are normal. The easiest way to extract such a specimen is to introduce a heavy-gauge, hollow needle through the dense outer bone into the bone marrow cavity. The pelvic crests and sternum are the most suitable locations. Although the bone marrow extraction is relatively painless, patients frequently complain of persisting discomfort at the site for weeks or months, until healing is complete.

Therefore, while your continuing pain may be normal, you should bring this to your doctor's attention.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Recently I discovered fresh blood at the end of a urine flow. A urologist easily discovered a tumor inside the bladder that was treated with cautery. I was commended on being very observant to catch the problem so quickly. What is my prognosis for the future?

DEAR READER: Your prognosis is probably excellent because you identified the problem early and received prompt, definitive care. However, I must add one caveat: Your prognosis depends to a large degree on the type of bladder tumor you had. Ordinarily, these growths are slow-growing and do not readily spread. Thus, you will need a periodic cystoscopic exam (where the urologist examines the lining of your bladder with a lighted tube) so that any recurrences can be cauterized (burned off).

On the other hand, if the tumor was highly malignant and invaded the bladder wall, your

future is less certain.

From the information you supplied, I suspect that you needn't worry if you follow the urologist's advice about follow-up. I suggest you discuss your prognosis with the specialist, who is familiar with your case and should be able to answer your questions.

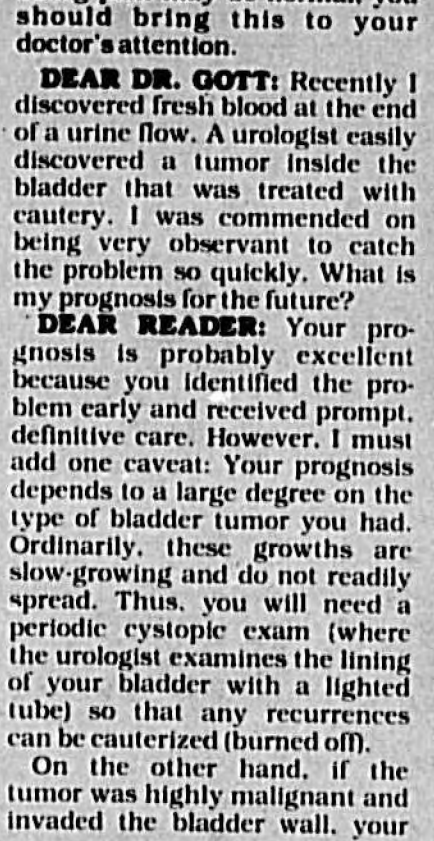

WIN AT BRIDGE



WIN AT BRIDGE

Bridge is primarily a game of counting and analysis. If you have counted the points and suit distributions, you can usually work out the best line of declarer-play or defense. But sometimes you must also draw an inference from a particular play of an opponent. Because he played one card rather than another, you can deduce his holding in the suit.

South's jump to three spades over his partner's transfer bid showed a maximum one-no-trump opening with four trumps. North was happy to push on to game.

West led the heart 10, the three was played from dummy. East encouraged with the eight and South ducked, letting West win the trick. Declarer won the heart continuation, drew trumps in two rounds, cashed the A-K of clubs, ruffed a club in the

dummy and ruffed dummy's last heart in hand. Now South led his last club and, when West produced the 10, discarded a diamond from the dummy. West, with nothing but diamonds left, could do no better than lead the ace and another, giving declarer both a trick with his king and his contract.

That was very well played by South, but East shouldn't have given him a chance to shine. When declarer doesn't cover the heart 10 with dummy's jack at trick one, West is marked with the heart nine. East should overtake with the heart queen. If South ducks, East can switch to the diamond 10 (or queen), defeating the contract immediately. If South wins trick one, he cannot eliminate hearts. East must get the lead on the second round of the suit for the fatal diamond switch.
