France And Belgium Resort To Extreme Measures To End Collapse Of Currencies

NEW YORK, July 16.—(AP)—France and Belgium are resorting to extreme measures in an attempt to prevent further collapse of their currencies. Meanwhile, feeling against the United States apparently is increasing in France.

Belgium has vested King Albert with virtual dictatorial powers to wage that country's fight against a financial Waterloo. The French cabinet has decided to ask parliament to grant it like powers.

Dispatches from Brussels say a decree will soon be issued providing for measures similar to those used during war-time. The Belgian railway, telephone and telegraph systems will be turned over to the private companies for operation.

Drastic curtailment of public building operations and a reduction of personnel to pre-war status are contemplated by the French government as further means of economy.

Continued decline of the French franc has enhanced the feeling of bitterness against the United States. It has even been declared in the chamber that the latest collapse of the franc is due to manipulations in New York.

Berlin dispatches say a tone of resentment against the United States also has been noticeable in certain quarters.

France Reaches New Depths
PARIS, July 16.—(AP)—The French franc reached new depths on the closing quotation on the bourse today when Finance Minister Cailhau was due to appear before the Chamber of Deputies to report on the bill for rehabilitation of the currency. The record-breaking quotation at the close of the bourse was 42.23 francs to the dollar.

BANKER TAKES HIS OWN LIFE WITH SHOTGUN

J. R. Smith, President Real Estate Board And Director Of Bankers' Trust Company Shoots Himself Early Today

Believe Man Fired Shot With His Toe

Letters Found Beside Body Are Given To Coroner To Be Read At Inquest Today

ATLANTA, July 16.—(AP)—J. R. Smith, president of the Atlanta Real Estate Board and a director of the Bankers' Trust Company for which a receiver-ship was designated in federal district court yesterday, shot himself at his home in Woodlands, a suburb, here early today. He was reported dead when found.

The body was found by a servant attracted to the scene by the sound of a shot. Dr. and Mrs. Smith's room was locked and the servant broke it down with an axe. His daughter, Mrs. Julia Ebbsey, was among the first to reach the body.

Mr. Smith was dead when found, the entire head of a shotgun having entered his abdomen. Belief was expressed that he fired the shot with his toe.

Letters Found Beside Body
Several letters were found beside the body. They were turned over to the coroner who announced an inquest probably would be held later in the day.

Mr. Smith was a former member of the realty firm of J. R. Smith and W. S. Rankin. Lately he had been connected with the Sylvan Mills and Morningside Development projects. In addition to having been a director of the Bankers' Trust Company, he also was a director of the Farmers & Traders Bank of Atlanta, which closed early this week.

In addition to the widow and daughter, Mrs. Lafayette of Miami, Fla., who was visiting her father at the time of his death, he is survived by two other daughters, Mrs. Hugh Inman Bell and Miss Catherine Smith, and a son, J. R. Smith Jr.

Woman Is Still Resisting Efforts To Evict Her From Cottage Of Former Fiance

WINSTEN, Conn., July 16.—(AP)—Mrs. Marion Hemming, of Hartford, is resisting all efforts to evict her from a Highland Lakes cottage now sought by its owner and her former fiance, Louis S. Griffing, in a home for himself and bride.

Mrs. Hemming insists that Griffing, a Hartford contractor, promised to marry her, and that she received the cottage as a gift.

Use of crow-bars, boarding of windows, the cutting off of the water supply and the severing of the telephone connection have failed to dislodge her.

The law came to her assistance yesterday when three men, who had been on guard at the cottage, descended on her from the front door and began to shove out the furniture. She was promptly arrested on a charge of disturbing the peace and ordered to appear in court tomorrow.

Mrs. Hemming hurt in skirmish with the law was injured in the struggle. The door struck her in the face, cutting her lip. Her 12-year-old son, who was standing nearby also was slightly hurt. The father and mother of Griffing watched the attempt to oust Mrs. Hemming, but Griffing himself was not present.

Editor's Long Fight Against Gamblers Ends In His Slaying

Threats Against Life Of Don Mellett Are Carried Out As He Puts Car In Garage

Guard At Home Is Off Duty At Time

Young Editor Instrumental In Arrest Of 2 In Parole Scandal

CANTON, Ohio, July 16.—(AP)—Threats on the life of Don R. Mellett, publisher of the Canton Daily News, because of his activities against alleged gamblers, were carried out early today.

Five bullets brought to an end the career of the young publisher who came here a year ago to publish the News, owned by James M. Cox.

Mellett was putting his automobile in the garage in the rear of his home when the assassin's gun spoke. Neighbors who heard the shots immediately dashed for the garage but Mellett was dead—a bullet through his left temple having ended his life almost instantly. The slayer had disappeared in an automobile which they parked about a block from the Mellett home.

Police had been guarding Mellett. That Mellett feared his life would be taken was evident for several weeks and as a result of a threat a police guard had been stationed at the Mellett home. The policeman was off duty last night, however.

Neighbors reported seeing a suspicious automobile, bearing Pennsylvania license plates, in the vicinity of the Mellett home. A short time after the shooting it had disappeared and no trace of it has been found.

Had the bullet which pierced Mellett's brain been an inch higher it would have missed the publisher. Members of the Mellett family recently had received several anonymous threats by telephone, according to Coroner T. C. McQuade.

Several days ago Mellett told friends he was convinced a plot had been laid for his assassination. Judge Hubert Pontius said the would personally offer a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the slayers.

Had Conference With Governor
COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 16.—(AP)—Murder of Don R. Mellett, publisher of the Canton Daily News, early today brought to light here the young publisher's activities in his efforts to put down crime in his city.

On July 7, Mellett conferred with Governor Moley on the crime situation there at which time, according to Secretary J. A. Meckstroth, he assumed sole responsibility for the confinement in the state penitentiary of Harry Turner and Harry Bouklis, who had been convicted of perjury in investigations into crime conditions.

Mellett told the Governor he had hired detectives who gathered the evidence to show that Turner and Bouklis had violated their paroles and that he personally in his office obtained a pledge from Prosecuting Attorney C. H. McMillen that the two would be cited for parole violation and sent to the penitentiary. He urged the Governor to act against early release of Turner and Bouklis.

May Conduct Federal Probe
CLEVELAND, July 16.—(AP)—Federal investigation into the slaying of Donald R. Mellett, publisher of the Canton News, appeared possible today when United States District Attorney A. E. RADIO OPERATOR IS REPORTED TO BE IN CAROLINA

Kenneth Ormiston, Sought As Witness In Investigation Into Kidnaping Case, Said To Be At Taylorsville, N. C.

TO WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—Reports that Kenneth G. Ormiston, American Temple radio operator, had been in Taylorsville, N. C., has the abduction story of Amos Semple McPherson, is extended to the search for Ormiston to the eastern part of the country.

Ormiston, known to have been friendly with the evangelist, during his employment at the temple of which he is pastor, was identified before the grand jury here yesterday as the man who appeared at Salinas, May 29, with a woman answering Mrs. McPherson's description.

Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan told the grand jury yesterday that he would produce several witnesses who would testify the evangelist and Ormiston created Saboteur on that date. It days after her disappearance at Ocean Park Beach.

At the request of Ryan, the grand jury recessed until next Tuesday to permit him to subpoena witnesses and to continue the search for Ormiston. District Attorney A. A. King said yesterday he had enough evidence to decide the case but refused to say which way.

In a bid for the continuance, Ryan told the jury that the identification of Ormiston's companion on the trip to Salinas was made by Deane Collins, garage attendant, from photographs of Mrs. McPherson. Ryan announced he would bring Collins before the grand jury next Tuesday to give testimony and to face the evangelist.

Reports were current yesterday that the district attorney's office had received a telegram purporting to have been sent to Ormiston, which stated that important documentary evidence in connection with the McPherson case had been sent by air mail to the district attorney's office. The message was said to have been sent from "somewhere in North Carolina."

ST. JOHNS CANAL BOARD MEETS AT SANFORD FRIDAY

Brevard County Land Owners Endorse Project As Most Important Matter Before Citizens Of Mid-Florida

At a meeting of the St. Johns Indian River Canal Board held yesterday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce, plans for the proposed canal route were submitted and a general discussion relative to the project was taken up with J. W. Braxton, engineer and P. A. Vans, assistant engineer for the canal board, in a session of the proposed canal to be run from the St. Johns River near Sanford to the Indian River near Titusville.

Mr. Braxton, engineer, presented blue prints of the proposed canal route which were approved by the committee. Henry C. Merrill, said to be one of the largest land owners in Brevard county, was present, and W. E. Stewart, of Cocoa.

Mr. Merrill said, "The St. Johns Indian river canal will be one of the greatest things ever attempted in Florida and the commission is determined to expedite the construction of the canal at a minimum cost to the taxpayers."

Present at the meeting were: W. P. Allen, president; J. G. Ball, Geo. W. Knight, P. A. Vans, Agnew, attorney; J. C. Merrill, W. E. Stewart, and J. W. Braxton, engineer.

Mr. Pearson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, announced that the next meeting would take place during the latter part of August.

Roads Cleared To Facilitate Work Of Navy Investigators

DOVER, N. J., July 16.—(AP)—Gangs of workmen were under orders today to clear up debris from the main roads of the wrecked arsenal at Lake Denmark to facilitate the work of the naval court of inquiry convening here.

A detachment of marines sent a good part of last night preparing the home of Capt. O. C. Dowling, commander of the arsenal, for the arrival today from Washington of the board headed by Rear Admiral Condit.

While Capt. Dowling's home will be headquarters throughout the inquiry, which probably will last several months, the court wanted the roads cleared in order to go over the grounds and see the damage that preliminary estimates placed at about \$75,000,000.

Four civilian employees who were in the reservation when lightning struck a storehouse on Saturday, were notified to be on hand as witnesses upon opening of the court.

Rain during the night added a detachment of marines who were pouring water on a storehouse in which fires still smoldered.

HEALTH OFFICER SPEAKS BEFORE COMMERCE BODY

Dr. Charles Duffin Requests Chamber's Aid In Keeping County Free Of Disease; Football Game Discussed

Support of Sanford's civic bodier and physicians in "holding down contagious diseases," was asked for by Dr. Charles E. Duffin, chief health officer of the second district for Florida, in a talk today before the Sanford Chamber of Commerce at the Seminole Cafe.

The health officer also urged that physicians be asked to report contagious diseases to city authorities without delay.

A motion made to appoint a committee to call upon physicians here to urge co-operation passed without opposition. The president is empowered by a resolution offered by Col. George W. Knight, and passed by the members, to appoint another committee to lay before the city commission the possibility of framing a city ordinance to enforce the provision of the state health law on contagious diseases.

District No. 2 has the best health record of the eight districts in Florida, Dr. Duffin said. The tourist season will soon be here, he said, and Sanford and other cities as well should see that a high health standard is maintained in their community. "We take our chances on importation of contagious diseases," he said "and we want to take all precautionary measures."

A resolution to appoint a committee to confer with the city commission upon the advisability of having knock down bleacher seats for the municipal athletic field and also to work with the local American Legion post in slugging a big celebration here on Armistice Day was adopted by the members.

M. R. Hutton, post commander of the legion, suggested that bleacher seats be purchased, so that spectators may enjoy football games and picnics held at the municipal field. The grandstand seats are not suitable for football games, he said. The seats ought to be bought before the first high school football game here Oct. 10, he said.

Claims Of 3 Women For Shares In Big Estate Are Denied

LITTLE, Mont., July 16.—(AP)—Claims of three women that they are daughters of the late Senator William Andrews Clark, copper magnate, and entitled to a share in his \$1,000,000 estate, have been held unfounded by a district court jury here.

The claimants, Effie Clark McWilliams and Alma Mae Clark Hines of Clarksville, Mo., and Mrs. Abbie L. Clark Miller of Denver, claimed that Senator Clark married Talitha C. Brooks, their mother, in Missouri in 1869 and deserted the family ten years later to go to Montana.

The defense claimed the three women were daughters of William Anderson Clark, also of Missouri, who died here last April.

The jury found that Senator Clark married Kate Stauffer and later Anna La Chappelle and that five children mentioned in the will were born of these unions.

Witnesses traced the movements of Senator Clark from the time he entered Montana in the gold rush days to the time of his death. The jury reached a verdict after little more than one hour of deliberation.

No Charges Have Been Preferred Against 5 Men Held In Slaying

MACON, Ga., July 16.—(AP)—While police have as yet preferred no charges in connection with the shooting to death Saturday night of E. W. Wilson, 24, and his fiancee, Hilda Smith, 20, five men held in custody. Authorities believe one is the actual slayer.

Sheriff's deputies have found that the scene of the murder was a liquor transfer point used by moonshiners and whiskey runner, and their investigation has been centered around men known to have been connected with the illicit liquor traffic. All of the men under arrest are alleged moonshiners and bootleggers.

Those in custody are A. B. Bond, B. B. Davis, C. L. Cobb, G. C. Conner and J. B. Bonner.

Truck Driver Cut By Broken Bottle

A truck driver for J. D. Molton of Orlando was cut badly about the arms this afternoon by the breaking of a five gallon water bottle which he was attempting to place on the wagon at Elder Springs.

The young man was rushed to Sanford, a distance of five miles where he was attended by Doctor C. P. Vincent of this city. A deep slash in the left arm and several bad cuts in the right hand were inflicted by the accident. The driver refused to give his name.

Davison Will Take Complete Charge Of Aviation Branch

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—The prospect of assuming command almost immediately over the War Department faced E. Trabue Davison today as he presented himself to be sworn in as assistant secretary charged particularly with supervision over aviation.

Unlike Secretary Wilbur, who ruled that the chief of naval operations takes precedence over the assistant secretary in charge of naval aviation, Secretary Davison functioned as head of the army, as both he and Assistant Secretary MacNider are absent from Washington at this time.

Among the first matters to be referred to the new assistant will be the recommendations of Major Patrick, chief of the air service, for the designation of two additional brigadier generals in the corps.

Gen. Patrick is understood to have advanced the names of Lieutenant Colonel Frank P. Luhn, and William E. Gilmore for these promotions, but Secretary Davison postponed action until Assistant Secretary Davison has opportunity to pass upon them.

Sears Appreciates Aid Given Effort To End Bank Check Refusals

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—Representative Sears of Florida expressed his appreciation to the treasury today for its assistance in stopping the practice of financial corporations refusing to accept Florida bank checks.

Mr. Sears, in a telegram to E. W. Starnes, deputy collector of the currency, said he had no intention of complaining against banks in his first message which called attention to "a campaign" against Florida checks.

"Glad matter now all right," his message received today said.

"Rumors are the most dangerous sayings in the world and I repeat what said in my statement that I refrain from believing business men will engage in, or pursue such unfair methods."
