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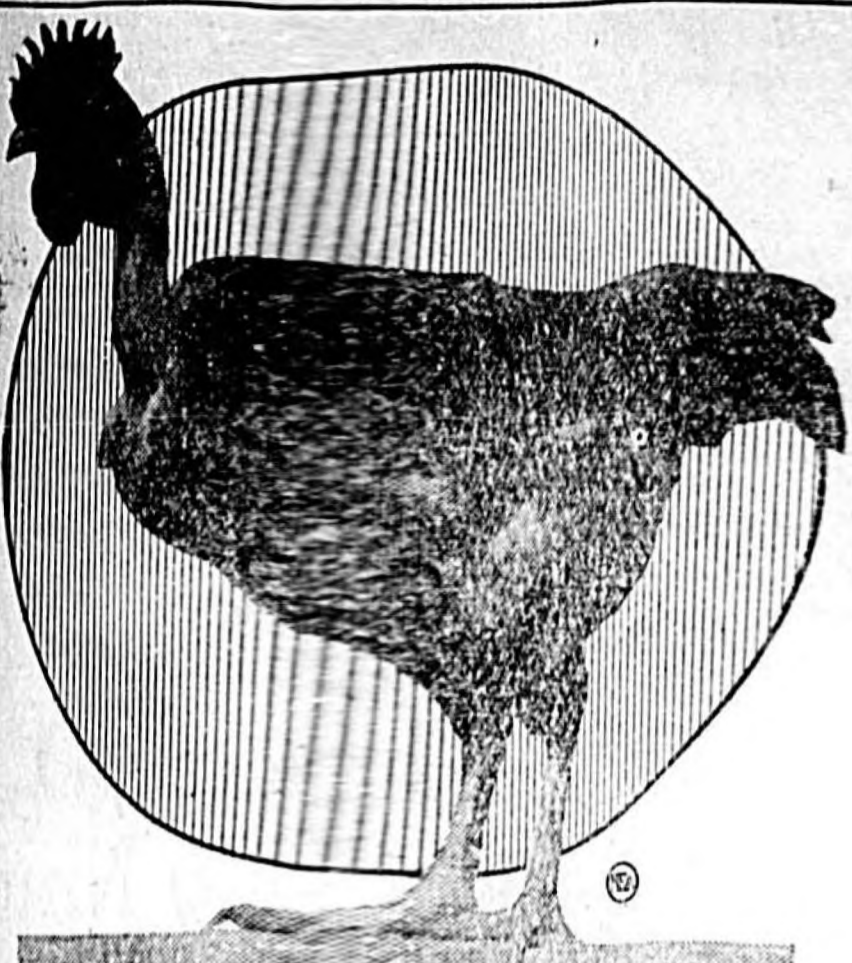

Cotton Crop Nearly All Picked, Says Government Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(P)—Picking of cotton virtually has been completed in the cotton belt except in central, eastern and northeastern Arkansas, where it has been too cool for the work, the department of agriculture today reported in its weekly summary of crop and weather conditions in the southern states.

Hardly truck crops, such as cabbage, onions, turnips and spinach made fair to very good progress in south Atlantic and east gulf districts though the soil was too wet for much field work. The setting of cabbage is about completed in the Mobil district. There was some frost damage to tender crops in parts of the west Gulf area.

The damp weather was favorable for marketing tobacco in Virginia, and this crop is curing nicely in Maryland but not as well today for stripping in Kentucky. The warm, damp weather was unfavorable for citrus fruit in Florida. Conditions by states included: Florida—lowlands too wet and trucking delayed in most sections except uplands and portions of south where seeding and planting continued. Cabbage and other hardy truck fair to good, but warm, damp weather unfavorable. Citrus fruits dropping; very heavy damage from storm at first of month.

The cigars were made in Key West, Fla., and the Savannah company is the sole distributor. The plane was scheduled to leave Savannah at 7 o'clock this morning. Local officials were at a landing field here at noon waiting for the machine.

The extension of the white way system of Sanford will make Sanford a well lighted city. Progressive steps of this kind that are being taken by the city fathers are largely responsible for the great growth being made here.

In order to allow tired employees to have ample time for a thorough celebration of Christmas, the banks of the city, and many mercantile houses will remain closed all day Saturday. Remember this tomorrow when you are transacting business and doing your shopping.

In the new December time table of the Atlantic Coast Line Sanford is shown as being one of the three points within the state of Florida where the railroad has double track lines Tampa and Jacksonville are the other two points. Travelers who study rail road time tables closely will be unable to help realizing that Sanford is an important point and the value of the city as an important center is again emphasized.

Influenza

Dr. Edwin B. Jordan of the University of Chicago predicts that there is danger of another epidemic of influenza of gigantic proportions. While he does not expect it in the immediate future, he believes that the disease has been recurring at intervals for a long period of time and that as the world is never entirely free of it there is a probability that it may break out in virulent form again.

It is estimated by Dr. Jordan that twenty millions of people lost their lives through this disease in the epidemic of 1918 when the world was at war and when men died in army camps by the hundreds. It will require a long time for us to forget the havoc of the influenza of war days but perhaps the remembrance of its seriousness will make all of us a little more careful in guarding against it than we would be otherwise.

While there has been much research and investigating since the 1918 epidemic and medical authorities have made some progress in ways and means of counteracting the disease, still, we are but little better prepared to cope with it than we have been. Influenza works quietly and quickly. It steals upon its victim without warning, suddenly developing into a dangerous malady. When not proving fatal it often leaves permanent evil effects. It is a disease we cannot afford to trifl with.

In rainy weather when we are very apt to get wet and contract colds, we should exercise every precaution to take care of our health. Prompt and vigorous attention, if given early colds, may avoid a serious attack of influenza. It is of such a nature that early consultation of a doctor is advisable.

Housing The People

Rapid strides have been made in recent years in providing housing facilities for America's twenty-five million families. Figures submitted to the New York Times show there are now twenty million dwellings in this country, but also twenty per cent more families than there are dwellings. It is indicated that within ten or twenty years, if construction activity continues as it has in the last few years, there will be sufficient dwellings to have one for every family.

In New York State there are twice as many families as there are dwellings. According to The Times there is no other State equally as crowded. Illinois has forty per cent more families than dwellings. The figures show there are few cities where there are fifty per cent more families than homes. Philadelphia, for instance, sustains its reputation as the city of homes having only ten per cent more families than houses.

Figures on Florida were not given but it would be intensely interesting to study the increase in housing accommodations here during the past year or two. Florida has had such a tremendous growth and such an influx of new residents, that it is hardly possible that its number of dwellings is anywhere near the number of families. The people of this state hope to provide a home for every family and are carrying on a stupendous building program but at the rate new people are coming to the state it may require a good many years to do so.

Sanford's home building program has been greater during the last twelve months than ever before in its history but yet the housing problem here is more serious than it has ever been. The coming year should see our efforts redoubled if we would see Sanford a city of homes, capable of housing the great multitude headed this way.

Poor Shots

The trial of Sheriff Chase and his deputies in Duval County, indicted for second degree murder, came to a sudden termination last week. The sheriff and his men were acquitted without even taking the stand in their own defense. It was brought out in the trial that the sheriff occupied a position in the Court House looking through a window directly opposite a jail cell. It was through this door that the prisoners made their attempt to escape. The sheriff's seven deputies occupied similar points of vantage.

The prisoners came through the door in single file. Between fifty and one hundred shots, the testimony showed, were fired at them. Only two were killed.

In connection with this insane gun play, a policeman stopped a passing car, thinking, he said, it might be someone trying to help the prisoners. He stood about ten paces from the driver, fired six shots from his revolver and hit the man, who happened to be perfectly innocent, only once.

Well, we will accept the jury's verdict of not guilty. Perhaps the killing was justified in preventing the escape. At least the jury said it was and we don't want to be called for contempt of court. But still we can't believe the Sheriff and his deputies are an efficient organization.

What after firing over fifty shots at seven men coming through a narrow doorway, and killing only two, after firing six shots at a man from ten paces and hitting him only once? Pretty bum shooting to say the least. We'd hate to have our life depend on Sheriff Chase's trusty gat.

Brazilian State Plans To Hold Coffee Price Using British Funds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—With Congress and Secretary Hoover actively seeking to rescue American consumers from high rubber prices, which have Great Britain's support, now comes news of the plan of the state of Sao Paulo, Brazil, to hold up the price of coffee, also with British financial backing.

Hesitating to attempt loans in this country, largely because of the recent plea of Secretary Hoover that American bankers deny credit to foreigners for such purchases, Paulo expects to borrow approximately \$50,000,000 from London bankers.

The Brazilian legislature has been asked to authorize the loan, which would be used to bolster the coffee market against any material price declines. However, the prospect that Americans may be asked to pay high prices for coffee as well as rubber finds Congress and Mr. Hoover ready to denounce the congressional investigation into the rubber situation gets under way.

After the holidays, it simultaneously will delve into the subject of the control of coffee prices in Brazil, as well as into other similar foreign monopolies.

Missing Houseboat Is Found Today Anchored In Lake Worth Inlet

WEST PALM BEACH, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The North Star, houseboat belonging to F. S. Seelye, manager of the Grove Park Hotel at Asheville, N. C., reported missing at Miami is anchored in Lake Worth here, having arrived two weeks ago.

MIAMI, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Apprehension is felt here for persons aboard the houseboat North Star which today was reported missing after departing from Jacksonville two weeks ago.

F. H. Seelye, manager of the Grove Park Hotel, Asheville, N. C., and owner of the boat was on the craft, as well as a captain and crew.

Inquiries along the Florida coast have failed to elicit any information concerning the whereabouts of the craft. The houseboat was en route to Miami from North Carolina.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Chicago's 3,000,000 inhabitants will spend more than \$60,000,000 for Christmas.

Last year it was estimated retail stores on State Street, where most of the Christmas trade is conducted, took in \$50,000,000. Conservative estimates today were for an increase of 12 per cent making the total for State Street \$56,000,000.

Disposition Of Huge Munsey Estate Raises Great Deal Of Interest

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The probable disposition of the large estate left by Frank A. Munsey, editor and publisher, who died yesterday of peritonitis, has aroused wide interest.

His fortune is variously estimated at from \$20,000,000 to \$40,000,000, including his two newspapers in New York, the Sun and the Telegram. He has no direct heirs.

Mrs. Munsey, bachelor, had no other immediate relatives other than an elder sister, Mrs. John M. Hyde, of St. Petersburg, Fla., who was not called to his bedside during his illness on account of her age.

Funeral services for Mr. Munsey, who died yesterday at the age of 71 of appendicitis complications, will be held tomorrow at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

Mr. Munsey chief business interest was the Frank A. Munsey Publishing Co. He was president of the company.

THOUGHTS--WISE AND OTHERWISE

If you have a fireplace—and everyone who possibly can do so has one nowadays—by all means have a yule log. There are some charming customs and traditions associated with the yule log in England and it is a pity that we have not made more of them as we have of the Christmas tree of German origin and the custom of hanging stockings by the fireplace, neither of which customs are so old as the yule log.

Your yule log should be as big as your fireplace will take conveniently. If you cannot go through the ceremony of bringing in the yule log yourselves, then select from your wood pile as comely a log as you can and have it ready to burn on Christmas eve. If you would have the yule bring you good luck then it must be lighted on Christmas eve, and while you eat supper the fire must not be stirred. Furthermore there ought to be an odd number of persons in the room when the fire is lighted and if possible you should light it from a fur of last year's log.

The old custom was for the laird of the manor to permit his tenants to eat at his expense in the manor house so long as the yule log was still burning. The old-time yule log, however, was big enough to burn for several evenings. Few present day fire places are large enough to harbor a log of anything like such proportions.



STORE OPEN EVENINGS UNTIL CHRISTMAS

Success On Concert Stage Called More Difficult In New Age By Young Artists

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The road to success on the concert stage in the olden days was difficult, but now it is even harder. More hopes of ambitious artists than ever are being crushed into disappointment.

This, in the opinion of several prominent New York managers, has come about because of increased competition and the attendance of more intelligent audiences.

"Why when I brought out Paderewski in London," said Daniel Mayer, who was the first manager of the great artist, "there were only ten or twelve famous pianists in the world. Today, there are twenty or twenty-five and hundreds of others trying to reach the pinnacle."

Not only is the route harder, but it also is more expensive. When anyone is ready for concert work, it costs at least \$10,000, and oftentimes more, to get started, exclusive of funds expended through the long years of training.

In making this estimate, executives of the Philharmonic Society of New York pointed out that there is the cost of expert teachers to correct mistakes previously overlooked. An accompanist is necessary, except when the artist is a pianist. Promotion and advertising also are expensive.

Then the artist must rent halls for his debut performances, which usually are given in New York, Boston and Chicago. On many of these evenings in New York, the hall is packed with persons, but the chances are the tickets were presented free gratis by the artist, or a wealthy sponsor was of assistance.

Concert managers here are in touch with managers and music organizations in hundreds of cities and towns throughout the country. When tours are arranged, the virtually unknown artist is guaranteed a small fixed fee for each performance.

Unless the artist proves an unusual success—and overnight successes are few and far between—the New York manager does not, in his opinion, receive a fair remuneration for his services until after the first or second year.

Can't Make An Artist Mayer, who in addition to bringing out Paderewski also was the first manager of Melba, Ysaye, Pavlova, Bauer, Elman and Giannini, does not believe it is proper to refer to a manager as

having "made" an artist. "You can not make an artist," he said, "but you can use the gifts of an artist if they are real to produce them before the public in such a manner that the artist becomes famous."

"Take the case of Dusolina Giannini, whose success is one of the few coming overnight. It was in March, 1923, that Anna Case became suddenly indisposed and was not able to appear at the Schola Cantorum, conducted by Kurt Schindler, at Carnegie Hall.

"Schindler had only a few hours' notice and was desperate. Some one told him of Madame Sembrich having an unusually good student in Giannini. The soprano happened to be familiar with the selection and after playing them over, agreed to help Schindler.

"It happened to be in the audience that night and heard her wonderful success. I was able to put her on the concert stage immediately, but if she had not been able to live up to the reputation resulting from her first night's performance, my services would have been worth nothing."

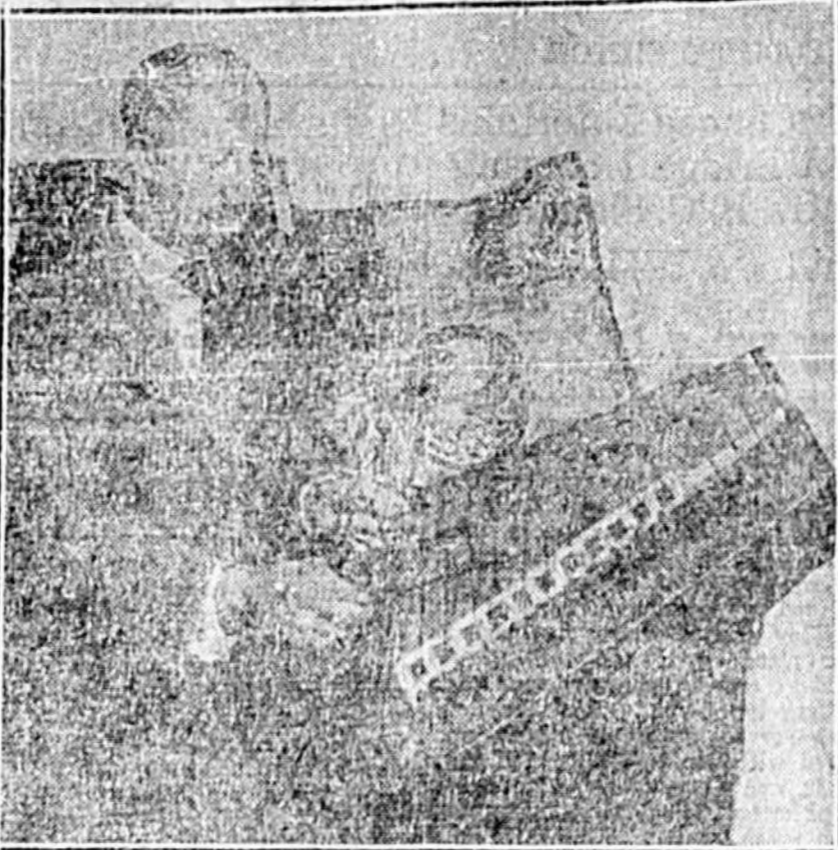
Old Type Passes

The old-fashioned temperamental artist is passing from the American concert stage and instead comes the artist with an eye for business. Audiences of today demand fine performances and there also is a natural desire on the part of the artists to give their best. A few eccentricities or an occasional outburst of temperament no longer can help across a program which may have been marred by the slurring of notes or the slapping of several wrong keys.

When success comes, the worry of poor audiences and small fees pass. The managers then guarantee big fees in advance and have little fear of so doing, for nearly always the attendance is large.

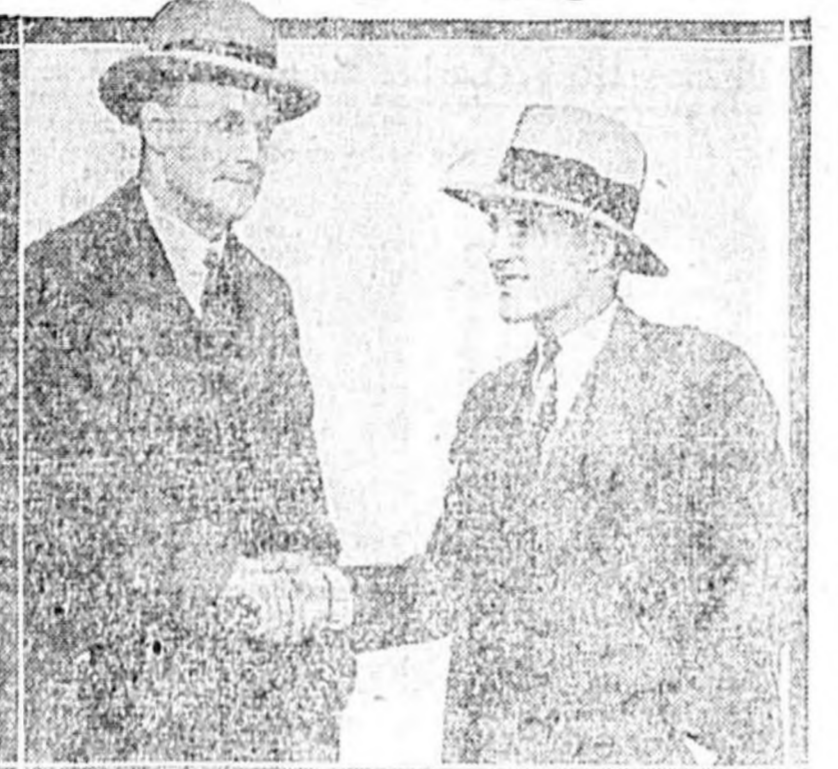
All these things, and many others, the young artists know. So they go through lean years with the hope that some day in the future fame's spotlight, with accompanying fortune, will find them.

"The State of Georgia
"Butts County.

"This indenture made and entered into the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty two, between Thomas B. Dunford, of the state and county aforesaid, and John Dunn of Tallapoosa county, State of Alabama. I, Thomas B. Dunford, do sell a certain negro man by the name of Nathan, about the age of twenty six years old. I do warrant him to be sound both in body and mind and all other wits and from all claims, for the sum of twelve hundred dollars by hand paid by John Dunn of the county and state aforesaid this day and year above written.

"Said, sealed in the presence of
"Test: Frances K. Dunford,
"James H. Hawkins,
"Thomas B. Dunford (Soul)

The bill is written in long hand and the words are yet perfectly legible.

Coast Lines Finishes Double Track Between Florida And Virginia

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad today announced completion of a double track system between Richmond, Va., and Jacksonville, the main project in a \$101,000,000 improvement program which has been carried out since the close of the war "without any new financing."

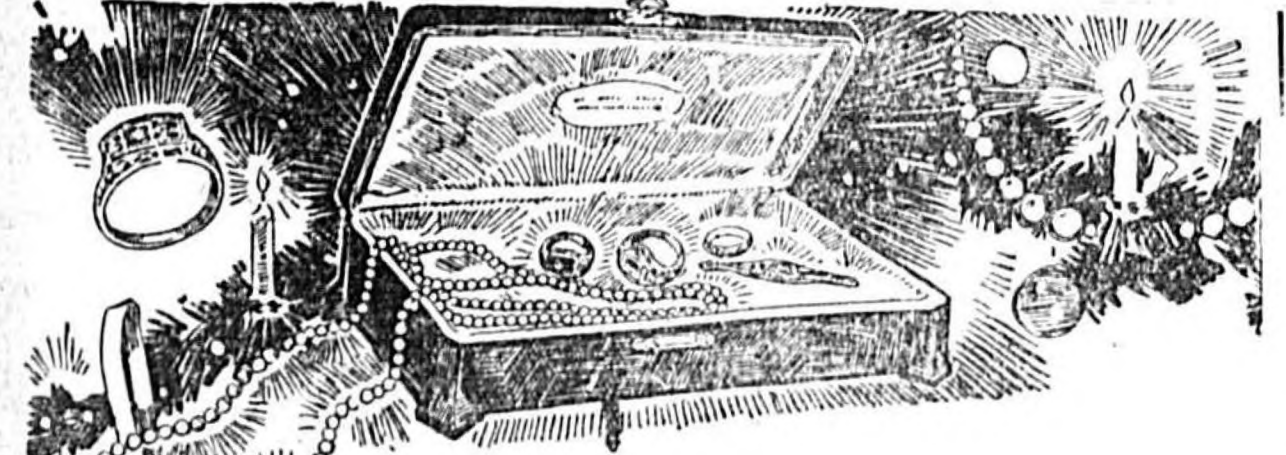

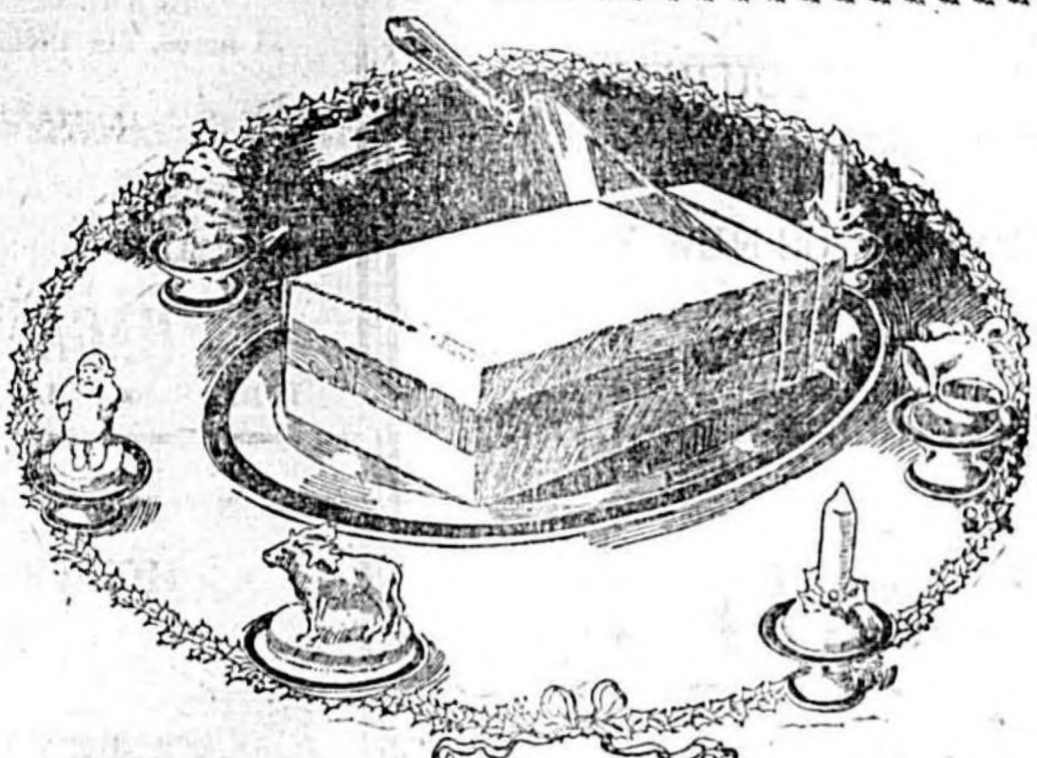

ORD AT FIELD IS OF AIR Specifications of Future Found Service Book

gineering division of the army air service, the book, which in reality is not a volume in the strict sense of the word, is known simply as the "War Book." Its resting place is known to only a few and access to it is impossible. "Should war be declared tomorrow," said a post official, "we can give this book to the war department and say 'gentlemen here it is. Go out and build them.' There will be no need to engage in a mad rush for verification of ideas, such as was the case when the United States entered the world war." The book consists of four sets of drawings and specifications. The first section contains all projects and problems under experiment. The second, lists every item that goes into construction of an airplane, from the smallest screw to the largest wooden strut. Drawings show how everything is made, where materials may be obtained and all details of procurement to the finished job.

Terrific Hurricanes Take Heavy Toll In Lives And Property Over France

PARIS, Dec. 22.—(AP).—Two deaths, scores of injuries and material damages amounting to several million francs were the results of a storm of hurricane intensity which swept France last night as the culmination of the worst spell of weather experienced for many years. The storms began with the arrival of December and have been increasing ever since. The center of last night's hurricane was the coast of Normandy, where the deaths occurred. In the third section under the head "obsolete," are listed items of airplane construction which may be used but which are no longer manufactured. The final chapter is devoted to a description of integral parts of the airplane as a whole which now are obsolete.

In Paris the Eiffel tower station at midnight registered a southerly wind of 40 metres a second, or nearly 100 miles an hour. The streets this morning were strewn with the wreckage of signs torn from store fronts, chimneys and roofing slates. Near St. Nazaire an English steamer broke her hawsers and was driven ashore, while reports along the Atlantic seaboard from Bayonne to Dunkirk tell of heavy damage. Villages and towns throughout the country report a damage to property. Along the Venise coast and at the mouth of the Gironde, there were heavy rains and winds. Snow in the Alps has further interrupted communication. At Vigo, Spain, and along the coast heavy weather had held up shipping. The entire fighting fleet had to return to port for refuge.

Government Gives Out Figures On Marriages And Divorces For Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 23.—(AP)—The department of Commerce announced today according to returns received, there were in Florida for the calendar year 1924, 18,589 marriages performed and 2,573 divorces granted. For the calendar year 1923, 17,335 marriages and 2,469 divorces were reported.

The increase in marriages reported for 1924 over the number reported for 1923 was 1,254, or 7.2 per cent. The divorces reported for 1924 show an increase of 104 or 4.2 per cent over the number reported for 1923.

The statistics of marriages for 1924 were furnished by the county judge, and those of divorce for the same year by the clerk of the circuit court of each county.
