## "Live, Love And Learn" Is Story Of Gay Village

Life in faded Greenwich Village with much of its love and a little of its learning, is packed in the new comedy romance, "Live, Love and Learn," which opened yesterday at the Ritz Theatre.

With Robert Montgomery and Rosalind Russell in the starring roles, supported by an excellent cast, the story is witty, logical and extremely well presented. The direction was by George Fitzmaurice who not long ago made "The Emperor's Candlesticks" with William Powell and Luise Rainer.

The narrative describes Montgomery as Bob Graham, a happy-go-lucky artist of the Village patterned much after the traditional type, who goes up to Connecticut to capture sylvan still life on his canvas. A fox hunt disturbs him as he works, but Julie, a lovely girl who tumbles off her horse virtu-ously into his lap is even more dis-turbing.

Their temperamental argument serves as a grand introduction and their temperamental natures do the rest. They fall in love. Julie flings her social life aside and goes to live with her artistic husband in a north-light garret studio not five minutes from Sheridan Square. Complications come at once, as might be expected.

A taste of tragedy enters when Bob falls in his work after Julie has left him. Montgomery again, demonstrates his versatility here, for he becomes the dejected figure of the Village, exactly the opposite of the once gay "madcap" who laughed easily and loved lightly. They are restored through the kindly efforts of a mutual friend and all is well. The story is more complicated than this brief account might indicate. In every phase, it is handled with professional skill.

Robert Benchley, the noted humorist and actor, has a prominent role and adds immeasurably to the humor of the tale. Helen Vinson scores as the "other woman" and excellent supporting work is contributed by Mickey Rocco and Monty Woolley.

## Hull Protests Again Against Japan's Policy

Demand Is Issued For Japan To Consult U. S. Before Seizing Chinese Customs

## British Join In Protest At Tokyo

## Japanese Claim Right Of Full Control Of Maritime Customs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Secretary Hull announced today that the United States has served a virtual demand on the Japanese government that it consult with this government before undertaking any changes in the Chinese maritime customs.

That the United States had made new and more vigorous representations to Japan against any attempt by the Japanese military at Shanghai to disturb the Chinese maritime customs, was disclosed today at the State Department where it was explained that the new American diplomatic move was in the form of a formal written presentation to the Japanese foreign office of views submitted earlier in an informal manner.

The new representations were made in Tokyo by Ambassador Joseph G. Grew yesterday on instructions from the State Department.

## Roosevelt Embarks For Fishing Trip Near Florida Keys

MIAMI, Nov. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt embarked on yacht "Potomac" today for a week of fishing around the Florida Keys.

A warm sun broke through the mist as he was piped over the side of the 165-foot former Navy patrol boat, its rails manned by sailors in service white.

Governor Clegg talked with President Roosevelt for about half an hour in Jacksonville last night as the presidential special train passed on its run to Miami.

The governor and former Senator Scott M. Lottin were the only persons who boarded the train. Lottin remained with Senator Pepper in the presidential suite when the special left.

Come told newspaper reporters afterwards he "had a good general talk" with Mr. Roosevelt.

The governor said the president asked about Florida citrus, reforestation, and civilian conservation corps camps in the state.

## "Tricycle" Plane Will Visit Florida



MIAMI, Nov. 29.—The Waco N-7 "Tricycle Landing Gear" biplane, claimed by its designers to be the solution to the problem of safe and simple flying for everybody, will arrive in Florida for the Miami All-American Air Maneuvers and a month's demonstration in Florida and Cuba.

## Japanese Report Capture Of Three Key Strongholds

Fortifications Prevented Japanese From Using Yangtze River

SHANGHAI, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The Japanese reported the capture today of three key strongholds in Nanking's defenses bringing them within striking distance of the last fortifications before China's capital.

Official communiques said the Japanese had occupied Klauyin on the Yangtze River, Wushan about 20 miles north of Wushan on the Shanghai-Nanking railroad, and Ding about 85 miles southeast of Nanking.

Army spokesmen admitted, however, that the Klauyin forts which have been held for more than a week against Japanese air, sea, and river bombardment still flew the Chinese flag. The forts and submerged boom of concrete laden vessels bar the way up the Yangtze to Nanking and prevent Japanese warships from reaching the evacuated capital.

A spokesman for the Japanese army said also that Japanese forces driving towards Nanking had entered Anhui Province and occupied the town of Sha-Szean.

The advance cleared the way for an attack on Wuhu on the Yangtze River above Nanking and was believed to have rendered untenable the positions held by the Chinese army in the Nanking area.

The Japanese "anticipated" that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and his staff would flee from Nanking in airplanes during the week.

The Japanese had established a strong base at Changshing, on the southwest shore of Lake Tai, whence the columns invading Anhui advanced. This base is linked to Shanghai by a series of canals which enable the rapid movement of munitions on big Japanese motor flatboats.

Meanwhile the Japanese tightened their hold on Shanghai taking over communications and the censorship bureau formerly operated by the Chinese government.

The telegraph office was refusing to accept messages to all points in China.

## WPA Plans Federal Symphony Project

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 29.—Organization of the Florida Symphony Orchestra, which will be the first state symphony in the south and the second in the nation, under auspices of the Federal Music Project, will be started immediately, state WPA officials announced.

Decision to form a state orchestra followed a visit to Florida this week of Dr. Nikolai Sokoloff of Washington, Director of WPA Music Projects, to evaluate the program and make plans for the future. Dr. Sokoloff will return early in January to direct rehearsals of the new state unit and also contemplate conducting concerts in several cities in the state.

## New Deal Hits At Monopolies In New Move

Cummings Calls Upon Nation To Destroy Monopoly As Roosevelt Makes Plans

## High School Boys Hear Utility Talk By H. H. Coleman

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Attorney General Cummings called upon the nation today to "destroy monopoly" even as President Roosevelt off on a Florida fishing vacation, consulted with ideas on new anti-trust legislation.

"Unless we destroy monopoly," Cummings said, "monopoly will destroy most of our reforms and in the end lower the standard of our modern life."

The Administration's expected attack on monopolistic practices still is a formative stage, Cummings' assistant Robert H. Jackson said in the South after talking to President Roosevelt.

Jackson accompanied the President on the fishing trip carrying with him data on anti-trust prosecutions and studies the department of Justice has been making in preparation for the suggested new legislation to improve the enforcement of the Sherman and Clayton acts.

Mr. Bram stated that 17 years ago he was himself stricken by tuberculosis, sent to the mountains of Virginia to get his health back, was later told to return home to die, but after staying in bed for 14 months was finally pronounced fully recovered.

He said that during this time he made up his mind that if he ever got well, he would do everything in his power to further the work of the National Tuberculosis Association which had been so helpful to him.

Declaring that one of the most unfortunate things about tuberculosis is that it effects its greatest toll from among those who are in the prime of life, Mr. Bram stated that the peak age is 35, and that in 1900 there were 300 persons 35 years of age who died of this disease, while last year there were less than 100 at this age who died from tuberculosis.

There has been a reduction in the death rate, in the past 35 years of 25 percent, he said. The rate is still too high, Mr. Bram added, for last year there were 70,000 persons in the United States who died of tuberculosis, while there are still over 600,000 active cases in Seminole County.

He said there were 10 deaths in 10 months. The sale of Christmas seals aids in the organization of the National Tuberculosis Association which is conducting a drive against this disease.

Part of the funds which have been raised in this manner in the past has gone for the purchase of some 95,000 beds, for the pay of 20,000 public health nurses, and for the operation of 1,000 tuberculosis clinics. Last year, Mr. Bram said, \$368.16 was raised in Seminole County through the sale of seals.

"Everyone," he concluded, "can't visit and cheer the sick. Everyone can offer expert advice. Everyone can do everything he wants to do to help the cause, but everyone can buy Christmas seals."

## First Round Lost By Gerardo Machado

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(AP)—First Gerardo Machado, former Cuban dictator, today lost the first round of a battle to escape extradition to Cuba on murder and embezzlement charges which grew out of the 1933 revolution in which he was overthrown.

United States Commissioner Garrett W. Collier denied a motion by Machado's attorneys to dismiss the application for extradition. The Commissioner based his denial on grounds that "The Treaty provides that the petitioning government (in extradition cases) shall be given 60 days after the arraignment of the defendant to prove the government's charges."

The Commissioner agreed to conduct a hearing tomorrow at the hospital where Machado is confined.

The pavement being wet, the auto began to skid when the brakes were applied. It turned completely around and came to a halt upside down.

Mr. Betts sustained only minor bruises in the accident.

## New Aids For Housing Asked By Roosevelt

President Calls Lag In Building One Of Main Reasons For Decline In Business

## Says Wage Hikes Came Too Rapidly

## Plans Conference To Adjust Costs To Consumers' Means

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked Congress today to liberalize the existing law to encourage billions of dollars worth of new housing construction in the next five years.

In a message to the special session completed before he left for his Florida fishing trip, the President asserted, "The long continued lag in building is a drag on all industry and trade" and was "one of the principal reasons why general business had failed to forge ahead" in recent months.

Declaring that increases in hourly wage rates and material costs had been "too rapid and the great for the consumer to bear" and had checked production and buying in other industries, he said he would confer with representatives of industry, labor, and finance in an effort to adjust such costs to consumers' means.

He proposed eight changes in the National Housing Act of 1934 to make possible through federal insurance of low-interest mortgages private financing of large numbers of housing units.

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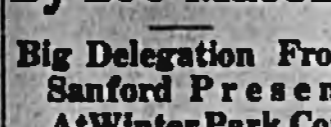

## Chinese Children Killed By Bombs

Catholic orphanage at Kashing is destroyed by airmen

## Shanghai, Nov. 30. (AP) — American Consul General Clarence E. Gausa protested to the Japanese consulate today after a Japanese naval crew seized an American-owned steam launch and lowered the craft's American flag.

The launch, owned by the China Foreign Steamship Company, an American firm and agent of the Roosevelt Line, was seized as it lay along the French bund.

## William Hunt, steamship company head, protested strongly to Consul Gausa against the seizure of the launch.

He declared the Japanese "rough-housed" the Chinese crew and then "deliberately pulled down the flag and tossed it into the river."

## Earlier the French ambassador said that Japanese air-bombs had destroyed a Catholic orphanage at Kashing and killed 40 Chinese children.

He also said 150 orphans, 400 French sisters and five Chinese sisters who were at the orphanage, were missing. The orphanage bombing took place 18 days ago, but was not reported until today.

## Chinese destroyers were reported falling back today 15 miles 40 to 50 miles east and southeast of Nanking with Japanese columns in hot pursuit.

Japanese reports of their army's said the Chinese, under an intensive aerial bombardment, had retreated nearly to the Chienkiang-Tanyang-Kiang fortified line close to the almost deserted capital.

## The Japanese gained steadily on the central front but were held up at the northern and southern extremities.
