## "Watch The Cubs" Is Word The "Boys" Pass Along As Hornsby Accepts Contract

**Star Second Baseman Is Expected To Put Pep Into Outfit Which Will Go Far In Ranks Of American League**

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—"Watch the Chicago Cubs," comes the word from the boys who see all hear all and know nothing. "Watch the Cubs with Hornsby in there."

There's one thing you can always say for the boys. They are never any siller than usual. With Hornsby playing second base and Joe McCarthy running the ball club, no one will have to tell half to watch the Cubs. It will be watching because it will be prompted by one of the most impelling of all emotions—human curiosity. No chemical laboratory ever attempted a more interesting experiment than will be sponsored in Chicago next Spring.

There is little of the "clubhouse lawyer" about Hornsby. His emotions are too honest to tolerate even a hint of surreptitious conniving. He simply is impetuous, easy to win. In fact, he is a ball player with only one possible inability. He prefers to do his thinking out loud.

Branch Rickey, Jack Hendricks and Jim Tierney have listened from left to right and seen of his natural candor thoughts without marked enthusiasm. The first two were managers of ball clubs and Hornsby worked; the third is something of a one-man "kitchen cabinet." All three are agreed that there is one outstanding trouble with Hornsby, he isn't a deal mite.

Will McCarthy overlook a few frank utterances from time to time? Undoubtedly. Joseph generally is credited with being a man of human understanding and an occasional expression of honest opinion about this and that will not mar the part of the ball game, after all. But Joseph's family name is McCarthy and he comes by it very honestly.

"There's one thing you can bet on," says McCarthy. "That's that Hornsby will be a great nationwide attraction. They are one of ten teams in America today that is neither beaten nor tied on the gridiron."

## JACK DEMPSEY IS SLATED TO FIGHT CHIEF CONTENDER

Rickard Declares Contract To Be Signed In Month Of January

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Jack Dempsey will sign a contract in January to fight a leading heavyweight next summer at a New York ball park, Tex Rickard said.

"It will give me great pleasure to be at the Yankee Stadium on Jan. 15," said Tex. "Paulino Uzcudun may fight and I may not be pending on how I feel next year. That's a long time off, and I am a dangerous guy," Jack Dempsey said.

Interest in the triangle title fight between Uzcudun, boxer, and heavyweight title reached the boiling point today as a result of the above statements, and following an interview between the promoter and Dempsey late yesterday, and a dinner given by Paulino last night to metropolitan sports writers.

Dempsey, who attended the dinner, evaded the issue of his comeback, but Rickard, who has just returned from Florida, said he was convinced that he had persuaded the former champion to make an attempt to regain his lost laurels.

It was learned that Dempsey had stipulated that his opponent must be one of the following group: Uzcudun, Jack Sharkey, Knute Hansen or Young Stridling. Dempsey also was quoted as saying that he must get a percentage of the receipts that will assure him half a million dollars for his effort.

While Rickard professed to believe that the negotiations were as good as closed, Dempsey was as usual noncommittal self.

"I'm not ready to make any statements right now," Dempsey said at the dinner. Then he informed that he had decided to attempt a comeback by adding "I've had a bad trouble in the past over terms, and we won't have any this time."

In a speech at the dinner Dempsey referred to Paulino as "one of the greatest and greatest heavyweights in the game today."

The next speaker, the grinning,

gold-toothed Basque, seized upon this opportunity to announce that he would fight the ex-champion on June 15, 1929, at the Yankee Stadium. He declined to amplify that statement.

Dempsey and his wife plan to leave for Los Angeles next Monday or Tuesday. According to Rickard, the old "Mannen Man" will meet him in the south for the signing ceremony.
