New Will U. S. Regard Stalin If Axis Loses

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Stewart's Russia continues to see up a fairly effective fight against the Nazis—perhaps re-creating more or less but still keeping Harry Hoover's forces too busy occupied in their eastern front to strike out furiously in any other direction.

What, then, is going to be our subsequent behavior toward the Soviet Union? In fact, they invite him to drop in and make himself at home in the foreign office. And Harry Hoover's visits to the Soviet Union are all the aid we can give to him in his scrap with Adolf and Benito Mussolini.

Albright, suppose the war ends satisfactorily to the democracies, with the Russians entitled to a good bit of the credit for it. We and the other democracies will be under no small amount of obligation to them.

But how about Joe Stalin and the Communist party? No true, Joe didn't jump into the ranks because of any personal sympathy in his personal opinion. He didn't jump in at all. He was jumped ON. All the same, he did the rest of the Communists as well as he, and, though by no choice of their own, in the same side that the democracies are on.

At the outset both John Bull and Uncle Sam were at pains to make it clear that they're not pro-Communist. They're pro-Communism, but a Communism that's not Communist. They're anti-Communist, but not anti-Communist.

A few days ago I overheard a conversation in a Washington office. The speaker was assigning a staff of political commissars to be with the troops in the field. A political commissar's job is to keep an eye on Russia's military, and give notice of it to Moscow, enabling the OGPU to liquidate the movement's leaders in its territory.

The dispatch of these civilian commissars to the front was interpreted as meaning that, maybe they had discovered symptoms of Communist tendencies in the Russian army. The commission of the political commissars is a good thing.

What could be seen, on the other hand, than to have Hoover and his forces too busy occupied in their eastern front to strike out furiously in any other direction.

Longest Pipeline In World To Be Built WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Plans for the longest pipeline in the world, to pump crude oil 1820 miles from Texas and Louisiana to the New York-Philadelphia area at the rate of 250,000 barrels a day, were announced Monday by Secretary of the Interior Ickes on behalf of 11 large oil companies. An immediate start is planned on the \$80,000,000 project but its completion will take nine months and Ickes warned that it would not solve the immediate petroleum shortage in the east caused by the diversion of 50 United States tankers to British uses. At the same time Ickes warned that there still was serious danger of a coal shortage due to limited transportation facilities. The transportation situation already was "tight," he said, and a shortage would develop if Fall seasonal demand disarranged it.

NAZI DEFEAT PLEDGED BY TWO LEADERS

Nazis Claim Odessa Has Been Encircled

Russians Declare Offensive Of Reich Is Being Smashed; Smolensk Deserted Position Of Red Army Still Grave

The Russians said today the German offensive was being smashed while the German Black Sea port, had been encircled by Axis forces.

The Red Army officially acknowledged abandonment of Smolensk on the central front last night and German reports indicated the hour of disaster was drawing nearer for Russians in the western Ukraine.

After 24 hours of secretiveness the Russian command in the western Ukraine again named the sector of heavy fighting.

German troops were declared by Berlin still to be advancing on Odessa, the great Soviet Black Sea port and naval base, from southwest west and north.

The Soviet command in its communique for Wednesday afternoon avoided mention of any sector by the Red Army.
