**Vegetable Shipments Generally Increase At All State Markets**

**WINTER HAVEN (Special)**—Month-end commodity reports for March show total shipments in excess of 1,000,000 bushels units at the Pompano State Farmers Market; 4,718 units, valued at \$35,155.65 for Fort Pierce, which is just now starting on its Spring crop of 1,000 bushels units for \$14,125.00 and 20,572 units of vegetables for \$58,307.00 at Plant City. More than 9,000 lbs. poultry, plus 15,504 dozen eggs, together grossing in excess of \$9,400.00 were handled at the Dade City Market, while the Wauchula State Market sold 51,761 units for more than \$48,000.00.

The Florida City Market handled 178,001 units valued at more than a million dollars, and the Starke State Market sold 8,781 crates of strawberries valued at \$52,791.71, William L. Wilson, Director of State Markets, said in summing up some market activities for March.

"Tomatoes are steadily declining on the Florida City Market, but should last two or more weeks yet. Last week around 25,000 bushel field boxes brought around \$182,400. High for the period was \$13.10; average, \$6.92.

"Watermelons in a very limited supply appeared on the Immokalee State Market last week and cantaloupes are expected to follow, but as yet there are not sufficient quantities of either commodity to quote. Last week's sales of all commodities were 7,816 packages, grossing \$47,676.65, an increase of nearly 5,000 units and more than \$9,000 over the previous week. Cucumbers lead in volume and revenue and tomatoes came next. Several varieties of squash, beans, peppers, eggplant, black-eye and Crowder peas were available.

"Despite a 72-hour rain in the Sanford area, the Sanford Market had approximately a 10,000 unit increase over the previous week. Leading commodities were cabbage, celery, beans, corn, squash and cauliflower. Both growers and dealers experienced a rising market on practically all produce.

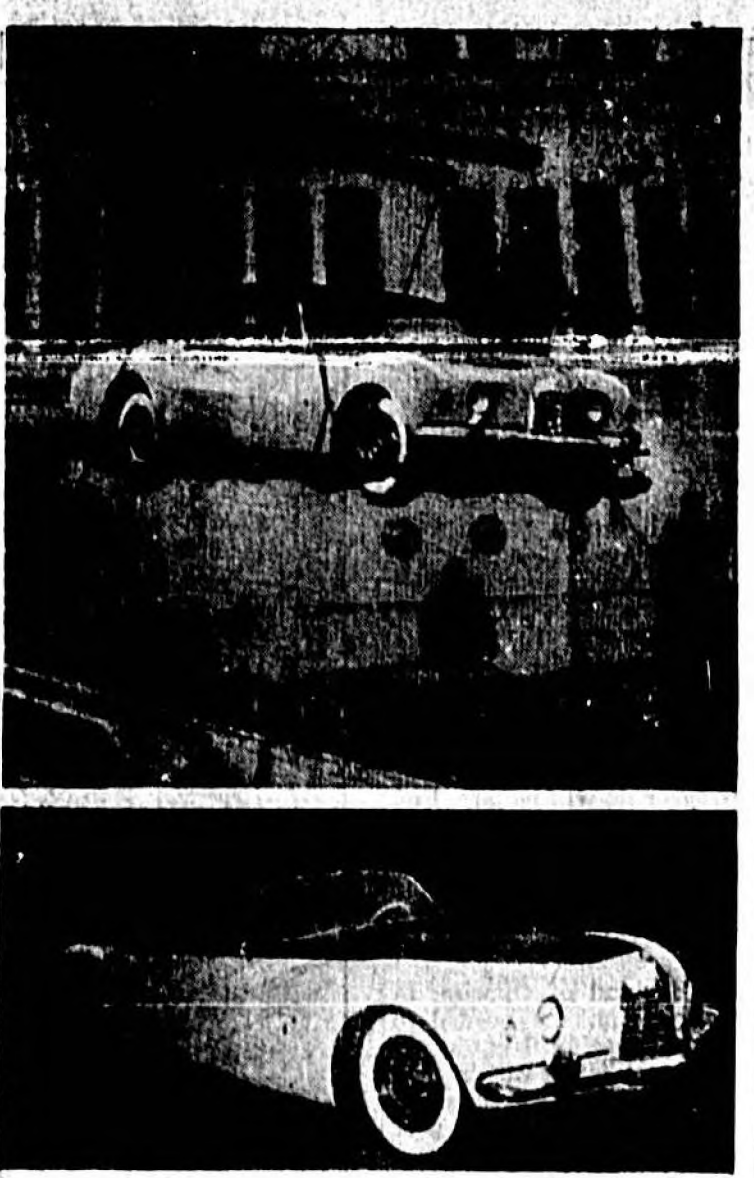
"Crops generally look good in the Palmetto area and very little damage resulted from the heavy rains of last week. A few farmers will start picking tomatoes this week and auction sales will begin next Monday, at which time there should also be a fair supply of Yellow Squash and Pole Beans moving.

"Beans and cucumbers at the Pompano State Market continue to decline steadily, however, eggplants and peppers should continue in light to fair supply for several weeks yet. Prices are satisfactory on most commodities and have shown increases, with few exceptions.

"Black Valentine and Contender beans made their first appearance on the Plant City Market last week, the former bringing from \$1.40 to \$2.50 per bushel hamper, and the latter \$2.50 to \$3.50. Bell pepper increased in volume, with fancy peppers selling for \$7.90 to \$10.50 per bushel hamper. Yellow Crooked Neck squash decreased in volume due to the heavy rains but an all-time high of \$15.00 per bushel was paid on one day. Total sales of all vegetables were 6,118 units selling for \$26,255.67. Strawberries in a limited supply are still available.

"An increasing volume of good quality produce continues to move through the Fort Myers Market. Spring cucumbers are being harvested and continue to be the "Top Dollar" commodity, bringing a high of \$9.00 per bushel on fancy. Eggplants, peppers, and squash were also available in fair to light volume.

"Last week the Wauchula State Market handled 2,574 crates good quality cukes, ranging in price from \$7.00 to \$12.15, and volume will take a sharp rise very soon as some of the open fields are now being harvested. Peppers and

**Electric Services Reflecting Growth**

Number of new electric connections reported a reliable index to the number of new buildings completed, were 2,000 in this district during February of this year then in February of last year, H. H. Coleman, division manager for Florida Power & Light Company, announced.

"During February of this year," Coleman said, "we connected 40 new electric services in our Sanford district, a twenty-two percent increase over the 33 new connections during February of last year. This increase reflects favorably on our area here.

"Despite defense restrictions on construction, building activity here has held up well. Most of our new electric connections have been to residences, indicating that local people are prosperous and are either building or buying new homes."

Florida generally is expected to continue to grow, Coleman said. The utility's economic researchers point out it is not unreasonable to expect the state's population to exceed 4,000,000 inhabitants by 1962. Florida's population now is approximately 2,771,000.

To serve the growth in its service area, Florida Power & Light Company expects it will be called upon to spend more than \$300,000,000 in the next ten years for plant and system expansion. Generating capacity, for example, will be increased from present 1,000,000 kilowatts to 1,800,000, or virtually tripled.

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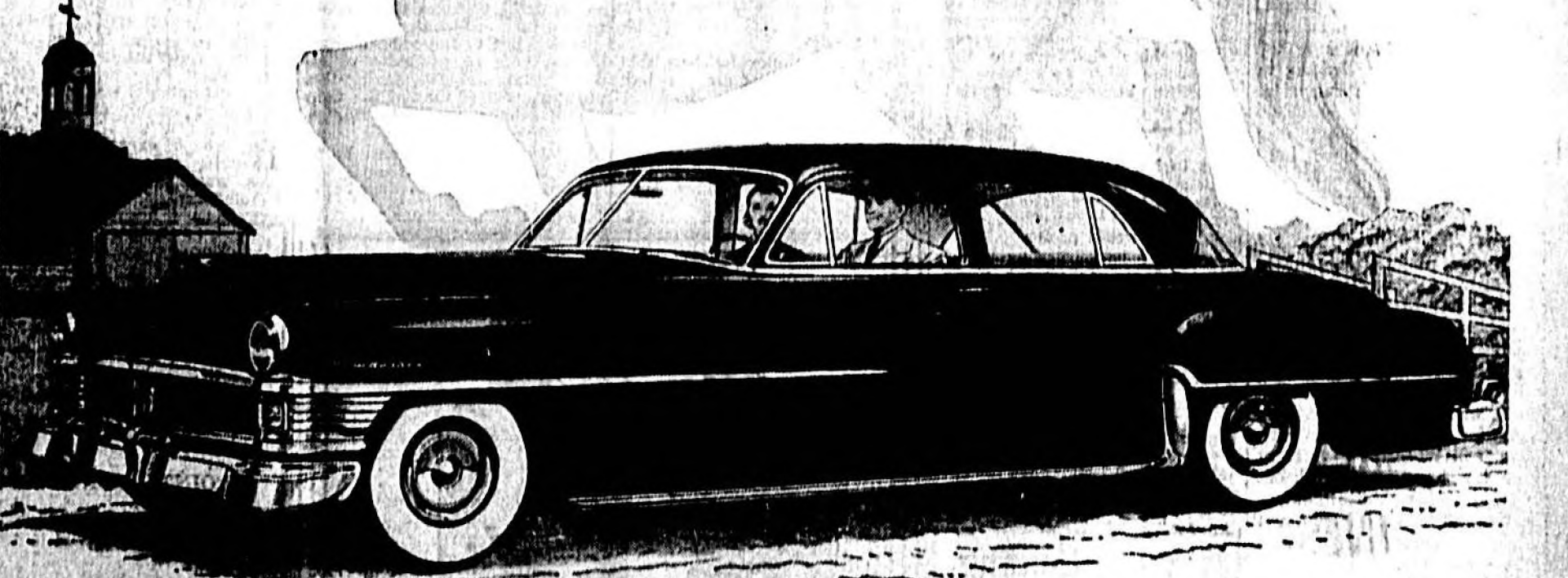

Bob Ward, a heavy hitting 22-year-old catcher from Oviedo, was signed by the Seminole Blues last Saturday afternoon. He was announced by Blues President Joel Field today. He also announced that veteran outfielder Chris Hermedes who was recently purchased along with flycatcher Ted Brooklyn from Cocoa, was released and sent back to Cocoa.

The husky Oviedo receiver played four years for Oviedo High School posting phenomenal batting of .340, .360 and .340. Ward is a two-year veteran of the Central Florida League team, where he batted .310 last year. In 1946 he posted a .330 in the CFL.

Ward played for the University of Florida freshmen baseball team last spring where he averaged .300 in the 500 hitting circle. The blonde-haired strong boy is the son of B. F. Ward in Oviedo. Ward stands slightly over 7 feet and weighs 180 pounds. He has been a catcher all his life and has been very impressive in the spring workouts with the Blues.

The Oviedo white bats and throws right and was signed as a rookie. His signature gave the Blues three catchers with rookie Gene Carr and veteran Domenic Petrosino.

"We are very happy to have Ward in the fold for he gives us catching depth and hitting average," General Manager John Krider stated.

Meanwhile the Blues sent Hermedes back to Cocoa to leave room for another veteran since league rules prohibit more than five vets in a club. The Seminoles have four already signed in first baseman Joe Parke, second baseman John Imbra, Petrosino and Aleno. GM Krider reported that the Fleming arrivals should be in today or tomorrow. President Field and Krider will be guests of the Lions Club Yach Club luncheon.

## Seminole Blues Begin Sale Of 1500 Opening Night Game Ducats

Over 1500 tickets to the Seminole Blues' opening night game Tuesday night, April 10 in the new Memorial Stadium went on sale this morning at three local drug stores. Blues President Joel Field announced this today.

With the announcement came predictions by baseball officials of an opening night crowd in the thousands. Seminole County Baseball Association director Marion Harman forecast nearly 7,000 but other prognosticators ran as low as 2,000. The all-time Sanford attendance mark is 4,132 set back in 1939 when Sanford was host for the Florida State League All-Star game. The 1500 tickets that went on sale today were in addition to the regular season tickets and the books of 10 ducats already sold during the last five weeks.

President Field reported that the club still had slightly less than 100 season tickets available out of the 200 printed. "We have to conclude the money saving season ticket drive by the end of this week," he said.

Meantime, Mrs. E. H. Laney, chairman of the Pilot Club's ticket drive, which has been selling 400 books of 10 tickets, reported that she expects all the books to be sold by opening night. "We have sold over half our quota," she said.

# The Sports Register

A week from tonight the Seminole Blues will launch the 1952 Florida State League season in Orlando's Tinker Field against the Senators. The Blues will wade into the FSL with a new team, manager, organizational setup and stadium. About the only thing old will be the franchise of Sanford and last year's Giant outfielder-first baseman, Joe Parisi, who is the only holdover from 1951.

After such a poor season both at the gate and on the field, it was agreed that Sanford should begin with a fresh start with new blood and inspiration. Since the club's transfer from the New York Giants to the new Seminole County Baseball Association, Inc., much has been accomplished by way of purchasing new life in the stagnant Sanford baseball franchise of 1951.

Checking back through the last two months it will be noted that the Chamber of Commerce baseball committee, headed by John Krider, President of the FSL, suggested the local franchise be run locally in order that fans could see a team that played to win and also to create more interest and local pride.

This was followed and the next step was to re-name the team. It was finally decided that the fans should have the privilege of naming it. So after five weeks of intense name entries and balloting, over 8860 votes poured into choose the label "Seminole Blues" after the Navy color of blue and Se-

minoles for the name of the region.

Meantime, other promotional stunts were arranged to market local participation and interest such as "Baseball Day" and "Operation Bright Lights." Not forgetting that the main object in running a ball club was, and is, the building of a winner, the baseball officials searched and screened applications for an outstanding playing manager with a good record as a player and pilot.

The final choice was achieved with the signing of Chuck Aleno, Florida International League batting champion 1948. It was a fortunate thing, of 1950 and home run king in indeed, that Fort Lauderdale had "Thirty-two" managers tell Aleno what to do and who he should play, for as a result Chuck simply threw in the towel and walked out. 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### University Modifies Cheating Penalties; Honor Court Resigns

**GAINESVILLE (AP)**—Two members of the University of Florida's Honor Court resigned Sunday night said today that President J. Hillis Miller had destroyed the effectiveness of the university's honor system. Chancellor of the Court John Trinkle and Clerk Fred Jones said that Miller "has removed all our constitutional rights by setting up a policy that cannot suspend a student in the recent cheating investigations."

**GAINESVILLE (AP)**—The University of Florida's 13 member student Honor Court resigned in a body Sunday night because the school's administration modified some of the penalties handed down in recent cheating investigations. Honor Court Chancellor John Trinkle said some of the sentences were modified by a faculty committee and others by University President J. Hillis Miller.

Trinkle said at the time of the investigations last February that some 200 students, including a few football players, were involved in the investigations. Florida's enrollment is 8,000. The cheating reportedly involved the selling of keys to machine graded examinations.

The resignation of the Honor Court — first announced by Paul Horton, editor of the Florida Aligator, official student newspaper at the university — was dated to take effect May 1. A new Honor Court was dated to take effect May 1. A new Honor Court elected last week will take office May 6.

of student control of student activities would be preserved, have been disregarded, though your Honor Court proceeded on a good faith application in those statements.

The statement says "we have in no way lost our faith in the ability of the student body to uphold and preserve the Honor Code" and that "we believe . . . students, like groups of men and women everywhere who seek and believe in the basic moral rules of society, do not wish to have the sincere efforts of your Honor Court representatives subjected to an equivocal and ineffective for the purpose for which the penalties are prescribed."

The statement said the resignations were made "in the hope that the student body and alumni who have experienced the everlasting values of an Honor Code will recognize the serious consequences of the issues involved, and the threat to the moral welfare of the present and future University of Florida students."

Trinkle said a letter from President Miller Friday advised the Honor Court of the modification of some of the sentences handed down by the court in the cheating investigations. Trinkle said the court held a meeting Friday night and met with Dr. Miller four hours Saturday to hear his reasons for reducing the sentences.

Several hours after the court's unanimous decision to resign Sunday night, notices of the action appeared on the campus. The notices were signed by Trinkle, Jones and nine other Honor Court members.

President Miller, in a statement after the resignations, said: "In a limited number of cases, the best interests of the university, of the students involved in violations, and of the great majority of students in the university who are in no way involved, may best be served by a change in the penalties imposed . . ."

"The President is of the opinion that all students convicted during the extraordinary sessions of the Honor Court should be rehabilitated on the campus of the university and that such rehabilitation should begin immediately. "As a means of rehabilitating the students involved, and of giving them an opportunity to consider further the gravity of their offenses, while at the same time affording them a chance of establishing within themselves a strong will and deep sense of moral integrity. The President is appointing a special counseling committee to whom such students will be responsible and to whom they may look for guidance in academic, moral and ethical matters."

"This action in no way minimizes the great worth and highest esteem with which I regard the Florida honor system, but above all I recognize my responsibility to save the young men and women involved in this unfortunate episode as far as possible within my power."

### Judge Smith Asks State For Facts In Clark Case

Acting on a motion to require State Prosecuting Attorney Murray Overstreet to furnish a bill of particulars to the defense counsel of Lillian C. Clark, charged with embezzlement of \$9,571 from the County Tax Collector's office, Circuit Judge W. B. Smith, in chambers here Friday, asked the State to grant information on three points and a portion of a fourth of like points listed.

The motion had been filed by E. F. Hourholder, attorney for the defense. The State is requested to answer in what manner or under what circumstances the defendant was an agent, clerk, servant and employee of John L. Galloway as tax collector of Seminole County.

To set forth the exact date or dates that the defendant is charged with converting said alleged amount or part thereof, and the exact date when the moneys alleged in the information were received by the accused.

To furnish a description of documentary evidence in the tax collector's office which the state expects to use in the case.

### Fruit Company Is Hit For Violation Of Shipping Rule

**JACKSONVILLE (AP)**—Best Fruit Co. of Florida, is charged with shipping citrus fruit during the Christmas holiday in violation of federal law.

An information charging seven violations, was filed in Federal Court here Friday. Arraignments are scheduled at Ocala April 2. William S. Walker, assistant U. S. district attorney, said the firm is accused of making six shipments Dec. 31, labelling the shipments for Florida destinations but verbally instructing the truck drivers to take them to Chicago, Pittsburgh or New York.

Oranges were not allowed to be shipped outside the state between Dec. 21 and Jan. 1, the annual holiday to permit Northern dealers to dispose of the heavy pre-Christmas shipments.

Walker said Ronald Earl Lundy, vice president of Best Fruit Co., said in a statement he thought it was all right to pack and inspect the fruit Dec. 31 so long as it didn't leave Florida before Jan. 1.

Records of the case show that field investigators for the Growers Administrative Committee followed the fruit shipments outside Florida and reported to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Maximum penalty for conviction on the charges would be \$500 fine on each of the seven counts.

### Seven Floridians Die In Accidents During Weekend

Death from violent causes came to at least eight Floridians over the weekend.

Highway accidents was the largest single cause. Three Jacksonville residents were killed in separate Dade County traffic accidents Sunday and two persons were charged with manslaughter in two of the accidents.

Lloyd Ellison, 12, died when he fell beneath the wheels of a truck in which he was riding. Albert Thomas Keene, 20, was fatally injured when the motorcycle he was riding collided with an automobile.

Nathan Simmons, 37, Negro, was killed when he was struck by an automobile while crossing the street near his home.

Mrs. Lrnie Williams was charged with manslaughter and released on \$500 bond in Keene's death. Thomas Billings, 43, was held on charges of manslaughter, reckless driving and driving without an operator's permit in Simmons' death.

Tommy Cohen, 25-year-old Miami accountant, was held on charges of reckless driving as the result of an accident which cost the life of Jack Stern, 48-year-old Miami Beach hotel owner.

Florida Highway Patrolman S. H. Walker said Cohen's automobile went out of control at high speed on Big Pine Key about 30 miles northeast of Key West early Sunday and Stern was killed in the resulting accident. Stern was a passenger in Cohen's car.

Mrs. Minnie Strouse, 81, who lived alone and had no close relatives, made funeral plans and then walked to her death in the waters of Lake Worth.

## Bullitt Told In '39 About Alger Hiss

### French Premier Quoted As Saying 13 Years Ago Hiss Was Agent For Russia

WASHINGTON (AP)—William C. Bullitt testified today he was told in the fall of 1939 of a French Premier's report naming two U. S. State Department officials named Hiss as "Soviet agents."

Bullitt, former ambassador to Russia, said the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee's information about the report came from French Premier Daladier.

Bullitt said Daladier, in first telling him about the report, mentioned no names. Bullitt said he asked for names and that the Premier looked at a memorandum and said "two brothers named Hiss."

"When he said that I, in my ignorance, laughed," Bullitt said. "I never had heard of a Hiss in the State Department and said there was a committee made by me."

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He said that in April, 1939, the State Department was notified by the Soviet secret police, Bullitt said, adding: "I was obliged to conclude that the Hiss case was a Soviet spy ring. The Hiss case is now trying for a new trial."

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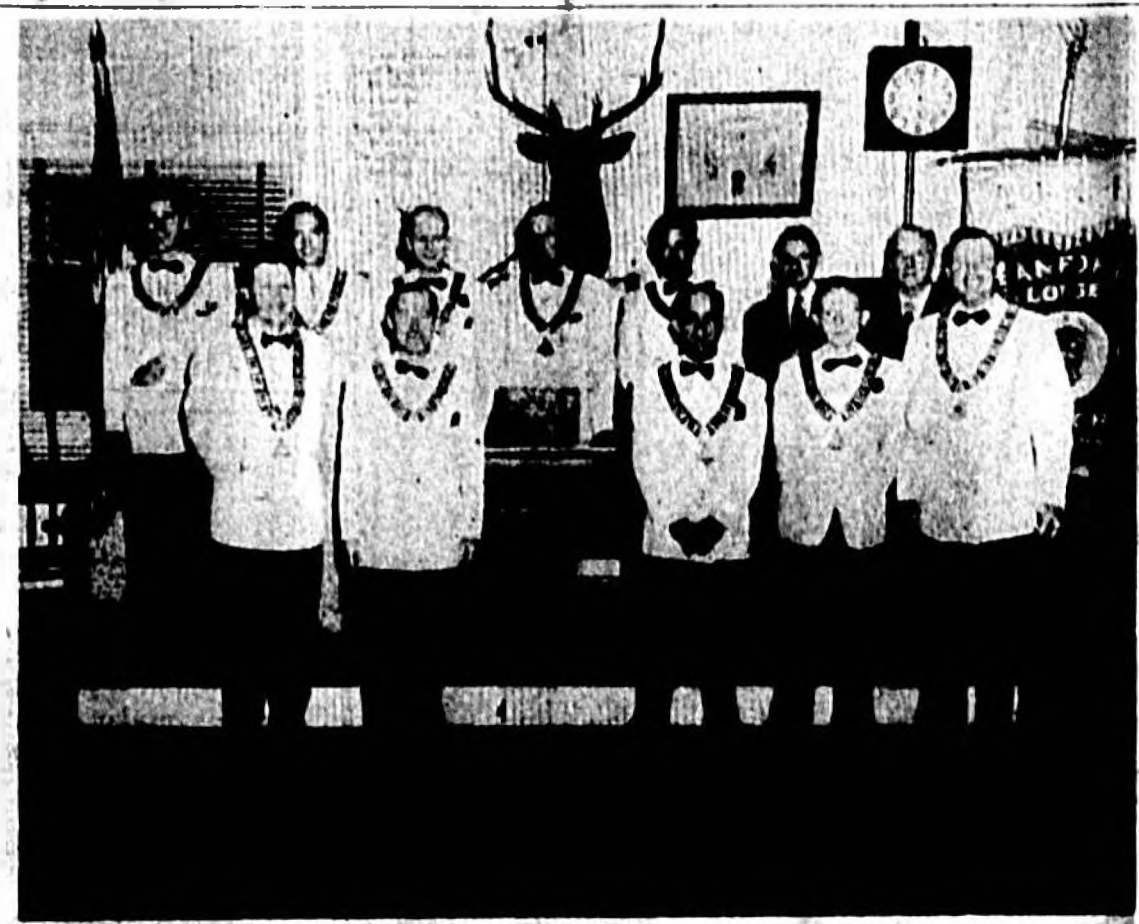
