SEMINOLE COUNTY - With three hurricanes and a tropical storm in the Atlantic, one already bearing down on the southern tip of the state, emergency management personnel are swinging into action in Seminole County.

Residents of Monroe County (the Florida Keys) began evacuating their homes and heading north on Wednesday. Those from the southern reaches of the mainland peninsula will be coming this way as early as today.

"They're coming this way," said Wolfgang Halbig, safety director for Seminole County Public Schools who is coordinating the opening of five public shelters in the county. "A lot of people leave their homes and just head for the center of the state. We've got to be ready for them."

Emergency management planners met this morning in Seminole County to work out a plan for dealing with the guests who are expected to fill the shelters at Winter Springs, Lake Mary and Lyman high schools and at English Estates Elementary School. A site is being pre-

pared for possible use at Highlands Elementary School for those people with special needs.

"We need to all get on the same sheet of music so we're singing the same song when we go out there to do our jobs," said Ken Roberts, director of the Seminole County Department of Public Safety.

The shelters will be ready to open by this afternoon, but they will probably not accept their temporary residents until Friday.

Sanlando United Methodist church, in Longwood, is accepting families with pets.

Hurricane Georges, the first of the storms in the line headed for the state, has got emergency workers hopping already.

John Blackwood, manager of the county's Department of Emergency Management, said the Red Cross is having trouble finding managers for their shelters. They will need 100 managers in Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties before the end of the weekend. So far, they have between 25 and 30.

Most of those who evacuate to this area, Seminole County Fire Chief Terry Schenk said, will be coming from

the Tampa area.

According to Jack Wert, director of tourism for the Seminole County Convention and Visitors Bureau, as of 4 p.m. Wednesday, most Seminole County hotels were reporting they were full the next few days, but that the weekend "looked okay."

Wert said disaster preparedness officials would be working with hotel managers to open up their ballrooms and meeting rooms to evacuees, if necessary.

Henry Danish, general manager of the Homewood Suites, said occupancy of the Lake Mary hotel went from 25 percent to 100 percent within four hours Wednesday.

"We have had a very large amount of reservations," Danish said.

The hotel, which also housed the largest amount of firefighters during the summer firestorm, is sold out.

Danish said the hotel is, as it did for the firefighters, offering special rates for the hurricane evacuees.

Terry White, of the Marina Hotel and Conference Center in Sanford, said the hotel has several reservations for this evening and they expect more.

Melissa's story Woman struggles after fiances' shooting death

SANFORD - Melissa is 23-years-old and pregnant with the child of a man who was shot to death 12 days ago.

Her hazel eyes are still watering.

"She isn't sure what she is going to do and what is to become of the child who has no daddy."

"Every day there are more and more WHYS, more and more WHAT WILL WE DO'S," Melissa said.

Melissa, who asked her last name not be used, was engaged to Paul Kafka, a 23-year-old who was killed in his car on a Saturday night in the Washington Oaks section of Sanford. Maurice Williams, a varsity football player at Winter Springs High School, admitted to police that he shot Kafka. He is now in custody.

"When Maurice walked up to Paul's car and killed him, not only was Paul's life destroyed but so were all of his friends, family and loved ones," Melissa said. "How can a boy, 17, be so thoughtless and uncaring to be able to decide to take another person's life." Melissa said.

City keeps citizens informed on issues

SANFORD - Everything residents wanted to know about key issues in the city will now be available through a public information service at the city manager's office.

The city so far has published literature regarding the upcoming Fort Mellon Park referendum and concerns surrounding the old gas plant. The information included in the packets is garnered from a variety of sources, said Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp.

"I call these answers to common questions," VanDerworp said. "It's my policy to get information out on major issues."

The information on the referendum is especially important, he said, because the public should have all the facts before they vote in November.

The fate of Fort Mellon Park has been the subject of controversy for the past year, since it was identified as part of the


prime site for a proposed hotel/conference center along the lakefront. The project has been opposed by a citizens group, that wants the developer and the city to consider another location. Another group, consisting mostly of local business owners, supports the project. City officials decided to leave it up to the voters whether the park is included in the site plan.

"This is the first big issue that we are addressing this way," VanDerworp said, adding that with all the misinformation circulating about the hotel/conference complex, it was essential to get out the facts.

People are in almost every day asking for information on the park, he said.

Commonly asked questions are highlighted in both packets, he said, which are available in the city manager's office. His staff will also provide updates to the city's 36,264 residents through mailers, a quarterly report and an annual report.

The Make Health A Habit Walk-A-thon will be co-sponsored by area chapters of the Links, Inc. Both the Orlando and Altamonte Links Chapters will participate. They will be joined by the Orlando Chapter of Jack & Jill of America, Inc.

The Links, Inc. is a national organization of professional African American women with more than 10,000 members who are affiliated with over 250 chapters in 39 states, the Bahamas and Frankfurt, Germany.

The Links, Inc. was founded in Philadelphia, Pa. on Nov. 9, 1946 by women who sought to improve their communities through cultural, educational and civic activities. Recently, the Links, Inc. donated over two million dollars to charitable organizations including the United Negro College Fund. The local chapters address national objectives through services to youth, sponsorship of activities designed to promote human welfare and eradicate second-class citizenship, a focus on the arts, and responding to international trends and events which might impact African Americans and African people. The way we were: More on the Milane Theatre

This is a continuation of information on the Milane Theatre which was published last week. Its grand opening was on Aug. 2, 1923.

It was announced on Aug. 15, 1923 that the Milane Theatre would soon be showing a film depicting Sanford scenes. In the film, nearly all of the larger buildings of the city were shown along with street scenes and other pictures. The high school and primary schools were said to be so clear that each scholar was easily recognized. The different clubs of the city and many other interesting views were also clearly shown. It was stated that the value of the film as an advertising tool would be great.

During the Kiwanis Club meeting held that week, it was announced that Mr. Rossiter would represent the club at a meeting in Huntsville, Ala. on Aug. 21 and he would try to make arrangements to show the Sanford movie in a Huntsville Theater on that date. Evidently the Sanford club had had the film made.

The Kiwanis directors decided to show this picture at the Milane on Aug. 30-31 and also put on a vaudeville program at that time. In a later article, no mention was made of a vaudeville program; instead the program would include the film "The Man Who Played God" starring George Arliss, a country store with a wide variety of prizes and a good comedy.

The Kiwanis Club would receive the entire benefit and the proceeds would be used for the good of the community.

The first amateur entertainment since the theater's opening was performed Aug. 23. Little Miss Martha Fitts gave a Balloon Dance which the audience appreciated and voted her the second prize. First prize was given to John and Bernard Schirard who gave a cornet and saxophone duet.

There was a County Store Night on Aug. 23. Some of the donated prizes included an electric curling iron by J.M.

Gillon, electrical contractor; medicine cabinet by T.J. Miller and Son Furniture Store; two tickets to the Labor Day Celebration at Lake Monroe by the Milane Theatre; two weeks cleaning and pressing for one person by Sanford Steam Pressery; one hair trim and shave by McMillen's Barber Shop; one pair of silk hose by Churchwell's; one case of Chero-Cola by Chero-Cola Bottling Company.

One Sept. 25, 1923, the Russell Sisters opened a three-day engagement in a refined novelty "Visions of Splendor". It was stated with its own special scenery and electrical effects and came directly from Atlanta.

The night before had been Amateur Night with Miss Juanita Smith winning the first prize of \$5 with a neat little dancing act. Second prize was won by Miss Wema Graves who performed a dandy little song "I've Got the Mumps". Others on the program were Mrs. Gordon who sang two songs and a duet by the Schirard brothers.

A child's well equipped automobile was to be given away on Christmas Day to the boy or girl having the most votes. Each paid adult admission would earn 100 points and a child's admission would earn 50 points.

The Milane was the scene of a fall fashion show of women's apparel presented by Baumel's. It was in the form of a musical act and was enjoyed by the large and delighted audience.

Eleven of Sanford's beautiful girls wore gorgeous garments which were described in detail. The girls mentioned were Julia Zachary, Lillian Shinhol-

Agreement joins bus companies

Recently, the transportation company Lynx, serving Orange, Seminole, and Osceola counties, and Voltran, serving Volusia County, joined together to make the Volusia County-Orlando commute much less stressful with the introduction of the "No-Stress Express."

The "No-Stress Express" is a new commuter bus service that starts on Oct. 5. This new service will take passengers between Orange City and downtown Orlando. With an estimated 20,000 people coming from Volusia County each day, the service also promises to be a huge success.

The "No-Stress Express" is part of an interlocal agreement that is designed to help motorists avoid the highway high anxiety. Participants in this event celebrated with a ribbon cutting ceremony, on Sept. 11, and luncheon. Also celebrated in the event was the cooperation between the two transportation companies.

FDOT, the Florida Department of Transportation and METRO-PLAN Orlando, the regional authority on transportation coordination and planning, also took part in the event. The project was co-funded by Volusia County and FDOT who gave matching funds. This will keep the project going to two years.

The "No-Stress Express" plans to make five trips in the morning between 6 and 8 a.m. and five in the evening between 4 and 6 p.m. Following the first week which is free, the fare is \$2 a trip, each way. Kenneth R. Fischer, Voltran's General Manager welcomed representatives from Orange, Seminole and Osceola counties to the event.

Fischer explained how this project came about because of the Interstate-4 congestion. Lynx Executive Director Leo Augher was also on hand to say a few words. "In the year and a half I've been here in the Orlando area, I've seen bumper to bumper traffic increase."

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has sent representatives to Puerto Rico and to the Virgin Islands to assess the damage on those islands. While minimal destruction was reported in the Virgin Islands, the damage in Puerto Rico is being called severe with destruction being reported to homes and crops. Nearly all the major roads on the island are practically impassable because of the debris and 700,000 people are without water.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has been dispatched to Puerto Rico to help clear debris from the road to make relief efforts possible.

FEMA's office in Atlanta, which oversees the operations in Florida, is already operating 24-hours a day in preparation for a strike in Florida.

Behind Georges, hurricanes Ivan and Jeanne are churning in the Caribbean and in the Atlantic and Tropical Storm Karl is beginning to pick up steam.

While emergency planners are opening shelters,

citizens can help out those who have already been hit by the hurricane.

The American Red Cross is accepting financial donations. Checks should be made out to the Red Cross and earmarked for Caribbean Crisis Relief.

Second Harvest Food Bank is accepting food donations, but representatives said they have enough water. Goodwill Industries is taking in clothing and furniture. The Salvation Army is accepting donations of food and water.

Seminole County residents interested in getting information about relatives in the Caribbean who might have been affected by Georges' rampage can call the American Red Cross at (407) 332-8200 between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to make an inquiry about specific individuals.

"Did he think he would get away with what he has done?"

To walk up to a car and kill someone while they are sitting there looking at you, insisting that they have no money, is nothing more than murder with a capital "M" and should be carried out with the highest level of capital punishment."

Melissa said she and Paul met when they were teenagers. They were friends but didn't pay much attention to each other until one day when they sat and talked under a palm tree. She had another relationship break up and had a son, who is now three.

Melissa and Paul would have their own child in early 1999.

"We picked names," she said. "If it were a boy he would be Paul Henry Kafka. If it were a girl, she would be Paula Jean Kafka."

Melissa was proud that Paul had been working the last half year at Metz Motors in Longwood. "He was about to make some good money. He was learning the trade from Mr. Metz, Paul was good and getting better."

Paul Metz said he was pleased, indeed. "Paul was a good young man. We liked him very much. I had him doing some paint work and learning all the things we do. We're devastated about what happened. Friday at work, it was 'see ya, Monday.'"

"But there was no Mon-

day..."

Melissa carried a poem that one of their friends had written about Paul's death - it was titled, "Reality."

"Why do people always kill? Do they really do it for a thrill?"

You people in the world need to realize that when you pull the trigger another person dies."

"None of us understand the meaning of this tragedy," Melissa said.

Bud Mullins, 17, was in the back seat of Paul Kafka's 228 Camaro when his cousin was shot. He said that Kafka was

"At first, everybody wanted to play," Richard said. "It's declined a little but that's because we had over 30 people



Downside of joint ownership explained

See doctor about weak knees

DEAR DR. GOTT: When I was a child, my uncle used to complain that he was weak-kneed. I thought this was a joke -- but now I'm 68 and it's no laughing matter. What could be causing this weakness in my knees and legs?



DEAR DR. GOTT: Being "weak-kneed" used to be a slang expression for being indecisive, so your uncle may not have meant his comment to be taken literally.

However, weak knees and legs, in the physical sense, is quite another matter. All people grow weaker with age, but severe or disabling weakness can be caused by many diseases, ranging from anemia and hematological disorders to cancer. I am not suggesting that your symptom is necessarily a consequence of a serious malady, but I do urge you to see your doctor for a diagnosis. You might have a treatable problem, or the physician may prescribe an exercise program to strengthen your lower extremities.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Three years ago at work, I severely strained my shoulder muscles. I can't seem to get rid of the pain. Am I stuck with this?

DEAR READER: Alas, you probably are. Once these muscles have been strained, they tend to remain tight and sore, because shoulder muscles are hard to splint.

— we use them every day. However, you might be helped by using ibuprofen now and then for the discomfort. More important, ask your doctor to refer you to a physical therapist for special exercises and other treatments.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I used to smoke but recently quit. Nonetheless, I am still somewhat short-of-breath. Are there exercises that might improve my lung capacity?

DEAR READER: People who stop smoking may experience continued difficulty breathing for several weeks or months, until the effects of the cigarette-induced lung inflammation have resolved. Most ex-smokers can anticipate a 10 to 20 percent improvement in respiratory ability — but not always. Be patient, let nature take its course and exercise moderately (and regularly). If you're not better in about six weeks, see your doctor for further advice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of gas, belching and heartburn, I was forced

DEAR READER: In my opinion, yes.

Fosomax can cause peptic distress, but your symptoms should not last as long as two months. Therefore, a specialist is in order. He will probably want to examine your stomach with a lighted tube in order to diagnose your ailment.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Not only in no-trump

Many inexperienced players think that the holdup play occurs only in no-trump contracts. They are wrong. It is just that a holdup in a suit contract is usually done for a different reason. As an example, on this deal, what is the correct declarer-play in four spades after West has led a low diamond to his partner's king? Perhaps you think that North should have raised only to three spades. However, when you know of at least a nine-card fit, always be happy to overbid a little. Nine trumps are much better than eight. The extra trump usually generates at least one more trick in the play. (Ten trumps are better than nine, but not by nearly as much as nine are better than eight.) Also, the good five-card suit, two kings and an ace all make that hand worth the jump to game. A heart start would surely have killed the contract. But West had an understandable aversion to leading from a jack. And the diamond lead would have been successful if South had won the first trick. After South draws trumps and takes the losing club finesse, East returns a low diamond to West's queen. Then a heart through dummy's king gives the declarer four tricks. However, South foresaw this possibility. So, he ducked the first trick. Now West couldn't get on lead for the heart switch. South won the diamond return, drew trumps, and took the club finesse, leaving East with no better defense than to cash the heart ace to stop the overtrick. Try to accommodate badly placed honors.
