Stricken Section In Form Of Triangle And Includes Some Of Richest Trunking And Citrus Land in State

TAMPA, Fla., Sept. 21.—(AP)—South Florida today was burying its dead, caring for its refugees and preparing to rebuild its devastated towns following the West Indian hurricane that crossed the lower part of the state Saturday night.

The worst damage was found in a section forming a triangle with the west shore of Lake Okechobee as its apex and the west Gulf coast from Tampa to Fort Myers as its base...

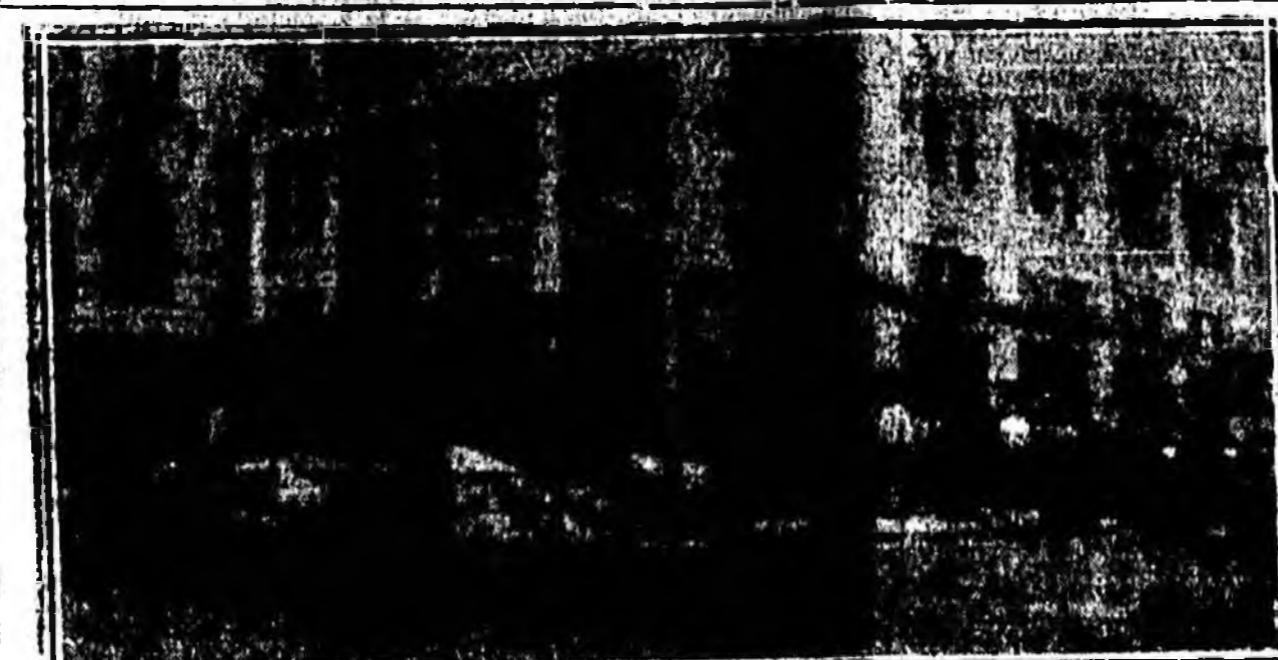

Hollywood is hit hard by the storm. The small villages that lined the Dixie Highway, all of them resembling shell towns, were in a state of confusion. The Dixie Highway, which runs through Hollywood, looked as though it had been swept clean.

When the troop convoy first struck Miami, it proceeded directly to the courthouse where Maj. Stevens and Capt. Park went into conference with the city commission and the mayor. The men were stationed opposite the courthouse and stayed there throughout the morning. In the afternoon Hollywood Company D was placed on guard duty and the medical detachment took charge of the military government and the hospital. Maj. Stevens and Capt. Park were detailed for duty at the hospital. Over 400 were injured in Miami. Maj. Stevens told me that at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon the streets were not yet open to traffic. At 12 o'clock as I was sitting on the back of a truck across from the courthouse, writing a story for The Herald, Maj. Stevens came over and told me to hop in, that we were going to Miami. He told me that the way I finally got over was the first newspaperman to visit the beach.

I hope that never again will I have to witness such a sight as that which we beheld in Miami Beach. It was not enough coming from the city, but the damage to the beach was estimated. The water front has taken on a grotesque appearance. The pleasure craft, coast guard boats, and ships of all kinds are high and dry along the shore. Hollywood Hit Hardest By Storm

In Royal Palm Park, one block from the water's edge, a large steamer lay on its side, and scattered about the tall royal palms were a number of smaller craft.

Scarcely a building in the city remained undamaged, while every piece of glass in the area is reported to have been broken.

Hollywood, located 17 miles north of Miami, was said to present the most pitiful scene in the hurricane area. Scattered about the beach were the remains of buildings, and the streets were a mass of wreckage. Many of the houses were completely demolished. The once magnificent houses were now mere ruins.

At Fort Lauderdale, where the death toll reached 19, seven thousand persons were in the district the day yesterday in bread lines and fed by local and outside relief agencies. Six hundred injured were said to be packed into three structures left intact by the hurricane. Twenty of these are not expected to live.

Progresso, a suburb of Fort Lauderdale, was reported totally destroyed. Two thousand persons were made homeless, and no check-up of the possible dead and injured has been attempted.

Newspapermen, who flew over the devastated area in airplanes, compare the scene to the shell-torn sectors of France and Belgium during the world war. They found giant palms, towering pines and large oaks snapped off, unrooted and strewn about in a tangled mass of wreckage.

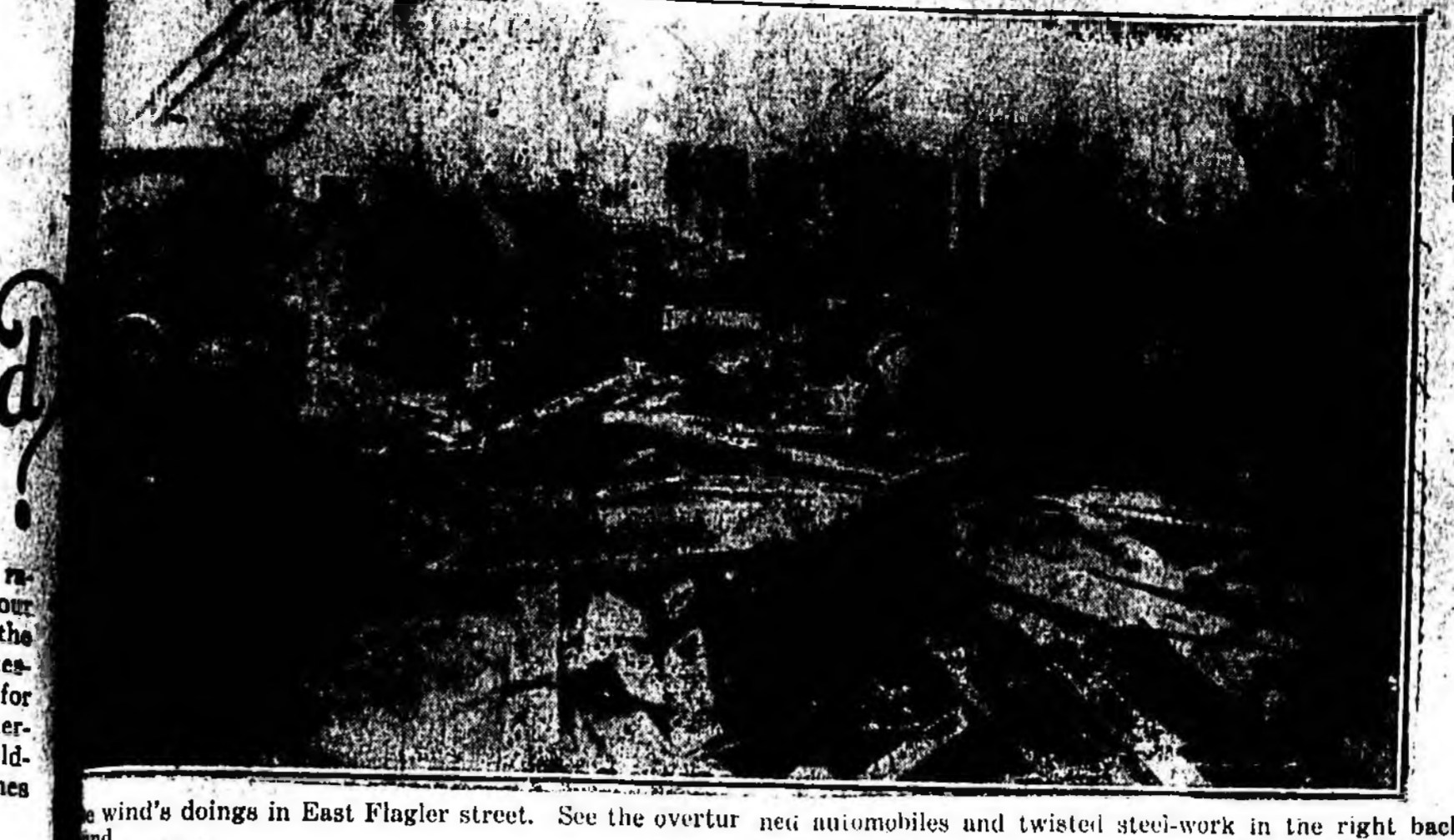
