**County looks to expand bus service**

**Commissioners seek assistance from cities in funding expansion**

SANFORD — Seminole residents could see an increased presence of Lynx, the transportation agency, as county commissioners Tuesday addressed shortfalls in bus routes and mass transit revenue streams. A 130-page transit service options study helped guide commissioners during their discussion. Seven bus routes currently serve the county; North Orange Avenue to the Altamonte Mall, Winter

Park to Forest City, Sanford/Midway, Fern Park/Sanford, State Road 436 Cross-town, West State Road 46 to Seminole Towne Center and Oviedo.

Commissioners directed county staff to develop an ongoing funding agreement with cities, Seminole Community College,

University of Central Florida, the Sanford airport and other major employers. Staff was also directed to develop a plan to expand and modify existing bus service as well as find ways to improve the county's bus shelters.

"The city aspect is critical," said

Only three cities currently help fund Seminole Lynx service, but Sanford, Altamonte Springs and Oviedo are the only cities to have extensive bus service inside the city limits. Casselberry does have bus services along 17-92 and Commissioner Grant Maloy wondered "if they could step up to the plate and help out."

A meeting next week with city managers will be the first step in building a See Service, Page 7A

**Vigil remembers the victims of domestic abuse**

SANFORD — Lillie Henderson presided over Thursday's memorial program dedicated to people who lost their lives as a result of domestic violence — a crime Henderson knows a lot about.

Henderson, Safehouse of Seminole outreach program manager, was in an abusive relationship for almost a decade. Her husband beat her throughout their seven-year marriage; and, when she decided to leave him, he tried to kill her.

"I am a religious person, and I didn't believe in divorce," Henderson said. "But, then I realized I was going to die, so I had to leave him."

Henderson is a survivor. However, more than 4,000 women each year are murdered by someone with whom they are in an intimate relationship. In 1999, 37 percent of all women who sought care in hospital emergency rooms for violence-related injuries were victims of domestic abuse.

Thursday's memorial was about remembering those who fell victim to domestic violence and didn't survive. However, it was also held to educate the

community during Domestic Violence Awareness Month about society's violent cycle.

"It is a vicious cycle we want to intercept," Safehouse Executive Director Karen Larkey said. "No one is spared with the damage it inflicts."

Nationally, estimates indicate more than 3.9 million women are physically abused

each year. Since 1995, domestic violence reported incidents in Seminole County have increased more than 20 percent, and during the past six years, there have been almost a dozen reported murders in Seminole and almost 200 in Florida due to domestic violence.

On Oct. 15, a Longwood

woman, 29-year-old Amy Lohrmann, was reportedly killed by her husband, who shot her and then killed himself. According to co-workers, Lohrmann was in the process of leaving her husband.

"We all wish we could do something to change what

**One woman injured after walking into U.S. 17/92**

SANFORD — A disaster was averted early Wednesday morning when a DeLand driver swerved on U.S. Highway 17-92 to only give a "glancing blow" to a Sanford pedestrian.

Tim Bryan, 38, was in his maroon Pontiac Grand Am on his way home from work in Casselberry at approximately 12:30 a.m. when he said the car in front of him swerved to narrowly miss Lora Dillon, 35, as she was crossing the highway near the north corner of 13th Street.

Bryan was unable to avoid Dillon, as she struck and broke the right headlight, passenger side mirror and window on the vehicle. Sanford police officers and firefighters worked the scene as the county's Air Rescue 3 helicopter landed near the country-western bar, the Barn, and transported Dillon to Orlando Regional Medical Center.

"I was coming home from work, and the light was green," Bryan said as recollected the mishap only minutes after it happened. "It was all of a sudden. I swerved with everything I had. All I know is I'm driving I-4 from now on out."

Sanford police traffic officers Bill Crapps and Bill Erwin

**Tots raise \$2,000 biking for hospital**

LAKE MARY — It wasn't exactly Interstate 4, but the parking lot at Markham Woods Presbyterian Church Pre-School had a few traffic jams Thursday when a group of 3-year-olds got behind the handlebars to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

**Schools celebrate Red Ribbon Week**

SANFORD — Red Ribbon Week took Seminole schools by storm last week with thousands of students learning that it is OK to say no to drugs.

In its thirteenth year, the week was proclaimed by Congress in 1988 in response to several school parent associations outraged at the killing and destruction caused by alcohol and drugs not only in America, but at the root of drug problem as well.

On Feb. 7, 1985 a 37-year old US Drug Enforcement Administration Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena was kidnapped in Mexico and was never seen alive again.

One month later his body was found in a shallow grave outside Michoacan, Mexico. He had been tortured, beaten and brutally murdered. Camarena was thought to be close to uncovering a multi-million

drug ring in Mexico. His death marked the beginning of a national effort to focus attention on the dangers of drug abuse.

"Kids hear negative things all the time through TV. This helps reinforce the positive things," said Sanford police Chief Brian Tooley about the significance of the Red Ribbon Week.

Tooley, Sgt. Mike Taylor and School Resource Officer Claudia Webber gathered at Bentley Elementary Thursday to judge anti-drug decorated classroom doors. The Bentley school appearance was just one of a handful Sanford police made last week as they showed their support for the schools' efforts in promoting the Red Ribbon Week.

According to Bentley guidance counselor Andrea Boyd, teachers ingeniously introduced some of the anti-drug

**Regatta organizers expect 1,000 participants to row into Sanford**

SANFORD — The Heritage Festival has been canceled, but the regatta will go on.

Originally billed as the Heritage Festival Regatta, the Head of Lake Monroe Regatta is

scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 10, from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. The one-day event will be held on the shores of Lake Monroe and will include high school, college and master level competitors.

"Due to the tragedies of Sept. 11, 2001, the Heritage Festival scheduled during the Veteran's

Day weekend was canceled," said Ezra Simmons of Mitty Events LLC. "However, in honor of the veterans who fought for our freedom, and as a symbol of our American resolve, the regatta will go on."

Mitty Events, the organizer of the regatta, also plans to donate

a portion of the proceeds from the event to the Sept. 11 Fund. Greenberg-Traurig, Attorneys at Law, and The Colonades at On Top of the World, who are the event's presenters, will contribute to the fund.

According to Simmons, about 1,000 competitors are expected to

participate in the classic "Head Race" style rowing regatta. Three of the four fastest single scullers in the southeast and the second fastest in the country are also registered for the event.

## Searching for courage to speak out about rape

**DEAR ABBY:** About six months ago, I was at a friend's house. We were drinking heavily, and I started getting dizzy, so I went to lie down in her guest bedroom. She was already asleep.

The next thing I knew, her boyfriend was in there with me. He started taking my clothes off. I begged him to stop, but he wouldn't. I was so drunk I didn't have the strength to fight him off. I begged him to leave me alone, but he wouldn't. He raped me. I finally passed out and woke the next morning hoping it had been a dream. It wasn't. I was still naked and had bruises where he had held my wrists. I left without saying a word and have told no one else. My girlfriend still calls, but I hang up. I need to tell her, but I don't know how. I also need to tell my family, but I can't because I'm afraid they will say I deserved it for going over there and getting drunk. I know I didn't deserve what he did to me. It has taken me this long to figure that out.

The pain has begun to fade, but the fear of him is still there. Abby, please help me find the courage to finally speak up and tell everyone about it.

**SCARED AND ALONE IN BRITTON, MICH.**

**DEAR SCARED AND ALONE:** The penalty for having too much to drink should be a nasty hangover, not rape. You did not deserve what happened to you. I'm only sorry you waited so long to speak out about the assault. With fresh bruises and the evidence that could have been collected at that time, you would have had proof of your rape, and your attacker could have been jailed for his crime. Also, you could have begun therapy immediately to help you place the blame where it belonged — on the rapist — and saved yourself long months of undeserved guilt.

However, it is not too late to get the counseling and emotional support you need. Pick up the phone and ask "Information" for the number of the nearest rape hotline. You will find that you are not alone and are not "guilty" of any crime. Once you understand that, telling your family and the girl whose boyfriend attacked you will be much easier.

### A Duty to Keep Sanford should ensure Sunland Estates residents aren't negatively affect by new apartment complex

Residents in Sunland Estates have a beef with the city of Sanford, and though they live just outside the city limits, it's time for City Hall to take notice. The city allowed a new apartment complex, Wyndham Place, to be built next to Sunland Estates. Work on the structures is not yet finished and few residents have moved in, but already Sunland residents are being negatively affected by the apartments: the buildings are taller than originally proposed, drainage problems have been amplified, traffic has become more congested, and the developer has broken promises.

Some of the residents' concerns can't be addressed. For one, the apartments aren't going anywhere, nor will the building heights be lowered. The owner exercised his property rights to propose, and once approved by the city, build apartments. Whether they like it or not, the residents will have to accept that their neighbor to the north is an apartment complex.

But the Sunland residents have property rights as well, and they shouldn't have to accept negative consequences simply because they're county residents. The city has a responsibility to make sure that doesn't happen, and to that end, the city should:

- Meet with Sunland residents to address their concerns.
- Find ways to minimize drainage problems, recognizing these problems existed in Sunland Estates prior to apartments. The subdivision was built in the 1950s when stormwater retention was not a part of the planning process, so correcting all of today's drainage problems is not the responsibility of the apartment complex. However, several feet of fill-dirt was brought on site to raise the topography, which consequently raises residents' concerns about drainage on their property. The city has yet to offer more than a cursory assurance that these concerns are unfounded.

• Address traffic concerns. Apartment residents traveling south on U.S. 17/92 can't turn left into the complex because there is no median cut. Residents and visitors to the complex must make a U-turn at the entrance of Sunland Estates, and that's the rub. U-turns, though legal, are more dangerous, along this busy stretch of 17/92. In addition, increased traffic at the intersection — conservatively put at 400 additional cars per day — will cause deadly traffic conflicts as motorists take more risks to minimize dramatically longer wait times to turn.

• Withhold Certificates of Occupancy (CO) for the remain units at Wyndham Place until trees are planted, drainage problems are addressed, and retaining walls are built according to the development order. It is a drastic measure to withhold COs but once they're issued, it's hard to force the developer to correct problems. Furthermore, this developer has shown a blatant disregard for following the city's instructions. The 25-foot canopy trees used for buffering have not been planted despite the fact that apartment residents are already moving in. Additionally, the developer tried to cut corners by substituting a Styrofoam wall covered with stucco when the development order clearly called for a block wall. Until the developer lives up to his agreements, the city should refuse to issue any more COs.

The city is not the only entity with responsibilities. The Seminole County Commission is the elected representative body to which Sunland residents can address their concerns. Specifically, District 5 Commissioner Daryl McLain should take the lead in this situation. Residents say they've called McLain and he hasn't responded. McLain says he hasn't received a request from residents to meet with him and any calls he has received have been forwarded to the appropriate county staff member.

Whatever the case, McLain needs to do a better job of communicating with his constituents when they call his office with a problem. Forwarding problems to staff members with the technical abilities to create a solution is only part of McLain's job. He must also communicate how the process is working to constituents who are often unfamiliar with the interworkings of local government. It doesn't need to be a full-blown civics class, but rather a short phone call advising the constituent he's aware of the problem and what action he has taken to solve it.

No one likes bad neighbors. The city and McLain should work with Sunland residents to ensure Wyndham Place doesn't become one.

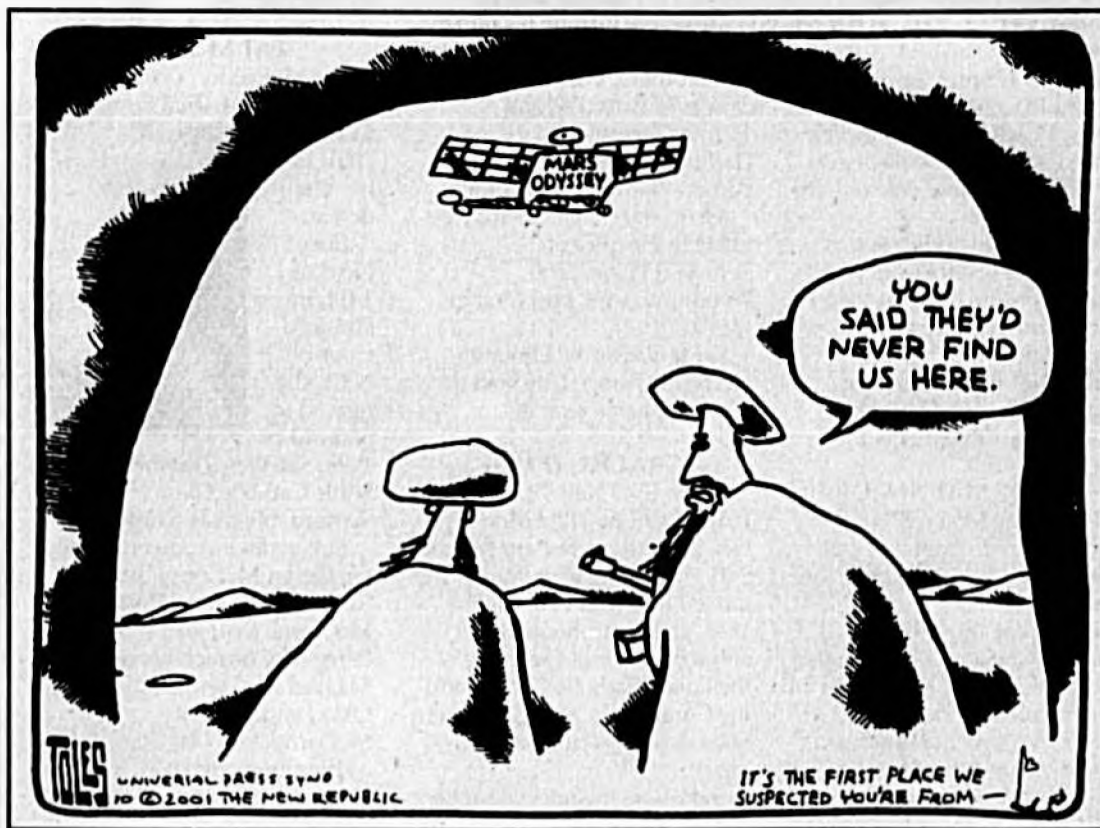

### Sanford resident doesn't agree with current war

To the editor:  
The *Herald* last month published a local pastor's sermon which was headlined, "God Bless America." In it, he presented a justification for Christians' support of the U.S. war on terrorism, citing the six principles of the Christian Doctrine of the Just War, and explaining how they applied to the present situation.

I write because this view should not stand unchallenged. The Rev. Jones mentions that some Christians hold the position of pacifism, and he himself says support for war "can seem confusing" given the various Scriptural admonitions on how Christians should act. Indeed, it can. I hope that, as the horrors of this military action become more apparent, American church people, as well as those of other beliefs, will examine their beliefs on the question of war and nonviolence. There is a long history of opposition to war and of advocacy of nonviolence. The early Christians were clear about this. Mohandas Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in our own time led political movements based upon nonviolence. There are more recent examples of "People Power" in the Philippines and Eastern Europe.

President Bush deserves credit for responding quickly and vigorously to the tragedy of Sept. 11. But, his "war" should have included all the elements

for dealing with terrorism except the military one. And, given the baggage the U.S. carries with many whom we seek in a coalition, the United Nations should have been asked to take the lead.

My sense of patriotism does not extend to support for our government's all too frequent abuse of its power. America can get away with this arrogance because we are the "800-pound gorilla" in military power. Some maintain that there is no connection between the sins of American foreign policy and the existence of the evil of worldwide terrorism. I disagree. In my lifetime, in addition to the debacles of Korea and Vietnam, we've had the adventures in Panama and Grenada ("training missions" some in the military called them), Nicaragua and the Gulf War (a thinly-disguised mission to protect our oil supply). And, an unbalanced response to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Many of us have protested these actions over the years.

Did our country deserve the destruction being wrecked upon us by terrorists? No, indeed! Is revenge, and continuation by us of the cycle of violence, the right response? I believe not. Are we complicit in our own suffering, by past failures? I believe so. Our policies should include acknowledgment of that reality, and efforts to avoid creating a new generation of multitudes who hate us. I was pleased to hear recently a forthright statement by the widow of the late President Sadat of Egypt, that America is hated largely because of our failure to deal fairly with the Palestine question. We should listen to our friends.

"Our country, right or wrong. When right, to be kept right; when wrong, to be put right." (Carl Schurz in a speech to the U.S. Senate on Jan. 17, 1872)

War is not the way to put it right. Jesus said, "Blessed are the peacemakers; for they shall be called the children of God." (Matthew 5:9) He did not bless warmakers. God is love. War is blasphemy.

### Managing growth comes with price

To the editor:  
Clearly most local communities want a better handle on growth and an end to urban sprawl. As a past member of the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission and former gubernatorial appointee to the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, I have heard both of these points expressed loudly and clearly literally hundreds of times. In Seminole County, the sentiment is all but universal.

As an attorney whose practice focuses on land use, eminent domain and commercial litigation, I know our communities have the capacity to achieve our growth management, but the answers are not easy. Growth management costs money. Property owners who are the targets of growth management

rightfully deserve and expect to be compensated for loss of property value as a result of growth management. It's a right every homeowner understands. Florida recognizes that right in its constitution, and we have enacted significant enabling legislation to protect that right.

On the other hand, the vast majority of homeowners in Seminole County see urban sprawl as a major threat in our community, our property values and what is in most ways an enviable lifestyle. In that respect, we're no different from the majorities in most urban areas in this state.

But the legislature has so far chosen a different path. There is a conflict on the horizon, and if it's not a defining issue in the 2002 elections, it will be in 2004.

The call for sound growth management breeds conflict between all Floridians. Most conservative legislators see their role as protecting the investment-backed expectations of property owners; while homeowners see growth and urban sprawl as the principal causes of rising taxes and deteriorating school, roads and public services.

In the last legislative session, powerful and popular State Sen. Lee Constantine championed a growth management reform, yet despite his efforts no significant legislation saw the light of day. In the near future, we will see a real fight between local governments and our legislature. Declining economic indicators and reapportionment will take center stage during the next legislative session. Some experts are already forecasting a shortfall of as much as \$500 million next year. And the impact on Florida of the September 11 terrorist attacks is still yet to be determined.

The only solution is bold leadership in Tallahassee. The solution will come if we elect legislators with guts.

If homeowners and local officials want infill instead of sprawl, we will have to realize that there costs involved and budget accordingly. Our elected officials will have to have guts to recognize that change will come with a price tag, but it's one that is well worth paying.

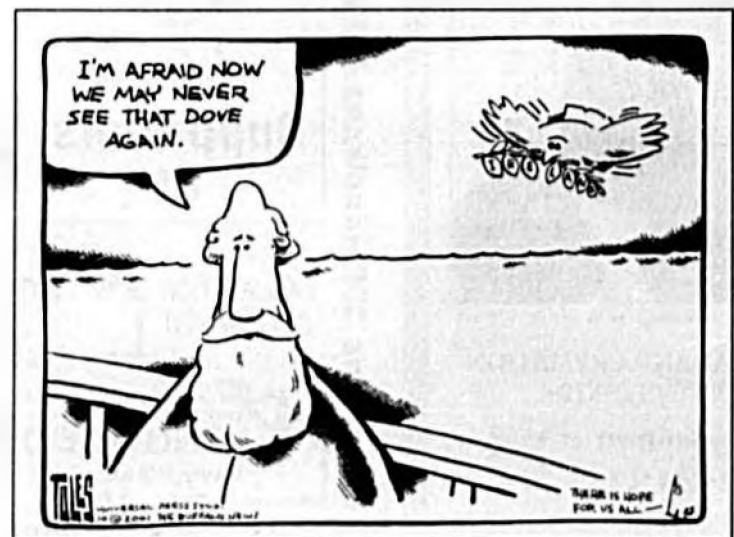
Any other approach will be either stopgap or ineffective.

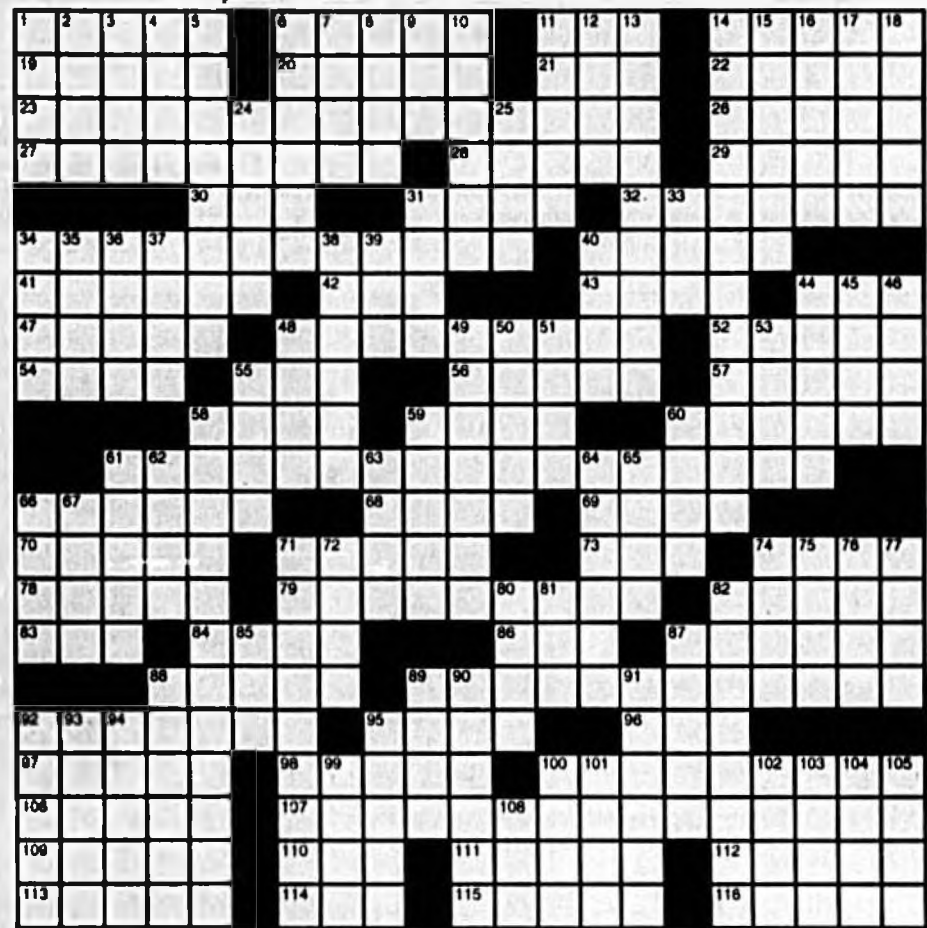

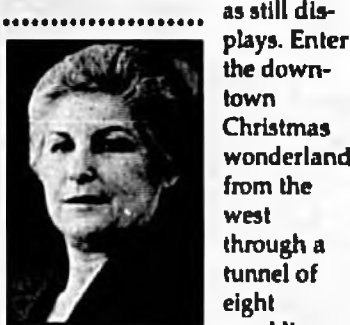

funding formula, said County Manager Kevin Grace.

"I don't think it will take very long to put something together," Grace said.

Another source of funding for added bus service could also come from new advertising on bus shelters. Commissioners discussed a plan to have a private company build, maintain and sell advertising on shelters. A request for proposals will be drafted by staff and then looked over by commissioners.

A new bus route will cost approximately \$400,000, but

there are several areas in the county that could benefit from an added bus service. Commissioners have expressed interest in adding service to the Lake Mary/Heathrow business area, Red Bug Lake Road and State Road 434.

Maloy pushed for a new laser route to serve the SCC Oviedo campus and UCF. Although UCF already has bus service and donates about \$50,000 to the county for mass transit, but Maloy said the added service could help a lot of people.

Suzanne Tesinski, dean of the SCC Oviedo campus, said she

hopes commissioners will have something in place by next fall semester.

"When we first opened we had about 10 students that walked about two miles to campus — that didn't last long," she said. "We're starting to get more and more UCF students taking classes at both places."

While its hard to judge exactly

happened to Amy Lohrmann," Larkey said Thursday. "But, maybe this event can prevent another tragedy from happening to someone else."

Larkey said plans are already under way to establish a memorial fund in Lohrmann's name to increase community awareness of domestic violence and its victims.

"We want to develop a wall to put faces to those who have gone before," she said. "They are not just numbers, they are people."

According to Seminole 18th Judicial Circuit Judge James Perry, domestic violence is not a

modern crime. As far back as the Roman empire, husbands had the legal right to beat their wives — with certain restrictions.

The saying, "rule of thumb," originated from an old English law, which restricted the size of a rod used by a husband to hit his wife, Perry said. The rod could be no wider than the thumb.

"What will end domestic violence?" Perry said. "Only time will tell. But, I believe all the problems we have in this country can be solved if we pay more attention to our children."

At the end of the memorial service, Henderson recited a

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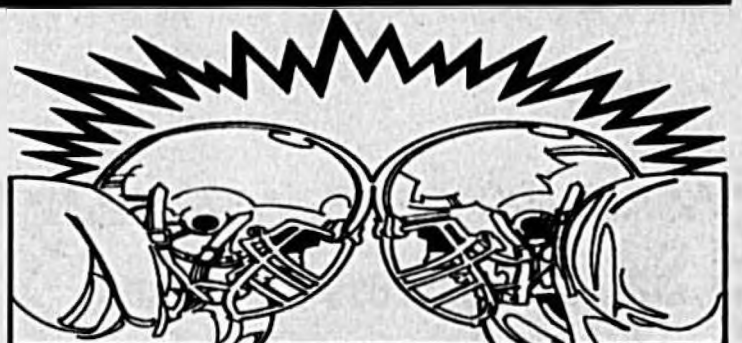

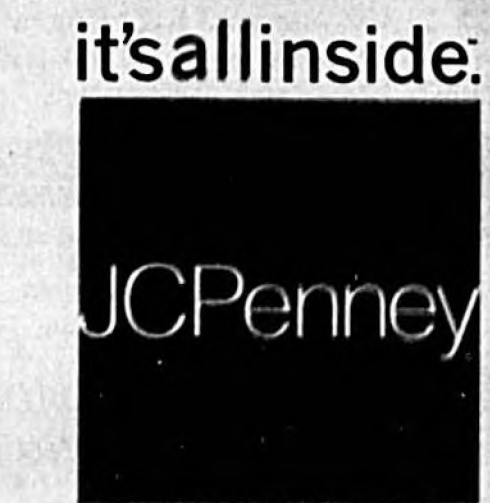

ORLANDO — University of Central Florida quarterback Ryan Schneider (Plantation High School) was named USATODAY.com Independent Player of the Week Monday as a result of his 28-of-39 passing performance for 355 yards and three touchdowns in last Saturday's 38-6 Homecoming victory over Louisiana-Monroe.

It is the second such honor this year for Schneider, who was also lauded for his 29-of-47, 297-yard performance in the season opener at Clemson.

Schneider, a sophomore, topped the 4,000-yard mark in career passing and moved into fifth place on UCF's all-time passing yardage list Saturday. He now has 4,208 passing yards and is also fifth in career touchdown passes with 30. He currently ranks 19th in the nation in total offense with an average of 264 yards per game.

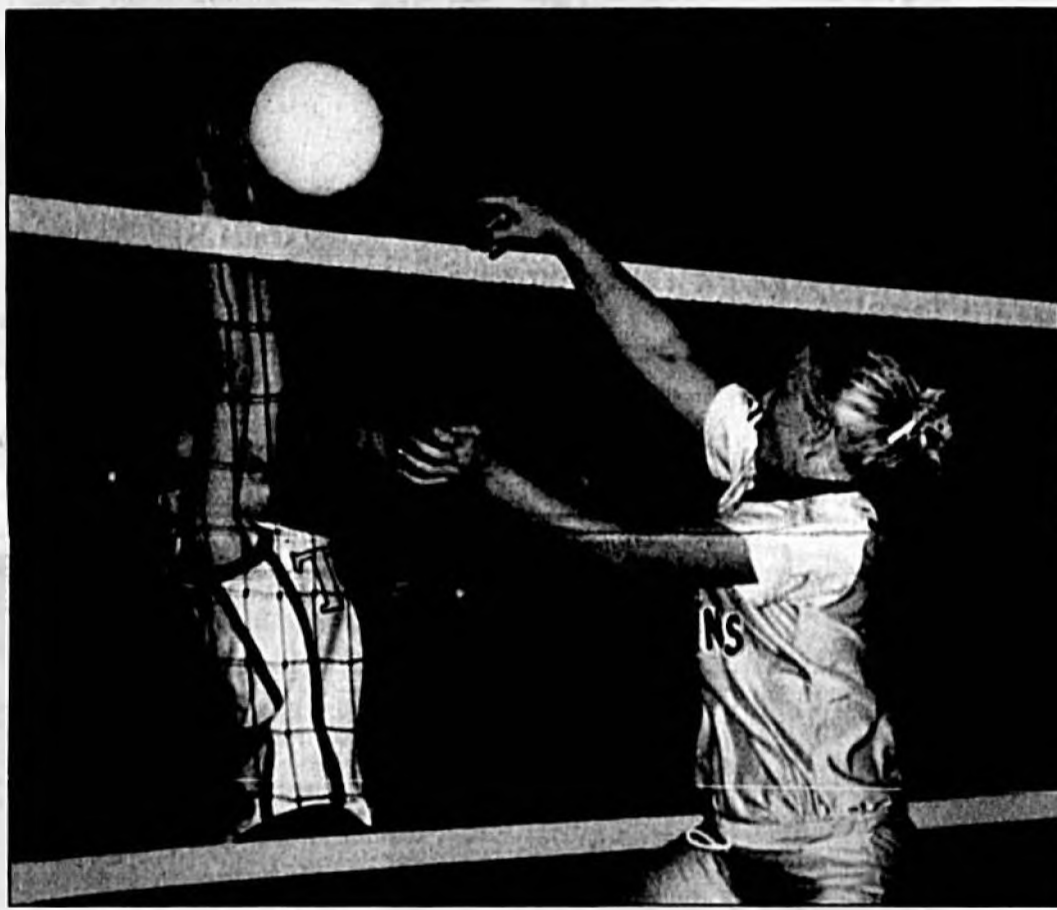

Class 5A-Region 2 will be played at the home of the Tuesday' Spruce Creek and Titusville (9-8) winner and they

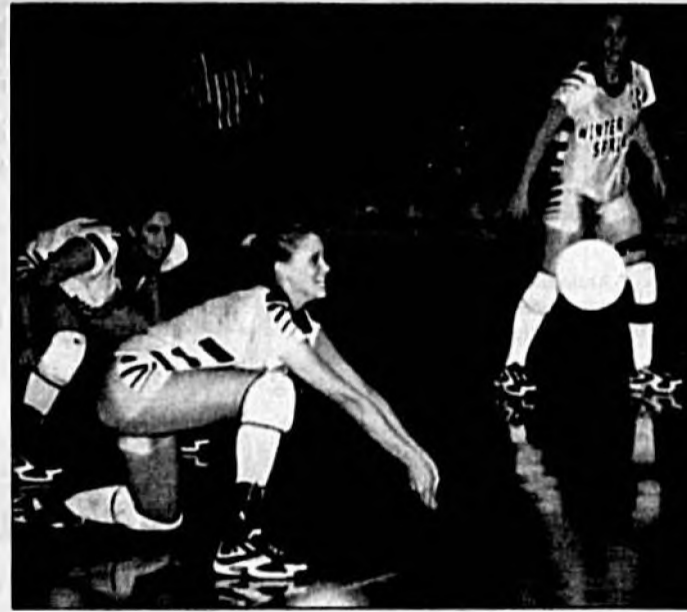

# United Sprint Car series ends 2001 season at Volusia Speedway Park

**BARBERVILLE** — Wild and exciting United Sprint Car Series (USCS) winged outlaw sprint car racing returns to Volusia Speedway Park this

weekend for the second annual USCS Dixie Sprint Car Nationals. Tonight's (Saturday) first sprint car race will be the Airflow Research "Power Dash" that showcases the top cars from

the previous USCS feature in an 'edge of your seat' six-car, six-lap shootout that will be the final chance to accrue points towards the Airflow Research "Super Power Dash" that pays up to \$10,000 and will be contested on Sunday night.

Heat races and a B-Main, last chance race, will follow before the star-studded sprint car field launches into the USCS Sunshine State Shootout 25 lap main event that will also serve as a qualifier for the final four open spots in the Airflow Research Super Power Dash.

The balance of the program will feature racing the VSP stock car divisions.

Sunday's program will feature the high stakes dash event and will also include qualifying heat races and a 12-lap B Main for the USCS sprint cars in addition to the championships in the stock car and mini sprint classes.

The weekend's action then wraps up with the 30 lap 2001 USCS Goodson Farms State Championship Race.

Seven-time National sprint car champion and current USCS Road to Indy national points leader Terry Gray will lead the USCS contingent along with Malabar's Kenny Adams, the 2000 USCS national champion, Winter Park's Red Stauffer, Adams' teammate who finished as national runner-up last year and was the 1997 USCS champion, and 1999 USCS champ Marshall Skinner from Arkansas.

Volusia Speedway Park is located 15 miles west of I-95 on Florida State Road 40 near Barberville. Gates open at 4 p.m. in the pits and for spectators at

5 p.m., with racing starting at 7 p.m. today (Saturday) and 6 p.m. on Sunday.

At Ray's Circus of Values, the folks don't clown around when it comes to low, low prices and a large selection of unique merchandise. The family owned business located at 211 East First Street in downtown Sanford opened for business one year ago, and has been part of the local business community for the past 11 years, said store owner Gail Siebold. Also working at the store is Bonnie Kookan, who has worked at Ray's for over eight years.

Like many of the businesses downtown, Ray's Circus of Values will participate in the Sanford Main Street Halloween Trick-or-Treat activities. Siebold will have her business decorated for the occasion, and she'll have plenty of candy to hand out to all the little ghosts and goblins.

The Trick-or-Treat event was started three years ago to provide children with a safe place to trick-or-treat. Last year, Main Street hand out more than 100,000 pieces of candy, but even that was not enough. Thanks to Siebold and Ray's Circus of values, volunteers were able to get-

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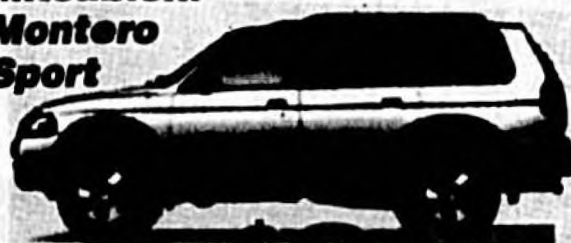

percent. Unfortunately, the average humidity in most homes is well below 40 percent, especially during winter months when heating systems are operating. When the surrounding air is dry, plants will often lose water from leaf tissues at a faster rate than can be absorbed through the root system. When this occurs, leaf tips become brown and flowering plants may lose flower buds. Humidity levels in the home can be increased by installing an inexpensive humidifier.

Humidity in the vicinity of plants can be improved by placing potted plants on a two or three inch bed of wet gravel. Water evaporating from the gravel increases the humidity around plants. The bottom of the plant pot should never be in or under the water, since this will cause a waterlogged soil which may result in root damage.

### Air Circulation

Good air circulation is necessary to the well being of plants, but, plants should be placed in draft-free locations. Areas where cross currents of air occur are not considered good for plants.

### Watering

When the soil remains saturat-

ed, root systems are unable to function properly because of lack of oxygen in the soil. More indoor plants die of overwatering than any other cause. Most plants should be watered when the potting mixture becomes dry to the touch and not watered on a regular schedule. The best way to determine when to water is to stick your finger into the mix up to the first joint; if it is dry at the finger tip, you need to water. Apply water from the top until it runs out of the bottom of the pot, this method of watering will wash excess salts out of the pot. Do not allow the pot to stand in water too long, always empty the drip saucer.

### Fertilization

Indoor plants do not need as much fertilizer as greenhouse plants. Also, rapid new growth is often undesirable, as plants may outgrow their containers. As a general rule, actively growing plants should be fertilized every two or three months.

## Seminole students win poster, essay contest

Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger welcomed the 12 poster winners of the 2002 Drug-Free Calendar to his office Wednesday for an uplifting photo shoot.

Siena Barkan, a fifth-grader at Longwood Elementary School, and Angie Fowble, an eighth-grader at Greenwood Lakes Middle School, captured the grand prizes Oct. 21 as a panel of community leaders selected the first-, second- and third-place winners at the State Attorney's Office in Sanford.

Nearly 3,000 posters and several hundred essays were submitted by children in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades of Seminole's public and private schools. In its eighth year, the project is a cooperative effort that helps reinforce the anti-drug campaign during Red Ribbon Week. The program is headed by State Attorney Norman Wolfinger and Eslinger, and participated in by Seminole Public Schools, the Seminole County Red Ribbon Committee, Students Working Against Tobacco (SWAT), and a number of community agencies.

"Every year it gets better," Wolfinger said about the calendar that develops positive peer pressure to help students say no to drugs.

Wolfinger actually started the idea for the drug free calendar years ago when he visited a national conference of state attorneys. He said a Baltimore state attorney told him of the drug free calendar and he utilized it in Seminole and Broward counties. The primary difference he said was he uses confiscated drug money to support the calendar.

"This brings it beyond the school room and in to the home," Wolfinger said. "It helps initiate discussions about drugs, and good choices and bad choices. It sends a solid message that drugs are not a good choice."

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## Plants don't always thrive when grown inside home

Plants grown indoors are often referred to as "house-plants." But, the plants we use

indoors usually lack sufficient light and humidity to grow well. This is because the environment in many homes is not conducive to growing plants. These adverse

growing conditions are often a problem to the homeowner who needs to learn how to select plants to fit the growing conditions in the home. Here are some tips for growing plants indoors.

### Light

Plants differ greatly in their light intensity requirements. Plants with highly colored leaves, such as coleus and croton, and flowering plants and succulents grow best when placed in an area where they receive full sunlight. Others like ferns, philodendrons, and many other foliage plants grow well with indirect light. Artificial lighting can be used to supplement or replace natural light.

Plants always turn their foliage and flowers toward the light. So, it is necessary to give a half turn to your plants once a week to keep their growth in balance.

### Temperature

A day temperature of 65 degrees to 75 degrees, and approximately 10° F lower at night, is satisfactory for most plants. The 10 degree drop at night enables plants to build new tissues. Plants grown in continuously high temperatures often become spindly and less resistant to disease and insect attack.

Temperatures below 50 degrees for extended periods may cause permanent damage to many plants. Wilting often results, followed by yellowing of leaves, and then leaf drop. Avoid placing plants in hot or cold spots.

### Humidity

Most plants grow best at a relative humidity of 40 to 60

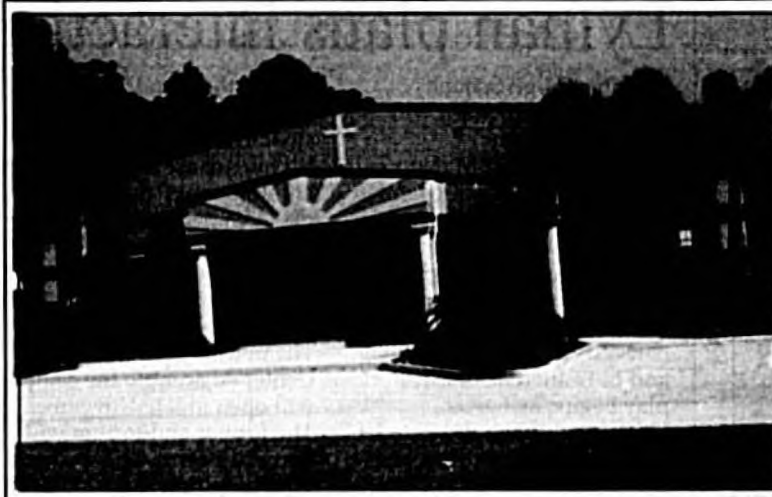
