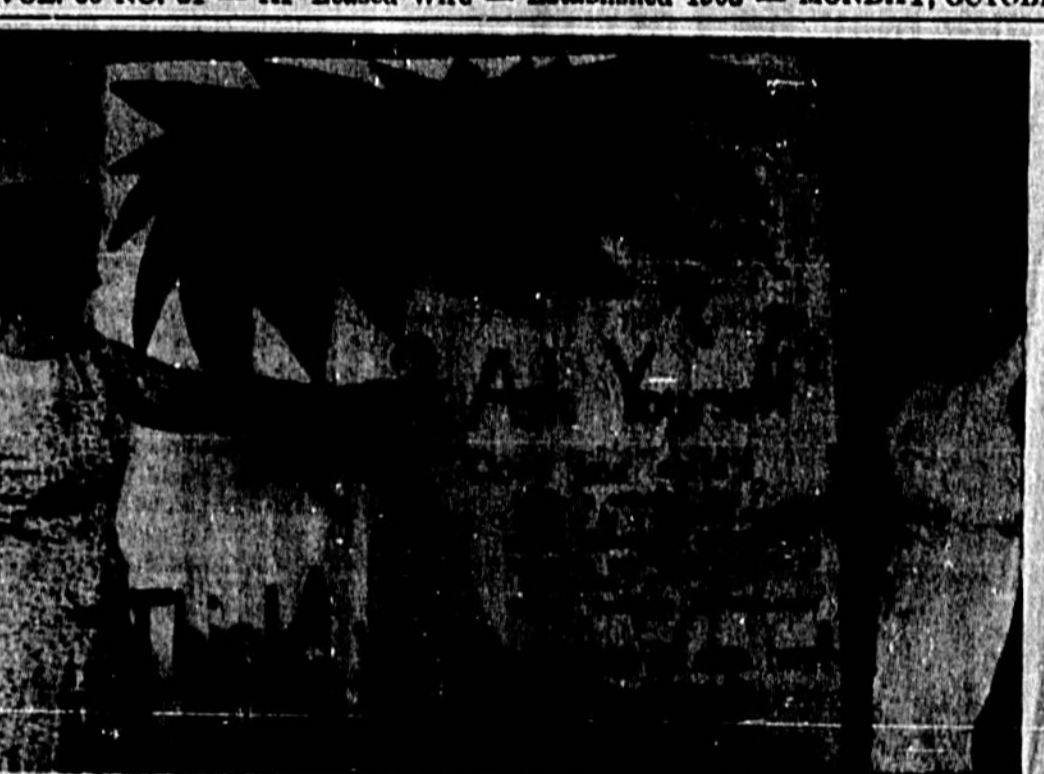

## 23 Percent Of Goal In

This year's campaign of the United Fund of Seminole County opened today with a colorful ceremony on the lakefront marina and an encouraging hard fact of pre-campaign gifts and pledges of \$12,404 or 23 per cent of the \$50,000 total.

It was the largest such percentage ever enjoyed by the United Fund and it was announced against a background of imagination and purpose hailed as guarantee of total success. For the campaign chairman, Wendell Springfield, arrived in custody of Sheriff J. L. Hobby and wearing the clothes of Robin Hood. His "merry men"—the key chairmen, also garbed in green, decked with Police Chief Ben Butler as custodian.

Released in custody of Richard Koogh, UF president, "Robin Hood" Springfield promised that "I will not steal from the rich during this period (the month of October) but will disburse the funds so generously given by Seminole County residents through the United Fund to the member agencies."

The outdoor ceremonies were conducted by Lee Moore, UF first vice-president, with a large crowd including representatives of county and municipal governments and heads of agencies on hand. It was, by any previous standard, eye-opening. Especially welcomed were Capt. G. W. Kimmons, Wing Commander from the base, and Lt. Ray W. Fullow, chaplain.

John Alexander, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, brought greetings and read a resolution which the commission had passed endorsing the UF drive and urging everyone to contribute his "fair share." It was at the indoor

"We have fulfilled our obligation. If the parents do not know the problems of the school, it is not our fault."

### School Board To Set Millage Vote Tuesday

The County School Board will meet at 7 p.m. Tuesday to set the machinery in motion for the district millage election Nov. 7. At an informal meeting last week, the board agreed to request the voters to approve the same six mill levy. The six mills will go toward administration, instructional and school plant operations.

Also scheduled for discussion at the special meeting, will be the possibility of placing a referendum on the same ballot asking the voters to approve an appointed school superintendent or electing one.

The board will also hear representatives from the Seminole Education Assn. on forming a negotiating committee to work with the school board on salary and other problems involving the teachers.

Alexander insisted that recommendations made by Bush and Lavender for his district be rescinded when wrangles between Commission Chairman John Alexander and other members of the Board could not be resolved.

### Price Increase

For the first time in 20 years The Sanford Herald is forced to raise its subscription rate. Effective today the rate for home delivery will be seven cents daily and 35 cents on a weekly basis. Newsstand sales of The Herald will remain the same at 10 cents. Monthly and yearly subscriptions will be increased proportionately at the same time.

The Herald regrets the necessity of increasing its subscription rate at this time but the price of newspaper has gone up twice since the beginning of the year and other production costs have increased accordingly.

## Our Crowded Courts

By DONNA ESTES (Part 1 Of A Series)

The United States has the best system of jurisprudence in the world—boosters and patriots of America insist, but in one instance the State of Florida, by particular, is sadly lacking and that is in the municipal courts.

While it is admitted that only 80 per cent of the persons who ever appear in any court appear before municipal courts, no provision is made to provide legal counsel for defendants nor can the accused request a jury trial.

The Florida Supreme Court has held violation of a city ordinance is not a state crime and therefore no jury trial is required. Outside city limits, however, a defendant has the right of jury trial.

Survey of the six municipal courts in the county shows dockets are cleared semi-monthly or monthly and even weekly in some instances. But attorneys point out that speed in having cases heard does not always insure justice is done.

One prominent Seminole County criminal attorney declared today that the system of municipal courts will eventually bring by a Supreme Court decision or otherwise provisions (Continued on Page 2 Col. 2)
