

Crime, Drug Innovation Is Started

(As another innovation by the Herald periodic visits will be made to the State Attorney's office to apprise citizens of the drug, the crime, the good and the bad situations which exist in our county. Following is an account of the first "visit").

Seminole County is fortunate in having a State Attorney's office comprised of efficient, articulate, and proficient individuals who, most importantly, function as a team and are not glory seekers individually.

Included in this team are Assistant State Attorney's Newman Brock; O. H. (Bill) Easton; Claude Van Hook IV; and a new member of the team Edward Keesel. Of course, major duty is State Attorney Abbott Herring.

An investigative team par excellence consists of Jack Fulerwider and Edward DeFay, and the secretarial force who keep the show on the road are Sherry Carpin; Mary Younger; Carolyn Brunelle; and Lynn Farrelly.

WATCHDOG OF COMMUNITY

Fulerwider elucidated the state attorney office is the "watchdog" of the community investigating complaints of citizens who may complain against law enforcement officers. In fact, he illustrated, a police chief and two officers were indicted in Indianlake after being investigated by the state attorney office. The matter was taken before the grand jury and indictments were returned which, Fulerwider said, "almost wiped out the entire police department."

Quered how a citizen proceeded with a complaint, he said one talks with either one of the assistant state attorneys or investigators and if validity is established the matter becomes one for action by the office. Fulerwider said, "almost immediately, the office is working on two cases involving fraud."

Quized as to the ever increasing arraignment and trial docket involving drug violations, we asked if the situation is worsening with the youth or the "olds" are just clamping down more efficiently.

Herring, Brock and Fulerwider, Van Hook said, will each have individual offices, the rest will share an office. One office will house the secretarial pool.

IMPORTANCE ILLUSTRATED

The importance of the office was succinctly illustrated in that as a case is put together, often a witness is found having information of which possibly the sheriff was not cognizant. This witness is located and the investigation an is "beefed up" by Fulerwider and DeFay.

Van Hook contends two or three more investigations are needed since the work load will be compounded when misdemeanors come under the jurisdiction of the office.

Fulerwider, who works "from can till can't," says as long as there is a job to do, the office will do it. There are no regular working hours per se.

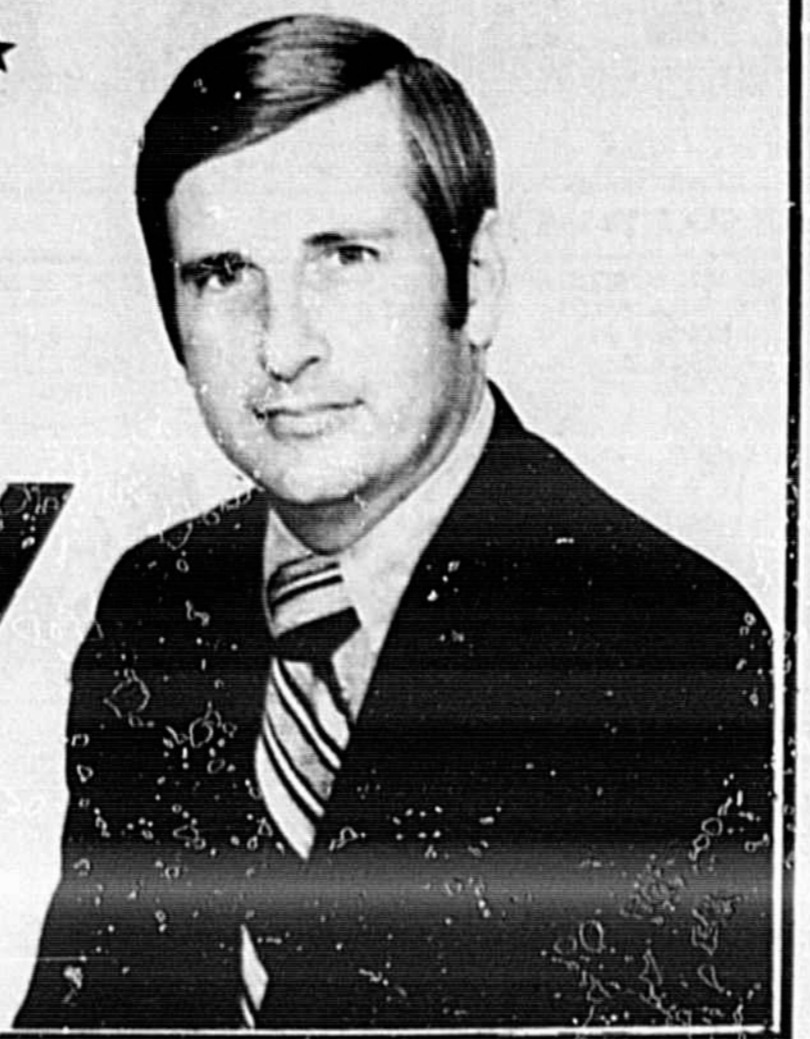

At the time of my resignation to run for the office of Sheriff, I held the rank of Lieutenant in this Division.

Certain conditions that exist in the present Sheriff's Department deeply trouble me. In the jail there is tremendous overcrowding, no rehabilitative or exercising areas, and juveniles placed there because of no juvenile detention home. I will support the prison farm idea to relieve these undesirable conditions, where the minimum security prisoners will have an opportunity to live as normal as possible while serving their sentences. We also need a juvenile detention home.

With proper administration and cooperation of all law enforcement agencies in the county, surrounding counties, and the State Bureau of Law Enforcement, steps toward a tighter and more effective control over all types of crime could be taken.

I would like to see a better working relationship between the citizens and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department. This would be accomplished by the law enforcement officer who has a more respectful attitude toward himself, his job, and the citizens he comes in contact with daily.

I would appreciate your support and vote to insure these ideas become realities for the betterment of all Seminole County residents.

Proposed Busline Includes Sanford

Sanford is included in the proposed transportation project for the elderly now under study by Environmental Design Group (EDG) and under auspices of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Transportation Authority. This was disclosed by Stewart Wilson, transportation planner with the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council and Fred Pshyk, EDG vice president.

Both men, involved in the study, stated all details including the number of buses available and number of times per week the service will be conducted between Sanford and South Seminole were incomplete, but some service to Sanford is planned, they added.

Wilson said a \$2 million grant from federal Urban Mass Transit Authority (UMTA) is expected. "These funds will be used to purchase 33 new air-conditioned buses for use in Orange, Seminole and Osceola Counties," Wilson continued.

He added an elderly transportation project uniting such facilities as Bram Towers, Sanford's senior citizens high-rise, with a run to Seminole Plaza in Casselberry and thence to Orlando is being considered. "This service will enable the elderly to have mobility," Wilson commented.

He indicated another bus would operate between Chuluota and Oviedo, linking with Sanford, also in the planning stage.

The elderly project is being considered first, but Wilson said, this did not mean that persons other than aged would not be prohibited from riding the buses.

Indications Pointing To High Turnout

Most of the county's 43 polling places are jammed

It appeared prediction of Supervisor of Elections Camilla Bruce of a 90 per cent turnout at the polls today might be coming to pass as most of the county's 43 polling places were jammed with long lines this morning.

Poll workers at precinct 33, Longwood City Hall, said it is the largest turnout in memory. Despite the fact voters were having to wait 30 to 45 minutes there, all were displaying patience and none was showing any inclination to leave without casting his ballot.

At the huge precinct 8 which votes in Slovak Gardens, lines extended 50 feet into the yard and George Touhy was in line at precinct 28, Sanford Utility Building, at . . . When the polls opened there, 12 persons were already in line.

Voters only complaint at precinct 24, Shell Station at 17-92 and 134, Longwood was too much smoke from cigarette smoking.

Meanwhile, in other precincts including four in Altamonte Springs lines extended far into the City Hall parking lot and the

Despite Poor Weather

Voters Rush To Polls

Generally poor weather over most of the nation failed to stem an anticipated record turnout today as voters chose between "four more years" of Richard M. Nixon and Democrat George S. McGovern, "the come home America" candidate.

Heavy rains or thunderstorms troubled many sections except the West and Northeast. And still, Americans were up early and in large numbers everywhere.

By day's end, more than 80 million Americans were expected to cast their ballots. Besides the race between the Republican President and his uphill-fighting rival from the South, voters will pick 18 governors, 33 senators and an entire House.

Nixon voted at San Clemente, Calif., near the Western White House, McGovern returned to his hometown, Mitchell, S.D. Nixon's running mate, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, balloted in Towson, Md., a suburb of Baltimore, while McGovern's stablemate, Sargent Shriver, cast his vote in Rockville, Md., a Washington suburb.

John Schmitt, presidential nominee of the American Party, planned to vote at midday in Tustin, Calif., his home city.

Two former presidents, Harry S. Truman and Lyndon B. Johnson, were using absentee ballots. Another onetime White House resident, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, voted in a Catholic school in Manhattan.

Republicans were hoping that Nixon would win in a landslide and that it would produce a net

GOP gain of 5 Senate seats and 41 House seats—enough for Republican control of Congress. The final Gallup Poll found Nixon leading McGovern by 81 to 35 per cent.

The first voting results came from the hamlet of Dixville Notch, N.H. It went for Nixon 19 to 3, but for Republican enthusiasts there is this dampening fact: Dixville Notch hasn't picked a presidential winner since it started midnight voting in 1960.

Even the rains, considered by some of Democratic Sen. George McGovern's supporters as their best hope to upset President Nixon in Florida, appeared to have little effect on turnout.

In Tampa, West Palm Beach and Daytona Beach, all drenched by heavy rains, elections supervisors reported generally good turnouts. Palm Beach reached seven inches of rain and turnout record that would easily smash the mark of 2.2 million in the 1968

Charter Action 'Improper'

City Commissioner Julian Stenstrom continued his effort last night to persuade fellow members of the board to delay submission of a new charter to the people of the city.

Stenstrom again warned that the charter, if approved by the electorate in December, can be challenged in the courts and the installed advertising of the document, since it has not been formally approved by the governing body in official session, has not been properly authorized.

The commissioner maintained the adoption ought to be done in a "clean" manner with no cloud upon it. The proposed charter is to be adopted by the Commission next Monday.

When asked for an opinion, City Manager W. E. Knowles agreed, "A charter in any municipality is the basic law," he said, likening it to the Constitution.

The manager continued that a city charter is so important the city should go to extreme measures or additional expense, if necessary, to see that its adoption is proper.

Election Day Bow To The L Of W V!

A Taiwan Thrust

An Image-Building Mission Here

"Our people are sad but not discouraged. We have an economy that will exceed Communist China's this year, but our future is tied to the American mutual defense treaty and especially to the Seventh Fleet."

These are the words of the Republic of China's top propaganda and information man who is in the United States on what he candidly admits is an "image-building" mission. The goal is to counter the trend that has seen his country ousted from the United Nations and deserted by many nations racing to establish diplomatic ties with Red China.

Frederick F. Chen, the man heading this mission, is director-general of the Government Information Office on Taiwan. At 27, he is the youngest man ever to serve in this position but he is well acquainted with America and with the top echelons of his own country.

He holds a Ph.D. from Yale University and has been English secretary to the late Vice President Chen Cheng and President Chiang Kai-shek.

"We depend very much on the mutual security treaty with your country," Chen said in an interview. "There is a particular psychological plus to this treaty—that no country is likely to attack us when we have a treaty with such a strong ally. Even more important is the presence of your Seventh Fleet near the Taiwan Strait."

"Should Red China attack us just 100 miles away—and that is their desire—the availability of the Seventh Fleet and

U. S. air power within three days could mean the difference. If it took three weeks for you to come to our assistance the situation might be different."

Contrary to what officials high in the U. S. government believe, Chen insists that Red China wants to attack Taiwan and also that the Peking regime considers the Republic of China a greater threat to its existence than Russia.

"The Russian border troubles go on and on," Chen said, "but if war should come it would serve to unify the Chinese people on the mainland—because the Chinese always have disliked the Russians. However, if war came between us and the Communists, it would split the people on the mainland and many would come to our side. This is what Mao Tse-tung and the others fear."

Chen denounced what he called his country's desertion by the Japanese in favor of Red China and said there are fears over the next course of the United States. "You are having dialogue with the Communists," he said, "and that is all right but we wonder what the next step will be."

Chen's mission, however, is not one completely devoted to erasing fears of his government. He is proud of the economic progress on Taiwan—"We will have a \$5.5 billion foreign trade this year," he said, "and that will be more than Red China has, even though they have 750 million people and we have 15 million."

"Ford has just agreed to build a \$20 million plant on Taiwan and our big industrial-trade complex in Kaohsiung (southern Taiwan port city) now can handle 150,000 ton vessels and is booming."

"And then Joe chorled in his merry way. The thing about Joe Garagiola, an old big league catcher with the bruised knuckles to prove it, is that he's bright, likeable, highly

knowledgable, a probing interviewer and also wears well. For the last five years, Joe has been a regular member of the "Today" show troupe.

He announced, not long ago, that he'll be leaving "Today" in a few months. With all his other shows, including his radio broadcasts on "Monitor," the schedule finally overtopped him.

"I talked it over with my wife, who's a real Hall of Famer, and we agreed it was getting to be too much," said Joe. "I just had to spend more time with my family. That was my decision. I'd walk in the door in the morning and my wife would say, 'It's Daddy!' and one of the kids would say, 'Which channel?'"

He shuffled through the stack of letters on his desk. "Here's one from Hubert Humphrey, a point where I had a little stature and I never felt that NBC would trade me for Roger Mudd and a game show host to be announced later. They even gave me my own office. I never had my own locker until I was six seasons in the big leagues."

"Five years," said Joe. "It was some kind of a ride on a fast track. When I started, people were surprised I knew any other words than 'third base' or 'take two and hit to right.'"

"I'm not pretty boy. I got this gap between my front tooth you could shove a Louisville slugger through."

Peace Draft Weak In Crucial Detail

The draft agreement on peace in Vietnam is woefully weak in its details.

My own experience in negotiating with Communists, and in watching first-hand while others negotiated, has taught me that technical points—not over-all goals—are the heart of success or failure. Neglecting details can be disastrous.

There is the danger that here, as in the grain talks with Russia, we negotiated so rapidly in our desire for a solution, and were so poorly informed on what the other side was doing that we have blundered in important respects on what should have been a magnificent coup.

Perhaps because the brilliant Dr. Henry Kissinger was tired—dead on his feet after weeks of heavy negotiating—there are two versions of the draft treaty—the English version interpreted by Kissinger, the Vietnamese version interpreted by Hanoi. The differences are not minor.

Item — Hanoi claims the document calls for a coalition government with considerable power. Kissinger, reading the English text and using words supplied by Hanoi in English, sees the same matter of the national council as a powerless advisory group. The difference is crucial. As history makes clear, a coalition would give Hanoi a sure-fire way to sabotage and then take power by coup.

Item — There is the matter of what are the limits of territory, what the boundaries are for each patch, and how a local government is to be resupplied if its territory is a city island in a sea of enemy-held countryside. No detailed agreed-on maps show which side controls what land. Each side is free to interpret what is held.

Item — The problem of resupply has not been adequately defined. There is a definite but inexact limit on what arms can be sent from the United States for South Vietnam. There is no limit on the arms the Communist bloc can supply Hanoi. The United States is depending on the good will and verbal assurance of Peking and Moscow. Theoretically, Hanoi is not to supply its southern forces at a higher level than the level at the time of the cease-fire. But no one knows what that level is or how to define it within reasonable limits.

Item — The English version of the draft, as Kissinger reads it, calls for evacuating all foreign troops, including North Vietnamese, from Laos and Cambodia. But to Hanoi, many North Vietnamese are not foreigners in Cambodia and parts of Laos. In some areas, Hanoi's cadres have adopted Lao and Cambodian names. A half-million North Vietnamese live in Cambodia; many serve as officers and recruits in Hanoi's local armies. The boundaries of some North Vietnamese tribal communities stretch well into Laos.

Some say such details can be worked out later; get the pact signed now. This is in a cease-fire as in an omelet, once the eggs are broken, it is impossible to turn back.

Press Censorship Is Grinding Down

The more than 300 editors and publishers from throughout the hemisphere who attended the Inter-American Press Association in Santiago, Chile, in October hardly need to be told, as they were by the owner of a Dominican Republic newspaper, that freedom of the press "has undergone an alarming deterioration" in the past year.

The meeting convened amid warnings that the Chilean government would not tolerate any attacks on itself or other "progressive" nations of Latin America.

In Chile, there is no official press censorship, but newsmen have been under increasing pressure. The government of Marxist President Salvador Allende Gossens has filed some 120 lawsuits against newsmen. Some have been jailed pending trial.

In Argentina, according to an Associated Press survey, the anti-leftist government of Gen. Alejandro A. Lanusse has incorporated press censorship into law.

In Uruguay, where press censorship has been practiced since 1967, a state security law enacted this year provides jail sentences for newsmen and others responsible for stories damaging to "Uruguayan prestige."

In Brazil, editors and broadcasters operate under what is called self-censorship, but newsmen can be raided and publications seized. Movies, plays and books are heavily censored.

In Panama, a government-appointed censor decides what will be published in the dailies.

One bright spot is Mexico, where government ownership of the newspaper monopoly has led to a form of self-censorship over the years. Recently, however, papers have begun to criticize the government more openly and President Luis Echeverria Alvarez says he welcomes it.

For Florida Candidates

Campaign Cost \$4.2 Million

Associated Press Writer TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Florida candidates on today's ballot raised and spent \$4.2 million in Congressional, legislative and Public Service Commission races, representing about \$1.20 for each of the state's 3.8 million voters, campaign reports show.

Biggest spenders of any race were Congressional candidates state Sen. Bill Gunter, D-Orlando, and L. A. "Skip" Balfaris, a Palm Beach Gardens Republican. Gunter reported a campaign warchest of \$134,334 compared to Balfaris' total of \$129,559.

That was substantially more than raised by either candidate for Public Service Commission—the only statewide race other than the presidential contest on the general election ballot.

Reports filed Monday in the state Elections Division showed Democratic PSC candidate state Sen. Gerald Lewis of Miami raised \$75,779 to \$64,925 for his opponent, Republican Paula Hawkins of Maitland.

Overall, Congressional candidates filed campaign contribution reports totaling \$2.4 million. State House candidates received roughly \$1.1 million while Senate candidates reported taking in \$600,000.

This does not include candidates defeated in the Sept. 13 or Oct. 3 primaries.

Contributions varied widely from candidate to candidate, but the "typical" Congressional candidate raised in the vicinity

of \$15,000 to \$40,000, the average state House candidate between \$5,000 and \$7,000 and the typical state Senate candidate between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

The amounts are incomplete, and the totals are expected to increase when final reports are filed 45 days after the election.

Although the total legislative contributions were higher than usual—because reapportionment of all 110 seats up for grabs—Elections Bureau Director Dorothy Gilson said individual reports did not seem unusually high.

"They seem to be about what they have been the last few

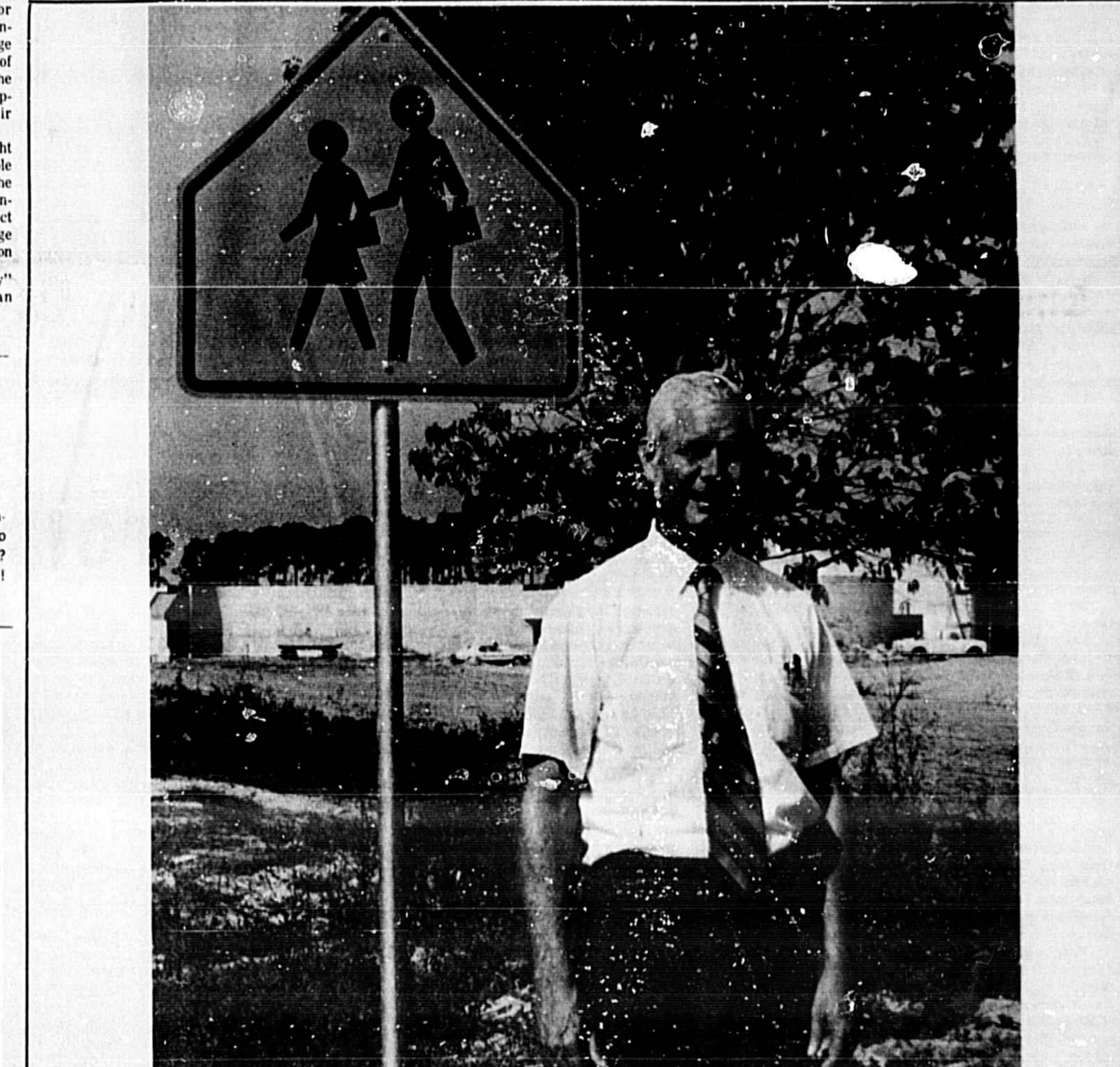
years," said Mrs. Gilson. "And a lot more is received and spent in years when there are gubernatorial and U.S. Senate races."

She said meaningful figures on what Floridians contributed to presidential candidates wouldn't be available until the final reports of national and state political committees were filed 45 days after the election.

Maximum limits fixed by Florida election law on campaign spending are \$50,000 for legislative candidates, \$150,000 for Congressional candidates and \$500,000 for statewide candidates, which covers the Public Service Commission race.

Sanford City Actions

By DONNA ESTES

The City Commission's effort to assure that the Zayre's Shopping Center planned for construction at the corner of Airport Blvd. and U.S. 17-92 would begin within one year has apparently gone for naught.

City Atty. William Hutchison in answer to a question from Commissioner A. A. McClanahan said the reverter clause which was to have been included in a contract for sale by the city to the Zayre interests of 1.3 acres of land fronting Airport Blvd. within the parcel on which the center is to be located was inadvertently left out of the contract.

McClanahan expressed concern in that he had recommended and gained approval of his fellow commissioners for inclusion of the clause requiring the shopping center to begin construction within 12 months. The clause would have banned use of the land for any purpose other than the shopping center without it reverting back to the city's ownership.

Deposit of the \$13,000 check for the sale was held up to give Hutchison time to find out if he can get the buyers to include the restrictive clause in the already executed contract.

Attend Stetson Meeting

City Manager W. W. Knowles and City Engineer Mack Lazenby are to attend a meeting at Stetson on Nov. 15 on behalf of city officials in the effort to create a St. Johns River Valley Council. The Council is to receive assistance from U.S. Rep. William Chappell and U.S. Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington in making the river a "model" one to acquire federal funding.

Also to be members of the Council are the chairmen of the Boards of County Commissioners in the areas affected as well as the mayor of each city or designer and representatives of various Chambers of Commerce.

Compromise Agreement

Compromise agreement has been reached between the city and the Winn-Dixie food chain on the request of the city that two entrances, considered hazardous by the city on French Avenue and 25th Street, be closed.

Attorney Kenneth McIntosh on behalf of the food chain, said the company will close the easterly main entrance to the center from 25th while widening the westerly main entrance to the center from 25th Street to 50 feet. In addition, McIntosh said, the present entrance to the center from French Avenue will be closed and a substitute one will be constructed 300 feet north of the intersection of 25th and French. The width of the cut from French Avenue at the entrance will be at least 30 feet and preferably 50 feet.

Winn-Dixie has offered to contribute \$500 toward the paving of 24th Place westerly of its intersection with French Avenue to the westernmost entrance to the center and the city is to provide labor and equipment for the project.

City Manager Knowles called the agreement a good compromise settlement. He added that the larger entranceway will give motorists the opportunity of swinging into the center quickly. The change is expected to relieve the bottleneck at the intersection.

Public Parking Kept

The City Commission indicated last night it is not in favor of "swapping" or otherwise disposing of its public parking lot at the corner of First Street and Park Avenue.

Norman Francoeur of the Downtown Business Association was also on hand at the work session to give his organization's position opposing the idea suggested by the Florida State Bank as a method of the city increasing its property size on which current facilities are located. Howard McNulty of the bank said last week the banking house needs additional parking space for its employees, clientele and tenants.

Commissioner Gordon Meyer said he had talked with several downtown merchants and others and following the talks is "reluctant" to see the city part with the public parking spot. "Downtown parking is critical," he said, also noting that the city has some \$60,000 invested in the parcel.

Commissioner Julian Stenstrom pointed out that eventually the city is going to have to consider a multi-story parking facility at the site. He said the city manager has advised that the city will need additional parking for the city complex when built and that the 2.4 acre site where the present facility is located will not be sufficient. Bank land to be swapped is adjacent to the police station.

In a straw vote the Commission indicated unanimously that it could not approve either a swap or sale of the parcel.

City To Force Work

Blount and Company, contractor on the work to restore the docks in the west basin of the Sanford Marina will be notified by the City this week that if they perform contract for work without further delay or the city will go to the contractor's bonding company to force performance.

City Manager W. W. Knowles gave the Commission a report detailing problems with the company and the difficulties the company is having doing the repair and replacement.

City Atty. Hutchison instructed Knowles to tell the company that it will either act or the city will call for the performance bond.

FTU—Florida Tech University will host the Second Annual "Snowbird Festival" November 9-11, when students from 19 colleges and universities will vie for awards in reading interpretations.

The Festival, to be held in the FTU Engineering Auditorium, will place the emphasis on learning and gaining experience in dramatic readings as well.

Guest speaker and judge for the event will be Dr. Beverly Whitaker, of the University of Texas at Austin, who brings a national reputation for her work in the field of inter-

2 Aircraft Lost In Viet Action

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command reported the loss today of the third F111 swing-wing fighter-bomber in less than six weeks and also announced the loss of a Navy A7 during raids on the southern panhandle of North Vietnam.

All three crewmen aboard the two planes were listed as missing.

Seven other Americans were rescued today after bad weather forced their helicopter down in enemy territory 90 miles south of Da Nang. The helicopter went down Monday night, but the men were not attacked during the night, the Command said.

Like the two other F111s lost on Sept. 28 and Oct. 17, the plane today was on a night mission, flying alone on a computerized course, when it vanished from command post radar screens shortly before dawn.

North Vietnam claimed that the first two F111s were shot down by its forces, but by noon today Hanoi Radio had not mentioned the third plane.

Meanwhile, U.S. sources reported that North Vietnam is rushing more troops into South Vietnam and rebuilding base camps along the Cambodian border in efforts to strengthen its negotiating hand.

The sources suggested that the North Vietnamese in future negotiations might offer to dismantle the bases and pull out the troops in exchange for concessions from the U.S. and South Vietnamese governments.

The Americans and the South Vietnamese have launched a joint air-ground campaign aimed at blocking the North Vietnamese.

The buildup is reported taking place in South Vietnam's 3rd Military Region, which includes Saigon and 11 surrounding provinces, and in the northern Mekong Delta.

Sources estimated that three North Vietnamese regiments, perhaps 5,000 troops, have moved from Cambodia into these areas in the past few weeks.

Local Complex Still 'Go'

The \$2.5 million apartment complex to be constructed on the city-owned 14-acre tract located at Seminole Blvd. and French Avenue is still "go". Contract for the purchase of the tract is to be closed Dec. 1, right on schedule.

But construction of the planned Quality Inn Motel on a portion of the site has been held up for an indeterminate period of time.

Attorney Vernon Mize and one of the three original principals, Ernest Southward, in the proposed development appeared before the City Commission in work session last night. They reported that a new group composed of W. R. Frizell, an architect, and Joseph Pulte, contractor, both of Ft. Myers, have taken over the project. Mize and Southward made it clear, however, that no profit will be made on the land transfer.

Frizell said the group will retain the Quality Inn franchise. They said despite the fact a study has proved the motel feasible, mortgage lenders insist the "Orlando area" is overbuilt in motel units at this time. He said the lenders feel the area is 2,000 units overbuilt presently.

Originally the tract was to have been developed first with a 128 unit motel and in the second phase with a 164-unit apartment complex. Decision now is to proceed with phase 1 of the development—the apartment complex first.

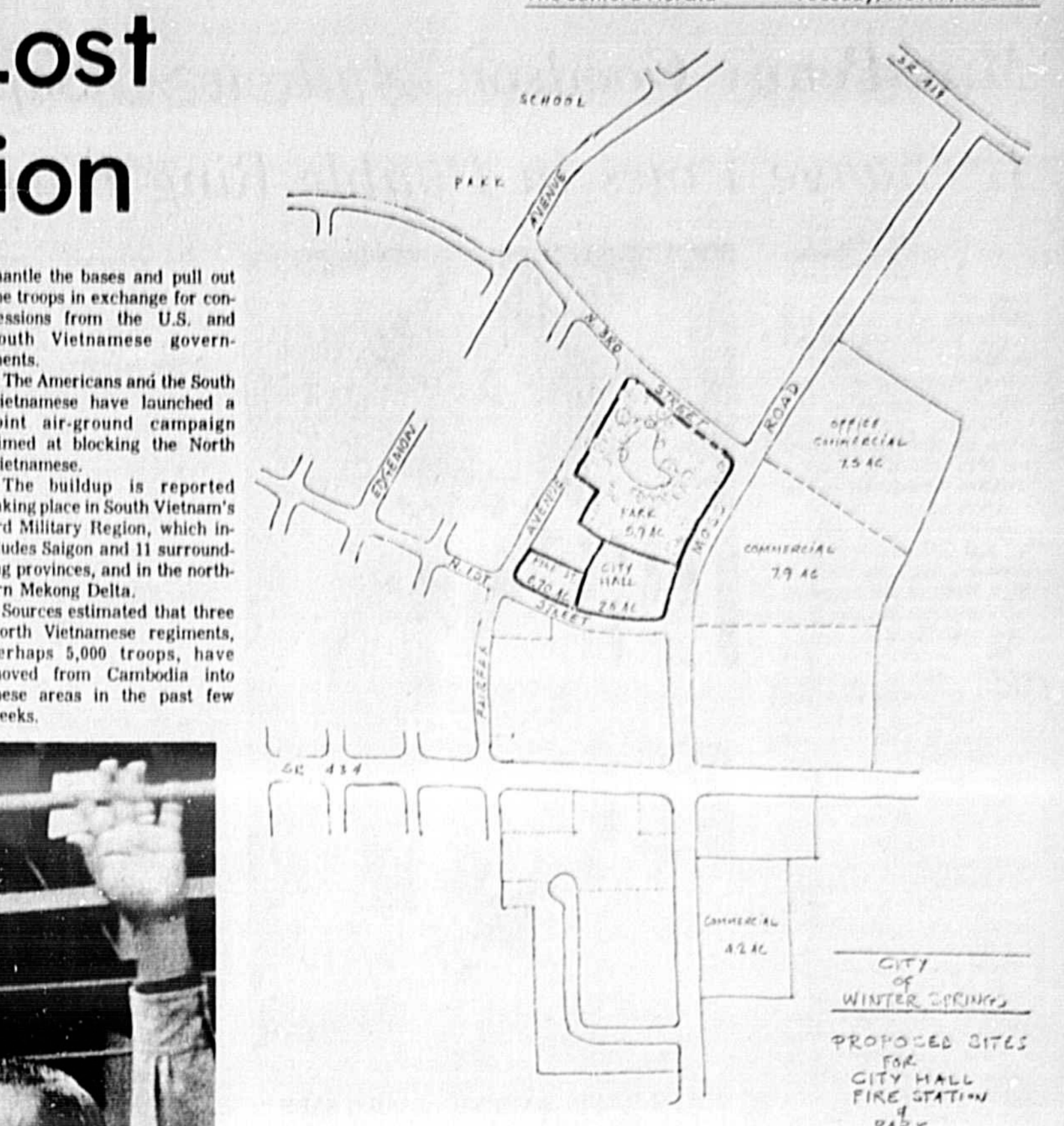

Winter Springs Gets Municipal Acreage

WINTER SPRINGS — In what Mayor Granville Brown termed the "piece-de-resistance" in a meeting of City Council, which was punctuated by numerous innovations, announcement was made that Florida Land Company has decided to the city land for municipal purposes.

The company has donated sites for a proposed new City Hall, Fire Station and park area, encompassing a total of 8.5 acres. The edifices located upon First Street, will also generate plans to have Moss Road cut through to SR 419.

Stipulation was made that the land will belong to the city so long as it is retained for municipal purposes.

However, City Attorney Thomas Freeman queried Nolan Reed, representing Florida Land Company if the reverter clause, representing Florida Land Company, was irrevocable, and if the company would consider deeding the land without a reverter clause. "We don't know what the land will be like in 50 years," Freeman stressed, and a reverter clause "just drives you crazy."

Reed contended it is important the property be utilized for municipal use forever, to which Freeman requested consideration of a 20 year time limit.

Another announcement, which precipitated a burst of applause is that North Orlando Water and Sewer Company has received permission from the various agencies involved to construct the new sewage plant. And still another progressive note for a city already in the throes of unprecedented advancement, is a proposal by Richard Davis, vice-president of WILCO Corporation, developers of the "Terraces" in Winter Springs and the proposed "Greenbelt" in Lake Mary, that the area on Moss Road, adjacent to his development be designated as a park, and Davis told council his company will erect tennis courts, basketball courts, chairs, tables, and improve the site, landscape and fence it, all without cost to the city.

The park, Davis emphasized, will be available to all city residents, and not merely those of his project.

Council accepted Davis' proposal with considerable enthusiasm.

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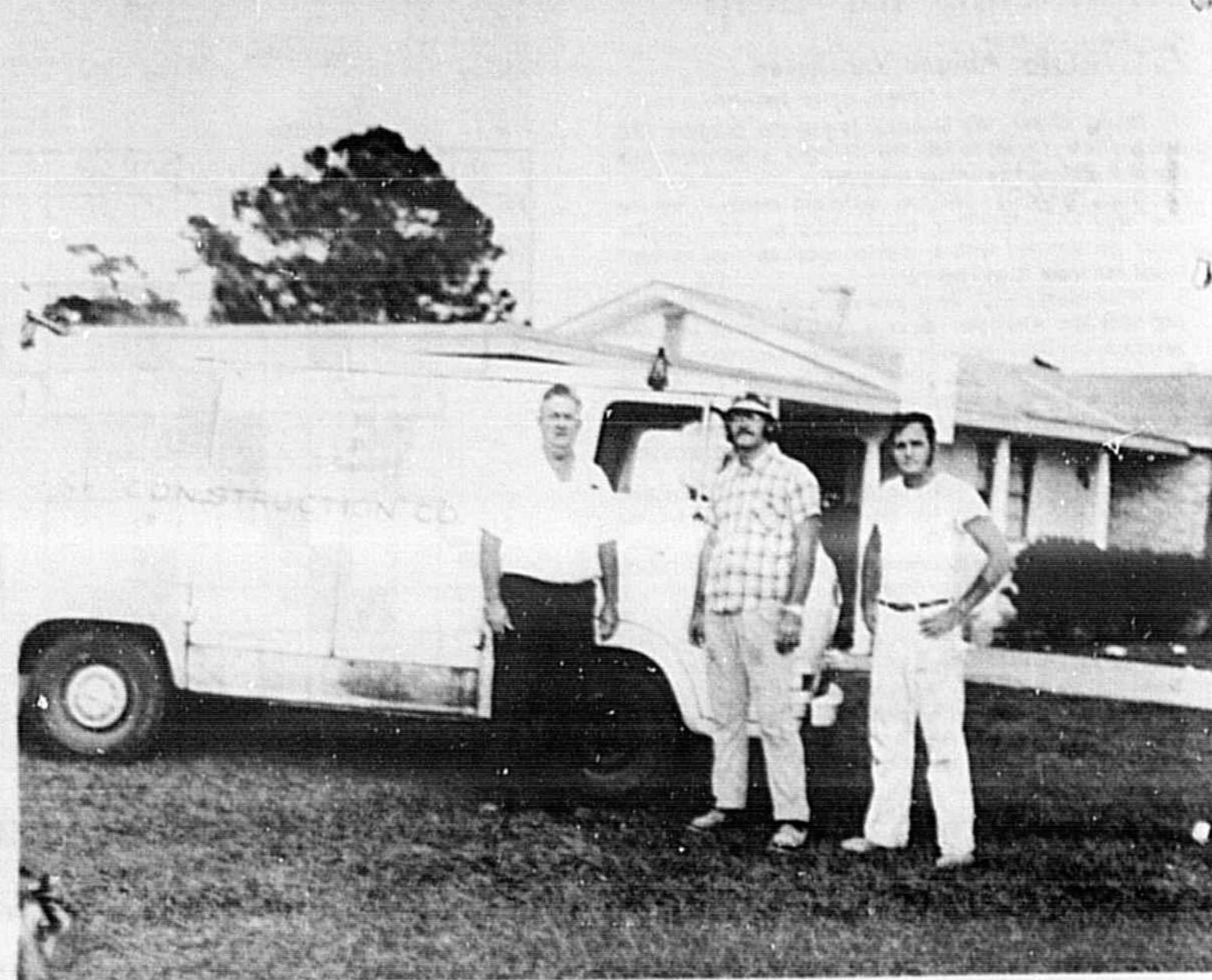

Republicans Lose Senate Seats Unfriendly Congress Faces Nixon

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The voters who gave President Nixon his landslide victory Tuesday also elected a Congress as firmly in Democratic hands as the House and Senate with which Nixon dealt during his first term.

The Democrats widened their margin in the Senate by at least two. The Republican incumbent was running ahead in Michigan in the last undecided race. If he kept his lead, the division in the new Senate would be 57 to 43.

With only seven of the 435 House races undecided, Republicans had made a net gain of 11, compared with the 41 needed to take control. And some of the new Republicans replace conservative Southern Democrats who generally had voted with the administration.

The Senate outcome was an especially hard blow to Republican hopes. The GOP had written off the House as probably unwinnable, but needed a gain of only five to take control of the Senate and thought there was a real chance.

But there was consolation for Republican strategists working for a full two-party system in the South, where many voters in recent years had shown readiness to vote for Republican presidential candidates, but stuck with Democratic candidates at other levels.

Two Republicans were elected to the House from Mississippi and one from Louisiana, the first since the Recon-

struction period after the Civil War. And in Virginia, William L. Scott defeated Sen. William B. Spong to become the first Republican senator from the Old Dominion since 1892.

The ticket-splitting voters across the country conformed to no pattern, but ousted conservative incumbents here and liberals there.

Democrat William D. Hathaway ended the 24-year Senate career of Margaret Chase Smith of Maine, chairman of the Senate Republican Conference and senior Republican member of the Armed Services Committee.

But the Democrats lost a Senate seat in North Carolina. Rep. Nick Galifianakis, who defeated Democratic Sen. Everett Jordan in the primary, was defeated in turn by a self-described conservative Republican television editorialist, Jesse Helms.

A stunner was the defeat of Sen. Gordon Allott of Colorado, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee and

an administration stalwart, by Democrat Floyd K. Haskell. Allott had been expected to win easily.

In Rhode Island, Democratic Sen. Claiborne Pell, once regarded as an underdog, won by a comfortable margin over John H. Chafee, who resigned as Secretary of the Navy to carry the Republican standard in the Senate race.

Four Senate seats vacated by incumbents changed hands—and the net result was a stand-off.

Republican Dewey F. Barrett defeated Democratic Rep. Ed Edmondson in Oklahoma to take over the seat vacated by Democrat Fred R. Harris.

The New Mexico seat left open by Democratic Sen. Clinton P. Anderson went to Republican Pete V. Domenici, who defeated Democrat Jack Daniels.

In South Dakota—George McGovern's home state which he failed to carry—the voters chose a Democrat, Rep. James Abourezk, for the Senate seat vacated by Republican Karl Mundt.

And in Kentucky, Democrat Walter Huddleston defeated ex-Gov. Louis B. Nunn to win the seat formerly held by Republican John Sherman Cooper.

Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana, Democratic leader of the House who has been missing since his plane disappeared in Alaska, was re-elected without opposition.

Rep. Nick Begich, D-Alaska, men in the House would increase from 12 to at least 15, and that the number of black members would go from 13 to 18.

Keeth pointed out that the apparent winners in Tuesday election to the School Board would take office on Nov. 21, under the new state election arrangement, which specifies winners can assume their new jobs in 14 days after an election.

Unless absentee ballots bring about a change, this means that Bud Feather and Davis Sims, Republicans, apparent winners, will take office on Nov. 21.

Next Board meeting is Nov. 14, at 3 p.m. in the county office building.

Ballot Propositions Reviewed

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Colorado voters have cut off funds for the 1976 winter Olympics, thus sending the once sought-after games elsewhere.

California overruled its Supreme Court on capital punishment and rejected a grow-your-own treatment of marijuana as voters around the nation spoke Tuesday on a host of state constitutional amendments, referenda and the like.

After years of effort to attract the games, doubts began to form in Colorado about the impact of the Olympics on the state treasury and the countryside.

The ballot proposition voters heavily favored cuts off state money for the games at the already spent \$1.9 million. The cutoff brings a halt to federal money, effectively sending the games elsewhere, Lake Placid, N.Y., site of the first winter Olympics hosted by the United States 40 years ago, stepped in line as an alternate site.

California voted two-to-one against legalizing possession and private use—but not the sale—of marijuana.

The California Supreme Court voted six to one to outlaw the death penalty, but voters decided to reinstate it. The U.S. Supreme Court has outlawed the penalty as it has been generally applied.

In other issues, Maryland voters turned down a plan for tuition grants to parents of non-public school students.

New York's \$1.15 billion bond issue for cleaner air and water rolled up 2-1 favorable margins.

Voters in Florida okayed two bond issues to spend \$240 million to buy environmentally endangered land and sites for outdoor recreation.

Ballot propositions in Oregon, California and Michigan reflecting the rising uneasiness about property tax for support of education were defeated solidly.

California's proposition would have cut property taxes statewide by an estimated \$3.2 billion a year. Increased taxes on sales, corporation, cigarettes and liquor would have taken up \$1.2 billion of that, but the legislature would have been left to make up the rest elsewhere. It lost by a 2-1 margin.

In Oregon, nearly all vocal interests opposed a proposition to ban the property tax that supplies 75 per cent of public education's financial support. The voters agreed by a 3-2 margin.

In Michigan, an proposition would have banned all locally collected property taxes for schools with an order to the legislature to come up with an alternate means of financing public education. A related proposition would have authorized a boost in the state tax. Both lost.

Propositions in Michigan and North Dakota to lift tough bans on abortion in favor of termination within the first 20 weeks of pregnancy lost by heavy margins.

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Seminole Republicans Win County For Nixon

Despite inclement weather and long lines at the 43 polling places Tuesday, Seminole voters turned out 79.4 per cent strong to give its votes to President Richard M. Nixon by a four-to-one margin.

Of the 44,371 registered voters, some 34,345 cast ballots in the election. Unofficial returns, not including some 2,102 absentee votes being counted today, gave the Nixon-Agnew team 25,922 to 6,221 for McGovern-Shriver.

The turnout was lower than that registered in the 1968 election when 83.9 per cent went to the polls locally to give the President his first term in office.

The Republican Party fared well in Seminole and appears to have taken all the seats on the School Board and four of the five posts on the Board of County Commissioners.

In unofficial returns not including the absentees, Missouri Belle Swafford (D), spouse of Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swafford was soundly defeated by Republican challenger, Davis Sims for the district 3 school board seat.

For the district 2 seat, the absentees might change the outcome, but this does not appear likely. Political newcomer Bud Feather (R) is leading another new face Ken Patrick (D) by 1,556.

For the County Commission, first term board member Al Davis (D) lost by more than 2,000 votes to Dick Williams,

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
